Dear Sharon



ANGRY GAY VOTERS

The data is in. The November 13th edition of the New York Times published exit-poll statistics for one-hundred demographic groups across the last eight races for the U.S. House — with "gay, lesbian, bisexual" added as a category for the first time in 1990. That year, 78% of gays voted Democratic. In the 1992 election, 77% of gays voted Democratic, but in this year's election only 60% did so - a whopping 17 point shift to the Republicans. By contrast, the shift for whites was 8%, men 6%, union households 4%, women 1%, blacks 1% (89 to 88), and Jews 1% (79 to 78). The overall national shift was 4% (54 to 50). In the year of the angry electorate, gays were over four times as angry as your Average Jo(e). Only two of the one-hundred groups were angrier still: liberal Republicans and those who perceived their standard of living as in decline

How is one to interpret these startling results? Some gays may simply have given up on the Democrats and reverted to voting their middle and upper class interests — Log Cabin types returning home, as it were. But something morally more interesting was alloot as well — a case of rising gay consciousness in action.

When the Democrats seized control of the White House and both branches of Congress, they degraded gays as gays had not been degraded before. They jointly wrote discrimination against gays into federal law for the first time ever, doing so for the very institution—the military—whose embrace has traditionally been for America the mark of full personhood. And so gays justifiably struck back, putting their self-interest on the line for the sake of what is right. Cays at the ballot box made the sort of sacrifice by which

identities are asserted and solidified. The vote was not a benighted power grab for gays, rather it was a morally-motivated assertion of gay dignity gained at the very risk of power and self-interest lost

Though the strategy entails short-term social disadvantage, it is expedient over the long haul. For it means that gays cannot be taken for granted by the Democrats — or by anyone. The problem with being taken for granted by some group is not that the group's opponents simply write you off, but that the group itself writes you off — as, for example, Clinton had done to blacks with his racist stance on Haitian immigration, by his jettisoning the Racial Justice revisions from the crime bill, and by using the same racial code as the religious Right when discussing crime and welfare. In the voting booth, gays refused to passively accept similar humiliation and discrimination.

But have gays simply cut off their nose to spite their face? No. Can gays live with the results of the elections? Yes. There may well be some ugly, largely symbolic legislation passed, like this year's nearly passed Helms Amendment, which would cut federal funding to school districts which teach that it's okay to be gay. Look for similar restrictions at the National Endowment for the Arts. But none of this is worse that what the Democrats have already done. And if we can successfully defend ourselves against the antigay referendum initiative in Idaho — where The Aryan Nation feels at home — we can be fairly certain that the more paramoid fantasies of some gay leaders are misplaced.

But even the non-paranoid seem to be

seriously off the beam. Sheila Kuehl — "Zelda Gilroy' turned gay Democratic political operative — said at and of NGLT" is post-election national gay leadership conference, "People are in mourning, as they well should be." This whining is one more sign that the nation gay "leadership" is out of touch with its constituency. Our organizations are still stuck on the Democrats even as we have moved on. It's time to send our own national leaders the message we sent to Clinton. we can do without you.

Take Canada. There gays can serve openly in the armed forces, encounter no sodomy laws, have been given constitutional protections, and have legislated civil rights in virtually all provinces. These gains have been achieved even though the country has no national gay political organization, indeed has never had one. Ditto for gay-progressive Norway. It is the culture that matters and gays need not worry too much that we are generally losing the political wars, for we continue to win the cultural ones. In these wars, we will do better to ally with principled conservatives than with phony liberals, by whom we have been too frequently betrayed.

CIRCUMCISION: A PRICKLY DECISION

Is There No End to the Circumcision Controversy?

In a study that began 72 years ago, I have concluded that the battle between the anti-and pro-circumcision advocates continues with no end in sight!! The fight takes place on talk shows. in the press, and more recently on the bulletin boards of Computer Services. Circumcision has been described as "a big issue over a small tissue". However, the subject draws strong emotional reactions.

