"Just WHAT do those people do anyway?"

Thanks to the community for your outpouring of love and support since we announced that the present Steering Committee of *The New Voice* plans to retire at the end of this publication year (After the February '98 issue.) We are really proud of our publication and we do not want to see it die, but it is time for new blood.

So, in case you were thinking that you would like to help out but you really don't know what you could do, we will be featuring the various areas that go together each month to make the magazine happen. Maybe you'll find something that interests you.

This month we'll take a look at the basic element needed for the magazine — writers and reporters.

WRITERS

The basic material needed to create a magazine comes from the imagination and creative nature of our writers. The skills required are simple basic knowledge of the English Language and basic rules of grammar; a pen, pencil, typewriter, or computer; and the courage to put your thoughts down on paper. From there, it's up to you. Writers generally write about topics of current interest to themselves and to others. They write about the events in their lives or about the events on the news. They have a lot of latitude in giving their own opinions about issues and a lot of freedom as to subject matter. Some of the

limitations to being a writer:

You have to understand that our deadline is the 10th of the month. We need all submissions by the 10th so they can be edited, corrected for spelling and/or grammar, formatted for our desktop publishing program, and put together with other articles in order to be ready to go to the printer by the third week of the month.

You have to be fairly brief. Each month we have a limited number of pages and a limited amount of space available, so opinion pieces and essays need to be less than 900 words in length.

You have to follow the laws regarding libel and slander and you need to avoid taking direct slams at people or events in the community. Using humor is especially tricky, since a comment you may regard as funny may well be the thing that offends a good part of our readers and advertisers.

REPORTERS

Reporters are a specific type of writers. The reporter collects information about events in the community and puts that information into a news story that either describes an event or announces an upcoming event. The basic requirements for this position are like those for writers with one notable exception — as a reporter you are presenting factual information and have less room

for personal opinions. You also have to be prepared to actually attend events and then write your article while events are still fresh in your mind. Like writers, you have to understand that our deadline is the 10th of the month, but we will make allowances for events that occur on the 11th or 12th — but you have to let us know and you have to be prompt. Again, space is a consideration.

We also can use reporters who don't actually write the stories themselves. We can take basic notes and lists of facts and put them into story form, if that's necessary.

Well, those are a couple of the jobs needed to put the magazine together. Next month we'll talk about some of the mechanics of the operation — typing and layout.

GRAND ISLAND READERS ASKS: "DON'T JUMP TO CONCLUSIONS"

Dear Editor,

I am writing you in hopes of adding balance to the recent letter concerning alleged homophobic behavior at the Grand Island Village Inn and the subsequent letter from the gentleman from California castigating the manager of the restaurant.

I abhor homophobic behavior and am particularly enraged by physical violence against anyone regardless of sexual orientation. As a visible, active, vocal, unashamedly gay man I have spent five years here in Grand Island living a life of example, providing leadership to local organizations, confronting the wrongs all too common in our society and changing people's attitudes in outstate Nebraska. I ask no quarter and give none back. My commitment to fighting the fight is solid. That makes this letter so hard but necessary to write.

I have met a large portion of the community here in Grand Island and have been frequently in a position to deal with the writer of the original letter accusing the employees of Village Inn of aggressive homophobia. I appreciate that the person who wrote the letter believes he has had a threat made to him. No one deserves to feel threatened with violence or made to be uncomfortable in their work environment.

At the same time, while this person warns all of us and our allies to protect ourselves, he presents accusations as facts and asks us to boycott, based on the unsubstantiated accusations, accusations I am unable to confirm through questioning any of the other gay employees and cus-

tomers. He asks us to accept this condemnation without adding any credibility of his name. Even in our often inadequate legal system in Nebraska, the accused deserves to know the identity of his accuser. Did the writer try to approach management with concerns? Did the *New Voice* substantiate these accusations before going to press? In the truthfulness, character and judgment of the accuser solid enough for a man from California to write a threatening letter over 1000 miles from his home? Has anyone been so concerned that they could come out and check it out for themselves? No one could contact the writer/accuser to confirm these statements as he was protected by anonymity! It appears that a gay vigilante posse has gone to work on the accused but not proven guilty managers, employees and owners.

