helped share information and experiences.





Soft Cell are best remembered here for their 1982 hit, "Tainted Love." The group is much more well-known in their native England, where they produced 17 hit singles from 1980-84. Since 1984, former lead singer Marc Almond has had a successful U.K. solo career with eleven single releases, three albums and two EP's.

Almond collaborated with Communards vocalist Jimmy Sommerville (then with Bronski Beat) in 1985, leading to the single "I Feel Love" by Bronski Beat and Marc Almond. "I Feel Love," a remake of the Donna Summer hit, reached number one in 19 countries and was a huge club hit here. Meanwhile, Almond's outstanding live performances in Europe and Japan have inspired critics to dub him "England's Boss."

The second annual convention is sponsored by Gutteramerica, Marc Almond's U.S. fan club. The name is intended to reflect an affiliation with Gutterhearts, the official Almond/Soft Cell fan club in London. Gutteramerica is a strictly non-profit organization. Cheers For "BOO"

BOO (Bars and Organizations of Omaha) is an organization or organizations. The group was established about one year ago when the Rev. Jan Kross, pastor of Metropolitan Community Church of Omaha, did some phoning to bring together the heads of Omaha's Lesbian and Gay groups and businesses.

The object was to share ideas and coordinate plans to avoid conflicts and to prevent groups from vying for the same audience at the same time.

The idea worked. BOO has met monthly for more than one year. Through a shared calendar, six (now down to four) Lesbian or Gay bars, religious support organizations, social and recreational organizations, support groups for Lesbian/Gay parents or parents of Lesbians and Gays, educational and fund-raising assemblies -- roughly 25 individual groups in all -- have worked together to coordinate Omaha's Lesbian and Gay community activities.

One of BOO's initial successes was planning and coordinating Omaha's 1986 Pride Week. The various BOO participants also worked together to make successful Labor Day and Memorial Day picnics. Through BOO, the Omaha Womyn's Group and River City Mixed Chorus invited not-for-profit groups to participate in a Monte Carlo night and share in the proceeds.

The apparent novelty of a cooperative organization such as BOO came to light at a national meeting in Minneapolis of Gay and Lesbian choruses (GALA). A River City Mixed Chorus member happened to mention, quite casually, at one session how BOO helped the RCMC avoid scheduling conflicts. Throughout the audience, eyes opened wide, and heads of participants from throughout the United States bent in unison as pens and pencils madly scribbled notes about

the cooperative and coordinating efforts of Bars and Organizations of Omaha.

BOO meets at 6:30 p.m. on the first Thursday of each month. The location rotates among the participating bars and M.C.C.

"Dignity" Grows Despite Adversity

In October, Vatican City released a letter condemning homosexuality as "disordered" and saying its churches should withdraw support from pro-homosexuals (implying DIGNITY).

By happenstance, the monthly DIGNITY/Omaha mass in November was a home mass, away from any sponsoring church. December's mass, however, was back at the host St. John's Church and was celebrated by the church The mass was wellpastor. attended, including an increase in womyn's attendance. The pastor an excellent dialogue (participative) homily and visited with the congregation during the after-mass fellowship. DIGNITY still has mass at 7:00 p.m. the second Sunday each month at St. John's Church.

A local chapter of the national body, DIGNITY/Omaha sees hope in the ever-increasing attendance, particularly by womyn, and takes as a positive sign the apparent continued permission to have mass at St. John's Church, said Russell Warzyn, chapter president.

The Omaha chapter of Lesbian and Gay Catholics, in existence for about three years, operated initially under a coordinator. Last March the members formalized their structure somewhat as they started down the road from chapter in formation to full chapter status, with voting delegates to the regional and national boards. Chapter members this January and February prepared their nominations for election of

new officers, which was scheduled after the March 8 mass.

Immediate tasks for the new officers will be working on chapter bylaws, as well as completing application for U.S. Internal Revenue Service recognition as a non-profit organization.

Bisexuals: Barriers on Both Sides

"I wanted only to try to live in accord with the promptings which came from my true self. Why was that so very difficult?" -- Herman Hesse, Demian.

That one simple quote sums up bisexuality, or just sexuality in general for me.

So often, society tends to feel the imperious need to label people and categorize them into modeled stere-otypes. Whether it be your race, religion, taste in music, or sexuality, someone is always standing by, ready to limit their vision of the person you are, because of their own perceptions.

Coming out to my homosexual side has fostered very interesting perceptions of myself from other people. Straights have commented that I am interested in women because of my "bad" experiences with men. Gays have commented that I am interested in men because I am afraid of homosexuality. And then I have run into people who just aren't that interested in expressing their opinions to me about their perceptions of my sexuality, be-cause they value my being: not so much what I am, but who I am. It is these people, who do not label or judge me according to stereotypes, that I am the most comfortable with.

