ACT 3, Scenes 1 & 2

Okay, by now most of you have seen me out and about, so you know I survived that 12 hour ordeal they call surgery and that lovely encore performance where they took out all the layers of stitches and flooded the room with nasty fluids my body just didn't want to absorb. Gee! Can you imagine why not! Seems obvious to me! The fluids were NASTY!

Anyway, it was kind of fun when they sewed it all back together--well, almost all of it was fun! Doc Phillips must have known Sharon and I were Fantasy Fans--he ran out of time with the local anesthesia he'd used, so when he got to the last layer of skin, he had to staple it together. Now, if you have never had 26 staples (big ones like they use in building houses) applied to your back side, well, suffice it to say--it was a touching experience! Oh! And my doctor's wife did have her baby the week before, so one of the nurses did try to entertain me with baby pictures throughout.

But that's all old news. As our adventure left off last month, I was about to get the final drain removed. That in itself is not a pleasant task either. It's gone now, but not forgotten! And there was no infection--at least none that we had to worry about.

I took the doctor at his word and checked out the following day when he took the day off and let one of his associates check in on me!

My mom had hung around, so she did her "nursing" duties for another week. Can you believe she was overheard talking to my sister one night telling her, "Carla was her bitchy self today!" Imagine that! Twenty-six staples on my back side and eight inches of stitches on the other side, and I'm supposed to be nice! Get real!

Well, that takes us to the end of July!

Then came August. I've returned to work at MCC-O. The first week it was two hours a day. After that I managed four to five hours a day. By

September I expect to jump up to full time. That will be a challenge, but as you can imagine, with all the bills, it will be a necessity. Oh yeah! I'll start teaching a night class for UNO Aug. 23, so with that and ICON, MCC-O, and the *New Voice*, life will get plenty busy again. Then again, some of those activities only slowed down to a brisk walk during all of this, but I digress. Back to the bills!

You may remember from previous stories that I am a customer of Blue Cross/Blue Shield. I pay for my own insurance at the ungodly rate of \$340 per month. That gives me 70% coverage on pre-approved treatment. The big bills look like this:

Hospital-Visit #1	\$37,998.40
Surgeon-Visit #1	\$14,758.00
Hospital-Visit #2	\$ 8,645.65
Surgeon-Visit #2	\$ 724.00
TOTAL	\$62,126.05
My 30%	\$18,637.80

(Actually, it's a little less because the charges were adjusted a little because I used "participating physicians") But then the charges above don't include the \$40 a day my personal physician charged for looking in on me for 11 days. Nor do they include the special infection doctor brought in to check for nasty bugs. And, the surgeon who did my abdominal surgery hasn't even billed me yet. (she's so cute!) so I look for my share of this delightful experience to top \$20,000. And I'm still paying off my 30% of the 1992 surgery. Lucky me! Hum! I wonder if Sharon would like to get a part-time job or two or three. Any millionaires out there just begging to adopt two cute cuddly lesbians? Call 556-9907 for an immediate appointment! Operators are standing by! (Drat--I hear no bells ringing. I may have to resort to becoming treasurer of an unsuspecting organization--say, the *New Voice*--only kidding.)

Trivia for those who love it: The smallest item on the bills was \$27.30 for Occupational Therapy. The quickest notice from BC/BS came by 11 a.m. on a Thurs. following a 3:30 appt. on a Mon. You tell me--How did the doctor's office bill BC/BS so fast? And, how did BC/BS process the claim so fast that I was notified of it less than 72 hours--more like 65 hours--later. And why is it it takes two weeks for them to send me a check when I send a claim to them? More trivia--The highest charge was \$23,054.45 for the first 12 hours surgery. I wish there were a room in our house that I could rent for \$1,900 an hour! So far I have received 6 pages of bills from hospitals, doctors, etc.; 32 pages of correspondence from BC/BS--including the same form twice only seven days apart. On both forms I clearly wrote, "NO, THIS SURGERY WAS NOT THE RESULT OF AN ACCIDENT." Oh yeah--there's one more thing while I'm raising these questions regarding BC/BS--I find it interesting that the claim they settled in 65 hours was for x-rays on Aug. 8, and yet they still haven't settled on a single item from the June 29 surgery which they pre-approved back in May. Why is that?

You ask, "Carla, do you favor a health care plan that covers all Americans?" My response, "Yes, but could we leave the word blue out of it?" I'm into green right now--greenbacks!

Finally--did all of this surgery do the trick? I don't know. We didn't know the hardware--those dimestore screws--were broken last time until I went in for my one-year checkup. It's only been 9 weeks. Ask me next June after the Pride Parade--better yet, look for me June 11, 1995. If I'm walking in the parade, well, there's a chance all of this worked. If I'm leaning on the sidelines, don't ask. And now Sharon's two-cents on all this: "Thank you, God. And thanks to all of you for your support and your prayers." (I agree!)

HAPPY BIRTHDAY, KARL

Dear Editor:

Karl Heinrich Ulrichs' 169th birthday was celebrated on August 28. It would be nice if all your readers took a few moments to remember he is the first known openly Gay person to speak and write that Gay people are healthy in both mind and body.

In 1867 at age 41, before a convention of 500 jurists assembled in the Grand Hall of the Odeon Theater in Munich, Germany, he made a public plea for the inalienable rights of Gay people, even before the word homosexual had been coined.

Ulrichs spent 18 years producing 12 books on Gay rights. He legally defended Gay people, and the Prussian police twice imprisoned him for his political views. At age 55 he retired in Italy and died in L'Aquila on July 14, 1895.

READER SAYS U S WEST MORE DETRIMENTAL THAN HELPFUL

Dear Editor:

The actions U S WEST in the last few years have been more detrimental than helpful to the gay and lesbian community and it is important to understand why. After reading what Janet Houston and Pat Phalen wrote in the *World-Herald*, it is clear U S WEST cannot defend gay people because it fulfills the worst rhetoric of the extreme homophobes who accuse gay people of wanting "special rights."

