

COMMUNITY MOURNS PASSING OF LARRY WISEBLOOD, FOUNDER OF NEW VOICE

The obituary printed in The Omaha World-Herald included the following information: Larry Wiseblood died on March 12, 1994. Larry had worked as a Mental Health Counselor at the Nebraska Correctional Center. He had served as Sports Information Director of Bellevue College. President of Students at Union College and Bellevue College, student Senate Treasurer, and founder editor of "New Voice." He is survived by his mother, Miriam Perkins of Bellevue, Nebraska, and a sister, Celeste Wiseblood of Staten Island, New York. Service were held March 16 at First Plymouth Congregational Church in Lincoln with burial in the First Plymouth Columbarium. Memorials may be sent to the family c o Miriam Perkins, 2305 Willow Circle. Sarpy Co., Omaha, NE 68123.

However, there is much more to Larry's life than is listed there. The obituary did not include that Larry was an activist to the core - working for gay and lesbian rights, taking part in Nebraska's Peace March, and founding a magazine that for 10) years has provided an outlet for the creative talents of the gay and lesbian community. Larry was an attractive and charming man, talented and



verbally skilled. He was assertive and confident sometimes impulsive - but always determined

to do what he believed was right.

When Larry was interviewed for the 10th Anniversary Issue of The New Voice, he knew that his time was limited. He took care to pass along a part of our heritage as he gave us a complete set of the first two years of The New

And the only thing he really wanted to say to the community was that he would really miss

After Larry's death, I received a call from Larry's Buddy from the Nebraska AIDS Project asking for copies of the March issue of The New Voice to have available at the memorial service. He also wanted to let us know how much Larry had liked the 10th Anniversary issue and how much he appreciated our contacting him for an interview

I was glad that I had the opportunity to talk with Larry one last time. It was a special meeting for me and I was very glad to learn that it had been important to Larry as well.

But, in the end, I can only repeat what I said last month. "We will miss you, too, Larry. Thank you for being there when we needed you."

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
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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

ANDREW SULLIVAN RESPONDS

Dear NVN Readers,

In response to both Kennedy and VanButsel, there are several points which need to be understood and seen

Omaha had two alternative newspapers, The Metropolitan and The Nebraska Observer, both engaged in reporting child sexual abuse scandal and never considered the source of such information nor did they understand how hype was destroying constructive analysis of the situation.

Both newspapers are now out of business. They lost legitimacy and credibility when the sex scandals were discovered to be part of extremist

movement and the papers perished.

The Times of the Heartland is opening itself up to the same trap by taking at face value the allegations of child sexual abuse and failing to make distinctions in sexual misconduct, teen-age

sexual delinquency and actual child abuse.

Kennedy and VanButsel say the *Times* coverage has been "factual" and "unbiased" but I wonder if such stories of priestly sexual abuse would be so readily accepted at face value if the stories were said about Jewish Rabbis.

I also have found serious flaws and omission of information regarding the Cardinal Bernardin

sexual abuse scandal

Steven Cook had made allegations of sexual abuse eight years ago but never mentioned Bernardin and claims he only "remembered"

Bernardin as one of the perpetrators. Cook says "therapy" had helped him "remember" the abuse. Cook has been denounced by the Chicago gay and lesbian community

VanButsel states that "only as we come out strongly opposed to child sexual abuse" will the myths and stereotypes of homosexuals molesting

children be put to rest.

I disagree quite strongly and unequivocally. Many gay and lesbian activists see a serious flaw in the "consenting adults" advocacy. Just at what age, what moment does a child become an adult? When are they old enough to ride all the rides in the amusement park?

When they turn 13 and business decide they can't come in at half price? When Nebraska Motor Vehicles gives them a driver's license at 16? When they have to register for the draft and register to vote at 18? Or when they are allowed

to drink alcohol at 21?

