## We are Everywhere In all Occupations

Recently The New Voice of Nebrasika conducted a non-scienEiflic survey to confirm what is already known-gays, lesbians and persons living alternate lifestyles are located in every occupation imaginable. There are gay and lesbian police officers, dentiats, construction workers, lawjers, doctors and farmers, We are located in schools, larye business fimns, hotels, retail stores, factories, and state and oity office buildingin. Whe serve the sick and elderly,
build bridges, fight fires, deliver the mail, and maintain our nation's security in every branch of the military.

Many stralght people stereotype un and place us into categories. Gay men are pictured as beauticians, interior decorators, florists and ballet daroers. There is nothing wrung with thowe chosen professions but we are not limited to a sielect troup of careers.

Disclosure in the work place can be difficult or nearly tmpossible in the midient. Many gaya and lesbians in Nebraska separate their private Lives from their camers. Lov ers and eignificant others ane referred to as rocmates and imagianary heterosesual facades often materialize. Sonetimes marriage occurs to protect one's identity and attempt to fit into the norms of society. Nost gays and lesbians do not Eit itereotypical inagos so it is easy to blend in the workplace without any suspicion.

The survey anked over 100 people to describe their jobs, how they enfoyed their work, guestions concerning disclosure and how sone occupations benefited gaym and lesbians. Mawbers of the Neot Voice staff passed out written questionnaires as well as receiving verbal responises.

Most gays and lesbians indicated that sone people in the vorkplace knew about their lifestyle but total disclosure was a rarity: most individuals did not fear losing their jobs but scme felt it onuld hurt their chances for promotion or acosptance among co-workers. Over 701 of those responding to the survey indicated that they enjoyed their work.

A surprising outcome of the survey was that a slight majority of respondents said their jobs enabled them to help other
gays and lesbians. For sare this was dane very indirectly.

## A Visit to Man's World

Several issuea ago $I$ wrote a colum about bathhouses. I basically said that going to the baths was a foolish thing to do but that people have the right to do foolish things. Some time later, I ans introduced to David, the owner of Man's World Baths in Council Bluffs, who was leas than pleased uith my column. He asked me to visit Man's World in Council Bluffa to see for myself what kind of a business he operates. I accepted that invitation and would like to share with my readers my impressions of Man's World and Man's World's owner.

I mada neveral broad generalizations about baths because I have not been to the baths since AIDS became a health problem for the gay male community. I remember filthy hothouses where sooties were in abundance, and it took hydrogen peroxide to make one feel reslly clean again.

Entering Han's World at 5:30 on a Saturday afrernoon, one notices the olear odor of bleach and learns that ane just eissed alaaning time, a ritual that takes place before the Jaturday night crowd arrives. David har a policy of maintaining as clean and safe an environment as is numanly possible, including oocasionally telling a patron, "Exouse me, but this is your third trick. Don't you think a shower would be a good Idea?" Negotiations are underway with the County Health Department to test for sexually transmitted diseases.

David says that be belleves baths serve a positive role in gay soofety because gay malan have always had a penchant for tricking anonymously. In a bathhouse, gay males dan anonymous 2 y crick in relative safety-.the magtings, fag bashings, and other occupational hazards that accompany tea cooms and parks do not axist within the

Walls of barhhouse, for the most part. Since gay males have always and iIIt always bet aore ?roadrotuous than the generdi population, David believes that by providing a relatively safe atmosphere for such activity, he does the community a service.

What about the AIDS Acare? "Studies show that the people the are at riak for AIDS are the people aho are promiscuous, whether or not they are promiscuous at the baths. A persion who picks up two or three triaks a week at the bars is fust as high a health riak as the person who goes to the baths."

Shortly after David purchased Man's World with his partnery he approached some woeen in Omahe about the possibility of vion's night at the baths. His idea was to fire a female artendant for one night a week and to admit only women that night. The Idea Was dropped for lack of Interest in the women's community +

We alao ralked about Man's Morld's ad, the ad which has appeared in The Nes Yoice and elsewhere, bearing the caption. "Don't let anyona tell you it isn't Man's World," and which has generated controversy in some quarters. David said that when he greated the ad he did not intend to discuas any "worid" other than the world within the walls of his business. Since his customers are exclusively gay males, there to celebrate gay male-sexuality, Man's World in 4 man's worid.

So, dear readers, are people who go to the bathe stupid? That is for you ro decide, I don't foel as strongly ahout that as I did before i visited David and Man's World. I do have good feelings about a man who han created as aafe a place for the celebration of gay male gexuality as ia reasonably possible.

