Pakistani Serial Killer Wanted to Punish Homosexuals

A serial killer in Lahore, Pakistan has confessed to murdering three gay men, saying that he carried out the killings in order to send a warning to homosexuals to stop but police say he had sex with his victims before killing them.

28-year-old Muslim father of two Muhammed Ejaz used his skills as a paramedic to sedate his victims and then broke their necks to kill the men.

One of his victims was a middle aged retired army major while the other two men were in their twenties.



Ejaz would have killed again if police had not gotten to his potential fourth victim before him and used him to ambush Ejaz.

Police found Ejaz's phone number in all three men's phones. Ejaz maintains he is not gay but police say he had slept with his potential fourth victim at least once before.

Ejaz told AFP that he had become concerned about Lahore being overrun by homosexuals and that he set about using his mobile phone and a gay dating app to do something about it.

'The gays are everywhere in Lahore,' Ejaz said. 'They are spreading evil and transmitting diseases. They cannot control themselves.' Ejaz said that his hatred for homosexuals stemmed from being molested by an older boy at age 10.

'I have hated them ever since what happened to me,' Ejaza said. Ejaz told AFP his motivation was right but he had come to believe his method was too extreme.

'My way was wrong. It is tragic that the families have lost their relatives but they were spreading evil in society and I had to stop it,' Ejaz said. 'I wanted to warn them to stay away from this evil.'

Letter to Pope: Protect LGBT Youth

The head of a homeless shelter for LGBT youth published an open letter to Pope Francis in The New York Times, asking the leader of the Catholic Church to change its teaching on homosexuality.

A PLEA TO POPE FRANCIS

ON BEHALF OF HOMELESS LGBT YOUTH

Noting that religious parents
tend to reject their LGBT children at higher rates than their
secular or less religious counterparts, Carl Siciliano, executive
director of New York's Ali Forney Center, wrote, "Jesus Christ
is never recorded as having said a word in judgment or condemnation of homosexuality or of LGBT people. He spoke of a
loving, compassionate God, and commanded his followers to
act with love and compassion. Jesus spoke of God as a loving
parent who would never abandon his children."

In an interview with The Advocate, Siciliano said that he is
""less interested in words than actions, and the church's hostilities against gay people haven't stopped at all," citing the rash
of firings of gay people in



of firings of gay people in Catholic institutions and the Catholic bishops continued public opposition to marriage equality efforts.

Still, he said, he admires the pope's focus on economic justice, and said he approached the issue of homeless LGBT youth from that angle.

When families reject their LGBT kids for religious reasons, the consequences include "economic destitution," he said.

Siciliano, a Catholic and former Benedictine monk, noted in the letter that, last year, over 200,000 LGBT youths experienced homelessness, and that LGBT youth make up 40 percent of the homeless youth population, despite being only about 5 percent of the overall youth cohort.

"The teaching that homosexual conduct is a sin has a poisonous (Continued on page 2)

outcome, bearing fruit in many Christian parents who abandon their LGBT children to homelessness and destitution. How could a good seed yield such a bitter harvest?" Siciliano wrote.

Siciliano wrote that he has "great respect" for Pope Francis, and invited him to visit the Ali Forney Center, "to meet our abandoned youths and see for yourself how their lives have been devastated and made destitute by religious rejection. I believe that there is no more compelling witness to the harmfulness of the condemnation of homosexuality than the consequent suffering plainly visible in the eyes of our homeless LGBT youths."

In 2012, Siciliano invited New York's Cardinal Timothy Dolan to visit the Ali Forney Center. Dolan declined.

In the letter, Siciliano said he wants the church to change its teachings on homosexuality, and for Pope Francis to "prevent your bishops from fighting against the acceptance of LGBT people as equal members of society."

Overall, Siciliano said he is seeking a culture change. He said that the LGBT movement has made progress in overturning antigay laws, but that the lives of LGBT youth are more affected by the culture in homes and schools, both of which can be influenced by religion.

"If we don't address this, if we don't take this on, we won't be protecting our kids," he said.

