This is also his line of work as being the Assistant Executive Director of Social Settlement for nearly ten years as he stated to me. Today though, Robert has taken a time out to give information about the


"The group was initially formed by a small group who sought a new platform for individuals to get together and make connections on a business or social level. Although the bars and the internet provide many opportunities to connect, we recognized there was a desire to get away from those typical venues and create a different space for people" Robert explains to me.

Every group has a mission and with a mission comes principles. "Our mission for the group is to advance the growth and equality for members, business, and allies by providing educational, networking, and community building opportunities. As part of our principles for the group, we support a welcoming, energetic, and open-meeting environment and encourage individuals to communicate in a positive, professional and cooperative manner amongst each other as well as with other organizations."

The group last year created certain goals including membership attendance, networking, and volunteer opportunities. They also are increasing a positive image and visibility of the group and members in the community. (Omaha GLBT Professionals, story Continued from page 1) group is planning to be a primary supporter of the GLBT Summit in Omaha. By aligning our group closer to the Summit, we will be able to address more issues and include more members in the process." Remember too, they also had an information booth at Pride.

I, myself, being an Iowa resident had to ask that the fact that Iowa carries a policy in health benefits, housing, and employment to protect the GLBT community. Has it been discussed in your group? Has it sparked anything towards your group doing the same for the State of Nebraska? Robert lets me know that "the group falls under the umbrella of CFEP – Citizens For Equal Protection. CFEP is a non-profit organization dedicated to advocating the rights of gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender families in the State of Nebraska. We support CFEP's efforts to advocate and educate for needed legislation protecting GLBT citizens in housing, employment, changes in same-sex adoption laws and other needed legislation."

What is Robert's personal status with the group? "Early last year I received an email about this group that was forming and put it on the back-burner as I am heavily involved with many organizations and civic groups. I did not give the group much thought until I was at a large conference here in Omaha and one of the breakout sessions focused on diversity, but distinctively left out GLBT issues. To me, this was a sign that I needed to get more involved with the GLBT Professionals group and ensure that we are represented positively and appropriately in a variety of venues." Robert goes on to say "I believe we all have a certain amount of civic duty to giving back to the community we live in – whether that be donating money or time, we

can each make a difference. Personally, I always include my affiliation with the GLBT Professionals on resumes and interviews to show my pride in myself and our community."

Groups always have a period of hardship or getting their feet off the ground. "As with any small, volunteer-driven group, our hurdle is time. It is difficult to find the time to coordinate the logistics and marketing of the group meetings, let alone find time to achieve some of our larger objectives. Although we have a small leadership team dedicated to maintaining the group, we would certainly welcome anyone who would like to volunteer, offer their business to host or meeting, or simply has new ideas to offer."

Robert is letting everyone know "it is important to note that our group is open to ALL individuals whether you consider yourself a "professional" or not. Our group includes accountants, waiters, teachers, activists, social workers, retirees, artists, custodians, writers, and more. We do not want to limit ourselves by job, age, gender, or sexual orientation. We are open to anyone interested in connecting with other people and making positive differences in our community."

The Greater Omaha GLBT Professionals group meets the first Thursday of every month from 5:30 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. They rotate their meetings between locations to visit different businesses in the city. What is Gay Pride?

It is a question that has gnawed at me from the beginning of my involvement with Nebraska Pride. With total attendance at over 8,000, Pride Knows No Borders is the largest most successful pride festival yet to take place in this "RED" state. Many came from neighboring states for the first time because the date change took Nebraska Pride out of conflict with Des Moines and Minneapolis. Even with a storm each night and six hours of lost entertainment because of it, the crowds returned and the celebration continued. Our partnership with Star City Pride gave us additional volunteers for the event and bore still more fruit as Lincoln's celebration more than doubled in attendance. In the success of the numbers of people, the positive feedback, the new friendships forged with Lincoln, and the volunteers who made it all happen, we have much to be proud of. Yet, I ask again, what is Gay Pride? Why do we have a pride festival? A straight friend made the comment, "we don't have a heterosexual pride festival, why do you guys have to publicly celebrate who you sleep with?" If that is what Gay Pride is, I understand why the Christian Right acts as if we are at war. My straight friend and, sadly, many members of the GLBT community don't understand or even have a clue it seems, or maybe it's me. Maybe I have it all wrong...