U S WEST fired a woman who wore a pro-life button depicting a live fetus. Translations, she was fired for holding a viewpoint and expressing it, not because she was a bad employee. U S WEST said it was disruptive. Let us put the shoe on the other foot. What would happen if you went to work with a button saying, "I'm gay" and were fired because it was disruptive? And what if that employer depicted a month of the family with celebration to children and marriage? Wouldn't you be upset with the one-way direction of expression? That is what Rev. Rick Coles was complaining about. Rev. Coles is trying to defend the right to hold and express an idea if that same right is given to his opponents.

U S WEST only fosters the fear that homosexuals are seeking "special rights" when it fails to recognize that rights are universal. Their

rights are our rights, and our rights are their rights. If gays are to be equal, we must understand the inequalities and injustices affecting other people. An Omaha man was fired from his job for writing "God" on a breakroom chalkboard. Does he suffer the same injustices as a person who is discovered to be gay and is fired? Again, someone was fired for holding and expressing an idea. If anti-discrimination laws are to protect homosexuals, it must protect everyone. Nebraska needs stronger laws defending people's right to hold and express ideas. Here gay and lesbians can set a clear example that gays want equal laws and rights for all people not just those who are gay.

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LESBIAN AND GAY CENSORSHIP

Since its founding the PEN Lesbian and Gay Committee, has been actively campaigning against censorship of lesbian and gay authors. A copy of Nancy Garden's book *Annie on My Mind*, which is about a lesbian teenager discovering and coming to terms with her sexual orientation, was burned by parents and local ministers in front of the Kansas City School District office. The following month, Lee Summit's High School in Kansas City removed *Annie on My Mind* from its bookshelves. Garden, a member of the Lesbian and Gay Committee, wrote an op-ed piece for the *Kansas City Star* protesting the attacks on her book. The PEN Children's Book Committee and Lesbian and Gay Committee, wrote both to the newspaper, pointing out that the bookburning threatened the "rights of the free access to books and

ideas", and to the local board of education, expressing alarm over the removal of the book from school shelves. Meanwhile, the Lesbian and Gay Committee, in conjunction with Canadian PEN, monitored the seizure by Canadian Customs officials of thousands of books and periodicals being imported into the U.S. Many of the confiscated and (in some cases) destroyed titles were on lesbian and gay themes and included books by Dorothy Allison, Andrea Dworkin, David Leavitt, and Edmund White. The Committee wrote to the Canadian government in protest at the practice and received in reply a promise to investigate the matter from Canadian Prime Minister Kim Campbell. *If you are interested in joining the PEN Lesbian and Gay Committee please write: Stephen Friedman, PEN, 568 Broadway, New York, NY 10012.*

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COMING OUT OF THE CLOSET

"The distance is nothing; it is only the first step that is difficult."

October 8, 1994 is National Coming Out Day (NCOOD 94), but this article is not a guilt trip about being in the closet. In addition this article is not a warm fuzzy for the courageous in our community who will join the millions already in the fresh air. No, this is for all of us in the closet, whether huddled in the darkest corner or fumbling with the doorknob.

For now let's forget about the ominous closet door that has been staring at us for all these years and take a look up above the frame. You may have to strain your eyes but you will see it. Yes, there it is - that ventilation vent to the outside! The beauty of it is that we can look out, say bold things, question the world and nobody knows who is talking! Enough with this contrived metaphor, what I am getting at is that there are varying degrees of being out and no matter where we are in our journey we can be a positive force for the LesBiGay community. The ventilation vent metaphor is not too far from reality if you think about it. With a little imagination everyone's voice will be heard. To get thing moving in the right direction, I've come up with a list of ideas that everyone can do and feel liberated in their own way. Besides the sociopolitical implications, just think, you may meet new people!

1. ANONYMOUS PHONE CALLS AND LETTERS DO NOT HAVE TO BE OBSCENE OR THREATENING!

Much of the power of any group is built from the lack of resistance to their ideas. If more of us would come out as rational thinking adults (forget even identifying yourself as lesbian or gay) and question the ludicrous logic of the hate-mongers, we would all benefit from a less paranoid world. Citizens for Equal Protection (CFEP) and the Rainbow Action Team have both proven the power of anonymous communications to politicians, the media, and local civic groups. Many of their members participate with a guarantee of anonymity and still feel the power of civil action.

2. CALL IT AS YOU SEE IT.

Let's not bother raising hands, most of have done it. I too am the innocent mute bystander to anti-gay remarks and slanderous speculations about his or her sleeping arrangements. No one has to be open about their sexuality to make someone reflect on what they just said and why it

is wrong. In many workplaces, the person can simply be reminded of how unprofessional they appear to everyone around them, especially if it is a business with plenty of contacts with the public. In a social setting it can often be amusing and appropriate to throw sexual orientation pondering back onto the speculator with an innocent, but well amplified, "Are you speculating about them or fantasizing?" It doesn't take a martyr to stand up for another person. Sometimes it takes a little courage, but more often it takes some compassion and a decision to be a small positive influence on your surroundings.

3. EXERCISE THE RIGHT YOU DO HAVE.

We may not have domestic-partnership or right-to-work legislation yet, but we do have the right to vote. No one has an excuse for not voting. Everyone has the means, no matter how closeted, to find out where candidates stand on social issues and whether they think public office gives them the right to enforce their morality. Most political groups, whether gay or straight, liberal or conservative, publish some type of "report card" on candidates' views. Please take the time to educate yourself to the issues and vote for whomever you believe is your best voice in government.

4. KEEP CURRENT ON LOCAL AND NATIONAL DEVELOPMENTS:

If LB395, Don't Ask-Don't Tell, Camp Sister Spirit, and Domestic Partnership are not familiar ideas or phrases you are not getting the latest in LesBiGay news. Locally, we have wonderful resources in *The New Voice*, *WomenSpace*, and National Public Radio's news broadcasts at 7AM and 4 PM every weekday on 91.50FM. On the national level *The Advocate* gives great coverage on all the significant political developments and many emerging social trends (both positive

and negative) that affect our community.

Personally, I have found just listening or reading about some of the larger issues and hearing about how Gays and Lesbians are coping across the nation is empowering. The more I learn about makes the world seem like a less threatening place. The more I can identify with the larger community the more comfortable I am with my own sexuality.

