Lesbian And Gay Couples Win Freedom To Marry In Connecticut

HARTFORD, CT – The Connecticut Supreme Court today ruled that barring same-sex couples from marriage violates that state's constitution. The American Civil Liberties Union, which was co-counsel in the case along with Gay and Lesbian Advocates and Defenders, applauded the decision.



"Today's decision makes it clear that it's unfair to treat same-sex couples who make the same commitments that other couples do any differently," said Andrew Schneider, Executive Director of the ACLU of Connecticut. "We couldn't be happier about today's decision by the court, be-

cause it truly fulfills our state's promise to treat all of its citizens equally under the law."

That reasoning was evident in the opinion, in which Justice Richard N. Palmer wrote, "Interpreting our state constitutional provisions in accordance with firmly established equal protection principles leads inevitably to the conclusion that gay people are entitled to marry... To decide otherwise would require us to apply one set of constitutional principles to gay persons and another to all others."

The case was brought in 2004 in New Haven Superior Court on behalf of eight gay and lesbian Connecticut couples who had been denied marriage licenses. The couples have now been together for between ten and 32 years and are raising a total of 14 children.

The plaintiffs in Kerrigan & Mock et al v. Connecticut Department of Public Health were represented by Gay & Lesbian Advocates & Defenders and the ACLU of Connecticut. Maureen Murphy of Murphy, Murphy & Nugent, LLC and Kenneth J. Bartschi and Karen Dowd of Horton, Shields & Knox, P.C. were cooperating counsel.



Global AIDS Prevention Gives Short Shrift to Gays

Jorge Saavedra's moment of truth came in the middle of an impassioned speech to 5,000 people about the paltry amount of money being spent to stop the spread of AIDS among gay men.

The Mexican federal official paused, then said publicly for the first time that he was gay.

As he held up a photo of himself with his partner, the crowd applauded wildly. Afterward, men from Africa and India congratulated him with tears in their eyes.

"They told me that I was a hero and that they wished they could do the same in their countries," said Saavedra, who is infected with HIV and also heads the AIDS prevention program in a country where many gay men live in denial.

Saavedra's coming-out on Tuesday at the International AIDS Conference sent a powerful message to the world: Homophobia must be stamped out if AIDS is to be controlled.

Fewer people are dying from AIDS, but rates of new HIV infections among gay and bisexual men in many countries are rising at alarming rates.

Yet less than 1% of the \$669 million reported in global prevention spending targets men who have sex with men, according to UNAIDS figures from 2006, the latest available data.

UNAIDS says these men receive the lowest coverage of HIV prevention services of any at-risk population. And experts say discrimination has driven gay and bisexual men in developing nations underground -- turning them into one of the epidemic's hardest groups to reach. From Mexico to India, a surprising number of men who have sex with men insist they are not gay, and in many countries, governments still refuse to admit homosexuality exists.

"It's very difficult to provide services to men who have sex with men in countries that don't acknowledge they exist or criminalize them if they do exist," said Craig McClure, executive director of International AIDS Society, which organized the conference.

In 86 nations, homosexual sex is considered a crime, and in seven countries it is punishable by death, according to the Foundation for AIDS Research, known as Amfar.

During the conference's inauguration, U.N. secretary general Ban Ki-moon urged nations "to follow Mexico's bold example and pass laws against homophobia."

In 2003, Mexico banned discrimination based on sexual orientation, and it has opened what it calls homophobic-free health clinics. The government has a national campaign that includes radio spots with mothers accepting their gay sons. Saavedra's program has earmarked 10% of its \$12 million budget toward prevention among gay and bisexual men.

Worldwide, few developing nations check the rates of HIV infection among men who have sex with men, but researchers who have surveyed some of these countries say they are finding the rates are nearly twice that of the general adult population.

"This fight needs to be driven by epidemiologists" who urge making this high-risk group a priority, not only for the human rights argument, but for the public health argument, said Chris Beyrer, director of the Center for Public Health and Human Rights at Johns Hopkins University. "It's a virus so you need to put the money where the virus is."

Gay and bisexual men are 19 times more likely to become infected with HIV than the general adult population, according to Amfar, which collected data on these men in 128 countries. In Mexico, this group is 109 times more likely to acquire HIV. To date, 57% of the HIV diagnoses in Mexico are from unprotected sex between men.

