

Why should gay men care about the Wimmin's Movement? While most wimmin support the Movement to some extent, few gay men express an interest in the social condition of Wimmin, gay or straight. Actually, the Wimmin's Movement is closely aligned with Gay Liberation because both movements can threaten the ideology of male supremacy, a basic tenet of the "New Right." The New Right, as we all know, threatens the human rights of all homosexuals.

The Right ideology generates an economical, political, and sexual force seeking to oppress a majority of human beings: wimmin, non-whites, the poor, and homosexuals. If the Right succeeds in controlling these groups, the "ideal" will seem secure: nuclear families, producing a posterity of conservative voters and consumers. To ensure this social structure, wimmin must play the role of a domestic servant, an unpaid laborer, dependent on men. The Wimmin's Movement can obviously cut away at the foundation of this male-supremacist ideology.

At the same time, the Gay Liberation Movement challenges the traditional thinking about human relationships, family structure, and even male supremacy. The Gay Movement allows for love relationships and families not focused on reproduction. As a result, the Right increasingly attacks the rights of both wimmin and homosexuals, and in both cases, the attacks are sexist.

In a capitalist society such as ours, freedom of sexual orientation is not valued; the dominant value of male supremacist

ideology is competitiveness-- therefore, profit supersedes human concerns and sexual preferences. Although sexual orientation is a human condition and should constitute a series of related rights, these rights are abused and denied by the New Right, which very much defines human value according to conservative, heterosexual standards. These "standards" are based on ignorance and fear. The Right is paranoid that homosexuals are everywhere, promoting a deviant lifestyle, converting little children. The same people who are attacking gays also oppose abortion, social programs, nationalized child-care, and especially the Wimmin's Movement.

While almost anyone who is anti-gay is also anti-woman, quite a lot of gay-male culture itself is anti-Woman as well. Gay men are not sexist by nature, of course, but their culture has come to resemble some of the sexism in society. Very few gay men consider the status and concerns of lesbians. It is, after all, a male-centered culture which values the male--whether he is occasionally dressed like a woman or not.

As such, it is clear that gay men and wimmin cannot submerge their unity in being gay. Under this definition, we are too susceptible to divisions caused by sexism, separatist interests, racism, and class contradictions. If we are to succeed in our struggle for gay-lesbian rights, we have to respect one another's concerns, recognize our common enemies, and work together to eliminate all forms of social and sexual oppression. Only then, can we hope to celebrate a united victory in Gay Liberation.



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Many Publications Have Come and Gone

Lincoln and Omaha have seen several publications come and go since the early 1970s. The early newsletters from the Lincoln Gay Action Group were the first to appear and had many varied titles, including The Newsletter, New Letter, Forum, Gay News, UN-GAY LIN-AGE News, The Gay Answer, and The Liberator. The Gayly Nebraskan was the first stable and long-lasting publication and appeared bi-weekly. The Gayly Nebraskan, besides providing information about the Lincoln Gay Action Group and University Gay Action Group, also had gossip and local and national news. The early publications were usually mimeographed. This lent to their seeming to be poor quality publications that sometimes looked as though they had been put together hastily.

The next major gay publication to come on the scene was GAIN (Gay Awareness in Iowa and Nebraska), which started its first issue in June 1977 and continued until late 1979. GAIN was a political and social group located in Omaha that had an emphasis on Gay Rights, locally and nationally. GAIN, a monthly newsletter, was the first publication in Nebraska to accept advertising and print photographs.

The Lincoln Gay News started as a monthly publication of the Lincoln Gay Action Group, but later became

independent after the Lincoln Gay Action Group folded. The publication started in the spring of 1981 and lasted until the summer of 1983. A special issue appeared in July 1981. The Lincoln Gay News emphasized news and events. Photographs and colored paper gave the Lincoln Gay News a distinct flavor. The monthly publication also was the first to use a smaller size--7" x 8 1/2." The Lincoln Gay News will always be remembered for its professional content and for a better "look" than had been previously seen in Lincoln gay publications.

The Capital Times was a short-lived monthly publication that started in August 1981 and had died by the year's end. Articles stressed organizations and events.

Other newsletters deserving mention include the MCC Newsletter of Omaha, (Metropolitan Community Church), LLL (Lincoln Legion of Lesbians) Newsletter, and the Coalition Newsletter. Other groups such as F-Flag, Community of Grace, and the UNL Gay Student Association have distributed fliers and newsletters. A new entry, The Big "Ball" News, can be seen in Omaha bars and is distributed by the gay bowling league in Omaha.