Now to some of us this list may have seemed basic or maybe even stupid, but I think it is important that we realize we are all at different places on the road to coming out but each of us must take responsibility for our future and personal freedoms. We can't all be plaintiffs in Supreme Court cases, but we also can't sit patiently wringing our hands and fervently hoping someone will magically give us a perfect society where it is all right to be gay. Each of us needs to keep moving forward on that road to coming out, if you stop too many wonderful experiences are going to pass you. Like I wrote at the beginning, I am still in the closet (for the most part only at work though), but I refuse to accept that as a permanent condition. Some days my journey down that road is slower than others, but I don't want to stop and luckily I no longer look wistfully back to the past. Happy trails!

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UNITY HOUSE WELCOMES



On a quiet street just north of Field Club's Golf Course there is a quietly elegant building, constructed of brick with the understatement of dark brown pillars framing the doorway. A casual passer-by might not even notice this house set among the lovely old homes that grace this neighborhood. It is the sort of house that would provide a gracious home to a successful person who has no need for ostentatious show.

However on the day when we visited, the house was filled with laughter and chatter and people coming and going. The front door stood open, the screen unlatched to facilitate the activity. Several trucks had just left after depositing stacks and stacks of furniture, clothing, and other items in the garage. A group of men were gathered around, helping unload and connect a stereo system in the "family" room. Two other men were at work on the patio painstakingly setting slips of a plant every few inches in a flower bed, carefully putting each slip so it would grow at just the proper angle.

We were greeted at the door by Joe Conrad and other members of A.C.E., our hosts for the afternoon. "I'm so glad you could make it. Let me show you around." And with that Carla and I were swept up into the joy and excitement of Unity House, Omaha's first Drop-In and Activity Center for those living with HIV.

Unity House, located at 1007 S. 37th, is the result of years of hoping and dreaming that there would someday be a place where persons with HIV could come to find fellowship, activities, and hopefully a reason to continue living. Joe described how the AIDS community had been talking about a drop in center for years, believing that it would be developed one day. He went on to describe how Rod Shuey (you may remember that two years ago Rod rollerbladed through the whole Pride Parade route with a sign proclaiming "Positively HIV Positive") called him with the idea of looking at this house owned by Rod's landlord. They went to look and, as Joe says, "we liked what we saw and we began to dream."

The next step was to put together an organizational meeting of A.C.E. members, the AIDS Interfaith Network, Nebraska AIDS Project, Don Randolph with PWA Assistance Fund, facilitators from the support groups, and representatives from the medical community. Joe explained that the purpose of this meeting was to talk about funding sources and to "feel out the community to see if they thought we were crazy or what."

As a result of that meeting, the Board of A.C.E. with Rod, Gary George—Executive Director of NAP, and Brother William of the AIDS Interfaith Network would work out a deal where A.C.E. would take the house for three months with a commitment from NAP and AIDS Interfaith to each pay for one month's rent. A.C.E. was responsible for one month's rent (\$850 which includes utilities) as well as getting the utilities hooked up. A tentative agreement was reached with Gary George and Brother William, and then the members of A.C.E. met on the last Sunday of June and voted to open Unity House on July 1.

Joe described those first few days as "frantic" as the group went through the process of getting the lease, seeking donations, formulating a fund-raising letter that would go out by mid-July, and getting the house ready. The response to those efforts is described as "fantastic." All of the furnishings in Unity House—the furniture, artwork, plants, rugs, food, office equipment, and office supplies—have been donated.

However, Joe went on to say that what is needed now is money. Cash is needed if Unity House is to remain open after September. Eventually Unity House will be funded by grants but the Internal Revenue Service is, according to Joe, "holding our tax exempt number hostage" due to typical red tape. Without a tax exempt number the group cannot apply for grants and donations cannot yet be claimed as tax deductions.

From the moment I walked in the door, I was especially impressed by the warmth and the feeling of welcome that I found at Unity House and from the members of A.C.E. I asked why Unity House was so special. Joe was the first to respond as he explained that Unity House is special because everything is done by people with AIDS. He went on to say that the house is something that people with AIDS have done for themselves, not something that others have done for them. This is a perfect example of the philosophy of the AIDS Coalition for Empowerment which is to "empower ourselves and take a certain amount of control over our lives. We have put together a house where we can come together in union and share our lives with each other, make friends, and educate ourselves on how to live longer with this thing. We want to live. We wanted to show the community that we could do this for ourselves with some help financially, spiritually, emotionally...all those things."

The members of A.C.E. went on to describe how they, as a group of people that don't have very much in common except this disease, can come together at Unity House and work towards a common goal. Others gave their feelings about Unity House. "It's a great place-it adds quality to my life. I'm accepted here more than any other place."

Joe commented that it "seems strange to most people who think we're at the end of our lives that we're actually just beginning to live. And here at Unity House we can come together in a non-threatening environment to watch TV, do crafts, talk, all sorts of things. We have only a few house rules - No drugs, no alcohol, and no pets since some people are allergic to them. The House is open to the whole community, whether they have HIV or not. It's an equal opportunity drop in center. Partners, spouses, children, the worried well are all welcome here."

Unity House is open to ALL.

I asked what the community can do to help with Unity House. The response was instantaneous as they asked that we spread the

word about Unity House to all our friends with HIV. They said "Let them know that we're here. You don't have to be a client of the Nebraska AIDS Project, and you don't have to get your medical care at the University of Nebraska - all persons are welcome here. If you know someone at home with HIV, let them know we're here and tell them to drop over."

Of course, the group was also quick to say that if someone wanted to do a fundraiser for Unity House, that was okay. And, of course, they still have a wish list which included: Dishes, Money, Silverware, Money, Laser Printer, Money, Copy Machine, Money, VCR, Money, Transportation volunteer, Money, Groups to host regular Sunday brunches.... As you can see, the greatest need is for money to pay the rent, the telephone, the cable bill, postage, etc. To help raise that money, A.C.E. will be holding a HUGE Garage Sale on September 8, 9, 10 from 9am to 6pm. Donations are welcome - just call 345-1992.

Sand Volleyball Tournament

Another major fund raiser, planned for September 24, is the 1994 SPIKE-AIDS Sand Volleyball Tournament to be held at McCormick's Volleyball Beach, 4428 S. 140 St. in Omaha. The tournament will include both mixed team (6 members, no more males than females) and 4x4 teams (teams of 4 men or 4 women). Team members will be asked to collect pledges from individuals and businesses. The net proceeds of this tournament will go directly to support the services of Unity House. For more information about the tournament, contact ACE Unity House (345-1992).

