Pat Phalen and Terry Sweeney were the driving force that brought the magazine to Omaha in the first place. I came on board a month or two later and became Editor in February 1988. Dick Brown joined us in May 1988, and Carla Petersen has helped with the magazine ever since she and I first got together in the summer of 1988.

We've come a long way since those early days and have survived many, many traumatic events and setbacks, but we have continued to put out a quality publication each and every month. That's really quite a record: *The New Voice* has not missed a single month of publication since it

began with the March 1984 issue. And you can bet that we are proud of what we've done.

But, the time has come.... Other hands and minds must take over the publication of the magazine. Dick and Pat and Terry and I will be resigning as of the February 1998 issue. That will mark my 10th anniversary as Editor and will mark 10 years plus 2 months that the magazine has been published in Omaha. That seems a nice milestone and a good place to take our final bow.

We hope that *The New Voice* will not end with our resignations. We hope that others will step forward and continue the tradition that we have worked so hard to establish. But that will not happen without you. If no one is willing to take up the cause, then the February 1998 issue will be the last issue that will be printed.

We have had some inquiries from people who may be interested in continuing publishing a monthly magazine but no decisions have been made yet. We welcome inquiries from any of you in the community who may have an interest in assuming publication of *The New Voice*. We would hope to see it continue as a volunteer community service but that decision will be made by whoever assumes the responsibility. 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STATE SENATOR JIM JENSEN INTRODUCES "NEBRASKA DEFENSE OF MARRIAGE ACT"

A proposal that would ban gay marriage entered the Legislature Monday (January 13) with 28 co-sponsors, three more than the number of votes needed to pass. Sen. Jim Jensen of Omaha, the primary sponsor, dubbed the Legislative Bill 280 the "Nebraska Defense of Marriage Act." The bill specifically adds a ban on marriage between those of the same sex to previously existing Nebraska bans on multiple marriages and marriage between close relatives. It states that Nebraska will not recognize such marriages from other states. "It is declared to be the strong public policy of this state to recognize as valid only those marriages from the other states that are between one man and one woman," LB 280 says.

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EPISCOPAL DIOCESE ENDORSES SAME-SEX MARRIAGES

By a wide margin that surprised even the bishop, the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania voted 176-96 to endorse the blessing of gay and lesbian relationships.

If the resolution is passed by the general convention, a rite of blessing will be devised, although the blessing would have no legal standing unless a state legislature chooses to recognize it.

Rev. David Moyer decried the vote, saying, "It's just one more step in the erosion of Christian morality in the Episcopal Church."

But Rev. Ruth L. Kirk, co-submitter of the resolution, said, "Can God do a new thing? And can God use the Church to do a new thing? For centuries we have condemned gays and lesbians. It is time to support committed, loving relationships."

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ICTLEP APPOINTS ANOTHER FTM TO BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Phyllis Randolph Frye, Executive Director of ICTLEP (the International Conference on Transgender Law and Employment Policy, Inc.), announces that the Board of Directors has voted to elect Mr. Shannon Minter, Esq., as its newest Director.

Mr. Minter is an FTM, a transgender male. Mr. Minter is currently employed as the Staff Attorney for the National Center for Lesbian Rights (NCLR).

Recently, he co-authored, along with Ms. Frye, the joint statement from NCLR and ICTLEP, entitled "GID and the Transgender Movement" which has received endorsements from many leaders of the lesbigatr community. (The term lesbigatr is short for lesbian, bisexual, gay, transgender, and is pronounced to rhyme with alligator).

Mr. Minter's duties will be as the Director over Health Law issues to include all health law issues, the ICTLEP Standards of Care, and insurance issues as have been researched and presented in past issues of the annual ICTLEP Proceedings.

As part of his team, he will remain Ms. Lisa Middleton, a highly placed and out insurance executive, who will retain her oversight with respect to Insurance Issues. Also to remain is Ms. Martine Rothblatt, Esq., who is the past Director of Health Law and was the author of ICTLEP

Standards of Care.

With the very positive reaction to the GID Joint Statement from transgendered physicians, it is hoped that with Mr. Minter's guidance, ICTLEP will be able to complete its five year effort to bring about a "marriage of sorts" between transgender strategists within the legal, insurance, activist and medical communities on all issues of Health related law.

Mr. Minter will organize and moderate one of the day long study tracks at the 6th Annual ICTLEP Conference which is to be held July 11-12 in Houston, Texas.

