MARSDEN HARTLEY'S WORKS AT JOSLYN

Marsden Hartley (1877-1943) was at the center of the artistic and cultural maelstrom known today as early American Modernism. Like a true modernist, Hartley ran through the full gamut of options then open to avant-garde painters, from groundbreaking abstract works to lyrical landscapes. The retrospective exhibition *Marsden Hartley: American Modern*, on view at Joslyn Art Museum from July 8 through September 24, 2000, presents superb examples of Hartley's paintings and works on paper from every phase of his artistic development.

Included in the exhibition are Hartley's early, post-impressionist Maine mountain scenes, pre-World War I abstractions completed in Paris and Berlin, New Mexican landscapes, colorful still lifes from the 1920's and 1930's, pastels of the Bavarian mountains, stark portraits, and late Maine landscapes. In addition to 37 paintings and 16 works on paper by the artist, the exhibition features one portrait photograph of Hartley by Alfred Stieglitz, two portrait sculptural busts of Hartley by Arnold Ronnebeck and Jacques Lipchitz, and three photo murals.

A painter, poet, critic, and artistic rebel, Hartley witnessed momentous changes during the course of his lifetime. He joined a generation of radicals who shook off the weight of convention and tradition and worked to develop an original artistic voice. As a vanguard artist, he also stood beyond social and sexual norms as a gay man. Living long before the gay-rights movement of our day, he kept that side of himself hidden, expressing his homosexuality in his art rarely and only through highly guarded symbolism. This inability to express his authentic inner self was extremely difficult for Hartley, especially when his role as a modernist called upon him to do so. Critics argue that the insecurity of a closeted life helped fuel Hartley's need to recreate himself and his art over the course of his career.

Hartley constantly shifted from place to place, living abroad several times and in varying locales across the country during the course of his life. He lived abroad in Paris in 1912, painting a series of still-lives and developing a close friendship with the author Gertrude Stein.

With World War I, however, came the need for Hartley to redefine his art as a longing for security, order,

and simple virtues took hold. Soon after the outbreak of the war, Hartley lost a dear friend, and possibly lover, Karl von Freyburg, who died in battle. He began a series of paintings that paid tribute to Freyburg and other war dead while also expressing, in a very guarded way, Hartley's life in Berlin's vibrant homosexual culture.

Dr. Randall R. Griffey, assistant curator of American art at the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art (Kansas City, MO), will give a public lecture entitled "Procedures of Concealment: Marsden Hartley's Sexuality and His Art" on Sunday, August 13 at 2pm in Joslyn's lecture hall. A noted Hartley scholar, Dr. Griffey will discuss the degree to which Hartley self-identified as gay in and with his imagery, as well as the extent to which the popular categorization of Hartley's imagery as "expressionist" applies fairly to his images that deal in varying degrees with his homosexuality. The lecture is free with Museum admission.

THE MAX FEATURES STEP-DOWNS OF FAVORITES

Sunday, July 2, the MAX will host the Step-Down show for Emperor 19 Michael Lyons and Empress 19 Laura Lee. Michael and Laura Lee were elected as monarchs of the Imperial Court of Nebraska last July and are holding their final show just one year later. During their reign they have lead the Imperial Court in donating over \$20,000 to the community. The largest recipient of their fundraising were causes meeting the needs of those living with HIV and AIDS. Over 100 families received grocery vouchers at Thanksgiving and over 100 children affected by HIV and AIDS received stacks of toys at Christmas time. In addition, the Board of Governors, the Monarchs and the Royal Families have provided a luncheon for clients, staff, and volunteers of the Nebraska AIDS Project each month. Come to the MAX on July 2 to applaud the hard work of these two individuals.

July 9 will be Step-Down show for Mr. MAX. The Latin Machismo of Paco Perez has made him a hit as Mr. MAX. He has represented the MAX well as he has been active in groups across the community as well as the major shows at the MAX. You can be guaranteed that this will be a night of hot, sultry entertainment.