Membership open to all

The group also clarified that membership in the AIDS Coalition for Empowerment is open to anyone. People who are not infected can also join. A.C.E. has regular meetings at Unity House every other Sunday at 6:00 p.m. and they now have an office there. The office is open Monday through Friday from 9am - 5pm. For more information on the group, call 345-1976.

The activity calendar at Unity House is already very busy. Unity House is open for folks to drop in from Wednesday through Saturday, 10am - 4pm. Other activities include:

As we started to wind down, Joe shared a recent experience when, at one of the regularly scheduled Friday luncheons which are open to anyone with HIV, 10 members of the cast of "Up With People" came to Unity House to spend the day. Joe described how "the 'kids' fixed lunch for us, played games, and in the afternoon went on the patio and we did an HIV education session with them. It was a great day, probably one of the best I've ever spent since I've lived with the virus. It was positive and life-affirming. They promised to be back when they are in town and we need for Unity House to be here and going strong when they can come back."

GAY MUSIC IS BREAKING RECORDS!

1993 was the biggest year ever for gay and lesbian music. More new artists emerged, more openly gay and lesbian themed albums were recorded and released (most on independent labels), and more gay and lesbian albums were purchased than ever before in the history of our community.

The abundance of new gay and lesbian albums warranted the writing an entire book on the subject according to music journalist Will Grega, author of the newly released *Gay Music Guide*.

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THE WIZARD DEFINES THE NEW GAY CULTURE

The gay community celebrated the 25th Anniversary of the Stonewall riots and Gay Games in New York City. Our community cast the "gay vote" to elect the current President of the U.S. We mobilized to enact legislation to protect us from discrimination as well as to defeat legislation designed to allow discrimination against us. Gays have been featured in more multi-media than any other period in American history (or herstory as the case may be), bringing our community out of the closet and into daily consciousness of the balance of society. The debate about what percentage of population is gay continues, as does the debate about whether we're a security risk in the military (bunk!), and whether we should receive "extra rights." Little attention has been paid, however, as to what status this segment of the population, commonly referred to as the "gay community", will have in society. For example, do we constitute a distinct, separate culture? Are we simply people exhibiting similar characteristics? Are we a society unto ourselves? Is it a lifestyle issue? Are we a minority? If we hope to unite, these questions must be answered.

Much like a corporation or public agency benefits from a mission statement in the formulation of business goals, our community needs to formulate a sense of identity beyond the confines of a mere "community". An attempt to answer the questions above might begin by defining terms and determining how well they describe our sense of the gay community, if at all. This uses definitions from *American Heritage Desk Dictionary*, published by Houghton Mifflin.

First, since the word community has already been used in this article, let's begin by defining it. **Community** is a noun defined as 1. a group of people living in the same locality and under the same government. 2. The district or locality in which they live. 3. A group or class having common interests. New York's Hispanic community; the scientific community. 4. Similarity or identity; closeness; a community of interests. 5. Society as a whole; the public.

Certainly, the American "gay community" does not live in the same locality and under the same government. Government - yes. Locality - no. We might be considered a group or class having commonality by the mere fact that gay men are attracted to other males and lesbians to other women? This is reminiscent of the identity confinement I experience when someone describes homosexuality as a "sexual orientation." Do we all enjoy baseball, theatre, similar musical taste, the same restaurants, or particular brand-name clothing? By what standard can we say that we have the same common interests?

Perhaps we're a separate society within the confines of a larger society. **Society**, a noun. 1. Human beings in general. 2. A group of people with common culture or way of life. 3. A group of people who unite to share a common interest: a stamp-collecting society. 4. The rich and fashionable social class: her introduction into society. 5. Companionship, company.

Unless you're a member of the "religious wrong", you probably agree that gays, lesbians and bisexuals are Human beings. We've ruled out a common interest (at least I have no interest in stamp-collecting as in this definition) and, although some might argue that the fashion consciousness of many gay men places them in a rich and fashionable social class, it would be difficult to demonstrate this for every member of our "community." Hence, we are not a society, although we may meet the definition for a group with a common culture or way of life. "Way of

life" can be translated into lifestyle. **Lifestyle** is a noun defined as a way of life or style of living that reflects the attitudes and values of an individual or group.

It has often been said that gays, lesbians and bisexuals live an "alternate lifestyle, deviant lifestyle or immoral lifestyle." Nonetheless, if one adheres strictly to the definition provided the gay "community" does not meet the criteria for consideration as a lifestyle. It seems ludicrous that an estimated 25,000,000 people nationwide would subscribe to the same values or style of living! Therefore, having ruled out a "common way of life," our attention turns to a "group of people with a common culture."

Culture is a noun defined as 1. The result of intellectual development, as evidenced by a high degree of taste, refinement, appreciation of the arts, etc., a man (or woman) of great culture and charm. 2. Intellectual and artistic activity and the works produced by this: Our libraries and museums bring culture to the people. 3. The arts, beliefs, customs, institutions and all other products of human work and thought created by a people or group at a particular time: The culture of western Europe owes much to Greece. 4. Development of the mind or body through special training: He believes in physical culture.

It seems safe to say that not all gays, lesbians or bisexuals will develop their intellect through taste, refinement or an appreciation of the arts, although many do. We might apply the second definition if broadly interpreted. The fourth definition, requiring special training, would not be applicable to every person in the United States who happens to be homosexual. Definition number three, however, is promising.

Again, the definition states "the arts, beliefs, customs, institutions, and all other products of human work and thought created by a people or group at a particular time is a culture." As described in the first paragraph of this article, the gay "community" has accomplished much during recent years. Our visible emergence into mainstream society, particularly in the last 25 years, provides some parameters in which to establish our time. For these reasons, this writer suggests a more appropriated term for describing gay "community" would be Gay Culture.

