And he has the most complicated family tree - which is what lead to this "Our Turn." Carla and I had been impatiently waiting for

"that baby" to arrive for several weeks (he was 12 days overdue) and had gone through several episodes of "magical thinking.

"That baby won't get here until his mom and dad get the carpet put down in the baby room." (So we helped them move furniture.)

"That baby won't get here until there's a dresser to put baby clothes in." (So Carla trotted

off to get "that baby" a dresser.)
"Maybe that baby wants to be an only child." (So the grandchildren came to stay overnight with us.)

"Maybe that baby has heard us talking about birthdays and wants a birthday cake." (I put my foot down at Carla going out to get a birthday cake for an unborn baby.

The "truth" was that John Pierre waited to arrive on the fifth anniversary of the day that Carla and I made the decision to be a couple and to live together. (How do you suppose he knew about our anniversary?)

The evening of August 12 we took the older grandchildren shopping and returned them home about 9 p.m. Everything still seemed to be in a wait and see pattern. Then, at about 11:45 p.m., on August 12, Carla and I had just gone to bed when the phone rang and my son-in-law said Jeanne was at Clarkson Hospital and did we want to come up. Of course, we did, so we arrived in her room right around midnight.

Clarkson has a wonderful birthing center,

with huge birthing rooms, (hospital rooms where the mother is in labor, the baby is delivered, and the mother remains for the rest of her hospital stay) so we were there watching monitors that trace contractions and listening to the sound of the baby's heartbeat, when the doctor came in to check Jeanne before ordering something for the pain. However, instead of ordering pain medicine, he started scrubbing his hand and gowning up. "I think we're going to have a baby here-just a couple good pushes."

Now, we had not planned to be present at the birth, but no one even asked us if we wanted to stay. The doctor and nurse just went about their business while we sat there. And while we sat there, John Pierre was born. After he was cleaned up and wrapped up and introduced to his mother and father, we got to hold him and count fingers and toes when he was less than 30 minutes old.

It was after John Pierre went home that I learned just how much we are a family. We got a baby book for the baby and his 13 year old sister was starting to fill out the family tree. She got down the grandparents and great-grandparents, but then started to frown and turn pages. "Where," she asked "is the place to put Carla's family?" "There probably isn't one," I replied. "Oh. Well, where should we put it?" was her answer.

Thank God for a loving family, who love and accept me and my spouse. Thank God for a safe delivery and a healthy baby. And Thank God for a 13 year old who just has to figure out a way to put her other Grandmother's family in the baby book

Karl Heinrich Ulrichs is the first known openly Gay enlightener who devoted his life advocating the decriminalization of homosexuality. Proving through 18 years of research that homosexuals were mentally and physically healthy, he urged family, church and state to accept homosexuals for what they were: totally normal people.

It was 126 years ago that this champion bravely stood before a body of 500 lawyers and judges in Munich, Germany, to plead our case. What gave him the courage was his sympathy for the men and women who suffered under the unjust German law against homosexuality, as well as under the hostilities from society. He constantly referred to the police harassment, blackmail and suicides of his "fellow-sufferers" in his many books.

On August 28, we celebrated Ulrich's 167th birthday anniversary — a day of remembrance and celebration of his extraordinary life and pioneering works. ### MOST IN SURVEY ANSWER: 'I'M GLAD I'M GAY'

Dear Readers.

A while back I asked my homosexual readers to respond to the question, "Are you glad you are gay, or would you rather be straight

I was not surprised that more readers said they were glad they were homosexual, but the volume of mail was astonishing. The last count was 75,875 responses with 30-to-1 saying, "Yes, I'm glad I'm gay.'

I asked for postcards only, but thousands of homosexuals wrote letters. It has been a busy time - and an enlightening one. Here are some

sample responses.

From San Francisco: What a question! If I had a choice I'd be straight, white, possibly Swedish, 6 feet, 1 inch tall and Protestant. My life would be easier, but I am not sure than easy life is always the best life.

From Chicago: We have four children. One of our sons is gay. He is the brightest and most sensitive, caring and thoughtful of the four. We often wondered if being gay made the difference

and have concluded that it did.

From Upland, Calif .: Are there any studies on what causes beterosexuality? Are people born straight or do the choose it? The straight folks I know seem perfectly normal to me. How about another poll

From Detroit: Am I glad I'm gay? You've got to be crazy. I've been beaten up, spat on and discriminated against in the job market. Who

would choose this?

From Columbus, Ohio: Yes, I'm glad I'm gay, but I regret that it took me 20 years to admit it to myself and 45 years to be open about it.

From Oakland, Calif.: Actually, I'm bisexual and I choose to be so. When lucky enough to be presented by nature with two options, why not

From Harrisburg, Pa.: I have known since I was seven years old of age that I was different. I'm an adult now and have been in a rewarding relationship for five years. I do not push my preference on anyone and ask only that people not persecute me for being who I am. God alone

From Portland, Ore .: For the first 36 years of my life I wanted desperately to be straight. I married and became the father of two beautiful children. I am a successful attorney. When I turned 40, four years after my divorce, I tried to straddle the fence - straight by day and gay by night. It didn't work. Finally I met a terrific man and we are extremely happy. So, Ann, to answer your question, "Yes, I'm glad I'm gay" because that's who I am.

From Yonkers, N.Y.: I'm a straight female who wishes she were a lesbian. Why? Because women are much more intelligent, caring,

sensitive, generous, honest and decent than men. My girlfriends are fabulous. The men I know are vain, exploitative, painfully self absorbed and

From Charleston, S. C.: Everyone knows black people don't choose to be black but that doesn't prevent discrimination. Do you honestly believe that if people accepted the fact that homosexuals were both that way, it would make

a difference? I don't.

