

The Georgia-based fast-food chain Chick-fil-A has never hid its conservative leanings, but now the full scope of its antigay agenda is coming to light — according to Equality Matters, the charitable arm of Chick-fil-A distributed over \$1.7 million to antigay groups in 2009 alone.

Chick-fil-A president Dan Cathy has said that his company doesn't carry an



New Hampshire Father Has One Question for the GOP

While Republicans focus their effort to overturn marriage equality in New Hampshire, one of the



state's rank-and-file Republicans is calling on them to consider his family's story.

"Members of my political party and others know me to be a conservative who believes in God, liberty and family values," wrote JP Marzullo, a vice chairman of the Contoocook Valley Republican Party, in the Concord Monitor. "What most of you do not know is that I have a gay son."

Marzullo called on fellow Republicans to consider one question while deciding whether to overturn New Hampshire's marriage equality law: "If you knew your child was gay would you disown him or her?"

The GOP doesn't appear to be answering that question the way Marzullo had hoped. Although the lawmaker who had sponsored a constitutional amendment to ban same-sex marriage is stepping back from his proposal, the Associated Press reports he's only doing it to ensure there are no distractions from passing a repeal of the state's marriage equality law, enacted two years ago by Democrats. That repeal proposal was approved by a committee earlier this week, clearing the way for it to be voted on by the full House, followed by the Senate.

Retiring Democratic Gov. John Lynch has sworn to veto the proposal if it reaches his desk, potentially setting up a struggle over a veto override.

The wider Republican Party also seems to have an answer to Marzullo's question. Texas Gov. Rick Perry, who is campaigning for president in the state, said in a speech last week that New Hampshire lawmakers should pass the repeal.

Marzullo tried in his letter to get Republicans to relate to his family, to realize that not disowning your son also means wanting him to live the fullest possible life.

"He is just like your son," Marzullo wrote. "And like your family, we want to leave him a better country and life, and that includes the same rights as married couples. I believe in freedom for everyone. We are blessed to live in a state where we can all be free to pursue our own happiness."

Nigerian Lawmakers Begin Debate on Anti-Gay Marriage Bill

Lawmakers in Nigeria have began hearings on a bill to criminalize same-sex marriages with penalties of up to five years in prison, Reuters reports.

"[A] marriage contract entered between persons of the same gender is hereby prohibited in Nigeria," a version of the bill before the Nigerian senate reads. Anyone who witnesses or aids in "the solemnisation of a same sex marriage contract com-



mits an offence and is liable to a term of 5 years imprisonment [.]" Same-sex sexual activity is illegal in the country, as are same-sex marriages.

A previous bill on marriage from 2006, which ultimately did not pass, had sought to ban formation of any LGBT clubs and proposed a prison sentence for anyone advocating on gay rights issues.



A Benefits Battle Looms

As the saying goes, the military recruits soldiers, but it retains families.

And, it goes without saying, gay service members have families of their own.

How they will be treated in the incipient post-"don't ask, don't tell" era is an open question, though the current answer is, quite simply, unequally. The subject was a pressing one for many attendees at the recent inaugural



OutServe Armed Forces Leadership Summit, organized by a group that started as a small underground network of gay active duty service members and now reports 4,500 members in 45 chapters worldwide, including two in Iraq and Afghanistan.

It's also an issue seized upon by several Republican presidential hopefuls, however, as well as a handful of GOP House members spurred on by social conservative organizations determined to undermine open service. On Friday, as OutServe conference participants — active duty and retired, out on the job or closet-



ed at work — arrived in Las Vegas to discuss topics from the stress of deployment to navigating available family benefits, one fervent anti-repeal congressman, Rep. Duncan Hunter of California, alleged that attempts at bringing parity to gay service members is part of a devious strategy by the "homosexual lobby," one that "isn't simply pressing to have equal status in the military with people that are heterosexual."

"They would like a military takeover by the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender community, and that's what they're going to keep pushing for until it happens," Hunter, a member of the House Armed Services Committee, told Family Research Council's Tony Perkins on his radio show, Washington Watch (Perkins' organization co-hosted the Values Voter Summit in Washington, D.C. earlier this month, a predictable buffet of antigay rhetoric).

Hunter's absurd claims track the diatribes used by Values Voter speakers at a convention that peddled swag from "Ex-Gay is OK!" buttons to "Don't Mess with Marriage" bracelets. But while DADT repeal is not going to spark some unspecified gay coup in the Armed Forces as Hunter contends, it has served to further highlight the inequities married gay couples face under the Defense of Marriage Act, and in a powerful way. If nearly four in five Americans were in favor of DADT repeal, will they now oppose unequal treatment of gay service members and their families?

