As the only woman on the Steering Committee of The New Voice I feel a tremendous sense of obligation and responsibility, not only to other wimmin in the community but to myself. When I decided to give what effort and ability I have to offer, I had a very clear-cut goal in mind: to make The New Voice a publication for the gay and lesbian community.

I recognize the other publications that are available for special interest groups in our area, but I wanted to see an objective communication tool—one that could be utilized and shared by all gays and lesbians. I feel a sense of urgency about it, perhaps because I see (in particular) the gay and lesbian community pulling apart.

I realize gays and lesbians have different personal concerns and priorities, and I am trying to empathize with both sides while answering to my own concerns and beliefs. As a woman I am deeply committed to equity and humanity—which calls for an end to sexism, pornography, social and financial discrimination and violence against wimmin. As a member of the gay community I am anxious to see us work together to end homophobia, discrimination in housing and employment and violence against homosexuals.

Perhaps I expected too much too soon. I started to take criticism of The New Voice personally and I wondered if there was any reason to stay on. Then someone told me I am making an important contribution—by keeping at least one line of communication available.

So, I am going to keep trying—not trying to patch up misunderstandings and differences—but to make sure there is always a line for communication whenever anyone wants to use it. If it is all I can do for now, I will.

The New Voice apologizes to all the organizations listed. In the future we will not use the name of an organization in direct or indirect sponsorship of an event without their permission. The individual who designed the ad only wanted to express the cause of unity (which is greatly lacking by many organizations in this state).

The New Voice no longer uses the word Editorial. For several months we have used the word Opinion. A staff member's opinion was mistakenly thought to represent the entire magazine.

Our associate editor in a telephone conversation with a member of the LLL collective offered to run their article in installments. That



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Exiled in Lincoln

I walked south on 48th Street from the shopping plaza toward my new apartment. Somehow I'd severely miscalculated my expenditures. The realization weighed heavier on me with every pace. I gave in to a step beckoning at the sidewalk's edge, and hunched with the gathering shadows of night over my sack and my sorrows.

A couple weeks before a concerned friend had flown me to Lincoln to stay with her while I tried to forget my first lesbian relationship, forget about being a lesbian, and prepare myself to reunite with my husband in order to escape the fires of hell. Now circumstances had demanded that I move into a place of my own. My lover had sent money by overnight delivery and my husband promised to send some soon.

I'd rented an efficiency apartment with a bay window walking distance from my friend and from where I hoped to get a job. I bought a small set of K-Mart dishes, and a few items: bread, cream cheese, Grape-nuts and milk. It was these little treasures that I clutched and cried over sitting on the sidewalk that evening in late fall, 1981. How many days would this food last? Why did I buy the dishes? When would I have to use my remaining \$8.40?

Back at the apartment, there were no books to read, no radio to play, no paper on which to write, no needle with which to sew, nothing with which to do anything. All my possessions would fit in the suitcase my lover sent me off with. I thought about going crazy those early weeks.

Eventually my husband shipped my bike. I borrowed tools to uncrate it (saving the nails and boards for similarly hard times) and to put it together again. My world grew seven miles in three directions.

That bike was my sole transportation that winter, including five miles downtown to the welfare office for food stamps. I didn't know I would

probably have qualified for money as well. I only asked for food stamps, and that was all I got. Anyway, I soon had a job, but had to wait six weeks for my first paycheck.

Christmas I silently collected discarded boughs clipped from store bought trees and tied them into a Christmas tree shape. I decorated my dresser top "tree" with winter berries gathered on the Union College campus. Desire to be with my first love during the holidays obscured other festivities. I still have a hard time remembering the loveliness of friends who shared their Christmas activities with me that year; all I could think about was being with Barb.

Poverty pressed me to put off tending to a fever and a sore throat until I thought I was going to die, likely from stress and exposure. Somehow I survived finding a doctor that would accept time payments, survived snowy trips to the welfare office to get prescriptions filled, and survived biking to work daily so as not to reduce a paycheck.

Amazons must be made for obstacles. My boots, my bike and I had crunched through leaves then snow then spring. The beauty of the local parks, the beauty of the view out my bay window centered me and strengthened me. It was a very quiet winter. A growing winter.