The next question to be answered is if this newly-defined Gay Culture is a bona-fide minority? **Minority**, a noun. 1. The smaller in number of two groups forming a whole. 2. A group that differs, as in race, religion, or ethnic background, from the larger group of which it is a part. Gay Culture meets this definition. Therefore, by using standardized definitions for terms which have been interchangeable, we establish that gays, lesbians and bisexuals are members of the Gay Culture which is a minority. Although commonly used, we cannot claim "community" status which, in the opinion of this writer, is to our benefit. A culture is more encompassing than a mere community, and we can legitimately claim minority status in accordance with definitions provided. Having determined this, let's proudly proclaim the emergence of a new, minority culture, and focus on educating people about the uniqueness and societal contribution this Gay Culture provides mainstream society.

GAY RIGHTS COMMERCIAL FILMED IN DALLAS

History was made Saturday, July 20, as the Dallas-based nonprofit organization, Alliance For Progress in conjunction with WPT Productions, shot its first television commercial entitled *Sunday Morning* in various Dallas locations, including the home of Human Rights Campaign Fund board member Lory Masters.

Sunday Morning similar in design to Roger Ailes' 1984 Presidential commercial entitled *Morning in America*, depicts the daily lives of lesbians through a chronological series of vignettes. These images pointedly show that the lesbian community shares the same values of family, religion, patriotism, and economic success as the heterosexual community.

"It is important that the lesbian community educates parents, grandparents, friends, coworkers, and neighbors to the fact that the majority of lesbians and gays live normal everyday lives, except with a same-gender partner. The most cost-effective way to inform them is through 30-second television commercials aired into their homes," stated co-founder Christopher Parman. "It's a simple message to counteract the Radical Right's propaganda to heterosexuals that lesbians and gays are sexual deviants out to spread AIDS and molest children."

"These commercials have been designed with three goals in mind," according to Parman. "First, educate the heterosexual community that like it, the lesbian community is mostly mainstream, so that the negative stereotypes spread by the Radical Right will be negated. Second, show that the harsh reality of discrimination, hatred, and violence against lesbians necessitates legal protection. Finally, to cut the alarming rate of teen suicides we must provide positive role models proclaiming that it is OK to be gay."

AFP needs the financial support of the lesbian community to effectively implement its advertising campaign. Once we have raised the necessary funds to broadcast the commercial," Parman stated, "the benefits to the lesbian community should become quickly apparent. Alliance For Progress will target areas where lesbian issues are at risk."

HELMS AMENDMENT WILL THWART AIDS EDUCATION

Despite an intensive lobbying effort by AIDS Action and other advocacy groups, the U. S. Senate approved an amendment August 1, that, if enacted, will prohibit any federally funded effort to provide health education to gay and lesbian youth in public schools.

By a vote of 63-36, senators approved an amendment sponsored by Senators Robert Smith (R-NH) and Jesse Helms (R-NC) that restricts local schools from distributing materials or sponsoring curricula and counseling programs that "have either the purpose or effect of encouraging or supporting homosexuality as a positive lifestyle alternative". Schools that defy the measure risk losing federal funding. The amendment was attached to the \$12.5 billion Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). "The Senate's action sends a chill through the halls of America's schools that reaching out to young gay men— who are at highest risk of HIV infection among teens— and

providing them with positive and effective HIV prevention programs is wrong," charged Christine Lubinski, AIDS Action deputy executive director for programs. In voting against what he called the "cruel" and "mean-spirited" amendment, Sen. Paul Wellstone (D-MN) lamented that "sometimes I think we talk about gay and lesbian people on the floor of the Senate as if they are less than fully human." The Helms-Smith Amendment was challenged by a broader, less onerous amendment offered by Sen. Edward Kennedy (D-MA). A Senate committee must now reconcile the two amendments, along with one attached to the version of the ESEA passed by the House of Representatives earlier this year.

Among those voting in favor of the Helms Amendment were Nebraska Senators Kerrey and Exon and Iowa Senator Grassley. Iowa Senator Harkin voted against the amendment. Contact these Senators to let them know your opinion of their vote.

GAY GAMES WADDELL CUP

The Federation of Gay Games announced the recipient of the Tom Waddell Achievement Award during closing ceremonies of Gay Games IV in New York City. Selected from a slate of more than 70 candidates from around the world was Ms. Rikki Streicher of San Francisco, CA. Sara Lewinstein and Brent Nicholson-Earle presented her the Waddell Cup before an audience of more than 50,000 in Yankee Stadium. Ms. Streicher was nominated for her long-time commitment to the Gay Games movement. She has been involved since the inception of the games and was co-president of the San Francisco Arts & Athletics Association prior to its evolution into The Federation of Gay Games, Inc. Ms. Streicher was instrumental in the formation of The Federation in 1989 and still serves as a director. The Waddell Cup was first awarded in 1990 at the Gay Games III in Vancouver, B.C. after a Canadian organization donated funds to purchase a silver cup to be a perpetual gift to deserving individuals.

CHIMPANZEE VACCINE PROTECTS AGAINST HIV-1

New data from studies in chimpanzees show that development of a potential vaccine used an inactivated or weakened form of whole HIV-1, the virus that causes AIDS, may be possible, according to scientists from the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and three other institutes. Scientists knew that unlike humans, chimpanzees infected with HIV-1 fail to develop disease. So they exposed HIV-infected chimpanzees to a different HIV-1 strain and found that they resisted infection with the second virus. Scientists now have a model system that can be used to help develop an attenuated HIV-1 vaccine for humans.

Grieving Family Members Recount

According to Dept. of Health figures, as of
September 1993, the number of acknowledged
AIDS cases in the U.S. totaled 339,250. Of these,
4,809 were children under 13, and 43,019 were
women. How many of us realize the enormity of
the pain and suffering behind these grim statistics.
Not only for the patients suddenly handed a death
sentence, but also for the families coping with
terminal illness and social prejudice.

Author Bobbie Stasey does now. But little

WOMANSOURCE HIV:

A New Resource

A Lesbian with HIV Speaks Out:

One of the participants in the video talks about the specific problems of being a lesbian with HIV. Amelie Zum states, "We're 12 years into an epidemic and the Centers for Disease Control still refuse to acknowledge that there are lesbians living with HIV. We know from a survey done both anecdotally and by the Centers for Disease Control themselves that probably 1% to 2% of the population of women living with HIV may be women that are having sexual relationships with women, regardless of how they identify."