In Portugal the age of sexual consent is 12 and in the United Kingdom it is 21. See if you can get 10 people from ten completely different backgrounds to agree at what age a child becomes an adult.

You can see why the distinction between a pedophile and a homosexual is so easily blurred and why just condemning child sexual abuse will never end and the accusation that homosexuals are child molesters.

I wish reality was as simple as the arguments. The U.S. Senate voted 99-0 to cut funds to the United Nations by 50% until it disassociates itself from groups advocating "child molestation" such as the North American Man/Boy Love Association which is a member of the International Lesbian and Gay Association.

As this happens, just as 18 year olds get false ID to drink beer, so do 15 year old gay boys lie about their age to sleep with men. Gay youth don't just kill themselves because they are gay but often because their own actions leads someone else to be a criminal.

Lask why does the Times of the Heartland accept stories of priests molesting children at face value? Is it because it is anti-Catholic? I say yes to the point of making homosexuals look like child molesters.

I know the first question that comes to mind is who is The Gay Alliance. That is a rather long and complicated story so I will spare you the details and simplify the answer. The Gay Alliance is an off-shoot of an Organization called The Alliance at Lake Buena Vista. We are a group of gay, lesbian and bisexual employees of the Disney Company in Florida Due to recent changes in Disney Policy, any activity that is not strictly social is not permitted. In order to continue our goals we created an additional group. With that out the way I have two very important items to inform you of.

Item one is a major event coming up in June. Enclosed you will find copies of the press release. This event is being announced across the country by direct mail, like this, as well as display ads in

The Advocate

Item two is a request to help. As I mentioned in the first paragraph the Disney Corporation has changed guidelines for our original organization, which has been an organization with Walt Disney World for more than a year now. We believe that pressures from a Right Wing religious group. The American Family Association, headed by David E. Caton is partly responsible for the restriction of privileges we had just a few short months ago. 

When I called Jason Stuart at his Los Angeles apartment, he was busy getting ready to fly-to Chicago the next day. He was packed and trying to straighten out his closet and moving a filing cabinet while he left me on the phone, listening to the crash as the metal cabinet hit the floor.

This informal, relaxed atmosphere continued throughout the interview. It was like talking to an old friend who is very charming and very entertaining

Sharon — Tell me about Jason Stuart and this "Coming Out" Tour that you're on. How long have you been doing comedy?

Jason — Ten years. I started at the Comedy Store in 1983 in Hollywood

Sharon — I know that's when you came out on Geraldo on national TV last June, but when did

you come out personally?

Jason — I came out to my family in my early 20's, 10 or more years ago, so it wasn't a surprise to my family and friends. But it sure was to people in the business who didn't think I ever would do that. In Hollywood it's an unwritten law that you can be gay but not publicly. I'd been going to the parties and was involved politically for years, but I felt I had no sense of dignity in my life. I wanted to stand up and be counted. That's just one reason I came out. There are many reasons we come out. It doesn't happen like you see it in a TV movie. Another reason I came out was because of all of the gay and lesbian youth. When I came out there was no one.

Sharon - What affect has coming out had on

your career?

Jason — In terms of stand up comedy, it's great. And to Patrick Hasburg it doesn't matter at all. He just hired me for the third time to guest star on Seaquest. And Jim Valley put me on the John Larroquette Show. In the world of stand-up comedy, they're starting to realize that gay means money so the bookings are coming in heavy and thick.

Sharon — So how did you get to Omaha? Jason — Colleen Quinn, then the assistant manager of the Funny Bone, and I had always liked each other and when the previous manager out Colleen called me. Colleen is fabaious. She is manager there now. I was there in Omaha 5 years ago and I was the middle act and was beavily in the closet. Now I'm totally out and the headliner. I'm so excited and looking forward to meeting the gay and lesbian people of Omaha. I'm so excited I can't decide if I should kill myself or go bowling. So far this year, I played a gay guy on John Larroquette and a straight guy on Murder She Wrote. It's been an incredible year.

