U.K. Marriage Equality Bill Advances

The United Kingdom moved a step closer to marriage equality today, with the House of Commons voting 400-175 for a bill extending marriage rights to same -sex couples.

The measure

must go through more parliamentary debates and a vote in the House of Lords before becoming law, but the House of Lords is likely to approve it, given the strong support in the House of Commons, the Associated Press reports.

If approved, the law would take effect in 2015, giving same-sex couples access to both civil and religious marriage, as long as the religious body does not object. Also, couples in civil partnerships would be able to convert their union to a marriage.

Marriage equality has the backing of Prime Minister David Cameron, who said before today's House of Commons debate, "I am a strong believer in marriage. It helps people commit to each other, and I think it is right that gay people should be able to get married too. This is, yes, about equality. But it is also about making our society stronger."

In the House of Commons, most of the resistance to the bill came from members of the Conservative Party, even though that is Cameron's party. Conservative lawmaker Roger Gale invoked works of literature in stating his opposition, saying, "Marriage is the union between a man and a woman, has been historically, remains so. It is Alice in Wonderland territory, Orwellian almost, for any government of any political persuasion to seek to come along and try to rewrite the lexicon."

Gay-rights Supporters Present 1.4 Million Signatures at Boy Scouts Headquarters in Irving

This morning, a group representing gay Boy Scouts and Scout



leaders presented petitions urging the Boy Scouts of America to rescind its ban on gay members.

Those taking part in the presentation of signatures included Will Oliver, a 20-year-old gay Eagle Scout from Duxbury, Mass.; and Eric Andresen, the father of a gay Scout who was denied his Eagle Award.

Oliver said he found Scouting to be a refuge during the teen years when he was coming to terms with his sexual orientation. He did not reveal that he was gay until after he had received his Eagle Award.

He said the Scouts' discriminatory policy forces gay youths to conceal their true identity.

"Tomorrow and the next day, you must do it again and again and again," he said.

"It is time for this archaic policy to end."

Andresen fought back tears as he talked about his 18-year-old son, Ryan, who completed the requirements to become an Eagle Scout but was denied the honor because of his sexual orientation.

"It hurts so much to witness what Ryan has been through, because he does not deserve it," the father said

Those opposed to the policy gathered outside the Boy Scouts of America national headquarters on Walnut Hill Lane near Mac-Arthur Boulevard in Irving.

No one from the Scouts came out to speak with the demonstrators or to address the issues they raised. One member of the gay -rights group brought the signatures inside the Scouts building and left them there.

The demonstration occurred as the Scouts' Board of Directors is meeting for three days in Irving. The organization said last week that the board would consider a proposal to allow local Scout councils to determine whether to accept gay Scouts and gay leaders.

The board meetings are private. As we noted last week, there is no guarantee that the board will even take up the question of the gay ban, much less act to modify or rescind it.

On Sunday, President Barack Obama told CBS that he supports an end to the ban on gay Scouts.

"My attitude is that gays and lesbians should have access and opportunity the same way everybody else does in every institution and walk of life," he said.

"The Scouts are a great institution that are promoting young people and exposing them to opportunities and leadership that will serve people for the rest of their lives. And I think nobody should be barred from that."

A day earlier, Texas Gov. Rick Perry, an Eagle Scout, said the no-gays policy should not be changed. To do so would be to capitulate to the whims of "popular culture," he said.

"I think most people see absolutely no reason to change the position and neither do I."

Military to Extend Some Benefits to Gay Partners

Leon Panetta's last week as Defense secretary will see the extension of some partner benefits to gay military personnel.

As one of his final acts as secretary of Defense, Leon Panetta is expected to establish more equal benefit rights for gay and lesbian military couples and their families.

According to Outserve-SLDN, Panetta will make the announcement this week, before officially leaving office. The organization has been lobbying the Pentagon and federal government to extend benefits as simple as housing and military ID access to same-sex partners of military personnel since "don't ask, don't tell" was repealed officially in 2011.

The Washington Post reports that Pentagon officials are trying to determine which benefits can be extended to same-sex couples without violating the so-called Defense of Marriage Act, which bars the federal government from recognizing same-sex relgationships. An estimated 100 benefits may be extended to partners, spouses, and families. Currently, same-sex partners and spouses are granted minimal rights.

According to the Human Rights Campaign, some of the regulatory changes that Panetta could make include housing, military identification cards, access to commissaries and exchanges, personnel assignments, legal services, and privilege to refuse to testify against spouses.

"Secretary Panetta established a strong civil rights record long before taking office at the Pentagon, so his unwillingness to extend support and recognition to gay and lesbian service members and their families where it is clearly within his authority to do so has baffled many of us," said Outserve-SLDN executive director Allyson Robinson. "We are hopeful that he will not take half-measures here; for him to grant anything less than the full extent of benefits available under current law would be an anticlimactic end to an otherwise exemplary record on civil rights."

Robinson also praised Sen. Chuck Hagel, who is expected to be confirmed as Panetta's replacement, for assuring that he would uphold support for LGBT military families to the extent of the current law.

"Considering DADT was repealed well over a year ago, our families have waited far too long for the Defense Department to extend benefits to same-sex military spouses," said Stephen Peters, president of the American Military Partner Association. "No military family should suffer because of outdated regulations. For the sake of our families, we hope for substantive action and look forward to hearing from Secretary Panetta on exactly what benefits will be extended."

