

NOW Activists Celebrate National Coming Out Day

During October, many NOW chapters are organizing Come Out Against Homophobia actions aimed at making the world a safer place where lesbians and gay men can in fact "come out."

"NOW has long recognized that lesbian rights is a feminist issue," NOW President Patricia Ireland said. "Our members — gay, straight, bisexual, transgendered — are raising their voices to condemn hatred, bigotry and discrimination."

Coming Out Day is rooted in the 1987 March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights with its AIDS Quilt display. That event is widely regarded as pivotal for the gay community, bringing together and politicizing lesbian and gay men and turning the tide on treatment for people living with HIV and AIDS. Rob Eichberg and Jean O Leary, two well-known gay rights activists, founded Coming Out Day on the first anniversary of the march, October 11, 1988, to encourage lesbians and gay men to reveal their sexual orientation to family, friends and co-workers.

Since the first National Coming Out Day, progress has been made, despite the growing power of the religious right, particularly in the legislative arena. While efforts to pass positive legislation have often been met with virulent homophobia, NOW activists have played a significant role in convincing two states, Maine and New Hampshire, to adopt non-discrimination laws



(NOW Activists, Story Continued from page 1) and in defeating anti-lesbian and gay civil rights ballot measures in Maine and Oregon.

In addition, major corporations have adopted policies extending family health coverage and other benefits to unmarried couples in committed relationships regardless of their sexual identity. NOW is a long-time supporter of such expanded coverage. Delegates at NOW's 1988 National Conference voted to support domestic partner legislation, and NOW's current Women Friendly Workplace campaign calls on employers to provide all employee benefits without discrimination based on sex, marital status or sexual orientation.

More and more employers are using domestic partner benefits to help attract and retain top employees. Those employers claimed, in a recent Washington Post article, an increase in morale and productivity after such policies were introduced.

Despite these results, companies such as American Airlines and Walt Disney Company are targeted by religious political extremists as "promoting homosexuality" through such lesbianand-gay-friendly policies. American was the first airline to adopt a non-discrimination policy that covers sexual orientation.

Disney has also been under attack for providing company-wide domestic partner benefits, as well as for the televised coming out of the title character on the sitcom Ellen, which is produced by Disney and airs on the Disney-owned ABC network.

The media frenzy accompanying Ellen offered lesbian and gay activists an opportunity to learn who is and isn't supportive of gay rights. Several big companies like Chrysler and Wendy's quickly pulled advertising. ABC itself rejected gay-themed advertising from the Human Rights Campaign and Olivia Cruise Lines, although some local affiliates did run the ads. The episode was the top-rated primetime show for the week, introducing to millions of viewers the fact that lesbians and gay men can be someone you've known and laughed with for years.

"Many NOW activists watching Ellen come out couldn't help but think how times have changed, but this year on National Coming Out Day, we are all renewing our commitment to making our world safe and supportive for lesbians and gay men," said Ireland.

Nebraska Employers Show Leadership with Non-Discrimination Based on Sexual Orientation

Employers are showing leadership in Nebraska by supporting non-discrimination based on sexual orientation. Below is a list of companies and institutions in cities across Nebraska, including many of the largest employers, that have non-discrimination policies covering sexual orientation.

These employers understand it makes great business sense in the competitive national and global marketplace to protect basic human rights to help attract and retain talented workers and to ensure increased productivity and economic activity. This is important to all Nebraskans because greater productivity and economic activity generates greater tax revenue which means taxes can be lowered for everyone. These pro-business non-discrimination policies are good for the state and improve the quality of life for everyone.

Both the neighboring states of Iowa and Colorado ban discrimination based on sexual orientation by law in employment, housing, and public accommodations. There is no reason or obstacle preventing the Nebraska Legislature and Governor from enacting an identical law to ensure the same pro-business, lower-taxes, non-discrimination environment exists across Nebraska to keep the state competitive.

HOW - AND WHEN - TO CRY

Many of us have grown up with the messages that crying is

shameful and a sign of weakness. Whether we are gay/bi/trans men who were told to "just suck it up" or tough-as-nails women who long ago decided: "I'll never let anyone see me cry again", most of us got the message that strong people rarely cry and only sissies and fragile people do.

This is bullshit.

Sadness is an emotion natural to us all. The ability or inability to EX-PRESS sadness is a learned behavior, and can be unlearned.



