First Openly Gay Prince Discusses Coming Out

Prince Manvendra Singh Gohil, India's first openly gay prince, made a video with Come Out Loud, an organization that strives to unite the LGBT community. Gohil first spoke about his sexuality on Oprah in 2007, and now further elaborates on his coming out journey.

"When I was around 12 or 13. I realized I wasn't attracted towards the opposite sex. I was attracted to the same sex. Why is this attraction happening? I wasn't clear about it because I did not have communication with anyone."

Royalty also put pressure on Gohil.

"Being brought up with servants and not many friends...no internet...it was a very confusing state."

When Gohil eventually began to explore his sexuality, he was disowned and disinherited by his family. Gohil then began traveling the world to share his story. After some time passed, his parents welcomed him home again.

Gohil commented with this strikingly powerful notion:

"We're all human beings. We should be treated equally and be given the rights which we have been denied. All we expect from the society is love. Gay rights cannot just be won in the courtroom, but also in the hearts and minds of the people we live with."

Pastor Wants Girl Scout Leaders To Be Executed For Supporting Gays

After he blasted the hit Disney film "Frozen" and the Harry Potter books for being too "pro-gay," Pastor Kevin Swanson (at right) has now set his sights on the Girl Scouts of America.

Swanson, who is a pastor at the Reformation Church of Elizabeth, Colorado, slammed

the Girl Scouts for promoting "lesbianism, abortion and contraception for 14-year-old girls" among its participants on Monday's installment of his weekly radio show, "Generations with Kevin Swanson," Right Wing Watch first reported.

He then implied that scout leaders should be put to death, specifically by having "a millstone be hanged" around their necks and "drowned at the bottom of the sea," for their actions toward young girls.


Later in the broadcast, Swanson praised evangelist Franklin Graham, who has publicly vowed not to buy Girl Scout cookies this year because of the scouting organization's "support of transgender rights and homosexuality."

"I'm just thankful that, finally, another protestant leader is willing to stand up against this American icon that has been used as a tool of the left for many, many decades," Swanson said.

As easy as it may seem to just laugh off the pastor's claims, Swanson has been dominating headlines with his outrageous views since the start of the 2016 U.S. election cycle. In November 2015, he was the chief organizer behind the National

Religious Liberties Conference, which was attended by Republican presidential hopeful Ted Cruz.

Puerto Rico's governor: Gay Marriage Legal Despite Ruling by Federal Judge

Puerto Rico's president plans to ignore a federal judge's ruling that last June's landmark samesex marriage ruling by the US Supreme Court doesn't apply to the island US territory.

Governor Alejandro García Padilla on Wednesday (9 March) said in a statement: 'The fundamental right to marriage has been ordered by the U.S. Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals for the First Circuit of Boston. Thus, I'm going to respect the



rulings of the higher courts which, thankfully, ordered matters to proceed much differently than Judge (Juan) Perez Giménez.

District Court Judge Perez Giménez has ruled earlier this week that the Supreme Court ruling making marriage legal nationwide does not apply to Puerto Rico because it is not a state.

He is the same judge who had previously upheld Puerto Rico's same-sex marriage ban.

The judge's earlier ruling was vacated by the US Court of Appeals for the First Circuit and Puerto Rico began issuing marriage licenses to same-sex couples.

Perez Giménez's ruling this week came in a case filed by Lambda legal on behalf of five couples seeking a judgment that

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all provisions of Puerto Rico law banning licensing and recognition of same-sex marriages is unconstitutional and no longer enforceable.

The legal group applauded the governor's defiance of the judge's ruling. "The marriages of same-sex couples in Puerto Rico are not in limbo and we appreciate that Governor García Padilla has reassured LGBT people and made clear to all others in the Island that marriage is here to stay,' Lambda Legal staff attorney Omar González-Pagan said in a statement.

'The decision issued vesterday by District Court Judge Pérez Giménez is fundamentally flawed and we plan to file an appeal to ensure that this discriminatory ban does not stand. The law is on our side.

He added: 'The U.S. Supreme Court has indisputably held that the constitutional guarantees of liberty and equality apply with equal force to the Commonwealth.'

