PFLAG Founder Jeanne Manford Dies at 92

Jeanne Manford, the founder of Parents, Families, and Friends of Lesbians and Gays, died today in her Daly City, Calif., home. She was 92.

Manford had been experiencing declining health for some time, according to her daughter, Suzanne Swan.

PFLAG's executive director, Jody M. Huckaby, said the world had lost a pioneer with Manford's death.

"Jeanne was one of the fiercest fighters in the battle for acceptance and equality for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people," Huckaby said. "It is truly humbling to imagine in 1972 — just 40 years ago — a simple schoolteacher started this movement of family and ally support, without benefit of any of the technology that today makes a grassroots movement so easy to organize. No Internet. No cell phones. Just a deep love for her son and a sign reading 'Parents of Gays: Unite in Support for Our Children."

One of Manford's sons, the late Morty Manford, was gay. He was beaten during a Gay Activists Alliance demonstration in April 1972, and police failed to intervene. She wrote a letter to the New York Post, published April 29, 1972, in which she stated, "I have a homosexual son, and I love him." Her letter sparked a groundswell of response, and less than two months later, she joined her son at the Christopher Street Liberation Day Parade. Her participation and the affirmations she received from others eventually led to the beginning of PFLAG.

The first meeting, with 20 people, was at a Metropolitan Community Church on March 11, 1973. PFLAG now has 350 official chapters across the U.S. and 200,000 members.

In addition to her daughter, Manford is survived by her son-in-law, Richard Swan, her granddaughter, Avril Swan, and Avril's husband, Stuart Streepy, and her greatgranddaughters, Clara, Grace, and Jules. Manford and her late husband, Jules, also had two sons: Charles, who died in 1966, and Morty, who died in 1992.

"She is known to thousands of people as the mother of the straight ally movement," Suzanne Swan said, "but to me, she was my mother."


February 27 – March 23, 2014

Judge: Bradley Manning Extremely Mistreated in Military Brig

Military judge
Denise Lind has
ruled that Army
private Bradley
Manning was
treated unlawfully before his trial,
awarding him 112
days of credit toward his sentence
if he is convicted.



The gay soldier was held in isola-

tion in a windowless 6-by-8-foot cell for nine months in a Marine brig in Quantico, Va., where he was denied sunlight and meaningful exercise, and was not allowed to wear clothing for part of his detention. Those conditions are deemed "cruel, inhuman, and degrading" by the United Nations' Special Rapporteur on Torture. Marine jailers testified that they believed Manning was a suicide risk and required extreme conditions to ensure he would not harm himself or others.

After a pretrial hearing, Lind ruled Tuesday that Manning's extreme confinement was excessive and largely unnecessary.

"She confirmed that Bradley was mistreated, and vindicated the massive protest effect that was required to stop the Marines at Quantico from torturing Bradley," Jeff Patterson, a spokesman for the Bradley Manning Support Network said in a statement Tuesday. "Yet, 112 days is not nearly enough to hold the military accountable for their actions."

Manning was arrested in 2010 for allegedly leaking large amounts of classified government information to the website WikiLeaks. He is being charged with 22 offenses and faces a potential sentence of more than 150 years in prison.

Manning's hearing will continue through Friday, and his courtmartial trial is scheduled to start March 6.

Rush Limbaugh Compares Marriage Lobby to Pedophilia Lobby

Radio personality Rush Limbaugh alerted his listeners Monday that there is a movement to "normalize pedophilia" just like the movement for marriage equality.

"There is a movement on to normalize pedophilia, and I guarantee you your reaction to that is probably much the same as your reaction when you first heard about gay marriage," he said.

"What has happened to gay marriage? It's become normal—and in fact, with certain people in certain demographics it's the

most important issue in terms of who they vote for."

Limbaugh was referring to an article in London's Guardian newspaper about a British television host who reportedly molested hundreds of young people, according to Politico. The article also brought up the growing argument that pedophilia should be classified as a type of sexual orientation.

The interim executive director of the Log Cabin Republicans, Gregory T. Angelo, said the comparison was "ridiculous." He added, "Rushbo, you're better than that. There is absolutely no



connection between gay marriage and pedophilia, and to insinuate that there is any connection is insulting to loving, committed, adult couples who want nothing more than to live their lives in dignity with the rights and protections afforded to their straight counterparts."