Sharon — Describe your style of comedy. Jason — I'm outrageous, topical, openly gay, I'm lunch with Merrill Streep and you. And my catch phrase in my act is "jealous?" For example, "I have all Barbra Streisand's records. Jealous? 1

would be."

Sharon — How does that go in straight clubs?
Jason — I started in the straight clubs. I work 6070% in straight clubs because there aren't that
many gay venues to work in. Lately the gay
community has been very good to me. I am
getting bookings from college groups for one day
shows and for Pride parades. And I've been
selected by Christopher Coopola to play in his
feature film, 'Loveland'.

Sharon - I bear you got picketed in Kansas City.

Was that Phelps?

Jason — Yes, it was. That made nationwide news. It was really strange. At first it was sort of funny, but then I had to go to the club. It was very disconcerting to have all those hate things around. You know, I didn't know the word faggot was in the Bible.

Sharon — It seems to be in his Bible.

Jason - I think so

Sharon — So, who will enjoy your performance? Jason — Gay people. Lesbian People, Jews, Blacks, Latinos, Straight couples.... I'm very hetero friendly and I'm gay so those are my brothers and sisters.

Sharon — I'm really impressed that someone like you with a career on the rise is coming to Omaha, Nebraska to perform. I want to encourage everyone to come see you. I'll call Colleen out at the Funny Bone to see if I can get some posters and flyers.

Jason — Before you go, I want to thank you for calling and for the interview and for helping get

Of course, with the Joselyn under construction, entering from the North Parking Lot was a bit treacherous. However, we found the back entrance and followed the signs, right past the bank of television screens where the guard monitors the security cameras, to the concert hall.

JoAnn Loulan is a petite blonde, with an attractive figure. She took center stage and a black clad sign language interpreter took her place to the side. No somer had I oulan started to speak than a woman came out of the audience with roses in her land. Loulan started to say how flattered she was when the woman took the microphone from her and presented the roses to the sign language interpreter for her service to the community. Loulan recovered quickly and joined in the applause for the interpreter, but I found it embarrassing. If Loulan also felt the embarrassing, it may have accounted for the pocky start to the performance, for it seemed to

take Loulan nearly 15 minutes to deliver material which got a response from the crowd. Throughout her performance Loulan made frequent references to concepts which may be a typical part of California lifestyle but seemed alien to her Nebraska audience. This, combined with the frequent use of the word "fuck", seemed to block the relationship between performer and most of the audience. Loulan comedy was at its best as she described attempts to "de-dyke" the house for a visit from family, and how to best retrieve the book which had been left out in view. However, the mood of the evening turned serious as Loulan began to talk about being diagnosed with breast cancer last spring. She was open and self disclosing as she discussed her feelings. Loulan challenged the audience to wake up because "Lesbians deserve to be on this planet!" She alleged that failure on the part of lesbians to do breast self-exams or to seek medical care is a form of self hatred that reflects our hatred of being a woman. The evening closed with Loulan reading a chapter from one of her books. Comedy, therapy, and activism combined for a show that lasted well over two hours



UNITY STRESSED AT PRIDE SUMMIT

But Group Falls Just Short of Goal

Gay and Lesbian Awareness (GALA) will be revied to plan and coordinate this year's pride celebrations. That was the decision reached by about lifty people, many of them representing other Lesbian and Gay organizations, gathered at Metropolitan Community Church, February 20.

That decision is being protested by Rodney Brown, who organized a new group, the Gay Pride Coordinating Committee, last month. But most of those at the meeting dismissed Brown as "uncooperative" and "confrontational."

The community summit was convened by the Gay and Lesbian Community Center (GLCC), with the support of Spirit of Hope MCC and Gay and Lesbian Services Network (GLSN). GLSN is the parent organization of GALA, which disbanded in December when the group learned that last year's event lost \$10,000 and still owed \$8,500. Several GLSN representatives were present at the meeting, but abstained from voting on the decision to revive GALA.

