Tasmanian Premier Supports Motion for Same-Sex Marriage

The head of Tasmania's executive government endorses same-sex marriage but says she won't "go it alone."

According to The Australian, Premier Lara Giddings supports a parliamentary motion urging Australia's federal government to legalize marriage equality, but says the state won't officially change the definition of marriage until the rest of the Australian Labor Party is on board.

On Tuesday, a measure TER MATH

ing on the federal government to amend the Marriage Act was tabled despite the efforts of the Tasmanian Green party, who have repeatedly tried legalize marriage in Tasmania.

"I can say that there is strong support for this within the parliamentary Labor party, as there is within the state branch of the Australian Labor Party," Ms. Giddings said, adding that she will not move to legalize same-sex marriage but hopes the Prime Minister will take the Tasmanian government's position on board.

"What I'd certainly say to the Prime Minister in that respect is that it is important to listen to what Tasmanians are saying. But we of course are not the decision makers in relation to this, the Prime Minister has to articulate the views of the Australian views as a whole."

A recent survey says that 59% of Tasmanians support same-sex marriage.



DADT is Dead

The military's "don't ask, don't tell" policy, the one described in 1993 by President Bill Clinton as "an honorable compromise" that eventually destroyed thousands of careers, ended Tuesday at 12:01 a.m., nine months after Congress repealed the law.

Though September 20, 2011 may be remembered as much as a nonevent for the nation's armed forces as it is a landmark day for equality, an official military memorandum on the end of DADT dis-



tributed Monday is striking nonetheless:

"From this day forward, gay and lesbian soldiers may serve in our Army with the dignity and respect they deserve," Secretary of the Army John M. McHugh and Army officials wrote (see a PDF of the letter here). "For over 236 years, the U.S. Army has been an extraordinary force for good in the world. Our soldiers



are the most agile, adaptable and capable warriors in history — and we are ready for this change."

Lawmakers and defense officials will mark the occasion Tuesday without considerable pomp and circumstance. At

12:30 p.m. eastern time, a bipartisan group of senators instrumental to passage of "don't ask, don't tell" legislation — Sens. Carl Levin, Kirsten Gillibrand, Susan Collins, Mark Udall, and Joseph Lieberman — will be joined by representatives from (Continued on page 4)

Servicemembers Legal Defense Network, Human Rights Campaign, and Outserve, whose co-director, known up to this point as J.D. Smith, has revealed his identity as Josh Seefried, a finance officer in the Air Force and 2009 graduate of the U.S. Air Force Academy.

"I personally felt it was important to come out of the closet on Day 1 to show that sexual orientation in the military will truly be a nonissue," Seefried said. "Overseas we have seen that some militaries still do not have people that feel comfortable coming out with their sexual orientation, even years after the policy has changed. I hope that by coming out, along with the other military members who chose to come out publicly in the pages of our magazine, help to show our military was ready for this change."

Later on Tuesday afternoon, Secretary of Defense Leon Panetta will also hold a news conference at the Pentagon to discuss repeal.

The Associated Press reported Monday that the Defense Department had begun accepting applications from gay recruits, to be processed directly after the ban is lifted. "No one should be left with the impression that we are unprepared. We are prepared for repeal," Pentagon press secretary George Little said Monday.

Gay service member advocacy groups and their allies struck a justifiably victorious tone Monday evening, with countdown celebrations held throughout the country. "[T]hanks to the persistent hard work of unwavering advocates, especially those who have been directly impacted by this issue, and some courageous politicians over the past six years, Don't Ask, Don't Tell is now history," Servicemembers United executive director Alex Nicholson said in a statement. "As a result, those who continue to serve can sleep easier tonight knowing that they can no longer be arbitrarily fired because of their sexual orientation. Justice has prevailed and don't ask, don't tell is dead. God bless America."

SLDN executive director Aubrey Sarvis said, "Our work is far from done, but today we pay tribute to the service and sacrifice of our patriots as we look forward to a new era of military service – one that honors the contributions of all qualified Americans who have served or who wish to serve."

