I am a native Nebraskan who now lives in the city of Atlanta, Georgia. I am writing to ask for some help. I am a member of various organizations throughout the metro Atlanta area. They include PFLAG, Human Rights Campaign Fund, Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual Veterans of America (which I am the president of), and Olympics Out Of Cobb Coalition. As you probably know, Cobb County commissioners passed an anti-gay resolution last summer condemning the gay lifestyle. Cobb County is the county north of Atlanta. Now — Atlanta Committee on Olympic Games (ACOG) wants to put the volleyball venue in Cobb County during the 1996 Summer Games in Atlanta. We feel that it should not be there until the resolution is rescinded. What I am asking of you is could you send a support letter to Olympics Out Of Cobb (OOOC) showing that Nebraska is behind us all the way. We are already getting support from other organizations across the United States plus abroad including royalty. Also — I am going to contact the Citizens for Equal Protection in Omaha. I will tell you about myself and what I do also. I grew up in Grand Island and graduated in 1986 from Grand Island Senior High. I am a veteran of Desert Storm, but never went over. I was discharged from the Army for being HIV positive, which I am now full-blown AIDS as I have had Pneumocystis pneumonia. I am still going strong and I take care of myself. I guess I stay out of trouble with all the organizations I am involved in. As I noted above I was just elected president of the gay vets in the Atlanta area. We are merely a social group, but we are trying very hard to do things within the Atlanta area. We are going to join the local American Legion, help AIDS patients at the VA hospital as well as the other major hospitals in the Atlanta area, help fellow veterans who have been discharged for homosexuality, and continue to help out in the gay community.

I want to commend you on your 10th anniversary of *NVN*. I am going to take a copy home with me and will send money for a one year subscription before the 10th of next month.

Again thank you for taking the time to read and I hope you can respond in any way. The letter can be really simple and just say that we support the cause, etc.... I may want you to also mention it in the *NVN* and maybe we can get support from other organizations in Nebraska, especially the Lincoln-Omaha area. Thank you Sharon! I also want to know if you have a phone number in case I need to talk to you personally. If I can be of any help to you — let me know, and I will do my best to do the same.

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BEVERLY BARBO NEEDS HELP TO GO TO ENGLAND

Dear Friends,

Asking for money is not something I do well. However, I have the opportunity to speak in Birmingham, England at the First International Compassionate Friends Conference, to be held August 5-9, 1994, if I can raise enough money to attend. (Compassionate Friends is a support group for parents who have lost children in any manner. There are chapters worldwide, but they have no funds.) The organizers in England told me that they really haven't found a way to reach out to families who have experienced an AIDS death and that is what they want me to address.

My son, Tim, died over 7 years ago and Dave and I were one of the first families in Kansas to come screaming out of the closet. Since then I have been speaking about AIDS, homophobia, gender bias and how all forms of discrimination lead our children into risk behavior for acceptance at any cost. We have also been working with families helping them work through their anger and grief individually, through our own Share and Care support group, Compassionate Friends and P-Flag.

Many of you have let me know how much my book, *The Walking Wounded*, (story of Tim's life and death, Tim's and Tom's relationship and finally Tom's death), has contributed to your healing. Those of you who have attended my workshops and seminars seem to have found them helpful, so now I hope to expand my ministry a little farther.

I believe that if families can learn to confront their prejudices, understand their fear and address their losses honestly it will enable them to get through the garbage and begin healing their grief. Parents, being open and honest about an AIDS death, will help society face reality and overcome discrimination and fear.

If you feel this is something you could support and contribute to, any amount would be appreciated. If you belong to or know of any group, club, or organization that might be interested in sponsorship, please let me know.

HOMOSEXUAL PRO-LIFERS JOIN D.C. MARCH

Twelve members of Pro-Life Alliance of Gays and Lesbians (PLAGAL) - one woman and eleven men - braved the cold and ice on January 21, to join 50,000 other pro-life activists in the Twentieth Annual March for Life commemorating the announcement of *Roe v Wade* January 22, 1973. Over half had not marched under PLAGAL banner previously, and for a couple it was their first pro-life function. This was PLAGAL's fourth year participating in the march.

The PLAGAL members came from Boston, D.C., Philadelphia, and central Pennsylvania. Additionally, a twenty year-old homosexual man who was unaware of support as a pro-life homosexual man, expecting to be the only one - but he wasn't. Toward the end of the rally, he discovered PLAGAL and joined.