Even simple tasks can be obstacles in the current landscape. "It can be so basic as the ability to go shopping in a base commissary to pick up a gallon of milk on the way home," said Army Lt. Col. Todd Burton of Arlington, Va., who attended the Out-Serve summit and came out Sept. 20 on the CBS Evening News as repeal became reality. "The ability to get on an installation to pick up a child — those are very basic things that in the civilian world you don't really have to deal with. It's different when the military moves you around every couple of years, they decide where you're going to live, what you're going to do."

Emerging legal challenges by gay service members and veterans seeking to access the same benefits as their straight counterparts are therefore not surprising. Last week, Carmen Cardona, a disabled Navy veteran who was honorably discharged in 2000 and married her spouse in Connecticut last year, filed a lawsuit in the Court of Appeals for Veterans Claims after she was denied an increase in monthly compensation following her marriage. A regional veterans affairs office cited the federal definition of spouse in rejecting the request.


"If you're legally married, you're not going to receive the two big benefits that are a significant part of your compensation: medical care and housing," Servicemembers Legal Defense Network executive director Aubrey Sarvis said of gay service members. DOMA is not the only culprit: Title 10 of the U.S. Code also defines "spouse" to the exclusion of married gay couples. (SLDN, as the Huffington Post reported Saturday, is preparing its own suit on behalf of service members.)

But the courts do not examine any issue in a social vacuum; educating the public on the unique challenges gay service members face will be crucial moving forward, advocates say.

Joining Forces, the White House's military families campaign launched by First Lady Michelle Obama and Dr. Jill Biden, did not explicitly include gay service members when it began in

April. In a letter to the OutServe summit, read to the more than 200 attendees by Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs Douglas B. Wilson, the First Lady offered at the very least a symbolic step forward, though whether Joining Forces could be an effective national platform for highlighting gay military families remains to be seen.

"Today, less than one percent of Americans serve in our military, but they bear 100 percent of the responsibility of protecting our Nation," Mrs. Obama wrote. "Until very recently, gay and lesbian Americans had to serve in silence, but in spite of this tremendous obstacle, service members like you persevered. ... I truly hope Joining Forces makes a real impact in your lives, and I hope it is worthy of the strength and commitment you and your families demonstrate every single day."

Wilson, who is the first openly gay assistant secretary in the Defense Department, said of Joining Forces, "The repeal of 'don't ask, don't tell' is a statement that part of that one percent are gay and lesbian troops, and that they have families, too."

SLDN and other groups are pushing for benefits not precluded under DOMA for those families, pointing to federal agencies such as the State Department, which under Secretary of State Hillary Clinton extended benefits including diplomatic passports and use of

medical facilities abroad to same-sex partners of foreign service officers. "I'm hopeful that the doors are going to continue to be open over there," Sarvis said of the Pentagon, "We've requested a sit-down meeting with [Secretary of Defense Leon Panetta] and I'm hopeful that that's going to come through in the next 30 days."

Of the benefits battle, Wilson said, "As you know, there's a [DADT] repeal implementation team at the Pentagon. The repeal part is done. The implementation part continues."

Lesbian Homecoming King and Queen Couple Bombarded with Hate Mail

A lesbian couple who was elected homecoming king and queen of their San Diego high school are now being met with hate mail from outraged people across the country, according to NBC San Diego.

Homecoming king Rebeca Arellano and her girlfriend, homecoming queen Haileigh Adams, were crowned at Patrick Henry High School on Friday. Arellano described the night as being "one of the most amazing experiences" she's ever had, and both students reported support from their classmates and teachers. However, the school has received phone calls and angry letters about the girls' achievement.

San Diego School District Superintendent Bill Kowba said the calls have come from adults outside of the city. He added that the district rejects such intolerance, and that he supports the student body's decision to elect Arellano and Adams. According

to NBC San Diego, Kowba said if the same messages came from students, they would likely face disciplinary action.

HAPPINESS:

What is it and how to get more of it

Happiness: what a topic! Most of my clients want to be happier...they want more happiness and less suffering in their lives. Who doesn't? But, what is happiness? We all know it when we feel it, or do we? Is it feeling good, joyful, optimistic, healthy, alive? Or is it a deeper



sense of pleasure, satisfaction, well-being? A wise old (straight) colleague of mine claims that "the happiest time of life for men is ages 60-69 and the unhappiest period is ages 20-29". Is this true for all of us, or just straight men? Is happiness for us LGBTers related to coming out, reducing our internalized homophobia, staying physically healthy, having a good group of friends and sense of community? Is it true – as many new age gurus claim – that happiness is a choice? Is it also true – as Freud claimed – that it takes more effort to be happy than it does to be unhappy?

Happiness is self-defined: your happiness may not look or feel like mine. The things that make your boyfriend happy may not make you happy, and vice-versa. Happiness is experienced not only in our neocortex (where our thoughts reside), but also on a total body level: a happy body is full of energy, flexibility, aliveness and strength. It can take you almost anywhere and recover quickly from difficult situations. Let's define what happiness is for you.