Garcia said in December that he would not be seeking a second four-year term in November. Instead, he said he would be focusing on solving Puerto Rico's \$72 billion debt crisis. He has been governor since 2013.

Bernie Sanders Releases Plan to Defeat AIDS

Bernie Sanders has a plan to create an AIDS-free generation.

The Democratic candidate's campaign released a statement on his website in order to address "the great moral issue of our day"— the affordability of HIV medication.

The statement took "profiteering" pharmaceutical companies to task for raising the prices of these treatments, thereby forcing those who live with HIV to pay thousands of dollars each year.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that at least 1.2 million people are living with HIV in the United States. In 2012, over 13,000 people died of an AIDS-related illness. LGBT people and people of color are particularly at

risk. A recent CDC report noted that half of black gay men will be diagnosed with HIV in their lifetime.

"In the richest nation in the world, we must not tolerate a health care system that offers the best care to the rich, while leaving everyone else to fend for themselves," said the Sanders statement. "We must do everything possible to end the



greed of the pharmaceutical companies and get people the medicine they need at a price they can afford."

To this end, the Sanders team proposed creating a "Prize Fund" of more than \$3 billion annually that would "incentivize drug development" and "provide virtually universal access to lower-cost life-saving medicines" as they become available.

The plan also seeks to reform patent laws that privilege pharmaceutical companies. Moreover, as president, Sanders would have the secretary of Health and Human Services "negotiate drug prices with pharmaceutical companies and reduce barriers to the importation of lower-cost drugs from Canada and other countries."

"The United States is the only major country on earth that does not regulate prescription drug prices in some manner, the plan pointed out, "and the results have been an unmitigated disaster for patients and their families."

The Sanders plan called for universal health care and the expansion of health services currently in place, including access to mental health care, the Ryan White HIV/AIDS program, the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief, and Housing Opportunities for Persons With AIDS.

Sanders also stressed the need for civil rights protections for LGBT and HIV-positive people, including safeguards against employment and housing discrimination.

"We all must work together so we can finally realize the goal of an AIDS-free generation," the statement concluded.

The release of this plan follows remarks made Friday by Hil-(Continued on page 4)



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
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lary Clinton, in which she praised the deceased Nancy Reagan and her husband, President Reagan, for helping to "start a national conversation" on HIV. After a backlash from LGBT groups, including the Human Rights Campaign, Clinton apologized twice.

In a Sunday interview on CNN's State of the Union, Sanders said he was "not sure where Secretary Clinton got her information" and set the record straight.

"They refused to allow that discussion to take place," he said of the Reagans. "They didn't get involved in it while so many fellow Americans were getting sick and dying."

In the past, Sanders has been a vocal opponent of Martin Shkreli, a pharmaceutical executive who raised the price of an AIDS medication by more than 5,000 percent. When Shkreli donated \$2,700 to Sanders, in the hopes of gaining an audience with him, Sanders gave the amount to an HIV clinic in Washington, D.C.

Family Says Bullying Led to Gay Wyoming Man's Suicide

A gay Native American man has been found dead in Wyoming, in an apparent suicide after he reportedly endured years of bullying.

Trevor O'Brien, 20, was found dead about 10:30 p.m. Tuesday in a park in Gillette, Wyo., the Gillette News Record reports. Gillette Police Department officers said O'Brien took his own life, although the local coroner has yet to issue a

verdict. No other information on the circumstances of his death has been released.

Police said they're investigating reports of homophobic harassment directed at O'Brien, who had previously reported that his car was defaced with an antigay slur in 2012. "They put a disparaging word commonly used for homosexuals on the car," Lt. Chuck Deaton told the News Record.



O'Brien posted a picture of the car to Facebook in December:

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Other posts from O'Brien deal with mistreatment he suffered for being gay, and one photo shows him with scratches on his face, apparently from a fight, reports Billings, Mont., TV station KTVQ. Family members told the station that O'Brien "felt he had no one to turn to for help."

O'Brien, a member of the Sioux tribe, was a lover of music, especially the songs of Sam Smith. He recently posted a Facebook video of him performing a song made famous by another popular singer — "I'm Yours" by Jason Mraz. Watch here.