Thailand is seeing "an emerging epidemic of really unbelievable proportions" among its gay and bisexual men after being held up as an example for its success with a massive condom campaign that curbed HIV's spread among sex workers, drug users, and migrants, said Kevin Frost, Amfar's chief executive officer.

Prevalence of HIV among gay and bisexual Thai men was more than 15% this year compared to 1.4% for the general adult population, according to Amfar. Frost said the country's prevention programs ignored one of its most vulnerable groups.

"These men believed they were not at risk because they were not having sex with sex workers or women, which is what the campaign focused on," Frost said. "That scenario is being played out across the developing world."

Complicating matters is that in countries from Latin America to Southeast Asia, many men who have sex with men insist they are not gay. More than 30% of Latin American men who reported having sex with men said they also had unprotected sex with women, according to UNAIDS. Many are married.

"Everybody knows somebody like that," Saavedra, 48, said.
"Instead of saying they are gay, it's easier for them to justify their behavior. They say they were drunk and they were really sexually excited and willing to have sex with whomever."

Some have beaten up transvestites after having sex with them because they are ashamed of themselves, experts say.

Even governments deny these men exist. Last year, Iranian president Mahmoud Ahmadinejad said at Columbia University in New York, "In Iran we don't have homosexuals like in your country."

In Malawi, that country's first organization working on behalf of gay men was created in 2006 with the backing of World Bank officials and other international agencies.

Called the Centre for the Development of People, the group surveyed 100 gay men about discrimination to prove to the government that such men existed in Malawi. Homosexual sex is punishable up to 14 years in prison in the African country.

The organization also found through testing 200 gay men that about 21% carried HIV compared with 12% for the general adult population.

"This means that we are not moving ahead with the fight against AIDS," said Gift Trapence, the organization's director, who has received e-mails threatening hanging.

AIDS activists say they avoid using words like "homosexual" or "gay" and instead use the label "men who have sex with men," or MSM, so their work is not impeded by the stigma.

Ashok Row Kavi said he has learned the importance of carefully choosing his words in India, where he started one of the country's first organizations to work with gay and bisexual men.

The Humsafar Trust found nearly 14% of the gay and bisexual men it surveyed in 1999 were infected with HIV. Kavi said when he told India's AIDS officials they "totally panicked because until now they believed these men did not exist."

But last year they added a definition of men who have sex with men to their health planning program to start prevention campaigns. The definition includes married men.

Diane's Story

"My partner and I had been together for 14 years when I received the worst phone call of my life. There had been a terrible accident, and she was being flown to the hospital by helicopter. The hospital staff wanted to know how to get in touch with her next of kin. Mine was the only phone number they could find in her wallet. I gave them her parents' phone number, got into the car and drove straight to the hospital.

When I arrived at the hospital, I couldn't get any information on Susan's condition. The hospital staff informed me that medical information could only be released to Susan's family. For them, family did not include live-in partners regardless of the length of the relationship. It took six hours for Susan's parents to arrive at the hospital. During that time, I sat in the hospital waiting room and wasn't allowed to see or comfort her.

Only after Susan's parents arrived was I able to see her. Thankfully, they were caring people who accepted our relationship. The doctors predicted that Susan would not make it through the night. She died within the next hour. All that time had been wasted as I sat in that dark waiting room. She had been slowly dying alone, when I should have been holding her hand and couldn't."

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Kavi has been training health workers how to ask men if they have had gay sex and not scare them away.

"I tell them to say things like, 'There are many cultures where men are very close to men. Are you one of these men?" he said. "These questions have to be sensitive," especially in India, where sodomy is illegal.

Rainbow Outreach, Not Out of Touch

The month of October is GLBT History month. It should be important that in a community you live in, that you know something of and from that community. How better to do this than to know about the Rainbow Outreach GLBT Center. I decided to question George Broadway, Board Chair and The Gayzette editor, about our community center.

Here is a piece from which we know about George Broadway and his affiliation with ROC. "When I first came out to the world (and my wife) around 2000, I didn't know any gay people, had no idea who I could talk to or where I could get information about being a gay man. So in this modern age of computers and the Internet I decided to find out as much as I could "online". I discovered the Men's Support Group (no longer meeting) which was being held at the MCC Omaha church every Tuesday night. I also discovered the Rainbow Outreach GLBT Resource Center and decided to stop by. That's when I decided I wanted to be involved with the Center. After a short time I became a board member at the Center and have been here ever since. After about 3 years I became the Board Chairman of the Center and for the last 4 years I have been the editor of our publication, The Gayzette. The Center was first opened in March of 1997 at its current location, 1719 Leavenworth Street."