Labels and stereotypes seem to create barriers of letting our true selves "come out," whether it is coming out to our homosexuality, heterosexuality or bisexuality, or just an aspect of ourselves that we would like to explore.

But because we all live in a world where society sets such selfdefeating standards, it is a true quest for the spirit of individualism to "live in accord with the promptings" that come from our inner selves.

Bisexuality: A Complex Reality

Bisexuality doesn't exist," said someone in Lincoln to me a couple of years ago. Bisexuals just can't have stable relationships. Bisexuals live in a "no one's land." Bisexuals are really gay people who just haven't come all the way out of the closet. Bisexuals are really confused about their identity. Bisexuals are indiscriminate in their sexual partners. The only way to be "truly" bi is to be active sexually with partners of both sexes equally. Bisexuals are incapable of monogamy. Bisexuality "doubles your chances for a date on Saturday night."

Perhaps some of these statements are familiar to you. The reality of bisexuality is often denied by gay and straight communities alike. Myths and stereotypes are a problem, just as they are for gay/lesbian people.

Individual bisexual persons may fit or believe one or more of these myths and stereotypes. But just as there is not just one homosexual lifestyle, there is not just one bisexual lifestyle, but a whole range of possibilities from which each individual makes her or his own choices and decisions.

Looked at in the context of the whole of what we know about human sexuality, sexual orientation is much more complex than simply the two commonly used heterosexual-homosexual categories. It is even more complex than adding a third category of "bisexual;" yet, to talk about certain realities, labels sometimes make things a bit clearer.

bisexual lifestyle, but a whole range of possibilities, from which each individual makes her or his own choices and decisions.

For the purposes of this article, bisexuality will be defined as the presence of significant degrees of erotic attractions, erotic fantasies, and emotional preferences for members of both genders, with some recognition of their significance. Note that behavior is not a necessary part of the definition, and recognition, or identification, is important. This not a precise definition (if one were even possible), but it will do for our purposes. It is important to note that bisexuality is not a discrete category, but roughly fits the middle range of the Kinsey scale.

The Kinsey scale is a zero to six continuum which was designed by the Kinsey researchers in the 1940's to describe the reality they were discovering, that there were not just "two kinds of people" (heterosexual and homosexual), but in fact a whole range of behaviors and "psychologic reactions" from homosexual to heterosexual and all points in between. The scale runs





from zero, exclusively heterosexual, to six, exclusively homosexual, with three being equal components of both.

There is not much research done on bisexuality or bisexual persons, but one study is particularly interesting. This study pointed out some of the ways bisexual persons are different from heterosexual and homosexual persons. Pat Saliba had self-identified heterosexual, homosexual, and bisexual persons rank themselves on three separate Kinsey scales: physical sexual activity, affectionate relationships, and erotic fantasy. Kaliba sums up her re-search: "Sexual orientation is complex, not simple." She found that people almost never rated themselves at the same point on all three scales. Within each self-identified group, there is diversity of ratings: all the homosexual ; soms and all the heterosexual persons weren't exclusively so, and all the bisexual persons aren't perfectly equal in gender preference.

She found that, among the bisexual group, affectionate relationships and erotic fantasies were "almost as important as sexual activity in their decision to self-identity as bisexual." This group also was quite diverse in the combinations of ratings among the three scales: some had only in-



cidental sexual activity with persons of the same sex, some had only incidental sexual activity with persons of the other sex. While affectionate relationships were frequently ranked equally, "erotic fantasies were as diverse as those for sexual activity."

Saliba found "tremendous variability, in all areas" among all groups. And yet, the bisexuals are much more like one another than they are the heterosexual either homosexual groups, and the same is true for each group." She also found that the way sex and affection are dealt with is more related to whether one is male or female. "Sexual orientation is not only much more than who you sleep with . . . but it is also where your affections lie, and even more importantly, how you integrate those affections into your sexual identity." ("Research Project on Sexual Orientation," The Bi-Monthly, newsletter of the Bisexual Center, San Francisco, Vol. 6, #5, Sept.-Oct. 1982, pp. 3-6.)

There are different kinds of bisexuality, as well: transitional, historical, sequential, and concurrent. Transitional bisexuality can be understood as a stage in coming out homosexual, and is primarily a behavioral reality, though attractions and fantasies can shift. Historical bisexuality is seen in the long sweep of a person's life, with greater or lesser mixes heterosexual and homosexual components. Sequential bisexuality is also seen over a period of time, with relationships being first with one and then with the other gender. Concurrent bisexuality is the maintenance of relationships with persons of both genders at the same time (Barry and Alice, Kohn and Matusow, pp. 126-7).

In my experience as a counselor, bisexual persons often feel some confusion at sometimes being attracted to one and then the other gender. The either-or myth contributes greatly to this confusion. Sometimes the confusion is simply the changeability of their attractions from day to day, or week to week.

