Ireland Votes Yes, Becomes First Nation in World to Approve Marriage Equality

With the world watching, the Republic of Ireland has become the first nation to enact marriage equality by popular vote.

The leader of the opposition, David Quinn, has already conceded the loss. "Congratulations to



the Yes side on their win," tweeted Quinn, who is director of the Iona Institute. And in a more lengthy statement Quinn is already pivoting to the next fight, saying "We hope the Government will address the concerns voters on the No side have about the implications for freedom of religion and freedom of conscience."

But today is a day of celebration for supporters of LGBT rights, both in Ireland and worldwide. The margin is still being finalized but all reports say Irish voters Friday overwhelmingly approved adding this language to the country's constitution: "Marriage may be contracted in accordance with law by two persons without distinction as to their sex."

The results make Ireland the 19th country in the world to extend legal marriage rights to same-sex couples.

The marriage equality measure had the backing of every major Irish political party and most of the nation's leaders, including Prime Minister Enda Kenny. While most of the Irish, like Kenny, are Roman Catholics, the church's opposition to making civil marriage available to same-sex couples did not sway them. Some other religious groups endorsed marriage equality, as did major corporations and Irish celebrities, including Colin Farrell and Bono. Polls leading up to the vote showed a majority of citizens in favor of equal marriage rights.

Ireland, unlike other countries where marriage equality has become law, had to conduct a popular vote on the matter because marriage is governed by the constitution, and the only way to enact a law that is deemed to be at odds with the constitution is to have it approved by a majority of voters. The nation's cabinet members agreed last December to hold the marriage equality referendum.

Popular votes on marriage have been held in two Eastern European countries, Croatia and Slovenia, but voters in both nations rejected marriage equality. Slovenia's Parliament, however, approved a marriage equality law nonetheless.

The First Federal Monument By and For LGBT Veterans

The first monument honoring LGBT vets to be approved by the federal government and erected on federal land was dedicated Monday at Abraham Lincoln National Cemetery in Elwood, Ill., an hour south of Chicago.



The monument is the result of an effort by American Veterans for Equal Rights, Windy City Times reports. "This is the first monument for LGBT veterans created by LGBT veterans that will be dedicated at any cemetery in the National Veteran's Cemetery System," Chicago-AVER founder, vice president, and secretary James Darby told the paper prior to the dedication. "I never believed anything like this could've happened because we've been discriminated against for so long in many areas of life, including the military."

Made of black and pink granite, the monument bears a pink triangle and the bronze service seals of the Army, Marines, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard, and Merchant Marines. It is inscribed with these words:

"Gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender people have served honorably and admirably in America's armed forces. In their

"It is my great hope that all those who see this monument remember all who have served this great nation and especially our LGBT veterans ... who have served from the founding of this nation," Stanley J. Jenczyk, the Chicago-AVER board member who led the effort for the monument, said at the dedication ceremony, according to Windy City Times.

Chicago-AVER president Lee Reinhart read the names of LGBT veterans who have died, noting, "Many of these are members of AVER, and many from Illinois who served and today have a place that remembers them." The ceremony also featured prayers by clergy representing various faiths and a performance by the Chicago Gay Men's Chorus.

Morocco Jails Three Men for Gay Sex

Three men have been sentenced to three years in jail for gay sex in Taourirt, Morocco, where homosexuality and premarital sex are illegal.

The sentence was handed down on Friday (22 May) by a court in the northeastern city of Taourirt. Police were tipped off to two of the men, a mechanic in his 40s and a man in his 20s, who they caught having sex in the mechanic's workshop.

During their detention, they said they met through a mutual

Duggar Show Pulled From TLC Schedule, Could Be Canceled

The TLC network has pulled all airings of its reality show 19 Kids and Counting in light of a molestation scandal involving one of the show's stars.

Josh Duggar, the oldest child of Jim Bob and Michelle Duggar, admitted to having "acted inexcusably" as a teenager after it was revealed that he was accused of molesting girls — including, according to reports, some of his sisters — in his teen years. Now 27, Duggar headed the lobbying arm of antigay Family Research Council; he resigned Thursday.

While 19 Kids is not currently airing, no definitive decision on cancellation has been made by TLC, according to TMZ. The network recently canceled Here Comes Honey Boo Boo after



that reality show's matriarch entered into a relationship with an accused child molester.

No one on Honey Boo Boo espoused antigay values, though. The Duggars are well-known for their antigay views, having, among other things, campaigned against an LGBT rights ordinance in Fayetteville, Ark., passed by the City Council but then repealed by voters. A robocall Michelle Duggar recorded for the campaign cast transgender people as child predators. By the way, Michelle Duggar has a lesbian sister, Evelyn Ruark.