My husband had moved to Lincoln in February and we took a house together. We planted a garden and played baseball and had a good friendship if not a marriage.

Marriage classes didn't seem to help, either. I pored over my workbook, doing all the assignments and tried to persuade my husband to do them as well. We were getting along fine, but he was pushing for sex and I couldn't bear the thought of it.

By spring I knew I had to see Barb. I flew to Michigan for a weekend. Being with her was like being home to myself. We began talking on the phone twice a day.

A month later she drove down and U-Hauled me away. Meanwhile my husband had secured a divorce, having found out that my weekend away was with my true love, not with a trick I picked up at the gay bar as he had imagined.

That winter's exile in Lincoln, designed to help me go straight, was a memorable experience for me, not only for the tremendous hardships

I faced, but for the inner strength I developed quietly pondering my life in those beautiful settings (especially at the dyke). Whenever something reminds me of Lincoln, the courage and joy I developed there rise up in me, and the remembrance that in Lincoln I decided for the last time that I had to be, that I am a luscious lesbian!

And know that I love you always not in spite of your being gay, nor because you are gay, but because you are my child and you are a good person and worthy and deserving of my love.

Fortunately a few rehearsals and supportive friends managed to calm my jangled nerves. (A few shots of rum didn't hurt any either.)

When I first started thinking what I wanted Darrell to be like, I took bits and pieces of several male performers and built them into a character. After the second performance, I changed Darrell's image with a tuxedo to see

If the audience would like a more polished look. I began to put more of myself into him when I started giving away a red rose at each show, and the rose became Darrell's trademark. The roses are my way of showing appreciation for the women, and it's become my favorite part of the act.

When people ask me why I do the act, I usually say, "Because it's a heck of a lot of fun," and leave it at that. There are other reasons: Darrell has been a way for me to contribute to certain benefits and causes, such as MCC, that I want very much to help financially. Also, it's a way of saying, "We're gay women and we're proud of it." Darrell was formed from the romantic, campy and extroverted side of me, and I think that's the main reason he's such a kick to do. But maybe part of the reason people like Darrell is that he's not perfect. Sometimes Darrell tries to be overly "slick" and he blunders on occasion, but it's just his campy way of having fun with the audience.

A Pastoral Chat

"Jesus is a Feminist" said the eye-catching button that was being sold at MCC's recent Mid-Central District Conference in Kansas City, Missouri. When one reads the Gospels they find a good deal of evidence to support that claim.

Many women claim to be turned off to Christ and Christianity because of the historically very patriarchal stance of the Judeo-Christian tradition. And, certainly, the role that women have been allowed in the churches of most major denominations is not terrifically encouraging. There is

progress, albeit slow.

However, one can hardly blame Jesus for that! Being a revolutionary in many of his sociological, economic and religious teachings and lifestyle, his credentials as a feminist are also intact. Not only did he break with tradition in the way he related to women, but he encouraged them in a sense of self-worth as individuals—something far too many women are still searching for, in all the wrong places.

The apostle Paul is often seen as the

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culprit in not allowing women an equal place in the church or home. This is an over-simplification of the facts, but it seems that many churches preach and teach Paulianity rather than Christianity, and the 2,000 year traditions of the Christian church often obscure Christ.

In the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches (UFMCC) you will find us dealing not only with feminist issues and inclusive language in a historic way, but women are working in equality with men at every level of church government. Our Board of Elders is presently comprised of four women and three men.

In the process of UFMCC's application for membership in the National Council of Churches, not only did we raise consciousness about gay/lesbian issues but also we had an opportunity to share

the very positive effect that equality of roles has had in our denomination.

Within the history of the gay/lesbian civil rights struggle, men and women have often seemed to work at cross purposes and have often times been defeated by the struggle among themselves before they could even deal with the over-all issues.

Somehow, not without pain, a tremendous desire to grow in the love of the spirit of Christ has helped men and women in UFMCC to minimize those struggles. We go a long step toward acceptance of each other when we see each other as individuals instead of seeing every man as an oppressor or every woman as a castrating —— (Mrs. Bush said it rhymes with rich).