There are many festivals in this nation made up of immigrants. There are Italian festivals, Cinco de Mayo, Santa Lucia, German fest, and St. Patrick's Day- all of which celebrate an ethnic heritage. I happen to be German, French, Scottish, and Blackfoot, but I am also gay. There are gay Italians, Gay Latinos, Gay Scotts, and Gay Native Americans; yes every group has a GLBT population. There are religious festivals. Christmas, Kwanza, Chanukah, Ramadan, Diwali, and Vesak are all religious holidays yet there are gay Christians, Gay Africans, Gay Jews, Gay Muslims, Gay Hindus and Gay Buddhists. Why Gay Pride? Why a Pride festival? During the Pride parade down 10th street, there were almost 2,000 people lining the sidewalks in support. Among them were a handful of protesters with Bibles, placards and suppressed hate hiding behind,

"love the sinner and hate the sin" and "saving our souls". I say suppressed hate because I really didn't feel any love coming from them. It is also the first time that I, as a gay man, have been blamed for abortion. Having raised two sons and a daughter, I have never been in favor of abortion, but I defend a woman's right to choose.

In Lincoln at Star City Pride, I was two feet away from a very forceful protestor. I was reminded that the Lincoln Catholic Diocese is the most conservative in the country when a five foot tall nun, in full traditional habit, crucifix in hand, stood and began to verbally chastise all those within hearing distance. Using the terms of "abomination", "unnatural", "sin against nature", and "have you no concern for your immortal soul?", I didn't feel any love there either. I am sure the 100 degree weather and her formal black nun's habit won her some suffering points- at least in her mind.

Why Gay Pride? The cover story of the recent Newsweek Magazine is, "Young Gay and Murdered." It is a story about 15 year old Lawrence King who was killed by his 14 year old classmate last February. Christine O'Leary, the lesbian comedienne who was such a hit at our pride festival introduced us to "Gay American Heroes" an organization that is seeking to build a traveling national monument to those in the GLBTQQS community who were killed simply because they were members of that community, of our community. Nebraska Pride has committed to raising money to help. 30 people have been killed for being members of our community since Matthew Shephard. That is in the last 10 years since this is the 10th anniversary of his murder.

Why Celebrate Gay Pride? Of the 1.7 million homeless youth in our country, 340,000 are members of our GLBT community. I know of some members of our group right here in Omaha who have been homeless and destitute. Would they be accepted safely in the shelter, probably not if they were openly or recognizably gay. We have members of this Omaha community who have survived bashings. Some still bear the scars. I lost two friends to Aids this past year. The numbers worldwide are still growing.

Why Gay Pride? Can I go into any bar in this state and share a glass of wine with my same sex beloved and hold hands across the table and expect the comment, "isn't that romantic" or "you two make such a cute couple?" Can I walk hand in hand with my same sex lover down any street in any neighborhood in this state and expect to be treated with respect? Can my same sex partner come to see me in any hospital in the event of an emergency? Can he inherit our shared belongings without a lot of extra legal paperwork and hassle in the event of my death? Can I and my partner adopt a child in this state?

Why Gay Pride? Are there still men and women entering into marriages because of fear and misunderstanding and simply doing what is expected? Are churches still telling us, "settle down, get married, have some kids, it will all go away, just pray!"

I have a young man who came up to me a year ago and thanked me for giving him the courage to come out. He had met me at a fundraiser for Proud Horizons when I was Emperor. I have another beloved friend who's baby sister I had taught years ago. She always reminds me of how I am still remembered and loved by her sister. I Have a straight friend who comes to the Max every now and then. He always wants to know what project I am raising money for, and he hands me some cash. He says, "your highness", and I remind him that I am a "wuzzy" because emperors only reign for a year. He fires back, "You will always be my emperor." I have a very dear friend and mentor who helped me find out who I am in coming out, and protected me and counseled me while I learned to find my own gay identity. He tried to help me develop a little thicker skin, because he worries about my trusting everyone, but he is there for me no matter what. Then there is the friend who helped me learn to love myself and respect myself when I lost everything in coming out. He helped me realize, that I had finally found myself, and without myself, I was really only a shadow to the world.