That track is entitled "GID and the Transgender Movement: Moving Beyond the Psychiatric Disability Model".

He will also organize a parallel track dealing with the ICTLEP Standards of Care, Insurance Law updates, and other Health Law issues.

GLAAD TIDINGS

Read this and tell me what you think:

"In the current Warner Brothers movie *My Fellow Americans*, lesbians and gay men play a vital role in saving the lives of two former presidents. James Garner (as the Democrat) and Jack Lemmon (as the Republican) portray the two former leaders who are forced to go on the run over the cover-up of a scandal involving the current president (Dan Akroyd), leads to attempts to assassinate the two.

At one point, Lemmon and Garner duck into a West Virginia gay pride parade to escape the bad guys. When one of the parade participants (who is in a marching band entirely made up of drag versions of Dorothy from the Wizard of Oz) befriends them, he arranges for a group of Dykes on Bikes to take them to safety. At the end of the ride, a lesbian gives Lemmon a freedom ring (gay pride) necklace, and Lemmon notes that after spending time with the lesbians, he has rethought the issue of gays in the military and thinks that the military could probably use several of those women. Later in the film, the Marching Dorothy heroically returns.

Please let Warner Brothers know that their non-exploitative and jovial inclusion of lesbians and gay men in *My Fellow Americans* is appreciated."

Transitions are confusing.

There, I've said it and I'm glad.

Or in this case, GLAAD. As in the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, which self-defines itself as "the only national lesbian and gay multimedia watchdog organization." GLAAD promotes fair, accurate, and inclusive representation as a means of challenging all forms of discrimination based on sexual orientation or identity."

This is from one of their alerts.

A good and helpful organization overall. But apparently also having difficulty with transitions. Reading their special alerts and operational manifesti, I am fatefully reminded of the poor TV anchor who has broken the latest disaster, but has too much air time, and no news to follow with. You can practically feel the poor patsy making it up as s/he goes along, inventing details, escalating the importance of minutia, and interviewing random passersby, to fill.

Sometimes it seems GLAAD seeks media gay bashing of major proportions, real or imagined, and escalates its importance to fill its agenda, which is to find discrimination, they slay it. Or laud its absence.

Just on the face of this alert, we have, as I read it, a movie with a parade full of drag Dorothys, leather lesbians on Harleys, and an aging misogynist making bad stereotypical jokes about us.

Am I hallucinating here? Isn't this what GLAAD is usually up in arms about? Don't they usually incite personcots over these kinds of movies?

Only now we are supposed to cheer Warner Brothers for, what? Oh, yes. "Non-exploitative and jovial inclusion of lesbians and gay men."

I'm confused. Enough so that I went to see this light little flick. Paid my own money. (Although, not wanting to take out a second

mortgage to buy the theater's, I did bring my own popcorn. Shhh. Don't ask. Don't Tell.)

And, yup. GLAAD's description is absolutely accurate. Up to and including the fact that the hero is a definite Dorothy. The only difference is that we don't die in the end. That's it. Our most extreme images, our only representation, win the day and save the respective demerits of the film's big-name protagonists.

Okay, so the film is aimed at Seniors, using cliches and terminologies that 70 or 80 year olds can relate to. For a change, we seem to be on the right side of the dramatic tension for this demographic, which does have the most trouble reversing their long-taught unpleasant beliefs about us.

But did I miss something here? What exactly is it I'm cheering about?

Well, okay, the idea of an Oz marching band playing Over the Rainbow IS kicky. I hope baton carriers everywhere are rushing to buy bolts of blue gingham. But non-exploitative? Wake up and smell the latte.

In the absence of actual lesbian and gay leadership to tell us what we're really supposed to think as we transition from outlaw underground to mainstream commonplace, GLAAD tells us

this is good. And I admit it. I'm baffled.

About the best thing I can say about this movie is that it's cute. Lemmon and Garner are always a treat to watch, even if the material isn't exactly Mr. Roberts (no relation) or a Polaroid commercial. And, mercifully, most people won't plunk down good bucks to bother.

As I said, transitions are confusing. I can't figure out whether I'm actually supposed to thank Warner Brothers for this cartoon depiction, or picket them. Just because they don't kill me. Especially in an age when I thought what we were after was non-exploitative and jovial inclusion in federal and state laws, not caricature myth continuations with unexpected happy endings, as bones to our own "watchdogs".

