We are Everywhere In all Occupations

Recently The New Voice of Nebraska conducted a non-scientific survey to confirm what is already known-gays, lesbians and persons living alternate lifestyles are located in every occupation imaginable. There are gay and leshian police officers, dentists, construction workers, lawyers, doctors and farmers. We are located in schools, large business firms, hotels, retail stores, factories, and state and city office buildings. We serve the sick and elderly, build bridges, fight fires, deliver the mail, and maintain our nation's security in every branch of the military.

Many straight people stereotype us and place us into categories. Gay men are pictured as beauticians, interior decorators, florists and ballet dancers. There is nothing wrong with those chosen professions but we are not limited to a select group of careers.

Disclosure in the work place can be difficult or nearly impossible in the midwest. Many gays and lesbians in Nebraska separate their private lives from their careers. Lovers and significant others are referred to as roommates and imagianary heterosexual facades often materialize. Sometimes marriage occurs to protect one's identity and attempt to fit into the norms of society. Most gays and lesbians do not fit stereotypical images so it is easy to blend in the workplace without any suspicion.

The survey asked over 100 people to describe their jobs, how they enjoyed their work, questions concerning disclosure and how some occupations benefited gays and lesbians. Members of The New Voice staff passed out written questionnaires as well as receiving verbal responses.

Most gays and lesbians indicated that some people in the workplace knew about their lifestyle but total disclosure was a rarity: most individuals did not fear losing their jobs but some felt it could hurt their chances for promotion or acceptance among co-workers. Over 70% of those responding to the survey indicated that they enjoyed their work.

A surprising outcome of the survey was that a slight majority of respondents said their jobs enabled them to help other gays and lesbians. For some this was done very indirectly.

A sampling of some of the job descriptions follows:

AUDIO-VISUAL PRODUCTION—make sound and video recordings, photo events and people and produce slide/tape shows.

BARTENDER mix drinks and serve public.

ARNADCASE JOURNALIST—write, edit, collect, investigate and announce "news".

COMPUTER PROGRAMMER—write, research, document and test programs.

FINANCIAL CONSULTANT—manage portfolios.

POST OFFICE MAIL CARRIER—sort and deliver mail.

MARGETING REPRESENTATIVE—Sell computer communications, software, systems and consulting.

MENTAL HEALTH COUNSELOR—group therapy, individual counseling, crisis intervention.

CHEMICAL DEPENDENCY COUNSELOR-Provide group training in Transactional Analysis and treatment for individuals having drug and alcohol problems.

PROFESSIONAL MISICIAN—member of a symphony orchestra.

A Visit to Man's World

Several issues ago I wrote a column about bathhouses. I basically said that going to the baths was a foolish thing to do but that people have the right to do foolish things. Some time later, I was introduced to David, the owner of Man's world Baths in Council Bluffs, who was less than pleased with my column. He asked me to visit Man's World in Council Bluffs to see for myself what kind of a business he operates. I accepted that invitation and would like to share with my readers my impressions of Man's World and Man's World's owner.

I made meveral broad generalizations about baths because I have not been to the baths since AIDS became a health problem for the gay male community. I remember filthy hothouses where cooties were in abundance, and it took hydrogen peroxide to make one feel really clean again.

Entering Man's World at 5:30 on a Saturday afternoon, one notices the clear odor of bleach and learns that one just missed cleaning time, a ritual that takes place before the Saturday night crowd arrives. David has a policy of maintaining as clean and safe an environment as is humanly possible, including occasionally telling a patron, "Excuse me, but this is your third trick. Don't you think a shower would be a good idea?" Negotiations are underway with the County Health Department to test for sexually transmitted diseases.

David says that he believes baths serve a positive role in gay society because gay males have always had a penchant for tricking anonymously. In a bathhouse, gay males can anonymously trick in relative safety—the muggings, fag bashings, and other occupational hazards that accompany tea rooms and parks do not exist within the

walls of bathhouse, for the most part. Since gay males have always and will always be more promiscuous than the general population, David believes that by providing a relatively safe atmosphere for such activity, he does the community a service.

What about the AIDS scare? "Studies show that the people who are at risk for AIDS are the people who are promiscuous, whether or not they are promiscuous at the baths. A person who picks up two or three tricks a week at the bars is just as high a health risk as the person who goes to the baths."

Shortly after David purchased Man's World with his partner, he approached some women in Omaha about the possibility of women's night at the baths. His idea was to hire a female attendant for one night a week and to admit only women that night. The idea was dropped for lack of interest in the women's community.

We also talked about Man's World's ad, the ad which has appeared in The New Voice and elsewhere, bearing the caption, "bon't let anyone tell you it isn't Man's World," and which has generated controversy in some quarters. David said that when he created the ad he did not intend to discuss any "World" other than the world within the walls of his business. Since his customers are exclusively gay males, there to celebrate gay male sexuality, Man's World is a man's world.