Since it is history month, has the Center broken any glass ceilings in any way shape or form with regards to the GLBT community and the city of Omaha as a whole? "We have made some inroads for the Omaha GLBT community, most notably the Friday Night Youth Drop-in. It's a time where all GLBT and straight youth can stop in and spend a casual evening with friends, watch a video or read a book in our library. Our youth group has organized their own youth board, electing board members and organizing events.

We have also assembled a fairly large library of books ranging from fiction to reference titles. Most of the books have been donated by friends of the Center and we really appreciate their donations. We now have over 1600 books, DVD's and video tapes."

How many organizations use the ROC, is there room for more? "There are a number of organizations and groups that use the Center. Some are very regular and some are occasional users of the facility. Groups that currently use the Center include The Omaha GLBT Sports League, Rainbow Celebrations, ICON, the Flower of Hope Transgender Support Group and we have an every Friday night Youth Drop-in. Is there room for more groups and meeting? There sure is. We want the Center to be used by the GLBT community as much as possible for meetings and other similar purposes. If you want to inquire about holding your meeting at the Center you can email me at glbtcenter@rainbowoutreach.org."

Is the ROC being used to its full potential in your view? Is it serving the value and purpose of the community? "Some have asked "who" the Center is for. It's for anyone and everyone. We welcome everyone no matter what their race, religion, sexual orientation or age. The Center is for that person who needs information or a place to discover their new life as a GLBT person. To ask questions and hopefully get meaningful answers to their questions. At one time most all of us were in the position of being afraid to admit to being gay, afraid to open the closet door and close it behind us for good. But we did it and we moved on to a better life. Some folks have not been able

to close that closet door behind them, afraid of being rejected by their families, friends and co-workers. As we all know, it was not an easy thing to do and often remains a difficult process. Most of the people in the GLBT community don't use the Center. But for that person who walks through the door and is confused about possibly being gay, or the person who calls the Center and is crying over the phone because they just can't come to grips with their sexuality, or the young person who has been harassed in school, beaten up because they are different or the person whose family has found out about them and not accepted the fact very well, those are the people who need the Center the most."

What are some of the monthly, yearly hardships that the ROC faces? What can help the ROC operate a little easier today, tomorrow, or next year? "Proper funding would go a long way to keeping the Center open and operating at a higher level of service. We currently run the whole organization on about \$20,000 a year and that covers rent, electricity, heating air conditioning, insurance, phone and internet service, not to mention supplies for day to day operation. Often it's not enough and I have to chip in to make ends meet. We really appreciate the local organizations that make us the benefactor of their shows at the bars and other events. We can sure use the help. I'm a frugal person and when I can cut an expense, I do so. Our major source of income is advertising income from producing The Gayzette. If it wasn't for The Gayzette we would have closed the doors for good many years ago."

Well then let's say the ROC was granted the money or won the lottery per say, what direction and improvements would we see happen to the ROC? "When the Center was first opened it was hoped that it could eventually expand into a bigger facility, open a housing unit for emergency housing, open a recreation center, have professional counselors on site and a few other great ideas. But all of those things take a considerable amount of money and a lot of work. Most of those things have not happened (vet) but who knows, perhaps someday we'll be able to make some or all of those "dreams" come true, should we receive a big Grant, get an enormous donation from a benefactor who knows the value of what we do, or maybe we'll win the Powerball lottery (but I suppose we would have to buy a few lottery tickets for that to happen). In any event, should we come into a substantial cash flow those "dreams" I mentioned earlier could become a reality. I know the original founders of the Center would be pleased."

With all that was mentioned then, where do you see the ROC five years from now? "In five years I hope to see The Center in a new location with more space and hopefully sharing that space with other organizations that also want an office, storage space or whatever. A full fledged computer center with computers that are not hand me downs. Professional counselors available, safe sex education, smoking cessation programs, a drug abuse help program and possibly many others. It would depend on how well the funding had developed." Rainbow Outreach Center's hours vary but their website has information for their hours and other information including The Gayzette online. See www.rainbowoutreach.org



Mormons Bankroll Anti-Gay Marriage Amendments in California, Arizona

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints has mobilized followers to give an estimated 77% of donations to support California's proposed marriage ban.