One thing I am all concerned about. Although amusing, this is one movie I found with not all that much to be GLAAD about.

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EMBRACING DIVERSITY – THE BENEFITS

I am a white, anglo-saxon, protestant male. A WASP. I'm neither proud nor ashamed of this heritage. It is simply fact. For centuries in the United States, this ethnic group has remained in power over minority groups. Even today, this group wields enormous power in its dominion over politics, financial institutions, religious organizations, institutions of higher learning, and in government and business.

It is unlikely this information is new or surprising to anyone. Perhaps this is so because it is part of our daily experience in this world, rendering it commonplace and unnoticeable. I doubt, however, that a minority person would agree that the impact of this situation on their lives, individually or collectively, is unnoticeable. Instead, they might argue that the commonality of their daily experience is discrimination and oppression at the hands of the elite power structure. Conversely, they may have become numb to this situation, deciding they have no power to change it. Either way, they have a unique perspective on what it feels like to be powerless, oppressed, and discriminated against.

The term minority as used herein is defined as: Any group who, by numeric count of lack of political and economic power, is oppressed by the group who, through numbers or power, impose values, mores and rules on the smaller or weaker group. As it is used here, minorities include the usual groups protected by law, i.e., race, culture or creed, religion, gender, national origin, disability and marital status. As used herein, however, a minority would also legitimately include lesbians, gay males,

bisexuals, and transgender individuals.

I had lunch with a good friend today. She and her husband, both white, have recently adopted two children of Asian descent. As I listened to her talk, I was reminded of her liberal attitudes about life. I was also aware of her newfound experience with the discriminatory attitudes she has recently faced as she now views the world through her children's eyes.

In my own life, I have experienced a transition in society's perception of me and my status by virtue of my decision to come out after being married for more than ten years. In my former, pseudo-heterosexual life, I viewed the world from the perspective of a white, HETEROSEXUAL, married, well-educated, professional, protestant male. Although I could intellectualize how it felt to be discriminated against, the actual experience was not part of my reality. The pain and fear were not part of my being.

After coming out, I faced the daily tribulations all gay people face. As a member of an "invisible" minority, I had to determine whether I would kiss my partner good-bye as he dropped me off in front of my office, or whether I would display a rainbow sticker on my vehicle, or with which coworkers I would share the intimacies of my personal life. No longer was this a decision limited only to whether I wished to share personal experiences or feelings with coworkers. Instead, it had become a political game with far-reaching ramifications such as whether a new employer would hire me, promote me, or decide to terminate my employment altogether. Suddenly, I

understood what it meant to be a member of a minority when the majority vehemently opposes my being. Suddenly, I felt the hopelessness that accompanies our government's decision to deny lesbians, gays and bisexuals the right to serve our country in the military, the fear of losing custody of my son in a courtroom run by a small-town judge who may not understand my identity or my ability to parent, the anger as I watch certain religious groups hurling verbal epithets at gays in a pride march, and the sadness that accompanies the death of friends dying of AIDS while our religious, political and business leaders do nothing, labeling AIDS the "gay plague."

These experiences have shaped me. I believe they have uniquely shaped all of us, but how can we benefit from these changes?

Society can ill afford to simply tolerate or accept individuals. We must wholeheartedly embrace diversity and the benefits it brings. It is our responsibility to teach these benefits to the rest of society, sharing our unique perspective. Just imagine how boring dining out would become if every restaurant served only one dish. Celebrating our differences encourages us to recognize the benefits of diversity.

The group Three Dog Night produced the lyrics to a now famous rock song – "Celebrate! Celebrate! Dance to the Music!" Come on, come out and celebrate your life. Let's start dancing today!

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LEGAL FRONT LINE

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND SAME SEX PARTNERS

We all felt a little bit more pressure during the holiday season. Constant family and social obligations wiped out our free time. Add a little alcohol to the situation, and tempers can flare. With this added stress, incidents of assault on one's boyfriend, girlfriend, or spouse skyrocket.

If the police are called to a domestic dispute; i.e., one that involves two persons living together in something more than a simple roommate relationship, they have an internal policy to arrest one of the parties, if possible. This includes same sex partners. The police can only arrest a suspect if they have reasonable belief that such person has committed a crime. Reasonable belief must be supported by objective facts. In a domestic violence case, this means that the officer must see some sign that an assault has occurred. Examples would be bruises, swelling, or cuts on the person claiming to be assaulted. Once they can articulate a basis for believing a crime has occurred, they can lawfully arrest a suspect.