Complete this sentence: For me, real happiness is

I recommend that you complete the sentence several times: your answers may "deepen" the more you think about it. Let your answer(s) be as long as you like, the more you write, the more your subconscious may get activated and you may get answers that surprise you. Once you've completed the sentence a few times, take a look at your answers: is there a theme? Are there links between the things you wrote? For example, are most of the things you wrote related to social events, physical activities or things done in solitude? Just notice, don't judge. It's just information.

Here are some other questions to help identify what you define as happiness:

- When was the last time you really felt happy?
- What kinds of things have brought you happiness in the past?
- When was the last time you did any of those things?
- Who are some people you know who seem to be happy? What is it about them that makes them happy? What are they like?

In my work with clients, I often use elements of Buddhist psychology to help clients identify and eliminate the sources of their suffering and locate the source of their happiness. For example, if you hook your happiness onto someone else (e.g., your partner) or some event happening in a certain way (e.g., your boss being kind to you), your happiness is shaky. A more solid, lasting happiness has got to come from a lasting source... a source that you can control. The only thing you can control is your mind and body...and that's a challenge in itself.

For some people, this is where spirituality comes in. God or Spirit is seen as the only unchanging source of happiness and, in theory, we need to align with this essence or presence in order to have a continual pipeline to happiness. Well, all you spiritual folks out there, how easy it THAT to pull off? Quite difficult, isn't it? It doesn't matter whether you have a spiritual belief system or not, happiness has got to come from within. There's nothing else we have guaranteed access to: money, your partner, your job, your house, it's all temporary and can be here today, gone tomorrow.

In an effort to avoid a cookbook mentality, here are some possible ways to experience more happiness: Identify what historically has brought you happiness and unhappiness.

Study people that you think are happier than you are. What do they have that you don't? If you can, ask them about themselves and how they find their happiness.

Begin to quiet your mind: any activity that brings you more peace and quiet is setting the stage for happiness.

Find ways to let yourself be more spontaneous, e.g., more yourself: do you need to spend a day hiking, an afternoon playing golf, an evening dancing your ass off until the dance club closes? How can you loosen up more?

Live more in the moment. Notice when you're off in future hopes or dreams and kindly bring yourself back to this moment. Happiness is only available NOW, not tomorrow and not yesterday. If you're stuck in the past, overanalyzing something for the millionth time, gently bring yourself back to the present.

Experiment with being more flexible; if you can "go with the flow", your odds of happiness increase exponentially. If you have to have things your way, happiness is unlikely to fly in your window...because you're got it bolted shut and locked down.

Forgiveness is another path to happiness. The person you refuse to forgive for their stupid behavior is probably off at the beach having a good time while you're still stuck in your misery. Forgiveness isn't about making the other person feel better; it helps you feel better, and brings you one step closer to experiencing more happiness.

Fitness Corner

Knowing what to do when you are injured is a critical element in maintaining your overall health and fitness. Obviously if there is a serious injury you are not going to need my advice. You are cutting edge enough to

phone for help or get to an emergency care center. However, if you suffer a minor injury, such as a muscle strain or sprain, then you can take measures to recovery on your own. Apply the RICE acronym which stands for rest, ice, compression, and elevation.

Rest will be necessary to get you eventually back on that horse you were thrown from. Limit most of your activities for a few days to give your body a chance to heal that minor injury. Rest will certainly help you avoid wreaking any further damage upon the area of your body that is in pain. Watch a movie, read a book, or write a letter to Santa while you remain on your sofa.

Ice is needed to get the swelling from your injury to subside. Moreover, you should apply ice or cold water to the affected area as soon as possible. If you opt to use ice then put it in a wrap or bag to avoid direct contact with your skin. You can also soak the affected area in cold water in your bathtub or that big bucket you have in the kitchen. Use this ice treatment for 20 minutes at a time and on several occasions each day for several days.

Compression helps the injured area get back to normal sooner than if left unattended. This process minimizes swelling and that subsequently speeds the healing of the sprain or strain. Elastic wraps or bandages are good to use and can be found at all the pharmacy stores. Wrap the injury firmly but not too tight. The last thing you want to do is create a loss of circulation. That would be a whole other issue to deal with!

Elevation is the last part of the acronym that is asking for your attention. By keeping the injured portion of your body elevated, you help minimize excessive swelling. The important thing to remember here is to keep the injured area above the level of your heart. Dangling your sprained ankle for hours while watching Desperate Housewives is not going to get you the results you are seeking. Propping up that ankle on some pillows while on the sofa and watching those wacky Wisteria women would be much more effective at minimizing swelling. You can even take some anti-inflammatory medications like aspirin and ibuprofen to assist with your application of the RICE principle. If the injury persists beyond several days and doesn't show signs of abating then seek outside medical attention.

A key component of your health and fitness is in knowing how to manage through the difficult and unexpected moments. This includes your injuries. Apply the RICE method the next time you twist your ankle or suffer that minor injury and get back in the game much sooner!
