
COVER DESIGN BY WADE SWENDSEID

Certainly, Representative Barrett, I understand that the first duty of a politician is to get re-elected. And, of course, by proclaiming a discriminatory policy against gay and lesbian people many votes will accrue to your account.

Dear Harry,

Thank you for contacting me concerning my office hiring policies. I appreciate the opportunity to respond to your comments.

The policies under which I hire and employ staff for the Third Congressional District of Nebraska, including those in my Washington, DC, office and my two district offices in Nebraska, are set out in a written office manual. I abide by the applicable federal statutes and the rules and regulations of the House of Representatives regarding equal employment opportunity. This includes a strict nondiscrimination policy of making employment decisions independent "...of such individual's race, color, religion, sex, handicap, age, or national origin."

Our federal civil rights laws do not define homosexuals as a protected class, and an individual's sexual orientation is not covered under the present hiring guidelines of the House. As such, each Member of Congress is free currently to address the issue within their personal office as he or she sees fit.

My own personal and religious convictions lead me to oppose any effort to promote the homosexual lifestyle. But more importantly, my constituents have told me in overwhelming numbers that they do not support the promotion of homosexual lifestyle. Since this office belongs to the people of the Third District, I have concluded that hiring a practicing, openly gay individual would be contradictory to the views of the majority I represent.

When this subject recently became an issue for the press, I could have easily sidestepped any critical headlines with the politically correct response. Rather, I gave an honest and straightforward answer and for that I can offer no further explanation. If you have any other questions or comments, please feel free to contact me again.

Dear Editor,

Something new and inspiring is happening in the gay and lesbian community. A new organization called Gay & Lesbian Americans (GLA) has formed to create a true and democratic gay and lesbian movement. GLA is a diverse, nonpartisan coalition of grassroots advocates committed to civil rights for gay and lesbian people and a cure for AIDS. GLA is in the process of coordinating a Grassroots Advocacy Network consisting of local chapters across the country and using phone-trees, letter-writing committees, direct action, advertising and other strategies to promote gay and lesbian issues.

The organization is already taking form and it is time for gay and lesbian Nebraskans to contribute to the shaping of this new grassroots movement. For the first time we have a way to make our voice heard on what actions should be taken on behalf of gay and lesbian people.

Already GLA has formed a platform to push for gay and lesbian civil rights laws, repeal sodomy laws, and increased pressure for a cure for AIDS.

I am optimistic about GLA and really think GLA is going somewhere. GLA is one organization that sees the political dead end of following the Democrats and the need to create a strong energized grass roots movement. GLA is far more open-minded and has more pragmatic form of flexibility. There isn't that sort of myopic mind-set. ABORTION AND BREAST CANCER?

New scientific evidence shows that the increase in abortions worldwide is concurrent with — and quite possibly has caused — a sharp increase in breast cancer. Breast cancer has increased by 50% since abortion was legalized in 1973, and is on the rise around the world. Over twenty studies indicate that women who abort their first pregnancy have a much higher risk of developing cancer.

A first pregnancy permanently changes the structure of a woman's breasts. Before she is pregnant, her breasts cannot produce milk, as the gland cells are immature and underdeveloped. When she becomes pregnant, estrogen and other hormones flood her system. This results in rapid growth in size, while the internal structure undergoes dramatic change.

Cells, previously dormant, rapidly grow into a system of branching ducts and gland cells capable of producing milk. Once this growth, change, and maturing is complete, there is no further significant change for the rest of her life. Once mature, the chance of the breast developing cancer is much less.

When these cells are changing and transitional, they are less stable and have much greater potential of becoming cancerous. If the woman completes her first pregnancy, this unstable period passes and her gland cells mature and stabilize.

But — if she interrupts her pregnancy in its early phase — and 90% of abortions are done in the first trimester — she in effect stops the development of the cells at this unstable, transitional phase. It seems apparent that cancerous changes can and do occur more frequently among those transitional cells of a woman who has terminated her pregnancy. If she aborts more than once before completing a pregnancy, her chance of cancer increases even more. A subsequent full pregnancy helps, but sadly never removes the sharply increased threat of cancer.

For instance, a 15 year old American girl has a 10% lifetime risk of breast cancer. If she gets pregnant in her teens and has the baby, she reduces her risk to 7.5%. However, if she has an abortion, her risk rises to 15% (assuming that she has at least one child in her 20's). If the abortion sterilizes her and/or for other reason she never has another pregnancy, her risk rises to 30%.