"I want to see Catholics, and Southern Baptists, and Methodists and Presbyterians say, 'we're not gonna let our kids be hurt anymore," he said. "If the message is loud enough and clear enough" the animosity LGBT youth experience will begin to wane.

He said that there are glimmers of hope in the religious sphere, pointing to the work of individual Episcopalians, Catholics, and others of faith who volunteer at the Ali Forney Center.

"I don't read the gospels and see antigay hatred," he said.

While Catholics in the U.S. support LGBT people at higher rates than other Christian groups, Siciliano said the percentage of Catholics who don't means there are millions of people hostile to LGBT people. In New York City, where he works, a global, diverse population means many of the youths he serves come from families with more narrow views.

Faith In America, which co-sponsored the ad, launched a Change,org petition where supporters can also send a message to Pope Francis.

"Pope Francis has the opportunity to lead faith communities around the world in gifting parents of LGBT youth with an unconditional spiritual embrace, a gift which most surely will bring peace to these lives and these families," Brent Childers, executive director of Faith in America, said in a statement.

According to the Associated Press, about 4,000 homeless youth live in New York City each night, and nearly a quarter are LGBT. Government and private funds cover only 350 beds.

Opened in 2002, the Ali Forney Center is named after a homeless transgender youth turned counselor who was disowned by his family at the age of 13 and later found shot in 2002 at age

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What have 93% of Young Straight UK Men Done Together in Bed?

Over nine in 10 straight young British men have spooned with another man, new research has revealed. Not only that, but a full 98% have shared a bed with one of their guy friends.

Two British sociologists, Eric Anderson of the University of Winchester and Mark McCormack of Durham University, have examined what



they call 'homosociality' and published their findings in journal Men and Masculinities.

They believe as straight guys become less homophobic, they are happier to be more intimate with their friends.

'We're always cuddling, my lot,' Jarrett, one of the young men who was interviewed, said. 'We're all comfortable with each other.'

Max, another survey participant, described how he and his friends would nurse their hangovers together at university. Following a night out, he said he's happy to watch TV, play video games, and frequently cuddle with friends. 'If your mate has a headache you can like massage his head, or you just lie there together holding each other and laughing about how awful you feel,' he said.

39 out of the 40 students surveyed also said they'd slept in a bed with another guy at least once since starting college. Some cited practical reasons like accommodating a friend who'd come to visit a cramped dorm or crashing at a friend's house after a night out, but others said they just wanted to feel close to their 'mates.'

'Most indicated that it was not necessary to be close friends to share a bed with someone,' the researchers said. 'These men are able to share beds with other men without risking their socially perceived heterosexual identity.'

Anderson and McCormack said while they were aware the sample size was small, they were hoping to extend the research to other universities and age groups in order to get a wider view of what straight guys get up to in bed.

Pastor Kevin Swanson Slams Honey Maid's 'Wholesome' Ad, Compares Being Gay To Murder, Cannibalism



Nabisco's controversial Honey Maid commercial depicting a same-sex couple is continuing to spark the ire of a number of conservative pundits.

As Right Wing Watch is reporting, Pastor Kevin Swanson of Colorado is the latest to take the company to task over the "Wholesome" graham cracker ad campaign.

In a Generations Radio broadcast, Swanson went as far as to compare homosexuality to "axe murder" and

cannibalism, before predicting that Nabisco was "going to lose business" in the wake of the campaign.



Swanson, whose opposition to lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) rights is well-established, didn't stop there, suggesting that the company might follow up the ad with a clip promoting bestiality.



"Maybe they had another family where a dog is the wife with a human husband," he said, before adding, "Homosexuals love their friends and cannibals love their victims -- they taste good."

Swanson's remarks follow those of One Million Moms, a right -wing conservative group best known for threatening to boycott JCPenney in 2012 after the retail chain hired Ellen De-Generes as its spokesperson.

Representatives for One Million Moms slammed Nabisco, saying the company should be ashamed of themselves for "attempt[ing] to normalize sin."

Giovanni's Room, Reportedly Nation's Oldest LGBT Bookstore, To Close In May

Giovanni's Room, which is believed to be the nation's oldest surviving bookstore catering to the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT)



community, is set to close next month.