So a lesbian living with HIV has to feel very brave and confident in order to come out, within the lesbian community as HIV-positive, or within the HIV community as lesbian. So she's often isolated, she's often lacking funds to access services. And when she goes to seek services, those services don't meet her needs, they don't say, you know, "You're a lesbian woman and you have a unique family structure, you have unique health care needs, you have unique psychosocial issues, and we will care for you."

MANAGING AIDS IN THE 90s

It begins slowly and silently. One by one, the body's T-helper cells are eradicated. This is the experience of a person who is HIV positive. Although the search for a cure continues, the emphasis remains on how AIDS can be managed.

In April, the *Journal of the American Medical Association* (JAMA) reported that patients with acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS) are living longer. The study concluded that prophylaxis (drugs that prevent the onset of AIDS-related infections) and treatment of opportunistic infections were more important factors in longer survival time than antiretroviral therapy. In addition, the study strongly suggests that prophylaxis can provide significant survival benefit to all populations with HIV infection.

When the first cases of AIDS appeared, doctors did not have the ability to manage the disease. Today, the medical community has learned more about the life-threatening infections a person with AIDS is at risk of developing when their immune system is compromised and how those infections can be prevented.

What are opportunistic infections?

Opportunistic infections produce illness only when they infect a person whose immune system is not functioning properly. Some of the more common opportunistic complications people with AIDS become vulnerable to are: Pneumocystis Carinii Pneumonia or PCP, Kaposi's Sarcoma and Mycobacterium Avium Complex or MAC, the fastest-growing bacterial opportunistic infection among people with AIDS.

PCP is caused by a germ many people already have in their body. It usually does not pose a problem unless an individual's immune system is weakened. If that is the case, the germ can

produce a very serious lung infection. Symptoms of PCP include: fever, fatigue, weight loss, dry cough and shortness of breath.

Kaposi's Sarcoma, a cancer of the skin, can be a life-threatening illness for people with AIDS. KS is a malignancy of the cells which line blood vessels (called endothelial cells). The reddish-purple lesions, characteristics of KS form when capillaries, the fine thread-like vessels that carry blood, begin to grow irregularly and rapidly. The capillaries often become leaky which results in an accumulation of red blood cells. AIDS-associated KS can appear at almost any site on the body, including the mouth, the gastrointestinal tract and the eyes. Researchers still don't know what causes KS. Some have speculated that this may not be a cancer; others say the disease is caused by an infectious agent.

Mycobacterium avium complex or MAC organisms constitute different groups of slow-growing, environmentally transmitted bacteria. They have been found in the water we drink, inadequately washed vegetables and fruits, and dust particles. Consequently, an individual whose immune system is compromised (by HIV infection, for example) and who is exposed to these bacteria either through the gastrointestinal tract or through the respiratory system, may acquire MAC infection. Little evidence, if any, has been found to indicate MAC disease transmission from person to person.

The incidence of MAC has increased dramatically over the past few years in people with AIDS. The number of MAC cases more than quadrupled between 1985 and 1990. Currently, 50 percent of all AIDS patients develop MAC disease within 2.5 years of their AIDS diagnosis.

Prevention vs. Treatment

Of the three most common opportunistic infections, Kaposi's Sarcoma is the only one without preventative therapy. However, there are drugs which can prevent the onset of PCP and MAC. The criterion for when a physician should initiate prophylaxis correlates with a person's risk factors and/or T-cell count. Once a person with AIDS has a certain risk factor or the CD4 count drops below a certain level, there are steps that can be taken.

Bactrim, which was recently approved by the F.D.A., is one of the drugs available for preventing the occurrence of PCP.

Mycobutin, which prevents MAC infection, works by inhibiting the growth of the bacteria responsible for causing this infection. When taken twice daily, it has been clinically proven to prevent MAC.

Although another option is treating a person once he or she develops an opportunistic infection, that course of action can be more complicated. For instance, treatment of MAC requires the use of anywhere from two to five drugs to maximize effectiveness and avoid resistance. The appropriate dosing regimen and combination of agents for this approach are unknown.

According to some physicians and patients, AIDS management may involve a variety of elements to be effective. Fostering a reciprocal patient-doctor relationship, eating a healthy diet, exercise and maintaining a positive mental attitude are recommended. An individual needs to take an active role in learning about all of the current therapies available for preventing and treating opportunistic infections.

Further, the important AIDS awareness message of the flag was communicated through the media to an audience of nearly 1 billion worldwide on this historic day.

Officials of The Stadlanders Foundation, organizers of the Raise the Rainbow event, announced that grant guidelines for the funds raised was issued on August 15th, and grant applications will be due by September 30, 1994. All costs for the flag were generously underwritten by corporate sponsor Stadlanders pharmacy, a nationwide mail service pharmacy specializing in the needs of people with chronic conditions, so that all money raised will go directly back to the community through the HIV/AIDS Community Grant Fund of the foundation. To qualify for funding, grant applications must provide documentation of their 501(C)(3) status.

Founded in 1984, DIFFA is the oldest and one of the largest funders of HIV/AIDS service and educational programs in the United States. In ten years, DIFFA has grown to comprise 20 chapters and communities large and small throughout the country, and has provided nearly \$19 million to hundreds of AIDS organizations. DIFFA is well known for its low administrative and fundraising expenses, with a high percentage of DIFFA spending going directly to programs on the front lines in the fight against HIV/AIDS.

DIFFA is a national organization, but is strongly represented at the chapter level. Each DIFFA chapter — from Seattle to Omaha to Boston — carries DIFFA's message and mission of fighting AIDS to large cities and small towns throughout the United States. Every chapter springs from the resources and talents of the local community, and works to meet the particular needs and challenges posed by the AIDS epidemic in that part of the country.

DIFFA and the chapters fight AIDS in two ways: raising awareness about the disease through educational and cultural programs, while raising millions of dollars annually, which is returned to that community in the form of grants for HIV/AIDS treatment, care and education. Indeed, DIFFA's efforts have often been vital in keeping small, understaffed and under-funded programs alive. Meantime, DIFFA grants are also given at the national level.

DIFFA mobilizes the vast and considerable talents of the design, fashion and artistic communities into a veritable army of concerned people about AIDS.