CLEANING OUT MY CLOSET: Hug Your Bookstore

How's your bookstore doing, if it's not too impudent of me to ask?

If your hometown is anything like mine, you're lucky enough to have a pink triangle establishment run by some brave literary adventurer who firmly believes that there's actually enough money in a bookstore operation to pay rent and order from New York in the same month. Probably somebody who reads, and thinks that maybe other people do too. And so far, nothing's happened to totally disavow them of that flimsy conviction.

If your community is also anything like mine, you probably don't even think much about the bookstore. It's just there. Whenever you need it. Kind of like the living room furniture. You know exactly where everything is, but if you woke up one morning and sat down suddenly in a surprisingly empty room, you'd be in for a rather rude awakening as your derriere made acquaintance with unoccupied space.

Now, I'm not meaning to suggest that anything's fiscally critical with your bookstore in particular at the moment, but in my neck of the woods, we've had two such lavender enterprises head for entrepreneur's heaven in the last couple of years. And since I started writing books exclusively for our community, I've become very close to the brave local soul who took on the task of serving the literary whims of the rainbow flag. Talk about risky business! Phew! 'Bout the same odds of success that my dad had when he bought himself a Geiger counter in the late fifties, and set out into the Nevada desert in search of our weekend

fortune. He didn't die from the enterprise, but we sure didn't get rich and famous for the effort either.

And as the jingle bell season freight trains rapidly toward whatever's so far undisposed of our disposable income, it seems to me that this is a really good time to remind us exactly what our local bookstore means to the community. The stuff it does that we hardly ever pay for.

Need the pride newspapers? The local community map? A room mate service? Where ya gonna go? The bookstore.

Have an occasion for some amethyst anything? The bookstore's got it in a showcase that has little literary in its occupation. If you want a rainbow bumper sticker, or a set of values to adorn the Acura, that's right, the bookstore. When you want to know where the meeting is, what the neighborhood is like, who to trust with your trusty a) roof repairs, b) spare time, c) loose change, there's almost always an Aunt Blabby behind the counter perfectly willing to tell you where to go. Want a doctor's referral? Ask at the bookstore. Real estate agent? Chiropractor? Astrologist? Check out the bulletin board, or any of the local periodicals. (Usually free). Where? You guessed it. At the bookstore. One bookstore I visited had classes in everything from cookery to crockery, from American Sign Language to Being Careful What Papers You Sign, a minimal fee, and didn't bother to charge for the books. Bravae!

And this is in addition to offering even the remotest editions from Naiad, Alyson, Firebrand,

Paradigm, Rising Tide, Cleis, Clothespin, Gay Men's Press, Spinster, or New Victoria, not to mention either Simon or Schuster. The kind of specialty titles we want to have at any available whim, but that Books R Us never bothers to carry.

What's the reward for such community contributions? All too often, it's cashless folks, killing an hour mindlessly meandering the merchandise. Who'll be more than happy to tell the staff exactly how much less any given tome is at Barnes and Noble (who can afford to buy titles by the trailertruck-ful and who almost never carry buttons that tell anyone in your immediate vicinity what they should or shouldn't presume about your orientation.) And, of course, there are the folks who mistake the bookstore for the local lending library. Browsing is one thing, but going into the back room and drooling over everything hunky, without once even offering a farthing, or a phenix for the privilege. Well, is it any wonder that most of the bookstores I've met have lately taken to stapling and Saran Wrapping the stock?

Did I mention shoplifting? How appallingly much merchandise seems to depart without benefit of cash register receipts? I mean, I understand how that could happen in your basic anonymous Humungo Emporium. Faceless checkers amidst boring irrelevant displays. But to steal from your friends and family? Why?

I'm sorry. I didn't mean to tie on a tirade. And I know that I really don't believe we owe any business a living just because they are community members, if they don't deliver the goods and

MAX DJ KEEPS DANCE CROWD SPINNING

"If you're feeling horny, scream!" Whether you are horny, single, crazy, or frustrated with life, you will probably scream at least once a night when Gary Frazer is working the DJ booth at The Max. He is the one barking those commands. "It builds energy in the room — it gets people going," Frazer recently told *The New Voice*.

Frazer is more than just a DJ, he is also the club's director of music programming. When he is not spinning records or CD's, you will find him spinning in his chair in the back office. Frazer will be talking to record companies to make sure Omaha's most popular dance club stays current. When he is not talking to the record companies, he will be on the phone sharing thoughts and ideas with several local radio DJ's.