What to Expect as the Supreme Court Takes Up Marriage

The Supreme Court has decided to hear two cases relating to marriage equality. The first, United States v. Windsor, raises the constitutionality of section 3 of the federal Defense of Marriage Act, which denies federal recognition to same-sex couples' marriages. The second, Hollingsworth v. Perry, involves the constitutionality of California's Proposition 8, the state constitutional amendment banning marriage for same-sex couples. After the court's announcement, many commentators and some LGBT activists speculated that the court's ultimate decision in the cases would bring the end of marriage-based discrimination against same-sex couples. Some expect the justices to extend the fundamental right to marry to same-sex couples. Others are focusing on equal protection, anticipating a ruling that sexual orientation classifications merit heightened scrutiny. Such a decision would immediately cast doubt on any form of sexual orientation discrimination, including the marriage prohibitions that a vast majority of states maintain. But this might all be wishful thinking.

Yes, the court might have taken the Windsor case because the Second Circuit Court of Appeals applied heightened scrutiny to sexual orientation classifications, whereas the First Circuit's Gill v. Office of Personnel Management decision applied only rational basis review. But, more likely, the court might have taken Windsor and not Gill because all nine justices could participate in the case. It was widely believed that Justice Kagan would have recused herself from Gill given her role in the Obama administration during deliberations regarding that case.

Yes, the court might have taken Perry in order to move the nation toward marriage equality and strike down the laws of 40-plus states. But, more likely, the court might have taken Perry based on the votes of four conservative justices who want to overturn the Ninth Circuit and find Proposition 8 constitutional. It only takes four votes to decide to hear a case.

Ultimately, then, all this talk about broad rulings, fundamental rights, and nationwide marriage equality may be premature. Given the court's track record in other LGBT rights cases, it seems more likely that the decisions we receive in both Windsor and Perry will be, even if favorable to the cause of marriage equality, more narrowly reasoned than many are expecting.

In 1986 the Supreme Court dealt LGBT rights activists a devastating blow, ruling in Bowers v. Hardwick that antisodomy laws were constitutional. It became increasingly difficult to argue that lesbians and gay men deserved heightened constitutional protection when the highest court in the land had declared that the conduct largely understood to define the group — same-sex sex — could be criminalized. But all was not lost. A decade later the court issued its decision in Romer v. Evans, striking down Colorado's Amendment 2, which prohibited state and local entities from passing or enforcing sexual orientation anti-discrimination laws. Without overruling Bowers, the court found that the law failed to pass the lowest level of constitutional scrutiny — rational basis review.

Then, in 2003, the court in Lawrence v. Texas overruled its damaging Bowers decision and struck down state antisodomy laws. Yet again the court resisted a broad ruling. While it identified a protected liberty interest at stake, it neither declared that a fundamental right was implicated nor applied strict scrutiny to the law. As it had in Romer, the court decided the issue favorably for lesbians and gay men but did so in a relatively cabined way.

This doctrinal preference — for narrow over broad rulings — relates to concerns over the court's institutional legitimacy. The justices are generally reluctant to move too far ahead of public opinion and to strike down laws on the books in a majority of states. When the court issued its ruling in Bowers, half the states maintained antisodomy laws. When it decided Lawrence, that number had shrunk to 13. Many are comparing the court's ultimate ruling in Perry to Loving v. Virginia, the landmark decision striking down bans on interracial marriage. But before

the court took Loving, it passed years earlier on a case raising the same question. In fact, the Loving decision came almost two decades after the California Supreme Court struck down its state prohibition on interracial marriage and at a time when only 16 states maintained such laws.

Justice Kennedy authored both Romer and Lawrence, and everyone is looking to him as the decisive vote in Windsor and Perry. He has established a favorable legacy on sexual orientation equality, and he is not likely to reverse course now. But it may be too much to expect Justice Kennedy — and four of his colleagues — to bring marriage equality to the entire country in one fell swoop, either by resorting to the fundamental right to marry or deeming sexual orientation a suspect classification. The day the court issues its opinions in Windsor and Perry may very well be a day for celebration, but we will likely be celebrating more limited victories than many are now envisioning.

Gay Teen Allowed to Submit Eagle Scout Application

A San Francisco Boy Scout troop has approved an openly gay member's application to be an Eagle Scout after a fierce petition drive spearheaded by the boy's mother.