Make no mistakes, if these actions of the employees were proven true, I would be on this issue like white on rice. As I am aware of the reality of the situation, I have chosen what I feel to be a more rational, productive approach which means speaking personally with the manager, speaking to employees I know personally, providing a face to go with the name "gay", hoping to turn what has until this time been a group of ignorant of gay issues away from feeling ambushed by accusations and further alienated our concerns and needs.

We hate it when people anonymously out us as gay or lesbian without substantiation. Rumors of gay stars, politicians, or even private citizens can be hurtful and reek of sliminess if the accuser

can't identify himself or has questionable motives. Why is it ok for one of us to point the finger from behind the protective veil of anonymity? We need to protect ourselves and others in our community, but we need to be fair in our accusations.

These people have been accused, tried and in effect sentenced with no real fair hearing or chance to defend themselves. Ignorance on their part is no excuse, but letters from people they've never met condemning them for things that in their estimation are not issues will somehow make them change. Believe me when I say that in my five years here, it is the personal contacts that change attitudes and behaviors. That is not what these letters will cause to happen.

In closing, I ask that we try harder to get the facts, try to work to keep rhetoric to a minimum and be brave: to talk first, accuse last, and above all get the facts straight. We cannot do this by anonymously accusing and threatening people.

Thanks for all your good work at the *Voice*. We need that venue to communicate. I appreciate all your efforts!

ERSKINE WANTS EYE IN THE SKY TO BUZZ GAYS

Ald. Barry Erskine wants police to use their new crime-fighting helicopter to chase away an increasing number of gays who gather in Calgary's North Glenmore Park and "do their thing." "We're going to be asking police to increase enforcement until this disappears," Erskine said in an interview Thursday. "It (the HAWCS helicopter) could easily come over that area and buzz the area and basically have a look," he said.

The Ward 11 alderman said he's received numerous complaints from area residents about increased gay activity in the wooded park and wants police patrols stepped up. "It's being frequented by gay men who have families (and) who are closet gays. What the real concern is... the public display of sex whether it be heterosexual or homosexual couples."

But Erskine's colleagues on council were less than warm to his idea of using the helicopter, which costs \$600 an hour to fly. "I think it's totally inappropriate use for the helicopter," said Ald. Ray Jones. "The cost of the gas and the pilot is pretty expensive. It should only be used... to chase criminals, not people having sex." Ald. Joe Ceci added, "It wasn't bought for that reason."

Police aren't enthusiastic about the idea, either. "My inclination would be to have a look at the problem and make some recommendations on how best to deal with it," said city police Supt. Dave MacKay. Erskine said the park had a problem with public sex a couple of years ago, but with the help of the gay and lesbian association "it disappeared."

Stephen Lock of the Calgary Lesbian and Gay Political Action Guild, said he'd be prepared to help Erskine address the problem. He said many men who visit the park are not open about being gay, "so when we talk about enforcement, we have to realize exposing them creates ruined lives. There has to be a balance struck here." As for using the \$1.5-million police helicopter as an enforcement tool "it strikes me as expensive.... It would be like trying to use a tank to shoot flies," Lock said.

North Glenmore Park Community Association president, Diana Russell, said sex in the park "is still a problem and the police are trying to do their best. "It might be worth it" to use the helicopter, Russell said.

GRAND ISLAND RESTAURANT NOT AS IT WAS PORTRAYED

In the future, I hope that these kind of accusations be validated before a letter is published. This type of letter could be written by anyone with a malicious intent. All this does is hurt the business, the whole cause, or an individual. We need to proceed forward, not backwards.

POSITIVE STEREOTYPES AREN'T FAIR EITHER

A new study makes generalizations to claim lesbians and gay men are wealthier than other Americans. A gay and lesbian market study conducted by Simmons Market Research Bureau for Mulryan/Nash, a gay-based advertising agency, states, "28% of the respondents reported personal income that exceeds \$50,000," and a fifth make more than \$100,000 a year. It backs away from addressing the respondents who make up a small and wealthy "consumer" segment of the lesbian and gay community. It refers to the results of the study as if it represents the entire community. "Fifty-eight percent of the gay and lesbian community also hold management positions, 48% are college educated and, within the last 12 months, 61% have taken a foreign trip." From that point on, it refers to the "gay and lesbian community" as if the study represents a true cross-section. Opponents of lesbian and gay civil rights claim that because of this alleged "wealth", we do not need protections. This study contributes to the myth that lesbians and gay men are a privileged elite. The study will inspire more lesbian and gay related advertising which will give us greater visibility. But it is not an accurate reflection of economic realities of lesbians and gay men. MISSISSIPPI GOVERNOR CALLS GAY MARRIAGES "PERVERSE"

Mississippi became the 17th state in the past year to ban same-sex marriages. While signing legislation into law, Governor Kirk Fordice was quoted as denouncing same-sex relationships as "perverse".

