Hit List Issued on Gays in Liberia

An antigay group in Liberia has reportedly issued a hit list reminiscent of the one that preceded the death in Uganda of a prominent activist as that country debated its "kill the gays" bill.

The Associated Press reports that a group called the "Movement Against Gay's in Liberia" is distributing a list of people suspected of being gay and followers have pledged to "get to them one by one."

"Having conducted a comprehensive investigation, we are convinced that the below listed individuals are gays or supporters of the club who don't mean well for our country," the group wrote, according to the AP. "Therefore, we have agreed to go after them using all means in life."

Ugandan gay rights activist David Kato was beaten to death

with a hammer in 2011 after a newspaper printed its own list of gay people. The newspaper's list of "100 Pictures of Uganda's Top Homos," which was accompanied by the words "Hang Them," made Kato the target of repeated death threat's. He was the advocacy officer for Sexual Minorities Uganda. His killer, who admitted to the crime and was sentenced to 30 years

in prison, claimed it was in self-defense against sexual advances.

Liberian legislators are considering a bill that would criminalize same-sex

marriages. The country already bans "voluntary sodomy" with penalties possible of up to one year in jail.

And the country's president, Ellen Johnson Sirleaf, recently defended the antigay laws.

"We like ourselves just the way we are," said Sirleaf during an interview with The Guardian. "We've got certain traditional values in our society that we would like to preserve."

Sirleaf's comments received added attention because she is the winner of last year's Nobel Peace Prize for her work on civil rights for women.

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
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

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
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We Are All a Part of the Human Race

A survey of 1,000 Omahans found that residents were in favor of the anti-discrimination law passed by the Omaha city council on March 13, 2012 by a 2-to-1 margin. It is this positive information that will allow for this new found freedom to be upheld. This bill allows for the LGBT residents of the City of Omaha to file Human Rights violations with the city. Individuals will no longer be dismissed from employment due to their orientation, suffer discrimination on the job, or be refused services at local establishments such as restaurants, hotels, and other businesses that serve the public.

Councilman Garry Gernandt's (South Omaha) changed his vote to YES after his 2010 vote of No which had prevented this law to be extended to the community at that time. He heard his voters and he responded accordingly. Sixty-eight percent of voters in his district are in favor of the protections that this bill offers while only 19% were against it.

The bloggers have come out in droves over web with their support of Omaha and the Omaha community in which we live. One blogger that has been very active with their feels stated that, "This is what happens when local, small town LGBT bond and band together in the name of their rights, their livelihood, and the next generation of gay youth in those areas." He goes on to say that, "All LGBT need to be involved and active, espe-



cially those in conservative states. You owe it to yourself and your life. When you do, you see phenomenal progress like this. It's worth the small effort."

While there is definitely world wide support for what has just happened not everyone feels that this is a positive thing for the city, state, or the Husker Nation. Nebraska assistant football coach Ron Brown spoke out against the anti-discrimination ordinance before the city council vote and continued to speak out after it was passed. His actions are being described as a homophobic assault by writer Jim Buzinski of outsport.com.

John F. Carroll an Omaha attorney and season ticket holder wrote a letter that was published in the Omaha Herald describing what he calls a depressing moment when Ron Brown drove to Omaha from Lincoln to speak out against the ordinance, Mr. Brown began his statement saying, "Hi my name is Ron Brown. I live in One Memorial stadium in Lincoln, NE. That's not really my home but it is where I spend most of my time." He went on to use the University and religion to argue his point to the city council. Mr. Brown stated to the city council that "For those of you on this council who have a relationship with Christ, and only you know if you do, you will be held to great accountability for the decisions you make."

University of Nebraska Chancellor Harvey Pelman was quick to respond to Nathan James of GBM NEWS stressing that the college does not share the coach's views. He goes on to say

I understand that there were also faculty and students from the university who testified in favor of the ordinance."

The city ordinance that was introduced by councilman Ben Gray is currently pending a legislative vote. Gray's bill is being directly opposed by State Senator Beau McCoy, who wants Gray's bill stopped by the state.

A Father's Reaction to His Very Young Gay Son

Over the past few months my wife, HuffPost blogger Amelia, has been asked numerous times what I think about our 7-year-old son identifying as gay.

This is not something I thought I'd be writing so soon (OK, honestly, I never thought I would be writing a blog on an internationally known news website). When my wife and I were expecting our first child, we discussed what we would do if he or she were born with a disability or with a foot growing out of his or her head. Dealing with a child with a disability would be a life-changing event and something that we had to think about a lot. Possibly having a gay son or daughter wasn't like that. We didn't even have to discuss it, because it wouldn't be a problem. Although the head-foot would need to be dealt with immediate-

ly, we assumed we had 15 years or so before any of our kids said they were gay.