For fifteen years now, I have sought out thousands of men who are willing to reveal their own personal feelings and experiences as they related to their circumcision status. One only has to read their stories to realize how tremendous a shock it is for a boy to find out he is different from his peers. Those who suffered the most shock and were often subjected to ridicule, were those few boys left uncut during the post World War II years when almost 90% of all boys were cut. Pressure toward conformity is strong in children and teens. My own interest in this subject arose because of my childhood, I perceived I was different, and for years allowed no one to see me

Against the views of urologists, the American Academy of Pediatrics, in 1971, determined that there are no valid medical reasons for routine neonatal circumcision. Rates slowly began to

Then, with much more research available and with the growing concern over sexuallytransmitted diseases, especially AIDS, an AAP Task Force on Circumcision, in 1989, changed its position and concluded that there were clear medical benefits conferred by circumcision, including prevention of phimosis, paraphimosis, and balanitis (infection) and reduced risk of penile cancer and especially of urinary tract infections.

That revised position now corresponds with the position of urologists who have always favored infant circumcision, considering its low cost a life-long preventive health measure, especially important in adulthood, as protection against

Studies have shown that a parental decision of circumcision is most influenced by cultural forces ("penile chic") and especially by the status of the father.

The major health problem for the uncut male revolves around the fact that the moist, warm space between the foreskin and the head of the penis offers microbes a natural harbor where they can multiply, fed by smegma. Greater attention to personal hygiene is required throughout one's

Studies made in Africa have shown that uncut males are eight times more likely to acquire HIV virus than cut males, and recent U.S. studies bear out the fact that AIDS and other sexuallytransmitted diseases ARE a greater problem for the uncut man

Even though circumcision advocates have

offered many arguments for their point of view, the major argument for retention of the foreskin has to be the great pleasure that a foreskin can provide its owner.

One should then consider the advantages of circumcision: Reduced need for more frequent genital cleaning, the greatly reduced risk of sexually-transmitted diseases, the elimination of any need for later circumcision, and in most cases, the higher chances of conformity to other boys, with the reduced risk of a boy's feeling "different"

It is estimated that as many as 15% of males are circumcised later on, either by choice or by necessity, with the cost and inconvenience increased with age. The rates for infant circumcision (now usually performed with a mild anesthetic) have now begun to climb again.

One thing characterized the men in our survey who found themselves "different". They universally developed an almost obsessive interest in finding out the circumcision status of every male with whom they had contact. The result: The men have put together a list of over 2000 celebrities, showing their cut/uncut status. Their research, as well as their own experiences, are published in quarterly newsletters.

"HOW GAY ARE YOU?"

How gay are you? Even if you are sexually attracted to your own gender, do you ever fantasize about the opposite sex? Do you develop emotional attachments with the opposite sex? Do you prefer socializing with the opposite sex?

San Diego psychiatrist Fritz Klein has had

innumerable gay and lesbian patients who were comfortable in an out-of-the-closet lifestyle, but had questions about nebulous interests in the opposite sex. They wondered about more than just physical acts and occasional fantasies

Some people prefer to have sex with one gender but are emotionally involved with the other," Klein notes. "Physical attraction is only one variable. A gay man may prefer a straight woman as a housemate. He may prefer socializing with heterosexuals in gay bars. And he may not think of himself as predominantly gay." So Klein developed the Klein Sexual

Orientation Grid to reflect a person's overall being, not just physical acts or sexual attraction. He included the grid in the recent update of his book, The Bisexual Option. At first Klein relied on Alfred Kinsey's Homosexual/Heterosexual Rating Scale which recognized sexual orientation as a continuum instead of an either/or determination. The seven-point scale ranges from a "one" as exclusively heterosexual to seven being exclusively homosexual. A person rating five is predominately homosexual, but more than incidentally heterosexual.

As much of an improvement as Kinsey's scale was over labeling a person either homosexual or heterosexual, Klein takes it further. His sexual orientation grid includes sexual attraction, sexual behavior, sexual fantasies, emotional preference, social preference, homosexual/heterosexual lifestyle and self-identification. Each category is divided into past, present and ideal.

"Sexual attraction is not synonymous with sexual behavior," Klein says. He cites a 34-year-old mother of two children as an example. "She was monogamous with her husband, but she admitted she had been attracted to women since her childhood," he notes.

Recently stars such as Elton John and Boy George have identified themselves a bisexual. But Fritz Klein believes some celebrities of the past who were labeled homosexual were more likely bisexual. Many gays today may have more interests in the opposite gender than they have realized. "Oscar Wilde was not a homosexual," Klein declares. Though tried and convicted in the 1890's in England for homosexuality, Klein believes Wilde was bisexual. "He was in love with his wife and they had two sons. He wrote beautiful love letters to her," Klein states. Prior to his marriage he had emotional and sexual love affairs with women which would have qualified him as a womanizer in today's terms. But even Wilde's early poems exhibited an interest in male physical beauty. During his last 14 years, he was equally enthusiastic about men, Klein noted.