PLAGAL met at the statue of Benjamin Franklin in front of the Old Post Office, and then proceeded to the Ellipse for the March of Life Rally. There they raised their banner of subtle shades of purple and neon pink, and a triangle surmounted with the image of an unborn child. At the rally, speakers refrained from remarks even possibly viewed as "homophobic" by PLAGAL participation.

"It was a distinct and welcome improvement over some past years," said one PLAGAL member. "Even Congressman Bob Dornan was positive, upbeat, and focused on saving babies, not fighting homosexuals."

PLAGAL distributed a new brochure, *An Open Letter to the Pro-Life Movement* by PLAGAL activist Chuck Volz of Philadelphia. Volz, an attorney long active in the pro-life movement who has reported several arrests in rescues at abortion clinics, is the adoptive father of two and the president of a crisis pregnancy clinic in Philadelphia.

Volz argued that the pro-life movement must "remember that the mission - the only mission - of the pro-life movement is to save the lives of the unborn and rescue their mothers from a brutal victimization."

"Indeed, boiled down to basics, the message of the Lesbian and Gay community and the Pro-Life movement is the same. All human life deserved protection and respect simply because it is human," said the pamphlet.

"It is a simple message, but nonetheless profound," Volz continued. "indeed, the growing scientific evidence that homosexuality is genetic may confront both anti-gay pro-lifers and pro-abortion Lesbians and Gays with a similar dilemma: Whatever will those myopic thinkers do when confronted with abortion that are being done because the unborn child has been determined to be homosexual?"

Other pro-lifers at the rally were generally friendly and encouraging, asking for "Open Letter" brochures and shaking hands.

PLAGAL debated with several marchers who tried to convince them to abandon their homosexual ways. Because the debaters were motivated by - in PLAGAL's opinion "somewhat misguided" - goodwill, the exchange uniformly ended without rancor. Many marchers requested brochures for homosexual siblings and friends.

Concerned Women for America, in the past openly hostile to many homosexual initiatives, was reported in the D.C. media to be "proud to work with pro-life homosexuals."

Jane Parshall, assistant to the president of CWA stated, "We would welcome them with open arms. If the singular cause is pro-life, we'd march anytime, anywhere with them."

GAY PRO-LIFERS GET REACTIONS

Blind-sided: by Cathy Ramey

Under enormous pressure to be part of the political and social mainstream - to be at peace with all men as far as it is possible - sometimes we find ourselves with a dilemma that seems too cumbersome to untangle. Take for example the presence of homosexual activists who joined in a pro-life march in January.

Immediately one's mind brings up old images of ACT-UP or Young Anarchists activists who are sincere in their desire to stand against abortion. Memory focuses on outrageous and vulgar chanting surrounding sexual preference and that all of us of a pro-life persuasion "ought to have been aborted". Pictures that we have seen of angry - shouting - earning piercing unusual parts of the body - demonstrators flash before our eyes. But this is not a fair description of the homosexual activists, twelve in all, at this particular march. At this gathering, Nellie Gray's March for Life, they are conservative in appearance, quiet and almost lost in the crowd of fifty-thousand. They carry a large banner with their movement's symbol - a pink triangle - and they are pro-life.

So, one is tempted to say, "What's the problem? Let them march." But there really is much more that needs to be said in light of the fact that their willful, continual, and intentional sin is a natural barrier that if abridged makes for nothing more than an unholy alliance.

First though, we need a reference point. Paul's second letter to the Corinthians (6:14) says "Do not be yoked together with unbelievers." The next several lines emphasize a contrast between those who habitually indulge in sin and those who reject it; those who walk in the light, and those who stumble along in the dark. "Be separate, says the Lord." In Ephesians (5:5-7) he writes again about the issue of unholy alliances and says, "Let no one deceive you with empty words, for because of such things God's wrath comes on those who are disobedient. Therefore do not be partners with them." Like the Israelites of old, we are warned not to ally ourselves with the ungodly; not to increase our numbers, not to improve our image with the world, and not to express a version of "love" that embraces the sinner but never calls them toward accountability over their sin.

All of this, you might think, has little to do with the March for Life. After all, are we to refuse to let them join in a public protest gathering such as the annual event in question? The answer is "No." The problem is not that they joined a march. The problem is that when they joined the march, in the words of a Concerned Women of America (CWA) spokeswoman, we welcomed them "with open arms", choosing to believe that their "singular cause is pro-life." She proceeds to say, "We'd march anytime, anywhere with them."