So, dear readers, are people who go to the baths stupid? That is for you to decide. I don't feel as strongly about that as I did before I visited David and Man's World. I do have good feelings about a man who has created as safe a place for the celebration of gay male sexuality as is reasonably possible.

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Biographers Debate Orientations of Writers/Artists

The controversy in the Lincoln and Omaha press over Willa Cather highlights some general problems facing biographers. Before the twentieth century, few writers or artists with homosexual or bisexual orientations were open about the fact—which is not surprising in view of the prejudices they would have faced. There are very few cases like those of Michelangelo, Byron, Wilde, and Verlaine where "conclusive" evidence in the courtroom sense exists. In most instances of historical figures perceived as homosexual—Sappho, Leonardo, Marlowe, Cather—the svidence is and will probably remain only circumstantial.

Consequently, biographers must be sensitive to delicate nuances and take negatives into account. If the men or women they are writing about showed no interest in the opposite sax, formed strong emotional ties with their own, printed or described them with unusual fervor or sympathy, or chose to deal with explicit homoerotic themes, etc., these clues can legitimately be given their due weight. If they are consistently discounted as not "hard" evidence, the world's lesbian and gay heritage will remain forever obscured, and the contributions such men and women have made to culture

will be overlooked. Popular ignorance is still great, even in the gay community. A friend of mine who is an enthusiast for Tchaikovsky recently expressed surprise when I told him that composer's homosexuality had been public knowledge for eighty years. In certain circles any admission of such facts would be unthinkable-in Russia, where he is idollized as a musician, neither the popular press nor specialized scholarship is candid about Tchaikovsky. In homophobic Cuba, although the national theater in Havans is named after federico Garcia Lorca, any reference to Lorca's sexual orientation is taboo.

But then, in how many American high schools is the question of Whitman's homosexuality discussed? When actors from England's Foyal Shakespeare Company came to Lincoln three years ago to give a public reading of passages from Shakespeare on the theme of love, they began with Sonnat 18-- "Shall I compare thee to a summer's day;" perhaps the most unequivocal declaration of love Shakespeare ever wrote. I remember wondering how many in the audience realized these lines were addressed to a man: it would have been interesting to know.

To imitate totally, one must dress the part.

The question of popularity among the people in the audiences is more difficult. While watching a recent drag show I noticed a number of gay women (lesbians). Most of these people were wearing jeans with a front fly and shirts without darts. No one accused them of "cross-dressing." I was also aware that the performers were among the best adorned

within the gay community. The versatility of costuming open to female impersonators seems unlimited. Now, if I were only younger and talented.

Next time you have a chance to attend a drag show, attend with appreciation -- or perform yourself with whatever talent you have.

New Ad Policy for Daily Nebraskan

The Daily Nebraskan formulated a new policy for roommate ads following a complaint by two women. One of the women attempted to place a roommate ad describing herself as a lesbian. The idea of placing gay/lesbian roommate ads was discussed December 4 at a UNL Publications Board meeting.

The UNL Publications Board voted for the use of only the words "male" or "female" in roommate ads, and eliminated a statement of preference based on sexual orientation, race, religion, age, disability, marital status, or national origin.

The Publications Board consists of five students and four "outsiders," citizens asked by the University to serve on the Board. The decision was, in actuality, made by the four non-students, who voted solidly against allowing self-identification. Two students were absent, and the vote was 4-1.

The publication policy now reads,
"The Daily Nebraskan will not
print any advertisement which
discriminates against any
person on the basis of sex.
sexual crientation, race,
religion, age, disability,
marital status, or national
origin. The Daily Nebraskan
recognizes and respects the

right of persons to specify a preference of gender when looking for a roommate and will not prohibit stating such a preference."

The Publications Board had five options in deciding a roommate ad policy: 1) put in anything. 2) no self-description or preferences, 3) arbitrary decisions based on individual ads. 4) self-description only, or 5) gender only.

In a personal interview with Chris Welsch, the editor of the Daily Nebraskan, he stated his idea of a sound ad policy: "There are costs to anything we do. I've come to the conclusion that a self-description roommate policy would be in the best interest of our readers."

Asked about the risks in identifying oneself as gay or lesbian, Welsch replied, "I don't think it's a huge risk to place your sexual orientation."

The result of the gay/lesbian roommate ad controversy is that gays cannot be discriminated against in advertising in the Daily Nebraskan, but one cannot describe oneself openly as gay in a roommate ad.

COMING SOON TO TV

"Consenting Adult," the madefor-television movie based on the controversial best-selling novel by Laura 2. Hobson will air Monday, February 4 on ABC-TV at 8:00 p.m. Starring Marlo Thomas, Martin Sheen and Barry Tubb, and produced by Ray Aghayan, it is the story of how a college student comes to terms with the realization that he is gay, and the way in which thoses around him deal with this news.

