Iowa Bid to Prohibit Same-Sex Marriage Unlikely to Advance

A proposed amendment to the Iowa Constitution prohibiting same-sex marriage in the state was introduced in the Iowa House on Tuesday but has slim chances for advancing, a key legislator said.

House Joint Resolution 11 seeks to establish marriage between one man and one woman as the "only legal union valid or recognized" in Iowa. Same-sex marriage has been legal for several years in Iowa, after the state Supreme Court ruled a state law barring it unconstitutional.

To be amended to the constitution, the measure would have to win legislative approval in two consecutive General Assemblies and then go to a vote of the people.

This year, it's unlikely to take even the first few steps down that path.

Friday marks a key legislative deadline in which legislation must win approval in a subcommittee and a full committee to remain viable for floor debate and eventual passage.

That deadline all but rules out advancement of HJR 11, said House Judiciary Chairman Chip Baltimore, R-Boone.

After being introduced on Tuesday, the bill cannot be assigned to a subcommittee until the Judiciary Committee meets at 1 p.m. on Wednesday, and that subcommittee, if formed, could not hold a meeting for at least 24 hours after that, delaying dis-

cussion until mid- to late-afternoon on Thursday.

If the bill cleared that subcommittee, it would have to be debated and passed in the full Judiciary Committee by Friday. The committee meets at 4 p.m. on Thursday, leaving perhaps a three -hour window in which the subcommittee could meet before the full committee convened, and after which the full committee would have to approve the bill.

Baltimore, who is signed on as a co-sponsor of the amendment, said all that would not happen, and that the bill would not move forward this week.

The Iowa Family Leader, the conservative organization that has led opposition to same-sex marriage, expressed some ambivalence for the measure's lack of progress. Because proposed amendments must be approved in consecutive General Assemblies, passage this year or next really makes no difference, said Family Leader Foundation President Chuck Hurley.

"There's no urgency in the sense that this year is better than next," Hurley said.

The marriage-rights advocacy group One Iowa responded immediately to the amendment's introduction with a statement in opposition.

"The introduction of House Joint Resolution 11 is a shameful

display of playing politics with Iowa families," One Iowa Executive Director Donna Red Wing said in a statement. "The truth is, Iowans have enjoyed the freedom to marry for nearly four years and nothing has happened except that loving and committed couples have married. The sky hasn't fallen."

Even if the proposal did navigate those tight deadlines and win approval in the House, it has virtually no chance of passage in the Democratic-controlled Senate, which has rejected several proposed bans on same-sex marriage over the last few years.

NAP NEWS

A new concept of analyzing HIV care, called the Treatment Cascade, was published by Dr. Edward Gardner and colleagues in the March 2011 edition of the journal Clinical Infection Diseases. This model gained quick attention regarding how people who were HIV+ were falling out of care along several steps of care, starting at testing and cascading through the steps of treatment all the way through to adherence with sustainable undetectable viral loads. Always alert and keeping ourselves informed, Nebraska AIDS Project (NAP) utilized this research and took quick measures to implement the most innovative practices locally.

Did you know that in 2012 NAP tested 1,368 people for HIV in the Omaha office alone? The dedicated and concerted effort of testing for the community relies on the help of a team of well trained volunteers, directed by skilled staff, all of whom provide the necessary care needed for people who come in to get tested. For many, the approximate 20 minutes of waiting for their results ends in decreased anxiety as they are informed their test result is nonreactive, or in other terms negative. However, for some their anxiety may be increased as they are informed their test results are reactive and a second test needs to be completed and sent to a lab for confirmation.

So what does NAP do for those whose 2nd test comes back positive? Traditionally, people who tested positive for HIV at NAP were provided a direct referral to an HIV specialist physician and to NAP case management if that particular set of services were needed as well. As of 2012 NAP, utilizing the Gardner Treatment Cascade, followed the national trends of adding a new layer of service provision that is producing increased personal awareness of education and quicker access to medical care.

If a person tests positive in the Omaha office they are given an opportunity to meet with the Linkage Coordinator, who is available in the Omaha office during all testing confirmations of HIV results. If the person newly tested positive with HIV is agreeable, they meet with the Linkage Coordinator who briefly explains the program which details 5 educational classes while working on accessing an HIV clinic of the client's choosing simultaneously. The classes provided are: HIV 101, Stigma/Confidentiality/Social Support, Medications/Side Effects/Adherence, Life Span/Life Styles, and Preparing for your Doctor's visit. During this time personal strengths are reviewed, actions plans are made, and referrals are provided for other areas of personal care needs identified during the classes. The Linkage Coordinator is even available to take a new client to

I even mentioned in the column (that he obviously didn't read) that he couldn't do that. Let's see if he reads my column this month and edits my commentary prior to publication. If the Spiced Green Beans recipe sucked, it's not my fault.

