#### Gay Pride Week— Nebraska Style

Gay Pride Week 1986 is a two-week event this year, bigger and better than ever before. Committees in Omaha and Lincoln have been working hard over the past few months to plan for many activities of interest to both gays and lesbians across the state.

Pride Activities begin on Saturday, June 14, when the River City Mixed Chorus sponsors an Art Show at the MCC from noon to 5 pm. The River City Mixed Chorus is also sponsoring a world premier play "Straight to the Point" which will be performed at the UNO Theatre beginning at 8 pm. Admission is \$9.00.

On Sunday, June 15, MCC will conduct a worship service at the MCC church beginning at 10:30 am. The River City Mixed Chorus will present a Pride Concert starting at 3 pm at the UNO Recital Hall.

A volleyball tournament is being sponsored by The Run starting at 6 pm on Monday, June 16. The tournament will continue on Tuesday and Wednesday. Organizations, bars, and groups are welcome to participate.

On Wednesday, June 18 the Metropolitan Club will hold its monthly meeting at The Lodge in Peony Park starting at 6 pm. Admission is \$4.00. Also on tap for Wednesday is a night of videos with gay themes sponsored by DIGNITY/Omaha. Films will be

shown at the Ms. Flowers Lounge at The Max, beginning at 7 pm.

The Nebraska AIDS Project is sponsoring an Awards Dinner on Thursday, June 19 at the Paxton Ballroom. Admission is \$20.00. Cocktails will start at 6 pm and dinner begins at 7 pm.

On Friday the Imperial Court Royalty is sponsoring a cocktail party for the gay community beginning at 6 pm at Mandina's Mansion. Admission is \$5.00. The Imperial Court is also sponsoring a welcome to out-of-towners show at The Chesterfield Bar beginning at 9 pm. The cost is \$2.00.

Another highlight of Omaha Pride Week takes place on Saturday, June 21, with the Imperial Court of Nebraska's Coronation. A new Emperor, Empress, and Athena will be crowned. Festivities begin at 6:30 pm at The Warehouse at Carter Lake, Iowa. Admission is \$7.50 in advance and \$10 at the door.

Another major event takes place on Sunday with the second annual Pride Parade, sponsored by representatives of Omaha bars and organizations. The parade starts at 9:30 pm. Sunday also features an MCC worship service at 10:30 am and "A Quiet Moment," sponsored by MCC, DIGNITY/Omaha, and Community of Grace beginning at 9 pm.

Sunday also features a Stepping Down Show at The Max. The show is sponsored by the Imperial Court and begins at 10 pm. A final event is a Wet Jockey Short Contest held at The Run.

June 22 kicks off Gay Pride Week in Lincoln. A Book Fair will be held from 4 to 8 pm at Kelly's and The Boardwalk. On Friday, June 27, a Video Night will be held at The Club and Kelly's and will feature a new release called "The AIDS Show," produced by Rob Epstein. (He also produced "The Life and Times of Harvey Milk.") The films begin at 8 pm.

On Saturday, a country-style picnic will be held from 2 pm - 7 pm. (Obtain more information at Lincoln's bars.)

A Book Fair and Organizational Fair will end Gay Pride festivities in Lincoln on Sunday, June 29. The Fairs will be held from 4 pm to 8 pm at Kelly's and The Boardwalk, All proceeds from the Book Fair will go to the 1987 Pride Week Celebration. Several gay and lesbian titles will be featured at The Book Fair.







#### Erotic Safe Sex Workshop Informative & Fun

Dr. Clark Taylor, sexologist and anthropologist from San Francisco, captivated audiences in Lincoln and Omaha on April 26 and 27 at the UNL Student Union and at The Max. Dr. Taylor's presentation focused on eroticizing safe sex and included a lecture, multi-video showing, and demonstration of


products used to help make sex fun. The seminar was sponsored by the Coalition for Gay and Lesbian Civil Rights and by the Imperial Court.