Religious and social conservative groups who have worked to



undermine repeal at every step remain defiant, however. "Tomorrow, the U.S. military becomes a tool in reshaping social attitudes regarding human sexuality," Family Research Council president Tony Perkins said in a Monday statement. "Using the military to advance a liberal social agenda will only do harm to the military's ability to fulfill its mission."

Foo Fighters Sing About Tolerance Before Westboro Protesters

The Foo Fighters warmed up for a concert in Kansas City, Missouri last Friday by performing on a rolling rig before a group of Westboro Baptist Church picketers, who at first seemed unaware of the band was making fun of them, reports Huffington Post.

Members of the hate-spewing Westboro congregation were picketing before a concert of the band, led by Dave Grohl, which recently released a very NSFW homoerotic video for their faux-country song "Keep It Clean (Hot Buns)."

The band, long noted for its playful sensibility, dressed in the redneck truckers costumes from their video, rolled on to the street across from the protesters and began to perform the song on the back of a rig adorned with U.S. flags. The Fred Phelps (Continued on page 6)

followers seem to think a group of unanticipated allies have arrived until they hear lyrics such as "I'm in the mood for hot man-muffin."

Their confusion ended when during a break in the song, Grohl announced, "God Bless Ameri-



ca! It takes all kinds. I don't care if you're black or white or purple or green, whether you're Pennsylvanian or Transylvanian, Lady Gaga or Lady Antebellum. Men loving women and women loving men and men loving men and women loving women — you all know we like to watch that. But what I'd like to say is, God Bless America, y'all!"

Jamey Rodemeyer, 14, Dies in Suicide



Another tragic reminder that bullying against gay youth is a continuing problem comes with the suicide of a 14-year-old boy, Jamey Rodemeyer, who had asked for help repeatedly.

The Buffalo, New York, teen died on Sunday, his body found later outside his home after an apparent suicide, according to the Buffalo News. His death followed not only taping his own It Gets Better video, but also blogging on Tumblr about the bullying at school that just wouldn't stop.

"I always say how bullied I am, but no one listens," he wrote on September 9. "What do I have to do so people will listen to me?"

In May, he was on a high after coming out to friends, and he pointed to the support from people online as the reason it gets better.

"I have so much support from people I don't even know online," he told the camera. "They don't ever want me to die."

Reaction on Tumblr has been of shock and sadness.

"Jamey Rodemeyer is dead? I've followed him on Tumblr since I made mine," wrote one person. "I can't believe this. I don't even know what to say. Although I didn't know him in real life, it's hard to cope with his suicide."

"He lived 45 minutes away from me," another said. "It kills me (Continued on page 8)

to think that not even one person could stand up for this kid."

Rodemeyer said in his It Gets Better video that he was being taunted in the hallways of his school.

"I felt like I could never escape it," said Rodemeyer, who claimed Lady Gaga as his inspiration for keeping his head held high.

Dan Savage reacted to the news on his blog, calling for those "who tormented this vulnerable kid" to "be held to account — not bullied themselves, not prosecuted or persecuted, but held to account — for their actions, for their

hate, for the harm they've caused."


The It Gets Better project was founded to help kids get through times like Rodemeyer faced.


"The point of the 'It Gets Better' project is to give kids like



Jamey Rodemeyer hope for their futures. But sometimes hope isn't enough," Savage wrote. "Sometimes the damage done by hate and by haters is simply too great. Sometimes the future seems too remote. And those are the times our hearts break."

In other videos from Rodemeyer, he talks about gay people being called "disgusting" by other students in class, about his belief that same-sex marriage should be legal, and about how Lady Gaga is "the reason why I am alive."





Assurances of Equality in a Post-DADT World

The White House, military officials, and lawmakers who voted to end "don't ask, don't tell" celebrated today's official repeal as a historic moment that will



better the integrity of the nation's armed forces.

The many details of a post-repeal world — how the military will handle harassment issues, how to bring parity to gay service members and their families in the face of the discriminatory Defense of Marriage Act — were better left for another day, however, judging by some responses in news conferences on both sides of the Potomac.