From Lexington, Ky .: Am I glad I'm gay? My response is an unqualified yes. It's thrilling to know that there are people who would happily kill me because of my sexual orientation. I am delighted that the government discriminates against me at tax time and I can't file jointly. I'm ecstatic that I'm barred from serving my country in time of war. I'm overjoyed that all major religions reject my lifestyle. I love it that I could lose my job if the truth were known. Best of all, it's great to be viewed as an outcast by one's own family. This is what it means to be gay.

Among Respondents: HOMOSEXUALITY PREFERRED 30-to-1 Dear Readers,

I asked my homosexual readers, "Are you elad you are gay or would you rather be straight?" The question has generated more mail than almost any other since I started writing this column nearly 37 years ago. More that 75,000 people wrote about their sexual preference. It was 30-to-1, "Yes, I'd glad I'm gay." Here are more excerpts from the most fascinating and revealing letters I've read in a long time

From Louisville, Ky.: Yes, Ann, I'm glad I'm gay. Thank you for asking. But being gay is a very small part of who I am. I'm a teacher and a football coach. I play classical music and a good game of tennis. I'm a gourmet cook. I can ski and I can sew. I am active in my church and a volunteer at a local shelter for the homeless. I don't believe in labels. Let's just say I am human.

Boston: I'm 32 years old, chairman of a multimillion dollar, high-tech company. And yes, I'm gay. Several weeks ago, I attended a meeting of the Greater Boston Business Council. I walked into the ballroom of a Hilton hotel and couldn't believe my eyes: There were more than 200 professional gay men and women. If I hadn't known where I was, I would have sworn it was a meeting of the chamber of commerce. We are your doctors, lawyers, shopkeepers, bus drivers, waiters and florists. But best of all, we look, walk and talk like everyone else. There are many more of us in the closet than out, but it's becoming much easier to open, thank the good Lord who made us all

Santa Fe, N.M.: Usually you are pretty sensible, Ann, but asking your gay readers to tell you if they with they were straight was over the top. Would you for a minute ask your readers if they are glad they're straight? People know only how it is to be what they are. For me, being gay is as natural as being straight is for you. Would you want to change? Well, neither would I.

Royal Oak, Mich.: Yes, I'm gay. I also am 73 years old, and it has been a difficult life. I knew that being gay was beyond my control from the beginning. I prayed about it and finally accepted it. I figured if God made me this way he must have had a reason. I never felt comfortable with a woman. It was impossible to think of a woman in a sexual way. I tried a few times when I was in the army during World War II and just couldn't. So when they now say it's in our genes, I know it's the truth. I'm glad I'm not married because I wouldn't want to bring a son into the world who might have to struggle as I have.

Denver. I've known since I was age 4 that is was "different". After a few years of therapy for depression and anxiety attacks, I accepted the fact that I was a lesbian. If I could take a pill that would made me straight, I wouldn't do it. I love the sensitivity and honesty that women have and men lack. Actually, the worst part of being gay is the prejudice and hatred we encounter from

supposedly Christian people

Chicago: Are gay people happy? Actually, some of us are, despite the fact that we live in a society that calls us sick, depraved and evil. With those labels it's not easy to maintain self-esteem. If straight people have a problem with my being gay, that's their hang-up, not mine.

Dear Readers.

It is my firm conviction that homosexuality is not learned behavior, it is genetic. It can be suppressed but not altered.

### GAYS AND LESBIANS CAPTURE SPOTLIGHT AT DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION

In what many activists are calling a historic political accomplishment, gays and lesbians captured unprecedented attention and support at the Democratic National Convention in New York City. From the floor of Madison Square Garden, to the streets outside, to the remarks of numerous convention speakers, AIDS and gay and lesbian civil rights gamered extraordinary press coverage, the unequivocal support of convention delegates, and the attention of top Democratic Party politics.

Democratic Party politicos.

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), Human Rights Campaign Fund (HRCF), and Gay Men's Health Crisis (GMHC) coordinated several gay and AIDS-related events both inside and outside the convention. Gay and Lesbian VOICE '93 (Voters Organized in Coulition for the Elections), a coalition of NGLTF, HRCF and GMHC, operated a media and delegate action center in the Ramada Hotel, a convention headquarters site next to Madison Square Garden.

The increased visibility for gay and AIDS issues at the Democratic Convention came at a time of already heightened coverage of the gays in the 1992 presidential race, and follows nearly two decades of organizing within the Democratic Party by activists. This year, the Clinton/Gore team has courted the gay vote and has publicly supported gays in the military. The Bush/Quayle campaign has attacked gay parents. And Ross Perot, just before dropping out of the race, held several meetings with NGLTF and other gay representatives following the national uproar caused by his media remarks about gays.

"Four years ago at the Democratic Convention in Atlanta, gay and lesbian issues were treated as odd sidebars to the main political menu of the day." said Urvashi Vaid, NGLTF executive director at a press conference on gay issues at the start of the 1992 convention. "Times change. Today, the gay and lesbian vote and civil rights are central and defining issues in this Presidential election year."

An unprecedented number of openly gay and lesbian delegates gathered during the 1992 convention. At the start of the event, 104 delegates and alternates from 23 states joined the Gay and Lesbian Delegate Caucus, growing to 108 by the end of the convention as more delegates came out of the closet. At least three of the delegates were openly gay people with AIDS. The gay and lesbian caucus itself was larger than 33 state delegations.

Using the VOICE Action Center as a base of operations, the gay delegate caucus organized several visibility actions, including massive poster displays ("Lesbian and Gay Rights Now") from the floor, numerous press interviews, and a gay delegate "conga line" through the convention.

The VOICE Action Center quickly became a hub of gay delegates, dignitaries, activists and reporters. The Action Center was staffed by volunteers from the International Gay and Lesbian Parents Coalition.

Other highlights of the convention for gays and lesbians included:

 A gay and lesbian delegate reception on July 12 to kick off the campaign. More than 900 people attended the packed event, sponsored by HRCF, NGLTF and the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund.

