New Year Brings New Unions in N.H.

New Hampshire is becoming the fourth state to legalize civil unions, and about 20 couples have decided to be the first to take advantage of the new law with a late-night ceremony on the statehouse steps in Concord Monday night.

Jennifer Major of Gilmanton, who helped organize the group ceremony, said festivities would begin at about 11 p.m. Monday with poetry readings and live music. The civil unions can take place once the law takes effect at 12:01 a.m. Tuesday.

Major and her partner, Kelley Morris, planned to be among the couples saying "I do."

"Every single night ... I come home from work and say, 'Guess what we're doing on Monday?' She says, 'Getting married," Major said last week. "We have to keep pinching ourselves because it's Monday, not next Monday or two weeks from Monday. 'I don't have any winter coats with rhinestones and glitter, so I'm just going to dress warmly," she said.

At the bill signing in May, Gov. John Lynch called civil unions for same-sex couples a matter of conscience. "How could any one of us look into the eyes of our neighbors, our friends, or our loved ones if we continued to deny them these basic legal protections?" he said.

New Hampshire joins Vermont, Connecticut, and New Jersey in legalizing civil unions. Massachusetts is the only state that allows same-sex marriage.

The new law says civil unions will provide same-sex couples with the rights, responsibilities, and obligations of marriage, except the name.

It also says New Hampshire will recognize legal same-sex unions from other states, but a group of conservative Republicans in the legislature is working to undo that part of the law. A hearing is scheduled for January 24.

The state estimated 3,500 to 4,000 civil unions will be performed in the first year. (Beverley Wang, AP)

San Diego Mayor Backs Marriage Equality

San Diego Mayor Jerry Sanders defied expectations -- and his own stated intention -- Wednesday evening to sign the city's amicus brief urging California's high court to overturn a same-sex marriage ban.

Sanders, a Republican, had said he would veto the resolution passed Tuesday to add California's second-largest city to the growing list urging justices to let same-sex couples marry. He said he supported civil unions when running for mayor in 2005.

Instead, Sanders signed the resolution, and said his lesbian daughter, Lisa, and her partner were a big reason why.

"As I reflected on the choices that I had before me last night, I just could not bring myself to tell an entire group of people in our community that they were less important, less worthy and less deserving of the rights and responsibilities of marriage . . . simply because of their sexual orientation," he said Wednesday in a prepared statement interrupted several times as he fought back tears.

Sanders becomes the first GOP big-city mayor to sign on to the cause. He sends a powerful message not only to the Supreme Court but to fellow Republican Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger, who has separately been sent by the Legislature a bill for marriage equality.

"I do believe that times have changed," Sanders said Wednesday. "And with changing time, and new life experiences, come different opinions. I think that's natural, and certainly it is true in my case.


"Two years ago, I believed that civil unions were a fair alternative. Those beliefs, in my case, have since changed.

"The concept of a "separate but equal" institution is not something that I can support \dots

"I have close family members and friends who are members of the gay and lesbian community. These folks include my daughter Lisa and her partner, as well as members of my personal staff.

I want for them the same thing that we all want for our loved ones -- for each of them to find a mate whom they love deeply and who loves them back; someone with whom they can grow

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

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










"And I want their relationships to be protected equally under the law. In the end, I could not look any of them in the face and tell them that their relationships -- their very lives -- were any less meaningful than the marriage that I share with my wife, Rana."

San Diego now joins Los Angeles, San Jose and Oakland, and several smaller cities, in calling for the court to uphold thousands of same-sex marriages officiated in San Francisco in February 2004 at the direction of Mayor Gavin Newsom.

Lisa Sanders was unavailable for comment, the mayor's spokesman, Fred Sainz, told Associated Press. Sainz said she had told her parents four years ago that she is a lesbian and is currently in a committed relationship, but her orientation wasn't public until her father's speech.

The mayor, a former police chief who is up for re-election next year, acknowledged that many voters who supported his earlier stance might disagree with his shift, but said he had to do what he believed was right.

In 2000, 62 percent of San Diego voters, and 61 percent of statewide voters, endorsed a measure to restrict marriage to a union between a man and woman. (Barbara Wilcox, The Advocate)

Russian Pride Organizer Faces Slander Charges

Moscow gay Pride organizer Nikolai Alekseev will soon face charges of slander and insult for allegedly outing former parliament member Alexander Chuev on live national television, reports the U.K. Gay News.

Speaking on the NTV channel's talk show K Baryeru! on June 21, Alekseev reportedly called the state Duma deputy a "gay, coward and hypocrite." It was the first outing of a gay politician in Russia.

The criminal case against the Moscow Pride organizer is expected to arrive in court shortly. The court will have to give the final verdict whether Alekseev committed any crime under Russian law.


