



HIV on the Rise Among Young Gay Men

A Belgian study released Tuesday suggests that unsafe sex practices among young gay men may be contributing significantly to the rise of the disease in Europe, London's Guardian reports.



In their analysis of the viral genetic information found in 500 HIV-positive patients, including both heterosexual and gay subjects, researchers at Ghent University found that one cluster of the virus was found almost exclusively among young gay men — many of whom were also infected with other sexually transmitted diseases, indicating they may not be using condoms.

"Members of this cluster are significantly younger than the rest of the population and have more Chlamydia and syphilis infections," researchers wrote. "We clearly demonstrate that, despite the existence of prevention programs, easily available testing facilities and a supposedly broad public awareness of the infection and its possible routes of transmission, [men who have sex with men] still account for the majority of local onward transmissions."

Iowa Divorce Rate Down Since Marriage Equality

The Iowa Independent News Network reported in its September 8th issue that since marriage equality came to Iowa April 3, 2009, the divorce rate in Iowa has dropped to its lowest per capita level since 1968. What that appears to indicate is that same-sex marriage does have an impact on marriage....in a positive way. So, at least in Iowa, same-sex marriage is saving the institution of marriage.

The article also had some other interesting facts. Statewide, one in ten Iowa marriages are now same-sex marriages. In Pottawattamie County, where Council Bluffs is located, one in four marriages (25%) are same-sex marriages. Pottawattamie County tied with Johnson County (home to Iowa City) as the counties with higher per-

centage of same-sex marriages.





UNLEARNING JEALOUSY

"Let jealousy be your teacher. Jealousy can lead you to the very places where you most need healing. It can be your guide into your own dark side and show you the way to total self-realization. Jealousy can teach you how to live in peace with your-you how with the understand if your



self and with the whole world if you let it."

Jealousy feels lousy; most of us do whatever we can not to go
there. Why do we give it so much power to make us miserable? Why do some people use jealousy as an "excuse" to go
berserk? Ask yourself: what is jealousy to me? For many of
my clients, it's an expression of insecurity, fear, rejection, abandonment, feeling inadequate, etc. Unlearning jealousy is a
wonderful thing. I help clients with this all the time. It's a
gradual process that takes time and introspection, but the results
are always worth it.

To unlearn jealousy, I help clients establish within themselves a strong foundation of internal security that is not dependent on having or possessing people or things. If we think we own someone or something, we're stuck in jealousy. We don't own our partners, jobs, kids, looks, or health...we're really just "renting" them. We can't make people stay with us, nor can we hold onto something good forever. It's in the nature of people and phenomena to be impermanent...ideally, we'll enjoy them while they're here and gracefully let go when it's time. Sounds good, hard to do.

One of the keys to unlearning jealousy is self-validation. Slowly, we can begin the process of looking to ourselves for our own happiness (an internal orientation) and needing less and less from other people, places or things (an external orientation). Start small...begin to develop your own internal compass. For example, when you do something well, don't call your best friend right away to blurt it out. Instead, give yourself praise and encouragement. People who take loving care of themselves are seldom jealous.

Jealous people need other people to do as they say. Because they don't have strong internal compasses, they cling to people and situations to feel okay. Jealous people usually feel out of control, so they want to control their partners, friends and everyone in their path. This isn't because they're cruel; it's because they're scared.

Becoming your own source of strength and comfort decreases your jealousy. When someone does something they don't like, a jealous person feels personally betrayed. A secure person notices it and may say, "I don't like that. Please don't do it again." and a calm, reasonable conversation can follow where a compromise can be reached. Sound familiar? It's how people maintain long-term friendships/romantic relationships. It can't always be about you. For jealous people, it is all about them, because they're so insecure and unstable they need you to do

what they say and not "upset" them.

When I work with clients who feel stuck in their jealousy, I ask them if they are WILLING to not act out their jealousy (no more screaming, name-calling or throwing things). Instead, we work together so they can sit with their jealous feelings, identify and analyze them; this strips the jealous feelings of their power. I encourage my clients to feel their jealousy rather than act it out. This is initially uncomfortable, and many people tell me things like "it'll kill me to feel this bad". But, It won't. However, habitually acting out from jealousy will kill your friendships, romances, careers and even your own aliveness. I encourage my clients to OWN their jealousy. "I feel jealous because my boyfriend was checking that guy out" or "I think my girlfriend is cheating on me because she was at the grocery store longer than usual." Intense jealousy reeks of paranoia. and that brings us nothing but misery and craziness. But, thereis good news: if you are willing to sit still and listen to your jealous little self with compassion, you quickly discover that jealousy is survivable. That alone is shocking to lots of people. Unlearning jealousy isn't easy, but, it sure feels good the more you do it.

I'll close with a quote from the wonderful book, Ethical Sluts (authors: D. Easton & C. Liszt):

"I notice that jealousy comes and goes, depending on how good I feel about myself. When I'm not taking care of getting what I want, it's easy to get jealous and think that someone else is getting what I'm not. I need to remember that it's my job to get my needs met. I feel the jealousy, but I'm not willing to act on it, so it mostly goes away."