Op-ed: How We'll End 'Conversion Therapy' in Four Years Flat

Three years ago, then-California state Sen. Ted Lieu made history by shepherding through the legislature the first bill in the nation to protect LGBT youth from being subjected to the dangerous and discredited practice of conversion therapy by state-licensed mental health professionals. By his side was Ryan Kendall, a survivor who had endured such a severe degree of this psychological abuse as a child that a family court emancipated him, leaving him to join the millions of LGBT youth on the street struggling with depression, addiction, and suicidality.

Last week, now-U.S. Rep. Lieu made history again by introducing the first nationwide bill to protect all LGBT people, no matter who they are or where they live or how old they are, from being defrauded by someone selling a false and too often deadly promise that they can change their sexual orientation or gender identity. By his side one more time was Ryan Kendall, freshly graduated from Columbia University summa cum laude and about to begin his first year at the University of California, Los Angeles, School of Law, and now serving as a member of the National Center for Lesbian Rights' #BornPerfect Advisory Committee.

The fight to end conversion therapy three years ago suddenly shifted gears to light speed, and survivors all across the country have begun joining forces with advocates to take down their abusers. Since California's Senate Bill 1172 was signed into law, conversion therapists have been held accountable for the damage they have wrought in courtrooms, state legislatures, Congress, the United Nations, and even the White House. Two federal circuit courts have upheld state conversion therapy bans, and a New Jersey case is on its way to making history by declaring claims that sexual orientation or gender identity can be cured as consumer fraud. Congresswoman Jackie Speier has twice introduced the Stop Harming Our Kids Resolution, calling on more states to follow California's lead. Three additional jurisdictions have enacted nearly identical legislation - New Jersey, Washington D.C., and just last week, Oregon. In 2015 alone, 18 states have introduced their own bills to protect LGBT youth from those who would profit from their pain. The United Nations Committee Against Torture has made this an issue of international human rights law. And, just last month, the president, vice president, and surgeon general declared

their opposition to so-called conversion therapy.

What we are witnessing is not only the weight of injustice collapsing under the force of its own gravity, but also the spectacular birth of a historic moment.

Still, as rapidly as things are moving, the birth of a movement takes time. Most state bills are still working their way through the legislative process, which moves at a notoriously glacial pace. Lawsuits can take years to result in a judgment, much less make their way through the appeals process. Changing the hearts and minds of parents misguided by an industry that preys on their concern for their LGBT children cannot happen overnight. And survivors must balance speaking out with caring for wounds that still bleed.

But there is good reason to keep our eyes on the horizon. When these laws do come up for a vote, they enjoy broad bipartisan support from lawmakers and overwhelming backing from medical and mental health organizations, faith leaders, youth advocates, and civil rights groups. Conversion therapists have lost every court battle they have entered to date. And groups like the Family Acceptance Project are working with conservative parents and faith communities to ensure as many kids as possible find the acceptance and support that research tells us save lives. Our momentum is only increasing.

The Therapeutic Fraud Prevention Act combines the best parts of this movement's state legislation with the best parts of its impact litigation. If passed, it would legally define conversion therapy as the consumer fraud it is and ensure that no person can profit from inflicting the sting of self-hatred on another by telling them they were born wrong. Having spent two decades working with survivors of conversion therapy, NCLR knows firsthand the lives this will save, including thousands of children.

In June 2014, NCLR launched the #BornPerfect campaign with the ambitious goal of ending conversion therapy in five years. At the time, it seemed like a daunting — and maybe even impossible — undertaking. But, one year later, we can see the contours of that day on the horizon. Getting there won't be easy, but pioneers like Ted Lieu and survivors like Ryan Kendall serve as powerful reminders of how far hope can take us. Hard as the conversion therapy industry may fight, the day is coming when every child, no matter their sexual orientation or gender identity, will wake up knowing they were #BornPerfect. We won't stop until we get there.


I have been a part of the LGBTQ community for many years in my previous state

Josh Duggar Resigns From Antigay Family Research Council Amid Sexual Abuse Allegations

Josh Duggar, the oldest child of the famously prolific and conservative Duggar family, has resigned from an arm of the antigay Family Research Council amid the revelation that he was accused of molesting five minor girls when he was as a teenager — and that some of his victims were apparently his sisters. Duggar, 27, has admitted to having "acted inexcusably" as a teen, now that In Touch Weekly this week broke the story that he was the subject of a police investigation in 2006, based on



accusations that he fondled female minors' breasts and genitals without their permission. The incidents reportedly occurred in 2002 and 2003, but the only involvement of police until 2006 was when Jim Bob Duggar, Josh's father, had him talk to a family friend who was also an Arkansas state trooper. That trooper, who took no official action, is now serving a prison sentence for child pornography, InTouch reports.