DIFFA has also been an innovative and determined agency in drawing corporations into the fight against the epidemic. Having started with volunteers from the fields of fashion, interior design, furnishings, and architecture, supporters of DIFFA now come from the following trades also: craft design, tabletop, visual, design publishing, hospitality, floral, fashion, exhibit, textile, display, product, graphic, and hair cosmetics. In addition, DIFFA enjoys tremendous support from the entertainment, publishing, broadcasting, finance, advertising, retail and marketing industries.

The local DIFFA Chapter is preparing a spring fund raiser — "Dining By Design". Dining By Design is an elegant, visually and emotionally enriching evening including entertainment, dinner and dancing. Table designs for the evening will be done by local designers from a variety of fields. Their creativity and magic will set the tone for the event — with innovative creations and themes.

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

Final awards were announced at the annual dinner held at Dance City on August 20. Voting for TAG awards is by the Omaha working theatre community. *Jeffrey*, SNAP's February 1994 comedy directed by Rob Baker, was nominated for outstanding comedy, direction, lead actor, supporting actor (3), and featured actor (2); featured actress (2), and sound design. *The Normal Heart*, presented in September 1993 and directed by Norm Filbert, was nominated for outstanding drama, direction, lead actor, supporting actress, and sound design.

SNAP Productions was formed as a non-profit, fund-raising support organization for The Nebraska AIDS Project. All SNAP proceeds benefit the programs of NAP, and all management, artistic staff, and production members are volunteers.

SNAP's primary focus is to produce and present dramatic plays and other performing arts offerings which help to create community awareness of AIDS-related issues. SNAP believes that the performing arts deliver a unique source of enjoyment, enlightenment, therapy, and a celebration of life.

US DEPT OF LABOR CONSIDERS ANTIVIOLENCE STANDARD FOR THE WORKPLACE

OSHA, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, with the U.S. Dept. of Labor, is considering creating a new standard that deals with violence in the workplace. At a recent presentation, Joe Dear, the Assistant Secretary for OSHA, was asked if there would be a provision in this proposed standard that would deal with Hate Crimes that occur in the workplace, like anti-Gay violence and violence that based on race or gender. He said he learned something from the questions and that he wanted information.

As a result, Gay and Lesbian people who have experienced violence in the workplace solely because they're Gay or Lesbian, need to come forward and talk about their experiences. Information is needed about physical attacks, harassment that's verbal or done through acts, and threats of violence, no matter what year the incident happened, and whether it was done by an employer, a co-worker, or an outsider.

Information is also needed in regards to people who have experienced violence in the workplace because of their race, gender, nationality, age or anything else.

The inclusion of a Hate Crimes provision in this proposed standard won't become a reality unless people step forward and fight back! If this standard is enacted with this provision, it'll be another victory for Gay Liberation.

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NETV CANCELS *IN THE LIFE* SERIES REFUSES TO SHOW TAPE OF STONEWALL 25

For the past two seasons *In The Life*, has been broadcast monthly on all nine NETV stations and has provided informative and entertaining programming with a gay and lesbian perspective. You may not have had the opportunity to watch *In The Life*, but unless Nebraska Education Television is assured that there is significant support for the series, they will never broadcast it again.

In The Life's presence on NETV had been in jeopardy since its suspension this past April. Since that time there have been several conversations between Gary Scharfman, Director of Broadcast Operations for *In The Life*, and Gene Bunge, NETV's program manager, to ascertain what *In The Life* needed to do to get the series reinstated.

DECISION NOT BASED ON QUALITY OF PROGRAMMING

Initially Gene Bunge said NETV's decision was based on the quality of the series. However, in July, in explaining NETV's decision not to broadcast our one hour special season finale, *Stonewall 25: Global Voices of Pride and Protest*, Gene Bunge admitted that quality was not the issue. To date, *Stonewall 25* has been broadcast on dozens of public television stations in this country as well as throughout the United Kingdom.

Though they may not admit it officially, *In The Life's* cancellation is due to the increasing hesitancy by the executives of NETV to broadcast programming that they think will offend their viewers; and to them this includes the placement of gays and lesbians in a positive light.

VIEWER SUPPORT IS NEEDED IF *IN THE LIFE* IS TO BE PUT BACK ON THE AIR

Your help is needed if NETV is to put *In The Life* back on the air beginning this October with our fall season. Gene Bunge has stated that a sincere effort could be quite effective in allaying the doubts by NETV that they can count on viewer support if the series is reinstated. You should be aware that Gene Bunge said that telephone calls carry the same weight as letters, and that the more individual the comment the more weight they will be given. LIPS TOGETHER, TEETH APART

Terrence McNally's recent Broadway hit, *Lips Together, Teeth Apart*, has been chosen as SNAP's latest offering. Slated for production September 17-20 and 25-27, this touchingly funny comedy will be staged at the Firehouse Dinner Theatre, 11th and Jackson Streets in Omaha's historic Old Market. Opening night tickets are \$30 and include a patron reception immediately following the performance. As one of the best of modern American playwrights, Terrence McNally has a string of Broadway hits (*The Rink, The Lisbon Traviata, The Ritz, and Frank & Johnny in the Clair de Lune* to name just a few) as well as a number of distinctive awards (two Guggenheim Fellowships, a Rockefeller grant, and a citation from the American Academy of Arts and Letters) to his name. *Lips Together, Teeth Apart* is one of his best - funny, fascinating, and amazingly empathic.

The plot revolves around two inter-related married couples spending the Fourth of July together at a beautiful beach house on Fire Island. Uneasy with themselves and each other, they're also incredibly uneasy in their new environment - surrounded by gay neighbors on all sides and vacationing at the home inherited by one of the women from a brother who recently died of AIDS. McNally manages to make the hopes, fears, and foibles of his characters endearing and humorous despite their obvious failings. Frank Rich of the *New York Times* called *Lips Together, Teeth Apart* "the one new American play that must be seen."