This morning, President Obama, who is in New York at the United Nations for a first-ever meeting with Libya's transitional leader, praised gays and lesbians in uniform and said to those who were discharged as a result of the 1993 law, "your country deeply values your service."

"For more than two centuries, we have worked to extend America's promise to all our citizens," Obama said in a statement. "Our armed forces have been both a mirror and a catalyst of that progress, and our troops, including gays and lesbians, have given their lives to defend the freedoms and liberties that we cherish as Americans." Obama said the day was a step "toward fulfilling our nation's founding ideals." (Read the full statement here.)

Repeal of DADT does not provide for benefits equity, and no new regulations or policies to rectify that situation were announced Tuesday. Pentagon officials have said that DOMA bars them from extending certain spousal and dependent benefits to gay service members that their straight counterparts are afforded.

"We follow the law here ... And we're going to follow [DOMA] as long as it exists," Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Adm. Mike Mullen said Tuesday in response to a reporter's question on unequal benefits for gay service members. "Certainly we're aware there are benefits which do accrue to this change very specifically and directly that went into effect last night at midnight, and there are others ... [where] there will not be any change." Potential harassment against openly gay service members in the absence of explicit protections in military nondiscrimination policy would be dealt with appropriately, said Defense Secretary Leon Panetta during a news conference with Mullen at the Pentagon.

"We have a zero tolerance with regards to harassment." Panetta said. "And my hope is that ... the standard disciplines that are in place will ensure that harassment doesn't take place, and that all behavior is consistent with the discipline and the best interests of our military."

Speaking at what will likely be his last news conference with Panetta before he retires on October 1, Mullen said in prepared remarks, "Today is really about every man and woman who serves this country, every man and woman in uniform, regardless of how they define themselves. And tomorrow, they'll all get up, they'll all go to work, and they'll all be able to do that work honestly. And their fellow citizens will be safe from harm. And that's all that really matters."

Following the Pentagon press conference, Defense Department general counsel Jeh Johnson and Vee Penrod, deputy assistant secretary of Defense for personnel and readiness, addressed some issues that have arisen during the post-repeal process. One is the question of whether military chaplains are allowed to officiate same-sex weddings in their official capacities, and in on-base facilities in states where marriage equality currently exists. The Navy's chief of chaplains, Rear Adm. Mark L. Tidd, issued guidance in April allowing for chaplains to do so, though military officials later suspended that guidance to conduct a legal review.

"We are very, very close to having a resolution of that issue, it's something I've been working on myself," Johnson said. Of Tidd's guidance, Johnson said, "We pulled it back for further legal review and I think we're pretty much done, and there should be something issued to the chaplain community and others very soon on that."

Penrod also confirmed that service members who were separated under DADT and given less than an honorable discharge have the opportunity to change their discharge statuses (the majority of individuals who were discharged under DADT received honorable discharges). "Through the Boards for Correction of Military Records, they do have the opportunity to correct that," she said.

Earlier today, a bipartisan group of senators — Joseph Lieberman, Kirsten Gillibrand, Susan Collins, Mark Udall, Carl Levin, and Chris Coons — stood alongside gay and lesbian service members at a Capitol news conference. The lawmakers were among the 65 senators who voted for repeal of the 1993 law, though only half in attendance at the press conference (Gillibrand, Coons, and Udall) have signed onto repeal of the Defense of Marriage Act.

Lieberman indicated his support for repealing DOMA — at least in part, as far as its prohibition of federal benefits to married same-sex couples goes.

Levin, chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, said that House efforts to weaken DADT repeal while broadening the reach of DOMA would be strongly opposed in the Senate. (Continued on page 12)

Youthfulness and Your Mental Health

I recently turned 56 and am damned proud of it. I have my share of wrinkles and gray hair, but I FEEL youthful and healthy. I'd like to share some of what works for me and my clients - in hopes it will be useful to you too:



Meditate. It teaches you to listen to your body, tell yourself the truth about what's going on with you and helps you get in touch with your desires, motivations and fears. Meditation has been proven to help relieve stress, decrease chronic pain and improve sleep...and has recently been found to slow down cognitive decline. What's not to like?

