#### Joe Biden Says Marriage Equality Is Civil Rights 'Issue of Our Day'

Vice President Joe Biden doubled down on his support for marriage equality this weekend at a Democratic senator's event that some pundits say could be the first sign of a 2014 presidential bid.



Biden stopped by Sen. Tom Harkin's annual

steak fry in Indianola, Iowa, a major Democratic political event that has become a national platform for presidential hopefuls, on Sunday. Biden noted the recent successes he and President Obama have had on a number of national issues

"A lot of people criticized me for speaking out, not long ago, about gay marriage," said Biden. "I could not remain silent anymore. It's time we stopped talking. It's the civil rights of our day. It's the issue of our day," said the vice president, pausing for applause.

Biden went on to reference the president's support for comprehensive immigration reform for the 11 million undocumented immigrants currently in the U.S., then turned his attention back to LGBT issues.

"That's why the president eliminated [the Defense of Marriage Act], 'don't ask, don't tell,'" he continued. "That's why he came out against ... this notion that somehow, marriage can be recognized in one state and denied in another. ... Everybody in America should have the dignity to choose who they love and marry who they choose. He believes that, but not just because it's a human right, because it's all about treating everyone with dignity."

political campaign and saying the nation needed 100 more like him, Cruz said, "It's every bit as true now as it was then — we need a hundred more like Jesse Helms in the U.S. Senate." Cruz also said the first political contribution he ever made was to Helms, a Republican from North Carolina.

While noting that it's no surprise that Cruz would praise Helms at such an event, several progressive commentators pointed out the bigotry that pervaded Helms's politics. He sought to block funding for AIDS education and the work of gay artists, was responsible for a long-standing policy against admitting HIV-positive immigrants and foreign visitors to the U.S., and opposed the nomination of "damn lesbian" Roberta Achtenberg to a federal government post. He appealed to racism when campaigning against a black opponent, filibustered against establishing a holiday to honor Martin Luther King, and even serenaded African-American senator Carol Moseley Braun with "Dixie," saying he hoped to "make her cry." He denounced the U.S. Civil Rights Act and once called the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill "the University of Negroes and Communists."

"Jesse Helms was a bad person in a uniquely terrible way that increased pain and suffering for countless individuals," wrote Tim Murphy on Mother Jones's website. Murphy noted that Helms called gay people "weak, morally sick wretches," said that "there is not one single case of AIDS in this country that cannot be traced in origin to sodomy," and asserted that AIDS education is "so obscene, so revolting, I may throw up."

MSNBC host Chris Hayes took Cruz to task Thursday night on his program, All In, After offering a list of Helms's racist actions, Hayes adding that the late senator was also "a notorious, nasty, brutish homophobe." Hayes wondered if Cruz would get in the same trouble that Sen. Trent Lott did when he praised segregationist politician Strom Thurmond, an incident that led to Lott being forced out as Senate majority leader. He also observed that remarks like Cruz's could interfere with the Republican Party's stated goal of reaching out to minority groups, and asked guest Michael Steele, former chair of the Republican National Committee, if Cruz should apologize. Steele said no, that Cruz was merely expressing "one man's opinion about who

#### **Artichoke Dip**

1 (14 oz) can artichoke hearts, drained and chopped 2 (8 oz) blocks cream cheese, softened (low fat is fine)

- Combine 1 1/2 cups mozzarella, sour cream, 2 tbsp Asiago, and next 4 ingredients in a large bowl
  - 2. Spoon mixture into a baking dish and sprinkle with remaining 1/2 cup mozzarella and 2 tbsp Asiago cheese.
  - 3. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until bubbly and golden brown.
  - 4. Serve with garlic bread and/or tortilla chips.

On her MSNBC show, Rachel Maddow also discussed Helms's record, and she observed that he died in 2008, having "never repented, never apologized" for his views. She concluded, "Whistling 'Dixie' in Carol Moseley Braun's face in the Senate elevator. We need a hundred more Jesse Helmses. That's what Ted Cruz thinks would be good for America. What happens next in this situation?" She also discussed the incident with gay MSNBC colleague Steve Kornacki, speculating that Republicans may have moved so far to the right as to not be embarrassed about Cruz's remarks as they were about Lott's.