And that, dear readers, is how it works.

Mr. Gay U.K. Denies Rape Charge

Mark Carter, a former Mr. Gay U.K and Yorkshire police officer. appeared in court Monday to deny charge of sex offenses



including the rape of another man.

According to the Yorkshire Post, "He appeared at Leeds Crown Court today and pleaded not guilty to two counts of rape and three sexual assaults."

The charges against Carter, 27, involve four different alleged victims between December 18 and 19, reports the Post.

Carter, who was crowned Mr. Gay U.K. in 2006, has been suspended by the West Yorkshire Police and was granted conditional bail Monday. He will appear in Leeds Crown Court December 13 for trial.

Atlanta Black Gay Pride Attendees Killed

Two men found dead from gunshots Sunday night in southeast Atlanta were among the attendees at the city's Black Gay Pride events over the Labor Day weekend.

According to The Atlanta Journal-Constitution, the victims were identified as Calvin Streater, 26, of Atlanta and Samuel Blizzard, Jr., 21, of Virginia. Blizzard was a student at Georgia State University.

"A friend found the victims in an apartment at the Station at Richmond Hill Apartments, in the 1700 block of Richmond Circle," reported the Journal-Constitution.

Police, who said the men attended the Black Gay Pride festivities, believe the victims knew their killer.

According to the GA Voice, police said there was no evidence that the men's attendance at the gay event motivated the shooting, but the investigation remained "wide open" by Monday afternoon.

Late last month, Black Gay Pride organizer Durand Robinson was found shot to death on a street in southwest Atlanta. Police continue to investigate the murder.

DADT Repeal Fails in Senate

The tone was set for a devastating rejection of an effort to end the 17-year-old policy that bans gays and lesbians from serving



openly in the military as soon as GOP senator Olympia Snowe sent out an ominous statement Monday afternoon.

By Tuesday afternoon, repeal advocates lost Sen. Susan Collins, who said she would join a GOP filibuster unless Senate majority leader Harry Reid agreed to open the debate. The loss of Collins was the Democrats' last best chance for beating a GOP filibuster that would prevent the Senate from moving forward with debate on the National Defense Authorization Act, to which the "don't ask, don't tell" repeal measure was attached.

By the time the dust settled, Republicans had prevailed 56-43. Repeal advocates swiftly decried the outcome as the product of a massive political failure but vowed not to give up till year's end despite an increasingly bleak outlook for the effort.

"Today's vote is a failure of leadership on the part of those who have been duly elected to serve this nation and to put the best interests of the country ahead of partisan politics," said Alexander Nicholson, executive director of the gay veterans group Servicemembers United. "It is simply inexcusable that this vote failed today."

But Aubrey Sarvis, executive director of the Servicemembers Legal Defense Network, acknowledged what everyone knew.

"We now have no choice but to look to the lame-duck session, where we'll have a slim shot," Sarvis said. "The Senate absolutely must schedule a vote in December, when cooler heads

and common sense are more likely to prevail once midterm elections are behind us."

Indeed, Sen. Joseph Lieberman indicated earlier in the day that he fully expected Reid to push the legislation again following the November election.

"I spoke to Senator Reid today, and he's very clear and strong that he's going to bring this bill to the floor in November or December — hopefully November — because he has to, because the military needs the bill."

Lieberman said he didn't believe opponents of repeal had the votes to strip it out of the legislation.

"Maybe that's why they're fighting so hard," he offered.

Following the defeat, Sen. Carl Levin called it "outrageous" that a filibuster was used to block mere consideration of the legislation.

"It's a sad, sad day, when the defense authorization bill is filibustered to the point where we can't even debate that bill," Levin said. "The Senate filibuster on motions to proceed cannot be allowed to succeed."

If the Senate fails to pass the defense funding bill before the end of the year, Levin said a continuing resolution could be passed to address some budgetary needs of the Pentagon, but that such a fix would not suffice for all defense needs.

Sen. Jack Reed, who joined Levin at the press conference, said he hoped the Senate could still strike an agreement to debate the bill before recessing for the midterms. But he also suggested that the Pentagon itself may have funding needs that make the NDAA a more urgent consideration during the lame-duck session.

"But there will be increasingly, I think, specific issues that will emerge about provisions that they must have that I think will help convince some of our colleagues that we've gotta get this bill done." Reed said.

Levin was hesitant to signal the likelihood that the NDAA might get new life in the waning days of the congressional session but added, "I will do everything I can to see that the bill is brought up during lame duck."

Pastor Accused of Sex with Minor

A prominent Atlanta, Ga. pastor has been accused of forcing two male members of his church to have sex with him. Lawsuits in DeKalb County, Ga. were filed Tuesday against Rev. Eddie Long, who heads up the New Birth Missionary Baptist Church, according to the Associated Press. The plaintiffs, Anthony Flagg, 21, and Maurice Murray Robinson, 20, were members of the church.

