SO YOU'D LIKE TO HELP WITH THE NEW VOICE....

"Just WHAT do those people do anyway?"

Since we announced that the present Steering Committee of *The New Voice* plans to retire at the end of this publication year (After the February '98 issue), I have been thrilled to receive since offers to help continue *The New Voice* from 4 people. That's wonderful! It is just what I knew would happen — there are too many talented, community minded people out there to let this publication die. Thanks Eric, Scott, Cheri, and Michael for your willingness to serve the community. However, we all know that you cannot do it alone, so I'm going to continue to recruit more volunteers so we can turn the magazine over with a solid base of support.

This month we'll talk about some of the mechanics of the operation — typing and layout.

The raw material for the magazine come to us in all sorts of ways: some is e-mailed, some is sent in neatly typed press releases, some comes in the form of scrawled notes on scraps of paper, some come handwritten on legal tablets, and some come in the form of long, rambling documents that must be condensed before they can be used. Some things are in professional journalistic style, ready to be edited by just eliminating the last paragraph (news stories should always have the most important information first and progress to things that are not essential to the story) while others are written like murder mysteries that tease you with bits and pieces until you finally get the important information in the final paragraph. Some are

professionally written with perfect spelling and punctuation, while some is full of misspelled words and sentence fragments and commas everywhere.

The raw material (the "hard copy") goes first to the editor(s) who shorten, correct spelling, correct grammar, correct punctuation, and rearrange sentence structure so the story makes sense. The editor also removes profanity not necessary to the content of the story and eliminates things which may put us at risk for libel or slander charges.

The edited copy then goes to the typists who type the stories into a computer. Since we are not on the internet at the main *New Voice* office, the stories must be saved to disk and delivered to *The New Voice*. The magazine is actually laid out on Macintosh computers, so it's handy if the typed stories are done in MacWrite II word processing program, but I can convert Word Perfect documents to Macintosh on my personal computer. The active involvement of the typists is brief, but intense. Where writers and reporters work all month long, typists receive their hard copy just after the 10th of the month and need to have it typed and returned within 3-4 days.

Once all of the typed copy is received, it is combined into several subdirectories (local news, features, national news, etc.) and we are ready for layout.

The New Voice is laid out using a PageMaker

4.1 program for Macintosh (old, but works great). The basic template was set years ago, and we just erase the pages and start over each month on the same template. The initial layout is done by our treasurer/advertising manager, Dick Brown. He figures out all of the ads that we have for a particular issue and maps out the spaces for the ads on the template. He actually typesets and creates some of the ads — others are pasted down as camera ready copy so all he has to do is block out a box of the correct size. Once this is done, the template is passed on to me for layout.

I've been doing the layout with some help from Carla for several years now, but it is not really part of the editor's duties — it just happens to be something that I really like doing. It's a lot like putting a jigsaw puzzle together. You start with a page with boxes of various sizes on it and you have to pick out stories that fit under the general heading for that particular section and that fit into the space available. That is a challenge! Many, many, many times I pick out a story for local news and put it on the page, only to discover that it is two inches too long or an inch too short. So I either have to take out part of the story (hard to do with local news — easier with long, rambling opinion pieces) or delete it and find something else. Or I have to stretch the story by making a huge headline or putting in one of those little "filler ads" that take up 1-2 column inches.

After a few years of practice, you develop a fair eye for what will fit in what space but sometimes you run into a dilemma — sort of like I did with Brian's Page last month. What Brian submitted was great, but there was no way it would fit on one page — and it wasn't big enough for two pages and, anyway, I didn't have two facing pages that had enough room. So last month you ended up with BRIAN'S PAGES instead of BRIAN'S PAGE. It worked and only took moving four advertisements around to do it.

That is another problem. You can move ads around so you have room for a particular story, but it gets tricky because some businesses always want their ads in a particular place and others just want them in a "good" place. Well, the preferred place for ads is on the lower right hand corner of the right hand page. Just try getting 40 ads into the lower right hand corners of a 36 pages magazine!

But it all works out in the end and we can always fall back on "fillers," those stories about some festival or book or news happening that seem to appear out of nowhere in the middle of the local news or features or letters to the editor.

Next month, we'll be talking about two of the toughest jobs, advertising and the job of treasurer. Those positions take exceptional talents of persistence and attention to detail. But more about that next month.

Dear Program Director:

I am writing to you in regards to your program aired on Sunday February 23rd, 1997. The topic dealt with anti-homosexuality issues. Your three guests from various backgrounds and experiences voiced their opinions in the discussion regarding the "Pro-Change" movement. (A movement that states a homosexual can choose to change their sexuality and not be homosexual.) I was appalled by their statements and judgmental condemnation while in the stance of being God-fearing Christians. I am concerned about your decision to give public air time to such horrid right-wing philosophies that have dangerous consequences for millions of people worldwide. Let me explain.

Your guest's viewpoints and the Pro-Change movement have dangerous consequences for millions of gays and lesbians and even people misjudged to be homosexual by others. The guest's comments portrayed homosexuals as in the wrong, sinful and mentally ill, that they are misguided individuals who need to be put in their place and made to repent. As God fearing Christians, homosexuality is not acceptable behavior, but something to be stamped out, eradicated from our society.

In the face of fear tactics, it can make it seem okay for hateful individuals to promote violence against homosexuals or even mistakenly identified homosexuals who are actually heterosexual. I wanted to remind you that just recently in the news there was a bombing in Piedmont Park of Atlanta, GA at the Otherside Lounge, an establishment supposedly frequented by gays and lesbians. A right-wing Christian group claimed responsibility for this violence. Where does this leave open Christian tolerance for humanity?

