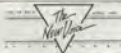

◆ THE IDIC CONCEPT

As a subscriber to the Lesbian Connection, I've been reading a lot lately about Whynny's Festivals, wonderful lesbian-affirming gatherings where lesbian and talented performers who get precious few other breaks. They're held all over the country, and women from all walks of life attend. However, the first annual East Coast Lesbian's Festival came off less than wonderfully.

It seems that no matter what the organizers do, someone will find something to grip about. (And here's something for you to take to sleep on: me about — I'm going to spell "women" the way it appears in the dictionary. Call me Politically Ignorant, but I was a student of the English language and old habits die hard.) I've usually kicked either time or money or both, so I won't qualify this discussion by stating that I've never been to a festival and all my information is second hand.

To my understanding, a Whynny's Festival is for women, and that included lesbians. It'd be nice for the sake of the "Women-Only" group of lesbian-gays, if teachers would produce only girl children. But one couple brought a boy child to the festival, and lots of Lesbian Connection readers talked hell. Now, I understand that festivals are meant to be "Women's space" and free of any male oppression, but I wonder how much oppression a little boy could cause all those adult women. Apparently some were so offended at his presence that they plastered signs on the family's table reading "Baby jerks go home" and "Don't feed males, don't breed males. This must have been very helpful to the women who love and nurture this child. Maybe they brought him hoping to increase his sensitivity to women's issues. Maybe they simply couldn't afford the child care to have left him at home.

Trying to please everyone 100% of

the time is an impossible task. Festival planners usually try to be helpful of various desires and needs. Biggers were employed for the food. Little programs were printed, raffle and modified jackets and showers were built for the differently-abled. However, there was still dissatisfaction because the festival was busy. Non-smokers had to tolerate smokers. Conservatives bristled at those with leather dykes. Still, more attempts at pleasing were made. A completely vegetarian menu was offered. A separate tent was set up for Twelve-Day dykes to hold meetings, while a sign at the separate tent continued the male-started organizations. Another tent was reserved for the 5/M crowd in an area that was supposed to be out of the way of those who did not care to mingle with 5/M dykes. Unfortunately, some more conservative lesbian-gays wandered too close the 5/M tent, but offended by what she saw, and asked the fest planners to tear-down the tent.

It seems to me that what a lot of lesbians would like to see from straight women is acceptance without fear, or at least tolerance. But how can we expect that from straights whose we don't even practice it within our own circles?

I've long been a fan of the TV series "Star Trek." Yeah, I know, there were some pretty weird things in it, but it was 1967 (gay women's movement), and the show was one of the first to show a woman (Lt. Uhura) as a bridge officer. Then there was the alien, the Vulcan named Spock. His people were a peaceful and highly logical race with a lot of good traits they lived by. One was the IDIC principle. That stood for Infinite Diversity in Infinite Combinations. According to that tenet, rather than letting differences be a source of antagonism and separation, the Vulcans merely accepted differences as a matter of fact. More than that, they believed that the combination of their diversity made them strong.

They didn't just tolerate differences, they celebrated differences in points of view and rejoiced in what could be learned from sharing them. They may have felt no compulsion to incorporate the differences into their individual ways of living, but they respected the rights of others to live differently without imposing their own standards.

Live and let live. Human beings had the same capacity for the same wisdom. Now all we've got to do is live up to our potential.

About the only way I can see to completely please every last-gay is to have a specific festival for each specific group of lesbians: one for Christian dykes, another for sports-minded dykes, another for sober dykes, an Asian Women-Only festival, a well-educated women-only festival, etc. Oh, yeah, then there's still the problem of separating the smokers from the non-smokers, the fat from the thin, etc. Well, you can see the ridiculousness this is leading to. We'd have countless festivals, and probably end up with something like an "upper-middle-class-left-handed-blue-eyed-Renaissance-artist-scholar-Dutch-vegetarian-pelican-rain-soaking-predator-lesbian-porn-only" festival, and what would that do for our lonely as lesbian sisters?

Wouldn't it be simpler if we all made an effort to tolerate each other's diversity? The IDIC concept would make far more sense if the whole world ran so much more smoothly, without all the antagonism that separates us. If you had someone's activities offensive, then simply stay away from "their" space and respect their right to inhabit this reserved area. For those of you who are itching to point out that by writing this article I am not tolerating those less tolerant, I am fully aware of that fact. I just reached a breaking point. I'm out — after all, a Vulcan. Sometimes I wish I were.