Almost two years ago I went through a really bad break up. It is something that is a fact of life. If it didn't hurt, then it couldn't have been very real. At the time, I was the only gay person in my retail department. I went to work and one of the guys caught me crying in the stock room. Before my shift was over, all four of the straight guys I worked with had come up to me and hugged me. For two of them, I was the only gay friend they had. All of them told me they cared. All of them were worried because they said I was much too honest and kind for I had opened their eyes to the fact that we all live and breathe, suffer and bleed the same.

That is why we celebrate Gay Pride. It is a time for those who have found their place and their peace to share. It is a time of hope for those still living in fear and pain. It is a time of education for those still living in ignorance. It is a time of strength and sustenance for those who are on the front lines of the battle for equality and charity. It isn't about our sexuality, it is about our right and our ability to be able to live and be respected with the exact same privileges as every other American! Maybe someday, we won't need to celebrate Gay Pride and can be content with our ethnic heritage because our GAY HERITAGE is no longer an issue. Gay Pride holds the flame for that dream! Dan Knobbe

Diane's Story

"My partner and I had been together for 14 years when I received the worst phone call of my life. There had been a terrible accident, and she was being flown to the hospital by helicopter. The hospital staff wanted to know how to get in touch with her next of kin. Mine was the only phone number they could find in her wallet. I gave them her parents' phone number, got into the car and drove straight to the hospital.

She died within the next hour. All that time had been wasted as I sat in that dark waiting room. She had been slowly dying alone, when I should have been holding her hand and couldn't."

Jamaican Lesbian Granted Asylum in Florida

A Jamaican woman living in Sunrise, Fla., has avoided deportation back to her home country after a judge ruled that her sexual orientation could lead to violence against her in Jamaica, The Miami Herald reported Friday.

The 29-year-old woman, going by her middle name Nichole, was initially ordered to be deported after two drug convictions. In the same ruling, immigration judge Irma Lopez-Defillo deferred the order because of Jamaica's criminalization of homosexuality.

Being gay "is the worst thing you can be stricken with [in Jamaica]," Nichole said in the article. "You basically have to live undercover."

The judge's decision is a rare one, as the case was handled under the United Nations' convention against torture, which prevents immigrants from being deported if it is highly probably they will face torture upon their return to their home country. According to the U.S. Department of Justice, 28,130 cases were filed under this statute, but only 449 asylum seekers were allowed to stay. Ninety-two cases were granted a deferred removal.

At age 10, Nichole and her familiy moved from Ocho Rios, Jamaica, to the United States. When she was a teenager, her parents, Seventh-day Adventists, tried to convert her once her sexual orientation became apparent. They moved her back to Jamaica to live with family members when she was 14, but the stay lasted just two months -- Nichole's involvement with another girl in her class angered her family. Her parents returned to Jamaica to retrieve her shortly afterward. (The Advocate)

Settlements Reached in Chicago Clergy Abuse Cases

The Catholic Archdiocese of Chicago said Tuesday it had agreed to pay more than \$12.6 million to settle lawsuits by 16 people who accused priests of sexual abuse.

"My hope is that these settlements will help the survivors and their families begin to heal and move forward," Cardinal Francis George said in a statement in which he also apologized for the abuse.

Fourteen of the cases involve sexual abuse by 10 different priests and two relate to the Rev. Daniel J. McCormack, who pleaded guilty last year to charges he abused five children.

"I apologize again today to the survivors and their families and to the whole Catholic community," George said. "We must continue to do everything in our power to ensure the safety of the children in our care."

The settlements were reached through a mediation process in which the cardinal himself gave a lengthy deposition. Attorney Jeff Anderson, who represented some of the plaintiffs, praised the mediation process and the cardinal. "He has demonstrated his commitment to healing these survivors," Anderson said.

George previously acknowledged he failed to act soon enough in McCormack's case. (AP)

LGBT Activists Call Democratic Platform Most Inclusive to Date

The final version of the Democratic Platform is being hailed as the most LGBT-inclusive to date by queer activists and politicians alike despite the fact that the words

gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender do not appear in the text of the platform, according to those who have read the document.

