Warning from the Police Department

A member of the gay community recently received a letter from B. Dean Leitner, Lincoln Chief of Police, and the Mayor's office concerning measures that would control activities at two areas where gay men frequent -- Antelope Park and the Adult Bookstore.

The police department has observed increased sexual activity at Antelope Park and has developed counter-measures to try and curtail public sex in the park. The restroom facilities are locked at 9:00 p.m., and a police substation is now operating out of the Antelope Pavilion. The conspicuous presence of officers using the station should put an end to Antelope Park as a meeting site for sexual activity," related Chief Leitner.

Also, measures have been taken at the Adult Bookstore. Plainclothes officers are located within the bookstore, and men have been arrested for making sexual advances toward the officers. More arrests are likely. In addition, the Mayor's office and police department are taking the bookstore to court. Violations have been cited, including the bookstore's refusal to remove all the doors in the arcade. It appears that the city wants to close the bookstore and is taking steps to do so.

I am not preaching nor trying to tell people what to do. However, I want to inform the gay community as to what is going on and suggest more appropriate meeting places for cruising and meeting other people. A few years ago, over 30 men were arrested at Antelope Park. All the names were published in the newspaper and several men lost their pride, dignity, and jobs. Some also lost their families. I would hate to see this happen again. It would be fair to say that public places are not

a safe environment to meet other people. Other settings, such as organizations and bars, would be a far better alternative.



Rev. Troy Perry to be Featured at Spiritual Renewal Weekend

The founder of the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches is scheduled to visit Omaha the last weekend of September to conduct a Spiritual Renewal for Christians. He is Rev. Troy Perry, who founded the UFMCC in Los Angeles in 1968. Since its inception, the church's membership has grown to over 32,000 with more than 200 study groups, missions and churches in ten countries.

Announcement of the plans for an Omaha Spiritual Renewal Weekend was made by Rev. Jan Kross, Pastor of the Metropolitan Community Church, 420 South 24th Street in Omaha- Rev. Kross said that Rev. Perry will conduct 7:30 p.m. renewal services Friday and Saturday evenings, September 26 The closing service is scheduled for Sunday, September 28, at 4:00 p.m. All services will be held at First Unitarian Church of Omaha, 3114 Harney Street in Omaha. Rev. Kross said all members of the Christian Community throughout the Midwest are invited continued on page 4

and encouraged to participate.

The UFMCC's doctrine is based on New Testament premises that the revelation of God in Jesus Christ is the religion set forth in the scriptures. Open to all people, the UFMCC is a Christian church called into being as an outreach to the gay and lesbian community. Approximately 85% of MCC members are gay men and lesbian womyn. The organization is actively committed to non-violent opposition to all forms of oppression, including sexism, racism, nationalism and homophobia.

Rev. Perry has held a seat on the Los Angeles County Commission on Human Relations and was honored in 1978 by the American Civil Liberties Union Lesbian and Gay Rights Chapter with its Humanitarian Award. He holds an Honorary Doctorate of Ministry from Samaritan College in Los Angeles. He is a noted author and speaker as well.

Rev. Perry lives by two credos: the first a belief in supernatural miracles and visions, and the second an overpowering conviction that God has a sense of humor. Both were validated to his satisfaction following two years of consideration and debate by the National Council of Churches over the UFMCC application for membership. The Council voted to postpone the application indefinitely. "I consider that vote to be a miracle," Perry said. "We haven't come out of this as victims or losers. The dialogue will continue," he said. As a result of the vote, Council leadership may recall the application at will.

Perry preached to a congregation that included several dozen board members of the National Council of Churches several months following the vote. Most of the members filed forward for communion. "When the first communion service in the history of the National Council of Churches comes from gays and lesbians," Perry said, "you know that God has a sense of humor."

Coalition Plans Annual Meeting

Plans for the annual meeting in October of the Coalition for Gay and Lesbian Civil Rights are being finalized. Each year the annual meeting draws a crowd of gay, lesbian, bisexual, and likeminded supporters together to attend workshops, listen to committee reports, socialize, and plan activities as well as the directions of committees for the coming year.

The activities which are a part of this year's all-day annual meeting are meant to emphasize the positive aspects of the gay, lesbian, and bisexual lifestyle. Participants will be able to select from a number of workshops to attend. Workshops include sessions on 'coming out,' a slide show illustrating Gay art since ancient times, current health issues affecting gay men, lesbians, and bisexuals, as well as panel discussions on how to build and maintain healthy relationships, how to deal with and prevent alcohol and drug abuse, and a panel discussion on religious issues affecting the gay, lesbian, and bisexual community today.