The investigation by the Springdale, Ark., police department came after a family friend found a letter, which had been stuck between the pages of a borrowed book, laying out Josh's al-

leged actions. Police filed no charges because the statute of limitations had expired.

The names in the police report obtained by InTouch were redacted, but the publication confirmed that Josh Duggar was the accused. TMZ is reporting that some of the accusers were his sisters.

Duggar today resigned from Family Research Council Action, the lobbying arm of the FRC, which is listed as a hate group by the Southern Poverty Law Center because it circulates untrue and harmful information about LGBT people.

"Today Josh Duggar made the decision to resign his position as a result of previously unknown information becoming public concerning events that occurred during his teenage years," FRC president Tony Perkins wrote in a statement posted on the home pages of both FRC and FRC Action. "Josh believes that the situation will make it difficult for him to be effective in his current work. We believe this is the best decision for Josh and his family at this time. We will be praying for everyone involved."

In a statement released to People magazine, Josh Duggar said, "Twelve years ago, as a young teenager, I acted inexcusably for which I am extremely sorry and deeply regret. I hurt others, including my family and close friends. I confessed this to my parents who took several steps to help me address the situation. We spoke with the authorities where I confessed my wrongdoing, and my parents arranged for me and those affected by my actions to receive counseling. I understood that if I continued down this wrong road that I would end up ruining my life."

The statement about "counseling" is open to question — In Touch reports that it consisted of working in a family friend's home remodeling business.

Josh's parents, Jim Bob and Michelle Duggar, posted supportive statements on Facebook, as did Josh's wife, Anna. The Duggar family has achieved fame as the subject of the TLC reality series 19 Kids and Counting, showcasing the large family and its conservative Christian values. The family members are well-known for their antigay views, having, among other things, campaigned against an LGBT rights ordinance in Fayetteville, Ark., passed by the City Council but then repealed by voters. San Diego Mourns Third Trans Teen to Die by Suicide

Kyler Prescott, an accomplished pianist and activist for marriage equality and animal rights in San Diego, Calif., died by suicide on May 18. The transgender boy was 14 years old.

Prescott's family was supportive of his identity, and attended local support groups for family members of trans youth. Prescott's "grief stricken" parents have given Kathie Moehlig, a friend the family met through those support groups, permission to speak on the Prescotts' behalf, reports San Diego Gay & Lesbian News.

Prescott came out to his family as trans "a few years ago," reports SDGLN. His parents respected his wishes and referred to him using male pronouns, even asking the young man if he wanted the family to remove childhood photos of him wearing more feminine clothes.

"Some teens when they come out, they come out and that's it," explained Moehling. "Other teens tend to flow between the genders. He chose male pronouns, but was completely comfortable with the family still having all the pictures up of his childhood. Because in Kyler's world a guy can wear a dress."

Although Prescott was occasionally misgendered by others and struggling with the general emotional turbulence of being a teenager, SDGLN stressed that the 14-year-old was "well supported within most of his life ... overall, Kyler was met with acceptance and approval."

The teenager struggled with the onset of puberty, Moehlig explained, pointing out that one's body developing in conflict with one's internal identity can be stressful and traumatic for transgender youth. Medical interventions, commonly known as hormone blockers, are sometimes available to delay the onset of puberty in trans youth, but it's unclear whether that was an intervention Prescott was seeking, or even desired.



Prescott was involved in local youth groups in San Diego, including at the North County LGBTQ Resource Center, the youth group in San Diego's LGBT neighborhood of Hillcrest, and the Transforming Family support group.

Since preschool, Prescott had been an outspoken advocate for animal rights, reports SDGLN. The Prescott family had a "small little zoo," according to SDGLN, which helped the teenager foster his connection to animals. He also enjoyed sketching and writing stories and poetry. In addition, Prescott was an accomplished pianist — a fact demonstrated by a photo displayed at a Friday memorial at the San Diego LGBT Community Center, showing Prescott seated at a piano, his long fingers gracing the white keys. The trans pride flags at the Center flew at half mast this weekend in honor of Prescott's memory.

Prescott's death is the third reported trans young person to die by suicide in the greater San Diego area since March. Taylor Alesana, a 16-year-old transgender girl, took her life on April 2, while a gender-nonconforming teenager named Sage, also died by suicide in early March. Both Alesana and Sage were reportedly involved with the North County LGBTQ Resource Center, where Prescott also attended various group meetings.