IMPERIAL COURT OF NEBRASKA 20 YEARS OF SERVICE Coronation 20 at Sokol Hall July 15

The Imperial Court of Nebraska is gearing up to welcome guests from across the country as they celebrate their 20th Anniversary with Coronation 20, "An Imperial Crystal Midnight Masquerade... A Journey into the Millennium." The Imperial Court was founded in 1980 with the stated purpose to "further the cause of Gay society in Nebraska." Over the last 20 years, the Imperial Court of Nebraska has become one of the oldest and most dynamic service organizations in the state. Over \$500,000 has been donated to local, regional, national, and international charities, including such diverse groups as "Jerry's Kids," the American Cancer Society, the Nebraska AIDS Project, the River City Mixed Chorus, the Nebraska Humane Society, the Heartland Gay Rodeo, International Ms Leather, Names Project Quilt, the National Gay Lesbian Task Force and over 40 other groups and organizations.

The Imperial Court of Nebraska provided the first formal social events for the GLBT community. Members of the Imperial Court also organized the first Pride Parade, held the first community wide picnic, were the first to provide HIV/AIDS education to the community through Project Concern, organized the first Gay Bowling League, created the very popular "Closet Ball," and organized the first projects to provide Thanksgiving dinners and Christmas toys for families affected by HIV/AIDS.

The 20th Anniversary Celebration begins July 6 with the State Dinner and Awards at Connections, and continues through the In-Town Show at the Omaha Mining Company, the Out-of-Town Show at DC's, Coronation 20 at Sokol Hall, and the Winddown Show at the MAX. NEBRASKA DEFENSE OF MARRIAGE INITIATIVE

As described in an article in PlanetOut, Nevada has more than enough signatures to put a "Defense Of Marriage Amendment (DOMA) on the November ballot. Some 30 other state legislatures have enacted laws to the same effect. A signature drive is underway for a similar but much broader ballot initiative in Nebraska. That proposal by the Defense of Marriage Amendment Committee would deny not only same-gender marriage but also "civil union, domestic partnership or other similar same-sex relationships." To qualify for the ballot, some 105,000 valid signatures must be collected by July 7. As the deadline draws nearer, efforts by the volunteers circulating the petitions will be stepped up. They have even called Metropolitan Community Church of Omaha to recruit volunteers to circulate DOMA petitions. Obviously, the DOMA Committee has not researched the local community very well. We encourage the community to not sign this petition and work to keep the issue off the November ballot.

Thoughts and Opinions from a Member of the TransGender Community

I'm a chatroom junkie, and I freely admit it. When I was living in central Nebraska, there weren't many opportunities to get out, so virtual conversations were the next best thing. Even though I've been a regular at the same transgendered-themed room for 4 years now, I'm still astounded by one thing: other cities don't have what we have. People across the country tell me there isn't much socializing between the different groups within our Community. The gays don't talk to the crossdressers, the lesbians don't like the bi's, the bi's hate the bears, and so on. When I mention how much communication and inclusion there is here, no-one believes me. They don't get it when I say we, lesbians, gays, straights, bi's, TG's, bears, leather lovers, were all invited to participate in the Pride Parade. They are incredulous about the diversity at the local bars and clubs. Maybe we are willing to reach out to each other because we feel outnumbered. This isn't the most progressive part of the country, so we all hang on to each other. There may be bigger communities in bigger cities across the country, but I like it here, where the social life isn't segmented.

Speaking of segmented, has anyone else noticed the large population of straight people at the Max for the last few months? I used to think it was great: a nice opportunity for public education and outreach. Lately, I'm not so sure. If straight people want to hang out at the Max, that's fine, but jeez! Stop staring! Yes, there are men in dresses. Yes, there are women with big biceps. And yes, those two guys are kissing. What did you expect at a gay bar? Hooters Girls and football? There are plenty of people who are cool with the whole scene, but there are also a number of folks who just don't get it. There are the frat boys who stand upstairs and say loudly: "Anybody wanna play pool with the DRAG QUEENS?" over and over again, just to get a rise outta someone. There are the straight couples who wander in and hang on to each other for dear life, for fear someone will steal their date away and "make them gay." And don't get me started about people without rhythm overrunning the dance floor! So, here's what we do: Everyone who comes in gets a hand stamp that says "Gay and Proud", and doesn't wash off for 3 days. Everyone parked in a 1 block radius gets a rainbow sticker on their bumper. House rule: No mixed couple dancing. I think that ought to weed out some of the undesirables, don't you?