Live long, and prosper in infinitely combined diversity.

▼ OBITUARY

Gerald Lynn (Jerry) Peck was born on October 23, 1939, as the last of five children into the home of share-croppers in Black, Nebraska.

At the age of two, Jerry and his family moved to Falls City, Nebraska, where Jerry attended school, graduating from Falls City High in 1957. Immediately following graduation, Jerry began a four year tour of military duty with the Air Force. Upon discharge from the military, Jerry returned to work in Lincoln and then Omaha, Nebraska. He was married in 1967. He attended Ashland College and Seminary in Ashland, Ohio, from 1970 through 1978. During that time he served as pastor first to a United Methodist Church, then a United Church of Christ Church. A son was adopted in 1975.

Jerry and his family returned to Nebraska. His wife and son left shortly thereafter. Jerry taught high school English, one year in Pullerton, Nebraska, and one year one year in Hannibal, Missouri. In 1980, Jerry returned to Omaha where he supported himself by working as a substitute teacher for five years. At the time of his diagnosis of AIDS, Jerry had been with First Little Missions for three years.

Jerry was preceded in death by one brother, Billy, and his mother, Dorothy Gladys (Carl) Peck. There are two estranged brothers like to Jerry's declaration of being Gay. Jerry is survived by his father, Lester, one sister, Ruth Graves, several Great-great-grand grand aunts and nephews, as well as many friends.

Jerry rested into his eternal life on March 9, 1993. Funeral services were held at Healey, Healey, and Holtzman Mortuary in Omaha on March 11, 1993. Burial was in the family plot in Mount, Karlov.

Jerry really touched a lot of people's lives. Myself, I never really got to know him. To me he was a difficult person to get to know. But I really liked him anyway. That could be preach! When we were between ministers, Rev. Jerry filled in one Sunday. I really regret I didn't get that sermon on Genesis on tape. It gave a whole new meaning to Genesis.

And what if anyone could be said to be the New Voice, Jerry would be the person. He was deeply involved with the New Voice and wrote some really good articles. You didn't have to agree with him, but his articles did make you think, and that was the important part. The New Voice will not be the same without him. Oh, yes, the column spaces will be filled with new stories written by new writers, but there will be a certain something missing now. A vital one will never be filled.

Rev. Jerry humbled this earthly body. I believe it is in Paul that scripture compares our body to a tent. The body is only a temporary dwelling. Now Rev. Jerry has "crossed over". I learned during the Jerry is now here saying God is a good God. . . . and that's it! Jerry was good!

Jerry was always present when it came time for the Pride Parade, whether walking, riding in the back of a pick-up, or simply sitting from the back of a gold Cadillac.

Jerry's sexuality was something he never apologized for. Actually, he wore it loud like a badge of honor, daring people to criticize. He believed in the beauty of the male form and felt the male nude was the highest form of art. He could be brutally honest about his sexuality, so we found out when he wrote about being jailed in Florida after being approached for sex by an undercover policeman.



The New Voice was very important to Jerry and he never gave up his dedication to the magazine. He was at a Steering Committee meeting just five weeks before his death and within the last year gathered up a complete set of the New Voice, beginning with Issue #1, so we could have it bound as a permanent part of our community's history.



Just over two years ago, I accepted the position of Editor of the New Voice after Jerry had first become ill with AIDS. He had not been thrilled when the Steering Committee named me as Associate Editor with the intent of assuring that the women's community would be represented, so I considered it a real test of confidence when he came to me over a year ago and said, "You're doing a good job with the magazine. Keep up the good work." I'll try my damndest to keep on doing a job that you would be proud of, Jerry.



I remember one Halloween party when he showed up dressed as Pope John, complete with blue pipe all over his body and a white ball of cotton glued to his backside.

Jerry could be a bit of a pain in the butt. If the spotlight was on him, he would do all sorts of things that you, Jim Jones and I decided to do the number "Loving Lesbians" for a benefit show. At the last minute the person who was going to be the subject of our Lesbian column backed out so we asked Jerry if he would help. He got a printer, set up white drapes, stuffed a lion, and became our "Visual Vagina," in the pose of having himself "decorated" with a lion head on his face as we took him off stage.

Last October NCC was taking part in a benefit show for ANGLAND. Jerry wanted to help. He wasn't strong enough to walk on stage and stand during the number, so he got in his wheel chair, put on white drapes and a lion head's head, and walked out on stage as a lion with a broken wing.