Dr. Taylor provided evidence that safe sex could be innovative, erotic, and very pleasurable. He suggested that each individual make his own choices and decisions regarding safe sex. The main object of safe sex is not to exchange bodily fluid, especially semen. Many gay men have had trouble changing their sexual lifestyles because they feel it is important to swallow semen. It is also a new experience for gay men to use latex and condoms. But many new methods of sexual exploration have occurred because of safe sex. Couples are discovering foreplay, touch, and massage and are finding sex to be even more enjoyable. "Given enough variety of things to do, we can create our own safe sex lifestyle," related Dr. Clark.

Just like an onion there are layers of risk reduction and each additional layer offers more protection against the possibility of contacting AIDS. For example, using condoms during oral and anal sex

is one layer of protection. Taking a bath before sex can add another layer. Using a latex glove during anal play is an additional layer.

Dr. Clark suggested better communication between sex partners. Expressing feelings is very important, especially when you first start using condoms and make other changes in your sexual practices. Dr. Clark advises each gay male to develop a safe sex plan, one that involves each person writing down specifically what safe sex practices they are willing to do, might do, and won't do. He also stressed the importance

of practicing safe sex techniques and suggested that each person set aside an hour a day to play with safe sex.

A poor method of safe sex is to avoid people who may look sick or pale. Dr. Taylor pointed out that healthy looking people can have the virus or be carriers.

Safe sex can be a long, stimulating experience. Spend an afternoon massaging a foot or give someone a bath.

Dr. Taylor ended his presentation by showing and demonstrating items used in safe sex. For example, feathers, fur gloves, and pompoms can add to sexual enjoyment. He explained the differences in condoms and passed out samples of rubbers as well as water-soluble lubricant.

His talk was very well received by small audiences in the two cities. It is clear that more people need to learn and practice safe sex techniques.







There are a number of reasons to be proud. As Americans, we feel the surge of patriotism when we hear "The Star Spangled Banner" or see Old Glory unfurled in the wind. If you are a football fan, you may get excited when UNL's Big Red runs onto the field. If you graduated from a school where you were involved, your pride rises whenever anyone makes fun of that school. If you are a parent, have someone just try to not look at the latest photos.

Our nation has done some things we are not real proud of, Big Red has not always been a winner, every school has had its scandals, and every family has a skeleton somewhere in its closet.

During June, the gay/lesbian communities throughout the U.S. are celebrating the anniversary of Stonewall with Gay Pride parades and other activities. It is a time to show our pride in what it means to be gays and lesbians. Perhaps the first step in the celebration is to put aside our complaints and gripes about our community. We need to remember that the social order of the gay/lesbian community is very new -- particularly in the Midwest. MCC Omaha has a history of thirteen years, Imperial Court of Nebraska crowns Emperor and Empress VI this year, River City Mixed Chorus is just over one year old. The Diamond Bar has over 45 years of operating as a gay bar, and The Max is just over a year old. New organizations are coming into being all the time, and maturing is a time-consuming process of falling down, bruising, and getting back up. If we can find fault with the U.S. government that has been

from the Coalition for Gay & Lesbian Civil Rights working "for the people" for over 200 years, it is not surprising that our community is subject to some fault finding.

Each of us who participates in the community experience — be it going to the bars, attending support groups, or associating with other gays and lesbians — is a part of the total success or failure of the gay/lesbian community of Nebraska. We are not where the communities of New York or San Francisco are at, but we don't have to travel far to see what life is like where there is no "community." Most of us left those towns to move to Omaha or Lincoln.

Having a "homosexual" preference is but a small part of the gay/lesbian experience as a total lifestyle within the community. We have come a long way in a short time, and, with pride, we can go a lot farther. This is a time to declare to one another that we are not ashamed, but rather proud to be gays and lesbians. Let us celebrate who we are and hope to be in community!

#### Walking Tall

By now, most Americans either have forgotten that we ever bombed Libya, or have filed the incident in their scrapbooks, right by Grenada and other heroic clippings of Rambopolitik. This latest example of Ronald Reagan's view of the world as a horse opera has many Americans "walking tall" once again. One hopes (probably in vain) that they will bang their heads against some cold semblance of reality.