He is also a member of something called a "pool". Actually, he is a member of more than one pool. They are groups of radio stations, dance clubs, and private DJ's who stay on top and in touch with the music industry. They provide The Max with new music on a weekly basis. Frazer and the other DJ's test that music every night. "What do I look for? When I look for a song, I look for the beat, the artist, and the feel of the music. Is it easy to dance to, energetic?" Frazer said. Every song that is played is then rated on how well the crowd responded. In other words, did it work?

The music has to have energy to be played at The Max. Frazer said, "I'm not doing my job if my dance floor is empty. The difference between me and a radio station DJ is I try to predict, forecast, and keep you on the dance floor. Some nights, I can look around and see 10 to 20 people moving to the beat off the dance floor. They don't want to get out on the dance floor because nobody else is out dancing. If some people would initiate the move out, then those 10 to 20 would draw 10 to 20 on the dance floor." He acknowledges that some people avoid empty dance floors because they are shy. That includes at least one writer for *The New Voice*. That is why the lighting is kept low early in the evening — to encourage people to dance.

Frazer loves to see a crowded dance floor, and he is occasionally surprised by how popular a song becomes. Two examples of that are Aretha Franklin's *A Deeper Love* and Robin S's *I Want To Thank You*. Even with the few surprises, Frazer takes pride in forecasting which songs will become popular. At the end of April, he predicted that Juliet Robert's *I Want You* would hit the top of the charts. It was already playing The Max and people were responding by hitting the dance floor. It is June now — was he right?

Playing music as a DJ can get political too. Frazer said that he received

criticism a few years ago when he played tunes by Donna Summer. Summer had been condemning homosexuality after becoming a born-again Christian. She had been using her concerts as a forum where she claimed that AIDS had been sent by God to punish gay men. Frazer said once he learned why people were complaining, Summer's music was no longer played. Summer has apologized since then, and her music has been generally accepted once again. The same thing happened with music by Marky Mark. Complaints about his verbal gay bashing were enough that Frazer stopped playing his music.

Changes are the horizon at The Max. Frazer said customers should look forward to the changes. Among other things, The Max is increasing the wattage used in the disco area. The club's sound technician has told him that when all the improvements are made, the club will have a sound that is equivalent to a rock concert in a 1500-seat auditorium. "Nothing is wrong with the sound now. We just want MORE sound," he said. "We'll have more sound than we'll need by a long shot."

Frazer is celebrating his first anniversary since returning to The Max. His first tenure as a DJ at The Max was in the 1980's. He decided to move to Red Oak, Iowa where he worked at a radio station. The club scene became a part of his life again a few years later when he spun records at The Metro and The Run. He returned to The Max in June 1993. "One of the reasons I like working here is because we don't let things lie. We stay on the leading edge," said Frazer.

If someone requests a song which The Max does not have in its library, Frazer will find it. Once he finds it, "We'll choose the version that has the best beat to it. Occasionally, I'll throw in a different mix to throw off the dance crowd. A predictable DJ is a burned out DJ."

As you might expect, music has always been a big part of Frazer's life. It started as a hobby when he was very young. He grew up playing the keyboard, drums, french horn, and trumpet. He has invested thousands of dollars in music and music equipment, which is mostly in storage now. He said he has no reason to use most of it, "because I basically sleep and shower at home and head out the door." When he's not at The Max, you might find him working at Chef Bob's in The Old Market. This guy holds down two jobs and still wants to do more with life. He enjoys boating, water skiing, and camping. One day, he would like to learn how to fly a plane. It makes you wonder if he will be spinning in the pilot's seat, flying over the Heartland barking, "If you're feeling horny, scream!" (But will anyone hear him?)

services in a pleasant, businesslike manner. It's just that almost regardless, the bookstore is the single exception I am universally willing to make. It's the one going concern whose going continues to concern me. Even inefficiently run, it still delivers more, dollar for community dollar, than even the most generous buyers actually paid for.

And these are wonderful places. Outbooks in Ft. Lauderdale. Glad Day in Boston. Oscar Wilde Memorial in New York. A Women's Prerogative in Dearborn. White Rabbit in the Carolinas. Lammas and Lambda Rising in DC. Charis in Atlanta. Full Circle in Albuquerque. Paradigm in San Diego. Beyond the Closet in Seattle. People Like Us in Chicago. Yours in Yourtown.