Would we? Would we "welcome with open arms" members of NAMBLA (National Man-Boy Love Association) who espouse pedophilia? How about serial murderers of a sort other than abortionists - men and women who are more discriminating in their choice of victim and find killing the unborn an affront; people willing to step out and condemn abortion with us as long as we agree not to make them too uncomfortable over their own ritualized and significant perversions. Would we subtly put our imprimatur upon any other group of people who willingly promote their sin while joining our cause?

Admittedly, not all at the March for Life were so easily convinced that Homosexuals on Parade are to be embraced as confederates (even if the cause is pro-life). But some of us were blindsided. For those of us who felt an uncertain

conflict, it is worth examining their presence with more depth. A spokesman for PLAGAL, Charles Volz, was quoted in *Life Advocate* (March '94) as having said about abortion that "It's a human rights issue. The value of all life is sacred."

We concur. Offering unborn children equal protection under the law is a "human rights issue" because all human life has an intrinsic, God-given value. We depart only by saying that all life (innocent and guilty) are not to be afforded the same defense. God affords a higher level of protection to be given to innocent persons than to the unjust aggressor, the willfully sinful, and those who stubbornly rebel against Him. Volz goes on to say that "It's an ethical issue to qualify the value of life; gay, lesbian or unborn. They are all just different fronts of the same issue."

Wrong, Charles!

It is here that he exposes the agenda that we ought to be wary of. The tiny group has a dual agenda that is not compatible with ours. They are feeding off the sympathy rightfully due an innocent child murdered by abortion. They hope to get us to see them as we see the unborn — struggling on a 'different front of the same issue' — in need of our sympathy and protection.

As we continue on in the fight to liberate the unborn, let us not compromise our ranks by gleefully embracing just any ally. Yes, let them march in our public events, but let us be wary not to let them promote their sin-cause among us under the guise of having found common ground. In the end, it is an effort to gain respectability for the sodomite cause that is repeatedly condemned along with the killing the innocent in Scripture.

But no one moved to shrug into a coat or "excuse-me" down the row to the this-way-out signs. They sat.

And finally, she pushed the curtain aside and faced them, the fans who didn't want to depart. Who wouldn't go till everything was final. Finished. Over and done. And, maybe, not even then, honestly, given the chance. Maybe if they stayed, someone would start the show all over again. No one wanted to break the spell.

Then she parted the curtain for the final call facing them where they sat, still, and wanted more and waited.

So she stood before them and thanked them for coming. In her chenille bathrobe and greasepaint and laughing condescension that was more than a trademark. An expectation. Fulfilled for them. And she, staring and shaking her head in mock disbelief, breaking the tension, said "What are you people still *doing* here? We're all finished. GO HOME!"

They'd called a town meeting for seven o'clock. It was to decide what it was they were going to do now.

They had come together in committee in crisis. It was a hard birth, born of necessity and

attack. The fundies had been more than organizing, they'd been menacing. Proposing an actual amendment that had every one quaking in the balance. What would they do? What *would* we do?

What they did was everything they could to stop it. After an impossibly slow start, with a single-minded purpose, they became the protection committee of record, the action organization of note, the politically correctly formulated arm movement designed to slash and stop the threat.

They raise funds and printed T-shirts, and met centrally. They sent home delegates who'd come on no particular organization's orders to go back home and organize the country committees into order and action should it become necessary.

They held speakers trainings that had the tongue-tied making proclamations by the end. And they imported Oregonians. And Coloradists. For inspiration. And lesson plans.

You'd have been amazed.

Then an amazing thing happened. We won.

Oh, not by the weight of our picket signs.

Not even by the rightness of our cause. Or the wrong-headed-ness of theirs. We won because of the other side's carelessness. And our due diligence in pointing out to powers that be that they'd got the wording wrong. That the purpose wasn't stated accurately. That the petition to turn our lives back into felonies didn't stand up in judicial standards. And incidentally, that they didn't have the signatures to put our affections up for a vote.

The fundies were told to go home. Not just us, but by Justices. Who agreed with all our arguments on human rights and wrongs, and found a way to tell them that they were not the majority our terror had crafted them into.

Oh, sure, some said it wasn't a clear cut victory. They complained bitterly that the judgment only proclaimed, "Clerical Error!" and not conspicuous conquest. But the reality is that a vanquish is a victory for the prevailing side, and for a change, we prevailed.

EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY ACT CLOSER TO INTRODUCTION!

Senator Edward Kennedy and Representatives Gerry Studds and Barney Frank and a number of their colleagues plan to introduce in the United States Senate and House of Representatives legislation which would outlaw employment discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation. The Human Rights Campaign Fund has been working with our coalition partners for some time to develop viable federal anti-discrimination legislation. We have chosen to move employment legislation in Congress now because of recent favorable indicators.

Professional polling and focus groups, commissioned by HRCF, indicate that Americans believe that people should not be fired or discriminated against for being gay. A *Newsweek* poll released in February reported that "74% of all Americans favor protecting gays from job discrimination." Furthermore, in response to HRCF's request, 71 Senators and 235 Representatives have indicated that sexual orientation is not a consideration in the hiring, promoting, or termination of an employee in their Congressional office. Finally, encouraged by President Clinton's White House, several federal agencies have issued policies prohibiting job discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation.

HRCF is working with members of Congress and other organizations to arrange hearings on this bill and to advance it through Congress, but we need your support to ensure success.

We need you to communicate to Members of Congress the reality of job discrimination against lesbians, gay men, and bisexuals, and the importance of eliminating it through federal legislation. And since Members of Congress need the support of their constituents, you must let them know that you support their efforts to pass an Equal Employment Opportunity Act.

Please take the time to write Members of Congress to relate your personal experiences with anti-gay discrimination and to urge their support for Congressional action. Feel free to draw from the sample letter enclosed. Then send us a copy of your letter with your response form to HRCF, PO Box 1396, Box 1396, Washington, DC 20013.

Finally consider taking additional steps to build support for this legislation by meeting with your Member during upcoming recesses and gathering endorsements for the bill.

According to a professional poll commissioned by the Human Rights Campaign Fund, 76% of Americans believe that people should not be fired or discriminated against in employment because of their sexual orientation. Yet, every day, many hardworking, patriotic Americans are.

Cheryl Summerville was fired from Cracker Barrel Old Country Store, Inc. despite her exemplary record because she objected to the firing of a fellow employee for being gay. Her separation notice read "This employee is being terminated due to violation of company policy. The employee is gay." Cracker Barrel has fired over a dozen people under this policy.

Discrimination based on prejudice hurts our economy and spirit, and violates the fundamental American values of fairness and equality. Please stand up to fear and ignorance by supporting the prohibition of discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation. I would appreciate your thoughts on this matter. Thank you.

For the last five years, the Clearinghouse has been a source for CDC-approved materials. The new document delivery service will give access to additional scientific, educational, and other HIV/AIDS-related materials.

Through the Document Delivery Service, you can:

- Order photocopies of materials from the Clearinghouse's Educational Material Database (you will not need to contact several publishers to order the items you want.)

- See copies of entire documents so you do not have to depend on abstracts to select items for particular audiences.

- Get copies of materials that are no longer available from the original publishers.

The cost is \$5.00 per document up to two pages, and \$.05 per page for each additional page in the document.

Items available from the Document Delivery Service include:

- Training manuals to help prepare and present HIV/AIDS information to different audiences.

- Brochures and educational materials for the general public and selected target populations.

- Fact sheets, reports, information packages, wallet cards, and other resources for education and prevention programs.

INTERFERON GAMMA BOOSTS ABILITY TO FIGHT MYCOBACTERIA

Interferon gamma helped fight non-tuberculous mycobacterial infections in patients who did not respond to conventional therapies, according to research reported in the May 12 issue of *The New England Journal of Medicine* by scientists from the U. S. National Institutes of Health (NIH).

Mycobacteria are a diverse family of disease-causing organisms including some that cause tuberculosis. Non-tuberculous mycobacteria occur in an environment and usually affect up to 40 percent of people infected with HIV.

The study involved seven patients who were not HIV infected and had severe non-tuberculous mycobacterial infection of at least two organ systems. Six of the patients had MAC.

The patients had received the maximum tolerated conventional treatment for at least four months and had become drug-resistant before enrolling in the current study. Treated with interferon gamma, all patients rapidly improved and many of their symptoms abated.