The Libya blitz shouldn't have come as a great surprise. Reagan has tipped his hand repeatedly to reveal his masturbatory fantasies of whipping the Commies and nasty A-rabs, and the hair on his palm is all too visible. But before he wakes up from his wet dream of power, he will have succeeded in inducing another orgasm of intolerance for too many Americans.

What will happen if, for example, a West German terrorist group strikes at American installations or personnel, as has happened before? Will Reagan sic the Air Force on Bonn or Munich? Will the CIA or Jerry Falwell go after Helmut Kohl?

Probably not; most Germans, after all, are white Europeans. We kill them only in declared wars.

The frightening aspect of all this has been the reaction of an apparent majority of Americans: war frenzy, and satisfaction at killing innocent citizens. Terrorism of any sort should not be condoned, whether it be Libyan- or Americansanctioned. But the bloodlust of some American people, as evidenced in newspapers and on TV, revealed close kinship to genocide.

So what has all this to do with being gay, and with gay issues? Intolerance, especially when sanctioned by an authoritarian government which cloaks itself in morality, is something that we must keep constantly in mind. In the thinking of many Americans, gays and lesbians are not really part of this country. We are a fear, a perversion, a plague. We are different. We are, in a sense, Libyans.

So what are we to do? We must also walk tall: with our own dignity and pride, in the knowledge that we are entitled to the rights of all people in a free society. Our rights -- including those not fully won -- should be nothing more or less than the constitutional guarantees of all Americans. This includes the right to fight for those guarantees. This includes the right to dissent.

By living as lesbians and gays, we are dissenting. However, by supporting Reagan's policies of "might makes right," we encourage intolerance and oppression. By taking politically safe views, we cut our own throats with a safety razor. It is not too extreme to imagine the American fever of annihilation directed at a group of people here in the United States. It has happened before. It takes little imagination to guess who the next targets might be,

Too many of us spend our lives bemoaning our fate, or paying no attention to ways in which we can better our lives. As the anarchist leader Joe Hill said before he was shot by the state of Utah, "Don't mourn. Organize!" It's still good advice.

#### Pet Orientation Amendment Considered in Ames, Iowa

An amendment to the Ames, Iowa Human Rights Ordinance has been proposed to include domestic animal preference as a protected category in employment, housing, and public accommodations. The Ames Pet Rights Task Force stated, "Owners of all kinds of pets should be treated equally - cats, dogs, ferrets, whatever."

#### Texas May Open AIDS Hospital

HOUSTON - The first hospital in the nation devoted to AIDS re-search and diagnosis may be opened in Houston, if a plan to convert a for-profit hospital is worked out. The University of Texas Board of Regents recently approved the plans for Citizen's Hospital. The 150-bed hospital would continue to be operated by AMI Corporation. The university would provide clinical direction and research.

#### Methodists Drop Case Against Rev. Rush

The Board of Ministry of the Rocky Mountain Conference of the United Methodist Church has voted to drop charges against Rev. Julian Rush, associate pastor of St. Paul UMC in Denver.

Two ministers in the Rocky Mountain Conference brought charges against Rush after newspaper articles appeared a year ago in which Rush disclosed facts about his relationship with his lover.

In a closed door session, a vote described as "close" exonerated Rush from fitting the definition of "selfavowed practicing homosexual." While Rush has said that he is gay, he has never disclosed that he's engaged in genital sexual behavior. Said Rush in a statement to the board:

Am I a self-avowed practicing homosexual? I decline to answer that question because I believe that I am a worthy person who deserves the same rights of privacy as anyone else. We so easily give lip service to human justice, reconciliation, and unconditional love. But I and thousands of other gay men and lesbians hope for a day when those words will apply to us."