- A press conference on Sunday, July 12, on

"Gay and Lesbian Issues, Vote and Power in the 1992. Elections," with Urvashi Vaid, Tim McFeeley and Carole Migden, plus Bob Hantoy, the openly gay man with AIDS who addressed the convention during prime time on Tuesday, July 14.

 A reception at the Royalton Hotel Penthouse on July 12, sponsored by the National Lesbian and Gay Journalists Association and The Advocate magazine.

— A massive AIDS march and rally on July 14, facilitated by Gay Men's Health Crisis and sponsored by United for AIDS Action, a cealition of more than 200 organizations. More than 50,000 people marched from Columbus Circle to Times Square in what the Washington Post called "one of the largest AIDS demonstrations seen here and, without a doubt, the most diverse."

 A "Town Meeting" sponsored by NGLTF and GMHC on "The 1992 Presidential Elections: What's In It For Gays and Lesbians?"

actions through the convention, including a leafleting "zap" of the convention media reception at Bryant Park on July 11, and protests against delegations from states with "irresponsible" HIV/AIDS policies. On Tuesday evening during the emotional AIDS speeches by Bob Hattoy and Elizabeth Glasser, a huge ACT UP banner was unfurled inside Madison Square Garden.

Hattoy said during his speech that "if there is any honor in having this disease, it's the honor of being part of the gay and lesbian community in America. The gay and lesbian community is family in the best sense of the word." Hattoy then attacked President Bush, asserting, "We need a president who will take action. A president who is not terrified of the word 'condom'...Mr. President, your family has AIDS, and you are doing nothing about it."

Glaser said, "I'm here because my son and I may not survive four more years of leaders who say they care — but do nothing." Glaser stated that as an AIDS activist, she has discovered how unfair America can be. Not just for people who have HIV, but for...poor people, gay people, people of color, children."

Several leading Democratic figures mentioned gay and lesbian issues during their speeches from the convention podium, including Sen Ted Kennedy, Paul Tsongas, former governor and presidential candidate Jerry Brown, and New York Governor Mario Cuomo.

In his acceptance speech on July 16, Bill Clinton bashed President Bush for not implementing the National Commission on AIDS report and stated, "But I will." Clinton also lashed out at the Republican Administration for "blaming them" for the country's social ills, including "Them, the gays." Activists said this was the first time a presidential candidate in his acceptance speech lad ever mentioned gays.

NGLTF, GMHC and others, including Queer Nation/Houston, ACT UP/Repub-lican National Convention and the Log Cabin Glay and Lesbian Republican Club are planning several events at the Convention in Houston, August 15-20. # RESPONDING TO BUSH / QUAYLE RHETORIC

In an interview published June 25, 1992 in in an interview published June 25, 1992 in the New York Times, President George Bush stated that he "can't accept as normal life style people of the same sex being parents...I don't accept that so normal" and added that he believes in "traditional family values." As the Republican National Convention approaches, Republican Officials, including Vice President Dan Quayle, are espousing "traditional family values" rhetoric and stacking the saw community as a mithatical. and attacking the gay community as antithetical

to family life.

There are currently some four to five million lesbian and gay parents in this country who face legal obstacles to creating nurturing and caring families. Only 11 states have laws that say sexual orientation is irrelevant in custody disputes. Courts in 11 other states have based rulings on the belief that gay people are unfit for custody of their children solely on the basis of sexual orientation. # **CBS HIGHLIGHTS GAY SUPPORT** FOR CLINTON

The CBS Evening News on Sunday, June 28th, highlighted the growing involvement of the lesbian and gay community in the presidential campaign of Governor Bill Clinton.

Lynn Greer, National Co-Chair of the Lesbian and Gay Victory Fund and Tim McFeeley, Executive Director of the Human Rights Campaign Fund, were featured in the report, which included an excerpt from a widely praised speech Governor Clinton gave last month to leshian and gay activists in Los Angeles. The broadcast was linked to Lesbian and Gay Pride celebrations which were held in New York City and San Francisco on June 28th.

CBS reporter Rita Braver noted that "gays and lesbians are more politically active than ever this election year and the candidates are paying attention. This year more than a hundred openly gay and lesbian delegates will attend the Democratic National Convention."

Greer, of Columbus, Ohio, was elected as a delegate committed to Bill Clinton. "We are going to be a force to reckon with in November," she noted, in an opinion shared by Tim McFeeley. "The gay and lesbian vote is large enough and can be concentrated enough in terms of voting as a bloc that it can make a tremendous difference to the candidate that's able to capture it," he said.

"Right now," CBS reported, "that candidate is Bill Clinton. The videotape of Clinton's address at a gay fundraiser in Los Angeles last month is now a feature attraction at similar events across the country. Gay and lesbian activists are campaigning hard for the candidate they say supports their agenda on AIDS and other issues.

### **PBS & GAY ISSUES** RIGHT-WING FIRE

Conservative politicos have launched an allout attack against the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB), which funds a healthy share of public TV programs. While Congress finally passed a bill funding

CPB for the next three years, they tacked on vague amendments prohibiting "indecency" and demanding "balance" in controversial matters. Mississippi Senator Trent Lott specifically attacked funding for Tongues Untied (Marlon Rigg's award-winning documentary on gay black men) and The Lost Language of Cranes, a BBC/ PBS joint production adapted from David Leavitt's novel about the parallel coming out of a gay father and son (broadcast June 24th on Great Performances).

Masterpiece Theatre is set to air Portrait of a Marriage starting July 19, about the lesbian relationships of British author Vita Sackville-West. Let the head of CPB know you want funding to continue for gay-themed programs (and not just British imports). Given the rightwing pressure being exerted, your letters are <u>urgently</u> needed! # GAY BAN IN MILITARY COSTS EVERYONE

by Congressman Gerry E. Studds

For many years, lesbians and gay men in the military have paid an unaccountably high human price for their services. Wanting only to honorably represent their country, these men and women have faced harassment, investigation, court martial and discharge simply because of their sexual orientation They have had careers, and in some cases lives, ruined.