While a gay man may rate himself a "six" on the Kinsey scale (predominately homosexual, only incidentally heterosexual) the Klein grid gives a broader picture. The same gay man places himself at a 6 in attraction and behavior but has a slightly higher level of fantasies for women (5). Emotionally and socially he is equally involved with men and women and his lifestyle is evenly mixed between the straight and gay - giving him a 4 rating in those categories. He identifies himself as mostly gay for a 6. With his totals running 6-6-5-4-4-4-6 shows a more diverse sexual orientation than Kinsey

The results may help people reach their full

potential, Klein believes. For example, self identification as just gay or straight can be "a painful self-limitation. A bisexual who views him or herself as a homosexual suffers not only because of the label. He or she may find nothing negative in being 'gay'. But one part of that person knows that the label is a lie." If the grid shows they are not as exclusively homosexual as they had thought, it may encourage them to be they had thought, it may encourage them to to who they really are. Klein says. Because the gay community has rejected bisexuality as homosexuals living in denial, some gay men and lesbians may have repressed even the slightest



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A REVIEW

Walk the Night by Robert C. Reinhart, is a very moving and serious work of fiction, dealing with the fate of the homosexual man during the Nazi occupation of Germany in the 1930's

Since the recent release of Schindler's List, there has been an intense interest in the Holocaust We have been told through numerous fictional and nonfictional accounts about what happened to the Jews during that period of history; however, little has been said or written about the rate of homosexuals in those concentration camps.

Several researchers of the Holocaust have been reticent in dealing with the "delicate" subject of homosexuals, but recent studies have put the number of gays who died under the Nazis in the

many tens of thousands.

During that era, the Nazis created a legal system that closed exits to their newly defined undesirables," who were scooped up and deposited into bins labeled "politically undesirable," "racially undesirable," or "homosexuals." If one didn't fit a certain category, a new label and a new bin were created by a new

Leda Kohl, from a small town in Germany, had lived a very sheltered life. Upon entering a prestigious music school in Berlin, she longs to

discover Berlin's "sinful" nightlife. In Berlin, Leda meets Rudy and Dieter, who show her a side of Berlin very few encounter, unless they happen to be gay, or from a select group of people.

Leda eventually falls in love with Rudy, but their love affair is cut short by the disappearance of Rudy. (It seems Rudy was smuggling people out of Germany to Poland, and was caught by the

Rudy is never seen or heard from again. Turning to Dieter for help, Leda later discovers that Dieter is being sought by the Nazis because he is gay. Leda eventually decides to help Dieter escape from Germany, but before her plan is executed, Dieter is captured, and never heard from again.

Living in New York in the '70's, and near her death bed, Leda decides to tell her only child, Paul, some of the secrets of her past life. What is revealed is disturbing and startling to Paul

eda, however, has one final request to her son before she dies, and that is to find out what happened the Dieter, who just happens to be Paul's father.

Walk the Night is a work that makes one wonder about the fate of those tens of thousands of homosexual during the Nazi occupation. The story of many homosexuals will never be told.



12th INTERNATIONAL AIDS CANDLELIGHT MEMORIAL

The 12th International AIDS Candlelight Memorial and Mobilization will be observed worldwide on Sunday, May 21, 1995. The event, which began in San Francisco in 1983, honors the memory of those who have died of AIDS and demonstrates support for people living with HIV and AIDS. It is the world's largest annual community-based AIDS event. 243 cities in 45 nations participated in 1994 and for the first time was observed in all 50 states in the U.S.

The International AIDS Candlelight Memorial and Mobilization is coordinated under the auspices of Mobilization Against AIDS, a San Francisco-based non-profit AIDS advocacy organization. MAA supplies event coordination kits to local groups, such as AIDS service organizations and churches, which then coordinate observances range in character from small gatherings in houses of worship to huge marches.

through city centers.

"A single person, without previous experience, can bring the Candlelight to his or her town with our guidance and support," Program Director Ben Carlson said. "We urge those who care about the HIV AIDS pandemic to get involved. People are still dying of AIDS. The Candlelight is a powerful way to get the message across."