Less Than 50% of Teens Identify as Straight, Says New Study

The next generation is much more queer and much less defined by gender than millennials.

My fellow millennials, we're already a relic of the past. Gone

are our days of defining the zeitgeist. Pack it up. Show's over. Nothing to see here. Because the upcoming legendary children, as Vice so gingerly puts it, are queer as fuck.

A new study by trend forecasting agency J. Walter Thompson Innovation Group found that only 48 percent of 13-20-year-olds identify as "exclusively heterosexual," compared to 65 percent of millennials aged 21 to 34.

Vice reports: On a scale of zero to six, where zero signified "completely straight" and six meant "completely homosexual," more than a third of the young demographic chose a number between one and five, indicating that they were bisexual to some degree. On-

ly 24 percent of their older counterparts identified this way.

When it comes to gender, over a third of Generation Z (as I guess we have to call them now) strongly agreed that gender (Continued on page 6)



did not define a person as much as it used to—only 28 percent of millennials felt similarly. Over half, 56 percent, of Gen Z said that they knew someone who went by gender neutral pronouns such as "they," "them," or "ze," compared to 43 percent of people 28 to 34.

Gen Z's perspectives on gender also extends to their wardrobe. Whereas 54 percent of millennials always bought clothes designed for their own gender, that number drops to 44 percent when it comes to teens. They also overwhelmingly support gender neutral bathrooms, with 70 percent in favor, versus 57 percent of millennials.

But for kids these days, embracing a queer identity while rejecting the gender binary is less a trend and more a reflection of growing up in a world with unprecedented access to information and communities, at a time when the concept of identity is open to interpretation.

And how great is that? While I often question the taste level of today's teens—back in my day, we had faces—I take comfort in knowing that they're much less hung up about gender and sexual orientation than my generation, and the generation before, and before that. It's called progress. And try as they might, no one can stop the inexorable march of progress.

Coming Out: Why I'm Worthy, No Matter What My Parents Say

This essay was chosen by editors in response to the #FirstTime prompt: What was it like coming out?

Does it even need to be said? I asked myself, standing at my parents' door on the day I'd chosen to come out. Will they accept me?



I couldn't settle on an answer.

My brother and sister realized I was gay. They didn't care. But my parents only suspected I was gay and so our relationship remained eerily constant. When I came out to them, would it all change?

My mother had grown more accepting in the 20 years since she joined the other parents of my brother's little league soccer team who demanded a gay assistant coach be dismissed "for the



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safety of the children." My father had become more tolerant in the 17 years since I trembled next to him at the grocery store while he unleashed a flurry of curses at a gay couple cutely flirting over which flavor of ice cream to buy. Still, I could see denial darken my mother's eyes whenever she said things like, "You'll make some woman very happy one day." And it seemed like no holiday dinner was complete without a helping of my father's dissatisfaction at the progress of LGBT rights.

I wasn't sure how my parents would react. But at that point, it didn't really matter. Coming out to my parents would be the easy part. Getting there had been the real challenge.

For nearly two decades, the question wasn't Will they accept me? It was Who am I to think I deserve acceptance? And the answer was I am not, I am trash.

I learned that answer when I was 11, low on self-esteem, and insecure – a prime target. My schoolmates threw the typical insults my way: Stupid! Ugly! Fat! Then one day, their words took on a different, more piercing tone: Faggot! Butt Fucker! Oueer!

I always had a friend or family member who buttressed my confidence enough for me to reject commonplace bullying. But when I was belittled for being gay, like so many other closeted young kids, I had no one to tell me, "There's nothing wrong with you." When I was beat up in the locker room, or suckerpunched in the hall, I had no-one to reassure me I didn't deserve it. In fact, my family felt nothing, but revulsion toward people like me. My friends turned on me. Everyone was unanimous: gays are vile degenerates. I began to agree.

My conscious self-loathing lasted until I entered adulthood, when things became even worse. Instead of working to accept myself, I dove into the dark bliss of denial, hiding my self-loathing and self-rejection under a grand delusion of layered rationalizations.