Alekseev added that he believes the court has no other choice but to find him innocent, "though in the current condition of pressure from authorities I can not exclude that the decision of the court will not be fair, which is not any more a surprise to us. In any case, we are ready to lead this case up to the European Court of Human Rights in Strasbourg."

Regardless of the outcome, the Pride organizer feels the end justified the means: "We reached the main goal of defeating Mr. Chuev in Duma elections in December."

Chuev failed to get 7 percent of votes for his Fair Russia party in the Khabarovsk region. As of Christmas Eve, he is no longer a deputy of the Duma. (The Advocate)

Domestic-Partnership Law Halted in Oregon

A federal judge on Friday placed on hold an Oregon domesticpartnership law that was set to take effect January 1, pending a February hearing.

The law would give some spousal rights to same-sex couples.

Opponents asked U.S. district judge Michael W. Mosman to intercede after the Oregon secretary of state's office ruled in October that they had failed to collect enough valid signatures on petitions to force a referendum on the law.

The Oregon measure covers benefits related to inheritance rights, child-rearing and custody, joint state tax filings, joint health, auto and homeowners' insurance policies, visitation rights at hospitals, and others. It does not affect federal benefits for married couples, including Social Security and joint filing of federal tax returns.

After the legislature approved the domestic-partnership law this year, gay rights opponents launched an effort to collect enough signatures to suspend the law and place it on the November 2008 ballot for a statewide vote.

But state elections officials said this fall that the effort fell 116 valid signatures short of the 55,179 needed to suspend the law.

In court Friday, Austin Nimocks, a lawyer for Alliance Defense Fund, which opposes the measure, said the state's review process was flawed, disenfranchising citizens who had signed petitions.

The state's largest gay rights group, Basic Rights Oregon, criticized the judge's decision.

"It's unfair our families once again are bearing the brunt of this ongoing struggle," said Jeana Frazzini, a spokeswoman for the group.

Eight other states have approved spousal rights in some form for same-sex couples -- Connecticut, Vermont, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Maine, California, Washington, and Hawaii. Massachusetts is the only state that allows gay couples to marry. (Sarah Skidmore, AP)

New Jersey Targets HIV Transmissions

HIV testing will soon become part of routine prenatal care and be required for some newborns in New Jersey under a new law that supporters say is putting the state in the forefront of the national fight against HIV transmission to babies.

Acting governor Richard J. Codey signed the measure into law Wednesday at University Hospital in Newark. The law will take effect in six months.

"We can significantly reduce the number of infections to new-

borns and help break down the stigma associated with the disease," Codey said. "For newborns, early detection can be the ultimate lifesaving measure."

Codey, the acting governor while Gov. Jon S. Corzine is out of the country this week for the holidays, sponsored the bill as the senate president.

Meanwhile, a ban in Washington, D.C., against using city money for needle-exchange programs was lifted Wednesday, a move officials say will help reduce the soaring rate of AIDS and HIV there.

A provision allowing the city to fund needle exchanges was included in the \$555 billion spending bill signed by President Bush on Wednesday. Federal spending packages dating back to 1998 had previously blocked such programs.

The New Jersey bill allows women to opt out of the HIV testing, but critics contend the screening will deprive women of their right to make medical decisions.

According to the Kaiser Foundation, a nonprofit research organization focusing on U.S. health care, New Jersey is the first state to push HIV testing for both pregnant women and newborns.

Arkansas, Michigan, Tennessee, and Texas require health care providers to test a mother for HIV, unless the mother asks not to be tested, while Connecticut, Illinois, and New York test all newborns for HIV, according to the foundation.

New Jersey has required providers only to offer HIV testing to pregnant women. Under the new law, HIV testing will be part of routine prenatal care for all pregnant women, and doctors will provide pregnant woman with information about HIV and AIDS. It also requires newborns to be tested when the mother has tested positive or her HIV status is unknown.

Riki E. Jacobs, executive director of the Hyacinth AIDS Foundation in New Brunswick, the state's largest AIDS service agency, said the law won't help the women who don't get prenatal care.

"We need to focus on getting people into care and keeping them in care," Jacobs said. "That is our most potent prevention weapon."

The federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has recommended all pregnant women be tested for HIV, though it has said testing should be voluntary. The CDC also found medical intervention during pregnancy can cut mother-to-child HIV transmission from 25% to 2%.

New Jersey has about 17,600 AIDS cases, according to the Kaiser Foundation. Women represent 32.4% of the cases -- the third highest rate in the nation. The national average is 23.4%. The state has about 115,000 births per year and had seven infants born with HIV in 2005, according to state health department officials.

The American Civil Liberties Union and some women's groups contend the bill deprives women of authority to make medical decisions.