Now there comes evidence that all of usnot only those of us in the gay community, but all American taxpayers-have been paying for the senseless witchhunts for gays in the military

A new, 143-page General Accounting Office study, requested by me along with Reps. John Conyers, Jr. (MI) and Ted Weiss (NY), has documented that the Department of Defense (DOD) spends tens of millions of dollars to implement this policy of institutionalized discrimination.

Simply to recruit and train replacements for those who are so illogically discharged, the Pentagon wastes \$28,000 to replace each gay enlisted man or woman who is discharged; the price to replace an officer is more than \$120,000. And, of course, the personal toll on gay soldiers, sailors, and air personnel is incalculable.

This inquisition continues despite the fact that 81 percent of Americans feel that gay men and lesbians should not be discharged because of their orientation. The witchhunts continue in the

absence of a single shred of scientific evidence that our military is in any way jeopardized by the service of gay men and women. Indeed, the homosexual officers and enlisted people drummed out of our military tend to have sterling records, and to have performed brilliantly, both in peace and on the battlefield.

Yet over the last decade, an average of 1,500 people each year have been summarily thrown out of the military simply for being gay. More than \$250 million has been wasted in the process.

The Pentagon no longer even claims to have any reasonable rationale for this systematic and costly discrimination. DOD's own reports concede-and Defense Secretary Dick Cheney has himself publicly acknowledged-that the old argument of "security concerns" is absurd on its face. Even the Pentagon is starting to realize you can't blackmail people who have nothing to hide.

Yet with all of this, the momentum is clearly moving toward long overdue acceptance of gay men and lesbians in the military. Community organizations, university faculties, newspaper editorial boards and at lest five dozen members of Congress are actively supporting the overturn of the policy. Legislation introduced by Rep. Pat Schroeder (CO) in the House of Representatives has already garnered 64 cosponsors

I encourage those in the gay community, and all fair-minded Americans, to contact their own members of Congress and urge them to help end this medieval inquisition - and cosponsor the Schroeder bill.

If our social history has taught us anything it is that racism, sexism and prejudice of all types have exacted tremendous costs-cost which we still bear today. When will we learn that exclusion means disaster, that bias tears us apart as a nation.

When will we end the witchhunts and let gay men and lesbians openly and proudly serve our country.Rep. Gerry E. Studds, D-MA, is the first openly gay member of Congress. Studs has been the leading advocate of reversing the Pentagon ban on homosexuals.

# **GAY GAMES '94**

The Board of Directors of New York in '94 has appointed Steve Donato to the position of Director of Development. In this capacity, Mr. Donato will be responsible for raising private donations from individuals and corporations to underwrite the costs of presenting Gay Games IV.

Previously, Steve worked as a fundraiser for the Cooperative American Relief Everywhere, or CARE. He also has helped raise money for the American Civil Liberties Union and the National Legal Aid and Defender

Association.

"I feel very strongly about the Games. It's important to have this kind of celebration, especially in this difficult new era of AIDS and other major concerns," he said.

On July 14th, the second day of the 1992 Democratic National Convention, a coalition of more than 300 organizations massed in Times Square in New York City to call for greater attention to the AIDS epidemic. Members of the New York in '94 Board served on the United For AIDS Action organizing committee which planned the highly successful march and rally. More than 10,00 AIDS activists and supporters, including a number of men and women holding Gay Games banners and wearing T-shirts and hats embossed with the logo of the Games.

Kennedy Travel of Floral Park, New York, will be designated as the official travel supplier for Unity '94 - Gay Games IV. As the official travel supplier, Kennedy Travel will make a contribution to the Games each time a booking is made for travel to the Games. Through this designation, Kennedy Travel will be able to offer special air and rail

discounts to groups and teams traveling to New York for the Games. In addition to organizing standard air and hotel arrangements, the agency will soon be announcing exciting tour packages consisting of cultural events, Broadway shows, sightseeing excursions, admission to the Games and transportation between the Games various venues. In business since 1965, Kennedy Travel has assembled a staff of professional agents who average 18 years of experience in the travel industry

Ann Northrop, co-president of New York in '94, was one of the 108 Gay and Lesbian delegates to the 1992 Democratic National Convention. The Clinton campaign chose Northrop largely because of her involvement in "As a delegate to the convention, I had the opportunity to talk about Gay Games with delegates from all over the country and learn that they share my enthusiasm for the Games. From now until November, we will be working hard to ensure that President Bill Clinton will preside over the opening ceremonies of Gay Games IV in June of 1994," she said.
The Board of Directors of New York in '94, the organizing body of Gay

Games IV, voted to adopt new dates. The Games will begin on Friday, June 17, 1994 and will end with closing ceremonies on Saturday, June 25, 1994. The Games were originally scheduled to take place from June 25 through

July 4, 1994.

The Stonewall 25 weekend is the climax of the international celebration of lesbian and gay pride. To encourage maximum participation of Gay Games IV athletes and artists in this celebration, the Board voted to schedule the Games in the week preceding Pride Week (June 25-26, 1994). By holding the worlds largest amateur sporting event one week earlier, we will free athletes and artists to give one hundred percent to both the Games and the Stonewall 25 Pride Celebration," said Ann Northrop, Copresident of New York in '94.

Gay Games IV is an Olympic-style event featuring 15,000 athletes from 40 countries participating in over 25 individual and team competitions. ranging from track and field, swimming, diving, basketball, softball and cycling to triathlon, volleyball and wrestling. Five hundred thousand spectators are expected to view the Games, which will be held in various facilities throughout New York City from June 17th through June 25th, 1994. "Unity '94" is the theme for Gay Games IV, which will also feature 5,000 artists in a simultaneous Cultural Festival. Gay Games IV is expected to generate \$111 million in economic activity for the City of New York, according to the City's Office of the Deputy Mayor for Finance and Economic Development.