Other organizations represented at the meeting included: KC Rainbow Alliance of the Deaf, Willow Productions, Human Rights Project, Show Me Freedom Band, Heartland Men's Chorus, Transgenderists and Twenty-Plus Club (created during the meeting to recognize and coordinate all those present who have been working in the Gay and Lesbian community for twenty years or more).

"GLSN kept saying the group had the option of using another structure," said Kevin Chafin, a co-chair of GLCC. "But there was pretty much consensus among the group that GALA be revived." Chafin and others said utilizing an existing structure, such as GALA, made more sense than creating a new organization.

Lois Reborne, co-chair of GLCC, credited facilitators Jennifer Wilding and Collette Panchot with keeping the group on track and helping those with different viewpoints "synthesize. It's what made the meeting successful. It could have been a shouting match, but it never deteriorated," Reborne said.

There was some dissension, however. Many of the group's decisions during the meeting were opposed by Brown and an unidentified guest. Brown told the News-Telegraph that he is opposed to any association with GLSN and "the controversy", referring to last year's loss. He was also critical of the meeting.

"It was the stupidest thing I've ever been to," Brown said. "It was concocted by self-appointed

leaders.

Brown, who was formerly a volunteer with GALA and organized numerous fundraisers at area Lesbian and Gay bars, said he has already scheduled fundraisers for this year's event.

"I'm going to go ahead with what I'm doing," he said. "I'm going to go ahead and raise money

and see what happens

Others at the meeting said they took issue with Brown's unwillingness to cooperate with GALA, which has an existing structure and a system of accountability that Brown's group hasn't developed yet.

"I can raise the same questions," Brown said, referring to GALA's debt. But GLSN representatives said they have made changes to the way funds are accounted for that will reduce the likelihood of a repeat of last year's fiscal problems. Brown's group, GPCC, has no bylaws, no board of directors, no budget, and, like GALA, no money yet.

"I heard from him (Brown) that he was very much in favor of unity and cooperation, but when push came to shove, I didn't see him embrace that," said Reverend John Barbone, pastor of MCC, noting that all of those present, except Brown and the other man, supported the decision to revitalize GALA. "The group would have treated any person without that accountability the same way. It was nothing personal toward (Brown), but no one can represent the community and raise money without accountability.

No decisions were made to establish the date and location of pride events this year, though there was discussion about conflicts with the Gay Games and Stonewall 25, two large national celebrations taking place in New York this June, which is the traditional month for pride celebrations in Kansas City.

RAYMOND BURR'S KIN SUE TO BLOCK WILL

Santa Rosa, CA — Raymond Burr, the late veteran actor who immortalized the fictional lawyer, Perry Mason on television and in film, is about to return to court in what may be a nasty fight over the actor's estate between Burr's relatives and his longtime companion and business partner. Minerva Burr and her brother James have filed a lawsuit to contest their uncle's will which left his entire estate, estimated to be worth about \$32 million, to Robert Benevides, Burr's one-time valet who for nearly thirty years was also the actor's close companion, although Burr never publicly acknowledged being Gay.

Minerva Burr, a Southern California legal secretary, however, says that her uncle "was unduly influenced and persuaded" by Benevides to cut the ten surviving members of the family including herself and her brother James—out of Burr's 30-year-old niece also insisted that her uncle had another will that left part of his rich estate to various family members instead of cutting all his family out of the will. She says, however, that she has been unable to locate the document.

John Hopkins, who was Raymond Burr's and is now representing Benevides, said he is "dumbfounded" by the lawsuit. Hopkins said he prepared three wills for Burr during the past two decades, but none of them left any significant becmests to his relatives.

Hopkins also dismissed Minerva Burr's statements that Benevides had soured the actor to his family as "ridiculous."

