Washington, D.C.'s Board of Ethics and Elections announced Tuesday that a measure to ban same-sex marriages cannot go on the city's ballot.

Opponents of same-sex

marriage wanted to ask voters whether "only marriage between a man and woman" should be recognized in the city. The elections board says putting a measure to ban gay marriage on the ballot would conflict with the city's Human Rights Act.

Board chairman Errol R. Arthur said in a statement that the "laws of the District of Columbia preclude us from allowing this initiative to move forward," reports the Associated Press.

Currently, the city council is considering a measure that would let same-sex couples marry, and it's expected to pass.

Federal Marriage Suit Continues

Gay married couples suing the government over the law that denies federal recognition to same-sex unions said Tuesday there is "no legitimate or plausible" reason for having a federal definition of marriage that excludes gay couples.

Gay married couples suing the government over the Defense of Marriage Act, which denies federal recognition to same-sex unions, said Tuesday there is "no legitimate or plausible" reason for having a federal definition of marriage that excludes gay couples.

The lawsuit was brought by seven gay couples and three widowers, all of whom were married in Massachusetts after it became the first state in the country to legalize gay marriage in 2004.

In court documents filed Tuesday, the group claims DOMA violates the 14th Amendment's equal protection clause since it denies them access to federal benefits such as pensions, health insurance, and the ability to file joint tax based on their sexuality.

The U.S. Department of Justice wants the case dismissed.

In a court filing in September, Justice Department officials acknowledged that the Obama administration thinks DOMA is discriminatory and should be repealed, but said the department has an obligation to defend federal laws when they are challenged in court.

The Justice Department also argued that there is no fundamental right to marriage-based federal benefits.

"DOMA marks a stark, and unique, departure from the respect and recognition the federal government has long afforded to State marital status determinations," lawyers for Gay and Lesbian Advocates and Defenders argued in a written response to the Department of Justice's motion to dismiss the lawsuit, reports the Associated Press.

It would take a ruling from the U.S. Supreme Court or an act of Congress to strike down DOMA.

A bill to repeal the law was introduced in the U.S. House in September by representatives Jerrold Nadler, Tammy Baldwin,

and Jared Polis, but it has little chance of making it to a vote this year.

"DO I DRINK TOO MUCH?"

When I first meet a new client, one of the questions I ask him/her is "how much do you drink?" Over the years, I have gotten some pretty amazing answers. Some of the more memorable ones include, "Just enough until I black out so I can sleep" and "Not very much, just a bottle of wine or two every night with dinner." For many people, alcohol, like sex, is a topic that makes us a little nervous. We wonder how



much we should drink, how much other people drink...and what if a licensed psychotherapist like me thinks you drink too much, what then?

It's not my place to decide who should drink how much and how often. My job is to help my clients become the men and women they want to be. For some people, alcohol gets in the way. It's an obstacle, not a pleasure. While I am not a licensed substance abuse counselor. I have worked with many clients who question whether they are drinking too much. It is a fine line between freely enjoying alcohol (you can take it or leave it) and depending on it (using it to get you through a tough day/ week/life). Most of us, myself included, enjoy a drink occasionally: it relaxes us, takes the edge off a rough day, helps us be less socially anxious or shy. Many people can enjoy the occasional pleasurable effects of alcohol without becoming hooked or suffering significant negative consequences. Some people can't. While they are often called "alcoholics", the more accurate psychological terms would be "alcohol dependent" or "alcohol abusing".

People who are dependent upon or abuse alcohol cannot have a casual relationship with booze; they "need" alcohol to function. Is this you? Can you function just fine without alcohol? Do you need a drink (or two or three) to make it through the day? To get through a social situation? To cope with a difficult relationship? If so, you may have a form of alcohol dependence. Does the alcohol control you, or vice-versa? Alcohol dependence can be identified by an increasing need for larger amounts over time. If it's hard for you to quit or cut down your booze intake, you may have an alcohol dependence. But don't freak out, keep reading.

If you have a dependant or abusive relationship with alcohol, the booze is typically interfering with your daily activities, e.g., making it hard to get to work and do your job or getting along with friends. You may not be dependent on alcohol, but booze could still be a problem for you, even if it's not severe enough for you to be considered an "alcoholic". If you were my client, I'd have some questions for you:

- Do you ever binge drink?
- Do you ever drink until you pass out?

- Do you ever drink to avoid feeling sad/angry/lonely?
- Have you ever driven your car while intoxicated?
- Do you drink alone on a regular basis?
- How much would your life change if alcohol suddenly disappeared off the face of the earth?

You may have some degree of alcohol dependence if you try to impose limits on yourself but can't stick to them. For example: you go out clubbing with your friends and resolve to drink only two drinks, three drinks max, and three hours later you've had eight drinks and wonder how you got there, cursing your lack of self-control. Maybe what started out a few years' ago as fun and experimentation has now become a necessity. Your tolerance for alcohol may have increased so much that what three drinks used to do for you now requires eight drinks.

If you wonder if you drink too much, look at your motivations for why you drink. I had a client ask me, "I'm only 21, isn't it normal to drink a lot?" I encouraged him to dump the word "normal" and substitute "healthy" or "smart" and answer his own question. While younger people may drink more, that doesn't mean it's a good idea.