Once an arrest has been made, the City Prosecutor reviews the police reports and decides what charges to file against the suspect, if any. Often, the prosecutor declines to file any charges or amends the charge suggested by the police.

In Nebraska, the possible penalty for assault and battery is up to one year in jail and/or a \$1,000 fine. If the person is arrested in Omaha, the City Prosecutor can also choose to file under the Omaha City Ordinance which carries a penalty of up to six months in jail and a \$500 fine.

An assault conviction does not require any physical contact. A technical violation of the law occurs if the victim was in fear of bodily harm and the suspect had the apparent ability to carry out a threat of harm. A battery occurs when physical contact occurs.

In years past, one could plan to pay a \$200 or \$300 fine for a conviction under either charge. Recently though, publicity and public outcry has resulted in much stiffer penalties. The Courts are taking domestic violence much more seriously and are handing down 10-, 20-, even 60-day jail sentences for a person's first offense.

Since the possibility of jail time is now more likely with this charge, it is important that a person consult with their attorney. The most important factor that determines if a person goes to jail, besides the facts of the case, is which judge hears the case. Judges differ widely in their sentencing practices and your attorney can help ensure that a more sympathetic judge will hear the case.

On Friday the 13th, Sept. 30 (Sevin's birthday), and Aug. 22 (his ex-boyfriend's birthday), "all kinds of things happen. There will be boys kissing, there will be a greater number of bimbos, there will be Elvis impersonators. It's really hilarious," he said. Maxis was reportedly not amused.

The world's largest mass gay wedding will be held Valentine's Day weekend in Fort Lauderdale, FL. "We want to give couples the opportunity to pledge their commitment to one another in a loving, caring, and sharing way," said Rev. Grant Lynn Ford, who will officiate at the "Love Celebration" on behalf of the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches (MCC). Other events throughout Fort Lauderdale's Winter Gayla '97 will include a beach party and a massive dance party in the open air atrium of the Museum of Discovery and Science. A portion of the proceeds will benefit MCC in its effort to establish a couple's ministry.

GAY STUDENT SETTLES IN HARASSMENT SUIT

Jamie Nabozny, 21, has accepted a \$900,000 out-of-court settlement from the Ashland (WI) School district. Nabozny's lawsuit claimed school officials violated his rights by not protecting him from years of anti-gay harassment by other students. Nabozny was urinated on, subjected to a simulated rape, and kicked in the stomach so hard he required surgery. "I feel like I have justice and that this means justice for all the other kids out there who aren't sure if they should stay in school or stay alive," he said.

MAYOR ATTENDS GAY WEDDING IN TAIWAN

More than 500 guests, including officials of the Taipei city government, attended Taiwan's first public gay wedding. Wearing a traditional Chinese scholar's robe, Hsu You Sheng exchanged vows and rings with American Gray Harriman. Hsu's open homosexuality is a rarity in Taiwan, where many gays face social stigma and intense pressure from parents to marry. But the wedding has gained mostly positive response in Taiwan, and the Mayor of Taipei sent a letter of congratulation.

BISEXUALS SCHEDULE ANNUAL CAMPOUT

Northwest bisexuals will hold their sixth annual gathering and campout over Labor Day weekend, August 27 - September 2 in the Wenatchee national Forest near Mt. Rainier National Park in Washington state.

The gathering, sponsored by the Bisexual Network of Oregon (BiNet), will be held at a secluded campground between the Bumping the American rivers, 23 miles east of Chinook Pass and Mt. Rainier National Park. The gathering has attracted campers from as far away as Massachusetts and New Mexico. Campers may come for any portion of the Wednesday evening through Tuesday morning gathering. All bisexuals and their guests are welcome. For information contact BiNet Oregon at (503) 703-8013.

HOMECOMING ROYALTY TWO WOMEN

Two lesbians were crowned homecoming king and queen at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. Jenn Beland and Joey Zocher were nominated by the 10% Society, the campus gay group, and were elected by the entire student body. When the announcement was made, there was some cheering and some silence, but overall, the couple said, they were well-received.