Each of the men said Long forced them to have sexual relationships while they traveled around the world. The men were 17 and 18 at the time of the alleged exchanges.

Russian Gay Activist



Arrested at Protest

Leading Russian gay activist Nikolai Alekseev was arrested Tuesday evening in a protest outside Moscow City Hall, marking his second detention by authorities in a week.

Despite his recent prolonged detainment, Alekseev, the organizer of the Moscow gay pride celebration, joined 10 other activists in a protest against Mayor Yuri Luzhkov, who is widely recognized for homophobic remarks and opposition to the pride event.

According to UK Gay News, "Mr. Alekseev said that he was injured during his arrest. He was speaking by telephone from inside a police van from which other activists were heard chanting 'happy birthday Mayor Luzhkov' — it is the Mayor's 74th birthday today."



Alekseev returned to Moscow on Saturday after an ordeal in which he claims that police, who may have been agents for the successor to the KGB, abducted him in an effort to pressure him to drop a complaint in the European Court of Human Rights against Moscow authorities for their repeated bans on

The Tulsa, Okla., school board will add sexual orientation to its nondiscrimination policy for students, staff, and parents.

The unanimous vote on Monday approving the policy addition was made in accordance with the U.S. Department of Education's office of civil rights, Tami Marler (pictured), a spokeswoman for the school district, told the Tulsa World.

Toby Jenkins of Oklahomans for Equality told The Advocate in an e-mail that the vote "took decades of behind-the-scenes work."

"We are pretty proud of this in the heartland," he said.

Witt on DADT: "It Kills Me"

Major Margaret
Witt, the decorated
Air Force Reserve
flight nurse discharged under the
"don't ask, don't
tell" policy, said
during her federal
trial Monday that it
"kills me" not to be
able to care for the
nation's wounded
soldiers in war time.



According to the Associated Press, Witt took the stand as a witness in the trial seeking her reinstatement in a Tacoma, Wash. courtroom.

"It's what I've spent over half my life training to do," said Witt as her voice broke, according to the AP. "I miss being able to be the one that that soldier looks at and I can do something for him. I'm not complete, and it kills me to not be there."

Witt sued the Air Force when she was discharged in 2006 after she was outed. In 2008 the U.S. court of appeals for the ninth circuit overturned a dismissal of Witt's case and ruled that the government must show that discharging a gay service member is necessary to preserve morale and unit cohesion.

Closing arguments are expected in the case Wednesday. It is not clear when Judge Ronald B. Leighton will rule.

Managers of the Miami Knight Center, however, cited First Amendment concerns for their decision to go ahead as scheduled with the Banton and Beenie Man show. Ticket sales were much lower than expected, though, and the show's promoter told Equality Florida that he had personally lost \$100,000 as a result of the controversy.

A new series of videos sponsored by the Human Rights Campaign in New York will personalize marriage equality with messages from celebrities and political leaders including Julianne Moore, Fran Drescher, Mayor Michael Bloomberg, and Whoopi Goldberg.

According to The New York Times, the commercials are timed to coincide with hope for another marriage equality vote in the state senate in early 2011. The marriage equality bill failed the senate by a vote of 38-24 last December, and powerful Catholic leaders have vowed to fight the bill again.

Brian Ellner, a former Bloomberg aide who heads HRC's Campaign for New York Marriage, thought of the ads, which will appear online first and on television as a marriage equality vote nears.

"In interviews, those appearing in the videos expressed puzzle-




ment and dismay that New York had fallen behind states like Vermont, Massachusetts and Iowa in legalizing same-sex marriage," reports the Times.

Others expected to appear in the ads include Kyra Sedgwick, the Rev. Al Sharpton, Kevin Bacon, the chef Tom Colicchio, and Jeanne Moutoussamy-Ashe, the widow of Arthur Ashe.

Fitness Corner

The last police car leaves the scene. The blood, glass fragments, and some torn clothing are all that remain of the accident. Wit-

nesses will remember seeing the speeding Buick Skylark hit the person and throw him 50 feet into the city park. The runner will be lucky to ever exercise again. It's a jungle out there for us runners but there are proactive measures we can take to avoid all the mayhem.

Run against traffic when there aren't sidewalks and you are forced into the streets. It is better to see what is approaching you then to turn your back on it.

Tell someone where you are going to go running. It is always a great idea to let your roommate, spouse, or best friend know what course you plan on completing. If you don't come back it is much easier to have the bloodhounds retrace your running path to search for you.

Keep an identification tag on your person at all times when out running. The tag should include your name, address, and an emergency contact for you. Attach this to your shoe, shirt, shorts, or anywhere that is attached to you. In the event of an emergency, your name will be something other than John Doe. Keep your eyes and ears open at all times. Just know your surroundings and look and listen for danger. IPods and headphones are not a good idea when running. It sure helps to have Lady GaGa and Kenny Chesney in your ears when you're finishing a five mile course in the heat.