"Laboratory and animal studies have suggested that interferon gamma, a protein normally secreted by the immune system's T-cells, plays an important role in containing and clearing mycobacterial infections in the body," says Steven M. Holland, M.D., who reported the study. "This leads us to conclude that the protein may someday be used in the treatment of other mycobacterial infections, including tuberculosis."

SPECIAL RIGHTS, EQUAL RIGHTS, GAY RIGHTS?

This year, referendum initiatives directed against gay civil rights protection are slated in eight states — Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Nevada, Arizona, Missouri, Michigan, and Florida. Last year, nineteen cities and counties across the nation had such referendums. Gays lost all of them. The organization which launched Cincinnati's referendum named itself "Equal Rights, Not Special Rights," while the gay side called its organization "Equality Cincinnati." Both sides claimed equality as their principle. Clearly America is confused about what equality is.

The "no special rights" side seems to take equality to mean equal opportunity or identical access to whatever government is offering by way of privileges and possessions. In consequence, these people suppose that any legislation that gives something to a specified group violates equality. And, indeed, equality understood as equal opportunity is quite entrenched in America's folk rhetoric of justice. For example, the chief federal agency for the enforcement of the 1964 Civil Rights Act is called the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

Still, this sense of equality does not capture all or even the core of what equality is. Equality is at heart a principle of non-degradation. It asserts that people are not to be held in lesser regard, as morally lesser beings, independently of their actions. Consider the sixteen state antimiscegenation laws which the Supreme Court struck down in 1967. Formally they treated blacks and whites the same, for they denied each group identical access — to each other. Blacks couldn't marry whites; whites couldn't marry blacks. What then was the inequality in antimiscegenation laws? They were inequitable not

because they denied equality of opportunity to blacks, but because they were part of a system that holds blacks in morally lesser regard independently of what they individually do; such laws viewed blacks as dirty, loathsome, abject.

Or again, consider the nation's paradigmatically racist joke: "What do you call a black millionaire physicist who's just won the Nobel Prize?" The answer is the sponsee, usually shouted, "nigger." Notice that the person in the joke has availed himself of opportunity as fully as anyone could. The joke's butt could not launch a suit against someone claiming that he has been denied access to some freedom, opportunity, or possession — for he has it all. Rather the joke's belittling fun presumes that the physicist's disesteem is entirely a matter of a perceived status having nothing to do with his actions. In the joke's moral system, which is to say America's popular morality, this person could never be equal no matter what he did. Equality, then, in this instance, is a principle of non-degradation, and only secondarily, if at all, a principle about similarity of access.

People marching under the banner "no special rights" are then understandably not profoundly confused about equality. It is true that equality is a right which everyone has, for everyone has a right not to be treated as a morally lesser being. Yet, given this understanding of equality, both assertions and violations of it will always make reference to the specific treatment of some group's members, will turn on whether they are socially viewed as degraded independently of any action that makes them members of the group. Justice then requires looking to the specifics of history and social custom, not to generic human nature, in order to determine whether some law, policy, or practice promotes or violates equality.

Have gays as a group historically been treated as less than full human beings, as loathsome, abject beings? Yes is the answer offered by society's record of slang, jokes, family policy, religious teachings, medical history, and symbolic legislation (like military policy and unenforced sodomy laws). Therefore constitutional equal protection should guard gays from degrading treatments by governments. Similarly, gay civil rights legislation promotes rather than destroys equality since it works to end the humiliation, degradation, and insult caused by discrimination in housing, employment, and public accommodations. Such laws then are not special treatments in any way that is morally objectionable. To the contrary, they are the historical and socially specific treatments which equality as a general principle of non-degradation requires.

Though now targeted just as gays, the rhetoric of "no special rights" is a ploy to attack all civil rights legislation which specifies any group as protected. It masks a mentality of "us versus them" and succeeds only a stratagem of "divide and conquer." Therefore, other minorities currently protected by law — blacks, hispanics, women, Baptists, Catholics, Mormons, jews, the disabled — all need to be particularly mindful that gay rights do not steal anything from them, but rather help solidify the very principle of equality in virtue of which they have these rights in the first place.

The congregation approved a proposal by the Board of Directors to have the building become smoke-free beginning Sept. 1. This "smoke-free" policy would be in effect for all meetings, whether official church functions or groups renting the building.

Members also voted a proposal to spend up to \$6,000 for an architect or draftsperson's two-part proposal to make the building handicap accessible and expand the sanctuary area. An amendment requested that any proposal include cost estimates, as well as information as to how our current heating, cooling and roofing would fit in with this expansion.