My belief is that for the most part homosexuality is genetic, people are born with these tendencies or not. Statistics have shown that the suicide rate for young gay and lesbian teens are the highest. Many teens, confused about their identity, find no acceptance, being shamed, not being welcome or fitting into society if they are homosexual. What if there was non-judgmental acceptance for them, whoever they are, would they find reason to live?

I would like to see your program offer equal air time to a pro-homosexual Christian group, such as a pastor from the Metropolitan Community Church (MCC), or Parents of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG) to talk about God's love for all, including homosexuals. Your program needs to have a balanced viewpoint on this issue. I hope that you take my letter seriously and follow up on my request. It is unfortunate that anti-homosexual Christians use the bible and God as a scapegoat to discriminate, hate and hurt other innocent people.

WHAT IS THE OPPOSITE OF HATE?

While on vacation, I ran across an interesting quote by Elie Wiesel. It went something like this, "The opposite of hate is not love; it is indifference." I found this to be quite a perplexing notion. As I was driving home after reading that, it caused me to focus on what the emotions of hate and love are. Hate and love can inspire individuals to act, either in a positive or negative manner. Therefore, the two emotions are different sides of the same coin.

Before anyone thinks I have really lost it, let me explain. I have been reading a fantastic book entitled "Führer-Ex" regarding the neo-Nazi movement in Germany. These are individuals who are acting on what I view as hate in a negative light. Their irrational hatred of anyone other than Germans causes them to act violently toward humanity. How many people in the gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender community knew that these bills were being discussed? What did you do about it? Did you contact your senator?

It is rather unfortunate that there are so few people doing the work for a community as large as ours. In order for us to successfully obtain equal rights in this state, it seems to me that our community needs to learn to hate indifference and work harder to see these rights become reality. A friend of mine often slights me and says that one person cannot make a difference. Although this is true to some degree, one person can start a ripple and eventually a wave could be the end result. Come on, people, let's make a difference in Nebraska! Don't let indifference be what defeats the Gay Community in Nebraska.

MIDWEST MALE NATURIST GATHERING

The 5th Annual Midwest Male Naturist Gathering (MMNG) will take place Wednesday, June 11th through Sunday, June 15th, at Camp Gaia near Kansas City, Kansas. For the second time the event is being hosted by Naked Minnesota (formerly known as the Minnesota Polar Bares), a social naturist group based in Minneapolis. All gay and bisexual men are invited to attend.

This year's event will feature a wide variety of fun and educational workshops with ample time to swim, sun, and socialize. Recreational activities like "Disco in the Dark", volleyball, and a nude game show are also planned. By request of previous attendees, one more day has been added to the event to give attendees plenty of time to enjoy the gathering.

MMNG is held at Camp Gaia (pronounced guy-ah) where 168 private acres of woodland and grassland, a 15-acre lake and cabins are available for full nude use. The easy accessibility of this regionally central location and alternative-lifestyle supporting ownership have been strong selling points for this rustic facility where the event has been held each year. The camp is located within easy reach of KC Int'l Airport and major highways.



Another reader asked me for more detailed information on the men I had mentioned in my massive letterpoem (Sharon was very kind in allowing an extra page to hold as my creativity last month.) And I have noticed that I am sometimes referred to as "oh, that Brian!" With all this adulation, that fact that I have not let all this power corrupt me is truly an amazing event...

The "Literate Poofter serves no master!" department: In my ongoing battle to make us all more well-read, I have spent the past month wallowing knee-deep in comic books (Yeah, I know, but this time I kept my clothes on!) because when push comes to shove, I really do not have the attention span for books. That's why I became a poet.

Anyway, back to the literature-stuff. Since I haven't read anything new lately, I will recommend one of my favorite things to read while eating huge bowls of cereal. If you have ever wondered about the world of your dreams, you will love *The Dreaming*. This is one of the many titles available in DC Comics' Vertigo line (their "over-the-edge" Mature readers books). Using characters and events created by Neil Gaiman in his critically acclaimed *Sandman* comic, this anthology series features works from some of the top talents in comics today. Since different creative teams take over with each new story, this is an easy book to pick up without having to read (or buy) a whole bunch of back issues. So far we have learned the true calling of gargoyles (especially the golden ones), watched a man travel through time after being accosted by fairies, learned about Adam and Eve's third son, Seth, and walked through the dreams of a woman in a coma as she hovers between life and death. This is great stuff! If you like to lose yourself in myths, dreams, and wonder, this is the book for you.

The "my dog ate my homework" department: People sometimes ask me how I go about writing my poetry. To be honest, I really do not know how I do this stuff. Something just "clicks" inside my brain, and "a la peanut butter sandwiches!" a poem is born. I like to just sit around a local watering hole and listen to bits and pieces of conversation around me. Sometimes, that will work. Some mornings, I will wake up with the beginnings of a poem. I try not to force the poem; it will come when it is ready (oooh! That sounded deep, huh?).

The "I will promote myself shamelessly any way I can" department: Don't forget the "open mike" night at the book station (1913 Leavenworth, every other Saturday at 8:00pm), where you can see yours truly slinging poetry all over the place, along with introducing some of the metro area's newest writers/poets/performers. I will also be reading at the Community Resource Center open house (check our calendar of events for times and stuff.) this month. If the power hasn't gone to my head now, it never will!! I should probably get to the poetry now, eh? This month, I am featuring yet another poem from Kelly Connor (who was featured in February, 1997). So until next month, take care of each other!!