In case you haven't glanced at your Rolex ident-a-date lately, it's that time again, when you start to scour the landscape for green-and-red or blue-and-silver wrappable trinkets and doo-dads. Could I suggest setting the mail aside, and considering a new starting place for this year's annual scavenger hunt? Your gay and/or lesbian bookstore. In addition to incense and harmony balls, freedom rings, and unguent oils, satin boxer shorts, and t-shirts defying all description, there are wonderful books there. Titles that tuck snugly

into stockings, that fit flatly into the post office slots, and that pile impressively under a pine.

Maybe there is one place in our world, after all, for all they do for us, that we do actually owe a decent living to. Tell 'em I sent you.

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STONEWALL 25

STONEWALL WAS A RIOT

In late June of 1969, angry reaction to a routine police raid on a tiny gay bar in New York City sent a ripple through the gay and lesbian community that is still having a major effect on America.

Much has been written about the Stonewall riots, some based on myth, some a bit overblown, but the dramatic results are all around us. Almost overnight, tens of thousands of gay people across the country made the decision to come out of their closets and be involved in the gay and lesbian movement. In the 20 years preceding Stonewall, fewer than 50 homosexual organizations existed in the U.S., but by 1973 over 800 groups were offering support and fighting discrimination.

Before Stonewall, demonstrations by gay people even in the largest of cities attracted only a few dozen hard-core activists. In June of 1970 for the first anniversary of Stonewall, at least 5,000 people marched in the streets of New York City and thousands more marched the following year in several cities. The concept of gay and lesbian "Freedom Marches" each June spread across the country, giving birth to today's "Pride Parades" and related events drawing millions of participants in every corner of the world.

Before Stonewall

To understand why there was a riot at the Stonewall Inn in 1969, we have to remember what life was like for gays and lesbians in the 1950s and 60s. Homosexuals were considered by most experts and authorities to be people with a form of mental illness and sexual dysfunction that needed treatment. Homosexual acts were against the law and police seemed to take pleasure in arresting anyone thought to be gay or lesbian. People were humiliated, harassed and sometimes thrown in jail on false charges. Politicians won elections by promising to rid cities of this "perversion". Senator Joseph McCarthy received much support for his congressional hearings to weed out homosexuals and Communists in the government, Hollywood and society in general.

In the face of this attack on gays and lesbians at all levels, a few groups began to offer support and fight back. The Mattachine Society of New York became a leader in the new movement and its president, Dick Leitsch, was one of the first gay people in the nation to openly use his full name in seeking to publicize gay and lesbian

oppression. In 1967, *The Advocate* published a feature story by former Mattachine Newsletter reporter Robert Amsel. He said Leitsch began using the court system to fight institutionalized discrimination, and he began to win.

The New York State Liquor Authority (and many similar bodies nationwide) had a long-standing policy that any meeting of three or more homosexuals in a bar was justification to pull the liquor license of the business. Bars that attracted gay people were often raided by police, and the owners and customers caught in such a raid were happy to escape without being named in the media. Anyone who protested police action risked arrest and possibly physical abuse.

In 1966 Leitsch and the Mattachine Society staged a well-publicized protest at a Manhattan gay bar, with legal support from ACLU, forcing the New York Liquor Authority to back away from a potential lawsuit and change its policy. Gay bars became legal in New York. However, homosexual acts were still treated as crimes and police sent handsome undercover cops into gay bars. The officers would try to get gay men to make a pass or propose a sexual encounter. This type of harassment and entrapment became more frequent and widespread.

Police found another good excuse to raid gay bars when it became known that many of them in the late 1960s were being operated by the Mafia. Undercover investigators would look for even the slightest violations of the fire code, liquor and dancing ordinances, or other laws. In *The Advocate's* feature, remembering the Stonewall riots, Amsel set up the mood of the week. Movie star Judy Garland died on Sunday, June 22, 1969, and was buried that Friday, the 27th. The thousands of gay men who had idolized her were in mourning and at an emotional edge. It didn't help that police raided two gay bars that week in the Greenwich Village section of town.

"What a dump!"

According to Amsel's first-hand description, the Stonewall Inn on Christopher Street in "The Village" was a run-down pub rumored to be operated by the Mafia. It was an after-hours private club for members only, or anyone who could afford three dollars and find a club "sponsor" for the evening. The former owners of the Stonewall had been burned out and, a year later, new owners covered the soot with black paint and mirrors. There were few repairs done and no liquor license was purchased. The bar was known to be a neighborhood drug connection and was the suspected source of a hepatitis outbreak. It was the perfect target for police.