His bizarre stand followed 14 weeks after the governor was involved in a bizarre accident. The married governor was returning home from lunch with an unidentified woman (Fordice's wife was out of town). Fordice had separated from his usual security force on the drive back and claims he doesn't remember anything about the accident or the day.

Suspicious opponents of the new law jumped on the controversy and denounced Fordice as a hypocrite who talks about family values.

In a related story, the National Organization of Women is conducting a nationwide campaign in support of same-sex marriage. In South Carolina, Candy Kern, a NOW coordinator, said, "In (this) state, it was illegal for a black and white to marry. And it's illegal based on similarly arbitrary grounds when you say you cannot marry simply because you're the same sex. It has nothing to do with the institution of marriage, but everything to do with bias and prejudice and fear."

All I can really say is that in my opinion, particularly as a journalist, censorship in any form is wrong which would mean that I support continuing the cause of open forums for any and all if they are not breaking the law, whether some regard them as moral or not. We can only accept responsibility for our own actions and cannot blame our problems on others. Where do you draw the line?

WHAT'S UP WITH ELLEN?

The controversy about the ABC sitcom Ellen has been changing as frequently as a mechanic changes tires. Things seem to have settled down — and here's where they stand now: ABC will NOT place the show on hiatus. It is, however, being moved to 7:30PM CST from March 4 through April 23. This will make room for Arsenio Hall's new show which will be showcased in Ellen's regular time slot. Late word has it that Ellen's character will finally come out on the show's April 30th episode — as long as ABC approves the script.

ABC says Ellen will return to her Wednesday night time slot in time for the coming out episode. Before the issue was settled, GLAAD's Entertainment Director Chastity Bono says, "GLAAD would like ABC to finally end the speculation. The public has waited patiently but now our patience is waning." GLAAD managing director, William Waybourn, said, "If ABC truly desires to paint an accurate picture of our diverse American landscape, it must not crop out gay and lesbian Americans. When Ellen Morgan finally steps out of the closet, we will all win — viewers and the network will benefit from the accurate reflection of the lives of real Americans, including gay men and lesbians." HEAD TO HAWAII APRIL 19-20

Plans are firming up for a rally and lobbying weekend in Honolulu on April 19 & 20. Call your travel agent and make plans to join us there, if at all possible. I have been spearheading the effort to organize this rally but now am working with people from PFLAG Oahu and from the Marriage Project-Hawaii.

The idea for the rally came from my anger and disgust at a rally called by the Catholic Bishop of Hawaii and co-planned by the Catholic and Mormon churches. Both churches based in students from private schools to the rally, which is why it was well attended. A group of teenagers attending the rally, many of wearing T-shirts from a private Mormon school, were verbally abusive, hateful and intimidating to the 65 to 70 gay people who counter-picketed at the rally.

The plan for April 19 and 20 is to lobby/picket at the legislature/capitol on Friday and then to rally on Saturday at a yet-to-be decided location in Honolulu. We are hoping to obtain endorsements and sponsorships from national organizations and publications and to spread the word as widely as possible. GOP'S STATE OF HOMOPHOBIA

The Human Rights Campaign offered a mixed reaction to President Clinton's State of the Union address, commending the President's call to end America's divisions while lamenting a missed opportunity to address our nation's rift over the issue of sexual orientation.

By contrast, Rep. J.C. Watts (R-Oklahoma) exploited an opportunity in the GOP response by seeming to justify discrimination against gay Americans.

The HRC called upon Watts to clarify a passage of his speech in which he seemed to be justifying faith-based discrimination. After calling for an end to racial discrimination and asserting that, "America must be a place where we all... feel a part of the American dream," he said, "It does not happen by trying to turn rich against poor or by using the politics of fear. It does not happen by reducing our values to the lowest common denominator, and, friends, it does not happen by asking Americans to accept what's immoral and what's wrong in the name of tolerance."