#### Court Orders Gay Father to Take Blood Test

CHICAGO - The National Gay Rights Advocates have appealed a Chicago court order requiring a gay father to take an HTLV-III antibody test in order to visit his children. NGRA attorneys have informed the court that the father will refuse to comply with the order. As a result, the judge has agreed to reconsider the order and hear further evidence from both sides.

"The judge's original decision was clearly wrong," declared Benjamin Schatz, Director of NGRA's AIDS Civil Rights Project. "The HTLV-III antibody test does no tell us whether a person has or will develop AIDS. Moreover, even if the father did have AIDS-which he does not-there would be no reason to keep him from visiting his children. AIDS cannot be casually transmitted, and it is time for the courts to recognize this fact."—Out Front, Colorado

#### NGLTF Closes NY Office

NEW YORK - In a cost-cutting move, the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) board of directors voted to shut down its New York office. At the emergency board meeting, called to save the financially floundering organization, the board also named co-director Jeff Levi as the sole executive director, replaced two officers on the board, and approved new financial controls and further program reductions.

The country's oldest national gay organization, with a membership of 7,000 and a debt said to be over \$82,000, will now be headquartered in Washington, DC.

#### Gay French Author Dies

PARIS - Gay French author Jean Genet died of throat cancer on April 15. Genet's work included: Our Lady of the Flowers, Miracle of the Rose, Funeral Rites, Querelle of Brest, and The Thief's Journal. Several of his books were made into films. Rainer Werner Fassbinder based his film Querelle on Genet's novel about a bisexual sailor.

#### Landlord Must Offer Lease to Surviving Lover

NEW YORK - A state judge has ruled that a landlord must offer a lease to a surviving lover in a gay relationship. Landlord Bruce Kafenbaum has started eviction proceedings against Michael Brown, whose lover, Robert Hayes, died of AIDS. Brown's name was not on the lease for the Manhattan apartment where he and Hayes had lived together for eight years. On April 21, Judge Freedman ruled that Brown must be treated the same as a close family member. Kafenbaum is also obliged to offer Brown a vacancy lease and is allowed to increase his rent by no more than seven-and-a-half percent. - Gay Community News, Massachusetts

#### Gay Videotapes Seized

ROCKVILLE, MD - Because X-rated gay videotapes went "beyond normal X-rated tapes," a video store in this Washington suburb was forced by police to remove nearly 300 gay and lesbian movies from its shelves. Only one heterosexual X-rated tape was requested to be removed.

Assistant Maryland State's Attorney Louis Lear refused to comment on what classes of films might be considered obscene. He said his office uses the U.S. Supreme Court view of obscenity. When asked if a film depicting sex between two men was considered obscene, Lear said, "I'm not going to go into that."

#### Bath Houses Close in Denver

DENVER - In surprising and totally coincidental developments, two of Denver's major bathhouses are closing. The Empire Baths closed May 25 due to their inability to obtain affordable liability insurance on their swimming pools. The Ballpark Health Club will close June 16 because of lease problems with their landlord. At a time when bathhouses are under intense pressure and scrutiny from the health department, it is ironic that the two clubs should close for reasons totally unrelated to AIDS.

#### Diocese Ordered to Pay Damages

LAFAYETTE, LA - An 11-year-old has been awarded \$1.25 million in damages as the result of a lawsuit brought against the Catholic Church. A jury ordered the Lafayette diocese to pay the boy and his parents the sum on the grounds that the boy's sexual abuse at the hands of a priest robbed him

of his religious faith.

The Rev. Gilbert Gauthe, a catholic priest, was convicted last year of having sex with three dozen boys at St. John Parish. He was sentenced to 20 years in prison. Another priest from the same parish, Rev. Ronald Fonterot, was charged in Spokane, Washington, with molesting boys in a substance abuse clinic there. He had been suspended from the Lafayette diocese in 1983 for having sex with some of the same boys involved in the Gauth cases.

#### Gay Rights Battle in Northern California

Opponents of equal rights for gay men and lesbians have launched initiative campaigns to repeal recently enacted human rights ordinances in two Northern California cities. Local activists, predicting a bitter and expensive battle, have established a united campaign support fund to defend the anti-discrimination laws.