Magic Theater

The Story of the Omaha Magic Theatre begins in the Old Market in 1969. It presented works of contemporary European playwrights. Today, you'll find the Theatre at 1417 Farnam, presenting works of contemporary American writers, musicians, composers, painters and sculptors. "Now when we work with writers," says Jo Ann, the Theatre's Producing/Artistic Director, "we invite them for a residency."

Playwright Megan Terry points out that the Theatre produced a number of presentations dealing with feminist issues in the early 1970's but "since all of that is cut in the open now, we always seem to be moving on." She recalled an example: We did a piece about

spouse and child abuse in '79 and it looks like the media (are) just discovering it." Megan says as soon as television has picked up on it, it's on to the next thing.

So, what is the next thing? Communication! Megan cites lack of communication within the family as the basic problem: "People cannot speak to one another." A piece still in research and development, called Family Talk, deals with positive, interpersonal communication within the family.

Astro-Bride, the next scheduled production, opens December 21. Written by Jo Ann, it offers a perception of humans through the eyes of a woman from another planet who has spent 30 years visiting Earth.

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Willa Cather

The current issue of *Signs*, which may perhaps be described as America's leading scholarly journal for women's studies, has an interesting essay by Sharon O'Brien of Dickinson College on "Willa Cather as a Lesbian Writer". This "Lesbian Issue" of *Signs* has several articles which should be of interest to Lincoln's lesbian and gay community, including one on discrimination against lesbians in employment and another on the persecution of gay men and lesbians in Cuba. But readers of *The New Voice* will probably find the Cather piece especially exciting. It presents the first detailed account of Cather's love affair with Louise Pound when Cather was a student at the University of Nebraska.

It's well known that Willa Cather destroyed one important set of letters she had written, those to Isabelle McClung, a Pittsburgh society woman with whom she shared a room in the latter's family mansion for several years. Others letters to women have survived, but Cather's will provided that none of her correspondence should be quoted by biographers. It has been possible, however, for scholars to read some of these letters and to paraphrase them. The two significant letters on which Sharon O'Brien bases her account of Cather's feelings for Louise Pound were written in 1892 and 1893. They are in the Pound collection at Duke University, Durham, North Carolina.

In the first, Cather praises Louise's beauty at a party the night before and regrets that friendships between women are regarded as unnatural. The note of emotional involvement is quite marked. In the second she pleads for proof of Louise's affection, begs her to visit Red Cloud, and then in a startling bit of self-dramatization adds that if "Louise did come to Red Cloud she might as well bring a pistol and deliver a miserable soul from its earthly torment."

Cather signed her first letter "William". A note added by Louise Pound's sister explains that the Pound family regularly called Cather "William" because she always dressed like a man. Early photographs of Cather confirm this male image with a hair style that is almost military. Louise Pound herself looks more conventionally feminine

in her photos. She was a brilliant student in Lincoln and in Heidelberg, Germany. Later she became a well-known scholar and the first woman president of the Modern Language Association. She was also the first woman elected to the Nebraska Sports Hall of Fame. She was formidable in tennis tournaments, organized the women's basketball team on campus and led a women's military group which practiced with heavy rifles. She and Cather collaborated in campus journals and dramatic productions. For many decades she was a professor of English at the University of Nebraska. I remember meeting her when I first arrived in Lincoln in the mid fifties. A professor emeritus by that time, she was still a vigorous and formidable woman in her eighties.

Sharon O'Brien's article is not the first publication to discuss Cather's lesbianism. Jane Rule included a sensitive essay on her in *Lesbian Images*, and Phyllis C. Robinson's recent popular biography also assumed this orientation. There is much circumstantial evidence to support this point of view and nothing to contradict it, but O'Brien is the first scholar to give a full account of the intensity of her feelings for Louise Pound. Cather had rhapsodized on female beauty in art reviews in the *Lincoln Journal*, for which she wrote extensively, and in 1895 she had published in its pages an ardent appreciation of the love poems Sappho wrote to other women in ancient Greece.