The Gay Games were founded by the late Tom Waddell, M.D. - who competed in the decathlon for the United States at the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City — as a celebration of lesbians and gay men and as a "peoples Olympics" open to everybody regardless of sexual orientation. The Gay Games IV theme, Unity '94, is an expression of the founder's dream that inclusion be the cornerstone of the Games.

Previous Gay Games were held in San Francisco (1982 and 1986) and Vancouver, British Columbia (1990). Some 1,300 athletes from 12 nations competed in Gay Games I, 3,500 from 16 nations in Gay Games II and 7,250 from 30 nations in Gay Games III.

# FLIRTATIONS LIVE OUT ON THE ROAD

The "Fabulous" Flirtations (as their fans call them) have been traveling across the continent thrilling audiences with their unique blend of musical artistry, politics and infectious humor since their first street corner appearances in Greenwich Village in the fall of 1988.

Little could they have known that four years later they would have appeared on the Donahue Show, Good Morning America, Nightwatch, MTV News and National Public Radio; that they would have gathered rave reviews across the country; and that they would actually be making a living doing what they love most; being gay and singing about it!

### EPISCOPAL CHURCH URGES GAYS TO 'HANG IN'

The Most Reverend Edmond L. Browning, chief bishop of the Episcopal Church, urged lesbian and gay Episcopal meeting in Houston to "hang in there. It is extremely important for your voices to be heard." Browning was making a historic visit to the 18th anniversary convention of Integrity, Inc., the Episcopal lesgay justice ministry. It was the first time in the history of lesbian gay Christian caucus' convention.

Bishop Browning preached and celebrated the Eucharist at the convention opening service on Friday, July 10 and led an open forum with Integrity members on Saturday, the 11th. It was at the latter event that the Presiding Bishop spoke most strongly in support of lesbian and gay Episcopal. He was responding to twelve lesbian, gay and straight persons who shared their struggles within the Episcopal Church with him. He appeared deeply moved and spoke well beyond his scheduled departure time.

Representatives of a National Episcopal Church committee studying human sexuality were also present for a three hour session during which Integrity members also shared their experiences in the church. Integrity's president, Bruce Garner of Atlanta, is the first openly gay member of that committee, the Commission of Human Affairs.

About 200 persons from all over the United States represented most of the 52 Integrity chapters in this country. The most notable non-American guest was Reverend James Ferry, the Toronto priest who was outed by his bishop and, after the

first church trial in Anglican history in which homosexuality was the alleged crime, was inhibited from performing priestly duties. Father Ferry was given a check for \$1600 toward his legal expenses, which exceeded \$50,000.

Also preaching at a special AIDS healing service at the close of convention on Sunday, July 12, was the Reverend Rand Frew, AIDS/HIV Ministry Consultant at the National Church

headquarters in New York.

Integrity was founded in rural Georgia in 1974 by Louie Crew. Dr. Crew, now a professor at Rutgers University in Newark, New Jersey, was a featured speaker at the convention. The 'Louie Crew Award" for outstanding service to Integrity was presented at the convention to Kim Byham of Guttenberg, New Jersey, a former national president of the organization.

Integrity, with almost 2500 members throughout the United States and non-affiliated chapters in Canada and Australia, is by far the largest lesgay caucus relative to the size of its denomination and second to Dignity, the Roman Catholic caucus, in absolute membership numbers.

### SAINTS BE PRAISED LEVI STRAUSS

Levi Strauss and Co. is a model gay-positive corporation. The world's largest clothing manufacturer (and maker of the ubiquitous 502 button-fly jeans) has a strong anti-discrimination provision, offers same-sex domestic partnership benefits, advertises in gay/lesbian publications, and just ended its financial support of the Boy Scouts of America for refusing to admit gay Scoutmasters and Scouts.

Following the Boy Scout announcement, the fundamentalist American Family Association launched a Levi's boycott, deluding the company with mail and phone calls saying its "pro-sodomy decision showed it "no longer wants the business of the majority of Americans."

Two national lesbian and gay organizations, National Coming Out Day and the Lesbian and Gay Public Awareness Projects, are asking all photographers (professional and amateur) to record October 11, National Coming Out Day as a day in the life of Gay and Lesbian America.

'National Coming Out Day, October 11, is the perfect day for our lives to go on records, "said Lynn Shepodd, Executive Director of National Coming Out Day. "We are a community that is diverse, crossing all lifestyle, ethnic, age, economic, racial, and other artificial lines. We expect The Photo Project to show that in a powerful

and long lasting way."
The Photo Project will give all Americans an opportunity to see us as we are. The Photo Project is not an attempt to portray any segment of our community as being better than any other, but rather it will show and celebrate the scope of our lives," said Julie Baron, Executive Director of the Public Awareness Project.

National Coming Out Day and The Lesbian and Gay Public Awareness Project specialize in building stronger communities by inspiring gay and lesbian people to be visible and non-gay people to be aware. The Awareness Project has produced a powerful series of thought-provoking ads which show different gay and lesbian people in common scenarios where prejudice can be overcome. It has recently completed a full photo ad in People magazine entitled "Guess What? We're your family, friends, neighbors... "Currently The Awareness Project is raising funds to place the same ad in Time magazine.

National Coming Out Day has two dozen ads that have been running for several years in over a hundred lesbian and gay papers, and used as handouts, to build confidence within the community for coming out. In 1990, National Coming Out Day ran a full page ad in Newsweek with photos of lesbian and gay notables called "Across America, People Are Coming Out." National Coming Out Day will be inaugurating the "I'm Out For Good" series in 1992 where gay and lesbian individuals and families will caption their photographs with statements about why their being "out" is good.