All of Lincoln's many and varied gay, lesbian, and bisexual organizations are being invited to have a representative inform participants of their organizations' projects and accomplishments for this past year as well as their goals for the coming year. Participants will be both better informed and able to lend a hand to any cause they believe worthy and to which they can contribute. In addition, Coalition members will be electing officers.

A keynote speaker (to be announced), a book fair (allowing persons to view and purchase the latest in gay, lesbian, and bisexual reading), a meal, and additional entertainment will fill out the day's events.

The Max's disco floor was converted into a theater in the round as the cast of "Straight to the Point" returned to stage for three more performances of the play.



Being Gay/Lesbian on Campus

Jim is a 17-year-old freshman at Kansas University. He has just graduated from high school and is majoring in psychology at KU. He came from another state to go to this institution. He doesn't know any other gay/leshian peers at the university. He has known that he is attracted to the same sex since he was eight years old.

Janet came to Cornell University to get away from home in Lawrence, Kansas. At 18, she is still developing her thoughts about herself and her career. She knows that she may be Being a newly-arrived freshman, she hasn't had time to acquaint herself with very many people. She has gotten to know a few 'straight' students on her dorm floor."

Shaun transferred to the University of Iowa from UCLA. He had to leave all of his friends behind. Shaun was a part of the Gay and Lesbian Association at UCLA, the gay student group. He is a junior in Computer Science. He feels stranded in the midst of the Bible Belt. Not being aware of any other gay students at the University of Iowa, Shaun feels isolated. The other men on his dorm floor are constantly deriding those students on campus who they feel fit gay stereotypes, describing them as swishy, effeminate and sick.

Catherine, an 18-year-old freshman at Smith College, lives in a large dormitory with 600 students. Her roommate is not aware of

Catherine's feelings about womyn. Catherine has always felt attracted to womyn. She feels trapped, castigated, and alone with her feelings.

These are some examples of students who are gay and lesbian and who are dealing with the college scene. They learn to play the straight game. If they decide not to play that game, they may reach out to other gays and lesbians. Student organizations are an important element to help these students feel comfortable with their sexual ori-Other groups in the entation. community can aid these students in living and loving in gay/lesbian world.

The feelings that gays and lesbians on a campus have can range from depression, loneliness, alienation and fear. They learn to operate in lots of straight social environments -- the fraternity or sorority, the dorm floor, the student union, or in the classroom. They must constantly deal with people assuming that they are straight. All of these

pressures affect young gay/lesbian students and often lead them to closet their identities.

Support systems that operate on campus to assist gay and lesbian students are: a gay/lesbian student organization or resource center; the dorm floor staff; the counseling local gay hotlines; empathetic clergy; or agencies outside the university.

Being gay or lesbian on campus doesn't have to be lonely, depressing, or alienating. It's up to the closeted student to reach out to other gays and lesbians. Our community is there to provide comfort, support and caring to these students. Many social activities outside the local gay bars are available and can be a chance for students to get to know each other.

The time is now for gay and lesbian students to get together and make campus a very gay activity. The offer is extended. It's up to you to take it!

Is Ronnie Reagan queer? My friend pointed out several suspicious traits of the president's during his recent press conference on TV. You be the judge.

He uses makeup. Now, this ought to be a dead giveaway. Republicans, conservatives, neo-Whigs and other right-thinking mastodons of the True Faith will erect themselves in outrage and say, "But it's for TV!" Well, that is a convenient excuse.

He dyes his hair. This rates about a 6 or 7 on the 10-point Queerometer scale. The last male public figure I knew of who dyed his hair was my hometown high school superintendent, who ran off with Ike the football coach. And these conclusions make about as much sense as the comments I hear about gays, lesbians, AIDS and a host of other facts from the mouths of uneducated heterosexuals.



The Max Celebrates Second Anniversary— A History of Gay Endeavor

The Max celebrates their second anniversary this month. The Max has already established itself as one of the best clubs in the country. The New Voice presents the history of a successful gay endeavor that started several years ago when Don and Bruce opened The Hollywood.

Throughout the past decade, the gay scene has evolved substantially. The unique and exciting business effort of Don (Stosh) Moran, and Bruce Barnard consistently add something worthwhile to our changing community.