"Raymond ran his life and his affairs," Hopkins said. "We all did what he said. If you knew Raymond, then you know that you were less likely to persuade him that you could Perry Mason." -News-Telegraph

Dear Ms. Radecic,

Thank you for your December 7, 1993 letter concerning the situation in Ovett, Mississippi. As are you. I am deeply troubled by the harassment and intimidation of Brenda and Wanda Henson, the lesbian owners of Camp Sister Spirit. The intolerance and bigotry demonstrated by some of the people of Ovett has no place in this country.

I have carefully considered your requests on behalf of the Hensons for assistance from the Department of Justice. As you are aware, Department officials met with representatives of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NXILTF) on January 12th to talk about the Department's ability to respond to the situation in

As was discussed at the January 12 meeting, federal junction is currently restricted by statute. At this time, sexual orientation is not a protected status under the federal civil rights law. Accordingly, we are unable to assist the Hensons through the enforcement of existing federal criminal civil rights laws concerning housing or federally-protected activities.

However, we recently learned from an NGLTF staff member that some federal criminal laws may have been violated through use of the federal postal system. The NGLTF staff member reported that an envelope addressed to the Hensons contaming a threatening letter was postmarked January 9, 1994 and mailed from Gulfport, Mississippi. Based on this development, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has been asked to conduct an investigation into this matter. If the evidence shews that there was a violation of federal criminal statutes, appropriate action will be taken.

In addition to initiating the FBI investigation, I have signed a taking order pursuant to my authority under 28 U.S.C.SS509-510 asking the Community Relations Service (C.RS) to intervene in the matter and to help mediate the dispute. While CRS is statutorily limited to assist only in conflicts arising from race, color and national origin issues, I consider the threat of violence in Ovett to be real and believe CRS's involvement is both appropriate and necessary to restore calm to the community.

Finally, I have asked my staff to schedule your requested meeting. Since the Ovett case is pending criminal investigation, it would not be appropriate for me to discuss the specifies of the case at this time. However, I look forward to the opportunity to talk with you about the general issues that the situation highlights.

i intend to keep fully appraised of the situation and ask that you continue to provide information to the Department. Thank you again for sharing your concerns with me. Together we can and will overcome the discrimination faced by the Hensons and others like them.

RANDY SHILTS, AIDS WRITER, DIES

Randy Shilts, perhaps the best-known AIDS with a first openly Gay reporter to write regularly for a major daily newspaper, died late February 16 at his home in the Russian River resort community of Guerneville, just north of San Francisco. He was 42 years old.

After writing for a while for The Advocate, Shifts was hired in 1981 by the San Francisco Chronicle, becoming the first openly Gay reporter to work at a major daily newspaper.

Shilts took on AIDS researchers, accusing them of looking for credit first and a cure second. He blasted the blood bank operators for thinking of profits above safety. And, yet, Shilts found himself at odds with much of San Francisco's politically powerful Lesbian and Gay community. In the early 1980's many activists denounced Shilts for advocating the closure of Gay bathhouses in the city to help prevent the further spread of AIDS.

In 1985 he finished his best-selling early history of the AIDS epidemic, And the Band Played On, on the very day he himself learned he had tested positive for HIV. He chose not to go public with his HIV status until last year when rumors of his deteriorating health became widespread, saying he fearing disclosing his infection would jeopardize his effectiveness as a

Last February, after suffering a collapsed lung and rumors began circulating about his health. Shilts confirmed that he in fact did have AIDS. An often controversial reporter and author, Shilts said he had kept his condition secret because "every Gay writer who tests positive end up being an AIDS activist, and I didn't want to end up being an activist."

Even though Shilts had AIDS himself, he always insisted his criticism of the Gay community's slow response to the epidemic was part of his journalistic responsibility.

"Here I write a book that assails the president, that takes on the most imminent researchers of our time, and essentially accuses the blood bankers of murder," Shilts said. "To do all that and then to not write about the failures within the Gay community too that would have been dishonest. And the only power that journalism has is when it tells the truth."