I made many friends in high school and college, but went to great lengths to evade them outside of class, lest they learn my secret. I like alone time, I told myself. I'm happier without attachments. I avoided serious relationships at all costs, finding outlets for my sexual frustration that are, to this day, my greatest source of pain and regret.

I'd often wake up crying, convincing myself over and over that it was just from a bad dream.

To everyone who knew me, I appeared happy, funny, charismatic. "You always smile!" But I was dead inside—a beautiful husk—lonely, desolate and ashamed, pretending that the blistering fires of the hell I lived were the warm rays of the sun.

I kept on this way until I was 28.

My coming out began with a friendship—just as shallow as all the others—that suddenly became very real when my friend and I both—through an accident of circumstance followed by a horribly awkward misunderstanding—felt forced to confide in each other that we were gay.

It was the first time I had ever said the words, but once I had spoken them, I couldn't stop talking. Long-imprisoned honesty exploded through the crack my confession had created.

Why did you say all that?! I was horrified I had alienated myself even further from yet another friend. But to my shock, the truth brought the two of us closer. We were soon spending days and nights together: talking, laughing, and crying for hours on end.

Still-it wasn't easy.

Every conversation was a battle fought on the charred fields of my suffering mind, my reborn self was viciously assaulted by doubt and self-hatred. But for every moment of vulnerability I achieved, my friends gave unconditional acceptance and love. The effect was profound. Over the course of a year, my doubt disappeared and the deep wound that had long-festered inside my soul closed. What hatred had inflicted, love had healed.

After years of hiding, I had finally come out to myself and found my own acceptance. It was the greatest moment of my life

So when I stood at my parents' door on the day I had chosen to come out, I asked and I answered:

Does it even need to be said? No. It doesn't need to be said. But I'm going to say it anyway.

Will they accept me? I don't know, but I deserve it. I am worthy.





COMMENTARY What Caitlyn Jenner's Really After

After losing interest in I Am Cait midway through the first season, I believed I was done with the whole Caitlyn Jenner media circus. I think it was watching her hit golf balls off the side of that mountain that finally inspired me to wonder if I didn't have better things to do with my time. I felt no regret, no sense of loss. In my opinion, life's just too short to waste even one more hour of it on someone like her.

The truth is that Caitlyn Jenner bores me even as she annoys me. I've known people like her my whole life. In fact, I used to be a lot like her. When I was in my late teens and early 20s, about 10 years or so after Jenner had won gold at the Olympics and graced America's Wheaties boxes, I was a punk. I wore black leather, listened to the Ramones and the Clash, and adopted the politics and social outlook of the punk movement — the good and the bad.

On the one hand, while my politics could probably be described as left-wing, it was only because it was the politics of the bands I listened to. I really had no set political worldview of my own. Few, if any, people of color were to be found in the clubs or at the shows I frequented, and the same was true of openly gay or trans people. There was no real hate, no true animosity there, at least for me anyway. It was simply the way things were.

I was into punk for the music and the emotional release valve it provided me. The actual politics of the punk movement were secondary for me, and I rarely thought about them at all. I didn't really care that there might be more, something of value beneath the surface of the world of anger, drugs, and loud music I lived in then. I was getting what I wanted and needed from punk, and I wasn't particularly inclined to dig any deeper.

It's this kind of immature perspective I see in Caitlyn Jenner today. She's getting what she feels she wants and needs out of life, and she isn't especially inclined to seek anything more. She has all the money and all the attention she could possibly want or need, and her worldview doesn't extend beyond that which affects her directly. It's like she's on permanent spring break.

For me, it wasn't money; it was the drugs. Getting by on next to nothing was part of the punk aesthetic, and the drugs we did were cheap and strong. Like the music, the drugs enabled me to feel what I wanted to and put other concerns, especially those I didn't want or wasn't ready to deal with, out of my mind.

Toward the end of my time as a punk and a drug addict, I was making good money. I had pretty much everything I wanted, more than enough money to pay the rent, feed myself, and buy all the drugs I could possibly want. To say I was self-centered would be an understatement.

The drug I believe Caitlyn Jenner is addicted to isn't smoked, snorted, injected, or drunk. It's the notoriety, the attention. She has succeeded Kim to become the uber-Kardashian, and she obviously loves it, revels in it. That's her drug, and just about

eve-



rything she does is focused on getting her more of it.