History of The New Voice

The idea for starting a new publication in Lincoln had its roots in the summer of 1983. I had talked to Gary Carey, a former staff member of the defunct Capital Times about the need for re-establishing a newspaper or magazine for the gay/lesbian community. I sought Gary's advice as to how to go about making such an effort. He gave me sound advice to take things one step at a time and get feedback from members of the community.

In December 1983, I distributed fliers at The Office and at The Sanctuary asking interested parties who felt that there was a need for a publication to attend a meeting at Commonplace U.M.H.E. The first meeting was attended by 6 enthusiastic people in early January, 1984. Individuals offered their time and support, and future meetings were sometimes discouraging as only a few people showed up.

I almost gave up when this occurred. But the effort continued, and the first publication was set to go to press sometime in February, 1984.

The first major obstacle was having a financial base to pay expenses. I called friends and asked for contributions and 5 people donated \$75 each to enable the first issue to get off the ground. Delays occurred because of a small staff, a lack of articles, and problems with layout and design.

The 1st issue was distributed on March 11 with a circulation of 500 copies and a total of 12 pages. Cost of printing was \$99, and other expenses used up the remaining \$16. It had been decided that the publication would be

free and would be run by a volunteer organization. Advertising, subscriptions, and contributions would pay the costs of each issue.

A meager start snowballed, and every issue looked better and

Showed more artistic qualities. The staff grew in size and The New Voice of Lincoln became The New Voice of Nebraska by the 4th issue. The rest, as they say, is proud gay history!

One Tough Year for The New Voice

The New Voice faced many obstacles during its first year, but came through the struggles with strength and perseverance. Our initial problems were in developing a staff and raising revenue. A steering committee that served as the 'executive board' was organized and revenue was gained through advertising, subscriptions, and donations.

Our first issue in March 1984 was 12 pages long, had a circulation of 500, and had few ads. Most of the content introduced organizations and publicized local events.

Issue II doubled in size and introduced several features and new advertising. From that time, The New Voice snowballed into what it is today. Our circulation has doubled, we have many new subscribers, and we went beyond Lincoln to become a statewide publication.

However, things were not always rosy. The New Voice had several roadblocks along the way. Our most severe blow occurred in July 1984 when Bryant News, Inc., owner of the Hickman newspaper called The Voice--News of Southern Lancaster County, requested an injunction to try to stop The New Voice from using its name. A temporary restraining order was refused by Judge Jeffre Cheavront on July 26, 1984. This led to a full-blown trial that cost the magazine a great deal of money. The New Voice staff

fought to the end, even though for some it meant disclosure and publicity that changed some people's lives. The trial on August 5 was long and exhausting. It turned into a bitter ordeal with accusations and bigotry thrown into our faces. Justice prevailed, however, and on August 23, Judge Jeffre Cheavront denied an injunction, and The New Voice won the lawsuit.

Another major obstacle involved our stance of allowing controversial issues and opinions to be addressed. Our name says it all, as we have always reflected the voice of the entire gay/lesbian community--no matter how diverse the opinions might be. Some winmin took offense to this and labeled us pro-pornography and anti-feminist. Some winmin tried to destroy The New Voice by writing letters to all of our advertisers and promoting lies and misconceptions.

We also made some mistakes along the way that hurt our reputation. A mistake in an ad, for example, canceled a major halloween event. We forgot to give credit to some of our supporters. We have been delayed because of lay-out and design problems. Or we missed some important events along the way.

But we have always tried to do our best, and we will continue to serve the gay/lesbian population of Nebraska. Let's be proud of who we are and grow along the way.

Our first anniversary! -- Learning from the past, building for the future.

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
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Election of New Officers for GLSA

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A Personal Profile—Shirley Marsh

One walks into the office on the ground floor of the capitol building and hears Bach. One notices office walls and a desk full to capacity with pictures and other mementos of family, of places she has been, of honors she has received. One sees a desk piled high with projects in process and finds, seated behind the desk, a pleasant, middle-aged, white-haired woman who looks more like a schoolteacher or your grandmother than the senior woman in the Nebraska legislature.

Some people have a characteristic that stands out from all other characteristics. Senator Shirley Marsh's is compassion. When she starts to talk about her accomplishments in the 12 years she has been in the Unicam, she begins with child abuse legislation, passed in 1973. One of her major goals for this legislative session is passage of an incest bill which would remove the statutory requirement that a charge of incest be corroborated. Nebraska is the only state with such a requirement.