NATIONAL NEWS

NIGHTCLUB BOMBED

Local and federal authorities are still investigating the bombing of a lesbian nightclub in Atlanta. Investigators thought the bombing at The Otherside Lounge may have been connected to the January bombing of an Atlanta abortion clinic.

Five people required medical attention in the attack on The Otherside Lounge. One person was injured seriously enough to require hospitalization. Atlanta Mayor Bill Campbell called the bombing a hate crime and ordered extra police protection at other gay nightspots in the city.

The Human Rights Campaign called on the Justice Department to investigate the nightclub bombing as a bias-motivated crime.

HRC Executive Director Elizabeth Birch also turned to an unlikely organization for help in condemning the attack — The Christian Coalition.

Christian Coalition Executive Director Ralph Reed responded by issuing a public condemnation that it says is consistent with similar condemnations of violence directed at African American churches, abortion clinics and Roman Catholic churches. The statement read, in part, "The recent bombing of a predominantly gay and lesbian bar in Atlanta was an act of indefensible terrorism and cowardice. It is the very antithesis of our humane and compassionate stand on behalf of the sanctity of the traditional family. I join with other religious leaders who have denounced this act of hypocrisy and violence."

WORKPLACE FAIRNESS ACT INTRODUCED IN CONGRESS

A California Republican has reintroduced the Workplace Fairness Act, which did not make it through the 104th Congress. Rep. Brian Bilbray's bill would prohibit the employment discrimination on any basis other than "qualities pertaining to job performance" for all Americans, including gays and lesbians.

Log Cabin Republicans is praising the introduction which is co-sponsored by four other Republicans and two Democrats.

"We believe that merit should be the only basis for employment in America, and things such as race, sex, religion and sexual orientation should not be a consideration," said Richard Tafel, executive director of Log Cabin Republicans. "In most communities across the country, gays and lesbians have no protection at all against employment discrimination. The Workplace Fairness Act would ensure that all Americans, including gays and lesbians, are judged only on their merit and qualifications."

In an innovative approach, Bilbray's bill would fight discrimination in a blanket fashion, rather than adding new protected classes under the traditional civil rights model.

ELLEN LIKES WOMEN — WHO DOESN'T KNOW THAT BY NOW?

The opportunity for a climactic moment has passed. All that's left is the formality. Ellen IS coming out.

ABC has announced that Ellen DeGeneres' title character will come out on her popular sitcom is scheduled to air on Wednesday April 30 — 8:30PM CDT.

Ellen Morgan, the character played by DeGeneres, will be the first lesbian or gay to ever lead in an American television sitcom. In this particular episode, Ellen finds herself attracted to an old college chum's lesbian friend (played by Lori Loughlin) and begins to explore her own sexual orientation.

Oprah Winfrey will guest star as Ellen's therapist who helps her understand her feelings and to come out. There have been reports of other surprises in the episode — so stay tuned!

LOG CABIN RELEASES

PRIORITIES FOR 1997

The nation's largest gay and lesbian Republican organization has released its 1997 priorities, which focus the group's attention on key legislative and political objectives for the year.

Topping the list of legislative priorities in the 105th Congress for Log Cabin Republicans will be the passage of long-awaited legislation to reform and streamline the Food and Drug Administration's method of approving life-saving and life-extending treatments for terminally ill patients, such as people with HIV/AIDS.

LCR also announced it will launch a national, grass-roots campaign to promote voluntary employment non-discrimination policies by Republican elected officials and candidates for office at the local, state and federal levels.

On other fronts, the organization has targeted three key Republican supporters of gay and lesbian equality as top national priorities for re-election. They are New Jersey Governor Christine Todd Whitman, Los Angeles Mayor Richard Riordan, and New York City Mayor Rudolph Giuliani.

MARRIAGE — IT'S ABOUT DISCRIMINATION

A new congressional report from the General Accounting Office found at least 1,049 laws addressing marital status specifically. Certainly most deny benefits, rights and privileges to same-sex couples.

The Lambda Legal Defense Education Fund says the study was released in February in response to questions raised during the debate over the so-called Defense of Marriage Act.

"Six months after voting for this radical anti-marriage bill, Congress just now is checking out what civil marriage means under federal law," said Evan Wolfson, marriage project director for LLDEF. "They shoved lesbian and gay couples outside this entire system of federal protections."

NATIONAL BLACK LEADERSHIP FORUM RE-ORGANIZES

Responding to the growing needs of the black gay and lesbian community, the National Black Lesbian and Gay Leadership Forum is announcing its first major reorganization in 10 years.

The changes include the addition of two new programs, three new national staff members, a slight change in the name (Lesbian and Gay instead of Gay and Lesbian), an entirely new National Board of Directors, a new regional structure and a lower membership fee (from \$35 to \$10).

"These bold new steps will give us a greater presence in local communities throughout the nation," said Executive Director Keith Boykin. "Working out of our new Washington office, the Forum will be able to reach out to black lesbians and gays of all income levels and all areas of the country."

The National Black Lesbian and Gay Leadership Forum is the only national organization dedicated to the nation's 2.5 million African-American gays and lesbians. Established in 1988, the Forum works to empower black lesbians and gays by developing their leadership skills, increasing their visibility, and building bridges between communities.