Many people don't even know what emotions they're feeling. Somehow, there is a "disconnect" between what we feel and our ability to recognize what we feel. A lot of this stuff comes from our childhood; we're "programmed" from birth on what to do with our emotions. If our emotions were validated and mirrored back to us, we realize it's okay to feel them. However, if

our emotions were invalidated and we were encouraged NOT to feel them, then we internalize emotional repression. Over time, this gets "hard wired" in our brains so we don't even have to think about repressing our emotions...we just do it subconsciously.

I went to a workshop recently and the speaker said that in his experience, women need to learn to express their anger and men need to learn to express their grief. While this workshop was predominantly for heterosexual men, I think the speaker has a point. Many of my female clients cry when they are angry, while many of my male clients get angry when they're actually sad. Good mental health means being able to responsibly express both anger and sadness, regardless of gender.

For some people, crying feels like giving in...like surrender. Most of us feel better after a "good cry": our bodies are more relaxed and our tension and stress levels go way down. It is also true, however, that crying may open the door to feeling more emotionally, and sometimes that is not what we want. Let me give you a simple exercise to help you control how much you "feel" at any given moment in time: when you want to feel more, breathe deeply. When you want to feel less, breathe as shallowly as you can. Your breathing strongly affects your ability to feel your emotions. Try it.

One way to get in touch with your feelings (e.g., sadness, anger, grief) is to notice where in your body you feel them. For example, let's say your sadness is in your chest. You could pay attention to it, and see what the sensation is like. Does it feel like tightness, a burning sensation, numbness? Just notice what's going on in your body.

If you want to cry, but find it difficult, notice if your tears are right below the surface, pushing at the backs of your eyes. Let your eyes relax; don't force the tears (it doesn't work). If you were told as a kid, "don't cry...suck it up", you may need to be patient with your tears. By starting to notice them and the physical sensations that accompany them, you're giving your tears more and more "permission" to come out. It takes a while to undo all the "brainwashing" from our childhood. Go easy on yourself and the tears WILL come!

I've had clients, who were afraid to cry, tell me, "Once I start crying, I won't be able to stop." This is just a fear: believe me, you'll stop. But you may need to cry quite a bit before that happens. If you've dammed up your tears up for a long time, you've got quite a backlog there! They may come out over time or over the course of a few days. Let them out!

If you're new to crying (isn't that a funny phrase?), let the tears come out in private, in a safe, relaxed place. You may want to start off alone, or with a trusted friend or lover there to comfort you. Or, like some of us, you can practice in the dark of a movie theatre or watching a video at home. Crying is like any other feeling, the more comfortable you get with expressing it, the easier it is to do so.

This summer, if it feels right to you: why not let yourself cry? Your body (and mind) will thank you.



Diane's Story

"My partner and I had been together for 14 years when I received the worst phone call of my life. There had been a terrible accident, and she was being flown to the hospital by helicopter. The hospital staff wanted to know how to get in touch with her next of kin. Mine was the only phone number they could find in her wallet. 
The Haircut

Out lesbian Jenny Durkan has been confirmed by the Senate to become U.S. attorney for the Western District of Washington.

President Barack Obama nominated Durkan, one of his first six nominees, in May. She is to replace Jeff Sullivan, a Bush administration appointee.

"I am honored and humbled by this challenge and responsibility, and will spend each day working to honor the rule of law, protect our citizens from crime, and to defend the U.S. in civil cases," Durkan said in a press release. "I am proud to lead this team of outstanding attorneys and staff who work tirelessly in this pursuit."

Durkan has her own law practice in Seattle. She has also served as counsel to Gov. Christine Gregoire and taught trial advocacy at her alma mater, the University of Washington School of Law. She was recommended by Washington state senators Patty Murray and Maria Cantwell in February.

Durkan, 50, lives with her partner and two sons.

Lutheran Church Splits

Over Gay Clergy

Members of St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Minneapolis voted on Sunday to leave the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, the nation's largest Lutheran denomination.

Following a 96% affirmative vote by members of the congregation, St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Minneapolis moved one step closer to splitting from the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America

The decision to leave came in response to the ELCA's general assembly vote in Minneapolis on August 21 to allow gays and lesbians in committed relationships to serve as clergy.

The new law lifts a restriction that had required gay and lesbian ministers to remain celibate.

According to St. Paul's senior pastor, the Reverend Roland J. Wells Jr., there are many pastors and members who are withholding funds from the national church and are working to establish a new denomination called Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ, reports Minnesota Public Radio.

"We feel quite affirmed by the hundreds of congregations who are contemplating the same move," Wells said in a news release.










Military Journal Piece Says Scrap DADT

An article in one of the military's top journals argues for immediate repeal of "don't ask, don't tell."