Ordinances extending housing and employment rights to gay people were passed this Spring by the city councils of Davis and Sacramento following extensive public debate and lobbying by Sacramentans for Justice (SFJ) and the Davis-based Citizens and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (CFLAG).

Anti-gay forces are currently circulating initiative petitions in Davis, where proponents of the ordinance have been subjected threats, verbal abuse, and physical attacks. Davis activists expect the repeal initiatives to qualify for a special election in August, when much of the large student population will be away on vacation.


The Davis City Council passed a similar law in 1979 which was repealed by voters following an initiative campaign in 1980. CFLAG believes that public education efforts over the past six years make victory possible in 1986.

In Sacramento, a coalition of conservative religious and business leaders have joined forces with tax foe Paul Gann to force a public vote on the November ballot. The City of Sacramento is heavily Democratic in voter registration and generally liberal, but local organizers are concerned that the Sacramento ordinance may be on the same ballot as the LaRouche AIDS Initiative and a heated local race for State Senate, both of which are likely to bring out conservative voters.

Leaders of the Davis and Sacramento campaigns established the Northern California Human Rights Fund to encourage financial contributions from throughout California and the United States. According to Kevin Braaten-Moen, Executive Director of SFJ, outside support is critical.

We in Sacramento simply do not have the resources available in San Francisco or Los Angeles. We desperately need assistance now if we hope to run a credible campaign, said Braaten-Moen.

#### **Beat Briefs**

Featured release for June: Culture Club, "From Luxury to Heartache." Virgin/Epic Records.

Following the creative and commercial failure of The Culture Club's last album, "Waking Up With the House on Fire," Boy George took a two-year leave of absence from the pop charts to be glamorous. Instead of making music. Boy cavorted at chic New York nightspots, like Palladium, and appeared on an episode of "The A Team." (Yes, Mr. T's gold chains are glamorous, boys and girls.) Now, Boy and his Club cohorts have bounced back with danceable conviction on this fourth LP, proving that they are more than some gender-blending novelty item.

Working with Aretha Franklin's former producer, Arif Marin, they experiment with a provocative potpourri of old styles ranging from Motown to early '70s funk.

"Move Away," side one's opener and the first single, has the innocuous simplicity and airy verve of their first LP, "Kissing to be Clever." T Pray," the following cut, sets the mood for the rest of "Luxury": infectious, funk-filled fun.

"Gusto Blusto," which is by far the finest track, features a painfully hypnotic synthesizer backdrop and backup vocals by soul songstress Jocelyn Brown. And Boy's voice is at its flamboyant best, too, adding harmonic fire to an arsenal of electronic sounds that have "hit" written all over them.

Side two's "God Thank You, Woman," is Boy's affirmative statement about his heterosexual tendencies, in which he drones on with such trite lyrical tripe as "I could give you my heart/ You're the air that I breathe." But he redeems himself on "Sexuality," an upbeat parody of gay bar pick-up pretensions: "All you pretty people staring at the wall/ When I say I don't dance/ I mean not like you/ Say it with your body/ your sexuality..."

"Luxury" is proof that dance music can be catchy and calculating. The Club has often reached back in musical retrospect to vintage sounds and styles, and on their latest effort they add modern social awareness and technopop effervescence to the best beats from the past. Now it's time for the Club to make up for all those number one songs they've missed out on the past two years. Boy, go get 'em, girl!

In Brief ....

The Art of Noise, "In Visible Silence." Chrysalis Records.

If surrealist shock artist Salvador Dali had ever been a musician, hiswork would have sounded a lot like these British studio musicians' second effort. Noise is exactly what this experimental disc contains, for such tunes as "Paranoimia," "Backbeat", and "Eye of the Needle" are nothing but cerie synthesizer sounds blended with bizarre grunting patterns and chants that all sound like a drum machine on a bad acid trip. A danceable re-make of Henry Mancini's campy 1960 "Peter Gunn" theme is freaky, outer spaced-out kitsch that will thrill B-52s fans. The dance extend of this one is already doing well on the All in all, however, In Visible Silence" concentrates more on sound effects than substance, making it an album solely for those with quirky musical taste buds.