Pay attention to your body, but don't obsess! Take care of your health so you don't worry unnecessarily. Don't weigh yourself too often. Let your clothes be your guide...if they don't fit comfortably, then decide how you'd like to handle that. Exercise is wonderful, but it only works in the long run if you find something you enjoy. Try new things and experiment with combining them. Too much routine can be deadly: keep yourself interested.

Notice what you eat. Try this Zen "paying attention" exercise. Only eat when you are really paying attention to what you're eating. For most of us, we can only eat about 3 bites before we start to zone out. When that happens, stop and refocus. Come back to the present moment: what are you eating? Do you really taste it? This works particularly well with desserts. For me, after the first 3 bites, I'm usually over my "craving" and can leave the rest alone. This exercise alone helped me kick an ice cream "addiction".

Sit still for a minute or two whenever you can. It'll calm you down and lower your blood pressure.

Be a little "goofy": let go of the "seriousness" of life. About 5% of things are seriously important, the other 95% aren"t. Can you laugh at silly things you do? Try it and watch your blood pressure drop and that crease in your forehead disappear.

Cultivate friendships with 2-3 people who really love you. 2-3 really good friends is all you really need in life. Do you have someone you can call at 2AM to take you to the ER, or someone who will come over ASAP if your lover dumps you? If not, then you need to develop a couple of close friends. It takes time and energy, don't kid yourself. Close friendships unfold over time...but your intention matters: make an effort to be around people you really love and see who you grow close to.

When in doubt, try moderation: a little dessert, one glass of wine, one morning to lie in bed, one afternoon to do nothing but read magazines...moderation is a wonderful thing. Living in the extremes is exhausting.

Keep exercising your brain: If you keep doing the same old stuff over-and-over...no wonder you're bored. Take a class or learn a new sport or skill: cultivating new skills is like aerobics for your self-esteem. You need new challenges to master to stay youthful.

If you love your work – don't retire! Work part-time or a few hours a week, or volunteer. You may not need the money, but your brain needs the stimulation!

Give of yourself: this is the fastest way out of self-pity (which is terribly aging). Get out there in the world and help someone else. You don't need to be Mother Theresa to make a difference. Got an hour a month? Some worthy organization would love to have you. Volunteering keeps you youthful: whether you're 18 or 80, you need to be around people. Do something that makes your heart happy: a happy heart is a youthful heart.

Continued from page 10) Several amendments in the House defense authorization bill passed in June focus on DADT and DOMA, including one by Missouri Rep. Todd Akin that would bar same-sex weddings on military facilities.

"We have several members of the Armed Services Committee here today. We will fight against those amendments and do everything we can to make sure that they don't appear either in the senate bill or on the floor," as well as in conference committee for the bill, Levin told The Advocate.

Collins, one of eight Republicans to vote for repeal, read from a postcard recently sent to her from a gay active-duty service member to thank the junior senator from Maine for her vote. The text of the postcard, as read Tuesday by Collins:

Senator Collins,

I will still be deployed in Afghanistan on 20 September when "don't ask, don't tell" is finally repealed. It will take a huge burden off my shoulders. A combat zone is stressful enough on its own. Thank you for your courage in favor of repeal as a Republican. I will repay your courage with continued professionalism.

"It is so poignant that he could not sign his name," Collins said.

A spokeswoman for President Bill Clinton, who signed the bill

into law in 1993 as an "honorable compromise" but told CBS's Katie Couric last year that he regretted how the policy has been used to justify witch hunts of gay service members, declined to issue a statement Tuesday on the repeal of DADT.

Fair Opportunity, Greater Effort

Joe Sestak, a decorated retired admiral and former congressman from Pennsylvania, tells us why the repeal of DADT gives him hope for America.