You know what they say about assuming: it makes all the asses come out in the comment sections of blogs -- people who don't know anything about my son other than the few guarded things my wife has written, and yet they seem to think they know so much. Let me say that most of the comments have been very supportive, and it's great to see the same people come to Ameila's defense whenever the occasional jerk butts into the conversation with some homophobic ideas. And many of jerk-butts (and some of the normal people, too) want to know what I think about this whole "gay thing."

The idea that I would be immediately disappointed/angry/ suicidal that my son identifies as gay offends me, both as a father and simply as a human. It seems the further we all move along into the 21st century in terms of technology, the more some parts of society regress to the 1950s -- or the Victorian era, if we're being honest -- when it comes to ideas of social mores and attitudes on certain subjects: Ward Cleaver would have been angry if the Beaver had come out of the closet, so surely a father 60 years later would have the same reaction. I mean, come on, that's only common sense! Excuse me while I roll my eyes for an hour or two.

I don't see how a father, or any parent, can look at their son, the one they've loved since before the child was even born, and upon hearing him say, "Dad, I'm gay," turn their back on him. The comments from men much older than me telling stories just like that break my heart. My wife always wants to adopt the teenage kids who write to her; I want to adopt the 60-year-old

PLAYING THE BLAME GAME

As my grandma (the Ohio chicken farmer) said, "Nobody's life is shit-free". She's right. Our parents mess up, friends let us down, lovers screw up, bosses and

coworkers act like morons. There is a huge temptation to blame other people for our problems. As a psychotherapist, I hear this all the time, "I'm so depressed because my mother never paid any attention to me" or "I'm so messed up because my ex cheated on me and now I can't trust anybody." By blaming other people for our problems, we don't have to be responsible. We get to be victims, and we get the perfect excuse not to change: it's all their fault.

Sometimes we do exactly the opposite: we blame ourselves for everything. "It's all my fault", I've heard clients say as they describe their parents, friends and ex lovers as almost perfect. It may be so painful to tell yourself the truth that your parents, lovers or friends screwed up, that you become hyperresponsible. It's not helpful to blame all your problems on yourself, e.g., "Oh, I'm just so lazy, it's all my fault" or "I'm just such a frigging mess, I've always been this way." Blaming yourself or someone else for your troubles will get you nowhere. I suggest an alternative: being responsible.

Being responsible means that you tell yourself (and others) the truth about what happened in the past, see it in context, learn something from it and move on. It's not about denial: you can't learn anything from saying, "Well, my ex was a total asshole, oh well, whatever..." How can you learn anything from that kind of verbal shoulder shrug?

Being responsible is about understanding what happened to us and putting it in context. Self-help guru Louise Hay says, "We are all victims of victims." This sounds depressing, until you look at it from another point of view: our parents couldn't teach us anything they didn't know, neither could our friends or lovers. Everyone is doing the best they can with the knowledge that they have at that time, Few people deliberately set out to mess with our heads, they just don't know any better. This includes us.

Many people enjoy playing the victim; it gives you the best excuse in the world for being immature and bitter. "They did it TO me! Poor helpless sweet little me". This may have been true when you were a kid, but are you going to stay a victimized child for the rest of your life? Blame will keep you stuck there. For example: if your father beat you when you were a kid, saying it was because he loved you, how do you not blame him? Let's assume he did love you, but his way of showing it was abusive. Being responsible is a process of accepting what happened in your past and validating it in the present, so you can work through it and be free of it. It means being 100%

accountable for yourself NOW, in the present. Blame, on the other hand, sounds like this: "This is how I am and I can't change it... I hate my dad and I'll never stop hating him for what he did to me." This is how people get stuck in hating and a desire for revenge.

Let me share my formula with you: Blame = avoidance. Responsibility = potential for change. If you want to keep on doing the same-old, same-old, then stay with your blame. Don't be surprised, however, when you feel depressed, cynical and bitter. This is where blame takes you. If you want to change your life, start to take responsibility for yourself. Yeah, maybe some nasty shit has happened to you in the past, but what do you want your future to be? If you're ready to change, seeing the past clearly and (eventually) forgiving yourself and the other "guilty" parties can usher in a new way of living: one full of possibilities and unimagined psychological freedom. The formula doesn't lie: the choice is yours.

men who cry when they read that I tell my son how awesome he is. I don't care if they are as old as my father; they deserve love just as much as anyone else.

So many of the negative comments have been funny to Amelia and me because the people writing them obviously don't know our son. "Isn't your son's father going to miss teaching him sports?" "Isn't not having your child get married going to just break your heart?" "How does his father react to the prancing flamer that your son must be?"

First of all, as I write this, my shoulder is sore from throwing a football with him earlier. He loves sports (American Football is his favorite), and he can throw a really nice spiral, especially for a 7-year-old (although if he grows up to be my size, he'll either be a fine defensive end or the heaviest quarterback in the history of the NFL). And again, he's 7: as far as he's concerned, he's going to play all the positions -- at the same time. And if tomorrow he wants to start ballet classes, we will go to all his recitals and cheer him on just as loudly as if he were on the 50-yard line.