BARBARA GITTINGS, BARNEY FRANK GRAND MARSHALS FOR NYC PRIDE

Heritage of Pride (HOP), organizers of Pride events in New York City, announced that Gay rights activist, Barbara Gittings, and Congressman Barney Frank will be Grand Marshals of the June 29th Lesbian & Gay Pride March. These individuals epitomize HOP's Pride theme of "Liberate, Educate, Demonstrate." Gittings has worked for Gay civil rights since the late 1950's, while Frank took national prominence in the late 1980's as an openly Gay public official. Both have made a lifetime commitment to educating the uninformed and misinformed American public about the truth of Gay and Lesbian lives, relationships, and families.

Elected in 1980, Barney Frank, is now serving his ninth term in the United States House of Representatives, representing the Fourth Congressional district in Massachusetts. He is one of the intellectual and political leaders of the Democratic Party, viewed by many as both 'political theorist and pit bull' at the same time. Frank's "coming out" as a 'Gay congressman' was via a casual comment made in response to a reporter's question in May of 1987. He has championed many causes for minorities and Gay/Lesbian persons. Frank has worked to expand immigration limits and has fought against the provision barring HIV+ people from entering the United States. On housing issues, he pushed successfully for amendments to the fair housing bill for people with AIDS, and the HIV virus.

Most recently, Barney Frank was the most outspoken critic of the so-called "Defense of Marriage Act" (DoMA), a bill which gave states the authority to reject the validity of same-sex marriages in any other state that legalized them, and also made married Gay couples ineligible for spousal benefits under the Social Security and Medicare programs.

On the 1997 New York City Pride theme "Liberate, Educate, Demonstrate," Barney Frank commented that, "It is relevant that as a community we come out collectively, in many cases, before we come out individually. People who aren't yet able to, for one reason or another, confront prejudice in a personal, face-to-face way by acknowledging their sexual orientation, are in many cases able to begin that process by joining in Pride marches. Since coming out to others -- throwing off pretense and being honest about who we are -- is the single most important act any Gay, Lesbian, or Bisexual person can perform in the cause of liberation from oppression, Pride marches have had a very direct impact."

Barbara Gittings has been a Gay rights activist since 1958, when she commented, "there were scarcely 200 of us in the whole United States. It was like a little club -- we all knew each other." She established the first East Coast chapter of the Lesbian organization, 'Daughters of Bilitis' (DOB) in New York City in 1958. She also served as editor of DOB's groundbreaking national magazine, *The Ladder*, from 1963 to 1966.

Gittings marched in the first Gay picket lines in the mid-1960's at the White House, the Pentagon, and Philadelphia's Independence Hall. Gittings remarked, "It was risky and we were scared. Picketing was not a popular tactic at the time. And our cause seemed outlandish even to most Gay people." Speaking on the same Pride theme as Barney Frank, Gittings remarked that, "As a teenager in 1950, I had to struggle alone to learn about myself and what it meant to be Gay. Now for almost forty years I've had the satisfaction of working with other Gay people all across the country to get the bigots off our backs, to oil the closet door hinges, to change prejudiced hearts and minds, and to show that Gay love is good for us and for the rest of the world too. It's hard work -- but it's vital, and it's gratifying, and it's often fun!"

NAP WELLNESS CENTER DEDICATION SET FOR SUNDAY, APRIL 20

The public is invited to attend the dedication ceremonies for the Nebraska AIDS Project's new Wellness Center facility. The ceremony is scheduled for 2:00 PM on Sunday, April 20 at 139 South 40th Street in Omaha. Dignitaries and religious leaders from across the state will be in attendance.

Opened in January of 1997, the Wellness Center is Nebraska's first full-time drop-in center for people living with HIV/AIDS. The Wellness Center is an adult day facility designed to meet the growing psycho-social needs of people living with HIV or AIDS in the Omaha metropolitan area. A variety of programs are in development, ranging from daily meal programs to group and individual counseling. These programs are all being designed with the same goal: to lessen isolation and enhance quality of life.

According to NAP Executive Director, Joseph Hall, "The timing of the Wellness Center couldn't have been better." With the introduction of new therapies (most notably the latest generation of Protease inhibitors) many people living with AIDS face the possibility of a greatly extended life expectancy. "A diagnosis of AIDS doesn't mean that life is over. It does mean, however, that each day becomes a quest to stay well," Hall added.

As people with AIDS live longer, new difficulties have emerged that adversely affect the quality of life for many - isolation, depression, inadequate nutrition, and financial instability have grown into important concerns. The physical and emotional deterioration that stems from this disease are significant obstacles to maintaining an independent and meaningful life.

When NAP first formed, it was to support the dying. As this disease has spread, it has changed. As the disease has changed, so have the needs of our clients. The Wellness Center is a direct response to these changes.



GENDER ALLIANCE PLANNING FOR FALL HARVEST

In preparation for Fall Harvest '97, a transgender conference and celebration which will be held this fall at the Red Lion in downtown Omaha, the River City Gender Alliance will host a planning meeting with members of M.A.G.G.I.E., the regional alliance of transgender groups from the Midwest. This will be the first time that Fall Harvest has been held in Omaha and the first time that a major transgender event has been held at a major downtown hotel.

On April 19, after a day hard at work on the details of the conference, the River City Gender Alliance and the members of MAGGIE will be honored at a reception from 5-7pm at Gilligan's. This event is hosted by the Imperial Court of Nebraska.

Following the reception, Emperor Royal Bush and Barbra Love will host a special show "Together in Unity" at the Omaha Mining Company from 7-9pm.

