### Baltimore Passes Amended Transgender Rights Bill

The Baltimore County Council passed a bill today to extend its standing human rights ordinance to protect LGBT citizens from discrimination.

The bill, which passed 5-2, prohibits discrimination against people in the Maryland County based on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity when it comes to housing, employment, education, financing, or public accommodations, according to WMAR News. The legislation does not include any mention of locker rooms and bathrooms, which became contentious areas of debate.

The bill makes Baltimore County the fourth municipality in Maryland to extend such protections.

Republicans Todd Huff of Lutherville and David Marks of Perry Hall voted against the measure, even though Marks previously had indicated he would support the bill, the Baltimore Sunreports.

### Rick Santorum Attacks Media for Asking About Social Issues

The candidate now says it's the media who keeps forcing him to talk about antigay issues. But we looked around, and at almost every point across the country the topic has come up.

Presidential candidate Rick Santorum has bragged many times during the campaign about his credentials on social issues. But when asked Friday about adoption by gay people, he sniped at a reporter for "trying to create this perception that this is what Rick Santorum talks about."



"Is a lesbian or a gay couple who adopt children, is that a family?" asked a reporter from WKAR in Michigan.

"Of course it's a family," Santorum scoffed.

The reporter followed up, asking whether he thought the family was immoral. Then Santorum took a page from Newt Gingrich and attacked the media for even asking.

"I think I have answered that question probably more than any other candidate in this race," he said. "The preoccupation with this question with me can be a little trying after a while. I don't think you ask these questions of everybody else with the insistency that you do with me."

Santorum claimed it was part of a media conspiracy to paint him as extreme on social issues.

"I understand the game," he told the reporter. "You are trying to create this perception that this is what Rick Santorum talks about. It's because I get asked these questions all the time, which is why they get told I talk about it."

Santorum has said he wants to pass a federal constitutional amendment banning same-sex marriage and that it would lead to banning adoption by gays nationwide. He's also said on the campaign trail that children would be better off having a heterosexual father in prison than being raised by two moms.

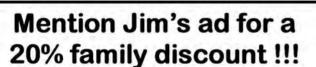

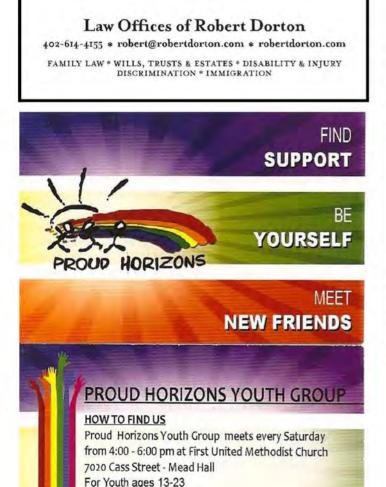

### Facing Deadline, Prop. 8 Backers Seek Full Review by Appeals Court

With Tuesday serving as the deadline for Prop. 8 proponents to request another appeal on the ruling that declared the voter initiative unconstitutional, proponents of California's same-sex marriage ban say they're seeking a full review by the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals.

Prop. 8 attorney Charles Cooper tellsMetroWeekly that he is seeking en banc review for the case — Prop. 8 was declared unconstitutional in 2010 by a federal judge, and a three judge appellate panel upheld that ruling two weeks ago. Now, the group ProtectMarriage, behind the 2008 antigay initiative, are seeking more of the Ninth Circuit to review the case. A majority of the approximately 20 Ninth Circuit judges have to approve an en banc review. Because the Ninth Circuit is a large circuit, they could approve a partial en banc, which would allow 11 judges to rule on the constitutionality of Prop. 8.

The en banc request will likely keep the case out of the Supreme Court until the 2012 presidential election. It's not exactly clear how this will effect marriage equality resuming in California, but the stay on marriages will likely continue until the Ninth Circuit decides whether to review the three judge decision.

### Staples Co-Founder: Allowing **Breastfeeding At Work** Will 'Kill Jobs'

Staunch Republican donor and co-founder of Staples. Tom Stemberg, has a grave concern that might just throw the fragile economic recovery into the into a precipitous tailspin: breastfeeding. Stemberg, who has contributed tens of thousands of dollars to Romney's campaign and SuperPAC, ironically enough has urged repealing healthcare to be the first on the next president's "to-do" list. ### Washington State Governor Gregoire Signs Same-Sex Marriage Bill

An emotional Gov. Chris Gregoire signed legislation Monday making Washington the seventh state to legalize marriage between same-sex couples, declaring it was time "to make history in this great state."