Shilts also authored The Mayor of Castro Street: The Life and Times of Harvey Milk about the assassinated Gay San Francisco supervisor, and more recently Conduct Unbecoming, about the history of Gays and Lesbians in the military

Dr. Paul Volberding, a leading AIDS researcher at the University of California in San Francisco, said of Shilts: "He was really the first reporter willing to speak out, willing to take on the editors to get his stories in the papers, and he alerted many people to the devastating epidemic we were going through."

In 1988 he was named outstanding author by the American Society of Journalists and Authors. In 1992-93 he was named journalist of the year by the Northern California chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists. And last year he received the lifetime achievement award from the Nation Lesbian and Gay Journalist Association.



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



NAP CLIENTS INSPIRE SCRIPT FOR UNL SHOW

The University of Nebraska - Lincoln's spring Theatrix season, directed by graduate students, was recently announced. Among the offerings is 'Old Friends: An Artistic Exploration of Nebraskans Living With HIV/ AIDS."

Mark Giesler, a doctoral student in theatre, conceived the project, which chronicles the stories of 11 people living with HIV/ AIDS in the Lincoln area. It will be performed April 14-17 in Room 301 of the Temple Building on the University of Nebraska-Lincoln campus.

"In my work as a NAP buddy, I was struck by the numerous clients who had moved away and felt a need to return to Nebraska. I began to wonder how easy that move was for them. The result was this project," Giesler said. The script is taken entirely from interviews conducted with NAP clients last summer.

"I was amazed at the need for these people to tell their stories," he said. "I would go with the intent of staying an hour and walk out three hours later

Giesler said the most exciting part of the process is yet to come. Beginning in mid-March, he and eight other Lincoln-area actors will begin rehearsing for the multimedia event, incorporating dance, yideo, and slides into a "reader's theater."

"I have cast eight actors who are willing to dive into these sometimes difficult issues," Giesler said. "That makes all the difference." Among the topics the show will address: The

Among the topics the show will address: The news media's response to the AIDS crisis, discrimination and women's issues.

Cast member Valorie Devoe said, "AIDS is something a lot of Nebraskans still don't talk about. One of my hopes for this project is that people will realize that we have to continue to talk about it."

"Old Friends" will open Thursday, April 14, and run nightly at 8 p.m. through April 16, with a 2 p.m. matinee Sunday, April 17. Tickets are \$2 and can only be purchased at the door.




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GRAMMY WINNER MELISSA ETHERIDGE TO APPEAR LIVE IN OMAHA

COMPANY: A REVIEW

The current Dundee Dinner Theater presentation of Stephen Sondhem's Company is a delightful walk through the early 70's and the pop art, pop psychology, and intense truth telling of the time. It is especially noteworthy because of some outstanding individual performances as well as highly effective set design and remarkable choreography.

In this work Sondheim presents a kaleidoscope of the relationships and interactions between men and women in love. The play is set in New York, and tells the story of Robert, just celebrating his 35th birthday, and the various relationships in his life. Robert, played by Richard Shackelford, is an observer of life, living for the moment as he contemplates the chaotic relationships of the five couples who attend his birthday party. Shackelford seems natural in the part, with a curious half-grin and a raised eyebrow that conveys his amusement. I especially enjoyed Shackelford's singing voice and found his vocal solos to be high points in the play.

The comic abilities of Dawn Buller-Kirke, who plays Sarah, are paired with those of Rob Hansen, who plays her husband Harry. Buller-Kirke walks away with the scene, first as she portrays a nearly-crazed food addict, and then as a middle aged student of karate who will not be bested in hand to hand combat with her husband.

Peggy Horrocks as Jenny does a good job of portraying a "square" housewife experimenting with pot. It's impossible to resist laughing along with her. Michael Deatherage, as her husband David, gives a classic portrayal of a flower child who has grown up and settled down.