#### Life Beyond Therapy

#### DO YOU NEED A THERAPIST?

Recently, I got a phone call from a young man who said:

"A friend of mine told me that he was tired of hearing me bitch all the time about the same problems over and over and that I should see a therapist. I've never gone to a therapist: what exactly do you do?"



I recommended to him that he consider therapists as personal trainers for the mind. For example, when you work out at the gym, hit a plateau and can't progress any further, if you're smart, you stop doing the same old unproductive routine and get a trainer to help you move to the next level. A therapist does similar work for your mental state: when you're "stuck" and can't progress mentally, you need some expert help. Friends, relatives and lovers can be helpful, but they have neither the training nor the objectivity and confidentiality that a good therapist does.

Therapists (psychotherapists, psychologists and psychiatrists) are regulated and licensed by the rules and regulations of your state. They usually have rigid continuing education requirements and can lose their licenses if they misbehave (e.g., have sex with a client, violate your rights to confidentiality, etc.).

If you have a problem that is not going away, for example, your self-esteem continues to be low after years of trying to feel better about yourself, or you can't get over your ex, or you feel depressed or panicky and often anxious, a therapist may be helpful.

A psychotherapist is specifically trained to do psychotherapy, that is, therapy for your psychological issues. They do not issue prescriptions for any medications and rarely do psychological testing. Psychologists are also licensed by the State to do talk therapy (like psychotherapists), but they often do psychological testing as well.

These folks often have the initials Ph.D. after their names. Psychiatrists are medical doctors (MDs) who specialize in mental health. Their primary focus is usually in doing psychological evaluations and dispensing medications (antidepressants, antianxiety medications, etc.). You can go to any of these for "therapy", but note that each has their own specialty. Psychiatrists are usually the most expensive, psychologists and psychotherapists usually charge less.

How do you find a therapist that you like and is able to help you with your problem(s)? Well...how did you find your doctor, dentist or chiropractor? Most of us ask our friends, family and co-workers for recommendations. Once you have some potential therapist candidates (sounds like "American Idol", doesn't it?) I recommend that you come up with a list of questions to ask them before you call them up. Some therapists will speak with you on the telephone before your first appointment, others will not. If this is your first time in therapy, I recommend talking with a therapist on the phone before you make an appointment; here are some questions to consider asking them:

"Are you comfortable working with (gay/lesbian/bisexual/transgendered) men/women?"

"I am looking for help with ------". Do you have experience with this?" "If not, can you recommend someone who specializes in this area?" (Note: some therapists are generalists and others specialize).

"How would you help me?"

"How often would you want me to come in?"

"How long would our sessions last?"

"How many times do you think I'd need to see you?"

"How much do you charge for your sessions?"

"Do you take my insurance?"

"Do you have a sliding fee scale?"

"Do you have evening/weekend/early morning appointments?"

If someone is too expensive for you, ask: "Can you recommend someone else who is more affordable for me? I can afford to pay (\$ amount) per session."

This is not an exhaustive list, but it's a good start. Interview several therapists over the phone before you choose one to see in person. Remember, this is how they make their living, so keep your telephone interviews as focused as possible...ask your questions but don't waste their time.

Once you have done your telephone interviews, pick one or two therapists and schedule an appointment. Tell them during your appointment that you are looking for a therapist and may see another therapist (or two) in order to find a therapist that you really click with.

Don't feel guilty if you don't click with the first (or second) therapist you meet. You may need to meet with two or three to find the right one. It's your time and money, so make sure you feel comfortable with who you choose. Then, get ready to face your problems and change your life!

## The Affordable Care Act: Real Benefits for LGBT People

While much of the news coverage of the Affordable Care Act (ACA) has focused on the bipartisan bickering and controversy surrounding its passage and subsequent attempts to repeal it or challenge it in court, the benefits for the health of the nation are generally overlooked. In particular, there has been little focus on the ACA's benefits for people who are lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender (LGBT).