Ministry, "Twitch." Sire Records.

Dismal fervor flows through this "death rock" dance band's latest. Tracks like "We Believe" and "Just Like You" contain political protest lyries fused with grating beats and the creepy vocals of Patty J. Most of their angst-ridden lyries are drowned by overproduced, monotonous electronic rhythms, but they display enough hooks to get people on the dance floor and keep them there.

Patti LaBelle, "Winner in You." MCA Records.

Patti's last opus delivered such tunes like "New Attitude" and "Stir It Up," gay disco classics guaranteed to send even the most butch dancer into fits of frantic lipsynching and camping. This LP,



however, lacks the insistent punch of "New Attitude" and contained a mawkish mess of hokey lyrics penned by such middle-of-theroaders as Burt Bacharach. In the opening cut, "Oh, People," Patti sings, "If we are on big family/ No one will have to beg to eat." Boohoo....

One of the most sappy yawners is "On My Own," a ludicrous duet with former DooBee Brother Michael McDonald. Only the jaunty "Beat My Heart Like a Drum" and the beautiful torch ballad "There's a Winner in You" appropriately fit her enormous vocal range and talent. Patti, there is a winner in you-your voice. Please stop wasting it on pablum like this.

Siouxsie and the Banshees, "Tinderbox." Geffen Records.

Although Siouxsie's been around since the birth of punk and has matured into a fine vocalist, she remains one of the most underrated and misunderstood geniuses of the music scene. On her ninth effort, she manages to maintain her trademark blend of gloom, doom, and glam with her sound like a rock 'n' roll Sylvia Plath. Throughout the album, she plays the sardonic social observer, commenting on the pain of childhood on "Candyman" to the motives of nightclub tragic socialites on "Party's Fall." The single "Cities in Dust," which is doing well on national dance charts, is Siouxsie at her wailing and angry best. "Tinderbox" doesn't contain the drama of the band's early works or the surreal elegance of 1984's "Hyaena," but it still has Siouxsie's sincere passion that's always thought-provoking and melodic.

Once again, she shows that she is the one musician who deserves a wider audience on this side of the Atlantic.



#### Affirmation Challenges United Methodists on AIDS

...Spring Gathering Elects New Coordinators, Makes Plans for Expansion

United Methodist responses to AIDS have been "slow and still inadequate" and "have reinforced a preference for judgment over compassion toward those most at risk for this disease," according to Affirmation: United Methodists for Gay/Lesbian Concerns.

In a statement approved at its annual spring national meeting, held April 4-6, 1986, in Seattle, Affirmation noted that AIDS has already claimed two of its earliest leaders, Michael Collins and Richard Cash, as well as numerous friends, lovers, and family members. The organization declared that it has 'experienced firsthand not only the grief of these losses but also the violence of homophobia fueled by AIDS hysteria."

While acknowledging the preliminary efforts of some congregations, agencies, and conferences of the United Methodist Church, Affirmation called for greatly increased action at all levels of the church. In its statement, Affirmation requested that:

church leaders, both clergy and lay, reject claims that AIDS is God's revenge on gays and publicly oppose "proposed policies, such as quarantine and employment, insurance, or other discrimination, that ... reflect society's blaming of those infected by a deadly virus";

 the United Methodist Council of Bishops prepare a pastoral letter on the subject of AIDS;

 congregations and conferences of the church develop resources for pastoral support for persons with AIDS and their loved ones; provide training events to prepare persons for providing that support; make available buildings and other resources to assist AIDS education, patient-support, and advocacy efforts; and use portions of funds set aside for health-care services to help meet AIDS-related medical, spiritual, and physical needs;

 church members everywhere "support effective and explicit risk-reduction efforts" for gay and bisexual men, for intravenous drug abusers, and others at risk for the disease;

 all United Methodists pray for persons with AIDS and for all others affected by this disease.