The future of the Philadelphia bookstore, which opened in 1973, had been in jeopardy for some time, but owner Ed Hermance confirmed the news April 28. The store will close May 17, according to Philadelphia Gay News

"The government is allowing Amazon to tighten their fingers around the throats of the publishers and drive their retail competitors out of the business by clearly monopolistic methods," Hermance, who owned Giovanni's Room for 38 years, told the publication. Although he claimed to have lost between \$10,000-\$15,000 in keeping Giovanni's Room open since the start of 2014, he seemed cautiously optimistic that the shop could be resurrected in some form, but noted: "Whatever it is that they do, it will have to be something different than what we are doing now. If won't survive if it isn't different."

Hermance had announced his plans to retire last fall, telling CBS Philly, "It's a job of a lifetime, but I can't make it work anymore. This place needs a new energy."

He nonetheless seemed nostalgic about the variety of customers he'd met over the years, noting. "Coming in meant they were willing to admit they were interested in what we had to offer. It was almost like coming out."

He now says he's considering starting a regularly-scheduled walking tour of LGBT Philadelphia, according to CBS Philly.

New York's Oscar Wilde Bookshop, which opened in 1967 and was previously the nation's oldest bookstore dedicated to LGBT readers, closed in 2009, according to The New York Times.

Toronto Club that Played Queer as Folk's Babylon Is Closing

The last gay dance club in Toronto's gay village, and the disco that portrayed "Babylon" on Showtime's Queer as Folk, is closing in June after the World Pride celebration.



Fly has operated on

Gloucester Street for 15 years, but is being eyed by developers as the site of a future high-rise. While construction on the condo tower is not imminent, the building's owner only offered to renew Fly's lease on a yearly basis; owner Keir McRae said that wasn't realistic. Hopes for another promoter to take over the club have not panned out.

Fly's adjacent restaurant and bar, Fire on the East Side, has already shuttered. When Fly closes on June 30 following the global World Pride party, it will be the last large dance club in Toronto's gayborhood. The city passed a law a decade ago that limits most dance clubs to a small district outside the gay village.

"The city's not doing a whole lot to protect gay businesses — sometimes actively discouraging them, especially dance clubs," MacRae told Xtra! "Dance clubs have always been a significant part of gay culture, and the city is not allowing gay dance clubs in the Village."

Fly, along with a now-defunct club called Five, portrayed the Pittsburgh super-club "Babylon" on the Showtime gay soap Queer as Folk.

Kentucky Print Shop: Guns? OK. Gays? Go Away



A print shop in Kenucky has created a customized ban on LGBT shoppers.

Herald Embroidery, which creates personalized merchandise like T-shirts, prints, and banners, recently stamped antigay signage on its Oak Grove, Ky., storefront: a rainbow flag with a red line through it.

The sticker reflects the print shop's policy to refuse service to LGBT customers and those seeking products "that promote ideas that are not in keeping with our consciences," according to a statement on the store's website clarifying the meaning of its graphic.

"While we will serve all customers who treat our place of business with respect, we reserve the right to refuse to produce

promotional products that promote ideas that are not in keeping with our consciences," the statement reads. "This includes, but is not limited to content promoting homosexuality, freemasonry, the use of foul language, and imagery which promotes immodesty."

The crossed-out out pride sticker is one of five circular graphics on the Herald Embroidery storefront, which have been created in the style of "no shoes, no shirt, no service" policies often seen on retail establishments.

Another that also has a prohibitive red line through it is a graphic that reads "foul language." Three other images are circled in green, signaling approval: a beard, a gun, and a Biblical verse.

The antigay policy has sparked a flurry of criticism on Herald Embroidery's online reviews. In the past week, a spurned LGBT customer, Jeri Vercetti, recounted experiencing intolerance during a recent visit to the store with her wife.

"My wife and I went into this shop to get shirts for my parent's anniversary," Vercetti posted on the store's Google Plus page. "We went in holding hands and the clerks gave us dirty looks the entire time.

We didn't understand why; maybe they thought we were suspicious? I confronted one of the employees and they directed me to a sticker in the window. It had a pride flag on it and it basically meant gays weren't welcome.