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## Biographers Debate Orientations of Writers/Artists

The controversy in the Lincoln and Omaha press over Willa Cather highlights some general problems facing biographers. Before the twentieth century, few writers or artists with homosexual or blsexual orlentations were open about the fact--which is not surprising In view of the prefudices they would have faced. There are very few cases like those of Michelangela, Byron, Wilde, and Varlaine where "oonclusive" evidence in the courtroos sense existas. In most instances of historical figures perceived si homosexual--Sappio, teonardo, Marlowe, Cather--the avidence fif and will probably remain only oircumstantial.

Consequently, flographers must be sensitive to delicate nuances and take negatives into account. If the men or women they are writing about showed no intarest in the opposite sax, formed strong emotional ties wh their own, printed or desoribed them with unusual fervor or sympathy, of chose to deal with explioit homoerotic thames, etc., these clues can legitimately be given their due weight. If they are consistently diacounted as not "hard" nvidence, the world's lesbian and gay heritage 0111 remain forever obscurad, and the contributions such men and woben have made to eultare

Wi11 be overlooked. Popular ignorance is still great, zyen in the gay community. A friand of aine who is an enthuadae for Tchaikovsky recently axpressed surpoise when I told HIm that ocmposer' 3 homosecoality bad bean public knowledge for eighty years. In certain cireles any admission of such facts would be ththinieable--in Russia, where he is idoliaed as a musioian, neither the popular press nor opecialized scholarghip is candid about Tchaikoveky. In homophobic Cuba, although the hational theater in Havana is. hamed after Federico Sarcia Lorca, any reference to torda's sexual orientation is taboo.

But then, in how many American high schools is the question of Whitmants homosexuality Itsoussed? When actors from England's Hoyal Thakespeare Company gane to Lincoln three yeara ago to give a public reading of passages from Shakespeare on the theme of Iove, they began with Sonnat 18"Shall I compare thee to a summer's day;" perhaps the most unequivocal declaration of love Shakespeare ever urore. I rest saber wondering how many in the audience realifed these ifnes were addressed to a sant it would have bean intaresting to know.

## New Ad Policy for Daily Nebraskan

The Daily, Nebraskan formulated a new policy for roommate ads following a complaint by two women. One of the women attempted to place a roomate ad describing herself an a Iesbian. The idea of placing gay/lesbian rocmmate ads Was discussed December 4 at a UNL Pubilcations Board meeting.
The isL Publications Board voted for the use of only the words "male" or "qemale" in roommate ads, and eliminated a statement of preference based on sexual orientation, race, religion, age, disability, marital statua, or national origin.
The Publications Board consists of five students and four "gutsiders," oitizens asked by the University to serve on the Board. The decision was, in actuality, made by the four non-students, who voted solidily against allowing self-identifiDation. Two students were absent, and the vote was $4-3$.

The publication poifcy now reads, "The Daily Nebraskan will not print any advertisement which discriminates against any person on the baris of sex. sexual orientation, race, religion, age, disability, marital etatus, or national origin. The Daily Nebraskan recognizes and respects the

Fight of pereons to specify a preference of gender when looking for a roonanate and will not prohibit stating ouch a preference."

The Publications Board had five options in deciding a roommate ad policy: 2) put in anything, 2) no self-description or preferences, 3) arbitrary decisLons based on individual ads,
4) self-description only, or
5) gender only.

In a personal interview with Chris Welsch, the editor of the Daily Nebraskan, he stated his idea of a sound ad policy: "There are costs to anything ve do. I've come to the concluaion that a self-description roommate policy would be in the best interest of our readers."

Asked about the risks in identifying oneself as gay or lesbian, Welsch replied, "I don'I think it's a huge risk to place your sexual orientation,"

The result of the gay/lesbian roommate ad controversy is that gays cannot be discriminated against in advertiaing in the Daily Nebraskan; but one cannot describe oneself openly as gay In a roommate ad.

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## Homosexuals Who Marry

It is a fact that there are gay men and women who are sarried. Some of them are happily married, and some of then are not so happily sarried. Some have been married and are now divorced. Some have told their spouces and children of their sexual orientation, and others have not. In other words, there is a wide spectrum of married gay sen and women today. They live and work in this soolety and culture, and they surplow. How they survive, how they live, and how they cope with those in our sooiety who are anti-gay varies from individwal to individual.

There existe in our society many myths held and espoused by the anti-gay groups. They foster these erroneous beliefs to win approval for their persecution of gay man and women. One of these beliafs in that the gay community seeks to break up the family and, therefore, it is right to be anti-gay so an to protect the institution of marriage and the institution of the family. Pardon me, folks, but that is just a lot of a.... S.....!