In some cases, participation in the International AIDS Candlelight Memorial and Mobilization marks a community's first acknowledgment that AIDS is a local issue, as well as a national and global issue.

In addition to raising awareness, the event offers a public demonstration of compassion and solidarity to people whose illness very often makes them the target of fear, hatred and discrimination.

The Global AIDS Action Network, a global AIDS advocacy organization, coordinates the non-U.S. observances of the event under contract to MAA.

RYAN WHITE CARE ACT REAUTHORIZATION

With the hopes for national health care all but lost, Congress should pass health-related legislation that addresses some of the most

vulnerable groups in America.

The Ryan White Comprehensive AIDS
Resources Emergency Act of 1990 (CARE Act) provides over \$600 million in community-based

health and social services for thousands of men, women, and children living with AIDS and HIV

Congress should act early in the next session to reauthorize the CARE Act for a second five year period, beginning in October 1995.

After nearly ten years of deadly silence from Washington, the CARE Act represented the first major federal response to an epidemic growing at an unprecedented rate. With the rising cost of caring for the sick overwhelming state and local public health systems, the CARE Act was conceived as disaster relief for all fifty states and twelve local communities that were disproportionately affected by the epidemic.

As is often the case with other forms of disaster relief, Congress temporarily set aside its partisan interests, passing the CARE Act by a nearly unanimous vote in both the House and the

Four years later, with the number of "AIDS disaster communities" now numbering thirty-four, the need for the CARE Act continues to grow. While gay and bisexual men - including men of color — continues to be disproportionately affected by the disease, the numbers of infected women, heterosexual men, injection drug users

and youths are increasing at startling rates. Moreover, though the nation's urban epicenters continue to experience the highest numbers and concentration of cases, HIV and AIDS is no longer unknown in suburban and rural areas.

As the need for the CARE Act grows, so too does the recognition of its effectiveness. Through its support of community-based health and social services, including preventive AIDS drugs and therapies, the CARE Act prevents unnecessary and costly hospitalizations. Its decentralized planning model recognizes that the HIV epidemic in the United States is really a combination of many local epidemics, each with its own unique face and unique service needs. Local planning has also demonstrated that traditional top-down decision making by public health officials can successfully be replaced by decision-making that involves people living with HIV as well as community-based service providers who are on the front line of the epidemic

The CARE Act was named after Ryan White, a young boy form Indiana who, before his death, inspired us with his tremendous courage and determination in the face of ignorance and fear on the part of his schoolmates and neighbors. Today, Ryan White's experience of courage in the face of discrimination is experienced daily by thousands of gay and bisexual men, women, and injection drug users who live with this disease and refuse to be silent or invisible. While the nation waits for truly meaningful reform of the nation's health care system, Congress should act now to reauthorize the Ryan White CARE Act.

What is the Ryan White CARE Act?

· Since 1990, the Ryan White CARE (Comprehensive AIDS Resource Emergency) Act has provided vital federal funding to state and community organizations to provide services to people with HIV/AIDS

· The CARE Act represents the federal government's largest investment for the provision of services to people with HIV. For 1995, Congress appropriated \$633 million to fund the

 Many federal programs, including the CARE Act, must be reauthorized every 5 years.



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AIDS AND ITS ACADEMICS

On November 17th, some two-thousand gay and lesbian academics descended on the University of Iowa to hear three-hundred papers presented over three days at the 6th National Lesbian and Gay Studies Conference. There was the usual measure of academic silliness. Papers bore title too clever by half: "Anals of History." "Butch Rage." "The Freet Penis: Can We Top It?", "Clits in Court." But there were a fair number of AIDS presentations too — all with sober titles. Death concentrates the mind.

How has the academy been doing on the AIDS crisis? Academe's response to the crisis has largely been governed by the various strands of what is called "postmodernism." Chief among these strands are moral relativism, cultural determinism, and skepticism about science strands which the French philosopher Michel Foucault spun out in the 1960's and 1970's. Foucault himself died of AIDS in June 1984, but a decade later the styles of thought that he inspired still dominate the social sciences and humanities. Unfortunately, the results have been a series of opportunities and lives lost. Postmodernism's influences on government regulation, applied science, and educational policy have been a disaster.