Shirley Marsh's compassion for those not able to defend themselves may have begun in 1956 when she spent three months in the hospital with polio. She says that the most important lesson she learned in the hospital is that it is essential to be part of the human race. After a 21-year absence, she returned to school to complete a B.A. in Social Welfare and went to work for the Lancaster County Public Welfare office. Four years later, she was elected to the legislature.

At the time, her husband was Nebraska's lieutenant governor, and Frank and Shirley Marsh became Nebraska's first husband/wife legislative team. According to Mrs. Marsh, they really were not much of a team since they do not see eye to eye on many issues. One newspaper, however, editorially endorsed her opponent on the grounds that there was a conflict of interest in having one's spouse as one's presiding officer. That same newspaper retracted its position at the end of the first legislative session. The only time their husband/wife relationship asserted itself was when Lieutenant Governor Marsh asked Senator Marsh, "Hi, hon, what's for dinner?" through a telephone that was connected to an open microphone he thought was off.

One of Senator Marsh's important commitments is to the Methodist Church. She is a member of the Methodist Church's Social Concerns Committee and was a delegate to the last two conventions, including the one in Baltimore that voted not to license openly gay and lesbian persons as clergy. Senator Marsh admits to being disappointed by that decision but feels the Methodist Church will change in time.

Becoming a grandmother rather than a senator, Shirley Marsh told me about her own children, including four foreign exchange students who spent time in the Marsh home. Her family includes two Indonesians, an Italian, and a Ghanaian, as well as six children of her own. Shirley Marsh is mother and grandmother to a large family that takes in whomever it meets.

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Gay Couples (Part 2)

In this article, I want to talk about the first stage of coupling. In the book *Male Couple*, this stage is called "Blending." Sometimes I think of it as merging because the two men or women do everything together. It is almost as if they begin thinking as one person. It is a great time and usually has a lot of sexual activity.

"Falling in love" is the usual name for this stage. It is an important stage for any relationship. The bonding that goes on in this stage helps the couple build the foundation for the rest of the relationship. Sometimes the partners feel at this stage that they can read each other's mind. The main mode of operation is compromise and "let's do it together." Most couples remember this stage with a lot of nostalgia. When couples move out of this stage, there is a tendency to mourn it and wonder if they ever will feel that much in love again.

Doing everything together tends to lead couples to give up, for a time, their individuality. This is normal and useful in the beginning, but does not work over the long run. Each individual will remark at times about how much he or she has in common with the other partner. This may or may not be true. During this stage, each individual has a tendency to say he or she likes something not because he or she likes it, but because he or she knows that his or her partner likes it and it is fun to do it together. Remember, compromise is the name of the game. Moving in together usually happens sometimes during this stage. If couples were not "in love" during this process, they would probably not make it through the first six months. Let's face it--dirty underwear on the floor is dirty underwear. But it can be seen as romantic or cute during this stage. The tolerance for each other's habits is at the maximum here and facilitates the couple living together. Roommates have a much more difficult time, because the oil of love is not there to grease the way.

The second stage in the Male Couple

is called "Nesting." This stage continues the building that started in the first stage and, as McWhirter and Matison write, it also brings ambivalence. The feeling of being "in love" begins to diminish. This can cause panic if the couple does not recognize this as a stage of development. What is happening is that the couple is changing the way they love each other. It is a time when each partner begins claiming his own space emotionally and physically.

Unless one or both partners have been in previous relationships and have gone through this stage before, when the intensity of their feelings begins to wane, many couples feel that they are falling "out of love" and the relationship is over. It takes a lot of work and faith to maintain through this stage. I think it is helpful for couples to talk to other couples to find out what they did during this stage.

This is not to say that there are relationships that need to end. Probably in the cooling down period of stage two, it is easier to see that things are not working and that the two of you are not compatible. The problem that I see is that many folks assume that when things cool down, the relationship is over, and thus they never seem to get beyond stage one in a relationship. Since gay relationships are not legally binding, it may be too easy to leave at times. The couples I have worked with that worked through this stage usually end up with a stronger relationship. Intimacy begins to take on a different meaning, and differences in each other are tolerated, and many times are enhanced to the betterment of the couple. For example, instead of always cooking together, one partner might take over most of the cooking and the other partner might do more of the cleaning up.

Keep in mind that ambivalence is normal in any relationship. It comes and goes in each stage and does not mean that the relationship is over. I believe that it is the way we balance the intensity of being "in love."

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The Untold Nova A.I.D.S. Story

The February 12 NETV's airing of NOVA was important in two respects: it presented a rational perspective on the medical aspects of A.I.D.S., and it did so in a way that educates both those most susceptible to the disease and the general population. Few who heard Kevin McConville's voice as he spoke of the joy of life and the right to dignity in the face of death will ever forget him.