The show will feature special guests, Miss MAX 13 Ashley Simone and Empress Phoenix Fallentino, joined by Monique, Leslie, and Princess Royale 16 Sharon. Proceeds from the show will benefit the River City Gender Alliance.

For those of you who haven't seen the show it's a light comedy about the serious subject of Homophobia, "Nothing anything of us have ever experienced," he said sarcastically.

The play is set during a Weekend Men's Retreat. You remember, in the early 90's all those "Real Men exploring their Real Beings" type events. In this retreat the attendees are divided into a tribal group of four, and the Chief of the tribe is selected by the leaders of the Retreat.

We follow this group of men, whose Chief is an openly gay man. Two of the men are rather open-minded toward the Chief, while one is having real problems dealing with his homophobia.

The Universal appeal of this play comes in that the play shows men how they "really are," when there are no women around to conform their behavior. It also explores how ignorant people can be when it comes to understanding what it's like to be a gay man. And also we get to explore what gay men and straight men are like when they're forced to interact with each other on a personal level.

If you get a chance to see any theater this year, this is The One You Can't Miss; even if you don't enjoy theater. The show is great, and the cause that is going on in conjunction with this performance is equally important.



GAY RODEO EXPLAINED

Horse Events

This is the fifth in a series of articles to explain gay rodeo.

Heartland Regional Rodeo, sponsored by the Heartland Gay Rodeo Association, is scheduled for the weekend of June 27 - 29, 1997, in Fremont, NE. The rodeo performances are on Saturday and Sunday, and we have some great parties planned for Friday and Saturday nights. There are a total of thirteen events in gay rodeo, divided into four categories: Rough Stock events, Roping events, Horse events (also called Speed events), and Camp events.

There are three Horse events: Barrel Race, Pole Bending, and Flag Race. All of these events require the contestant to ride a horse through a set pattern. These events are timed, and the fastest time wins. If the horse breaks the specified pattern, then the contestant is disqualified. Men and women compete separately.

Barrel Race

Three barrels are set up in the arena in a triangle: two barrels near the start/finish line and one barrel at the far end of the arena. The pattern to run is a modified cloverleaf around the three barrels. The contestant must ride the horse first around either of the barrels near the start/finish line, then around the other, and finally around the barrel at the far end of the arena. There is a five second penalty for each barrel knocked over (five seconds are added to the contestant's time.)

Pole Bending

Six poles are set up down the length of the arena. The contestant must ride the horse to the pole farthest from the start/finish line and then weave through the poles. The contestant must turn the horse completely around the last pole and weave back through to the first pole. There is a five second penalty for each pole knocked over.

Flag Race

Two barrels and a pole are set up in the arena in a triangle: the two barrels near the start/finish line and the pole at the far end of the arena. There is a pail on top of each barrel, and a flag in the first pail. The contestant must ride the horse past the first barrel and grab the flag, ride around the pole, and finally ride past the second barrel and plant the flag in the second pail. There is a five second penalty for knocking over the first barrel or pail, or knocking over the pole. The contestant is disqualified for knocking over the second barrel or pail, and receives no time if the flag does not stay in the second pail. The contestant can run the event to the left (right-handed) or to the right (left-handed).

"IN THE LIFE" SET TO AIR APRIL 5

The April/May episode of IN THE LIFE, the national gay and lesbian newsmagazine, takes a look at the participation and experience of gay men and lesbians in institutions that typically define the American experience.

Correspondents Bill Britt, Tanya Barfield, and Hal German join host Katherine Linton for the following stories and more on the April/May edition of IN THE LIFE:

In the Workplace: Last fall, the United Auto Workers union demanded that Chrysler add sexual orientation as a protected category in the discrimination clause in its contract. Chrysler refused. Through interviews with Chrysler employees, representatives and union officials, this story explores this debate and the significance of corporate non-discrimination policies in the workplace. Also included: a preview of a new documentary "Out at Work". The show talks to three union members. Eleven other gay employees refused to be interviewed.

In the Magic Kingdom: From Vice Presidents to animators, lesbians and gay men play a larger and more visible role in the success of the Disney empire. IN THE LIFE travels to Walt Disney company headquarters in Los Angeles, home of Mickey's slice of the American pie, for a glimpse inside the Magic Kingdom to see how and to what effect gay men and lesbians are making their mark on screen and behind the scenes.

In the Country: IN THE LIFE travels to Wisconsin for a discussion with gay men and lesbians who grew up on farms and in rural areas. Those who have remained, those who have returned, and those who will never go home, tell their stories of how growing up on a farm has affected their lives and their character as adults.

Included is an interview with Will Fellows, editor of "Farm Boys", a book which profiles more than three dozen men who grew up on farms in the midwest. (Note: Will Fellows will appear at Borders at 7pm April 4 and at the Nebraska Bookstore at noon April 5.)

In the Arts: It would be difficult to uncover gay Americana without remarking on the life and legacy of Andy Warhol. Through a tour of the Warhol museum in Pittsburgh and a discussion with openly gay museum curator Tom Sokolovsky, we gain some insight into the work and the man behind the reputation, ten years after his death.

In the Center Ring — On the Tightrope: This story will focus on the historical participation of lesbians and gay men in the circus, circus side-shows, and Vaudeville. From bearded women to "half man, half woman", and from ringmasters to clowns, the circus has always been the alternative family to run away to — and, as long as they could draw a crowd, gay men and lesbians have always run to them! Included is a taste of gay life on the trapeze as the high flying artists of "Air Male" are interviewed and perform.