"Making a statement to the church about AIDS is important to both the gay men and lesbians in Affirmation," explained Mary Gaddis, Affirmation's of spokespersons. "We lesbians are concerned for our gay brothers who have AIDS, and, because of the lack of knowledge that the general public has about the disease, lesbians are confronted with the homophobia that is directly related to AIDS. Lesbians in some places are being tested for insurance, for example, even though we are the one group that has been shown not to be at risk for the disease. One of my favorite lines is that, if AIDS is God's punishment, then lesbians must be God's chosen people."


In other action at the meeting, Affirmation members selected cospokespersons and coordinating committee members to serve through the next General Conference of the United Methodist Church, to be held in April 1988. Morris Floyd, of Minneapolis, and Gaddis, of Holy City, California, were reelected as the organization's two co-spokespersons. Named to the coordinating committee were Judy Cayot, of Albany, California; Gaddis; Lyle Loder, of West Hollywood, California; D.J. Porter, of New Hope, Pennsylvania; Beth Richardson, of Nashville; Maggie Roe, of Lincoln, Nebraska; Bradley Ruhmph, of Washington, D.C.; Mike Underhill, of Chicago; and one lesbian and one gay man who. because of discriminatory denominational and societal policies, cannot be publicly named.

Affirmation members also decided to continue to strengthen the Reconciling Congregation Program by planning a consultation, tentatively set for spring 1987, of representatives of all Reconciling Congregations across the United States. Reconciling Congregations are local United Methodist churches that publicly welcome gay men and lesbians as equal members of their church families. Fifteen churches now belong to the program, which was begun in 1984. Affirmation also made plans to expand promotion of the Reconciling Congregation Program's quarterly journal, Manna for the Journey, which provides materials for congregations to use in improving ministry to and with lesbians and gay men.

Future plans for local and regional organizing by Affirmation members were also discussed in Seattle. It was noted that local Affirmation bodies now exist in 18 areas across the nation, up from 7 in April 1985. Gatherings for Affirmation members from broader geographic regions of the United States are being planned, beginning later in 1986. A national "Family Reunion" retreat is tentatively scheduled for July 1-5, 1987.

National Affirmation meets twice annually, once in the spring and once in the fall, for its business meetings. The next meeting is scheduled for September 19-21, 1986 in Washington, D.C. #### AIDS Survey

AIDS Survival Study

Statistics on AIDS show that more than 80% of people diagnosed two years ago have died. Yet little attention is paid to the 20% of cases who survive longer. In particular, there has been no systematic study of people who continue to live in a stable state of health for much longer periods.

The Boston AIDS Action Committee is planning a study of long-term survivors of AIDS to try to identify factors which may have contributed to their long survival. We hope that this information will be useful to other people with AIDS and to our scientific understanding of AIDS.

The Boston AIDS Action Committee study is divided into two phases. In Phase I, we hope to establish informal contacts with large numbers of long-term survivors of AIDS to gather impressions regarding the aspects of medical care, nutrition, lifestyle, medication, and coping styles which may have contributed to their success in battling the disease. In Phase II, we will use the information gathered in Phase I to prepare a more systematic questionnaire for distribution.

If you have AIDS which was diagnosed more than two years ago, we would appreciate hearing from you. The following information would be most helpful:

- Name, address, and telephone number and date of diagnosis.
- Particular AIDS-related condition you have had (for example, KS, PCP, or other infections).
- Any experimental treatment protocols in which you have participated.
- Any special modification in diet, drugs, lifestyle, nontraditional medications which you believe may have contributed to your survival.

## S.I.R. Plans Reunion in San Francisco

Former members of the Society for Individual Rights (SIR) are planning for a reunion in San Francisco on June 24 - during that city's Gay/Lesbian Pride Week. SIR was the nation's first large multi-service gay organization. During its 1964-74 existence it had over 2,000 members.