EUROPE'S FIRST GAY RUGBY TEAM

Europe's first all-gay rugby team, the King's Cross Steelers, has been certified as a member of Britain's Surrey Rugby Football Union. Club chairman Robert Hayward, noting the team colors are green and blue, said, "No, we don't play in pink. And I must say for a collection of gay men we managed to pick the colors very quickly and without too much argument."



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GAY RODEO IS COMING!!

This is the third in a series of articles to explain gay rodeo.

Heartland Regional Rodeo, sponsored by HGRA, is scheduled for the weekend of June 27-29 in Fremont, NE. The weekend will include parties on Friday and Saturday nights and the rodeo performances on Saturday and Sunday. We expect a lot of contestants and spectators from out of town. HGRA hopes that Heartland Regional Rodeo becomes a successful fundraising endeavor and a weekend of first class entertainment for our community.

There are a total of 13 events in gay rodeo, divided into four categories: Rough Stock events, Roping Events, Horse events, and Camp events. There are three Roping events: Calf Roping on Foot, Mounted Breakaway Calf Roping, and Team Roping.

This article will describe Calf Roping on Foot and Mounted Breakaway Calf Roping. The next article in this series will describe Team Roping.

ROPING EVENTS, part 1

Calf Roping on Foot

The calf is in the roping chute. The contestant is holding a rope and standing in the box next to the chute. Time starts when the chute opens and the calf's nose clears the chute gate. The contestant has one chance to rope the calf and must do so within 30 seconds. The contestant must throw the loop of the rope completely over the calf's head and catch it around the neck or belly. When the catch is made and the calf pulls the slack out of the rope, the contestant releases the rope and a judge signals time end. Fastest time wins. Men and women compete separately.

Mounted Breakaway

Calf Roping

The calf is in the roping chute. The contestant is on a horse in the box next to the chute. Contestant's ropes are secured to the saddle horn with a string. Time starts when the chute opens and the calf's nose clears the chute gate. The contestant has two chances to rope the calf, provided he/she is carrying two ropes. (Contestants may not reuse the first rope.) There is a time limit of 30 seconds. The contestant must throw the loop of the rope completely over the calf's head and catch it around the neck or belly. When the catch is made and the calf pulls the slack out of the rope, the string breaks and a judge signals time end. Fastest time wins. Men and women compete separately.

DES MOINES GAY MEN ARE “DOING IT FOR THEMSELVES”

Sometimes all it takes is one person saying, "what if..." to achieve results beyond anyone's wildest imagination. An example of such a result is the Des Moines Gay men's Breakfast Club.

A little over a year ago, Jonathan Wilson, of came-out-as-gay-and-was-defeated-for-School-Board fame, as well as a prominent Des Moines attorney, called a few of his friends and proposed a networking breakfast meeting for the city's gay men. Those friends not only enthusiastically embraced the idea, but also were each able to provide 2-3 names of people they knew, who in turn provided more names, etc.

Today, the group has a mailing list of 220 names and averages attendance of 90 at their monthly breakfast meetings in a downtown Des Moines hotel.

But the group is about more than men getting together — although some of them admit that they had never seen so many gay men in one place at 7:00 a.m. before in their lives!

Each month's meeting features an invited guest speaker from the community. Some of those have included the chief of police, the fire chief, and some elected officials. Not only does the group get to hear the presentation from the guest of the month, but the guest also receives an education by being exposed to a sizable group of openly gay men who are active in the business life of Des Moines.

Another education is about to take place as a result of the group's efforts. Through fundraising efforts, they now have a \$3,000 scholarship which will be awarded to the Iowa high school student who has done the most to fight homophobia during the past year. This offers two opportunities for education. First, letters were mailed to every high school counselor in Iowa asking them to submit nominees for the scholarship. And then, when the winner has been chosen, the scholarship will be presented at that student's Honors Assembly, just like every other scholarship.

And Des Moines lesbians have recently started organizing a similar group for women.

It just goes to show what a "What if..." can lead to.

NAP ORGANIZES AIDS UPDATES

Keeping up with the latest HIV/AIDS information can be difficult, but it's also extremely important for people living with HIV. NAP volunteers and staff, and others in the community who have an interest in AIDS education and prevention.

To help keep the community informed about recent developments and emerging issues in the world of HIV and AIDS, NAP is organizing a series of guest speakers for monthly HIV/AIDS Community Update meetings to be held at the new Wellness Center facility at 139 South 40th Street. The HIV/AIDS Community Update series is set for the third Wednesday evening of each month from 7:00 p.m. until 8:30 p.m. It will be open to all NAP volunteers, clients, staff, and other interested persons and is free of cost. NAP is also in the process of identifying individuals with other AIDS service and education programs in metro-Omaha to encourage their attendance.