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FIGHT THE RIGHT

Until recently, the gay rights movement locale has been viewed as coastal in nature. Now, the Heartland of America is home for an innovative nonprofit organization in Dallas, Texas — Alliance for Progress. Gay rights advocates, Roger Davis, a Los Angeles businessman, John Etienne Mourot, a Dallas political consultant and entertainment attorney, and Christopher Parman, an Oklahoma City political advertising consultant, have combined their talents to promote a positive mainstream image of gay and lesbian lives through television advertising and public education forums.

"The gay rights movement must inevitably advocate its message not only through Congressional lobbying efforts, as other gay rights groups currently do, but also through voter awareness campaigns. The most effective means of lobbying voters is through televised commercials," Parman asserted. "We will air 30-second commercials which emphasize the similarities between gay/lesbian and heterosexual lives and values. The spots will be telecast both nationwide and to locally targeted areas, much like public service announcements," he explained. Alliance For Progress will film its first commercial, entitled Sunday Morning, this summer and air it nationally this fall. The organizers said that Sunday Morning demonstrates how the majority of gays and lesbians actually spend their Sundays like most Americans, such as going to church, eating at a restaurant, recreating at a park, shopping at the malls, and spending time at home with the family.

"Our goal," Mourot stated, "is to show the heterosexual audience that gays and lesbians are normal everyday people who engage in normal everyday activities; the difference being that they live with, and love, a same gender partner. If we can alleviate some of the public's fear-induced stereotypes of gays and lesbians, anti-discriminatory legislation will no longer be a threat that must be fought at every level of our political system and in our courts. By educating the public to the realities of gay life, we can replace an atmosphere of fear and hate with one of understanding. Everyone has the right to live in peace, out of the closet."

While the advertising campaign has been carefully planned, Alliance For Progress needs the financial support of the gay and lesbian community to effectively implement it. Our philosophy is simple. When we present our community in a positive manner to the "Heartland" and change its beliefs, then our community's battles will be over and the war won."

Joan & Christy: Who are they?

Joan first caught the performance bug in the cultural mecca of Vinita, Oklahoma where she appeared as the sugar plum fairy in the kindergarten production of *The Nutcracker's Suite*. A self-taught folksinger, she conducted one-woman hootenannies for civic, Camp Fire, and school groups during her junior high and high school years in the 1960s. Armed with a psychology degree from the University of Kansas and a set of hand tools, she set off for a career in housing rehabilitation. For several years in the 80s, she traveled throughout the Midwest as a member of a women's acoustic string band, *Rosy's Bar & Grill*. After working for 8 years as an independent remodeling contractor, she now works as a housing inspector for HUD in order to support her music habit.

Christy was first inspired to develop her musical talents during summers at Girl Scout camp spent 'singing around the campfire' and during winters spent freezing her lips to the mouthpiece of her cornet and french horn in elementary and high school band. Also a self-taught folksinger, she continued to play and sing for friends, for fun, and for an occasional coffee house. After graduating from the University of Idaho with a degree in zoology, she landed, for awhile, in Manhattan, Kansas seeking zoological specimens. The search led eventually to Kansas City where she earned a degree in nursing from the University of Kansas. She is currently working in the intensive care unit of a children's hospital in order to support her music habit.

Following parallel themes in their lives, each, in separate communities, helped to found women's choruses. Christy started, directed, and

accompanied Manhattan's first women's chorus, *Women of the Heartlands: Singing Our Lives*. Joan was a founding member and accompanist of the *Kansas City Women's Chorus*. They met when Christy moved to KC and joined that chorus where both are currently co-directors, music arrangers, accompanists and singers.

Christy and Joan, *The Neon Girls*, began making music as a duo in the spring of 1987. With the encouragement of friends, they began performing at benefits and women's gatherings. They have since opened concerts for Dredre McCalla, Ferron, Alix Dobkin and Judy Small. Their first road trip was to Parsons, Kansas to perform at the Kansas State NOW Conference. They have since traveled to Des Moines, Iowa to perform at a coffee house, to Mississippi for the 3rd Annual Gulf Coast Women's Festival, and to Roman Nose State Park in Oklahoma to perform at a Women's Retreat sponsored by Herland Sister Resources. Besides benefits, rallies and birthday parties at home, they have also presented full concerts in Kansas City through Willow Productions, Cross Currents and Lavendar Umbrella. In October of 1992, they released their first audio recording, *The Neon Girls - Defying Gravity*. They currently are trying to get out more, so they can become world renowned performers, quit their jobs, and support their music habits with their music.