The Stonewall had two large rooms, one the dance floor, the other was the bar. The customers who squeezed into the place were mostly young men, usually hippies, ethnic minorities, street people, drag queens, and under-age teens who had nowhere else to go. Many of the Stonewall's customers that week in June of 1969 had already been forced out of other neighborhood bars by raids, and they were not happy campers. That Friday night was hot, there was a full moon, Judy was buried, and the police were on the prowl.

The door was smashed open again and the detectives grabbed a fire hose hoping to hold off

the crowd. But the weak stream of water only made the floor slippery. As a side door started to give in to the crowd, one cop yelled, "Get away from there or I'll shoot!" With the front door wide open, the side door being attacked and the boarded up windows being broken out, the cops all took out their pistols. Smith's *Village Voice* report said, "One detective arms himself in addition with a sawed-off baseball bat he has found. I hear 'We'll shoot the first motherfucker that comes through the door'." Then Smith saw an arm come through the window space and a squirt of liquid onto the floor followed by a lit match. As flames spread across the floor, sirens were heard and the crowds scattered.

According to the *New York Times*, the first night's riot lasted 45 minutes and involved 400 youths. After the area was cleared and the small fire put out, Smith went back inside to find the police had smashed all the mirrors, juke boxes, phones, toilets and cigarette machines in their anger. No one else had been inside, but the courts would later find police innocent of vandalism.

Riot Number 2

The management of the Stonewall bailed its employees out of jail, restocked its liquor and reopened Saturday night. But the management couldn't keep customers from spilling onto Christopher Street with shouts like "Gay Power!" The sounds of freedom from tyranny echoed down the street with what Amsel called a "strong feeling of gay community and a strong fighting spirit, an intoxicating sense of release." He remembered the crowd growing as people began kissing and hugging and shouting.

Police arrived with helmets and clubs, but they were not prepared for the huge crowd which filled every doorway, street, alley, even rooftops. As cops chased protesters, larger groups of gay bystanders also started running, until someone in the crowd yelled "Stop!" They collectively seemed to realize that the gays outnumbered the cops, and the chase scene was reversed.

"Gay Power" graffiti showed up on the boarded Stonewall windows and small fires were reported throughout the neighborhood. The *Times* reported that the "near riot" was dispersed by 3 a.m. and about 400 people were again involved. Area residents said it looked more like thousands.

Sunday, Monday and Tuesday night crowds were much smaller and more quiet, with a couple of minor exceptions. Amsel recalled cops in their cars yelling obscenities, and groups of youths and bystanders yelling threats right back. Cops walking their beat would swing their nightsticks at pedestrians and make rude comments. Firecrackers would go off and people would run down the street in a cat and mouse game.

The Third Riot

The scene turned ugly on Wednesday, July 2, the day the weekly *Village Voice* hit the newsstands with Howard Smith's report on the Stonewall riots. The story attracted many radicals to the village such as the Black Panthers, Yippies and street gangs. Looting and vandalism targeted many of the gay-owned shops. Cops began striking at pedestrians in the neighborhood. Amsel reported "Young people, many of them queens,

were lying on the sidewalk, bleeding from the head, face, mouth and even the eyes. Others were nursing bruised and often bleeding arms, legs, backs and necks." No violence was reported on the nights that followed.

As a result of the series of riots, the police harassment and violence, and the court cases which never settled anything, new gay and lesbian organizations began springing up. The Gay Liberation Front became a more radical version of the Mattachine Society and similar groups could soon be found across the country, including one of the nation's first college groups at the University of Iowa. While the Stonewall riots may not have been the glorious fight for freedom that has become romanticized over the years, the events mobilized a community of gays and lesbians. Gone were the days of the panics who fled when someone yelled a name or threatened violence. It was the beginning of a sense of pride. Sources—

PRIDE AT WORK

The Organizing Committee for Pride at Work Stonewall 25, A National Lesbian/Gay/Bi Labor Conference announced that their founding meeting will take place in New York City on June 24, 1994. Both the trade unions and the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender movements are under attack from numerous radical right-wing factions. Recognizing this, labor activists representing local Lesbian/Gay/Labor groups from across the country met on April 26, 1993, one day after the 1993 March on Washington. At this initial meeting, plans started for a national organization that recognizes the natural alliance of the two movements.