Unlike Gertrude Stein, who seems to have been willing to have posterity see her as a lesbian, Cather in later life was very private and conservative in her lifestyle. But it is becoming increasingly obvious as evidence accumulates and candor increases that America's greatest woman novelist did, indeed, belong to its most despised minority.

Personal Profiles - Rosemary Machacek

The gay and lesbian community lost a vocal ally on the Human Rights Commission last month with the resignation of Rosemary Machacek, a vocal supporter of the so-called gay rights bill sent to city council by the commission in 1982. She has resigned in order to more effectively work for civil rights in other areas.

Rosemary Machacek was born into a family in Crete where discussing politics and religion at the dinner table was not considered rude, though intolerance for the opinions of others was. Her parents were, and still are, strong and vocal supporters of civil rights for all. "A civil society lets people be different," she told me over coffee a few weeks ago. She went on to say that she firmly believes prejudice of any sort to be taught rather than innate. "I have a brother in New Mexico who is straight who was a high school and college athlete, a real jock. But growing up in the same environment I did, and being taught that it is OK to be different, means that he has no trouble at all with the concept of gay civil rights or civil rights in general."

A student at the University of Illinois-Carbondale during the anti-Vietnam protests, her commitment to civil rights was refined and confirmed by seeing what happened at Kent State in 1970 when freedom of speech conflicted with John Mitzell's idea of law and order. Her own university was forced to close during the spring quarter that year because of the rioting.

Returning to Lincoln with an M. A. in English, she was awarded a Regents' Fellowship to study the Education of Psychology and human

learning. A staunch feminist, she volunteered to work for the Women's Commission.

In 1982 Beatty Brasch left the Commission on Human Rights to become Election Commissioner and Mayor Helen Boosalis found herself with one last appointment to make. "I think she wanted to use her last bit of influence to benefit a Commission whose work is very important. Look at what Reagan's influence has been in the area of civil rights. Membership in the KKK is way up from the 1960's. Poverty in this country is the highest since the 1960's. The bigots have crawled out of the woodwork."

Machacek is an optimist, however, pointing out that politics is cyclical in this country. While conceding that the Human Rights Commission is controversial ("If these issues were not controversial there would be no need for a commission"), she also says that human rights are more important than political expediency.

When the Coalition asked the Human Rights Commission to pass a gay civil rights ordinance, Machacek immediately seized upon it as a human rights issue. She spoke to numerous groups, including churches, to ask them for their support. While being disappointed by the outcome of the vote, she thinks it is too early to tell whether the campaign was worthwhile.

It is not too early to tell that Rosemary Machacek has been a boon to those who believe that equal rights under the Law means exactly that. The self-styled "sturdy peasant" says she loves her life, sleeps well and is ready to go in the morning. May she have many mornings yet to come.

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

To the Editors of The New Voice:

This letter is in response to an editorial entitled "A Different View" written by Mel Dahl and published in The New Voice. This statement about pornography reflects the opinion of Lincoln Women Against Pornography. We do not attempt to present the "other side" of the pornography issue. Rather, we hold that there are no sides to be taken—it is not a debatable issue. Pornography harms women, children and men; it is a gross form of exploitation.

Pornography at the root means the sexual slavery of females. It depicts women as sexual objects, animals and whores who enjoy pain, rape and humiliation. Pornography is forced sex used as a means of controlling and degrading women and all those oppressed by the male power-over system. Those oppressed include other men and children, with added discrimination and violence directed toward women of color and other minorities. The issue here is one of inequality and denial of civil rights through subordination, not an issue of purity or obscenity. Our analysis is a feminist one. We are not anti-sex and do not find women's bodies "dirty" but rather we object to the link between sex and violence, using women's bodies as objects, and the subordination of women.

Pornography promotes the message that it is the function of women to be used sexually for the pleasure of men. This pleasure ranges from passive displays of body parts to rape and murder. The message of pornography contains the assumptions that it is OK to use women in this way, that we want and like to be used, and that we are always available for anything a male wants to do to us. These are false assumptions, in fact lies, about women's sexuality and male license.

Corollary relationships have been established between the viewing of pornography and increased male aggression toward women. It works like this: pornography presents women being raped, beaten andliking it; men read pornography; men believe pornography; men in turn rape and beat women.