SIR was an umbrella for numerous activities - many of them "firsts." It published the first slick gay magazine ( Vector ), circulated numerous professional gay legal and educational pamphlets, introduced city and state politicians to the needs of gay people, staged elabo-

rate stage productions, ran VD campaigns, and held the city's first same-sex dances. The group dissolved in 1974 when its most active members went on to form other gay organizations.

Fifteen former members, including form SIR officials, have been meeting to plan the event. They promise an informal, memorable evening with photographic and publication displays on that period with ample food and drink available. The event will be at Chez Mollet (527 Club).

#### Girth and Mirth Tell All

Long before May 1976 there was a loosely unorganized group of gay friends who kept contact with each other between San Francisco, Los Angeles, Chicago, and New York. These were heavy gay fellows and those gay fellows who found them sexually attractive because they

were big, fat, and available. In New York, they congregated at a gay bar called The Beaded Bag, owned by a chubbette by the name of Frenchy. In Los Angeles, they met at a gay bar on Western and 2nd Street called Joly's, which still exists today. In Chicago, they met at the New Flight, and in San Francisco, they met at the Old Crow on Market Street. These were called Chubby/Chase bars. And these were the days that all a chubby or chaser had to do was spend an hour or two (long before AIDS) and pick up a chubby or chaser at one of these bars and spend a sexually exciting evening together.

In May, 1976, a young chase, living in San Francisco, called Charlie Brown, along with his then big lover, Dick, just for the fun of it decided to run an ad in an underground paper, The Berkely Barb. The response to this ad was phenomenal. The initial group of about eight people included Reed Wilgoren, Tony Di Genova, Ed Pardee, Rick Hansen, John Kelly, and Sergio Sarzo. This group grew to 20 to 30 to 50 in a very short time. The first meeting was at Charlie Brown's apartment and then to the 527 Bryant Club and the rest is history.

After changing meeting places about every year or two, they presently meet at 176 Page Street in San Francisco. They call themselves the Girth and Mirth Club of San Francisco, and this club pioneered the beginnings of Girth and Mirth clubs in Los Angeles in 1977, in New York in 1978, and in Chicago in 1980. San Francisco was incorporated as a non-profit club in 1980. Other clubs started lately in Boston, Denver, and San Diego.

Not all of the clubs adopted the names of Girth and Mirth and not all of them survived, but they were all gay big men's clubs. Like all new movements, the clubs sometimes put their efforts in the wrong direction. The original concept of providing a place for chubbies to meet chasers in their own town or helping clubs to form in other cities was lost in non-productive political pursuits.

Four wonderful conventions were held in San Francisco in 1980, in New York in 1983, in Chicago in 1984, and in Scattle in 1985. ABC, the Affiliated BigMen's Club, was formed at the Scattle convention, Convergence 85. San Francisco joined ABC but resigned shortly after. San Francisco, the city that

started the whole chubby scene was forced to go back to basics and return to the non-political club it was meant to be. This is now a club that serves gay chubbies and their admirers from the Greater San Francisco Bay and now to the far corners of the world. San Francisco has widened its visions and is now going international.

They are now San Francisco, International Girth and Mirth Club Inc. and is the only national incorporated non-profit, tax-exempt club that concerns itself solely with social and educational efforts. The club is designed to present the myriad ways of offering fun for its members - fun, and only fun. We may sometime become educational but never political. Political issues take all of the fun out of the scene. GM/SF is proud to serve the local, national, and international commu-

nuties of gay big men and their admirers. Since taking this new posture, the GM/SF has been attracting more and more members.

The GM/SF publishes a newsletter called Fat City by the Bay with an extensive Pen-Pal section called the "Meet Rack." They are presently making plans to expand the newsletter into a national magazine with many pictures of beautiful gay nude chubbies and their admirers proving the adages that fat can be beautiful and fate men have more to offer. The club helps gay fat men develop a positive image of themselves by providing an atmosphere of total acceptance. They accept the adage that it is not only OK to be a fat gay but it can be desirable to be a fat gay. Many are now joining this vibrant and dynamic club and are