Dr. Michal W. Ross, in his book The Married Homosexual: A Psychologioal study, has documented lour common reasons why homosexual men get sarried. These reasons are not listed in any partioular order. Gay man inarry because they don't know they are homosexual, although they know that they are "different." Gay men also marry as a conscious flight from their homosercuallity --they believe that by getting married their "problem" will De cured-or else it will vanish. Homosexual men alvo sarry because of soolal pressures, partiaularly from their families. And, gay men marry because they vant to have a family, to have children.

Dr. Rose also has this ta say in his book:
"In sociecies where there is no education, or negative education regarding hososexualfty, there will miost 10 kely be a greater number of homosexuals who lead unhappy ifves and lack self-esteen. There will also be a greater number who marcy, ither in ignorance of their sexual orientation, or in an attempted Elight from it. The majar contradiction in lack of education or negative information thout homosexuality is that it produces a far greater toll of braken marriages and human misery f the very reason advanced for anti-homosexual atancesthe 'protection of marriage and the family' - in Fact directly contributes to more marriage breakdowns where honosexuals have married."

Think about it. What Dr. Bons found in his research in Australía and New Zealand also applies to the 1.S. It makes sense--common sunse. By denying knowledge of alteroative lifestyles to mon and women, we increase the likelifhood that gay men and somen will continue to flee from thair homosexuality, please their families, or they will marry. believing that aarriage is the only way to live. Tha vesults of such marviages are urualiy misery and divorse with no one really happy and fulfilied.

So, what should be done? For one thing, solleges should be providing information about altemative lifestyles. The gay somnunity ahould make available information about "being gay" and that it meant:- And, most of all, we should all try to banish forever the itigma attached to being gay. We should begin within our own oommunity. It is a good place to start.

## In Good Company - Malcolm Boyd

Sometime, it might be a good Idea to devpte an antire issue of The Heat Poioe to coming-out stories. Everyone has a different and a unique story, and yet I've hever read a coningout trony that I didn't find syself identifying with. Malcols Boyd's story of his soming out, in Take off the Maski (paperback). $1 \frac{5}{5}$ a baso In point.

For years, Boyd, the se-called hippie priest, fought a long battle against accepring his homosexuality. Ha grev up in New York City as a rich kid. an only child, and most of his free time was spent reading or playing imaginative games. His father triad to interest him in softbali, but like many of us, Boyd was a klutz. And his father, like many of our own fathers, wal disappointed in his. Bayd knear what was happeningt he was mot the son that his father danted hia to be. Not surprisingly, Boyd retreated into books. And like most of lis, he was tupned on by fantasy, In his catre, though, it was Robin Hood's bulging groin in his momantic nineteenthcentury tights.

After Boyd moved to Denver, he Was still faarful of making elost male Iriendshipy in high school because he knew that he wanted his friendships to be more intense than lass allowed. The fer timet that he honestly confessed hin affection for another boy, he was scorned and refected. Finally he gave up trying. He graduated from high school and went to Hollywood.

But even in California, Boyd wasn't happy. He saw an enormois gay spectrum of peopla there, 5it he didn't like thair flip artitude toward sex. He especialIy disliked the promiscuity that he saw. Boyd longed for a lover, and at the same time, he denied himasif a lover.

He entered the Episcopal priesthood, and there he Found other gay men who vere sublimating theiv homosexuality. For a while, he belleved that a life of prayer and a iffe of abstinence from sex yai the only say that he could conquer his craving for other men.

Then one day he fell so deeply in love with another young priest thet he teas convinced that bod did mot look on him with have. He forgave himself and at the same time, he liberated himself to live his life fully-spiritually and sexually.
Boyd's confession is a very honest cosing-out story. There are no high-flung selodramatios here. There is only hard-care pain and ioneliness and, finally, triumph. The book is haunting, but it is also very rich and positive and very foyous. I foel that after you finish it, you aill feel prouder of being gay becausa you too have suffered many of the gamin kindt of anguish shat Boyd did. You too know how painful it is to want to express love for another man-and be afraid to do 50 .

Books like this one always make me aware that we gays should be flercely proud of ourselves and, we should be especially proud of one another. Each of us has wrestled with our mexuality until we finally had the Inner strength and courage to assert bur integrity to be gay. Honosexuality is our nature, and we have the right to our soxuallty . In contrast, hetemosexuals have no such challenge, no search for dexual self-confidence and identity. All gays are fellow veterans of a struggie to Find our self-worth and selfesteen. Dur self-knowledge has been earned. We've faced deep truths, and wa oan celebrate life-respecially in this new year-as fos can.