For an early business venture, Don and Bruce's liquor store gave the impression of a trend setting establishment. It had a reputation of friendliness, of course, and you could even buy fresh flowers there.

In 1978, Don and Bruce decided that the community deserved something better. At this time the bars were tolerable but nothing special. They had the air of a corner tavern, which very few people were frequenting. The result was the construction of a bar called The Hollywood." Included, was a restaurant called "Chaplins." The newspapers and television crews promoted an excitement about such a bar, and soon, numbers of people flocked to the scene. It is estimated that with time, the bar population of gays on a weekend night increased from two or three hundred to over one thousand. It was not uncommon to see these 1000 people at The Hollywood on any given weekend night. It was simply the place to go.

This overflowing success was becoming the place for the straight crowd as well. When the bar scene approached nearly 100% straight, Don and Bruce decided to close the front door, and open a back entrance to promote a more gay population. This effort was successful. In becoming a gay bar again, the community began to grow along with the bar. Gay organizations

were cropping up, and the entertainment quality of bar shows had increased tremendously.

It is easy to see how the Hollywood influenced the evolution of the attitudes in the community. Young gays were no longer paranoid about being in the bars, and the no longer seemed ashamed to bring friends or even family to such a place. There was a certain amount of pride in the community.

In January of 1984, city expansions, with a "threat of domain" brought about the closing of the Hollywood -- and plans for a new bar.

Television shows such as "Solid Gold" and lighting schemes from rock concerts influenced Bruce in creating their next venture, The Max. The Max was to be constructed in a parking garaged with only four cement walls, a 30 foot ceiling, and no plumbing! The success of the Max since then speaks for itself as crowds are surprised by such additions as a new show stage and a patio.

Bruce and Stosh assure us that more surprises are on the way at the Max, and they are still seeking a location in Kansas City for another Max.

It is important to recognize the efforts of Don and Bruce in their promotion of a better gay atmosphere. Much of the attitudes and pride in our community are a result of the many changes in the past decade.

Coming Out to Your Parents Part II — Disclosure

By now, we will assume that you have thought about all the considerations (and more) that I presented in Part I of this article (see the August 1986 issue of The New Voice for Part I). So you've decided to tell your parents you are gay. The next step is deciding specifically how you are going to do that. And then doing it. That's the really scary part. The doubt may be lurking in your mind whether they will still accept you as part of their family. Will they even be able to love you anymore?

While there are cases where the parents, or one parent, may reject the child, let me remind you that parental love is a powerful thing. After all, parents nurture a child for many years before the child grows to adulthood and leaves the home. They watch the child grow. They hope and pray for their child's happiness. All that is pretty hard to forget. Yes, they may react very badly right away due to the shock of such news, but given time they'll probably see you still as their child, regardless. Here are some suggestions that might help you -- and them -- get through this very trying experience.

First, try to tell them in person if it is at all within your power. Granted, too many miles between you may not allow this. If something like that is the case, perhaps a phone call will be just as good. The important thing is that they hear it from you, not from someone else. Hopefully, they will see it as a sign of your respect for them that you tell them yourself. They are bound to have many questions. Try to do them the courtesy of being there to answer them.

Honesty is also extremely important. The truth may hurt, but it's easier to deal with than lies. Lies will only make them trust you less. Don't water down any of your feelings just to try to soften the blow. The only way they can even start to accept that you are "different" is to know what your feelings are. They most likely won't be able to understand why you are gay, why your feelings are for persons

of the same sex, but they need to know what your feelings are before simple acceptance can begin.

Be prepared to tell them why you feel you are gay. They may think that this is a "phase" or wonder where you "learned" this behavior. Parents may express guilt over the way they raised you. Don't let them blame themselves or anyone else. Nobody can make you gay if the inclination is not already naturally there. This is something from inside you. Back yourself up with readings on when and how sexual orientation is determined early in childhood. Know what other theories have been raised, so that you can discuss them intelligently, laying to rest those which are myths.

Don't apologize for being gay. Apologies imply that you are wrong. Your parents will feel shock and pain, no doubt. And that might make you feel had. If you do, remember that it's because what you've said has caused them to hurt. But don't apologize for being gay. Remember that it is a natural part of your whole being, just like having blue or brown eyes. And you don't apologize for your eye color, do you?