Questionnaire Instructions

Step 3 - Describe yourself by circling the word or words that best describe you, which is a free description of yourself. You should circle at least one in each category. Circle more than one too if appropriate.

Step 4 - Describe your ideal match by circling the word, words, or, or, or in the female and/or male (including those to which you circle) and in italics to what extent you would want that item to be true of your match. Circle exactly one of three responses per item as described below.

Circle *no* if you prefer that description to be true of your match. This is a vote for a *no-match* guarantee.

Circle *if* if you don't care one way or the other. This is an *ambivalent-no vote* either way. Leave left blank as *no* or *if*.

Circle *yes* if you prefer this description not to be true of your match. This is a *vote against*—a *disqualification*. Treat it as a *no*.

Circle *no* if you want no further mail except for writing that description to you, even if they have other suitable qualities. This is a *disqualification* and is not allowed by category code. Treat it as an absolute "no." We recommend that you circle between 10 and 20 items to restrict age, sex, ethnicity, and other important bits of your matches.

Note: The use of *no* or *yes* entries for certain of the items qualified to meet you. You are guaranteed the number of matches you order, but if you use *no* or *yes* entries you may get fewer matches than you ordered initially, in which case you will receive credit for the remaining matches. You can use the credit to select your questionnaire within member number anytime.

Step 5 - Rank the categories. The questionnaire is divided into 16 categories. To ensure that your responses on the less important items include matches that are the more important items, you must indicate which categories are important to you. Using the blank in the left of each category heading, enter:

Rank each category from 1 to 16 in an order of importance to you, with 1 to be the most important and 16 to be the least, using only one circle per item.

For a blank match beside the five most important category headings, leaving the rest blank.

Note: Your matches will be based mostly upon the most important categories, with the least important ones serving only as tie breakers. Names and ages have very little effect in the lower ranked or unranked categories. Some of your matches may have names by which you circled an *if* however, unless an exclusive opposite of category code.

■ HOMOPHOBIA POSTERS AT UNL

The UNL Affirmative Action/Equal Opportunity/Compliance Office has released a "homophobia" poster to all of the departments at the University. The poster is in response to the UNL Board of Regents barring all discrimination based on "individual characteristics". The poster in red and black reads as follows:

Ho-mo-pho-bian, 1, the irrational fear or hatred of same sex relationships. 2, fear of homosexuality or homosexuals.

The University of Nebraska Board of Regents prohibits discrimination toward students, employees or other clients (campus visitors/customers) based on individual characteristics.

Complaints against employees expressing homophobia may be accommodated by contacting the UNL Affirmative Action/Equal Opportunity/Compliance Office, 127 Administration Building, 472-3417.

Students who have concerns about homophobic treatment by peers are to contact the Student Judicial Affairs Office, 125 Administration Building, 472-2021.

Research is currently underway to determine whether this policy would cover gay/lesbian couples who want to live in married housing on the UNL campus. ROTC may also be affected by the Regents' policy.

UNL is the only campus in the NU system with such a poster. UNMC and UNO have not followed suit.

**FIRST HEARTLAND PRIDE COORDINATORS CONFERENCE HELD IN WICHITA, KANSAS
ROBERT BRAY IS KEYNOTE SPEAKER
FUNDAMENTALISTS PICKET CONFERENCE**

Wichita, Kansas, was the site of the first annual Heartland Pride Coordinators Conference held March 9, 10, and 11. Over 40 Gay and Lesbian Activists gathered to hear the keynote speaker, Robert Bray, Director of Public Affairs for the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, and to attend workshops on all the aspects of conducting Pride Activities. Fred Phelps, Sr., a Baptist minister from Topeka, Kansas, currently running for Governor of Kansas, took the opportunity to further his faltering campaign by staging a demonstration outside the Wichita Royals while the conference was going on inside. Phelps and about a dozen of his supporters picketed and carried signs denouncing homosexuality as a sin and a threat to families. During the demonstration, participants in the workshop continued meeting, hearing Robert Bray speak on Internalized Homophobia. During a press conference, leaders called on the community to support all persons and to put an end to bigotry and discrimination. The International Pride Coordinators Conference will take place in Minneapolis-St. Paul during Columbus Day Weekend next October. Next spring, the Second Annual Heartland Pride Coordinators Conference will be held in Kansas City, Missouri.