HRC Executive Director Elizabeth Birch said, "I am concerned that Congressman Watts may have made a thinly veiled appeal to the very politics of fear which he had deplored in his previous sentence. Like other faith-based differences, sincere religious disagreements over the issue of sexual orientation are not a valid reason for unfair discrimination."

No federal law protects Americans from discrimination based on sexual orientation. So while it is illegal to fire good employees from their jobs just because of their religion, it is legal in 41 states to fire them because of their actual or perceived sexual orientation.

I don't think I have blushed so much in my life, like some child that has heard his first off-color remark. You must bring that out in people. It's a special gift.

Thank you for showing me your faith in God. I would watch you each time you blessed your meal; study your strong frame humble itself before a higher power, even for just a few moments. I could feel your peace as you told me about the accomplishments in your life. I felt like a disciple during those moments, and I would check my own faith, wonder why the peace sometimes escapes. I admire your strength.

Thank you for the talks we shared, as you helped me figure out my place in the little soap opera that week. I know I spend too much of my time thinking about where and how I can fit in this world, like some extra puzzle piece left in the box. Your words comforted me, along with that soothing deep voice. I could close eyes and listen to you all day long. I can imagine the feel of that voice at night, snuggled in the covers and ready for sleep.

Thank you for taking me to the nightlife in Florida. The bars and clubs didn't seem so different from my haunts in Omaha; at least my attitude did not change. I guess I am still a scared little boy who fears all the wolves wrapped up in the linens of opening lines and casual glances. I can still see the lights of the Copa, and I will never forget my stint as the water-boy in the wet underwear contest. Thank you for pushing me out on stage. Now I have a story to tell all my friends that they will never believe. You would never see a contest like that back here; the Bible thumpers would have a protest-holiday, complete with pamphlets and picket lines.

The skies are trying awfully hard to rain here in Omaha. We still have almost fifty-degrees, and weathermen are starting to make jokes about an early Spring. I love days like these, where you can watch the remains of the last snow turn soot-black and melt into the curb. My walks from place to place become obstacle courses as I try my best to avoid the mud left behind by the frost.

Tony, thank you for your kindness, and teaching me the fine art of the secret crush. I think I have boyfriends too; and just like yours, they have no idea. You asked me once why I liked big men. I told you I liked the feel, the sense of security as a big man held me, and then I would make the joke about living in Nebraska, and needed the extra body heat on cold winter nights.



NEBRASKA FINALLY CONSIDERS HATE LAWS

Nebraska is one of only three states that do not have hate law legislation. Hawaii and West Virginia are the others. But that could soon change. State Senator Jennie Robak, of Columbus, has introduced a bill that would bring hate crime laws to the state. And it includes sexual orientation. LB90 reads in part, "A person in the State of Nebraska has the right to live free from violence, or intimidation by threat of violence, committed against his or her person or the destruction or vandalism of, or intimidation by threat of destruction of, his or her property because of his or her race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, political affiliation, sex, sexual orientation, age, or disability. Any person who commits an unlawful offense against a victim or a victim's property because of the victim's race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, political affiliation, sex, sexual orientation, age, or disability or because of the victim's association with a person's (same list) shall be punished according to the next higher penalty classification than the penalty classification prescribed for the unlawful offense. In no case shall a person be punished by a penalty greater than a Class 1B felony."

The bill includes provisions for a victim bringing civil action against his/her attacker. Civil action must be brought within four years. It would also require the Nebraska Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice to collect and analyze information regarding hate crimes. If the bill passes into law, it's important for any victim of a hate crime to report his/her situation to police. It would not only help bring the perpetrator to justice, but allow the state to monitor how serious attacks on an individual group is.

GAY RODEO EXPLAINED

This is the fourth in a series of articles to explain gay rodeo.