Try to get them to see you as a human being, not as a label. You are a homosexual, but you are also a student or a waitress or a lawyer. Labels should be downplayed; they can be depersonalizing. It'll be easier for parental love to overcome prejudice if they view you as a person rather than a thing.

Remind them that you're still the same person you've always been. Only how they see you has changed because now they know something else they didn't know before. You still have the same values and morals they taught you. Your parents will probably, at first, feel that the son or daughter they knew has suddenly become a total stranger. They'll feel a great separation from you. They'll feel they don't know you anymore. Point out that now they know you better.

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

Campaign Underway to Defeat LaRouche Initiative

Voter registration and a "Get Out the Vote" campaign plans are underway. Almost half of the goal of registering 7000 voters in the Los Angeles area has been reached. Volunteers are signing up approximately 500 new voters a week. Based on polls and voter history, 700,000 to 800,000 households will be called from phone banks around the state in an effort to convince the undecided and borderline supporters of the proposition to vote "no."

Hal Larson and Associates, a nationally renowned media consulting firm, has been hired and currently is producing television spots to inform the general public about the implications of Proposition 64. The proposition purports to protect people with AIDS as well as people who may be exposed to the HTLV-III virus by calling for measures such as barring people suspected of AIDS from working in schools, medical, food service and other public contact industries.

Educational walks through downtown Los Angeles and beach areas are targeting the "person on the street," with volunteers handing out brochures about the proposition in English and Spanish and signing up people to help in the "No" campaign. Speakers are being prepared to represent both No on LaRouche and No on 64 to local organizations, the media, and national organizations to get the word out about Proposition 64 and its backers.

A Women's Coalition has been formed, with representatives from the National Women's Political Caucus, National Organization for Women, and National Council of Jewish Women on the steering committee. Leaders from the Black, Latino, and Asian communities, gay and non-gay, are joining together to form a Minority Council to work against Proposition 64.

Lesbian Against LaRouche, a task force of No on LaRouche, have formed "LaRouche L'Raiders" -- a hit team which fundraises at Los Angeles-area men's and women's events. To date, the group has raised \$7000 of its \$25,000 goal.

No on 64/Stop LaRouche, coordinated by veteran campaign organizer David Mixner, handles all major media work, while the No On LaRouche Initiative Coalition, co-chaired by Ivy Bottini and Eric Rofes, is conducting voter registration and grassroots organizing. The two groups share office space at 3670 Wilshire Boulevard.


At least another \$2 million needs to be raised for the media campaign alone which is required to defeat the proposition, according to Torrie Osborne, coordinator for the No on 64 campaign in Southern California. Contributions are being sought nationally to stop the quarantine idea before it becomes a national trend. Various local, state, and national communities, including the gay and lesbian community, the medical profession and religious organizations, are being solicited for financial as well as political support for the "No" campaign. The entertainment industry is being mobilized by a committee of celebrities. which includes Bob Hope, Carol Burnett, Diahann Carroll, Matthew Broderick, Sally Field, Elizabeth Taylor, Goldie Hawn, Gregory Peck, Quincy Jones, Gene Kelly, Barbra Striesand, television executive Barbara Corday, producer Barry Drost, songwriters Alan and Marilyn Bergman, directors Martin Ritt and Sydney Pollack, among others. Robin Williams is set to perform at a September 4 fundraiser in San Francisco.

Other fundraising events include a "Monte Carlo Night" at the Pacific Design Center on September 13 and a "Button Night" in Los Angeles County bars on September 27. About 70 bars are expected to be worked by volunteers who will give out buttons, bumperstickers and brochures for \$1 donations from the patrons. The first weekend in October is being reserved for 3000 private house parties around continued on page 20

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Response to the AIDS crisis inside gay communities has been swift and largely positive: support-groups, fund-raising efforts, safe-sex campaigns, public education programs, hospices and more have been founded and funded. All of these organized responses have employed the visual and media arts as part of their educational and funding campaigns. This exhibition, "The AIDS Show," is testimony to these community and individual responses to the crisis as reflected in various media.

The exhibition will be organized to reflect the two directions from which AIDS image-making primarily comes: community organizations and individual artists. The exhibition will be sponsored by. and opening at, the Ohio State University Gallery of Fine Art. The show will open during Na-tional Gay Pride Week (late June 1987) and will tour afterward in two different versions -- one for gallery and museum exhibition spaces; and a second in simplified format for exhibition by community organizations. 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