Rep. Adam Schiff and 25 other members of Congress urged Panetta to allow same-sex spouses certain benefits, such as military identification cards and access to Morale, Welfare, and Recreation (MWR) programs, and to allow access to family programs like deployment support, marriage and family counseling, relocation assistance, and financial management.

"We need to make sure that all military families — including those with same sex partners serving at home or abroad – have access to the very best care, facilities and services possible," Schiff said in a statement Tuesday.

The Hidden Costs of Affording a New Home

HOA Fees.

This is true if you move into a condominium or subdivision that has common areas - You may have to pay fees to upkeep the lobby, the front gardens, picnic areas, green space, pools, community centers and other items.

Utilities.

Sometimes these utilities can add hundreds of dollars to the monthly costs of maintaining your home. My brother in Minneapolis recently had a 3 month \$950.00 water bill! Maintenance and Repairs.

The porn blog Fleshbot wrote:

The Hungarian-born legend moved to America shortly after being discovered by porn studio Kristen Bjorn while working as a chemist, and pursued a career in the adult industry "on a whim." After moving to America and teaching himself English, the legend appeared in more than 45 adult films and countless other one-off scenes.

"He was a great guy, on top of that, there was a lot more to him than just that surface persona. He was a very active person in the gay community, he gave a lot of money to charities, and was overall a really good guy." Lynch says of his friend. "He



was probably one of the biggest porn stars out there."

House Introduces Immigration Bill For Gay Partners

Rep. Jerrold Nadler, backed by dozens of House colleagues, introduced a bill to allow Americans to sponsor their same-sex partners for legal residency in the U.S.



tionships of same-sex couples, due to the Defense of Marriage Act, Nadler's Uniting American Families Act would grant the same rights to gay couples that heterosexual married couples currently have. The bill comes as Congress debates an overhaul of the country's immigration laws.

Versions of this bill have been introduced in Congress in each session since 2000.

The UAFA would add the term "permanent partner" to the Immigration and Naturalization Act, which currently only applies to married heterosexual couples. A "permanent partner" is described as an adult who is in a committed, intimate relationship with another adult in "which both parties intend a lifelong commitment."

Right now, at least 31 other countries, including Brazil, Denmark, Hungary, and the United Kingdom, allow residents to sponsor partners for legal immigration.



"Today, thousands of committed same-sex couples are needlessly suffering because of unequal treatment under our immigration laws, and this is an outrage," Nadler said in a statement Tuesday. "Our Con-

stitution guarantees that no class of people will be singled out for differential treatment — and LGBT Americans must not be excluded from that guarantee. Moreover, any serious legislative proposal for comprehensive immigration reform absolutely must include gay and lesbian couples and their families."

Democratic leader Nancy Pelosi, who is backing the bill, said that enacting UAFA would be striking "down the barriers of discrimination." She added, "As we work toward comprehensive immigration reform, we must ensure that the value of all families is valued, respected, and recognized in the eyes of the law."

Rachel B. Tiven, the executive director of Immigration Equality, said that November's election outcome is a clear indication that Americans would support this bill.

"Voters sent a clear message in November: they support treating everyone — gay and straight, citizen and immigrant — with dignity and respect," Tiven said. "These are true American values. As Congress moves forward on long overdue immigration reform, lawmakers must include UAFA as part of that effort. Our immigration laws must reflect the diversity of our beautiful country and must protect families and family unity."

Gay representative Jared Polis of Colorado said the UAFA would "help reduce family backlogs, grow our economy, and improve the effectiveness of the immigration process. This common-sense legislation is part of the solution to how to fix our broken immigration system."

Because the federal government does not recognize the rela-

Out representatives Mark Takano of California, Sean Patrick Maloney of New York, Kyrsten Sinema of Arizona, and David Cicilline of Rhode Island are also cosponsors of the legislation.

Sen. Patrick Leahy of Vermont is expected to introduce the companion bill in the Senate.

with marriage equality and the second in the Midwest.

Today in the House, Bloomington resident Danielle Cook testified that she and her partner, Suzie Hutton, need the law to "make our lives more complete," the Chicago Tribune reports. Ministers also testified both for and against the legislation.

A Senate committee had approved a version of the measure last month, just before the legislative session ended, and backers concluded there were not enough supporters in the full Senate to pass it before the session was over. The new legislature, seated shortly thereafter, has a greater number of LGBT rights supporters.

Illinois Senate Committee Moves Marriage Bill Forward


A committee moves the bill to the full Senate, expected to vote on it Valentine's Day; it also needs a vote by the House and the governor's signature to become law.

Today an Illinois Senate committee approved a marriage equality bill by a vote of 9-5, advancing it to the full Senate, where a vote is expected February 14.

"It should be a very welcome Valentine's Day gift for the thousands of couples and families that are anxiously awaiting the passage of this bill," said Rick Garcia, director of the Equal Marriage Illinois Project and senior policy adviser for the Civil Rights Agenda, an Illinois LGBT advocacy group. "The momentum continues to build in Illinois."

If approved by the full Senate, the bill will go to the House of Representatives, and if passed there, to Gov. Pat Quinn, who has said he will sign it. It would make Illinois the 10th state