But seriously, myself and other members of the River City Gender Alliance like to go out after our monthly meeting, (sometimes more often than that), and we like to socialize. I've not heard of a single complaint about the other clientele at the Max, or any of Omaha's

other bars, from members of our group. We tend to sit upstairs in a cluster, away from most of the other guests. While it may look like we're being exclusive, we're not. We sit together for a couple of reasons.

First off, it's easier to talk that way. And we do a lot of talking, because for some of us, it's hard enough to walk in heels, let alone dance! We also sit together, because often, we'll have someone with us who is out for the first time, and is usually a bit scared. No, they're not scared of the Max, they're scared because it's may be the first time they've been out in public in their chosen gender role. It can be a pretty frightening thing. Many of us are shy by nature anyway, and that doesn't help the situation. When someone is shy, typically, they don't like to let on. They'll adopt a look of aloofness. (Is that a word? It is now.) Other people don't approach the shy subject, because they look snooty, and the whole situation gets worse. That first person starts to think nobody likes them, because nobody talks to them, and they get more shy.

What I'm getting at is this: We may look like we're our own little club and don't want anything to do with anyone else, but it's not true. When you see us out, come over and say Hello. Everyone likes to make new friends, RCGA members included. Sure, we may dress differently, and act a little funny compared to other people you know, but hey! That's diversity. If you don't understand where we're coming from, ask. Most of us are pretty willing to talk, so let's reinforce the bridges we already have. We've got something good here in River City. Let's make it stronger.

RODEO CONTESTANTS ARE TOUGH (AND MUDDY) BUNCH

4th Annual Rodeo Plagued by Storms

The Heartland Gay Rodeo Association managed to put together a successful rodeo despite assaults by mother nature. Torrential rains the night before the opening of the rodeo left the area a sea of mud. The Grand Entry became a grand walk along the grandstands on Saturday and several cowboys donned plastic raingear over their Levi's & western shirts. Pools of water along the outside edge of the arena made rows 1, 2, and 3 into "splash zones" reminiscent of Sea World's Shamoo exhibit.

The bareback bronco riding started with an unheard of situation. The cowboy carefully mounted the bronco in the chute, adjusted his grip on the strap and nodded to the arena crew to open the gate. But when the gate opened, the audience watched the horse's hindquarters sink slowly into the mud until it was belly deep in the mire. The crew pulled the cowboy off, got the horse back on its feet, repositioned the rider and threw open the gate. This time the horse stood there, turned its head, looked out into the arena and did not move an inch. Not only did it not buck, it didn't even move. It was as if the horse was saying, "I'm not stupid and I'm not going through that again." Needless to say, the cowboy got a re-ride with a different horse.

The afternoon continued with normal activity if you don't include the judge whose feet got stuck in the mud so he fell backwards onto his behind when he tried to take a step. And if you don't count the chute dogger who sank 2 feet into the mud under her steer. And if you don't count the cowboy whose horse threw him full length into a pool of muddy water. Or the longhorn steer who refused to return to the pen and repeatedly charged the horse and rider (until they turned a more docile steer into the arena and the longhorn quietly walked into the pen accompanied by its new-found friend.)

Sunday started off with a sunny sky but ended with tornado and severe thunderstorm warnings. While final results are not available as we go to press, suffice it to say that the cowboys and cowgirls of the Heartland Rodeo proved that they are made of some pretty tough stuff.

But tough as they are, they had wiped tears away openly as Bryn Geerdes led her 20 year old Tennessee Walker "Trouble" around the arena in the riderless horse ceremony. The ceremony was made more special by the addition of "memory badges" to the blanket, each one honoring someone who has passed away before their time. The emotion of the ceremony was further increased by Tamara Marks singing an original song by Derric Field, a longtime HGRA member who died of lung cancer last year. Tamara herself broke down into sobs as she finished the final lines of the song.

Our congratulations to the men and women of the International Gay Rodeo Association who competed with such courage and such compassion during the Fourth Annual Heartland Rodeo.