With the Lenten season is in full stream (get it? fish... steam...), I recommend hitting your local fish fry even if you're not Catholic. That being said, I HATE fish (or so I thought). I am very selective about my fish fries, and only go to ones that serve shrimp.



If you're up for something new, try the Bang Bang Shrimp at All Holy Name Greek Orthodox on 90th and Q Street.

Did I mention that I HATE fish? My wife has been trying for three years to find a fish that I like, and my father in law finally nailed it when he made Panko Encrusted Swai for dinner one night and forced me to eat it. It's a very mild, non-fishy tasting fish that is easy on your wallet. This dish uses Panko, a crunchy Japanese style bread crumb. If you can't make it to your local fish fry, give this dish a try at home.

Panko Encrusted Swai

Ingredients:

1 cup Panko with Italian Herbs (you can buy it that way, or just add Italian seasonings to regular Panko)

1/4 cup Parmesan Cheese (the kind in the can that you put on pizza works great)

4-6 pieces of Swai (it's in the frozen fish section at the grocery store, thaw before using) Olive oil

Directions:

 Mix the parmesan cheese and Panko together in a dish or on a plate

- Place unrinsed fish in dish and coat with panko mixture
- Fry in pan coated with olive oil over medium heat, 7-8
 minutes a side. Don't keep flipping the fish or the

their first appointment where they meet the medical team and labs are drawn, and then also to the second medical appointment where the lab results are interpreted for them by the medical team. To ensure a person is connected to medical care, if a person opts out of meeting with the Linkage Coordinator they are referred to a medical provider by the testing team. Additionally, if they agree to meet with the Linkage Coordinator but opt out of the program offered by the Coordinator, they are referred to a medical provider by the same referral processes used by the testing team.

With the coordination of the highly skilled testing counseling team and the services offered by the Linkage Coordinator, persons testing positive at NAP in the Omaha office are provided a level of service that not only addresses their status, but enhances their quality of living as they are empowered by education and rapid access to medical care.

7 Steps toward a Happier You

Lately, I've been experimenting with ways to be happier. I am a personal growth junkie: I am always interested in learning something new about how to have a happier, healthier, more peaceful and prosperous life. As a psychotherapist, I share these ideas and techniques with my clients and now I'd like to share some of them with you:

Step 1: Letting go of our stories: Our words are very powerful. What we tell ourselves is amazingly self-fulfilling. If we keep telling ourselves the same stories over-and-over, we are pretty much doomed to keep having the same experiences over-and-over. Our stories create our self-image. If you are willing to release your old stories about yourself, who you are and who done you wrong, you are opening the door to new experiences. It is simple, but not easy. Begin the process by noticing the stories you tell yourself about who you are, who hurt or betrayed you, what you think about men/women/relationships/money, and start to notice what you are perpetuating in your life.

Step 2: Forgiving people: I wish this weren't true, but holding grudges against people ultimately harms only you. I have held a lot of grudges in my time, and none of them did me any good. While I was angry at people who I thought treated me badly and should be "punished", these people were off with other people having a great time. Who suffered? Me, I know that forgiveness is hard, but start here: be willing to forgive. It will start the ball rolling.



Step 3: Embracing peace and releasing drama. For some people, drama

gives the illusion of feeling "alive". These people are confused (or very, very young). Drama is not aliveness, it is a substitute for aliveness. Aliveness is a life full of opportunity and new possibilities. Drama sucks the energy out of you. Aliveness gives you energy. Drama is often a diversion from looking at the deep (old) pain in your life. Face your pain, clean it up and reduce your drama.

Step 4: Embracing more sophisticated ways of functioning. Are you doing the same old shit over-and-over? Is it working? I didn't think so. As we age, the Universe/God keeps showing us what we need to let go of in order to embrace something better. It's like the Buddhist idea of the empty rice bowl: if you're holding on to stale old rice in your bowl, there's no room for fresh, new delicious rice. You've got to dump that stale, moldy old rice so there's room for something new and wonderful. Scary? Sure. Productive? Absolutely.

Step 5: Polishing your rough edges: We all have areas where we're not so smooth or high functioning; start to notice them. If you really want to discover your "rough" spots, ask people who know you. They probably see them much more clearly than you. And don't beat yourself up for them, instead, just notice them and be willing to change. Start with compassion – not

punishment - for yourself.