Michelle Garrity as Susan and Bill Bohannon as Peter are limited by their roles. I suppose that at one time there was a shock value associated with couples such as this, one African -American, one soft-spoken Caucasian with a trace of a Southern accent. They portray a seemingly happy couple announcing that they are getting a divorce but continuing to live together. Doesn't seem all that unusual in the world we know today.

The high point of the show comes as Amy, played by Pamela Callahan, is preparing for her marriage to Paul, played by Gordon Krentz. Callahan portrays a crazy blonde — not crazy as in zany, but crazy as in certifiably insane. She is terrified of getting married to the man she has lived with for years, and goes through incredible contortions as she anticipates the approaching ceremony. Her performance is incredibly funny, with Krentz providing the perfect counterpoint. The rhythm of the performance catches you up so that when the mood turns deadly serious, you want to weep at the way she hurts the man who loves her.

The performance of Michael Taylor-Stewart as Larry is one of his best. He maintains his character well as he portrays an aging disco king who truly loves and accepts his "rich bitch" wife. While the costuming throughout the play is wonderful, the irridescent pink leisure suit he wears in the final scene is a superb touch. Stephanie Davis does an excellent job as the cynical, hard-drinking Joanne. Davis' voice does not show to its best advantage in the first act, but when she takes center stage to perform The Ladies Who Lunch she comes close to blowing the roof off the theater.

Intertwined throughout the play are glimpses of Robert's relationships with three very different women. Kathy, played by dancer Andrea Lang, abandons Robert when she decides to marry. Marta, played by Libby DeLaune, is constantly philosophizing on the essence of New York. DeLaune's vocal solo uses her voice to its full advantage, but I remember more clearly her riveting green eyes than I do the song she sang. Lang and DeLaune both seem completely natural as they convey the free spirit image of the early

April, played by Cindy Rismiller, is a not very bright stewardess who succumbs to Robert's chaims for the one bedroom seene. The scene is completely "G" rated, with the actors crouching under the spread on the bed while Andrea Lang dances around them. In fact, this scene is probably the most disappointing in the play. There does not seem to be any aftermpt to simulate a passionate encounter, but neither do the performers face into the set and allow your concentration to be directed to the dancer and the superb choreography.

All in all, Carolyn Rutherford has directed an excellent production that is well worth seeing. Eric Selk's set design does wonders to utilize every inch of the small stage. When good set design is combined with the choreography of Michal Simpson the result is that all 14 people can move freely on stage for the production numbers.

Of course, this is a dinner theater, so the performance can be paired with a meal calered from The Market Basket. UN-L SHELVES HEALTH BENEFITS FOR SAME SEX PARTNERS

UN-L has tabled a proposal to offer health benefits to same-sex partners of faculty and staff. The Omaha World-Heard recently quoted Nancy Mitchell, head of the Employee Benefits Committee for the UN-L as saying "If's an issue that is highly emotional. Before we come to some conclusions I think we need a lot more studying." The Committee on Lesbian and Gay Concerns has urged the Academic Senate to push for benefits to domestic partners, contending that failure to do so is a form of discrimination. Ms. Mitchelf stated that it was not a moral issue, but rather one regarding how broadly the proposal should be drafted. She stated that it didn't make sense to float the idea prematurely and attract protests from within and outside the University.

This is their office." He went on to say that he would not ask about sexual preference in an interview, "But if it was openly admitted by the individual, I probably wouldn't hire him or her."

Four other Nebraska and western Iowa congressmen did agree to sign the petition circulated by the Human Rights Campaign Fund. They are: Doug Bereuter, R-Neb.; Peter Hoagland, D-Neb.; Neal Smith, D-Iowa; and Fred Grandy, R-Iowa.

Representative Jim Ross Lightfoot, R-lowa, did not sign the petition, stating be was never asked to sign it.

So far 227 members of the House of Representatives have signed the petition which states "The sexual orientation of an individual is not a consideration in the hiring, promoting or terminating of an employee in my congressional office."