Getting married is up to him; single or married, he's still my son. If he and his maybe-some-day-far-far-in-the-future boy-friend want to tie the knot, they just need to tell his mother and me where to be, and we'll be there. Hopefully by then they can get married in whichever state they want, but if not, we'll just travel to one of the cool states and have a great time.

And the "flamer" comments... where to begin? Do effeminate men exist? Of course. Are all gay men effeminate? Of course not. But does it matter? Whether he grows up to be the manliest man in all mandom or the most effeminate guy to ever hit the drag-show circuit, he is my son. I want him to be loved, comfortable with himself and his friends, and happy. If that means he's the next RuPaul or Joe Montana (or just that nice guy in Accounts Receivable), he will know that being himself is important, no matter who he ends up growing into. And he will always know that his father loves him.

Transgender Contestant Can Compete in Miss Universe

After being rebuked by groups including the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation, the Miss Universe Organization will allow Jenna Talackova, a transgender woman, to compete in the Miss Universe Canada pageant.

"The Miss Universe Organization will allow Jenna Talackova to compete in the 2012 Miss Universe Canada pageant provided she meets the legal gender recognition requirements of Canada, and the standards established by other international competitions," according to a statement released by the organization late Monday night.

GLAAD contacted the pageant organization after Talackova was disqualified for her transgender status; the group urged

Miss Universe to change its policies. GLAAD is hoping to change the policy for all transgender competitors.

"The Miss Universe Organization made the right decision and has taken an important first step," GLAAD's Herndon Grad-

dick said in a statement. "Now, GLAAD urges the Organization to include all women and use this incident to speak out in support of the transgender community."

Oral Arguments on Deck in Historic DOMA Challenge

Oral arguments will be heard Wednesday in Boston for a legal challenge to the Defense of Marriage Act, marking the first time a federal appellate court will consider the constitutionality of the merits of the 1996 law.

A three-judge panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the First Circuit will hear arguments in a consolidated appeal of two cases, Gill v. Office of Personnel Management and Commonwealth of Massachusetts v. Department of Health and Human Services. The cases challenge Section 3 of DOMA, which holds that, "the word 'marriage' means only the legal union of a man and a woman as husband and wife, and the word 'spouse' refers only to a person of the opposite sex who is a husband or a wife."

In July 2010, Judge Joseph L. Tauro of the U.S. District Court of Massachusetts, appointed to the bench by President Richard Nixon, ruled that section of DOMA unconstitutional in both cases. Judge Tauro ruled in Gill, a case brought by Gay and Lesbian Advocates and Defenders, that the section violates the equal protection of the laws guaranteed by the Due Process Clause of the Fifth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. The judge ruled in Commonwealth of Massachusetts that Section 3 of DOMA violates the Tenth Amendment and the Spending Clause of the Constitution.

(Oral Arguments on Deck in Historic DOMA Challenge, Continued from page 9)

The Department of Justice alerted Congress in February 2011 that it had determined heightened scrutiny should apply when evaluating Section 3 of DOMA, and that under this higher standard, the law is unconstitutional, and the department would no longer defend it. The Republicancontrolled House opted to continue to defend DOMA through the Bipartisan Legal Advisory Group.

In the hour allotted for arguments on Wednesday morning, the Department of Justice is expected to contend that heightened scrutiny should apply, based on briefs filed with the court. The department disagrees with the states rights' claim of Massachusetts, however.

"Under the well-established factors set forth by the Supreme Court, discrimination based on sexual orientation merits heightened scrutiny, and under that standard of review, Section 3 violates equal protection principles and is unconstitutional," wrote the department in a brief filed last December. "Moreover, because it violates equal protection principles, Section 3 exceeds the authority of the Spending Clause. However, Section 3 presents no further Spending Clause concerns independent of its violation of equal protection, and it does not violate the Tenth Amendment."

In his decision nearly two years ago, Judge Tauro applied rational basis, the standard that BLAG urges in its appeal. BLAG is expected to defend DOMA based on rationales such as "responsible procreation" asserted when Congress passed the law, as well as new rationales involving "the federal interest in uniform eligibility for federal benefits."

"Opposite-sex couples can, of course, marry in every American jurisdiction while same-sex couples can marry in only some," wrote BLAG in a brief filed last September. "If Congress simply incorporated state-law definitions, same-sex couples would be treated as married for federal law purposes if they lived in states recognizing such marriages, but not if they lived in states retaining the traditional definition. More confusion would arise regarding same-sex couples who marry in a state or foreign country where such marriages are permitted but reside in a state that does not recognize foreign same-sex marriages."

"In enacting DOMA, Congress rationally decided to avoid creating such a confusing patchwork in favor of a simple uniform national rule relying on the traditional definition," they wrote.





