OFEP Statement on the Passage of H.R. 3685-the ENDA "light" Legislation!

On November 7th, the House of Representatives passed H.R. 3685, the substitute Employment Discrimination Act (ENDA), by a vote of 235-184. This version of ENDA prohibits discrimination in employment based on sexual orientation only. The original legislation, H.R. 2015, contained gender identity and sexual orientation.


Citizens for Equal Protection joined over 360 other national, state, and local organizations to oppose H.R. 3865. Known as United ENDA, this coalition urged House leadership to pursue the original, inclusive ENDA and not accept a substitute bill. We, and our coalition partners, are disappointed that the U.S. House of Representatives has forced through a divisive and flawed bill with limited chance of being signed into law. In addition to failing to provide protections for transgender people, legal assessments show this bill fails to adequately protect lesbian, gay and bisexual people


Additionally, some members of the House will be less likely to vote on a more inclusive version of the bill in the fu-

The grassroots mobilization across the country has been astounding and Citizens for Equal Protection is proud to have been a part of it. Like our partners in United ENDA, we will continue to advocate for inclusive employment protections. Elected officials at the state and national level need to know the



FBI Shows Gay-Bashing Increase in 2006

Hate crimes against gays made up 16% of total documented hate crimes across the U.S. in 2006, up from 14% in 2005, the FBI reported Monday.

The rate of all bias-motivated crimes increased 8% in 2006. Hate crimes based on sexual orientation are the third most common type behind race and religion, according to the annual report.

In May the House of Representatives passed the Local Law Enforcement Hate Crimes Prevention Act -- known as the Matthew Shepard Act -- in a bipartisan vote, and the Senate approved it as well. If enacted, the proposed law would give the federal government expanded jurisdiction to investigate and prosecute violent crimes based on a person's race, color, religion, or national origin as well as their sexual orientation, gender identity, gender, and disability. It also provides assistance to local law enforcement to investigate and prosecute biasmotivated violence, according to an Human Rights Campaign press release. Existing federal hate-crimes law covers only those based on a victim's race, color, religion, and national origin.

"This FBI report confirms what the Human Rights Campaign has known for over a decade -- that hate-crimes protections for the gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender community are long overdue," HRC president Joe Solmonese said in a statement. "We urge Congress to send this legislation immediately to the president's desk, and for the president to sign it into law." (The Advocate)

Thousands March in Gay Pride Parade in Argentine Capital

Thousands of Argentines waving rainbow flags marched in the annual Gay Pride Parade Saturday in Buenos Aires, where some said they still face discrimination in one of the most gay-friendly cities in Latin America.

The capital became the first city in the region to pass same-sex civil union laws in 2002, and this year it played host to soccer's "gay world cup" and saw the opening of the first five-star hotel catering to gays.

But activists said more needs to be done to correct discrimination against gay, lesbian, and transgender people.

"It's a society that...projects an image of equality, but if you really get on the inside, there's discrimination," said Alejandra Victoria Portatadino of the Homosexual Community of Argentina, or CHA.

Dancing atop booming sound trucks and waving from rainbowflag-draped cars, the revelers snaked through downtown Buenos Aires past the capital's Government House and the iconic Obelisk monument.

CHA leader Marcelo Suntheim said the organization is lobbying to expand same-sex unions nationwide and outlaw job discrimination based on sexual orientation.

"We need pensions for widows, inheritance rights, and adoption rights," he added.

Since 2002, civil union laws have passed in parts of Mexico and Brazil. And this year, Colombia gave same-sex couples the right to share assets and add partners to health insurance plans. Argentina's first Gay Pride Parade was held in 1992. (Katherine Glover, AP)

I Heart Al Gore

While listening to the former vice president discuss climate change in the backyard of a Los Angeles estate on a chilly Friday night, Advocate deputy editor Rachel Dowd suddenly realizes why the world is better off without Al Gore as president of the United States.

The evening of October 5, 2007, was unseasonably cold in Los Angeles, forcing the well-heeled crowd gathering in the back-yard of Michael and Jena King's Pacific Palisades home to huddle under heat lamps. Paper lanterns swung wildly from the tree branches with every gust of ocean breeze; the lights of downtown twinkled in the distance like a Christmas village in Sweden. From time to time some brave soul would duck her head out from under the fiery halo to snatch a full glass of champagne or a crab cake. That a fund-raiser to benefit Oceana -- an organization dedicated to protecting the world's oceans and marine life from, among other things, overfishing -- would choose seafood as an appetizer is a discussion for another time. Nourishment staves off hypothermia.

Inside, clearly the smarter place to be, the flat-screen television above the mantle showed the Boston Red Sox in the early innings of their eventual win against the Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim -- a win which would propel the Sox to the American League Championship Series and, ultimately, to their second World Series title. Stick with me here: After an 86-year dry spell that had marked the team as "cursed" (or for those of us who grew up in the Nation, "godforsaken losers that'll break your heart year after year"), the Red Sox have finally unleashed the potential we always suspected they had. Much the same can be said about Al Gore, who two weeks after accepting the Partners Award at Oceana's chilly soiree would be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in Stockholm.

Let me start by saying that I never really knew what to make of Al Gore. The vice president is by definition something of an afterthought, but VP to Bill Clinton? You may as well be the wallpaper. And then there was the 2000 election, which was punctuated with Gore's strange claims to have invented the Internet, a painfully bad makeup job during at least one debate, and an awkward attempt at a passionate kiss with Tipper. Even so, I voted for him. I threw my fists in the air when the White House was handed over to a dimwit in his place. I've imagined—innumerable times—what this country might have been under his leadership. But seeing Al Gore take the microphone seven years later confirmed that he has hit his stride outside of politics, and that's no mistake.







Fitness Corner

It's the holiday season now and it's also about time for the dreaded cold and flu season. There is nothing you can do to prevent either of these two seasons from surrounding you. You just don't have to throw in the

white flag and let them beat you up. You are on your own for now with the mother-in-law visit, the purchase of two dozen presents, and the office holiday party. However, I will give you some advice on how to brace yourself and hopefully prevent the onslaught of the cold and flu.

Wash your hands. Germs are everywhere and you are always coming into contact with them. Don't freak out too much here and walk around in gloves, a mask, and a lab coat. Just be sensible and wash your hands before you eat or handle anything that is going in your mouth. It might be wise to knock off that bad habit of biting your nails. 