In the Family: A look at the vital work of PFLAG. This extraordinary national group of Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays has been many things to many different people: A resource to other parents, a source of love and support for the lesbian and gay community, and certainly a shock to conservatives who have been angered in the past two years by their activist campaigns targeting homophobia.

A Day in the Life: IN THE LIFE'S regular story feature, "A Day in the Life" will follow Sabrina Sojourner, the first openly lesbian

African American elected official working in the House of Representatives, as she tackles the many obstacles and opportunities Washington has to offer in just one day.

This episode of IN THE LIFE is funded in part by the H. van Ameringen Foundation, The Michael Palm Foundation, The Advocate, The Joyce-Mertz Gilmore Foundation, The Gill Foundation, and IN THE LIFE members nationwide.

It will air on Saturday April 5 at 9PM on Nebraska Educable.

ONE ARGUMENT FOR SAME-SEX MARRIAGE DOESN'T ADD UP

There are many arguments for legally recognizing same-sex marriages. We hear them all the time — equality in employment benefits, social security benefits, hospital visitation rights, and adoption just to name a few.

However, from time to time, one issue creeps into the debate. It's an argument for same-sex marriage that doesn't add up.

Taxes

One survey asked same-sex couples what types of discrimination they have faced as a couple. The second most frequent answer was taxes.

In the spirit of April 15th (just around the corner), let's take a look.

Recognizing that figuring one's taxes can vary a great deal, we'll look at a simple and probably typical example: Jerry and Gary — a fictional gay couple who want to legally get married. Jerry earned \$32,500 in 1996. Gary earned \$27,200 in the same year. They live in an Omaha apartment.

Let's see how much taxes they would have owed under three scenarios.

SINGLE FILERS:

Legally, they can only file as single taxpayers.

Jerry, with his \$32,500 income, had to pay \$4153 in federal income taxes and \$1160 in Nebraska state income taxes.

Gary, with his \$27,200 income, had to pay \$3101 in federal income taxes and \$848 in Nebraska state income taxes.

Together, they paid \$9,262 in state and federal income taxes.

MARRIED & FILING JOINT:

Jerry, with his same \$32,500 income and Gary with his \$27,200 income would have had to pay \$8206 in federal income tax and \$2223 in Nebraska state income taxes.

That's a total of \$10,429 or \$1,167 more than if they filed as single taxpayers.

MARRIED & FILING SEPARATE RETURNS:

There's not much difference here. Jerry would have to pay \$4849 in federal income tax and \$1296 in Nebraska state income taxes. Gary would have to pay \$3,365 and \$926. Together, that's \$10,435 or \$7 more than if they filed jointly.

Fellows interviewed 75 gay men, ranging in age from 25 to 84, who grew up on farms in the rural Midwest. In *Farm Boys*, he included extensive first-person narratives from 25 of them, and the result is a moving and diverse collection of oral histories about an unheard group of men.

Some of their stories are painful, others funny, but all speak with honesty about farm life and the decision by many to move to the city. In their plain-spoken accounts, these men recall strict gender roles, a sense of isolation, and a lack of information about their sexuality but also a love of the land and strong ties to family and community.

Will Fellows grew up on a dairy farm near Evansville, Wisconsin. He received his bachelor's and master's degrees in nutrition from Cornell University, Ithaca, New York. He currently lives with his mate in Milwaukee and works as a nutritionist and writer. This is his first book.

Several local personalities are featured in *Farm Boys*, thanks largely to an article which appeared in *The New Voice* asking for volunteers to take part in the interviews. Readers may recognize several characters in the book, including Mr. Rick Noss and Mr. Harry Beckner.

NAP OPENS HIV RESOURCE CENTER

The Nebraska AIDS Project has provided a central clearinghouse for HIV and AIDS information for over a decade. With the opening of an HIV Resource Center in its new location at 139 South 40th Street, Omaha, Nebraska, NAP has made access to the latest AIDS information easier than ever. "For the first time, we have been able to gather our information resources in one place that's user-friendly, and easy to access," said Rich Santee, Director of Education and Volunteer Programs. "In the past we had books, videos, and files scattered throughout the office, wherever there was a nook or cranny. We just didn't have a central location big enough to store it all. Now it's together in one place, and anybody can come in and use it."

The HIV Resource Center is a prominent feature of the Nebraska AIDS Project's new location. It is just inside the front door, next to the reception desk. The Center is staffed by Ron Carlat, who can provide visitors with assistance in locating information on hundreds of HIV/AIDS related topics from caregiving, to molecular biology. The Center houses books, magazines, video tapes, brochures, files, and Internet access for AIDS education. The materials in the HIV Resource Center must be used on the premises and are not currently available for loan.

"We probably have between 10 and 20 hotline calls each month from students in high school and college who need information for a report or a presentation," said Santee. "Then another 20 or 30 walk-ins each month, plus clients and volunteers who need information frequently. I expect that the Resource Center will get quite a bit of traffic," Santee adds that his department is currently reviewing materials to be added to the Center. "We have a pretty good start," he said. "I'm really pleased with the variety and scope of materials we have, but there's a lot more out there, and we will be adding to our collection on a regular basis." The HIV Resource Center is open from 9:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. English and Spanish language materials are available.

CLINTON'S HIV/AIDS BUDGET ASKS FOR SMALL INCREASES

President Clinton's budget proposal includes small increases for programs that deal with people living with HIV and AIDS, but falls far short of the lofty goals of the White House's National AIDS Strategy.