Traditionally academe has at least tried to provide cool reason as a brake against social hysteria. But under postmodern pressures, academe hasn't even tried in the AIDS crisis, where magical thinking and prejudice have usually carried the day. The traditional structures of public health policy are based on the classical liberal understanding of rights — the belief that the individual is the primary unit of social value and that restrictions on the individual should be limited to the least restrictive means that will protect others from harms and from perils for which they themselves are not responsible. But in the postmodern view, the individual is the product of social forces and therefore cannot constitute a source of value over and against the popular will.

Postmoderns have been chary to own up to the communitarian and communistic

consequences of their premises. And yet, their effects on the popular press have been seductive calls for the government to enforce "responsible" behavior, where the criteria for "responsible" are communitarian and communistic. I am thinking, for instance, of New York Newsday's weekly gay columnist, Gabriel Rotello, who takes Foucault as his intellectual hero. As AIDS in the 1990s has again come to be socially viewed as an affliction of minorities, governments have been all too glad to answer such calls for coercive measures. Over the last four years, half the states have passed laws making acts that might transmit AIDS count as attempted murder even when the acts are consensual. It is less likely that these unjust measures would be on the books if academe had nourished rather than undercut the country's liberal traditions

After Larry Kramer abandoned ACT-UP, it came under the sway of Foucauldian academics like Douglas Crimp. In consequence, politics corrupted science. ACT-UP's slogan became "Drugs Into Bodies!" The slogan derived from Foucault's homage to drug use in an interview published posthumously in *The Advocate* (August 7, 1984). Through media blitzes and demonstrations, ACT-UP got the government to release the anti-viral drug AZT untested — a fine enough anti-paternalistic move. If people desperate for anything want to put untested drugs into their bodies, that's their own business.

But apparently believing that ignorance is bliss, ACT-UP also got the government to abandon its double-blind effectiveness studies of the drug, which itself was know to be highly toxic and whose anti-viral effects diminish the extended use. Now, double-blind studies are how rationty is maintained in drug trials. In them neither the doctor nor her patient knows whether he is getting drug or placebo. In this way, the effects of false hones are screened way.

hopes are screened away.

Politically-driven false hopes proved disastrous here. For subsequently, the broadgaged French and British Concorde Studies found that people on AZT live no longer than people with AIDS who take no drugs at all, though the

onset of fatal opportunistic diseases is somewhat delayed with AZT. Rather than admit it had made a whopping mistake, the U.S. government now recommends that individual doctors decide on a case-by-case basis whether to prescribe AZT. But in terminating the fine-tuned double-blind studies, the government botched acquiring the very knowledge that doctors need in order to make this decision — knowledge of when AZT's toxicity and diminished returns become reasonable tradeoffs for its delaying effects. Thanks to postmodernism, doctors are now back to square one as far as anti-viral therapies go — thrashing about in the dark

Postmodernism has also bedeviled preventative efforts Postmoderns hold that sexual categories and, derivatively, sexual desires are socially formed, and so socially re-formable. All we have to do is change the way we talk and think about sex, and — voila — our sexual natures, desires, and behaviors will comply with the current social understanding of goodness. Or so it goes. With this as a background dogma, Foucault disciple Simon Watney, for instance, holds that we simply have to get kids to believe — the lie — that safe sex is part of the very definition of gayness, and gay kids will, in turn, act accordingly. Similar lies blare from posters which read "Safe Sex Is Great Sex" — a case of the lady protesting too much.

Not surprisingly, these simplistic efforts backfired. When people see through the lies, they simply lose faith in safe-sex campaigns. After a decade of safe-sex advertising lies, gay men are again becoming infected at a rate that will return AIDS to its saturation level among them — about lifty percent. Realistic AIDS education teaches that safe sex is merely okay sex and counsels, without moralizing, the prudence of reduce expectations. Realistic AIDS education acknowledges that many people will not be saved by its message. But more people will be saved by it than by lies.

Postmodernism's unwillingness to face the fact that there are facts — to admit there is a cussedness and intractability in people, sexuality, and germs — has bungled both therapeutic and preventative efforts and prompted needless deaths.

BAY AREA YOUNG POSITIVES OFFERS CARE, SUPPORT FOR HIV-INFECTED YOUTHS

Positives, a peer-support group for young people with HIV, released a poster campaign touting the agency's counseling services and social events for HIV, residing Bay Arra youth

events for HIV-positive Bay Area youth.

The agency's programs include one-to-one peer counseling, a wide variety of support groups, health and social services, educational workshops, and a buddy program to help young people living with HIV connect with another BAY Positives member.