Recent data show that there are about 9 million LGBT people in the United States, accounting for roughly 3.5 percent of all Americans. Thanks to research at The Fenway Institute and elsewhere, we know that there are several specific health disparities that affect our community. LGBT people smoke at rates 70-percent higher than the general population. Gay and bisexual men, especially those from communities of color, are disproportionately affected by HIV/AIDS, accounting for roughly half of the 1.2 million Americans living with the virus and 66 percent of new infections in 2010. Transgender women have the highest prevalence of HIV of all population groups. Lesbians and transgender people are less likely to access preventive health care. LGBT youth have an elevated risk for homelessness, suicide attempts, and depression, and sexual minority youth report higher rates of substance use than heterosexual vouth.

Lack of access to health care has been a major contributing factor to LGBT health disparities. Research has found that lesbians and transgender people are less likely to have health insurance. Thousands of same-sex partners in dozens of states were stripped of employer-provided health insurance when antigay family measures were enacted outlawing public-sector domestic partner benefits. Private insurance companies have historically discriminated against gay men and same-sex couples, and many deny coverage for preexisting medical conditions like HIV. One quarter of people with HIV are currently uninsured. This includes many gay and bisexual men and transgender women. Medicaid currently does not provide coverage for single individuals or families without dependent children, which is why the Medicaid expansion to all earning up to 133-percent of the federal poverty level is so important.

The Affordable Care Act will improve access to health care for LGBT people in five important ways:

- Nondiscrimination protections: Public and private health insurers are prohibited from discriminating on the basis of sexual orientation, gender identity or HIV status.
- Insurance market reforms: The Patient's Bill of Rights
  phases out annual and lifetime limits on coverage, ends preexisting condition exclusions, and ends arbitrary rescission of
  insurance coverage. These protections are especially important
  for transgender people and people living with HIV/AIDS.
- Prevention and wellness: Certain preventive services particularly important to LGBT people will soon be covered by

insurance as Essential Health Benefits, including HIV testing, depression screening, and tobacco use screening.

- New coverage options: Subsidies will allow millions of working-class people, including LGBT people, to afford to buy health insurance for the first time.
- Data collection: The ACA authorizes the Secretary of Health and Human Services to expand the collection of sexual orientation and gender identity data on national health surveys that help us better understand LGBT health and prioritize spending and research priorities.

Thanks to the Affordable Care Act, partnered LGBT people in the 38 states that don't recognize same-sex relationships will have more affordable insurance options. Screening for HIV and sexually transmitted infections should become more accessible, routine and widespread. Health insurers won't be able to drop coverage just because someone is transgender or attracted to a person of the same sex. Low-income, uninsured LGBT people in the states that go along with Medicaid expansion will be able to access Medicaid coverage for the first time. And our community's unique health care needs will be documented by the federal government so that we can better understand and address them.

The Affordable Care Act is not going to solve all the problems plaguing the American health care system. It has gaps. For example, the ACA protects transgender people against discrimination in health care, but not lesbian, gay and bisexual people. A sexual orientation nondiscrimination regulation is needed. But the ACA represents a huge step toward addressing inequities in health insurance coverage and connecting millions of Americans, including LGBT Americans, to the health care they and their families need to live healthier, happier lives.

## Elton John Decides to Perform in Russia: 'I've Got to Go'

Elton John will not cancel a concert planned for later this year in Russia, despite the antigay climate and the threat of prosecution and jail time posed by the country's "gay propaganda" laws.

The 66-year-old gay singer told The Guardian that the show must go on in Moscow this December, in order to support his LGBT fans who might be suffering "in an isolated situation."