If there's anything I remember well from my own days as an addict, it's that when you're addicted to anything, no matter what it is, it becomes what your life is about. Nothing else and no one else matters.

Some have argued that Jenner is still new to being trans and new to this level of attention, and so she hasn't found her balance yet. The problem for Jenner and for all of us is that unlike with most actual drug addicts, her addiction is playing out in public, in the media. Indeed, it's that very media attention which is her addiction.

It's because of the attention Jenner seeks and enjoys so much that she has the potential to seriously harm the cultural and political interests of an unjustly harshly persecuted minority.

Caitlyn Jenner wants attention, and she doesn't especially care who's harmed as a result. That much is clear just about every time she opens her mouth. For trans people, particularly in an election year when anti-trans sentiment is at an all-time high, this is a problem for the community, and a big one.

Some time ago, transitioned helicopter pilot and news reporter Zoey Tur was the trans media darling of the moment. She spewed a plethora of misinformation about trans people in the media and publicly attacked some of her fellow trans journalists, including myself. While the actual content was different, the problem was much the same: Tur obviously loved the attention as much as Jenner does and would say whatever she had to in order to gain more of it.

The massive blowback in the media to Jenner's comments on I Am Cait about Republican support for trans rights can be attributed to the same cause that precipitated the fall from grace of Tur — she finally went too far, clearly exceeding the point where anyone could argue she was still credible.

That's the precipice upon which Caitlyn Jenner stands right now. She can grow up and start presenting herself as a competent trans woman who lives in the real world, or she can continue to show the world that she is neither. It'll be interesting to see what she does next.



Sorry, rhetorical question.



Many a client has told me that he/she spent hours online, trying to connect with someone, only to be shocked afterwards at how much time they spent in their "hunt".

I recommend you partake of these apps just as you do highcalorie desserts: enjoy them sparingly, with a big dose of humor. Without humor, some of the mean comments you get on some apps would make any one of us want to run home and hide under the covers.

What if you're having fun on the apps? Then, my friend, go for it. But, again, get some vegetables with your desserts. Spend time with your (real life) friends and monitor the time you spend staring at your phone, hoping that the latest picture you carefully took in your bathroom (perfect lighting, your chin at just the right angle to make your nose look smaller and your eyes bigger) will get more hits from hotter guys/girls.

Dating/hook-up apps are great for making a (superficial) connection with LOTS of people. It's a numbers game: the odds




I recommend that my clients see the world of dating/hookup apps as a game: it's something you might enjoy, but there is no guaranteed outcome.

And – if you find yourself on-line a bit too much – you might ask yourself: am I looking for validation? Maybe I'm not feeling so good about myself, I've gained a bit of weight and I noticed a new wrinkle (or two) today. If you get on-line validation: good for you! Maybe that's all you needed. I've had clients tell me that they like on-line chatting more than actually hooking up. The chatting makes them feel "connected" and less alone. And who can't relate to that?

Please humor us LGBT elders who pre-date the Internet: we grew up in a very different world. We had to meet a man/ woman in person and see what they looked like, how they talked, if they looked us in the eye, how they laughed. We got a wealth of non-verbal information that let us quickly sum someone up as a "yes" or "no".

Regardless of the app you use, sexual compatibility can only be discovered face-to-face. Photos and demographic information only take you so far: you gotta meet up in person for the real deal to happen (or not).

Many of us use apps to connect, meet someone to date or have sex with. As a psychotherapist, I wonder: are these dating/hook-up apps making us less (or more) lonely? I hear clients complain that no one wants to really connect, but, if it's really so hard to be your real, vulnerable and un-Photoshopped self on the apps, is this so surprising?

Loaded Baked Potato Salad

One 5 pound bag medium Russet Potatoes 1 cup sour cream 1/2 cup mayonnaise 1 package of bacon, cooked and crumbled 1 small onion, chopped Chives, to taste 1 1/2 cups shredded cheddar cheese Salt and pepper to taste

1. Wash the potatoes and poke holes in them with a fork. Bake at 350 degrees for about an hour or until fork tender.

2. Cool and cut the potatoes into bite sized chunks. I put them in a separate bowl and once they cooled enough I put them in the fridge to cool all the way. This gives them an excellent texture and prevents the dairy ingredients from getting hot or the cheese from melting. If you are serving this salad hot then you don't need to cool the potatoes, just skip that step!