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LINCOLN AIDS HEALING SERVICE TO BE FIRST TUESDAYS

As a result of a meeting for persons interested in the Lincoln HIV/AIDS Healing Worship Services, the monthly Healing Service will now be held on the first Tuesday of each month. From September through December 1994, the AIDS Healing Worship Service will be held at Trinity United Methodist Church, 1345 South 16th Street, in Lincoln at 7:00 p.m. on the first Tuesday of each month. During that time, the Urban Ministries Committee of the Lincoln Interfaith Council will be looking at the possibility of a permanent location for the service. Responsibilities for planning and leading the monthly worship service will be shared. The schedule for AIDS Healing Worship Service leaders is:

Tuesday Sept. 6 — Rev. Dr. Robert Kunz, First Christian Church
Tuesday Oct. 4 — The Rev. Murray Schmechel, Aldersgate UMC
Tuesday Nov 1 — The Rev. Richard Scheerer, Vine Congregational UCC
Tuesday Dec. 6 — Father Don Hanway, St. Mark's on the Campus Episcopal

Strong support was given to the need for personal commitments to attend these services so as to provide a *continuing congregation* of supporters. Persons with HIV need to be able to expect that many of the *same congregational members will be present each time* — to build trust and develop friendships, which are integral elements in the healing process.

There was also strong affirmation to continue these as *Christian ecumenical healing services, with the laying-on-of-hands liturgy*. Christianity has a long history of healing services within its traditions, and this type of worship is a special *gift* from the Christian community to those who wish to accept it. Different *gifts* from other religious traditions could be offered via the Urban Ministries Division of the Lincoln Interfaith Council for consideration. To be "inter-faith" does not mean that the Lincoln Interfaith Council has to deny the uniqueness of its individual members.

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


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EQUALITY BEFORE THE LAW

Candlelight Vigil Planned

A few months back, a small group of people got together to discuss their concerns about the alarming number of crimes motivated by hatred in Nebraska. Out of that meeting, *Equality Before the Law* was formed.

At that first meeting one incident in particular, the New Year's Eve murder of three young people in Southeastern Nebraska, was at the forefront of discussion. Teena Brandon, who went by the name Brandon Teena, was a Lincoln, Nebraska native who had made a new home in Falls City. Though Brandon's body was physically female, she felt as though she were truly male. True to her feelings, she was living as a man in Falls City. Many local people felt that this was a lie on Brandon's part, but any doctor specializing in gender identity would have advised Brandon to do the same.

Rumors began to spread that Brandon was physically a woman. Two men, who for some reason felt particularly threatened by Brandon's identity, acted out their fear in a brutal, ruthless manner. They kidnapped Brandon, beat her, and raped her. They locked Brandon in a bathroom with orders to clean herself up, and a warning that if she went to the police, they would kill her.

Brandon escaped out a window, and went to the police, who were more curious about Brandon's identity than the crimes that had been committed against her (*Lincoln Journal*, Jan. 5, 1994, p.1). The police took no action against the men Brandon accused of raping her.

Upon learning that Brandon had reported the incident, the two men hunted her down. They found her at the home of a friend near Humboldt. They broke into the home and killed Brandon by shooting her in the back of the head, and stabbing her repeatedly. They also killed a black man who had been dating the sister of Brandon's girlfriend, and the woman who was letting them stay in her home.

Three basic sentiments prevailed at that first meeting as we discussed this horrifying incident:

**Nobody* deserves to die for being perceived as "different."

*A woman who does not conform to the "traditional woman's role" does *not* deserve to be

beaten, raped, or killed.

**Everyone* deserves the protection of the law.

Thus, *Equality Before the Law* came into being. *Equality Before the Law* takes its name from the official state motto of Nebraska. It means that Nebraskans value equality above all else, and that Nebraska law should ensure the equality and protect the individualism of all Nebraskans. Equality cannot exist unless everyone is included. If equality doesn't exist, then our motto is meaningless. *Equality Before the Law* is an ad hoc coalition of individuals and organizations concerned about hate crimes in Nebraska. We are founded on the fundamental principle that *we all have the right to live our lives without fear of being victimized for who we are.*

A hate crime is one committed against a person solely because that person is perceived as "different" in some way. A person can become the victim of a hate crime due to his or her ethnic origin, gender, sexual orientation, religious affiliation, age, physical or mental disability, or, as in the case of Teena Brandon, gender identity. Hate crimes differ from other crimes in that they are motivated by ignorance, fear, bigotry and hatred of the victim. Any one of us could be the victim of a random crime - a robbery, mugging, or carjacking, for example - but Teena Brandon was at greater risk simply because *who she was made her a target.* That's reality for many Nebraskans. If we can decrease that risk, Nebraska will become a safer place for everyone. That's why hate crimes legislation should be important to all of us.

As of 1993, 20 states, the District of Columbia, and eleven cities and counties had enacted hate crimes legislation. Typical components of hate crimes legislation are provisions for law enforcement training in identifying, responding to, and reporting such offenses; the maintenance of a central registry for the collection and analysis of hate crimes; definitions of hate crimes; and the provision for some type of civil action for the victims of the crime.

The goals of *Equality Before the Law* are:

1. *Support the passage of hate crimes*

legislation in the Nebraska legislature during the 1995 session.

2. *Raise awareness of the Teena Brandon murder case and other hate crimes in Nebraska, and educate the community about the need for hate crimes legislation.*

3. *Call for an investigation into the conduct of the Richardson County Sheriff.* Sheriff Charles Laux made statements to Brandon's sister such as, "What kind of a sister did you have?" (*Lincoln Journal*, Jan. 5, 1994, p. 1). These statements and the fact that the men Brandon accused of raping her both had previous criminal records (*Lincoln Journal*, Jan. 3, 1994, p. 8) suggest that Sheriff Laux may have had a personal bias that prevented him from performing his duty as sheriff. His failure to act promptly may constitute a violation of Brandon's civil rights.

In calling for an investigation into the sheriff's conduct, we are not in any way making an accusation of criminal conduct on the part of Sheriff Laux. We are only expressing our desire to *find out* if the law came through for a victim of a horrible crime.

A rally and candlelight vigil is scheduled for Monday, October 10, at 6:00 p.m. We will gather on the west steps of the Capitol where community members will speak about how hate crimes have affected them in Nebraska. We will then light our candles and walk to the old Federal Building at 10th and "O" Streets where a vigil will be held in memory of victims of hate crimes. We are asking that you plan to attend the rally and vigil on October 10th.

In addition, we also ask that you consider contributing \$20.00 to help us defray postage, copying, and rally/vigil expenses. As we are an ad hoc coalition of groups, we have limited funds. Checks may be made payable to *Equality Before the Law*.