Step 6: Emptying yourself. Try saying some version of "I am empty" meaning, I am open, I am willing to let go of preconceived ideas. It's a really interesting phrase that I've been working with, and it is quite helpful at letting go of upset and feeling calm and spacious. So often our mind feels full of thoughts that we can't let go. These thoughts can even keep us from falling asleep or enjoying time with our loved ones. Emptying yourself let's you dump all that junk and see how you feel without it. Try telling yourself, "I am empty" and see where it takes you. Step 7: "I don't need to know". This is another phrase that I frequently tell myself. So many of us think that more information will bring us happiness. Usually, it doesn't. In fact, you will be happier if you can let go of having to "know" and "be right". Information is useful, but only if you use it in a way that works for you and those you love. Too much information can actually be very unhelpful. Try saying "I don't need to know." And feel how freeing it is. You may be surprised to find out that it's true.

Sheriff: No Hate Crime Investigation for Slain Gay Candidate

The family of a brutally slain up-and-coming gay politician in Mississippi has demanded that authorities take a closer look into the murder of Marco McMillian, who was running for mayor of Clarksdale, Miss., and was considered to be one of the first viable openly gay office seekers in the state.

McMillian's family said they want his death to be investigated as a hate crime, due to the nature of the incident. However, the Coahoma County Sheriff's Department said they would not explore the option, the Clarion-Ledger newspaper reports. They have also been tight-lipped with media and McMillian's family about the details of his death, his godfather Carter Womack said

"He was very concerned about his safety—people had tried to talk him out of the race," Womack said to the paper. "The family feels this ought to be investigated a hate crime."

The candidate's body was found near the Mississippi River last week after he had apparently been beaten, dragged, and set ablaze. His body was recovered a day after his SUV was involved in a head-on collision. McMillian was not in the car at the time of the accident, as investigators believe he had already been dead, and his body had been dumped several hours prior. The man driving the SUV was Lawrence Reed, 22, who was arrested in connection to McMillian's death. Reed was initially

airlifted to a Memphis hospital, but is now being held at the Shelby County Jail in Memphis.

At the time of Reed's arrest, the sheriff's department did not release information on any theories about a motive,
although the county coroner said he
believed politics was not a factor.
While Mississippi's hate crime laws
cover race, gender, and religion, it
does not protect against crimes spurred
by antigay bias.



Some believe that Reed and McMillian knew each other prior to the murder, but McMillian's family said they had no knowledge of a prior relationship.

McMillian, 33, was the CEO of MWM & Associates, a consulting firm that works with non-profit organizations.

Blackburn was one of the 138 to vote against the bill, with 286 in favor. Eighty-seven Republicans supported the LGBT-inclusive VAWA.

"I didn't like the way it was expanded to include other different groups," she said. "What you need is something that is focused specifically to help the shelters and to help out law enforcement who is trying to work with the crimes that have been committed against women and helping them to stand up."

Tebow Heading to Liberty U For Men's Workshop

Liberty's Convocation, which takes place throughout each semester, is billed as "North America's largest weekly gathering of Christian students." Tebow's talk on March 8 will be closed to the public, according to a schedule of events acquired by Right Wing Watch.

Tebow's talk will focus on men's issues, complete with Chickfil-A boxed lunches, and other food options. Workshops will include fishing, football, home defense, marriage, baseball, disaster preparedness, and other topics.

Liberty University was founded by the late televangelist Jerry Falwell. The school bans openly gay students, and has hosted several antigav events.



Congresswoman Votes Against VAWA Because of LGBT Inclusiveness



Antigay Scottish Cardinal Admits to Inappropriate Sexual Conduct

Cardinal Keith O'Brien, who has been accused of inappropriate conduct with four men, today admitted his behavior 'has fallen below the standards' expected of him.

Cardinal Keith O'Brien, who resigned last week as the head of the Roman Catholic Church in Scotland, has admitted to inappropriate sexual behavior earlier in his career, a week after allegations surfaced involving three young priests and a seminarian.



"I wish to take this opportunity to admit that there have been times that my sexual conduct has fallen below the standards expected of me as a priest, archbishop and cardinal," O'Brien, who is noted for his antigay remarks, said in a statement posted online today, The New York Times reports. He also offered an apology and said he will play no further public role in the church.

Last weekend The Observer, a U.K. newspaper, reported on allegations of inappropriate sexual conduct with the four men, with the earliest instance occurring in 1980. "The first was a seminarian when Cardinal O'Brien, then a priest, served as a powerful supervisory figure in two Scottish seminaries, the Times reports. "The others were young priests; it is not clear exactly when in the 1980s they say they were subject to his unwanted advances."

During the papacies of John Paul II and Benedict XVI, O'Brien took an ultraconservative stance on homosexuality, the paper reports. "Abandoning the relatively tolerant approach to the issue he had adopted in the years before he donned a cardinal's red hat, he condemned homosexuality as immoral, and as a 'grotesque subversion," the Times notes.


He is the highest-ranking figure in the Roman Catholic Church to admit to sexual misconduct in recent years.


