

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Our Turn

Comments and Opinions from The New Voice staff

The New Voice, unlike the Lincoln Gay News, has survived. In the summer of 1979, Kate and R. S., editors of the Lincoln Gay News, announced that the publication was coming to an end after thirteen months of publication. The main reason was staffing problems. Their staff had gone from 6 to 2 to 3 to 5 to 2 to 7 to 5 with weekly fluctuations too numerous to remember. Apathy and poor community support also led to the demise. The classified section had been discontinued due to lack of interest. The magazine had pleaded for help for months, but the pleas had been disregarded by those who took the Lincoln Gay News and R. S. for granted.

Lincoln and Omaha would be empty without gay organizations, bars, and businesses. Recently two groups folded in Omaha for lack of interest, and as of now there is no Gay and Lesbian Pride Week Committee to schedule activities for this year's celebration. Many groups struggle financially. Recent concerts by the River City Mixed Chorus had poor responses in both Omaha and Lincoln even though both events were extensively publicized. The performances were tremendous and done very professionally.

Here at The New Voice, this magazine is put together by a dedicated group of volunteers who do what we do because we love to do it, because we want to serve the community.

The New Voice is, in our opinion, one of the finest gay and lesbian publications in the country and nobody is paid anything for

putting it out. The majority of gay and lesbian publications in this country are profit-making businesses. I recently returned from Denver, where I met with the staff of Out Front and The Guide. Both publications have paid staff who are fine people and concerned about the community, but the main goal of both papers is to make a profit.

We are proud to reverse that. Our number one goal is service to the gay and lesbian community. Our secondary goal is keeping our heads above water financially. We are still paying off legal fees from a lawsuit that we won last August. We will not fold, but at the same time, we need more volunteers. Too few people are doing too much work.

Rather than knock the positive gay efforts of The New Voice, why not give us and other gay and lesbian organizations a hand? It would be a tragedy if someday we found ourselves with no organized gay and lesbian community at all because of lack of interest.

Every gay and lesbian organization in Lincoln and Omaha, including The New Voice, is made up entirely of volunteers, all of whom have other full or part-time jobs. Many volunteers are involved in more than one organization. Sometimes things are late, sometimes mistakes are made, sometimes there are other problems. But on balance, our community is much better off for its organizations than it would be without them.

No pennants, banners, bumper stickers or flags being sold. Our declaration of our pride will be more subdued, but not less sincere.

Hopefully, there will be several occasions for gay people to get together and hold their heads high with a smile on their faces and say by their presence that they are not ashamed of being gay. There is a difference from being ashamed and in the "closet," acceptance of one's gayety, and proclaiming pride in one's self as a gay person.

I am gay and proud to be a part of the gay community. I am proud of my ability to cope with the bigotry that threatens to oppress me, my courage to seek out other gay people for support and friendship, and my willingness to support others. I am proud of my association with various gay organizations and the support that I am able to

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provide through finances, attendance of gatherings, and offering whatever talents I may have. I am also proud of my knowledge that I am one of my God's creations--just as I am--and that my God and I can and do love one another. My God didn't make no junk, and I am not about to make junk out of His handiwork.

My lifestyle has been condemned by some fellow gays--along with my choice of clothing, my ideas, and even my deodorant. However, I have learned not only to live with myself, but to be proud of who and what I am. As I get older, I do get better.

My hope for each of you reading this is that as you see other proud people who are also gay, that you will join the Gay Pride Group. It does feel good!

'Nothing,' replies Sadie, 'He has a doctor, lawyer, and accountant for lovers.'

This, along with more gay-oriented jokes, songs, and conversation were the makings of "An Evening with Lynn Lavner," April 24, at 8:30 pm in the UNL Nebraska Union Ballroom.

Lynn, a New York native, has entertained for the past 2 1/2 years in New York gay bars. Only recently has she taken the show on the road, playing mostly to college campuses. She stressed the need for gay



Consumer Watch

Recently, the 24-Hour Nautilus Health Club went bankrupt in eight states and closed down facilities in Omaha, Lincoln, and in Bellevue. In Lincoln, The Iron Works, which was formerly called The Body Firm, abruptly closed its doors and did not notify its employees or customers.

I have belonged to both of these fitness centers in the past year and I was shocked and surprised by the closings. I lost a small sum of money, but since I was paying on a monthly contracted basis, I didn't lose a great deal. Other members who signed for long memberships and paid in cash were not so fortunate.

How can a person avoid this kind of a situation? That is hard to answer, as several health clubs have closed over the past few years. Does everyone remember The Cosmopolitan Lady, Little Bo's Health Club, and The Lincoln Health Club? The consumer's best bet is to go with a stable club which has long-term standing and a good reputation. I would recommend the YMCA, YWCA for those with tight budgets. For individuals with a little more to spend, try Wallbangers, The Prairie Life Center, or the Lincoln Racquet Club. The Alpha Fitness Centers and Sports Courts have also been around for awhile.