When such positive educational uses are made of television, one hates to criticize, yet if NOVA's presentation brought a perspective not yet seen in the media in regard to A.I.D.S. on one level, on another level, it maintained a perspective all too usual in the media: glorious medical science, selflessly saving lives through totally objective research for the good of everyone.

Don't misunderstand: I have nothing but praise for the doctors and researchers portrayed in the broadcast; I think the planet is in their debt. But the discoverers of HTLV-3-LAV were not the only dedicated researchers. Research has also progressed because of doctors and researchers who followed theories other than the familiar notion of a transmittable virus; who often were shortchanged on research funding and, who, because they were willing to investigate less than orthodox possibilities, often found themselves facing the stigma and hysteria associated with A.I.D.S. without the authority and support of major governmental and medical institutions.

Yes, that's right, there are any number of ways to explain A.I.D.S., even in medical terms. What's more, the GAY doctors who identified the first cases of A.I.D.S. and brought them to the attention of the medical community were not portrayed in the broadcast. Neither were the numerous medical practitioners such as "Dallas Doctors Against A.I.D.S.," who continue to think that an M.D. gives them some kind of expertise in the "Morality Department," or those who fought government funding for A.I.D.S. research because it might mean less money available for their own research specialties.

Furthermore, the Center for Disease Control, a federal agency highly influential with both the media and the government, is not the selflessly objective chronicler of an unavoidable epidemic as one might believe from the broadcast. The C.D.C. devotes considerable energy to telling people that A.I.D.S. is incurable, that everyone who gets it dies of it, but that the "general public" has nothing to fear. The effect of this government "line" is to discourage everyone with A.I.D.S., as well as everyone who wants to FIGHT A.I.D.S. Furthermore, government funding for medical research under Reagan is directly proportional to how many rich, white, heterosexual males are affected by a particular disease. The fact that the blood banks in the United States constitute a \$2 billion dollar a year business had a great deal to do with overcoming the medical profession's "scruples" about the "advisability" of spending large amounts of money on A.I.D.S. research.

Finally, and this is not a criticism of NOVA, but an observation: there is still an untold story: what can we do to prevent the spread of A.I.D.S.? What can we do about A.I.D.S. once it hits? What about the political and social aspects of A.I.D.S.? For example: why are employers (like United Airlines) being permitted to fire employees who are diagnosed as having A.I.D.S.? (How will this encourage people to seek medical help?) Why should gay men voluntarily refrain from giving blood when their employers and churches are expecting them to prove their "heterosexuality" by doing so? (And what legal recourse does a gay man have if fired because his employer suspects that he's gay?) When will people diagnosed with A.I.D.S. be entitled to disability status? (Or is the government immune from any responsibility to keep people from dying in the streets?) And when will homophobes like Jerry Falwell, Pat Buchanan and Paul Cameron be brought to account for their irresponsible attempts to exploit anti-gay prejudice in their quest for power and attention?

And most important: Spring is around the corner, and the joggers are blooming in all the parks! HURRAY!



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The God People

The God People were out and about at the recent Twin Cities Mens Chorus concert. Yes, indeed, there they were and they were very anxious to know whether or not we knew Jesus. Those of us who went to participate in a relaxing evening of fine music were greeted by the (Constitutionally protected) love-by-intimidation group. They could love a person to death . . . if a person weren't careful. What a shame, how shameful, and what a sham (minus the "e").

Well, I know Jesus Christ very well, thank you, and even then I don't know Him as well as I want to or as well as I will some day. I don't believe I will ever know Him completely in this life. I don't believe God can be categorized, filed and stuck in a file drawer. I don't believe He is bits and pieces of self-serving information which can be pulled out on file cards (or printed on little, tiny brochures).

These people, so fervently in love with their God, asked us whether we knew Jesus, and I assume they meant the Jesus Christ of the New Testament. Yet, their material didn't quote Jesus. Their material used a few Old Testament pieces. Why then, was the Jesus they asked about, not included in their material? Why no quotes from the Saviour? The answer, as tough a pill to swallow as it is, is this:

There are no quotes from Christ on the issue of being gay.

I do indeed know Jesus Christ well enough to know that He didn't "forget" to bring it up, that He wasn't "afraid" to bring it up, that He didn't worry about "turning people off" or the "acceptable topics of His day."