The campaign kickoff coincided with the seventh annual World AIDS Day, a global event commemorating and celebrating those affected

by HIV and AIDS.

The theme of this year's World AIDS Day observance is "AIDS and Families Protect and Care for the Ones We Love" — which, according to Antigone Hodgins, 26, executive director of BAY Positives, speaks directly to the concerns of young people with HIV.

With the headline, "Young People With HIV Supporting Young People With HIV," the BAY Positives billboards, posters, and internal bus cards feature HIV positive young women and men of all colors in photos emblazoned with the

words "friendship", "fear", "relief", and "hope". The posters, which will be seen by a potential daily MUNI-riding audience of 706,722, also carry the BAY Positives phone number, 415-487-1616.

Recent studies show there have been 2,542 cases of AIDS diagnosed in San Francisco among young people aged 20-29, representing one in eight cases. The vast majority of them contracted HIV in their teens or early twenties.

New HIV infections in the city are expected to occur at a rate of 4% annually among gay and bisexual men ages 17 to 25, as against an annual increase of 1.5% among adult gay men and bisexual men. That is about 200 young gay and bisexual men becoming infected with HIV each

Hodgins said young people living with the virus are more likely to accept support from someone in a similar situation who is speaking with a similar voice.

"Given the stigma, ignorance, and fear associated with young people and HIV, it is most effective for HIV-positive youths to offer emotional support and educational services to youths who are newly infected or who have ongoing concerns about living with the virus," Hodgins said.

Bay Area Young Positives as founded in January 1990, when two HIV service providers began facilitating a Monday night drop-in support group after concluding city HIV services lacked

youth sensitivity.

Soon that group was youth-led the peer facilitation model proved highly effective in supporting the nearly 200 HIV-positive youths that attended over the next few years.

After receiving federal funding through the Ryan White CARE Act in December 1993, BAY Positives moved into Lower Haight quarters earlier this year, and remains the only purely peer-based program run by and for HIV-positive young people in the Bay Area.

Rodney Allen Bell, II, a former Nebraska gay/HIV activist was ordained as a minister November 25, 1993 from the American Fellowship Church in Carmel, California. Rodney received his B.A. in 1987 in Political Science from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. Rev. Bell received his Master of Arts in Pastoral Counseling from Truman Institute in 1993 and his Doctor of Divinity in 1994. Love Spirit Ministry is the organization that he founded and continues as director of today.

continues as director of today. Rev. Rodney A. Bell, D.D. was president of the UNL Gay and Lesbian Resource Center. He is the originator of the "Wear Blue Jeans If You're Gay Day!" that shook the UNL campus in 1985. Rev. Bell also received the Sue Tidball Award for Creative Humanity in 1986. He founded the UNL Gay/Lesbian Alumni/ae Association and founded the Rodney Allen Bell, II Scholarship Fund for Gay and Lesbian Students. While in Nebraska, Rev. Bell promoted concerts, wrote grants, publicized gay/lesbian events, built bridges between organizations, studied life and made waves handing out condoms in February of Initially, the Administration of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln went to court to get a restraining order to prevent the students from handing out condoms and educational material. UNL GLSA won. The headlines were nationwide. Mr. Bell created the Gay/Lesbian Programming Committee at UNL, which is now COLAGE (Committee Offering Lesbian and Gay Events.)

In an attempt to stay ahead of a growing chorus' needs, the Chorus has taken several steps to distribute some of the work load and begin planning for the future. The Board of Directors voted to increase the size of the Board from seven to eleven. A special election was held last fall, to fill these additional positions as well as the vacancy created by the resignation of Ellen Adamson. The five new Board members are: Lisa Stover, Rence Reimer, Kathy Fischer-Berry, Christine Peek and Greg Toobey. Unfortunately, due to career conflicts, Christine found it necessary to resign in December in December a Board retreat was held at Mahoney State Park where the initial phase of vision-setting took place.

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COMMUNITY RESPONSE TO NEEDS OF THOSE INVOLVED IN RECENT PARK ARRESTS

A small group of Omahans gathered in November and December to develop a way to deal with the crises resulting from the recent arrests in the parks. Without dealing with the right or wrong of the behavior, it was acknowledged that these events have caused problems in people's lives. One man chose to take his own life. Others have been suspended form their jobs and many may be fearful of legal consequences. This group included people from various disciplines, especially counseling, ministry, and law. Together they developed a statement offering supportive services to anyone caught in the sting operation. The general attitude of the participants was that the community must reach out in compassion and without judgment.