"As lesbian and gay workers, we personally know about Right-Wing attacks. The Radical Right-Wing has used attacks on lesbian and gay men as one of their main rallying cries as they organize their whole anti-worker agenda. In response, we are forming an organization to use our combined experiences and strengths to better fight for our rights. Pride at Work will also better enable us to educate both the Lesbian and Gay Community about the workers rights agenda as well as the Labor movement about the concerns of its lesbians and gay members," states Organizing Committee Co-Chair Teresa Conrow.

The Pride at Work Conference will bring together lesbian and gay trade unionists and their supporters to address these and other issues. The Conference will take place on Friday, June 24, 1994 (just two days prior to the Stonewall 25 Celebration), at the Office of AFSCME District Council 37, 125 Barclay Street in New York City.

EARLY GAY ACTIVISTS UNITE AT STONEWALL

A celebration of the activists of the Gay Liberation Front who started the modern-day gay liberation movement will take place during Stonewall 25. While several homophile organizations were in existence in 1969, and gays had fought back against police harassment before, what made the Stonewall Rebellion significant was the strong national movement that it began. Gay Liberation Front (GLF) in New York, started immediately after the riot, was the first militant organized response, and GLF groups quickly appeared across the country and around the world.

The Women's, Anti-War, and Anti-Racist movements had set the stage; GLF was where it came together for lesbians and gays. It was in GLF meetings that "coming out" was first defined as a political act. "Out of the Closets and Into the Streets!" became the watchword of a new political movement. GLF organized the first anniversary march of thousands of open gays and lesbians up Sixth Avenue in New York City, demonstrating their new-found political strength. It adapted the technique of "consciousness raising" from the women's movement, held demonstrations to bring the issue of gay rights into the public consciousness, began the first gay community center in NYC, and made strategic alliances with many other movements on the political left. Although the group had a lifespan of only a few years, the issues that it identified and struggled with are very much a part of the issues that the gay movement and society still face today.

A two-day program is planned in New York University, on Friday and Saturday, June 24-25, 1994, sponsored by the Association of Lesbian and Gay Faculty, Administrators, and Staff (ALGFA) at NYU and organized by 4 early pioneers in New York's and Chicago's GLFs, Jim Clifford, Steven Dansky, Murray Edelman, and Henry Wiemhoff. A group of filmmakers working on a film recording the history of GLF in New York will be on hand, both to show a short segment of footage that they had already shot for this documentary film as well as capture additional footage of this historic two-day event.

DROP IN CENTER ON TARGET

It was almost midnight as we pulled into a parking place near 17th and Leavenworth. In the glow of a street light across the street, a young man thumbed his way through a copy of *The New Voice*. A little further up the street a younger man walked with an occasional anxious glance toward the cars going by. One of them slowed and turned the corner, pausing just a little way down the street. The young man's pace quickened

At 1723 Leavenworth large picture windows let us look into a large room with a few shabby chairs and some old desks. Parts of the room were divided off with dusty partitions. Four people sat just inside the door, which was left open to invite others inside. A few blocks away, Mike was at the bars passing out condoms and pamphlets and talking with the patrons. He would return when his bag was empty.

I went inside the "Drop In Center" with notebook in hand, anxious to find out what this place was all about. I was greeted warmly by Merritt Stinson, Coordinator of the Center, and the other volunteers who work the Center. Shelley and Paula act as receptionists. Roz is the "regular" phlebotomist but this night Jane Pierson was helping out also. Merritt and John Vaccaro would do counseling if it was needed.

The volunteers talked openly about the Center and recounted its history for me. This special outreach was started 1 1/2 years ago as a combined effort of the Douglas County Health Department and the Nebraska AIDS Project. The space is rented jointly by the two organizations and then Health Department provides the educational material and the condoms and NAP provides the volunteers. The Center is designed to reach the highest risk populations: the male and female hustlers who work the streets and those who share needles. The idea came into being in response to a letter which was received telling how a young person had become infected through IV drug use. The Center also targets the under 21 age group who come to the bars for after hours dancing. When the Center first opened the main emphasis was on outreach — going out into the streets and into the bars and talking with people about HIV and about prevention. However, in just three or four months the Center had expanded to include HIV testing.

The Drop In Center is only open every other Friday night from 9 pm to 2 am. Test results are given out from 9 - 10pm and from 10pm - 2pm testing and counseling take place. Despite these limited hours, the Center has tested nearly 100 people with a 12% rate of positives — the highest rate of any test Center in the state.