Pornography is not women posing freely for large sums of money. Women and children are forced into the making of pornography by kidnapping threat, job harassment, low self-esteem, poverty and child abuse. Many pornography models are runaways and 70-80% are incest victims. Models see little or no money from pornography—Linda Marchiano (Linda Lovelace in *Deep Throat*) made no money from that movie. Money is an issue in the making of pornography, but it is the pornographers who enjoy the profits of an industry which reaps 9 billion dollars per year.

Models are not the only women hurt by pornography. It is forced on all women in many ways—a direct link between pornography and other forms of sexual abuse exists, e. g. rape, child molestation, wife battering and marital rape. Pornography is used in rape on the street, in the workplace, in educational systems and assaults us in the grocery store, on billboards and TV.

Pornography is women-hating propaganda and to support its existence is to support the hatred of women and the consequent violence done to women. Pornography harms everyone, including the men who believe pornography to be about sexuality instead of an issue of power and violence. It is men's need to control women which keeps them raping and battering—violence is the means of control and pornography is the sexualization of violence. Stop violence against women—no more pornography.

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
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"Building Growing

P—Flag Receives Grant

Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG) Cornhusker, a Lincoln support group, has received a \$1,770 grant for educational and outreach efforts. The money will be used: to develop a core library of books, for educational outreach to parents in Lincoln and other Nebraska communities, to maintain a monthly newsletter, and to subsidize members' attendance at the International PFLAG Convention to be held in Denver later this month. PFLAG provides a safe/confidential place for parents, friends and gay and lesbian "children" to openly share their feelings and experience, as well as to support one another. Because of the homophobic attitudes frequent in our society, this is often the only place where they can talk about homosexuality as a personal experience. The group is educational in its efforts to learn about and to teach others not only what homosexuality is, but also what it is not. It is estimated that one out of ten persons is homosexual, which means that there are many parents in Lincoln alone who might be interested in the support and information pro-

vided by PFLAG Cornhusker. Anyone interested in more information may write to PFLAG Cornhusker, P. O. Box 4374, Lincoln, NE 68504. All queries are held in strict confidence. A self addressed, stamped envelope would be appreciated. The grant was received from the Chicago Resource Center (CRC) a foundation which is concerned with gay and lesbian issues. In 1982 the CRC funded two conferences in Nebraska for pastors on counseling gay and lesbian people and their families.

Here and There

Violence against lesbians and gay men is widespread in America, according to a recent survey released by the National Gay Task Force. Results of the study, which was conducted in cooperation with local gay/lesbian organizations in eight U. S. cities in June and July, 1983 show that of nearly 2,100 lesbian and gay people surveyed, more than 90% said they experienced some type of victimization because of their sexual orientation. Physical abuse was reported by 20% of the males surveyed and 10% of the females. Approximately 1/3 of respondents stated that they had been verbally abused by relatives because of their sexual orientation. Other forms of abuse included objects being thrown and individuals being chased or followed.

Guide Magazine, Denver

After eight years of court appearances and legal battles a gay and lesbian student group at Texas A & M University has won recognition from the school administration. The Fifth Circuit court of appeals ruled that the school's refusal to grant GSS (Gay Student Services) recognition is unconstitutional and impermissibly

denied their First Amendment rights of freedom of association.

Gay Community News, Boston

The Salvation Army of New York City has refused to accept donations of clothing of gay men who have died of AIDS. Bob Brennan, director of operations for the Army's adult rehabilitation center, said that he would not, under any circumstances, direct his employees to pick up clothing donations from "people who, to my knowledge, have died of AIDS—no matter how clean the clothes are."

Washington Cascade Voice

A recent report by U. S. News and World Report listed homosexuals as the seventh largest block of voters in the United States, with 17 million potential members. The report also noted that gays and lesbians had more electoral power than Hispanics, Jews and farmers combined.



Having raised over \$10,000 as well as receiving a \$10,000 private donation over Labor Day Weekend for AIDS re-


search I can't understand why an organization that can raise over \$20,000 on a weekend can't give their time and energy toward trying to raise \$1,500.00?