Heartland Regional Rodeo, sponsored by HGRA, is scheduled for the weekend of June 27-29 in Fremont, Nebraska. The rodeo performances are on Saturday and Sunday, and we have some great parties planned for Friday and Saturday nights. What's in it for you, the reader of this article? Well, for starters, the weekend will provide a wonderful opportunity to:

1. Party in the sun
2. Watch performances by local and national entertainers (at the rodeo grounds and at the parties)
3. Shop (there will be vendors' displays at the rodeo grounds)
4. See what a gay rodeo is all about and

5. SEE NEW FACES. We expect a lot of contestants and spectators from out of town — from Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona, Minnesota, Illinois, and Kansas.

In addition to the above, it's for a good cause. A rodeo is expensive to produce, but if we make a profit, proceeds will go to charitable organizations. In 1996, because of the successes of our Charity Ball in Des Moines and the International Convention in Omaha, we were able to donate \$4300 to the Nebraska AIDS Project and the All Iowa AIDS Benefit combined. The men and women of HGRA invite you to be a part of this fun-filled weekend. We hope to make Heartland Regional Rodeo a successful fund-raising endeavor and a weekend of first class entertainment for our community.

There is a dress code for contestants and rodeo officials. Except for during the camp events, contestants and officials must wear long pants, long sleeved shirts, western hats, and western boots. Spectators can wear whatever they please. There are 13 events in gay rodeo, divided into four categories: Rough Stock events, Roping events, Horse events, and Camp events. There are three Roping events: Calf Roping on Foot, Mounted Breakaway Calf Roping, and Team Roping. Last month's article described Calf Roping on Foot and Mounted Breakaway Calf Roping. This article will describe Team Roping.

Roping Events, Part 2

Team Roping

There are two contestants in this event. The calf is in the roping chute. The contestants are on their horses in the box next to the chute. Each contestant carries one rope, and the team is allowed a total of three throws. Time starts when

the chute opens and the calf's nose clears the chute gate. The first contestant (the "header") attempts to rope the calf over the head, neck, or horns. If successful, then the second contestant (the "heeler") attempts to rope the calf around its hind feet. There is a penalty for catching only one hoof. Five seconds are added to the team's time. Time ends when the horses are facing each other and the ropes are tight. Fastest time wins. Men and women compete together. A contestant may enter this event twice, once as header and once as heeler.

NEW YORK'S STAR THEATRE OFFERS COMPELLING, HONEST AIDS PRESENTATIONS AND WORKSHOPS AT UNL

New York's award-winning STAR Theatre of the Mt. Sinai Adolescent AIDS Program will offer free public performances and workshops at UNL and Hastings College March 13-20.

In compelling and realistic musical productions, STAR Theatre portrays the lives of young people as they confront the difficulties of growing up in the age of AIDS. The shows are honest; focusing on sex, communication, safety, the choices youth make.

Two separate productions will be presented by the young and talented cast: "On The Edge," is targeted toward a high school age audience, and "Over The Edge" toward a college age and older audience.

"On The Edge" comes from a real teen perspective. It is targeted toward young people who are bombarded by peer pressure, hormones, and difficult decisions which often result in risky behavior. The show is an interactive musical theatre piece about decision making, safer sex, STD's, drugs, HIV/AIDS, and homosexuality.

"Over the Edge" is a sophisticated, fast paced musical targeted at high-risk youth in college and toward young adults. The show blurs the line between reality and stage reality by the use of interrupting scenes, directly addressing the audience, and through other theatrical devices. It follows the lives of nine people on their separate journeys and deals with racism, gender equity, homosexuality, STD's, communication, pregnancy, safer sex, and HIV/AIDS.

The public performances will be at Westbrook Music Hall, Room 119, on the UNL City Campus and scheduled as follows.

Immediately following each performance, a half hour or more is devoted to a lively discussion with the audience of the issues raised in the show. Audience participation encourages people to express themselves about sex, drugs, and AIDS with members of the STAR Theatre company.

All performances are free. Early arrival is encouraged for limited available seating.

In addition to the public performances, STAR Theatre will conduct special seminars, workshops, and training sessions for the faculty, staff, students, and community members on health and social issues at UNL and Hastings College. STAR Theatre received the 1989 American Medical Association's Award for the best prevention education program in the country.

STAR Theatre's visit to Nebraska is sponsored by the Nebraska Department of Health, University Foundation, University Health Center, Nebraska Department of Education, Committee on Gay and Lesbian Concerns, University Housing, United Way of Hastings Area, Inc., and Central HIV/STD Prevention Planning Group.