Nationwide, Prescott is the 11th reported suicide of a transgender youth this year, in an "epidemic" that trans advocates say sees far more casualties than make headlines. Earlier this month, 15-year-old Cameron Langrell of Racine, Wis.,





took her own life just days after coming out as trans on social media. The highly publicized suicides of 18-year-old Charlotte, N.C., activist Blake Brockington, as well as that of 17-year-old trans girl Leelah Alcorn in Union Township, Ohio, last December, saw hundreds of thousands mourning worldwide.

A GoFundMe page has been set up to help the Prescott family offset funeral costs.

Men Who Masturbate Will Find Their Hands Pregnant in the Afterlife, Anti-Gay Televangelist Warns



But how will the hand give birth?...

A Turkish televangelist has claimed men who masturbate will meet their 'pregnant hand in the afterlife'.

Mücahid Cihad Han, a Muslim preacher, was answering viewers' questions on 2000 TV on 24 May when one asked him about masturbation.

The viewer said he 'kept masturbating, although he was married, and even during the Umrah', the pilgrimage to Mecca performed by Muslims.

In the bizarre response, Han insisted Islam strictly bans masturbation.

'One hadith states that those who have sexual intercourse with their hands will find their hands pregnant in the afterlife, complaining against them to God over its rights,' he said, referring to what he claimed to be a saying of Prophet Muhammad.

'If our viewer was single, I could recommend he marry, but what can I say now?' the televangelist added, advising the viewer to 'resist Satan's temptations'.

The claim has been widely criticized on Turkish and other media. He has also received criticism in the past for calling homosexuality 'evil' and 'the worst of all sins'.

Many have commented how only a very limited number of Islamic interpretations forbid masturbation, with many just considering it something to be frowned upon. Many main-stream Islamic interpretations even allow it, such as using it to avoiding cheating on your spouse.

'Are there any hand-gynecologists in the afterlife? Is abortion allowed there?' one Twitter user asked.

Northern Ireland Bakery Stops Serving all Wedding Cakes So They Can't be Made to Do Gay Ones

The Northern Ireland Christian bakery at the center of a legal row is now not serving any wedding-themed cake as they can not, by a court ruling, discriminate against LGBTI people.

Ashers Baking Company was found guilty earlier this month after refusing to make a pro-gay Bert and Ernie cake.

As they are not a religious organization, the judge ruled they cannot discriminate against LGBTI people.

They are appealing the decision.

So it might have been bad timing when the Belfast Telegraph sent along a reporter and asked for a replica of the cake that caused all the fuss in the first place.

When an Ashers employee heard what the cake would be, they said: 'Oh please, we don't have time for this' and hung up the phone.

In a statement, Ashers Bakery said they would no longer be allowing customers to buy custom-built cakes on advice from lawyers.

They will only be serving birthday and baby-related celebration cakes.

They said: 'Ashers Baking Company has decided to limit the scope of its Build A Cake department while the owners review this aspect of their business and take further advice from law-yers.'

Fathers and Mothers

As we're about halfway between Father's Day and Mother's Day, it feels timely to write a column addressing how our fathers and mothers affect our lives and relationships.

In this column, I'd like to focus on: (1) How our Fathers and

Mothers are (unconscious) models for our own adult relationships and (2) How we can become good fathers and mothers ourselves, whether we are single or married.

According to Freud, we model our adult relationships on those that our fathers and mothers had with each other. For many of us, this is not good news. However, it may explain why our past relationships may have emulated our parents' relationship (for better and for worse).


This may sound simplistic, but I think there's a lot of truth to it. In my own case, I sure played it out according to Freud's predictions: before I came out, I always picked women who were so much like my Dad. Whenever these women met my Dad, they just loved each other. After I came out, I picked men who were like Dad, and Dad and my boyfriends got along much better than Dad and I ever did.

And, yes, I played out my Mom's role with all these girlfriends and boyfriends: I was attentive to them, looked after them, and catered to their needs (much more than they did to mine). It took me a lot of therapy to see that I was imitating Mom and picking partners like Dad in my own relationships.

I don't do this anymore, thanks to my own therapy, and now I assist others who want to break their own patterns and NOT have relationships like Mom and Dad's.

If you are having difficulties in your relationship(s), look and see if your partner is like either your Father or Mother, and also question if you're playing out your Mother or Father's role. If so, you're not alone. And, happily, you're not stuck there. With awareness, help from friends, books, workshops and – perhaps – good therapy, you can break those old patterns and NOT play out your parents' relationship.