An upcoming issue of Joint Force Quarterly, the Pentagon's top scholarly journal, will include an article that calls for an end to the ban on gays and lesbians serving openly in the military, reports The Boston Globe.

The piece, which is authored by Air Force colonel Om Prakash, charges that "the military is essentially forcing thousands of gay men and women to lead dishonest lives in an organization that emphasizes integrity as a fundamental tenet." according to the Globe.

Colonel Prakash argues that the Obama administration should forgo a study of "don't ask, don't tell" and simply move forward with lifting the ban.

"After a careful examination, there is no scientific evidence to support the claim that unit cohesion will be negatively affected if homosexuals serve openly," writes Prakash, who is now working in the office of Defense secretary Robert M. Gates. "Based on this research, it is not time for the administration to reexamine the issue; rather it is time for the administration to examine how to implement the repeal of the ban."

Neither Defense secretary Robert Gates nor Joint Chiefs chairman Adm. Mike Mullen have spoken out publicly about their views on the policy, though both have said that President Barack Obama has been clear about his intent to end the ban. Secretary Gates is currently reviewing the policy to see if there's a way to soften implementation of the ban until Congress repeals the law.

Observers of the debate over "don't ask, don't tell" say the publication of such an article is an indication that military leadership is open to hearing competing views on the topic.

The Obama campaign was awash with good news over the weekend, announcing a staggering \$150 million haul in fundraising for the month of September and receiving the coveted endorsement of former Secretary of State and mem-

Gov. Sarah breaking with her running mate, Sen. John McCain, to voice her

support for a federal marriage amendment outlawing same-sex marriage.

Powell, who announced his support for Sen. Barack Obama on the Meet the Press Sunday, said the country was facing the most difficult times he had ever seen in his 30-plus years of public service. While Powell said both Sen. John McCain and Sen. Obama were prepared to be president in his judgment, he added that Sen. Obama is a "transformational figure" who has the "rhetorical abilities" and the "substance" to meet the challenges of the day.

"He is a new generation coming into the world -- onto the world stage, onto the American stage, and for that reason, I'll be voting for Senator Barack Obama,' he said. Powell also indicated that part of his decision stemmed from the divisive tone of McCain's campaign, his capricious approach to dealing with the economy, and his choice of Gov. Sarah Palin as his running mate.

"Now that we have had a chance to watch her for some seven weeks," Powell said, "I don't believe she's ready to be president of the United States, which is the job of the vice president."

Gen. Powell, who had strongly supported the military's "don't ask, don't tell" policy and helped craft the plan before he stepped down as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, has indicated a willingness to review the policy in recent years. Last year, he told Vanity Fair that the military ban "is still a discriminatory policy; it is prejudicial," adding, "It's now 14 years later, the country has changed, and the day may well come when it will not be a problem any longer."

For her part, Gov. Palin took time this weekend to revisit the merits of another anti-gay federal law that, unlike DADT, failed to make it's way into the books: the Federal Marriage Amendment. Palin told David Brody of the Christian Broadcasting Network that she supports passing a federal law that would constitutionally define marriage as a union between a man and a woman and deny same-sex couples the right to marry.

"In my own state, I have voted along with the vast majority of Alaskans who had the opportunity to vote to amend our Constitution defining marriage as between one man and one woman," Palin told CBN. "I wish on a federal level that that's where we would go because I don't support gay marriage.'

Palin's views on the issue break with those of Sen. John McCain, who has twice voted against the Federal Marriage Amendment and who believes defining marriage should be left up to individual states.

Sen. Obama's announcement of his \$150 million month brought his fundraising totals for the campaign to more than \$600 million. Sen. McCain opted to receive public financing, which allotted him \$84 million to use from the beginning of September through the end of the race November 4. Sen. Obama's financial advantage has allowed him to flood the airwaves with ads at a rate of about three-to-one to Sen. McCain and enabled him to put staffers into a number of very traditionally red states such as Virginia and North Carolina.

Another financial development last week: The Atlantic reported that the Democratic National Committee is considering pouring about \$20 million into state legislative races nationwide in an attempt to flip control of key legislatures. In the cross hairs, sources said, is New York, where Democrats are two seats away from winning a majority in the state senate. Many LGBT activists believe that a Democratic senate majority would usher in the chance to pass a bill legalizing same-sex marriage. The New York State Assembly passed gay marriage legislation last year and Gov. David Paterson told The Advocate he would "absolutely" sign the bill into law if it reached his desk.