However, lots of people just stop by the Center to talk and perhaps have a soda or a cup of coffee. While I was there a tall queen in a sequined dress stopped inside to talk for a few minutes before going on to the bars. A man of indeterminate age stopped briefly to talk about a book he'd found at the public library. Other people waved as they went by.

The staff told how surprised the people on the street had been when they started going out and

talking and handing out condoms. Now they are familiar figures. A few people turn down the condoms, saying they don't need them — that they aren't going to be doing anything. That's okay with the volunteers. "At least they know we're here!"

Mike returned from his rounds of the bars, his bag empty, the pamphlets and condoms all given away. Mike said the Center has passed out 3,000 condoms along with education about proper storage and use of the condoms as well as other HIV information. However, he was quick to point out that the Center cannot provide free condoms to all of Omaha, but through education perhaps all of us who are sexually active persons and so at risk for a Sexually Transmitted Disease will take the responsibility for our own actions.

Mike was quick to point out how important volunteers are to the Drop In Center and to all of AIDS education. He especially noted the contribution made by the AIDS Coalition for Empowerment in their new program of going into the bars with condoms and HIV education. Their presence allows Mike and the other volunteers to make sure that all the bars are contacted and condoms and education offered to the patrons.

He also noted on the dedication of the core group of volunteers who staff the Drop In Center. Just 5 or 6 people carry the bulk of the load and are there almost every single time the Center is open. Some, like Merritt and Shelley and Roz have been working at the Center since it opened. Others have come more recently.

In fact, when we asked the volunteers what the Center needed, they were quick to respond, "More volunteers." Volunteers are needed to staff the Center and to go out to hand out pamphlets and condoms in the bars. They made it clear that no special training is needed to pass out pamphlets or condoms. Volunteers go out in groups of three to maintain security, but there has never been an injury or an incident involving one of the volunteers.

Mike told us that he has been out during the day doing a needs assessment about the Drop In Center and has discovered that there may also be a need for the Center to be open at some time during the day. Even more volunteers will be needed in order to staff the Center during daytime hours.

The volunteers also identified some concrete needs around the Drop In Center. The carpet desperately needs cleaning. The walls need a coat of paint in a cheery color. They could use a vacuum cleaner or a Hokie Vac. They could use a good second hand couch and some chairs. A small television and VCR would allow them to show safer sex videos. And a boom box or portable stereo would allow them to provide some music as background and to help invite people in.

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SCHOOL BOARD ADDS SEXUAL ORIENTATION TO STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT

The gay and lesbian community and their supporters turned out to support and speak in favor of the addition of "sexual orientation" to the section of the Student Code of Conduct which includes provisions for disciplining students who harass others because of gender, race, age, religion, marital status, or disability. However, no voice spoke louder than the voice of student Tim Mahoney who brought the issue before the Omaha School Board on May 1.

With a parent standing in support on either side of him, Mahoney told the school board how another student had written "homo" across the back of his gym shirt. He went on to describe how his gym teacher refused to allow him to change the shirt or even to turn it inside out so the word would not show.

About 30 people stood in support of the amendment during its first reading. The motion to amend the harassment policy to include sexual orientation was made by school board member Bernard Kolasa. Board member Bill Meier abstained from voting on the amendment, but did vote in favor of the entire amended harassment policy. All other board members voted in favor of both the amendment and the policy except for Kenneth Anderson who was absent.

Editor's Note: The policy passed its second reading Wed., May 18, by a vote of 10 to 1. The only dissenting vote was cast by Kenneth Anderson, who had proposed an amendment that failed. About 25 people attended the meeting to show support. Five persons spoke. It is interesting to note that despite eloquent and informative statements by Dave England of PFLAG, Dick Smith of the Support Group, Rev. Matthew Howard of MCC, the Omaha World-Herald chose to quote my comments about how I feared my grandchildren would be harassed because someone perceived they were gay. I deliberately did not come out during my statement, but spoke as a grandmother. I wonder if this reveals some of the homophobia that surrounds us.



IT'S NEVER EASY TO SAY GOODBYE

It is the time once again to say goodbye to one of our own. Emerson "Bubba Ray" Briney born August 6, 1963 passed away Monday April 25, 1994.