Though the official platform has yet to be released to the public, LGBT advocacy groups say the wording that was adopted explicitly discusses adopting a national HIV/AIDS strategy, repealing the military's "don't ask, don't tell" policy, and passing hate-crimes and comprehensive employment nondiscrim-



ination legislation. The document reportedly also marked some historic firsts by including "same-sex couples" in the Democratic Party's definition of families, pledging to fight discrimination based on "gender identity" and opposing the Defense of Marriage Act, which prohibits federal recognition of same-sex partners who are legally married.

"This has been the most inclusive drafting process of a party platform in history," Rep. Tammy Baldwin said, noting the approximately 1,600 listening sessions that took place across the country to incorporate the ideas and concerns of average voters. Baldwin said the platform was far stronger on LGBT issues than the one adopted in 2004 because it went "from rhetoric to policy and substance and reflected the positions that have been championed by Senator Obama" throughout the campaign.


Jon Hoadley, executive director of the National Stonewall Democrats, said the exclusion of the words gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender had more to do with the inclusion of equivalent terms typically used in legislation. "Sexual orientation, gender identity, same-sex couples—this is the type of language that appears in legislation and policy across the country," Hoadley said.


Mara Keisling, executive director of the National Center for Transgender Equality, also noted that the inclusion of transgender people in the platform never became a point of discussion. "Gender identity got put in the draft of the platform, and then there was never any serious debate about taking it out," she said, crediting all the grassroots work and education efforts taking place around trans issues.


Jennifer Chrisler, executive director of the Family Equality Council, said that after talking to both the Democratic and Republican parties about their platforms, she was particularly pleased with the outcome of the Democratic platform. "For the first time, we're not just talking about family values, we're actually valuing families in this platform," Chrisler said. (Kerry Eleveld, The Advocate)

No Conjugal Visits for Gay Costa Rican Inmates

Gay felons in the Costa Rican prison system will not be allowed conjugal visits, the nation's highest court ruled, according to the Associated Press.

A former inmate brought a case to the Constitutional Tribunal after prison guards discontinued his weekly conjugal visits with his partner, an inmate currently serving in jail. The court said that the prison personnel's decision fell "within the scope of their rights, duties, and powers," according to the report.

The court is also considering a similar case that challenges the current prison rules restricting conjugal visits among straight couples. The Costa Rican congress is also considering a bill currently under debate that would legalize same-sex marriage, which could affect the ruling on conjugal visits. (The Advocate)

Canada Denies Entry to Westboro Baptist Church Members

The Canadian government has notified border patrol guards to prevent extremist antigay church leader Fred Phelps from entering the country, the Canadian Press reported Friday. Phelps, leader of the Westboro Baptist Church in Topeka, Kan., was scheduled to take church members to Winnipeg to protest a funeral for a man who was killed by a fellow passenger on a Greyhound bus. The cause of death, Phelps says, was God's response to Canada's laws allowing abortion and gay marriage.

According to the report, Public Safety Minister Stockwell Day alerted border patrol about people with signs and pamphlets that fit the church's hateful messages, urging them to keep them out of the country. A group of church members was stopped at the border on Tuesday and turned away.

Shirley Phelps-Roper, Phelps's daughter, said that a smaller

The church is known for protesting funerals of fallen U.S. soldiers and those lost to HIV/AIDS as a means to disseminate its belief that God hates gays. (The Advocate)

"Gay Street" Keeping Its Name

A request made by Second Baptist Church of San Antonio to change the name of Gay Street, which runs adjacent to the church's property, was denied by the city council on Thursday, reports WOAI TV.

The church wanted to rename the street "Second Baptist Way" in a supposed effort to reach out to the community. Many involved, though -- including attorney Rosie Gonzales, who participated in the hearing -- suspect the reason for the request had more to do with the controversial existing name than it did with outreach efforts.

Gay Street was named after a prominent community activist. and those who live on the street and in the general area have requested the street keep its name as a tribute.

At the hearing at City Hall on Thursday, the request was ultimately denied by a nearly unanimous vote. According to WOAI, city councilwoman Sheila McNeil requested that the name change be denied, and the council agreed. (The Advocate)