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MAINSTREAM PRESENTS "HOW TO FIGHT POLITICAL EXTREMISM"

The Nebraska Mainstream Committee presented an all-day workshop, "How to Fight Political Extremism In The Heartland" on Saturday, June 11. About 50 people attended.

J. Eileen Durgin-Clinchard of Mainstream welcomed the group and explained that Mainstream is a coalition of member organizations with a threefold mission: coalition, communication and coordination. Coalition as a catalyst to bring together diverse groups with a common thread...they have been under attack by the radical right, or are potentially under such attack. Communication by means of a monthly newsletter which will provide information based on the research the Mainstream Committee has done, information sharing across organizations, and educational material relating to being active in the democratic process. Coordination of the unique and common interests of the member organizations, recognizing that there is room for divergent interests, to help educate the public, news media, and government officials about efforts of the extremist groups to subvert an open and fair political process.

Sue Ellen Wall, director of Lincoln/Lancaster Commission for the Status of Women, was the first speaker. Sue talked about pro-choice and how it is important that women continue to have a choice. She stated that she believes the first culprit is the men who run the Roman Catholic Church. She believes that men are afraid for women to become totally free and independent for fear of being treated the same way that men treat women today. She challenged the men in the group to take to task men who beat their wives, abandon their children and continue to keep women pregnant as a means of keeping the power. She said men need to give up some of their power and privilege. She also said that we all must name the behaviors and hold media responsible for covering news in an even-handed way. Those organization who are 501 (C)(3), as many of the radical right are, should stay out of politics or have that tax status taken away. She said we

should all be involved in school board meetings and hold the schools accountable to have sex education and human growth classes.

Following Sue was Jeff Wilson who challenged the group to understand that there is nothing "special" about wanting to have housing, employment and same benefits. Jeff said the radical right is using gay/lesbian issues as an inroad to dominate other subcultures and it is potentially possible for their agenda to expand to nearly any minority status person. This is known as "fencing off" and is treatment as non-people.

David Moshman, president of the Board of Nebraska Civil Liberties Union spoke next about the rights of all people even those we disagree with. His main point was consistency in all cases.

Following David was Sharon Rowe, Pro-choice activist involved with Nebraska Republicans for Choice. Sharon was a delegate to the Republican meeting and she stated we need to be active and get ourselves selected to attend these caucuses as a way to make certain that our voices are heard. It is not difficult, often only a call to ask for the form and then returning it.

The last speaker was Jody Ripper from Iowa, founder of Iowans for Democracy, a coalition of over sixty organizations concerned with activities of the radical right. Ms. Ripper has spent several years conducting research on social and political movements with focus on the New Right, studying both secular and religious agendas. She talked about Pat Buchanan and other right wing fundamentalists who make several billion dollars a year and have large numbers of followers.

We must be prepared to fight extremists. They are getting elected into our school boards, church boards and anywhere they can get a foothold. Often their agenda is not open, they manage to get elected and show their real agenda.

Also discussed was an incident at an Omaha Public School, which resulted in a school board meeting, an overwhelming vote, to put "sexual orientation" on the list of the **No Harassment** code of conduct. For a 16 year old boy, to take this matter to the school board took a lot of courage. The best part was, the boy's parents, were right there beside him, in full support. Way to go!

Following the business meeting, discussing the Brunch and the school issue, a video was shown. Entitled *Before Stonewall* it was a long video, but a doggone good one. It gave a rundown on G/L's and their lives, before Stonewall. Even though we know there are no G/L's in the military, it did cover G/L's in WWII and quite a good coverage. This is an excellent video. If you get a chance to see it, by all means do.

Let's see more good turn outs like this one. Especially from the G/L community. If Lincoln can do so, why not Omaha? So come on, Guys and Gals, let get out there and support PFlag. They do us. Can we G/L's do no less?

PS - *The Omaha School Board met in session over the issue. The first session vote was 11-0, in favor of adding "sexual orientation" to the "No Harassment" rules.*

This addition is now "policy", all because a 16 year old boy, and with the loving and full support of his parents, who were beside him all the way.

HELIOOTHERAPY

Heliotherapy is a chiropractic treatment used for muscular stimulation and relaxation.