Dear Reader, today, why not take a good honest look at your drinking and ask yourself the above questions. If you are concerned about how much you drink, you can get more information about alcoholism and alcohol dependence/abuse on-line or from a 12-step Alcoholics Anonymous group (for locations near you, Google "Alcoholics Anonymous") to help you decide if it's time to modify your booze consumption. No one – including me - can tell you if you drink too much, but if alcohol just isn't working for you, tell yourself the truth and get some help. Now is the time,

Gay Tourists Abandon The Vega Strip?

MGM and Harrahs have spent years marketing to gay consumers -- and both companies fear gay tourism to Vegas will plummet if Gov. Jim Gibbons makes good on his promise to veto the state's domestic-partner benefits bill.

For years, Harrah's Entertainment, MGM Mirage, and a number of other Nevada companies have courted gay and lesbian tourists -- but if Nevada governor Jim Gibbons sticks to his promise to veto a domestic-partner benefits bill that is making its way to his desk, will Silver State tourism suffer the loss of the almighty gay dollar?

On Tuesday, Harrah's Entertainment senior vice president Jan

Jones wrote an impassioned letter to state lawmakers that stressed the importance of gay tourism to Nevada's economy. The letter urged that gay tourists could abandon Nevada's casinos, clubs, and restaurants in droves if the legislation fails.

"Our state cannot afford to lose any more revenue to other destinations because of a reputation as a place which is not socially or politically the right place to do business or to vacation," Jones stated in the letter, dated Tuesday.

"Most of the legislators have answered," Jones told The Advocate on Wednesday. "Some have said 'We're with you,' and some have said, 'Nice to hear from you.' We just believe we have to keep the pressure up. There's no reason not to support it, it doesn't mandate employers provide certain benefits."

Harrah's -- which owns casinos on the Strip including Caesars Palace, Bally's, the Flamingo, and Paris, and the popular Stripadjacent Rio -- is one of Nevada's largest employers, and the company provides health care benefits to partners of its employees.

The Nevada legislature already passed the domestic-partnership bill, which would give committed unmarried couples -- both gay and straight -- the same rights and responsibilities as heterosexual married couples. The bill specifies that domestic partnerships, or civil unions, are not the same as marriages as defined in the Nevada constitution.

But Gibbons has vowed to veto the bill, with his communications director saying the governor believes the bill is not necessary because any couple already can secure rights pertaining to wills, inheritance, and hospital decisions by executing private contracts. Jones says this is a basically a lie; gay couples would have to personally execute dozens of contracts, at their own expense, to accomplish what this bill automatically would.

"This should be a very simple vote," Jones said. "It's the right thing to do. It allows people to preserve their rights and their family's rights."

MGM Mirage's senior vice president of public affairs Alan Feldman said Jones' letter is "completely consistent with what Harrah's and what Jan would do." MGM Mirage, which has also offered domestic-partner benefits to all of its employees for many years, is preparing for a potential veto by the governor, but Feldman said he hopes that eventually "cooler heads will prevail."

"It is a challenge," he said. "We make a very real, concerted effort on a lot of these issues, and to have the sense that you're fighting against your own state is very frustrating."

Jones says if the governor does vote the bill it could have a longterm impact.

"I don't think the governor is thinking at all... I think there's going to be longterm ramifications for many of the governor's decisions."

In opposing the DP bill, Gibbons has also stated that he doesn't want to get involved in residents' personal lives, although he supported the state's constitutional ban on same-sex marriage in 2002. To this, Jones says, "How does [the DP bill] get into people's private lives? It allows them to have a private life. If he

(Continued from page 9) really believes that than he should be an ardent supporter."

Jones knows LGBT tourists have funneled millions, if not billions, into Nevada's economy.

"These are customers who we actively recruited, that we've spent millions on convincing them Las Vegas should be their city of choice for vacations... How can we say to them, 'We want your business, but we don't care about your rights?"

There's no organized boycott of Nevada as of yet, and the bill may pass through a legislative override of the veto. But if enough votes aren't found, gay tourists could take their money away from Las Vegas and Reno.

"Las Vegas is the number two gay destination in the country" after New York, Thomas Brock of Community Marketing Inc. told the Las Vegas Review-Journal. "It would be very dangerous for the state to send out a signal like that. If you don't want to take care of your own citizens, why should we support you?"

Catholic Church Talks Abuse, Gay Marriage

The Catholic Church renounced the myth that gay priests abuse children more than straight priests, while still affirming that marriage should be defined as a union between one man and one woman at the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops meeting in Baltimore on Tuesday.

A preliminary report commissioned by America's Roman Catholic Bishops released on Tuesday finds no evidence that gay priests are more likely to abuse children.

Researcher Margaret Smith of John Jay College of Criminal Justice in New York said the study so far has found no connection between being gay and an increased likelihood of abuse, reports the Associated Press.

Questions about any link had been raised widely in the church because most of the known victims were boys.

Gay advocates and many experts on child sex abuse have long held that there is no link.

The ongoing study is looking at what led to the clergy sex abuse crisis. The final report is expected at the end of next year. Also during the meeting, the nation's bishops reiterated that the Catholic Church will continue to define marriage as a union between one man and one woman and assert that sex is meant for procreation.

In a pastoral letter on the issue, the AP reports, the bishops claim that redefining marriage to allow same-sex unions would damage the common good and would ignore the proper role of husbands and wives.