He preached a Gospel of love and full human fellowship. He preached a Gospel of non-judgment, reserving judgment to the Father. He told us very clearly what God

expected of us: love of Him and love of each other. And . . . He got angry. When His Father's temple was desecrated by those who twisted the meaning of God and twisted the Love of God and made God self-serving, He Threw Them Out. It was not a hateful anger, it was a justified anger. Those who twist the Gospel of the New Testament, those who re-interpret the clear, simple, great Commandment to love God and each other and try to make it different than it is; those who interpret it to exclude gay people, those who sit judgmentally, those who use twisted interpretations as a blanket for abuse and hatred . . . are wrong.

How great it would be if such Christians, if all Christians, put as much effort and energy into loving God and each other, as they do trying to tell other people HOW to do that. How great it would have been if those who stood outside Kimball Hall had the fortitude to step INSIDE Kimball Hall and witness the musical tribute so eloquently expressed to their God during parts of the performance.

To every gay person at the concert that night who spent any time at all feeling dirty, unloved by God, unsure, because of the acts of these people in Christian clothing. I say to you and urge you: pray for them, that they may come to know the truly gentle, loving Spirit of their God. And for each and every one of us: Claim your God, because He is the God of each of us. No more defenses, no more rationalizations of "why we are right." Those who believe God is theirs despite the preaching of others, ARE right. You don't have to defend it. Simply enjoy the full life which comes with knowing it and living it.

And for those of you who were pushing pamphlets in front of Kimball (and yes, I know you read The New Voice), it's really too bad for you: you missed a great concert.





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Plays Have Gay Themes/Characters

This past season, the gay and lesbian community was fortunate in having several plays with major or minor gay/lesbian characters at the Howell Theater on UNL Campus. Starting off with Mass Appeal, with David Landis playing a bisexual seminarian, the season progressed to My Blue Heaven, a lesbian play; The Hostage, in which Jeff Talbott played a flaming number named Rio Rita; and The Fox, a story about a lesbian couple whose lives are changed by the entrance of a young man who decides he wishes to marry one of them.

I spoke with Dr. Rex McGraw, head of the Theater Department, to ask if the large number of plays with gay/lesbian characters was significant.

Visiting with me in his office in the Temple Building, Dr. McGraw, who is in his ninth year at UNL, said that when plays are selected, the University tries to find plays that represent everything. This year, it just happened that the number of plays gays and lesbians can lay some claim to is larger than usual.

Dr. McGraw also indicated a desire to bring Bent, a play about the oppression of gay people during Nazi Germany, to Lincoln. The play contains two explicit scenes where two concentration camp inmates bring each other to orgasm through their conversation. It also has a scene where an actor walks across the stage naked. Dr. McGraw said he did not expect these two things to be problematical because the University has already produced plays with nudity in them.

Statistically, approximately 10% of the population is gay or lesbian, according to generally accepted figures, with an even higher proportion among artists. Yet, according to Dr. McGraw, at UNL, that figure seems to be lower and so non-gay actors and actresses often play homosexuals. That does not seem to present much difficulty for heterosexual thespians. "An actor works from within himself. He puts on a character, much like putting on a suit of armor."

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LES'PEAKS

Girls are aware early that they are treated differently than boys. Their freedom and opportunities to learn about the "harsh realities" of life are limited, expectations for subdued behavior are greater, and their adult role (whatever their accomplishments) is strictly defined. It is from this awareness that their first rebellion arises.

Women are protected and treated like children. They are not allowed to grow up, and if they act or dress like men, they are considered butch or unwomanly. It is from this awareness that their first feminist protest arises.

It is not surprising that lesbians subject their gay brothers to searching and critical appraisal, and shudder slightly at what they see. It is as though the gay male wants to be protected and treated like a child, in a world with limited opportunities, subjected to expectations of subdued behavior (if he wants to be successful in the world) and strict role definitions in the gay subculture. Since these are the very things the lesbian seeks to avoid, it is very difficult to understand why they are so important to her brother.

Nor is it surprising that lesbians protest and rebel against their gay brothers when they encounter the same sexist exclusion they found first as children and then as women.

The contemporary gay subculture is one that lesbians instinctively distrust because the issue of sexual freedom seems to be split off from the larger issues which insure the freedom of sexual expression. For example--defense of bath houses and pornography become more important than human health and welfare, criminal abuse (rape), and equal pay for work of equal worth.

Traditionally, women do not welcome men into their affairs, and men are conditioned to exclude women from their deliberations. Lesbians accept with poor grace the inclusive expectations of gay men when gay men so obviously ignore values which lesbian women hold to be self-evident.

This space is a challenge to both gay males and lesbian women to sort out the problem areas which exist to separate and divide them. The goal is to provide increased understanding of differences of viewpoint, if not an actual unity of thought.



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
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