Heliotherapy is the only known cure for Seasonal Affective Disorder, a cyclic mood disorder caused by sun light deprivation during fall and winter months.

Currently, AIDS research clinics use heliotherapy as an effective tool for boosting the immune system.

Heliotherapy used in hospital operating rooms reduces the bacteria count by as much as 50%. As a result, patients have been found to recover faster and have fewer post-operative infections.

Scientists at the Baylor University Medical Center have successfully used heliotherapy to destroy the AIDS virus and other infectious diseases and are developing heliotherapy to decontaminate blood for transfusion.

Heliotherapy is practiced in Cancer Research Institutes for successful DNA repair. Within hours of light treatments, the cancer cells begin to die, leaving the normal tissue unharmed. 70% to

80% of the tumors treated responded positively after just one treatment.

Heliotherapy is used as an effective tool for irradiating the blood of cancer patients.

The maternity wards of most major hospitals use heliotherapy for the treatment of hyperbilirubinemia (neonatal jaundice), a condition found in over 60% of prematurely born infants.

While fully recognizing that long term overexposure to the sun and burning can result in skin cancer, premature aging and wrinkling in some cases, the science of heliotherapy supports that the sun also offers many benefits.

IN SUPPORT OF... GLAGN

As a person who has lived in outstate Nebraska all of my life, it has been difficult to fully appreciate, let alone come to grips, my sexuality.

This is not to say that those who live in more urban areas have it easy in this department but the opportunities to become more aware of the dynamics of this are, naturally, fewer here than what would be found in a metropolitan area. And, of course, being gay or lesbian and living in a highly straight oriented society, brings with it a set of references and built-in perspectives that can be difficult to overcome.

That is why I am so thankful for group like GLAGN. When I first saw it listed in the resource guide of another publication I couldn't believe it! For so many years I was pretty much convinced that I was alone or nearly so in this area and that anyone who was gay or lesbian had long since moved out of the country or to somewhere like San Francisco! Slowly, I began to realize that there were many of us around only it was all so deeply closeted that the very idea of a group where issues of mutual interest could be discussed was beyond reality!

And now there are groups in North Platte, Grand Island, and Scottsbluff! People that I know who are gay and lesbian and who used to live in this area are astounded that we have this resource now among us! They remember what it used to be like and many cannot believe that it might be changing.

I have found the GLAGN group to be very important in helping me feel good about who I am and in helping me to fully accept who I am. Any gay or lesbian person who is over thirty and who has lived anywhere in the midwest, west (outside of California), or south has been bombarded with the gay jokes, the stereotypes, and playground games such as "Smear the Queer!" We have all been made to feel subhuman, abnormal, and perhaps even evil. It takes time to feel accepted - even accepted by yourself!

GLAGN is giving me a way to do this. I am learning that I am not alone in these feelings, that what I have experienced is not unique, and that healing can occur! I have made some great friends as well.

And, most importantly, I am finding that as I begin to address all the suppressed feelings and unspoken anger and resentment build up over a long number of years, that I am beginning to like life again, to accept others more easily, and to not have so many resentments, and hang-ups. In short, I am on the track again of becoming a whole person.

Now, this does not mean I am going to rush from the closet and clobber everyone around me with my new found wisdom and insight! In fact, I think that would be counter-productive to the growth I am feeling because of GLAGN! Things are changing, and, yes, the change is slow.

I need to be realistic and realize that while I am feeling better about my sexuality, the environment in which I live is still not sure that all this change is good! However, I am finding that I can deal with this prejudice and ignorance a lot easier than before and it is far less threatening than it used to be! I now realize better who I am and, therefore, I am in a better position to help others understand and accept this as well.

Right now, I may be just as effective doing this from the closet than from without. And, who knows, I may not be as closeted as I think I am! I believe time is on my side with this as well and when the time is right I will know it or it will happen.

So, I would like to urge people in outstate Nebraska to become even more involved in their GLAGN groups. Go to the meetings, support the people who have organized them and made their homes available for this. Encourage each other and be good listeners! And, very importantly, try to understand each other and be accepting of each other.

We are all in this boat together and we are all at various stages of acceptance or denial. Many people are pretty fragile because, for many of us, this is new ground. For such a long time we had no means of expressing or sharing who and what we are. That was a closet door we can be glad was opened! GLAGN can only help make things better for all of us if we become, in whatever way we can, involved with it. It really represents an investment in ourselves!