On September 20, "don't ask, don't tell" will be repealed by the Defense Department, and from today forward all Americans will finally be able to serve in our military, regardless of race, gender, or sexual orientation. As a young Navy captain, I was asked by the admiral I worked for what I thought of DADT when it became official policy during the Clinton administra-

tion. I now think ruefully about my reply: that I soon expected DADT to be overturned by the Supreme Court on the basis of discrimination. Over the years, I remember a number of instances when a young sailor would approach me to let me know he was gay, intent upon no longer living a lie, and wishing I could say, "Please don't tell me, you're too good and I don't want to lose you."





I had been to war for our nation with such sailors; how could I come home and not believe they deserved equal rights from the country for which they had fought with the same common purpose as their shipmates? But that wasn't the only reason I cosponsored the legislation to repeal DADT when I later became a congressman from Pennsylvania. I also did it for the betterment of our military.

I came to understand in the Navy that the best part of our nation's character is that America has always been driven by an alliance of rugged individualism and common enterprise; by people striving for their individual achievement, but never measuring it apart from the greater effort. Ours is the first nation founded on principle, not power. But our nation is built upon the belief that individual principles — freedom, suffrage, civil rights, equality — are not attained until they extend to all. It is the success of this long struggle to embody the vision set by our founders for everyone that makes our nation – our military – so powerful. It is the recognition that a fair opportunity for all ensures even greater service to our common effort, our common purpose.

Shortly after arriving in the Indian Ocean during the war in Afghanistan, I launched attack planes from the aircraft carrier of my battle group, one of which had a young woman pilot. Over Afghanistan that night, she disregarded a standing order not to dive low without permission. U.S. Special Forces had been ambushed by the Taliban; four were dead and she felt there was no time to ask permission to save the rest. She immediately dove and strafed the enemy, and in her covering fire, the remaining men extracted their dead and themselves.

When I joined up during the Vietnam era, there were no women on aircraft carriers, never mind flying attack aircraft off them. Because women were later given an individual opportunity to achieve all they might desire in our Navy, our common mission that night in Afghanistan was better and saved U.S. soldiers.

My belief in the repeal of DADT is based upon my experience of the conviction that the more people given a fair opportunity for their own achievement means a greater effort for the common purpose of America. I saw during my 31 years in the Navy that America's success is born out of the basic idea that everyone should contribute to their fullest and should be given the tools and opportunity to do so. This simple notion has been the bedrock of our achievement, where shared opportunity is shared attainment.

This is why today is important: once again we've looked into the national mirror and said "we are better than that." And it is why no one should ever sell short the character of Americans, with our enormous capacity to change and grow for the better. Our courage to face the truth about the need to live up to our best ideals is why America will — despite any challenge always grow stronger and move forward as one, united nation.

Bandits Captured in Florida

A trio of drag queen bandits who've been accused of stealing "thousands of dollars of filmy fabrics, sequins, feather boas, and other accessories" from stores across Florida have been apprehended, according to the Orlando Sentinel.

"It's a whole gang of drag queens," said Amanda Marshall, manager of Jo-Ann Fabrics in Orlando, after police arrested three suspects Sept. 18. "They were real upset when the police made them take their wigs off."

All three cross-dressing shoplifters had been spotted pilfering items from fabric and craft stores in the region. At the time of their arrest, one man had stuffed his man bag with five packs of black feathers, two packs of red feathers, two packs of red lace gloves, two packs of black red lace gloves, eyelashes, five bra pads, five butt pads, five gel inserts as well as three handbags, two boas, three pairs of costume glasses, and 10 bandannas.

"They'd come in and order yards of fabric at up to \$39,99 a yard, stuff it in their man purses and leave without paying," Marshall said. "Oh, gosh, they could wipe out a whole section of boas in seconds..."



According to police reports, Demitri Marsh, 19, swore at a Jo-Ann clerk and threatened to "cut her" before fleeing. Marsh, Renford Patterson, 18, and Antonio Webb, 22, were all charged with felony retail theft of merchandise.