My wife and I were heartbroken; we just wanted shirts made! But...we wasted a trip for nothing. Guess we'll get our shirts online next time. So sad about this treatment.):"

In March, Kentucky lawmakers overrode Gov. Steve Beshear's veto of a so-called "religious freedom" bill, which provides protections for the expression of "sincerely held religious beliefs."

Groups like the ACLU have warned that such legislation could be used as a "license to discriminate" against LGBT people and other minority groups in the public and private sectors.

The Masculine Mystique

A recent study published in Pediatrics, the official journal of the American Academy of Pediatrics, has raised alarms about the way some gay teens are responding to bullying.

Researchers analyzed government surveys from 2005 to 2007 of boys whose age averaged 16, 4% of whom self-identified as gay or bisexual. While only 4% of the survey's straight respondents said they used steroids, 21% of the gay ones did.

A 2012 study of high school students found that "increasingly muscular" images of men, combined with relatively easy access to steroids, puts pressure on boys to look a certain way — what Michael Kehler, a professor at the University of Western Ontario, calls the "hypervisibility of the masculine body."

While Aaron J. Blashill and Steven A. Safren, both affiliated with Massachusetts General Hospital and the LGBT health clin-

ic Fenway Health, mentioned poor body image in their study on gay teen steroid abuse, they took it a step further. Comparing their data to the CDC's Youth Risk Behavior Study, they discovered that bullying was a more important factor.

Kehler has studied extensively why some boys dread gym class. For them, he tells The Advocate, the locker room becomes a place where "masculinities are policed and scrutinized." They see working out as a way to "gain membership, to gain status" among their peers and, by extension, in a world that defines masculinity as muscle



mass. For boys who are not straight, masculinity — and therefore status — is a matter of outsized significance. Those who do not appear masculine enough can be subject to bullying.

"Schools and parents," Kehler says, "need to rethink body image as it relates to youth understandings of what it means to be a boy and to be a man."

Significant muscle mass can be the result of hard work rather than innate masculine characteristics, something both boys and adult men would do well to acknowledge. As a therapist once told me, "If they look like they go to the gym all the time, that's because they go to the gym all the time."

United Church of Christ Files Suit Against North Carolina's Marriage Ban

The United Church of Christ (UCC) announced it is suing the US state of North Carolina over its gay marriage ban.

The liberal Christian denomination announced the legal challenge today, 28 April.

The church claims the state's prohibition, known as Amendment One, infringes on the free speech rights of clergy.

'The United Church of Christ is proud to defend the religious freedoms upon which this nation was founded,' the Rev. Geoffrey A. Black, general minister and president of the UCC, said in a statement.

'It is unfortunate that, even today, laws are designed to treat gay and lesbian people unequally,' Black continued. 'In its efforts to restrict gay marriage, the State of North Carolina has restricted one of the essential freedoms of our ministers and of all Americans.' According to the activist group Freedom to Marry in 2012 voters in the US southern state passed Amendment One. The statute bans marriage equality and 'prohibits same-sex couples from attaining any form of legal family status.'

The UCC suit adds the law makes it a crime for religious officials to officiate a wedding between two people who lack a valid marriage license.

'United Church of Christ ministers, interested in conducting a religious marriage ceremony for same-gender couples, could face up to 120 days of jail and/or probation and community service if found guilty, since North Carolina marriage laws define and regulate marriage as being between only a man and a woman.' the church's statement said.

Joining the legal action is the Rev. Nancy Allison, senior pastor at Holy Covenant UCC in Charlotte, North Carolina.

'When gay and lesbian congregants come to me asking that I perform their wedding, I want to be able to offer them both the blessing of Holy Covenant United Church of Christ and that of the state of North Carolina,' the UCC minister said in a statement.

'It is time to challenge an unjust law and bring greater freedom to every religious leader in North Carolina,' she continued.

In 2005, UCC became the first mainline Christian denomination to support gay marriage.



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Maine Republicans Still Oppose Same-Sex Marriage 2 Years after Voters Made it Legal

The Maine state Republican Party has adopted a new party platform which continues to oppose samesex marriage despite most voters in Maine supporting same-sex couples' right to wed.