GAY/LESBIAN COALITION ON THE SCENE

An estimated one-third gay men and one in ten lesbian women will be victims of homophobic violence at least once in their lifetime. Clearly, this violence must be dampened. To examine the problem, violence against gay and lesbian people was the focus for the recent Annual Meeting of the Coalition for Gay and Lesbian Civil Rights.

A welcome well knowled provided an invigorating getting for the meeting held on January 20th at the UNL Culture Center. The program was planned so that people could drop in for topics of interest and attendance ranged from approximately 20 to 50 at various times.

The morning program began with an account of local history of violence, including assaults and deaths. A 12 minute tape of radio and television clips of bigotry, prepared by the Anti-Defamation League, illustrated the current level of public tolerance for the expression of hatred against gay and lesbian people.

In a discussion of the psychological aspects of violence and the experience of victimization led by Peter Frazier-Koontz from Lincoln/Lancaster Mental Health, people began to explore how to move "from impotent rage to operational anger." A process of empowerment was described in such things as rejecting others' negative images, embracing and defusing the labels, and making choices to do something, with support and the ability to step back and examine your choices.

A brief demonstration of self-awareness/self-defense by Kit Boesch was a very popular part of the program. The Coalition can work with Boesch to arrange separate self-defense workshops for gay men and for women when a minimum number of people are interested. This opportunity is highly recommended.

An afternoon panel discussed Lincoln's criminal justice system and violence against gay men and lesbians. The panel included Captain John Becker of the Lincoln Police Department, Dennis Keefe of the Lancaster Public Defender's Office, John Colburn of the County Attorney's Office and Sue Harrell of the Comhusker Detox Center. Their presentations and discussion with the audience opened doors for continuing work in the area.

The Annual Meeting ended with time to talk about where we go from here. Several people signed up to work with the Coalition's Hate Crimes Committee to look at such things as programs with reporting of homophobic violence, and alliance with other groups who experience hate-related violence.

Our own organization and community were discussed as well. Is there a gay and lesbian community? Are there people who care? Currently the Coalition distributes 400 newsletters and has 50 paid members. Membership support is important and welcome in many ways—from financial support to participation in projects to helping with special events.

Throughout the day, and in spite of the serious topic, laughter was frequent. Clearly this is a group that likes to have fun. The new Steering Committee is waiting for the right time for a Gay/Lesbian Coalition dance... keep in touch. ● AIDS TRIALS AT NIAID/NIH 1-800-AIDS-NIH

The National Institute of Health has provided national and international leadership in the fight against AIDS. Much of this effort depends on the availability of volunteers for studies. It is important that volunteers be recruited for inpatient and outpatient studies of new drugs and vaccines. In order to make information about our studies more readily available to health care providers and prospective patients in the community, we now have an 800 number: 1-800-AIDS-NIH (1-800-245-7644). A staff member will be available to answer questions for callers Monday through Friday, from noon to 3 PM Eastern time. Those calling at any other hour may leave their names and telephone numbers and the calls will be returned as soon as possible. Callers may be assured of complete confidentiality.

If a patient is accepted for a protocol and enrolls in the study, all subsequent travel expenses are paid by NIH. In addition, all medical care provided at NIH is free.



● NATIONAL STUDY OF AIDS RESOURCES FOR BLACK GAY AND BISEXUAL MEN

AIDS in the United States is disproportionately affecting the Black community, particularly among Black gay men. Nearly 30% of all newly reported AIDS cases in the U.S. occur in the Black population.

Black C.A.R.E. (Community AIDS Research and Educational Projects) is committed to the fight against AIDS in the Black community, especially in regard to the lack of services, information, and resources directed toward the needs of Black gay and bisexual men. To help in changing this sad reality, your support is needed.

Black C.A.R.E. is gathering information directly from the community through an anonymous, national survey, the BLACK MEN'S HEALTH SURVEY. This survey has been widely distributed, but your help is needed. If you know a Black man who is gay, bisexual or has had sex with another man since 1977, let them know about this survey. These men can write to us directly requesting that a survey be sent to them; they can call our totally confidential number and leave their name and address; or you can request that a survey be sent to you and you can pass the survey on to them. It is important that the diversity of the community be represented in the information collected. Black men who are gay or bisexual need to be heard.