It is the homosexual part of being bi that usually gives the most difficulty, so bisexual people usually need the support of gay/lesbian people, and so often are reluctant to identify as bi in gay/lesbian circles. This seems to be changing somewhat, at least in some gay groups, but homophobia will continue to make it difficult to "come out" bi in the general society.

Bisexual persons are most often concerned about relationships rather than gender.

Bi people are often particularly sensitive to the importance of selfidentification, growing out of the common experience of others denying their existence or defining sexuality for them. Bisexuals may come for counseling to be more comfortable with a wide range of sexual options. They may want to be more comfortable in fantasy or behavior or both, with men and women. They may want to be monogamous. They may want to be nonmonogamous and still have a viable primary relationship with either a woman or a man. They may want to be comfortable with multiple relationships (and practice safer sex). They may want to be more comfortable defining their own sexual options, apart from partner, peer, or society pressure. They may want to be comfortable not being sexually active with both sexes, and have feelings and fantasies about both.

Bisexual persons are most often concerned about relationships rather than gender, with the capacity to express relationships genitally if it is fitting, desired, and mutual. Bi persons are also often concerned about managing these relationships not only in caring ways for their partners, but also in ways that honor their own self-understanding.

Bisexuality is a complex reality, perhaps as complex as sexual orientation itself. In my opinion, the experience of bisexual persons helps illumine the wide range of the gift of sexuality, and will continue to challenge our understandings and assumptions about sexuality.

Bisexual Happiness: A Personal Story

For thirteen years, from 1956 until my husband's death in 1969, I was married to a bisexual. Jack could, obviously, function in a relationship with a woman, but that took time and care and enormous trust; the involuntary sexual response -the dry mouth, the short breath, the stirring of the gonads - these were invariably caused by men. He told me before we married, and telling me was very hard for him. It made no difference to me; I loved what he was, and marriage seemed to me to be about a lot things, but physical fidelity wasn't one of them. But having made a decision to marry, we also had to arrive at a way of accommodating Jack's homosexuality.

Jack's personal sexual tastes made it easier. He didn't like casual sex; his partners were almost invariably long-term friends as well as lovers. Some of our happiest times were occasions when his lovers came to stay with us, or we visited them and spent our time turning a triangle into a circle; I learned to love a lot of his friends. Some of them were married, too, but none had told their wives about themselves. That was something I really didn't understand -- how a marriage could exist with so large a part of one partner's experience unknown to the other. I myself, incidentally, remained faithful to Jack. That may not seem fair, but I knew that my taking a lover would hurt Jack deeply; his having lovers didn't hurt

Jack's guilt and fear made it impossible for him to face the prospect of coming out, so we lied a lot.

It wasn't all easy. One problem was Jack's ambivalence about his own sexuality. Homosexuals of his generation lived with a tremendous burden of guilt, and in some ways he wanted a kind of absolution from me that I couldn't give; I didn't think he had any reason to feel guilty. And somewhere deep in his psyche Jack had the notion that my lack of jealousy meant that I

really didn't love him. Part of him rejoiced in his freedom to be what he was; part of him felt there was something deeply wrong with me that I could accept him. That problem was made worse by our isolation from straight friends. Jack's guilt and fear made it impossible for him to face the prospect of coming out, so we lied a lot. Part of the sense of relief and ease we felt when his lovers came to stay was the simple pleasure of being able to talk freely, without constantly guarding our tongues.

The end of the story isn't happy; Jack eventually found it impossible to deal with the burden of guilt and the recurring bouts of depression that had hit him every three years or so since he was twelve. He took a massive dose of barbiturate. But in spite of this I still feel that happy and life-sustaining bisexual partnerships are possible. They need honesty, patience, and a sense of community support -- but any marriage needs those. We had the honesty, and the patience; we did not have community support. A Lifestyle Is More Than Sex

Does devoting an issue of the magazine to bisexuality mean that it exists in body, in spirit, or both? I've been told by both heterosexuals and homosexuals that there is no such thing as a bisexual; I've been told you're one or the other and saying otherwise is only avoiding an issue.

If I knew the answer to my opening question, the following would take on quite a different dimension. I'm male, mid-fifties, and in a comfortable financial position. I'm married and happy about it and in having a pleasurable sex life. I joyously fathered two children. Here's the kicker: I also enjoy sex with male friends. Granted, in my position, this is not often but nonetheless it's enjoyable. Am I heterosexual with

an occasional fling, am I homosexual using my wife to keep the closet door closed, or . . .?

For me, sexual arousal can be tender or rough, timely or untimely, and can occur without respect to gender.