Same-sex marriage has been legal in Maine since December of 2012

after a majority of voters backed the reform in November that year but Maine Governor Paul LePage still opposes it and his party elected to reflect that in its new platform adopted on Friday.

The trend in other states has been for the issue to be removed from the platform for being too divisive for voters and party members.

The Nevada and Indiana state Republicans have already dropped the issue from their party platforms.

Life Beyond Therapy

SCARED OF THE GYM?

Here are some of the most popular reasons I hear for not working out at a gym:

- I'm too depressed
- I have avoided working out for years
- I'm too fat and out of shape to go
- I don't know how to use the equipment there
- I feel intimidated by how goodlooking everyone else is
- If I go, other people will look at me and laugh at what lousy shape I'm in



I'm too old to get in shape now; I'll hurt myself

I'll admit to a bias here: I have been going to a gym for over 25 years' now and I couldn't do without it. Okay, so now you know my point of view. I'll also admit that I have no connection (business or otherwise) to any gyms, so this isn't a thinly-disguised PR piece for gym-going. I'm writing this because going to a gym – and the exercise we do there – is really good for your mental health. I am a psychotherapist, not a personal

trainer, and I find that regular, intense, cardio-boosting, endorphin-generating exercise is one of the best antidepressants you can buy (and there's no side effects either, except for sweaty workout clothes).

Psychological research backs me up on this: the mind-body connection is a hotly researched topic these days. Our mind and body are always communicating with each other, and the effects of this two-way communication are just beginning to be documented. For example, recent studies show that aerobic exercise and weight lifting are effective at decreasing depression, and there are no side effects (save a happier body)! Another study found that, for some people, three hours of exercise a week is comparable to taking anti-depressant medication. Research shows over-and-over again that regular exercise reduces depression and improves your mood.

Okay, there are some great reasons to go. Now, let's look at your motivation, or lack of it. Ask yourself: Why am I going to a gym? Here are some reasons my clients like the gym:

- Improved Health
- Improved Energy
- Endorphins give you a "natural high"
- Social (meet other people taking good care of themselves)
- Admiration from others for a better body
 Admiration from yourself for a better body/improved health

If you want to start exercising at a gym, how about getting some help with this? Like everything else in life, you can "do" the gym all alone, or you can get help and support, from people like:

Trainers. often you can get some free advice, but, remember, they make their living doing this stuff. Talk to a trainer to see if you can afford to get some help, especially at the beginning, when you want to learn the "right" way to do things, so you don't injure yourself.

Friends: you probably know people who will support you in going, go with you, can give you suggestions on exercises to do, how to use equipment, etc. Having a gym buddy is a great way not to flake out on going. And it's more fun.

Other gym-goers: you'd be surprised how kind and sweet some of the biggest, toughest-looking gym hunks are. Most people at my gym are very helpful. In fact, it is flattering to ask someone for help. It makes people feel good to give help and it is a joy to receive great, free advice. Be brave and speak up.

Once you try out a gym, here are some psychological suggestions to make it as pleasant as possible:

Stop comparing yourself to others; they may have a completely different body type than you, and they may be really strict about eating healthily.

Focus on yourself: whenever you feel jealous or someone else, remember how far YOU'VE progressed from where you used to be... THAT'S what counts.

Most people go to gyms to work out and focus on themselves; it's very unlikely they're paying much attention to you or anyone else.

Praise yourself for going, push yourself a little when you can, get help from others and concentrate on pleasing yourself. The admiration of others will come in its own sweet time. Enjoy getting healthy, feeling less depressed and looking good!

Butter a 13 x 9 inch casserole dish and arrange bread cubes in casserole dish. Sprinkle with shredded cheddar cheese. Beat

together the eggs, milk, dry mustard, onion powder, salt and Worcestershire sauce. Pour over the bread and cheese in the casserole dish. Sprinkle with crumbled bacon, mushrooms and chopped tomatoes. Cover and chill overnight. Preheat oven to 350 degrees and bake uncovered for 1 hour or until set.