"Women's privacy rights and choices are as constitutionally

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
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valid as any other citizen, regardless of reproductive status," said Maretta J. Short, New Jersey's National Organization for Women president.

In Washington, Mayor Adrian M. Fenty said in a statement Wednesday that needle exchanges will be included in a larger city program to reduce AIDS and HIV infections. About \$1 million will be devoted to the exchanges.

About 128 of every 100,000 Washington residents have AIDS, compared with 14 cases per 100,000 people nationwide, according to a recent study. (AP)

Stopping Homelessness for Omaha Youth

"If you want to see how important families are, then look at homeless youth, because the family has a tremendous impact on their lives," said Ana Marie Cauce, Professor of Psychology at the University of Washington at Seattle. According to the CRS Report for Congress, "gay and lesbian youth appear to be overrepresented in the homeless population, due often to experiencing negative reactions from their parents when they came out about their sexuality". In Omaha specifically, there is a shelter service that is trying to take homeless youth off of the streets. This is the Youth Emergency Services, and in an interview with Bob Storey, the Executive Director of YES, I had the opportunity to find out how this program services the Omaha area.

What is the mission of YES?

We're the only organization that deals with homeless, runaway youth in town. The organization has been around since 1974. When the organization was started it offered short, emergency shelter for teenagers 13 to 18. It stayed as a one program service until about late 1998. That's the time when we developed and implemented the street outreach program. The street outreach program deals more with the homeless, runaway youth than did the original shelter operation. The original shelter operation dealt with kids that were having trouble with their families and it grew across time where we also deal with the juvenile courts and the foster care system. It didn't particularly deal with the homeless, runaway kids until about 1998. That's when the street outreach program started, and we serve anywhere from 500 to 700 kids a year now.


What kind of services do you offer homeless kids? Well, it depends on the program. If you are a kid that has been caught up in the juvenile court system, the court may rule that there's something going on in your family that precludes you from going home. They'll order you to be placed in out home placement. That kid may stay with us for a short term of time until a more stable type of situation can be found. We'll probably have that kid for up to 30 to 45 days, and then, they'll move on to a longer term placement. If the kids is in the foster care system and has all of a sudden developed problems with the foster family and needs to be removed and placed into another foster family, they may be placed with us for a period of time until they can be placed in another foster care system. If you're talking about a kid that is not getting along with the parents and there is a lot of behavioral issues and the family is kind of at their wits end, we will have that child anywhere from seven to fourteen days in order to give the family the opportunity to get some services put in place in order to deal with that situation. When you talk about runaways and homeless youth, if they choose to, they can reside in our shelter for a short period of time until we can provide a stable housing situation for them. If they are on the run, then we will allow them to stay in the shelter building until we can make arrangements for them to be returned to where they need to be or negotiate their return to the family.

I understand that you have a drop-in center on Harney. What is that used for?

Now, in addition to the shelter services with the outreach program, we do have a drop-in center that is located at 2057 Harney. That building has a food pantry. It has an inventory of clothing, a shower facility, a laundry facility. We do have meals that we provide at that location. That building is open Monday through Friday from 3 p.m. to 9 p.m. We have a visiting nurse association and a public health nurse onsite, two nights a week to take care of their immediate health needs. We also have the visiting nurses taking care of some parenting classes, because a lot of the young ladies that we deal with do have children. We also stock up on baby food, formula, and diapers at that location.

How has the community gotten involved with the YES program?

We do get donations of diapers, formula, clothing, and books on a regular basis. We also have some activities at that location that allow community organizations to come in and present their services so that kids know what's available to them. We maintain a resource manual. We're pretty familiar with about every service in town that these kids may need, and we have referral rights to those programs. The last thing about the program that makes it a little bit unique is a lot of people are familiar with the safe place signs around town, but they don't necessarily know what these signs mean. If you drive into a Kwik Trip for instance, you will see on their light pole a yellow sign that says "Safe Place". There are 50 of these places around town now, and the staff of those particular buildings understand that if a kid comes in and says, "I need help", they will call us and we will respond to it.



Nebraska AIDS Project's MPower Program Coordinator is currently recruiting 18 to 29 years old Gay/Bi-Sexual men who want to get involved developing a new social fraternity in 2008. We need 12 to 20 "Core Members" (Big Brothers) who will be making decisions for the group.

Core Members (Big Brothers) will sponsor volunteers (Little Brothers) to assist with all activities carried out by the group. If you are an individual who wants to take an active role in creating something positive within your identifiable population, now is the time to get involved. We will begin building this dynamic and much needed program from the ground up starting in January of 2008.