### BRAIN STUDY: GAYS SHOW DIFFERENCE

A cord of nerve fibers that allows the two halves of the brain to communicate with one another is larger in homosexual men than it is in either heterosexual men or in women, scientists have reported.

The brain structure, called the anterior commissure, is not thought to influence sexual behavior directly, but researchers believe the finding supports the idea that the brains of homosexuals differ in many subtle ways from those of heterosexuals and that sexual orientation

has a deep biological basis.

The discovery is still to be confirmed by other laboratories, and some researchers remain skeptical that it has any relevance to an issue as complex as human sexuality. They said so little is known about how the brains of higher animals work that to assign function or meaning to slight discrepancies in anatomical features is a gross oversimplification.

Others embraced the finding as added proof that homosexuality is inborn rather than a chosen behavior and that therefore all discrimination against homosexuals should be illegal, just as it is against minorities or women.

"It points out that gay people are made this way by nature," said Robert Bray, head of public information at the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, a gay-rights advocacy group in Washington. "It strikes at the heart of people who oppose gay rights and who think we don't deserve our rights because we're choosing to be the was

we are.

The report, from Dr. Laura S. Allen and Dr. Roger A. Gorski of the University of California at Los Angeles, appears today in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences. It follows by less than a year another announcement of anatomical differences in the brains of homosexual and heterosexual men, a study that generated a debate nationwide.

In the previous experiment, Dr. Simon LeVay of the Salk Institute in La Jolla, Calif., said a region of the hypothalamus, a part of the brain that helps regulate sexual behavior, was smaller in homosexual men than in heterosexual men; it was equivalent to the dimensions seen in heterosexual women. Dr. LeVay, who is openly gay, praised the new research.

"I think the work is very good, and I think it's correct," he said. "It's such a clear result, and in a sense it's more important than my own finding."

In the new study, the researchers looked at the anterior commissure, a structure about the width of a baby's fingertip, which early research had suggested was larger in women than in men. The function of the commissure remains mysterious, but researchers believe that it allows the left and right hemispheres of the brain to integrate sensory information, just as another, more familiar structure called the corpus callosum does

The scientists examined brain sections from 34 men whose medical records indicated they were homosexual, 75 men presumed to be heterosexual, and 84 women also thought to be heterosexual. They were not able to obtain brain samples of known lesbians, because lesbians rarely die of sexually transmitted diseases like AIDS and thus their sexual orientation is almost never noted on medical charts.

They found statistically significant differences among the three groups. The commissures of the heterosexual women were 13 percent bigger than those of heterosexual men. Those of the homosexual men were 18 percent larger than the samples from the women and 34 percent larger

than those of heterosexual men.

However, these differences were based on comparisons of the sample groups average commissure dimensions. There also were vast differences within the groups. Among heterosexual women, for example, the largest commissure was three times the size of the smallest.

# **LESBIANS AND AIDS**

Disease prevention depends upon two things: first, you have to understand how a disease is transmitted, and second, you must learn how to

stop its transmission.

Over the past few years we have seen an explosion in AIDS coverage and prevention While medical research, behavioral studies and media attention have been important in fighting this disease, it is sad that this progress has taken place only in recent years. It is also important to note that this attention is directed exclusively at male homosexuals and, more recently

In the beginning AIDS was seen as a "Gay Man's Disease"; the medical community and society as a whole seemed content to sit back, ignore, and/or condemn persons with AIDS. At that time, beterosexuals were thought to be "low risk." There was little concern about heterosexual transmission and even less about educating the "straight" community. As a result, heterosexual transmission of HIV is now claiming to epidemic proportions. You would think that as a society we would learn from such tragic mistakes. Evidently,

Eight full years have passed since the first reported case of female-to-female HIV transmission and gay women still have no information about the risk (or prevention) of HIV/AIDS as it relates to their lifestyles.

One spokesperson for the Centers of Disease Control (CDC) trivialized the lack of information available to gay women about HIV/AIDS by claiming lesbians "don't have much sex

Lesbians have been misguided and misinformed into believing that they are at low risk because they are lesbians. It is what we do, not who we are, that puts us at risk. A lesbian becomes HIV-infected the way any woman can, for example:

> some lesbians engage in oral sex, vaginal and/or anal intercourse with men by choice, force, or necessity

some use drugs and share needles

· some have received blood transfusions

some are artificially inseminated some exchange blood and vaginal secretions during oral or manual

sexual contact with women\* · some lesbians share dildos and other sex toys®

· some lesbians who have engaged in none of these activities do have multiple sexual partners and are at risk even if only one of those partners has engaged in one or more of the above activities

· HIV is in menstrual blood as well as other blood; it is also found in the vaginal fluid and breast milk of

infected women.

No one knows how many women have contracted HIV from sex with other women because the CDC hasn't conducted a female-to-

female transmission study

There is also growing evidence that HIVrelated infections may manifest themselves differently in women than in men; combine this with the "low risk" label and the result is misdiagnosed lesbians who will not receive the early treatment so crucial to surviving this disease.

It has been estimated that for \$50,000 a female-to-female study could be conducted that would conclusively determine HIV risks to

leshians

That such a study has yet to be done is inexcusable. It demonstrates the sad truth in the phrase "invisible lesbian" and underscores the general lack of medical attention women receive in our society

The AIDS Equity League is sponsoring a nation-wide campaign to urge the CDC to undertake the study of female-to-female HIV

transmission risks.

We must not waste time as a nation or a community to obtain the necessary information to prevent disease that has claimed so many lives

We ask you to:

1) Write your US Congressional delegation. Request that the CDC immediately begin a female-to-female study on HIV transmission.