"The good news is that the president is asking for increases for care, prevention, housing and research at a time when other discretionary spending is static," said Winnie Stachelberg, HRC's legislative director. "Unfortunately, these increases are not enough considering that we could be on the threshold of beating back this epidemic. To achieve the goals articulated in the White House strategy, President Clinton must commit the money now, for treatment of those already infected and for research aimed at finding a cure."

One serious problem is the president's plan to impose a per-capita cap on Medicaid spending, according to Stachelberg. "Imposing such restrictions could be devastating to thousands of people living with HIV and AIDS and might limit their access to the new class of drugs that have improved and prolonged so many lives," she said. The bipartisan National Governors Association and a bipartisan roster of senators joined a chorus of groups opposed to such caps.

The president's budget calls for a \$17 million increase for HIV/AIDS prevention, an approximately 3 percent increase over fiscal 1997 levels. States would decide how to spend this money. "We hope that states will use some of these funds to target injecting drug users, since about three-quarters of all new HIV infections are occurring in this population," Stachelberg said. "We also continue to believe that the administration should encourage states to implement needle exchange programs because such programs have been shown to slow the spread of HIV in one of the most vulnerable communities."

The president also requested an \$8 million increase in the Housing Opportunities for People With AIDS program. This represents a 4 percent boost over fiscal 1997, when \$196 million was appropriated for HOPWA. About 90 percent of these funds go directly to states and cities to provide housing for people with AIDS.

In the area of care, the president asked for a \$40 million increase above the \$996.3 million appropriated last year. Of that increase, about \$15 million would go to states under Title II of the Ryan White CARE Act, giving them the flexibility to earmark the funds for drugs. Title IIIB of Ryan White, which provides funds for direct services to people living with HIV and AIDS, would get also get an increase of \$15 million, 22 percent above fiscal '97 levels. "These increases are particularly welcome in light of the dramatic health improvements some people with HIV and AIDS have shown after taking the new drug combinations," Stachelberg said.

The budget also includes a plan that would make it possible for people who have benefited from the new drug treatments to return to work without losing their Medicaid coverage. Currently, people on Supplemental Security Income who go to work lose their Medicaid coverage if their earnings exceed a certain amount, set by their state. The president's budget proposes allowing such beneficiaries to keep their Medicaid coverage by paying premiums as their income rises. The president also asked for a 4 percent increase for AIDS-related research, a total of approximately \$1.54 billion.

The president's budget also calls for a \$2 million increase, to \$142 million, in the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's breast and cervical cancer early detection program. This program is gathering data on the incidence of these cancers among lesbians, a population believed to be at a higher risk than heterosexual women.

AUSTRIAN ANTI-GAY LAWS REPEALED

On December 12, 1996, the Upper Chamber of the Austrian Parliament passed the full repeal of anti-gay Articles 220 and 221 of the Penal Code. This vote corroborates the November Lower Chamber decision. The reform came into effect on March 1, 1997. This is significant, albeit partial victory, for the Austrian Lesbian & Gay movement, which has struggled for this reform for the past 17 years. Article 200 criminalized the production or distribution of materials presenting homosexuality in a positive light, while Article 221 prohibited the existence of groups whose mandate included the promotion of homosexuality. Article 209, however, which imposes an unequal age of consent of 18 for gay men versus 14 for lesbians and heterosexuals, remains on the books. The left wing Social Democrats, Greens, and Liberal Forum had proposed the full repeal of all three articles in the Lower Chamber, but unfortunately do not constitute a Parliamentary majority. The Austrian lesbian and gay movement extends their thanks to all who supported their international campaign.

"Beyond Inclusion: Celebrating Gay and Lesbian Commitments and Ministries Within the Episcopal Church" is a national conference being held to explore the full participation of gays and lesbians in the Episcopal Church. The conference will unite together experts from throughout the nation. Theologians, ethicists and other church leaders will explore the history, theology and practice of inclusion in the church, including the detailed stories of parishes with effective ministries reflecting full participation of gays and lesbians.

The Beyond Inclusion Conference will be an electrifying weekend providing ideas and support for expected participants at the July 1997 Episcopal Church General Convention in Philadelphia. EPISCOPAL DIOCESE ENDORSES SAME-SEX MARRIAGES

By a wide margin that surprised even the bishop, the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania voted 176-96 to endorse the blessing of gay and lesbian relationships. If the resolution is passed by the general convention, a rite of blessing will be devised, although the blessing would have no legal standing unless a state legislature chooses to recognize it. Rev. David Moyer decried the vote, saying, "It's just one more step in the erosion of Christian morality in the Episcopal Church." But Rev. Ruth L. Kirk, co-submitter of the resolution, said, "Can God do a new thing? And can God use the Church to do a new thing? For centuries we have condemned gays and lesbians. It is time to support committed, loving relationships."

AIDS AGENCY SUES L.A. COUNTY OVER HIV COMMISSION MISCONDUCT

The nation's largest community AIDS organization has sued Los Angeles County in federal court following actions by County officials that were intended to punish AIDS Healthcare Foundation (AHF) for protesting funding cuts in 1996. Last summer, AHF coordinated several multi-agency demonstrations protesting planned cuts to AIDS services. The protests averted a \$4.9 million in cuts. But following a heated discussion at a County-appointed HIV Commission meeting in which members attacked AHF's role in the protests, the Commission voted to punish AHF for its advocacy.