Ryan Andresen's scoutmaster refused to sign his Eagle application because the scout is openly gay, in line with the national organization's policy barring openly gay scouts and scoutmasters. His mother, Karen Andresen, launched a Change.org campaign, spurring 460,000 people to express their support for her son. The Eagle Scout Board of Review evaluated Ryan Andresen's credentials and recommended him to join the Mt. Diablo-Silverado Council December 31, though the national organization can still reject Andresen's membership.

"I want other gay Scouts to know, especially those who are hiding who they really are, that this win is for you. Thank you to everyone who joined my mom's campaign. Your signatures made this possible," Ryan Andresen said in a statement Tuesday.

Bonnie Hazarabedian, who was on Ryan Andresen's Eagle Board of Review, said he did "everything right in the process of fighting the Eagle Scout's refusal to sign his application.

"Following BSA advancement policies in such situations, we felt an Eagle Board of Review was justified," she said. "As we do with all Eagle candidates, volunteer Scout leaders -- parents ourselves of current or former Scouts -- met with Ryan to review and discuss his scouting history and advancement records, his Eagle Leadership Project, and his spiritual beliefs and life goals. We are convinced that Ryan has demonstrated he deserves the rank of Eagle Scout."


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Time for a Retreat?

This is a crazy time of year, as Christmas and the New Year beckon. What's one of the best things you can do for yourself at this time of year? Perhaps it's time for a retreat. You may protest, saying you don't have the time or money, but check out these three different types of retreats:

The at-home retreat: This won't cost you any money and is the easiest type of retreat to pull off. Your only challenge is to actually do it. When you stay home, it's easy to fall into your



You might make the retreat for an hour, or a morning. Start small. You can always do a longer one next time. Set an intention for your retreat. Ask yourself, "What is it that I need right now?" and let the answer to that question guide your retreat.

Set your home up so that it is as quiet and retreat-like as possible: turn off your phones and electronic devices, remove all obvious distractions and prepare yourself for a wonderful adventure...a retreat into yourself.

The meditative retreat: This type of retreat is about finding some peace of mind. Whether your call it prayer, meditation or something else, the goal is to slow down, relax and rejuvenate.

 Γ ve recently been on meditative retreats in three very different locales: the first retreat was in a large mansion, the second at a monastery (and Γ m not even Catholic) and the third was in a retreat center that closely resembled army barracks. With these kinds of retreats, you get what you pay for.

If you pick a structured retreat, there may be other people who walk you through the process. If you choose an unstructured retreat, set an intention for your retreat and keep checking in to stay in touch with your intention.

Most of us lose focus on a retreat; so don't sweat it. If you find yourself fantasizing about the gorgeous person meditating next to you, that's normal. Instead of beating yourself up for losing your focus, just return to your breath or whatever your intention is. Our mind is like a "monkey mind", it just bounces all around. We can't tame it, but we can get to know it better and make peace with it.

The self-care retreat: This type of retreat is about taking extra-good care of yourself: mind/body/spirit. It's really nice when you can go to a place that offers all three. This type of retreat typically costs more than the others, because a retreat like this typically involves being pampered and cared for in many ways, e.g., great food, fitness classes, nice accommodations, personal attention and spa treatments like massages and facials. I went on a week retreat at Rancho La Puerta, about 30 miles east of San Diego, just across the border in Tecate, Mexico. Wow, what a nice place!

The accommodations were beautiful, the food was healthy and tasty, the facilities were immaculate and the classes offered ranged from very nurturing (Feldenkreis, Tai Chi and Crystal Bowl Healing) to super intense (9-mile mountain hikes with a 2000 foot climb, Boot Camp workouts, Par Cour and pushups done upside down while suspended

from the ceiling).

Part of the appeal of this kind of retreat is the energy of your fellow retreat-goers and the expertise and encouragement from the retreat staff. At Rancho La Puerta, I met really interesting people from all over the world...and we were all there to focus on getting healthier. There were five swimming pools, three Jacuzzis and dozens of fitness classes offered on an hourly basis. And, yes, there were facials and massages (I had one of each) and even reflexology (try it, it's great).

No matter what kind of retreat you choose - whether you need rest, a break from a busy social season, a chance to grieve the loss of a love, or an experience of meditation or a total escape to a luxurious world like Rancho La Puerta - relax, be kind to yourself and enjoy your retreat!

At least 50 additional petitions have been launched to fight the Boy Scouts of America's policy, led in part by gay rights activist Zach Wahls.