# NATL. AIDS OFFICIAL SPEAKS AT UNIVERSITY OF NORTHERN IOWA

Vaccines for AIDS are at least ten years in the future and even then will only help people with HIV avoid developing AIDS. No vaccine is expected to protect uninfected people from the risk of exposure to HIV

I'hat was one of the messages delivered in Cedar Falls by Dr. June Osborn, chairperson the National Commission on AIDS. The 104th annual meeting of the Iowa Academy of Sciences at the

University of Northern Iowa

Osborn's address, "The Second Decade of AIDS," focused on a report by the U.S. Commission on AIDS. She noted that in the last ten years, AIDS has claimed more American lives than the Korean and Vietnam wars combines, and by 1993's end, will reach 350,000 in the U.S.

Osborn said that the Commission's report was highly critical of the administration's policy of withholding potentially lifesaving information

in the name of morality.

She said anal sex remains the most probably infection method during sexual contact but government funded education is not allowed to talk about it, and research cannot focus on it. She shared several personal experiences of talking with the President, who offered "anything he could do," but that there has been no follow-up action on recommendations.

Osborn also noted that the epidemic is growing even faster around the world, with 40 millions cases of AIDS predicted by the end of this decade. An illustration of the explosion is in Thailand, which went from no diagnosed cases of AIDS 18 months ago to one half million infections among needle users and heterosexuals, mostly by

prostitution

She addressed the need for AIDS and sex education in American schools and drew a parallel to math education. We teach grade schoolers basic arithmetic very early on so they have it mastered before being challenged by algebra. She agreed with former Surgeon General C. Everett Koop who said youngsters need to know the basics of sex and AIDS before being taught protection methods and humanity issues in high school

In talking about vaccine technology, Osborn said a cure is unlikely, but, HIV infections will become manageable, like juvenile diabetes

Osborn addressed the state of the health care system. She said HIV diseases are magnifying existing problems. She noted that the hospitals and health care system currently strained with 100,000 AIDS survivors ill totally collapse by the time America's estimated 1 million infected people need health care, even if no further infections occur.

Yet Congressional attempts to provide funding for health care are met with hot debates and fundamentalist-backed bills to decrease AIDS funding. Several recent bills to beef up the health care programs have been vetoed by the President.

When questioned about protecting health care workers from exposure to HIV, Osborn said standard universal precautions are all that is needed. Those guidelines were established to protect against Hepatis-B which is 100 times more easily transmitted.

# IMMIGRATION RESTRICTS PEOPLE WITH HIV/AIDS

The VIII International AIDS Conference, scheduled for last July, was moved from Boston to Amsterdam due entirely to the U.S. government policy that bans HIV+ people from traveling or immigrating to the U.S.

ACT UP's Golden Gate/SF immigration Working Group was primarily responsible for winning agreement from the conference organizers not to hold the conference in Boston unless the U.S.

changed its policy completely

HIV+ people can obtain waivers to enter the country only if they show that they are coming here for work, family reunification, medical treatment, or conferences related to AIDS. There is no medical basis for this restriction of movement. The policy is basically discriminatory. Please write President Bush and tell him it must be stopped.

A portion of the NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt (63 of the 12 x 12 squares which contain about 8 panels each-a total of approximately 500 panels) will be on display at Cushing Coliseum (The Field House of the Health and Sports Complex) on the University of Nebraska at Kearney campus

# QUILT IN SINGAPORE. MALAYSIA

In April, the Quilt was displayed for the first time in two Southeast Asian counties, providing very different views of the epidemic.

The display in Singapore was one of the first officially acknowledged AIDS education events in a country known for suppression of gay and AIDS issues. Four memorial panels presented in Singapore will serve as the starting point for a new Quilt project there.

In Malaysia, a joint effort by the Rotary Club and Fink Triangle brought a large number of visitors to this first-ever display in a Muslim country.

International sections of the Quilt will be woven into the display with participants from each country reading, unfolding and participating in all of the weekend's events.



## ABOUT BENT By Eric O'Brien

The producers of Bent, partly for publicity, partly for interpretation, asked for my preliminary impressions of this complex play. However, I find it difficult to adhere to one viewpoint about a piece of literature until I've had time to process it. Because of its disturbing subject matter, Bent may prove more difficult for me to understand than other theatrical literature. Set in pre-World War II Germany, Bent is about people robbed of thought, freedom and dignity who fight against seemingly insurmountable odds to find love, hope and courage A few facts: most of the characters are homosexual; homosexuals were viciously persecuted in Nazi Germany; homosexuals were at the bottom of the

social structure at concentration camps.

The play centers around Max (my role), a hedonistic, scheming alcoholic. He and his lover, Rudy (played by Steve Tamisiea), chased from their native Berlin by the Gestapo, flee for two years across Germany. After capture, Max is sent to Dachau, a concentration camp fifteen miles from modern Munich. There he meets Horst (Keith Hale) and begins a new struggle for survival and samity.

The cast-Eric O'Brien, Steve Tamisica, Keith Hale, Kevin Barratt, B.J. Tobin, Rick Brayshaw, Marty Magnuson, Brett Foster, Bryan Poole, and Scot Working, spent a good deal of rehearsal time discussing the atrocities committed by the Nazis. Responses have included shock, dismay, insomnia and disbelief

We all share an abhorrence for that time, but Bent director, De Moreland, emphasized in a recent interview that the political climate today is in many ways similar to Germany after the First World War. Both societies suffered economic depressions and accompanying bitterness and struggle. Such times breed hatred and scorn of dissimilarities in others

Recent race conflicts, mounting homophobia in the wake of the AIDS epidemic, and an alarming rise in such groups as the KKK, Posse Comitatis, Neo-Nazi Front and drug gangs testify to our fractured sense of brotherhood.

The entire cast, I believe, shares my convictions about using this play, not only to raise money for Nebraska Aids Project, but also to remind the audience of a time when prejudice and hatred were primary motivations.