The first HIV/AIDS Community Update meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, February 19th at 7:00 p.m. featuring Dr. Richard Pollard of the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston presenting a CMV Townhall Forum courtesy of Roche Labs. Dr. Pollard is the chief of the AIDS Care and Clinical Research Program at UTMB, and is a renowned expert in AIDS care. The CMV forum will address the infection processes of cytomegalovirus and the treatment options now available. Dr. Pollard's prepared presentation will be followed by Q & A with the audience. Refreshments will be served.

On March 19th, the HIV/AIDS Community Update will feature a speaker from the University of Nebraska Medical Center who will discuss AIDS Clinical Trials at UNMC, providing an overview of drug trials, discussion of the potential benefits and risks for participants, and how PWA's can enroll in drug studies at UNMC.

Future presentations are now being identified and arranged. Some of the topics we expect to cover in the first half of 1997 include sexually transmitted diseases, HIV and Tuberculosis, and substance abuse as it interacts with HIV disease. LESBIAN COUPLE WIN IN PATERNITY LEAVE DISPUTE

A lesbian police officer, "Pia," has been allowed to take paternity leave by Sweden's national social insurance office. Pia's registered partner, "Monica," also a police officer, gave birth last winter to a daughter conceived by artificial insemination, but attempts to transfer some of her one-year maternity leave to Pia, a practice common among heterosexual couples, were originally rejected. But now the insurance office has declared that the two women have "the same rights as in a conventional marriage."





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AGAINST VALENTINE'S DAY

Love, like God and pornography, is in the details. Or at least this is true of those loves that take a marital shape.

I don't want to throw a wet blanket over an occasion to party and perhaps I'm just a fuddy-duddy, but it seems to me the conception of love standing behind Valentine's Day is a mistake. On that model, one falls in love of a sudden, as though struck by Cupid's arrow, and then persists eternally in that love, which changes from being thought of as an arrow to being thought of as a high blaze, one which magically requires no fuel and produces its own oxygen. Love here is a pure, mystical, disengages passion.

Fill out, as you will, the rest of the model with references to souls, stars, *Romeo and Juliet*, and perhaps a Platonic Form or two. Be sure to ease or excuse physical passion as a symbol for spiritual union. And there you have it — romantic love, a heady mix of suddenness and transcendence, one which in its early, tingly phases psychologists sometimes call "limerence".

Been there. Done that. Lasted six months. No T-shirt.

True love cuts a different course — one more mundane. Indeed, it is rooted in the mundane, the ordinary, even if it sometimes has unexpected beginnings.

We met — Bob and I — on Wednesday 24 May 1978. I was an unemployed bum, he a bartender with a spare afternoon. We intersected while cruising one of the continent's great sexual playgrounds — the ravines that make up Toronto's David Helford Park, like LA's Mulholland Drive, a wilderness lost amid urban bustle. The day was the year's earliest on which one could reasonably sunbathe. After winter's exile, a few gay boys with time on their hands were out reclaiming swatches of the park as gay turf, while also working on their base. Bob and I had each riveted our eyes on the outstretched frame of what could easily have been a ballet star, but oblivious to his admirers, Apollo nattered away with a nerdy friend.

Bob and I settled on each other, drifted bushward, then to my place. Sex, rather than being wild, crazy, wondrous — Wagner's Brangane was not prodding into rapture by singing gloriously from her tower of the dangers of the night — was instead exquisitely attentive. Limerence was nowhere in sight, but from our patient tendance applied to the material aspects of living sprang the headwaters a marital love. The attentiveness lead to the sharing of meals, the planning of days, and before you knew it, nearly 19 years have passed for our journeying together.

Along the way, we have accumulated the standard debris of daily domestic life in America — sanitary district tax bills, car insurance payments, property tax evaluation reassessment challenges, a mortgage (now burnt), set of dishes, toasters, a post-hole digger, leftover gallons of house paint, stuff like that. In the main, our life together is ordinary, not operatic. But in its very ordinariness lies its marital nature.

For what marriage is — the thing as lived, not the legal monster — is intimacy given substance through the medium of everyday life, the day-to-day. Marriage is the fused intersection of love's sanctity and necessity's demand.