3. Mix the mayo and sour cream together in a bowl. Add to the potatoes, then add the onions, chives, and cheese. Salt and pepper to taste – I use a pepper grinder and a sea salt grinder for EVERYTHING so I never know exactly how much of either I put in. I think the taste is far superior to just using regular

table salt and pepper.

4. Top with extra shredded cheese, bacon, and chives, and serve!

This is a simple and inexpensive side dish for any meal but especially great to take to a barbecue. My favorite part is that this is one of the regular ole recipes that anyone would make without realizing that it happens to be gluten free naturally. Those are my favorite! No special ingredients or expensive grocery stores, just regular food that I can eat along with everybody else. And it's delish!



Texas Politician Claims Same-Sex Couples Won't Survive on a Desert Island

Far-right Republican congressman Louie Gohmert of Texas is still making a case against marriage equality, continuing to use the argument that same-sex couples can't reproduce without assistance.

Gohmert repeated this argument last weekend to journalist Michelangelo Signorile, saying that if samesex couples were put on a desert island, they would not survive, Signorile reported in The Huffington Post.



Signorile approached Gohmert at the Conservative Political Action Conference, where the congressman laid out his case:

"If you want a long-term study on what's the best building block for the family, you can take couples, man and wife couples, put them on an island where they have everything they need to sustain a society. Take all male couples, put them on an island, everything they need to survive. Take all women couples, put them on an island, and all they need to survive. Come back in 100 years and see which building block has been most effective in perpetuating their society and I think it'll tell you all you need to know."

Gohmert made similar comments last year. "We could take four heterosexual couples, married, and put them on an island where they have everything they need to sustain life," he told a youth group then, reported Right Wing Watch.

"Then, take four all-male couples and put them on an island with all they need to sustain life, take four couples of women, married, and put them on an island, and let's come back in 100 to 200 years and see which one nature says is the preferred marriage," he concluded, essentially arguing that the ability to procreate should be a deciding factor in whether a union is legal.

Gohmert, a frequent honoree in The Advocate's Phobie Awards, has a history of over-the-top antigay statements. In the House of Representatives in 2009, he said LGBT-inclusive federal hatecrimes law would offer protections to people who are "oriented toward animals" or "toward corpses, toward children."

Back in 2010, Gohmert testified against the repeal of the military's "don't ask, don't tell," policy, since he believed gay soldiers would be unable to control their "overt feelings of homosexuality" and end up assaulting fellow soldiers. Gohmert equated marriage equality with bestiality during a right-wing conference call in 2013. In 2014, he claimed that LGBT advocates are like Adolf Hitler's Third Reich, bent on silencing those who disagree with them.

Gay College Runner Finds Acceptance

Despite being inadvertently outed, one gay college athlete in Virginia is finding solace in the fact that his track and field teammates are accepting of his sexuality.

In a recent profile by OutSports, College of William and Mary student Cavender Salvadori recalled the process of coming out to his track teammates after his thenboyfriend let the secret slip that he was in a relationship with a man.



"That freaked me the

fuck out," Salvadori said, remembering how his boyfriend told his teammate and friend Jacob Sears that the two had been dating, and how anxious he felt because someone on his team knew his secret. "I can't believe the moment I've been dreading my whole life is about to happen."

Fortunately for Salvadori, Sears was surprisingly supportive of him, as were many other members of the William and Mary track team, and let him know that his being gay made no difference to them.

"He's my teammate, and this didn't change anything," said Sears. "He's my friend. I love him."

Now he presides over a congregation of thousands, with classrooms for Sunday School, a coffee shop in the lobby, and a baptismal font as big as a swimming pool. Today should be a day of celebration. But Paul is about to preach a sermon that will shake the foundations of his church's belief. A big-little play about faith in America—and the trouble with changing your mind.