The cast, however, differs on other points. I strongly feel this play, while depicting the most hellish time in modern history, offers a strong catharsis concerning human will and redemption. Moreland offers this: "To see people robbed of everything special to them and still triumph is very uplifting." Keith Hale, however, laments the lack of a happy ending, but acknowledges that most stories in our everyday reality don't have happy endings. Hale says, "I thing all theatre has a reason for doing it. Everyday I am more horrified by the atrocities of Nazi Germany." "I'm just worried about my nails. I've been downing gelatin like you wouldn't believe," said Marty Magnuson about his turn as a drag club owner who sells Max and Rudy to the Gestapo. "I think my character Greta serves as a Judas. He's a catalyst for a lot of the other action, but he also demonstrates the importance of survival." Steve Tamisiea sees the role differently: "She betrays her own kind of greed." Of his own character, Steve says, "We're similar in a lot of ways. The things that I see in Rudy and in myself are the things I like most about myself." Kevin Barratt simply feels that his characterization of a Nazi named Wolf should be "really f – king weird."

The cast as a whole is involved for a blend of artistic and societal reasons. Hopefully, we can accomplish a two-fold goal of raising money for Nebraska AIDS Project and, as Tamisiea puts it, "leap up to a new level" of artistic involvement



# MCC-O FEATURED IN OMAHA WORLD HERALD

The August 1 issue of *The Omaha World Herald* featured in the "Living" section an article by staff writer, Julia McCord, entitled *Church Life Uneasy for Homosexuals*. The article discussed the "awkward relationship many gays and lesbians have with their home churches" and included interviews with Rev. Matthew Howard of MCC-Omaha, Rev. David Ruhe of First Central Congregational, and Rev. Jack Pettit and the Elder Cleve Evans of Lowe Avenue Presbyterian Church. These churches are among those that welcome the gay and lesbian community, though Lowe Avenue is at odds with the "official" position of the Presbyterian Church when it does so.

The writer also contacted several church officials, including Archbishop Daniel E. Sheehan, whose churches condemn homosexual activity. Archbishop Sheehan was quoted as saying, "We do not accept the

homosexual act as moral behavior.'

Overall, the article was presented in a positive light and informed the community at large of several churches where gays and lesbians are welcomed, though MCC-Omaha is the only one "that actively seeks homosexuals as members."

Reactions to the article were quite positive among the members of MCC. While there was some initial concern about the reaction of the community at large, there were no incidents of harassment or vandalism despite the fact that the article featured a 5 x 7 color photo of Rev. Howard standing in front of the church and gave the address of the church twice in the article.



# GAY/LESBIANS AND CHEMICAL DEPENDENCY: OMAHA WORKSHOP ADDRESSES TREATMENT

On August 7, the Student Development Services of the University of Nebraska at Omaha presented a one day workshop for counselors and social workers on "Chemical Dependency Treatment for Diverse Populations" at the Peter Kewitt Conference Center in Downtown Omaha. Presentations included cultural and treatment issues for Native American, Spanish Speaking, Gay and Lesbian, and African-American clients.

Each section included general information on the group's particular culture and the relationship between those cultural issues and

chemical dependency and treatment.

Addressing the needs of gay and lesbian clients were Randy Todd, Outpatient Treatment Coordinator at the Gay, Lesbian, and Bisexual Treatment Program at Lincoln-Lancaster Drug Project, and Sandra Miller, a certified Alcohol/Drug counselor at Lincoln-Lancaster Drug Project.

Sandra and Randy began by presenting basic information about the gay and lesbian community, including the Kinsey scale which shows sexual orientation as a continuum with only a small percentage being "totally" heterosexual or homosexual. Studies have indicated that 1 in 3 males (37%) and 1 in 8 females (13%) have had sexual contact to the point of orgasm with a member of the same sex. Sandra went on to point out the prevalence of substance abuse and chemical dependency in the gay/lesbian community where it is estimated that 33% of all gays and lesbians are chemically dependent, compared to 10-12% of the general population. Another study found 35% of the lesbian population to be chemically dependent compared to 5% of owner in the general population. That study found that 30% of gay males are chemically dependent compared to 29% of men in the general population.

Randy addressed cultural influences that impact treatment, identifying three major areas; the pivotal social/political role played by gay bars, external homophobia, and internalized homophobia. He paid particular attention to making the audience aware of how homophobia is demonstrated, utilizing a descriptive article from Philadelphia P-FLAG on Heterosexual Privilege.

Randy and Sandra identified the relationship

between treatment and the coming out process, including resolution of grief and loss, family rejection, tack of role models, and relationship issues. They also identified the impact of sexual abuse, which is often disclosed during treatment.

Obviously, the concerns about HIV/AIDS also impact chemical dependency and treatment. Randy and Sandra utilized the film Sex, Drugs, and HIV to give the audience a basic understanding of transmission and risk factors. They went on to discuss issues directly related to the treatment of chemically dependent gays and lesbians.

Gays and lesbians historically do very poorly in mainstream treatment programs and have high rates of recidivism, due largely to the effects of homophobia and heterosexism. Randy cautioned counselors to be aware of their own homophobia, recognizing that they may presume all clients are heterosexual, may view all problems as related to sexual orientation, and be unaware of the unique stresses of gay life. The therapist may make assumptions about the family and recommend that the biological family be included in therapy, when the client may not be "out" to them or may have suffered significant rejection because of his or her sexual orientation. Randy and Sandra both stressed the need for the therapist to redefine "family" to include the gay/lesbian family of choice.

The session closed with specific recommendations for clinical practice, reviewing the need to be aware of one's own homophobia and the impact it may have. They emphasized the need to make an environment that lets the client feel affirmed and welcomed, from gay/lesbian magazines in the waiting room to having staff members who are "out" gays and lesbians.

The audience of 75 chemical dependency

The audience of 75 chemical dependency counselors, social workers, and others responded to the presentation with applause and insightful mestions.