★ CLEVE JONES STEPS DOWN AS EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF NAMES PROJECT FOUNDATION

Cleve Jones, founder of NAMES Project Foundation and organizer of the AIDS Memorial Quilt, has announced his resignation as Executive Director in order to devote his time to other NAMES Project endeavors, including the recently announced HIV Life House, which is a center that would house a wide variety of non-medical HIV services and provide workshop, office and display space for the NAMES Project.

David Lemus, former Managing Director, will serve as Acting Executive Director.

★ SENATE REJECTS HOMOPHOBIC AMENDMENT

In a major victory for the lesbian and gay community, an anti-gay amendment offered by Senator William Armstrong (R-CA) was down to defeat on March 1. This was the second time in less than a month that the Senate voted with the gay and lesbian community on a critical vote.

Armstrong had sought to weaken the strong prohibitions for lesbians and gays included in the Washington D.C. Human Rights Ordinance by introducing an amendment which would have allowed all institutions which serve children in Washington D.C. to exclude gays and lesbians.

Senator Edward Kennedy (D-MA) led the floor fight which defeated the amendment by allowing alternative language that would allow institutions to drop positions or heterosexuals, gays, and lesbians who have been charged or convicted of sexual offenses with minors.

"What Senator Kennedy did was shift the issue from one of attacking gay people who work with youngsters to an issue of protecting children from any kind of sexual molestation, abuse or gay. Senator Kennedy struck a blow against the anti-gay bigotry of the Armstrong amendment", said Stephen Smith, legislative director of the Human Rights Campaign Fund.

"The Senate rejected the obviously false notion that lesbians and gays can not be appropriate role models or that we pose a threat to children", said Smith.

★ A MATTER OF JUSTICE AND COMPASSION CONFERENCE AT DRAKE UNIVERSITY

"Racism, sexism, and homophobia are social ills with health consequences. They limit the educational, personal, and health potential of many young people in America. . . . In working with gay, bisexual, and lesbian youth, it is vital that all of us work together to provide power, affirmance, and emphasize the rich heritage of diversity in America. Celebrating diversity requires our tough commitment to effective social change," said Dr. Richard Kesting, Chairman of the Board of Directors for the National AIDS Network in a letter to the conference's participants. Speakers talked about homophobia in our schools, communities,

churches, businesses, and homes. Advocates promote the "traditional family" whatever that will, encourage morality, and place value on the "NGRM." They begin in agreement with total rejection of those who are different, move slowly to pity, then tolerance and may finally come to acceptance. In contrast, an individual who is open and vulnerable diversity will demonstrate a number of levels of positive response including support, admiration, appreciation and nurturing.

A panel of six young people spoke about "Growing Up Gay in Iowa." All seemed to agree that knowing a teacher, pastor, or family friend who was supportive and accepting would have made a big difference in their coming out to themselves and others. None could identify a positive role model in their lives. Several had considered suicide as an answer to the confusion, rejection and stress of being gay, closeted and alone. Thirty to thirty-five percent of gays and lesbians under 20 years of age have reported suicide attempts (2-3

times that of straight youth). Dorothy Grayson, Ph.D. spoke about homosexuality as an educational equity issue. Her comments included shocking statistics about dropout and personal anxieties that demonstrated how homophobic "brings kids in the place." She stated that changes in legislation and increasing counseling resources could bring about greater Awareness, Changes in Attitudes, broader range of Alternatives, and positive Action by individuals and groups. After many hours from education organizations as Outstanding Teacher of the Year, Dr. Grayson left her closet and now openly discusses professional and personal commitment to gay youth.

Virginia Urbe, Ph.D., founder of Project 10, a counseling program committed to keeping students in school, off drugs, and sexually responsible, spoke of the years of study, work and struggle against detractors. Her program is discussed in greater detail, and well-referenced, in a handbook prepared to accompany a videotape entitled "What's Ahead of Project 10?"

Anyone interested in seeing the tape, listening to these two ladies' presentations, or talking about working for a support/counseling program here in Omaha, please call me at 291-6781.

In spite of warnings that the conference would be disrupted by hostile religious opposition, the committee presented a very well researched, planned, and executed affirmative day of speakers and activities about gay and lesbian youth. Judging by the appreciation of the attendees at the final session, this may become an annual presentation by a coalition of gay and lesbian and gay and lesbian sensitive groups in the Des Moines area. I, for one, will go again. I would encourage anyone who embraces diversity to consider attending next year.