At one time I was told you are what you fantasize. No help there. For me, sexual arousal can be tender or rough, timely or untimely, and can occur without respect to gender. What I wish for in a friend is the same I wish for in a sex partner: kindness, friendliness, someone who delights in touch and feel, who likes to listen and talk, someone who understands my ups and downs, a hand to hold, a closeness not dependent on space, and someone who knows how to let out and pull back when the time comes. Does this sound like someone you know or would like to know? Does this someone sound female or male? With me it really does not matter if it's a female person or a male person, just as long as it's a comfortable person: a real person, not a phony one.

Since I have lived for some years I've had a great deal of time to question myself on my sexuality. My answers tend to confuse me; so no doubt, they would do the same to others. Do I like pomography? Sometimes. Do I want it to be female or male? Depends. Would I like a night on the town with my wife or a male friend? Yes. Does a breast bursting its blouse demand an admiring glance? Yes. And so on and so on.

Am I heterosexual or homosexual or what? Maybe I'm a human being who loves the feel of sex, who likes good looking people, who likes people who are comfortable with themselves and who make me feel comfortable. I have some lovely male friends and some lovely female friends; sex is not the allconsuming, all-encompassing issue, Sex is one of many attributes. I'll accept it and I'll offer it, but so will I offer and accept friendship, love, understanding, dislikes, phobias, and quirks, all of which makes up me and you. Can it be wrong to enjoy, to accept all aspects of another person?

"My Two Loves": A Review

I want you to tap your memory circuits and return back to the time of your first love for a woman. The cherished memories of the excitement you felt in her presence, the shit-eating grin you got on your face every time you thought about the previous night of love-making when time stood still for an eternity.

Now that you are remembering the experiences, start feeling the emotions of fear that "lesbian" was permanently written on your forehead, or the confusion and guilt that those feelings were socially unacceptable to friends and family. Feel yourself running away, but at the same time wanting to stay and learn more about this dark place in your heart.

All this happened in the movie My Two Loves, starring Mariette Hartley, Lynn Redgrave, and Barry Newman. This movie is about one heterosexual woman loving a man - as she has all her life - then finding out she can love a woman more passionately than she ever loved any man.

I appreciated them portraying a lesbian as a beautiful professional woman instead of a strong male likeness, as in most movies. My Two Loves portrayed real life situations, such as the mother catching the two women kissing, or the feeling of going crazy because of the emotions and seeking out professional help to continue with the process of coming out.

At the conclusion, Mariette Hartley chose to let go of both relationships. This left the viewer with a choice as to what conclusion would be best. This lack of moral judgement on sexuality is refreshing.

I think this movie helped the general population realize that you can experience your sexuality in a completely different way anytime in life. I would strongly suggest to anyone to watch this movie. Many people taped it from television last year, so ask around.

PFLAG Booknotes

Rofes, Eric. Socrates, Plato, & Guys Like Me: Confessions of a Gay Schoolteacher. Boston: Alyson Publications, Inc., 1985. \$6.85, pb.

Eric Rofes is not a new face on the scene, but this book was new to me. In 1981 Rofes edited a collection of childrens' stories about themselves, The Kids' Book of Divorce. As a result of that effort, he and some of his students were interviewed by Phil Donahue, and the work received wide recognition. He certainly established his credibility as a caring and knowledgeable teacher.

Now, in Socrates, Plato, & Guys Like Me, we can read the autobiographical account of his first years in teaching, as well as the evolution of his need to allow his identity as a gay man to be recognized. Fresh out of Harvard, Eric was hired to teach at one of the private country day schools that abound in New England. He was already somewhat of a gay activist, as much as one can be from within a professional closet. He felt constrained to hide this aspect of his his employers. from Homophobia in our society sometimes casts its shadow over the very people who are its objects, and Eric bought the untested notion that a gay school teacher would not be acceptable to the parents and school board.

Although this was his first experience in the classroom he soon displayed himself to be a gifted teacher, sensitive to the needs of his students, well-prepared in his subject matter, and like and respected by parents and fellow teachers. A happy compromise: teaching in his public life and privately a gay speaker, writer, budding political activist? The best of both worlds? Using a pseudonym as a gay man, constantly on guard that he would say or do something, or be seen some place, that would reveal his secret, Eric's personal growth did not allow him to be comfortable in this particular state of compromise.

True, compromise is often the oil that keeps the surface of life pleasant, but it is not the stuff of principle, or of self-acceptance.

Rofes reveals in this book how it became necessary for him to become fully open as a gay man. He allows the reader to become part of his process of "coming out" in a way that I think anyone can relate to. For me this book is one that I can recommend to anyone who needs to ask the question: "But why do 'they' have to tell everyone?' And if you don't need to ask that particular question you will still be appreciative of this highly readable account of a portion of his life. It's a quick read, and a valuable re-source. We need role models, and Eric Rofes certainly qualifies.