AHF President Michael Weinstein noted that several agencies participated in the protests, yet only AHF was singled out for contract investigations by the Commission. Audiotapes from the meeting record that employees of agencies competing for funds with AHF made motions calling for contract investigations—a clear conflict of interest. And despite state law mandating public notification of agenda items at official meetings, AHF's public policy actions were not on the Commission's public agenda nor was AHF informed that the protests were to be discussed at the meeting. Audio tapes of the meeting recorded one Commissioner saying, "they [AHF] get money from this body and there are things this body can do to control that and them."

"Unfortunately, when we appealed these actions, the County's lawyers said they saw nothing wrong with any of the Commission's actions," said AHF's Weinstein. "Our only recourse now is to ask a federal court to make sure the County understands our constitutional protections to free speech, as well as our right to seek redress by publicly addressing our elected officials on issues that directly affect our clients," said Weinstein. The suit asks for an injunction preventing the County and its appointees from infringing on the agency's free speech rights and seeks no monetary damages. "This lawsuit is really about accountability of government in our constitutional democracy at its most fundamental level—local government," said AHF attorney Steven D. Ashford. "Our democratic process is threatened when any government body attempts to silence its citizens from speaking about political matters." Named in the lawsuit are Los Angeles County, the County Health Department, and several Commissioners.

PRESIDENT OF ISRAEL RETRACTS REMARKS, FALLS SHORT OF A FULL APOLOGY

On December 20, the President of Israel, Ezer Weizman, made a homophobic remarks about lesbians and gay men in response to a question by a high school student at the Reali School in Haifa. Weizman said that he found gays and lesbians "disgusting." Weizman called for legal steps to determine the status of homosexuals and said it was up to society not to encourage this phenomenon. In the past, he noted, homosexuals were considered a security risk. Weizman expressed opposition to same-sex marriage and concern that homosexuality has become "nice".

Response to Weizman's comments was swift. Member of the Knesset (MK) Yael Dayan immediately called upon Weizman to apologize, stating Weizman had engaged in incitement against an entire group in Israeli society. MK Naomi Hazan called for his resignation. The Association for Civil Rights in Israel condemned the president's remarks and said that he has a responsibility to work for the dignity of all persons in Israel. It is important to note that the office of the Presidency in Israel is a largely ceremonial one, yet seen as a unifying force in the country. The World Congress of Gay and Lesbian Jewish Organizations sent a letter expressing concern, urging him to retract his statements and apologize. On the day following Weizman's remarks, a group of over 500 people gathered outside Weizman's home to protest his homophobic statements. Chants of "Big mouth, small head" and "Weizman homophobe" were heard throughout the crowd.

On December 23, 1996 after a meeting with members of the Society for the Protection of Personal Rights in Israel and various Ministers of the Knesset, the President's bureau chief Arye Shumer released the following statement to the press: "The president sees legislation which discriminates as undermining the foundations of democracy, the rules of natural justice, and the dignity and freedom of man, and he has no intention of encouraging legislation which leads to discrimination between citizens of the state regardless of origin, religion, sex, or sexual orientation. The president says that any deed or expression in which people are publicly humiliated - or deeds which can be interpreted as such - should be regretted," the statement continued. "The dignity, rights, and well-being of all the citizens of Israel must be upheld." Many of the meeting participants, while satisfied with the outcome, believe it to be only a first step. MK Hazan said at the end of the meeting that the call for the President's resignation was suspended but she described him as "on probation" for the remainder of his presidency. Members of the Society for the Protection of Personal Rights request that activists continue to pressure the Israeli government to honor the rights of gays, lesbians and bisexuals in Israel. PRIMARY IMMUNE RESPONSE TO HIV PREDICTS DISEASE PROGRESSION

Certain patterns of immune responses to the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) during the first weeks of infection are highly predictive of an individual's subsequent rate of disease progression, according to investigators at the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID) and their colleagues.

"Our data strongly suggest that the immunologic factors at work during this early period of infection, as much or more than virologic factors, are the critical determinants of the ultimate outcome of HIV disease," says Anthony S. Fauci, M.D., NIAID Director and Chief of the NIAID Laboratory of Immunoregulation.

"The growing understanding of the initial interaction between HIV and the immune system, and of the immune responses to HIV during primary infection, both favorable and unfavorable, is important to the development of effective HIV vaccines."

Drs. Fauci, Giuseppe Pantaleo, formerly of NIAID's Laboratory of Immunoregulation, report findings in the January, 1997 *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences*.

Once it enters the body, HIV infects a large number of CD4+ T cells and replicates rapidly. During this acute, or primary phase of infection, the blood contains many viral particles that spread throughout the body, seeding various organs, particularly the lymphoid organs such as the lymph nodes, spleen, tonsils, and adenoids. Two to four weeks after initial infection with the virus, up to 70% of HIV-infected persons suffer flu-like symptoms. The patient's immune system fights back with killer T cells (CD8+ T cells) and B-cell-produced antibodies.

"One important way in which a person's immune system responds to primary HIV infection is by mobilizing different subsets of certain white blood cells, CD8+ T cells, that can destroy cells that have been infected with HIV," says Dr. Fauci.

"We found a clear correlation between the patterns of CD8+ T cell expansion during primary infection and how well a patient did clinically during the subsequent year or 18 months. Regardless of the amount of HIV in the blood during primary infection, patients who mobilized a broad repertoire of CD8+ T cells had slower progression of disease than individuals who showed a pronounced expansion of only a single subset of CD8+ T cells."