This new group will operate under the existing philosophy as the original MPower Group. "A program that encourages all gay/bi-sexual men to work together to build a healthy community in which they can thrive, formulate optimistic social connections and support safer sex; using gay-positive and sexpositive approaches." One of the focus groups that will be starting in January will be a bi-weekly support group for the HIV-Negative Gay Man. As AIDS prevention strategies focus more on psychosocial pressures of gay men who are HIV-negative, group work with this population has proved to be a healing solution to the on-going psychological toll of the AIDS pandemic. In an environment in which the link between sex and survival has been turned upside down, groups of these men offer invaluable forums for normalizing fears, clarifying values, disseminating information, and building a community of concern that mitigates overwhelming feelings of loss and isolation that might otherwise lead to selfdestructive behaviors. Of particular importance with this focus group will be stage specific interventions. Recognizing how to utilize an integrative approach may give the group leaders the best opportunity for exploring the multi-issue concerns related to both staving uninfected and maintaining psychological wellbeing. To be very frank, the group will talk about sex, relationships and concerns about your confidence in staying negative.

As MPower Program Coordinator, I firmly believe that only by celebrating the normality and healthiness of gay men's needs for social, emotional and sexual connections with each other can we begin to help men not place themselves or others at risk of becoming infected. When gay men deeply feel good about themselves, good about what they do sexually and good about their partners, there is a hope and possibility that they will choose not to behave in ways that will continue to transmit HIV. Unsafe sexual behaviors are possibly an expression of low self-esteem or occur solely under the influence of alcohol or party-and-play drugs.

MPower's "thought provoking" "safe-sex" question(s) of the month:

Can you infect a partner with HIV if taking medications? Do you know where on your body mucous membrane can be found?

Answers:

HIV has been a threat for 25 years, yet many people believe they are at low risk of becoming infected or infecting their partner. This is especially true of young gay and bisexual men who, unlike older gay and bisexual men, have not experienced the toll of HIV/AIDS. At the same time, the success of new drug treatments may be contributing to increased risky behaviors among some MSM. For example, some MSM may mistakenly believe that they or their partners cannot spread the virus when they take HIV medication or that having HIV is minor condition with no life-threatening consequences. They may not understand that HIV treatment may not work for everyone and that for some, it may work only for a time.

A mucous membrane is wet, thin tissue found in certain openings to the human body. These can include the mouth, eyes, nose, vagina, rectum, and opening of the penis.

Nepal Court Rules for Gay Rights

Nepal's top court ruled last week that the government must create new laws to protect gay rights and change current ones that might be tantamount to discrimination, an official said.

The Supreme Court issued the order in this conservative Himalayan kingdom after hearing a petition filed by four gay activist groups seeking greater rights for homosexuals, said court spokesman Til Prasad Shrestha.

Shrestha indicated it is up to the government to determine how the ruling should be implemented. It was not immediately clear whether the ruling overturns current laws banning homosexuality or whether the government would be compelled to recognize same-sex marriages.

Homosexual acts are punishable in Hindu-majority Nepal by up to two years in prison.

A government representative could not immediately be contacted.

Sunil Pant of the Blue Diamond Society, the country's main gay rights group, said it was a bold decision by the highest court in Nepal, where gays frequently face harassment, including by police.

"It was an extremely positive decision and a pleasant surprise for us. It would set a precedent for other conservative countries like Nepal," Pant told the Associated Press. (AP)

ACLU Demands That School Stop Censoring Lesbian Student

The American Civil Liberties Union has requested that a Virginia high school remove any mention of discipline from the record of a student who was punished for wearing a T-shirt with a lesbian symbol. Bethany Laccone, a 17-year-old senior, was suspended December 10 when a teacher became offended by a shirt she wore in class that featured two overlapping female symbols.

The assistant principal and the teacher told Laccone that her shirt violated the school's dress code, which bans "bawdy, salacious, or sexually suggestive messages." In a later meeting with Laccone's father, the assistant principal said that the teacher is "very conservative" and that she was so upset by the shirt that it interfered with her ability to teach.

"When my teacher told me she wanted me to turn my shirt inside out or cover it up, I was confused, because I've worn that shirt to school several times before and nobody ever said a word about it," Laccone said in a statement. "I wear that shirt because I want people to know that I'm proud of being a lesbian and comfortable with who I am. And I have the same constitutional right to free speech as any other student."

She attends a different school full-time but goes to I.C. Norcom High each morning for a hotel management class, according to the ACLU. The group is urging the school to remove her suspension from her record and to pledge not to illegally censor students.

"A public school teacher's job is to serve the needs of all the students who go to that school," said Christine Sun, a staff attorney with the ACLU's national Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender Project. "If a teacher can't deal with the fact that there are gay students in her classroom, that doesn't mean she gets to violate that student's First Amendment rights." (The Advocate)