He is a man who deserves tribute and recognition for all he did for not only the Omaha community, but also the Dallas and San Francisco communities as well. He was an advocate and a leader who rarely showed fear or easily backed down. He also was a long time survivor of AIDS. He was HIV+ for ten years before he fell victim to the symptoms of this horrible disease. He never felt sorry for himself for being HIV+. Nor did he let it stop him from pursuing his dreams and goals. He was constantly involved in many organizations and took his commitments seriously.

As a member of Alcoholics Anonymous, he and Jeri S. started the Wednesday "Stonewall" meeting. He also was active with the Heartland Roundup Steering Committee for a couple of years and brought some wonderful speakers to the Omaha area.

In this arena, as all others, he shared his life and all of its pain by doing so, he touched the lives of many people. He was active in Pro-Choice, N.O.W. marches and rallies, and even escorted at the Women's Clinic here, truly an advocate of women's rights. He was an active participant in gay events, and was on the front line with the city on several issues at the local level.

Not to mention on a steering committee for the 1993 "March on Washington." This is just a sample of some of the things Emerson did here locally for our community.

The grand finale, the thing that put Emerson on the map locally and internationally was his involvement in the leather community. He was a member of the Omaha Players Club and also held many titles; Mr. D.C.'s Leather 1992, Mr. Omaha Drummer 1992, Mr. Leather Nebraska 1992, Mr. Great Plains Drummer 1992-93. His most important title, International Mr. Drummer 1993, a title that took him away from Omaha for one year, and also brought him back in his final months.

As I watched this dreaded disease take this handsome, built friend of mine and turn him into a small, frail man, I felt nothing but anger and outrage that someone such as Emerson who had so much to say and do was running out of time so quickly. I had spent much time with Emerson in his final months and I am glad I was there for him, because I could not take away his pain. I could at least visit with him, play games, help him grocery shop, fold laundry and even cut his hair. But even by doing these things I still felt helpless and frustrated that after all the years AIDS has been around and all the publicity — that we are still no further along in finding a cure. For those involved in the fight against AIDS and those who volunteer for organizations such as N.A.P. — keep it up! For those who don't do anything — get off your ass and start! One final, personal note:

Emerson, I love you and I will miss you, I am sorry that I did not get to say goodbye — so I'm saying it now. Special thanks to Amy Meek for providing leather title dates and handling Emerson's affairs. You're greatly appreciated Amy.

HOME: THE PARABLE OF BEATRICE AND NEAL

The musical drama, *Home: The Parable of Beatrice and Neal*, concerning the experiences of lesbian and gay persons in the church will be performed at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 23, 1994 in the sanctuary of United Methodist Church, 1000 30th St. N.E., Cedar Rapids. A reception in the social hall of the church will follow the performance at 9:00 p.m. All are invited to attend.

The Reconciling Congregation Program produced this original musical drama to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the national reconciling congregation movement. The Reconciling Congregation Program is a national network of United Methodist churches that welcome all persons regardless of sexual orientation into the community of faith. Faith United Methodist Church became a reconciling congregation in June 1993. *HOME* is written and directed by Tim McGinley, minister of music at Broadway United Methodist Church in Indianapolis. McGinley is distinguished as a music director, voice performer and teacher.

HOME tells the story of Neal, a gay man estranged from a condemning church, and Beatrice, a Christian burdened by a tradition which restricts God's love and excludes gay persons from faith communities. As their separate journeys toward a spiritual home intersect in this dramatic musical portrayal, they are transformed by this vision of a church which practices hospitality regardless of sexual identity. *HOME* is derived from the story of Peter and Cornelius in Acts 10 with modern musical elements from the Roman mass. *HOME* premieres in Chicago early in June then tours in churches in more than a dozen Midwest cities.

PWA SHOW AT THE MAX RAISES \$4000+

"This One's For You," the '94 version of The MAX's annual benefit show for the PWA Assistance Fund, raised \$4,303.00 which will go to help meet the emergency needs of persons diagnosed with AIDS.

This production was a kaleidoscope of color and motion and featured some of the most talented performers in the area. The show was dedicated to the memory of Wayne Tietson, general manager of The MAX, who died of AIDS in 1993. Wayne had conceived and staged the first two editions of this show. The set, designed by Tom Cech, was an elegant yet striking combination of red and white against the black walls. The quilt included photographs of Wayne and Tracy and of Wayne with his son and grandson. The piece also included the MAX insignia from Wayne's jacket, a teddy bear, appliques, a poem, tiny roller skates, a baseball cap inscribed "the world's best grandpa," and a carefully embroidered panel of irises among the mementos.