Gregoire's voice broke as she described conversations with her two daughters, who told her that marriage equality was "the civil rights issue of their generation . . . Thank you to that younger generation and my two daughters."

The governor presided at a ceremony in Olympia, joined by legislative leaders and the longtime same-sex partners of such lawmakers as Sen. Ed Murray and Reps. Jamie Pedersen and Laurie Jinkins

### A LOW STRESS LIFE

Today I got a call from a new client, who asked me, "Can you help me lower my stress and anxiety? I don't want to take medication. Oh, and by the way, I'm kinda depressed too." This is a common request. Despite TV commercials that show relaxed, happy people running in fields, blessed out on their new anti-



depressants or anti-anxiety medications, many people don't want to take pills. Many pills have a lot of side effects, some of which may be worse than the anxiety or stress itself. And many people don't want to feel "dependent" on pills. I am not an MD, so I don't prescribe medication for my clients. For some people, medication works. For the rest of you who prefer to lower your stress and anxiety without medication, this column is for you. Here are some suggestions for reducing your stress, anxiety, panic and worry without taking medication.

Try a simple 3-5 minute meditation: sit comfortably in a chair or sofa and let your feet rest easily on the floor. Relax and allow the chair to hold you up; you don't have to do anything. Let your eyes gently close. Put your hands on your stomach and begin to breathe deeply and easily. As you breathe in, say to yourself, "I am breathing in." As you breathe out, say to yourself, "I am breathing out." Notice the easy rising and falling of your stomach as you breathe. If thoughts come into your mind, let the thoughts be like clouds: they float into your mind and easily float out. Enjoy your breathing.

Get away from people on a regular basis. Even if you adore your partner or you are the mother of 5 fabulous kids, you need to periodically get away from people. One client I know – a stay-at-home dad - leaves his beloved partner and their son and goes to a coffee shop, reads the paper and people-watches at least once a week. Another client of mine takes a bubble bath and locks the door. Her partner and kids are not allowed to disturb her during her 30 minutes in the tub.

Create a relaxing morning and evening routine. When you wake up and just before you fall asleep are two times of day when your conscious is very receptive to positive (or negative) thoughts. Even if you're super-energetic, don't leap out of bed and try to control your day from the get-go. Let yourself wake up gradually...you might even make a statement of gratitude like "Thank you for another day." This sets the tone for your day. You can also do the 3-minute meditation (see above) when you wake up. Before going to sleep, don't read the newspaper or watch the news; you don't want to take all those disasters to sleep with you. Instead, create a simple routine for yourself that calms you and sets the tone for the kinds of dreams you want to have.

Get enough sleep. Experiment; find out how many hours of sleep really makes your body happy. What time is it best for you to go to bed/wake up? Don't compare yourself with other people, your body is unique. Once you find what works, stick with it as much as possible. A predictable sleep schedule promotes deep, stress-reducing sleep.

Moderate your sugar, caffeine and alcohol intake. Sugar and caffeine highs and the crashes that follow make it hard to stay relaxed and grounded. Alcohol can temporarily relax you, but you pay a price later...usually in lousy sleep or low energy the next day. If you know you're going to be drinking a lot, keep the next day as undemanding as possible.

Find outlets for your anger and frustration. You can't live in this world without getting pissed off at times. Even the Dalai Lama loses his temper and Mother Teresa was no pushover. For some of us, this means a physical outlet. I used to have a punching bag suspended in my bedroom, and I'd hit it with boxing gloves when I was frustrated or annoyed. Writing can be a good way to discharge intense emotions. So can music: find yourself a nice, aggressive and angry song to sing along with when you're irritated and pissed off. Some people go dancing at Rich's or Urban Mo's and sweat through their clothes, thoroughly discharging all the negative emotions they've held onto all day.

Know your limits. Sometimes, feelings of anxiety, panic or depression are too much for us. If you have suicidal feelings, pay attention: this may be a sign that you need professional help. Call your doctor, therapist or go to the nearest hospital emergency room and ask for help from the on-duty psychiatrist.