Californians Against Hate released figures Tuesday showing that \$17.67 million was contributed by 59,000 Mormon families since August to groups like Yes on 8. Contributions in support of Prop. 8 total \$22.88 million. Additionally, the group reports that Mormons have contributed \$6.9 million to pass a a similar law, Proposition 102, in Arizona.

"It is a staggering amount of money and an even more staggering percentage of the overall campaign receipts," Fred Karger of Californians Against Hate said in a press release. "The Mormon Church, based in Salt Lake City, Utah, has hijacked the campaigns in both California and Arizona, where voters face constitutional amendments to end same-sex marriage."

Karger said Californians Against Hate came up with the figures by cross-referencing donor information from the California secretary of state with Brigham Young University alumni lists, church memberships, and other personal documentation that could identify Mormon Church members. He said the surge in support has been an attempt to boost the church's social standing among the greater religious community.

"For whatever reason, they're trying to get some respect from other religions," he told The Advocate Tuesday. "They've always been looked down upon by the Christians, the Catholics, and evangelicals."

Success with the marriage amendment would give the church credibility, Karger said.

The Latter-day Saints Church says it has approximately 770,000 members in California, accounting for about 2% of the state's population. Senior church elders broadcast a call to Mormons October 8 for increased volunteer efforts and donations for the marriage fight. The hour-long message went out to churches in Utah, Hawaii, and Idaho as well as California.

Members of the Quorum of Twelve Apostles, the second-highest church governing body, explained their plan to pass the ballot initiative. They asked each California congregation to commit 30 volunteers to donate four hours a week to Proposition 8. They also urged young people to use technology -- such as social networks, text messaging, and blogging -- to spread the word. (Michelle Garcia, The Advocate)

Boston College Study:Why Gay Couples Marry

A recently released Boston College study indicates that legal recognition and the opportunity to make a public statement are the prime motivators for Massachusetts gay and lesbian couples to marry.

The college conducted the study 13 months after Massachusetts

legalized same-sex marriage. (The state began marrying gay couples in May 2004.) Professor Pamela J. Lannutti surveyed 263 couples, including those who were legally married in Massachusetts and those who plan to marry. The average relationship duration was 7.5 years.

A quarter of couples said they were motivated to marry for legal protections, while 20% said they wanted to make a public statement of commitment, and only 15% cited feelings for their partner.

Others said they tied the knot to receive acknowledgement from family members (14%), legal protection for help in having children (13%), political reasons (4%), and religious reasons (2%).

"The arrival of same-sex marriage brings up many issues that often lurk in the background in families. It forces same-sex couples and their parents to confront their deepest feelings about same-sex love," said Robert-Jay Green, Ph.D., in a press release from Rockway Institute, a national center for psychology research, education, and public policy on sexual orientation and gender issues.

A common obstacle for same-sex couples to overcome when considering marriage is lack of family approval. Forty-one percent of the couples interviewed reported dissatisfaction from parents. A majority of couples, 58%, said their primary method of dealing with family members' disapproval is to ignore it. "We almost changed our minds about getting married," said a male participant. "We thought our families were OK with us as a couple, but when we wanted to send out wedding invitations.

Brad Pitt to Give \$100,000 to Fight California Marriage Ban

Hollywood A-lister Brad Pitt announced on Wednesday he's donating \$100,000 to fight Proposition 8, the November ballot initiative that could ban same-sex marriage in California.

The Los Angeles Times reports that Pitt's contribution is the largest anti-Prop. 8 donation by a celebrity.

"Because no one has the right to deny another their life, even though they disagree with it; because everyone has the right to live the life they so desire if it doesn't harm another; and because discrimination has no place in America, my vote will be for equality and against Proposition 8," the actor said in a statement.

Political strategist Chad Griffin told the Times that he hopes Pitt's donation spurs more celebrity donors. He added that Democratic billionaire Ron Burkle plans to host a large fund-raiser at his home in October to rally the entertainment industry against Prop. 8.

Recent weeks have been marred by reports that the Yes on 8 campaign has seen a huge influx of cash support from wealthy evangelical donors. According to reports, the bulk of the donations have come from outside California. (Neal Broverman, The Advocate)