And now, a bit of a jump over to point #2: you may wonder, if you're single or not a biological parent, how you can be a good Father or Mother? The reality is that being a good Father or Mother is more about an attitude and point-of-view than it is biology. Lots of biological parents do a lousy job, and lots of us single folks have good parent energy that we share with the world.



Once we get older, part of our life task is to mentor/help younger people. What good is experience and wisdom if we don't share it with those who could benefit? If it's our intention to help younger people have a better, happier, more fulfilling life, then we are truly being good Fathers and Mothers.

As LGBT people, we often didn't have biological parents who really "got" us. We had to struggle to find our place in the world. It doesn't have to be that way. By being "good" LGBT Mothers and Fathers, we can give that loving, protective, nurturing energy to others. And, by doing so, we can redefine "Father's Day" and "Mother's Day" and make them a universal experience that we can all take part in.

I sincerely invite you to do so.

Australia minister: Gay marriage 'very likely' by end of year



'Gay and lesbian Australians deserve better than being treated as second-class citizens. It's well and truly time the parliament acted,' Hanson-Young said.



Op-ed: Don't Let Harvey Milk Down

My old friend Harvey has become a legend. His life has inspired books, films and other works of art and music. In California, his birthday, May 22, is recognized as Harvey Milk Day. He is a hero to millions of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people all around the world.



As we remember Harvey on what would be his 85th birthday, it is important to remember that behind the legend there was a real person, a man who was neither genius nor saint, but an ordinary man who endured defeats, tragedies, and the challenges most of us face in our lives. For me, he was a neighbor, friend, and mentor. He encouraged me to go to school and took me with him to work in San Francisco City Hall as a student intern. He was funny and kind and absolutely determined to change the world.

As I look back over the decades, I marvel at the progress our community has made in achieving our rights and know that Harvey would be proud. And as we wait for the Supreme Court's decision on marriage equality, I know that Harvey would remind us that our struggle is not yet won — no matter what the court decides.

There was a special place in Harvey's heart for young people, perhaps because he came out late in life and remembered the pain of hiding the truth of his life. I was just one of many young people he encouraged. I was in his office on days when the calls would come in from queer kids across America who had read of his election and reached out in search of hope for their own lives.

I campaigned with Harvey against the Briggs Initiative, a proposition to ban LGBT people and our supporters from working in public schools. It was fascinating to watch Harvey engage voters of all races and backgrounds, to see the way he used humor and wit to find common ground and break down the stereotypes and prejudices we still confront today.

Most observers believe that the Supreme Court will rule in our favor and that marriage equality will become the law of the land. It will be a great victory and a wonderful gift to the many loving couples that have waited so long for their relationships to be honored by the state. But we still have a long way to go. LGBT workers have no



protection against harassment and discrimination in 29 states. Transgender people, in particular, suffer from high unemployment rates. We see legislation masquerading as "religious freedom acts" introduced in many states to actually encourage discrimination.

But what would grieve Harvey the most, I'm sure, is the reality that our kids are still killing themselves. LGBT youth are still being thrown out of their homes, abused at school, bullied, and beaten. We read the stories almost every week of beautiful young people whose lives are lost to homophobia and transphobia.

Harvey Milk and his contemporaries, our movement's pioneers, taught us some valuable lessons that are every bit as relevant today as they were 40 years ago. Harvey knew that the single most important step any of us could take was to come out, to leave our closets and reveal our true selves to our families, friends, coworkers, and neighbors. He understood that this was the only way to tear down the misconceptions and fear and the hatred they fueled. In every speech and interview, Harvey repeated his call, "Brothers and sisters, you must come out!"

Harvey also believed that the LGBT community was part of something larger — the global movement for peace and social justice. He believed in coalitions with labor unions, feminists, antiwar activists, and other progressives. Here in San Francisco, he fought for renters, senior citizens, people of color, and low-wage workers. He wasn't a single-issue candidate, and as a city supervisor he championed the causes of our most vulnerable residents.

On November 27, 1978, I was in San Francisco City Hall and saw Harvey's body on the marble floor. I had never seen a dead person before. It is an image that haunts me to this day. All I could think was, It's over, it's all over. But then the sun went down and the people began to gather. Hundreds, thousands, and then tens of thousands of people came to Castro Street — Harvey's street — and began the long, silent march



down Market Street to City Hall. We were men and women of all ages, races, and backgrounds, gay and straight alike, and as we filled the Civic Center plaza with the light of our candles, I knew that I was wrong: It wasn't over, it was just beginning.

Long live Harvey Milk.