In this world, living a low-stress life is an ongoing challenge. Whether you live in a fabulous mansion or a tiny studio apartment, there's no escaping stress, anxiety and worry. The above ideas are a start. This stuff works when they do it, but it's hard to do it all the time. Not to worry: the goal is a long-term, sustainable reduction of stress and anxiety in your life. Try these ideas and see if they work for you, keep the ones that do and let the others go.

The law goes into effect on June 7, unless opponents succeed in gathering 120,577 valid voter signatures to force a referendum in November. If so, marriage equality would be held up pending a decision by Washington voters.

Gregoire predicted that Washington, for the second time, would vote to ratify a major piece of gay/lesbian civil rights legislation. Washington voted in favor of Referendum in 2009, becoming the first state to ratify an "everything but marriage" domestic partner law.

"Washington will say yes because a family is a family," Gregoire declared. "It is time to give our loving gay and lesbian couples a chance to have a married life in the state of Washington.

Gregoire told of receiving a letter from a 16-year-old girl who had just come to grips with her sexual orientation. In the future, said the governor, the young woman will "not have to get on bended knee and ask, 'Will you civil union me'." Kids in schools will not have to have their parents seen as "somewhat different than other loving parents." Gregoire added.

"I'm proud that our same-sex couples will no longer be treated as separate but equal," the governor said.

Opponents show no sign of slackening their opposition. "We ARE going to exercise our right to referendum and reject this law," declared the website of the Family Policy Institute of Washington.

There was coast-to-coast action on marriage equality Monday. As Gregoire signed Washington's bill into law, the New Jersey State Senate voted 24-16 to legalize same-sex marriage in the Garden State. State Assembly approval is expected. But Republican Gov. Chris Christie says he will veto the legislation.

Ex-Sen. Rick Santorum, a scathing critic of marriage equality, will meet this afternoon in Olympia with opponents of the bill Gregoire signed into law. The Republican presidential candidate holds a rally with supporters tonight at the Washington State History Museum in Tacoma.

The Family Policy Institute and the Catholic Archdiocese of Seattle had asked followers to call on Gregoire to veto the marriage equality bill. A statement by diocesan bishops, critical of the law, was included Sunday in Catholic parish bulletins.

Other faith groups in the state have endorsed marriage equality. Episcopal Bishop Greg Rickel has described it as a "conservative" step in which society recognizes and encourages fidelity in human relationships. The Faith Action Network has lobbied for the legislation. Churches hosted meetings at which Washington United for Marriage mobilized support for the legislation.

Under the law, no church or religious denomination is required to marry same-sex couples -- or anybody. "This bill preserves freedom of religion for our churches: Absolutely nothing changes in the state of Washington," said Gregoire, herself a practicing Catholic.

New York, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Iowa, Vermont, New Hampshire and the District of Columbia currently allow same-sex couples to marry.

New York approved marriage equality last year in a manner replicated by Washington. A Catholic governor -- Andrew Cuomo -- championed the legislation. Four Republicans in the New York State Senate provided crucial backing, as did four GOP members of the Washington State Senate.

Washington has passed three landmark gay/lesbian civil rights bills during Gregoire's tenure as governor. The first civil rights bill was passed in 2006, after a 19-year effort. Domestic partnership was approved two years later.

"Years from now, our kids will look back and ask what all the fuss was about," joked Rep. Pederson. Pedersen pointed proudly to "my partner and future husband Eric," who stood a few feet away, baby in hand,

Sen. Ed Murray has worked 17 years on civil rights and marriage equality. He came to the Legislature after the death of State Sen. Cal. Anderson, Washington's first gay lawmaker, who had worked eight years on civil rights legislation.

"My friends, welcome to the other side of the rainbow," said Murray. "No matter what the future holds, nothing will take this moment away from us.'

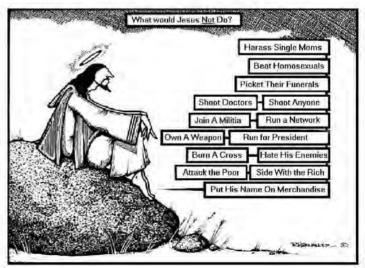