The statement which is being sent out to the media encourages persons to call the Information and Referral Line. The volunteers will give names of therapists, lawyers, and ministers available for referral. Anyone wanting to offer services is invited to contact the Phone Line at 402-558-5303 with the

needed information.

This group is also offering a panel representing legal, therapy, and spiritual professionals for media interviews to discuss making these services available and the need for a compassionate and non-judgmental community response. Anyone wanting further information is invited to contact Rachel Foley at 402-551-7171 or Rich Ketter at 402-341-1371. The statement being sent to the media follows: Whenever there is a tragedy or a perceived tragedy in out lives we tend to have the feeling that we are all alone. The feeling of loneliness might be accompanied by the feelings of shame or guilt for what has happened. As a result of these feeling we avoid seeking assistance or confrontation in the hopes that the attention will fade away. Some of you may he having those feelings now if you were part of the park roundup or have visited the parks in the past. You want some assistance or maybe you just want someone understanding to talk to, but you do not know where to turn. Some of you will just plead guilty and hope the whole thing goes away. Others have thought of suicide and one has already committed suicide, and others will lose relationships or jobs over the publicity. No matter how overwhelming these feelings may be, giving up is not the answer.

There is a group of concerned citizens in Omaha who have gathered together to lend their assistance to those who might need it. This group consists of attorneys, ministers, therapists, and citizens who are willing to lend assistance with whatever need you might have, whether it be legal, spiritual, psychological, or just someone to talk to. The group is nonjudgmental. They are here to ensure that you find the help or information you need. You are not alone and help is just a phone call away. Call 402-558-5303 for assistance. You will receive a recording. Please leave your name (first name only is okay, a number where you can be reached and what type of assistance you need. All messages are held in the strictest of confidence.

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OMAHA POLICE SEIZE GAY ARTWORK FROM THE NEW RUN BAR ACLU May Join Battle Against Censorship

As reported in *The Omaha World -Herald* and on all three major TV stations in Omaha, on Tuesday, December 13, police vice inspectors entered The New Run Bar at 17th and Leavenworth and confiscated one oil painting and two pencil drawings by the renown gay artist, Snowflake.

The works were put on display at the Run through arrangements with an Omaha collector.

The series of works includes male nudity and some depiction of gay sexuality. Individual pieces are valued between \$1000 and \$20,000.

Bar owner, Terry Tippitt, stated that the police

Bar owner, Terry Tippitt, stated that the police arrived at the bar and asked to see the display which was housed in the newly remodeled lower level of The Run.

The lower level was not open at the time, and Terry stated that he had to unlock three different doors in order for police to gain access to the area.

It was reported in *The World-Herald* that the police were responding to a complaint from fire inspectors who had been in the lower level over the weekend checking compliance with the recently issued after hours permit.

In an exclusive interview with The New Voice, Terry stated that the American Civil Liberties Union is considering taking the case as part of their project to deal with censorship in the arts.

As of this writing, Terry Tippitt will not be cited for any criminal acts, but, through his attorney, he did reach an agreement with the city prosecutor to remove any artwork which might be construed in any way as portraying sexual activity.

Any further action will be taken up as a civil matter.

LIVING WITH AIDS IN THE 90s

Results of the recent survey, "Living with AIDS in the '90's" call for increased education on managing opportunistic infections (OI), a critical area in AIDS management. The survey was conducted among representatives of organizations that offer services to people with AIDS who were attending the National Skills Building Conference.

The survey shows that 90 percent of those surveyed agreed that the people they serve need a better understanding of AIDS-related OIs, illnesses that develop in a person of the respondents agree that they would also like to have a better understanding of OIs. The need for information is further underscored by 92 percent of respondents who agree that some OIs in people with AIDS can be averted with preventative therapies.

"AIDS patients need to know about opportunistic infections and the related symptoms to seek appropriate and timely medical care," said Alberto Avendano, M.D., medical director, NAPWA. "It is alarming that experts working in the trenches believe that they do not have enough information to share with AIDS patients."

"The survey also reveals what the respondents believe their clientele know about AIDS management:

• Forty-five percent said their clientele know some but not enough about when to seek treatment for various symptoms. Thirty-six percent said their clientele know very little or nothing at all, compared to only 15 percent who said their clientele know very much.