"Tve got to go," John said. "And I've got to think about what I'm going to say very carefully. There's two avenues of thought: Do you stop everyone going, ban all the artists coming in from Russia? But then you're really leaving the men and women who are gay and suffering under the antigay laws in an isolated situation. As a gay man, I can't leave those people on their own without going over there and supporting them. I don't know what's going to happen, but I've got to go." John's decision to perform stands in contrast to another international gay icon and performer, Cher, who recently turned down an opportunity to sing in Russia because of all the "gay hate" there.

"I can't name names but my friend called who is a big oligarch over there, and asked me if I'd like to be an ambassador for the Olympics and open the show," she told Canadian newsmagazine Maclean's. "I immediately said no. I want to know why all of this gay hate just exploded over there. He said the Russian people don't feel the way the government does."

This is not the first time the "Rocket Man" singer's sexual orientation has stirred controversy. In May 2010 he received threats from an Islamic group who demanded he be banned from a music festival in Morocco, reported the BBC. John went on to perform despite the threats.

He also revealed his dream of performing in front of the pyramids of Giza, an opportunity he was denied by authorities in Egypt because of the country's antigay laws.

Although activism is still on his mind, John told The Guardian that his "priorities have changed" as he's aged, citing to his longtime partner, David Furnish, as well as his two children.

"I probably won't be going to Albania any time soon," John said. "I don't want to tour all the time. I want to spend time with David and the kids. I've got musicals to write, films to produce. None of us know how long we've got left. I could go out tomorrow and have a car crash. But you can take precautions if you want to have a longer life. And I want to grow old with my children."

#### Jason Jacobs, Seattle Gay Man, Beaten In Alleged Hate Crime

Jason Jacobs told KOMO News he was walking through Seattle's Capitol Hill neighborhood shortly after midnight on Monday when he was approached by three men and two women who began taunting him with anti-gay epithets.

The altercation apparently occurred, Jacobs told KIRO News, after the group noticed his pink shirt and shoes. The group is then said to have chased Jacobs, 37, down the street before attacking him, leaving him with a broken nose and cuts to his face and knees, according to the report.

"Hopefully somebody saw something,"
Jacobs, who unfortunately could not provide a good description of his attackers, noted. "Hopefully we can get some justice."

He also told KOMO News, "I feel unsafe in my own neighborhood." At present, no arrests have been made.

The incident comes on the heels of a disturbing spate of alleged antigay hate crimes in New York earlier this year. Among the victims was 32-year-old Mark Carson, who was fatally shot in the head while walking through Manhattan's West Village neighborhood.

Elliot Morales, the suspect in the Carson case, may plead not guilty by reason of insanity, according to DNA Info.

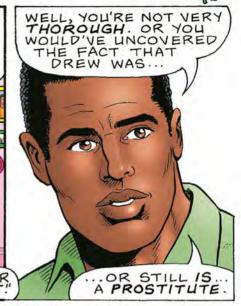

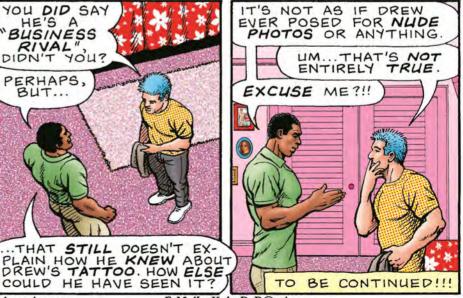

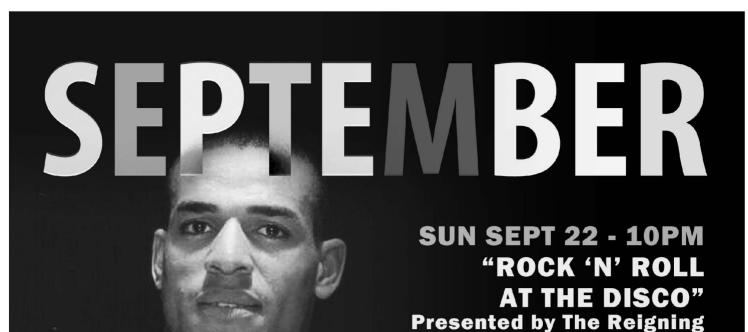