Culturally, we are disinclined to count Great Loves as marriages. Antony and Cleopatra, Tristan and Isolde, Catherine and Heathcliff — these are loves which burn gloriously but too intensely ever to be manifest in a medium of breakfasts and tire changes. Neither do we count roommates, even "domestic partners", as married if all they do is share the common necessities of life (food, housing, and the like). Marriage requires the presence and blending of both necessity and intimacy. And life's necessities are a mixed fortune: they are frequently drag, dross, and cussedness, yet they can constitute opportunity, abidingness, and the prospect of nurture. They are the field across which, the medium through which, and the ground from which the intimacies which we consider marital flourish, blossom, and come to fruition.

There is now plenty of empirical evidence to show that gay and lesbian couples fulfill this definition of marriage. And ironically, because gay and lesbian couples are freed from the automatic and weighty social expectations of role divisions along gender lines — breadwinner, homemaker, proposer, disposer, top, bottom — gays and lesbians may well provide the cultural exemplars of married life. For an intimate relationship, as distinct from an impersonal or commercial relation, is one that takes its color from the individuality of its members. Roles fixed, or presumed to be fixed, by nature therefore cut against intimacy. For operating according to roles presupposes that people are interacting as types or kinds, not as

unique individuals.

It is true that gay and lesbian relations generally divide the duties of living between the partners — this is the efficient thing to do, the very first among the economies of scale that coupledom affords. But who does what is in the first instance a matter of personal preference and joint planning rather than of nature and culture. Decisions are made in part with an eye to who is better at doing any given task and who has free time — say, for ironing or coping with car dealerships. But adjustments are made in cases where one person is better at most things — or even everything; here the relation is made less efficient for the sake of equality between partners, who willingly end up doing things they would rather not do — not out of a sense of traditionally assigned duty and role, but out of an impulse to help out, a willingness to sacrifice, and a commitment to equality.

In these ways both the development of intimacy through choice and the proper valuing of love are interwoven into everyday life. Choice improves intimacy. It makes sacrifices meaningful. And it gives love its proper weight. In a gay marriage, the sanctifications that descend instantly through custom and ritual in many heterosexual marriages descend gradually over and through time — and in a way they are

better for it. For the sacred values and loyal intimacies contained in a gay marriage are a product of the relation itself; they are truly the couple's own.

Gay folk and straight folk should strike a deal: gays can teach straights how to do it right and straights can give up their monopoly on the benefits of legal marriage. Against that day, Bob and I carry on. Perhaps sedimentation alone is the explanation and perhaps I'm simply deluded, but our love feels ever more deep, robust, substantial — the sort of things that might lead one to believe in permanent non-material objects, traces of the divine, whatever. Our marriage courses on un-

wed — shimmering, if plain, constant and nice.

So let the prospective lovers' lesson be: Send flowers and candies if you wish, but hold the limerence. Don't be the love of my life, be the love of my living. And for sure, don't be my valentine.

CABOOSE PRESS OFFERS EROTIC LITERATURE

Caboose Press has set its publishing course into the uncertain waters of sexually explicit fiction. Contending that such writing need not be aimed at individuals reading at a sixth grade level and that those characters portrayed should not be condemned to positions of meat rack expedient, this small publishing house situated in tiny Rocklin, California has set itself the ambitious undertaking of bringing explicit fiction to the attention—and possibly into the appetites—of those not ordinarily inclined toward it. The first volumes in that direction are "Pieces", "Leaps", "Horses", and "Bridges", all from the very fluid pen of Dixon Stalward. Wisely, Stalward chooses not to ignore certain hallmarks of this venerable genre. The result brings to us a wider appreciation of our common humanity while never ignoring the meatier—and celebratory—aspects of the sexual mystery. Stalward's tales are always hotly erotic, but not beyond practices commonly indulged in by the many of the millions. The difference here lies in the style, the verve, the vocabulary, the perceptions and insights—often rueful—found in the writing. Indeed, sexuality on a truly adult basis. Caboose Press and Dixon Stalward seem to have made a good effort; we have here worthy harbingers of more to come.

Author Dixon Stalward is a recovering alcoholic living and working and writing in the foothills, the rolling fields and woods of Northern California. His notion, he says, is to spread the news of the joy to be found in sobriety and, as well, to nurture through word—and sometimes deed—the healthy sexuality that makes us all human.