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Homosexuals Who Marry

It is a fact that there are gay men and women who are married. Some of them are happily married, and some of them are not so happily married. Some have been married and are now divorced. Some have told their spouces and children of their sexual orientation, and others have not. In other words, there is a wide spectrum of married gay men and women today. They live and work in this society and culture, and they survive. How they survive, how they live, and how they cope with those in our society who are anti-gay varies from individual to individual.

There exists in our society many myths held and espoused by the anti-gay groups. They foster these erroneous beliefs to win approval for their persecution of gay man and women. One of these beliefs is that the gay community seeks to break up the family and, therefore, it is right to be anti-gay so as to protect the institution of marriage and the institution of the family. Pardon me, folks, but that is just a lot of B... S....!

Dr. Michal W. Ross, in his book The Married Homosexual: A Psychological Study, has documented four common reasons why homosexual men get married. These reasons are not listed in any particular order. Gay men marry because they don't know they are homosexual, although they know that they are "different." Say men also marry as a conscious flight from their homosexuality—they believe that by getting married their "problem" will be cured—or else it will vanish. Homosexual men also marry because of social pressures, particularly from their families. And, gay men marry because they want to have a family, to have children.

Dr. Ross also has this to say in his book:

"In societies where there is no education, or negative education regarding homosexual-ity, there will most likely be a greater number of homosexuals who lead unhappy lives and lack self-esteem. There will also be a greater number who marry, either in ignorance of their sexual orientation, or in an attempted flight from it. The major contradiction in lack of education or negative information about homosexuality is that it produc-es a far greater toll of broken marriages and human misery: the very reason advanced for anti-homosexual stances-the 'protection of marriage and the family' -- in fact directly contributes to more marriage breakdowns where homosexuals have married."


Think about it. What Dr. Boss found in his research in Australia and New Zealand also applies to the U.S. It makes sense-common sense. By denying knowledge of alternative lifestyles to men and women, we increase the likelihood that gay men and women will continue to flee from their homosexuality, please their families, or they will marry, believing that marriage is the only way to live. The results of such marriages are usually misery and divorce with no one really happy and fulfilled.

So, what should be done? For one thing, colleges should be providing information about alternative lifestyles. The gay community should make available information about "being say" and what it means. And, most of all, we should all try to banish forever the stigma attached to being gay. We should begin within our own community. It is a good place to start.

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In Good Company - Malcolm Boyd

Sometime, it might be a good idea to devote an entire issue of The New Voice to coming-out stories. Everyone has a different and a unique story, and yet I've never read a coming-out story that I didn't find myself identifying with. Malcolm Boyd's story of his coming out, in Take Off the Masks (paperback), is a case in point.

For years, Boyd, the so-called hippie priest, fought a long battle against accepting his homosexuality. He grew up in New York City as a rich kid, an only child, and most of his free time was spent reading or playing imaginative games. His father tried to interest him in softball, but like many of us, Boyd was a klutz. And his father, like many of our own fathers, was disappointed in him. Boyd knew what was happening: he was not the son that his father wanted him to be. Not surprisingly, Boyd retreated into books. And like most of us, he was turned on by fantasy. In his case, though, it was Robin Hood's bulging groin in his romantic nineteenth-century tights.

After Boyd moved to Denver, he was still fearful of making close male friendships in high school because he knew that he wanted his friendships to be more intense than was allowed. The few times that he honestly confessed his affection for another boy, he was scorned and rejected. Finally he gave up trying. He graduated from high school and went to Hollywood.

But even in California, Boyd wasn't happy. He saw an enormous gay spectrum of people there, but he didn't like their flip attitude toward sex. He especially disliked the promiscuity that he saw. Boyd longed for a lover, and at the same time, he denied himself a lover.

He entered the Episcopal priesthood, and there he found other gay men who were sublimating their homosexuality. For a while, he believed that a life of prayer and a life of abstinence from sex was the only way that he could conquer his craving for other men.

Then one day he fell so deeply in love with another young priest that he was convinced that God did not look on him with hate. He forgave himself and at the same time, he liberated himself to live his life fully-spiritually and sexually.

Boyd's confession is a very honest coming-out story. There are no high-flung melodramatics here. There is only hard-core pain and loneliness and, finally, triumph. The book is haunting, but it is also very rich and positive and very joyous. I feel that after you finish it, you will feel prouder of being gay because you too have suffered many of the same kinds of anguish that Boyd did. You too know how painful it is to want to express love for another man-and be afraid to do so.

Books like this one always make me aware that we gays should be fiercely proud of ourselves and, we should be especially proud of one another. Each of us has wrestled with our sexuality until we finelly had the inner strength and courage to assert our integrity to be gay. Homosexuality is our nature, and we have the right to our sexuality. In contrast, heterosexuals have no such challenge, no search for sexual self-confidence and identity. All gays are fellow veterans of a struggle to find our self-worth and self-asteem. Our self-knowledge has been earned. We've faced deep truths, and we can celebrate life-especially in this new year-as few can.