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Here and There Across the Nation

Gay Democratic activists reacted angrily to a statement by national party chairman Paul Kirk, Jr., calling gay rights a "fringe" issue that should not be a top priority of the party.

Roman Catholic Archbishop John Quinn agreed to pay an out-of-court settlement of \$2,250 to the Dick Kramer Gay Men's Chorale for his breach of contract with the Chorus.

A second San Francisco police officer, Niall Philpott, was sentenced to serve eight months in county jail for beating two gay men in August 1984.

After being threatened with a lawsuit, a chain of health food restaurants in Honolulu, Hawaii, has agreed not to discriminate in the hiring of gay men and women. Healthy's Natural Fast Foods job application form warned people not to apply if they engaged in "homosexual activity or knowingly associate with people who do."

Joining governors of four other states, New Mexico Governor Tony Anaya signed an executive order prohibiting employment discrimination by the state or by those who contract with the state on the basis of sexual preference. Other states with executive orders are New York, Ohio, California, and Pennsylvania.

The Baltimore gay rights bill was defeated by the Baltimore City Council by a vote of 11-7. This marked the second time that the Council has considered legislation protecting gays and lesbians; in 1980, the Council

rejected a similar measure by a 12-6 vote.

No Bad News, St. Louis' gay newspaper, announced that it will no longer use the Granite City Press Record-Journal as its printer after the printer refused to print the April edition unless the paper agreed to censor drawings promoting safe sex that depicted naked men touching one another.

The U.S. Department of Defense (DOD) wants civilian blood banks which collect blood at military installations to provide military health service agencies with the names of all service members who test positive for the HTLV-III antibody.

Gay activist Leonard Matlovich announced that he has submitted two proposed election initiatives to the Washington, D.C. Board of Elections and Ethics banning sex in D.C.'s gay bath houses. In 1975, Matlovich, a former Air Force sergeant, became the first person to challenge the military's ban on gay service members.

Paul Cameron who spoke to the United Students Association (USA) in Fayetteville, Arkansas, was picketed by over forty lesbians and gay men from the campus of the University of Arkansas and the community. USA was formed to oppose the funding of the gay and lesbian student association. Cameron, a Lincoln, NE resident called for a quarantine of all "homosexual males" to curb the spread of AIDS.

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Interview with Daniel Ondov

A former roommate of mine was raised by alcoholic parents. To this day the scent of alcohol makes him physically ill. Fundamentalist churches affect me in much the same way and for basically the same reason.

The Reverend Daniel Ondov, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church and member of the Board of Directors of ISIS, Paul Cameron's "research" organization, visited with me in his office not long ago. He told me that he really doesn't have much perspective on where ISIS is going because he has not been to any recent meetings due to time constraints. Mr. Ondov was also unwilling to speculate on the final outcome of what one newspaper columnist refers to as "the running feud between the fairies and the fundies." He also was not willing to say if he thought God would destroy America, saying he cannot read the mind of God.

He has no bashfulness about discussing the mind of God as it relates to homosexuality, though. "I am opposed to the evil of lesbianism and homosexuality based on the Scriptures and on common sense. God created two sexes, male and female. I pray God the homosexuals are not winning." He also said that America was becoming like Sodom and Gomorrah and suggested that if ever homosexuality becomes socially acceptable there is a possibility that this society may cease to exist.

When Jesus was on earth he spent a great deal of time with social outcasts such as prostitutes and Samaritans and much of his time castigating the religious leadership which condemned such. Jesus never mentioned homosexuality, yet Reverend Ondov suggested that the Scriptures are plain that Jesus opposed homosexuality. When I asked him if he thought

Jesus would serve on the board of ISIS, he laughed and said he did not know. It was one of two occasions during the interview that he laughed.


Pastor Ondov said that if he had a gay parishioner he would be "gentle but firm" though he was reluctant to speculate on how his church would respond to the individual. "I am a minister of the Gospel. I would be compelled to tell them they are breaking the laws of God but at the same time offer them the forgiveness of Christ, contingent on repentance." He did admit, though, that it would be difficult for him to continue a friendship if he found out a friend were gay because "I know how homosexuals are perverting the country." Of course, from a statistical standpoint, it is highly unlikely that Daniel Ondov has no homosexual parishioners.

The fundamentalist approach to homosexuality leaves a number of unanswered questions. For example, if homosexuals choose their sexual orientation, when does this choice take place? Your reporter cannot imagine someone being heterosexual up until one certain moment and then choosing to be gay. Is it a gradual process? I asked Reverend Ondov about this, and he said he didn't know but would guess it happens when a person first started practicing homosexuality. And if, as Ondov asserts, it is impossible to be a Christian and a practicing homosexual at the same time, how does fundamentalism account for the large number of Christians down through the ages who have been "practicing homosexuals" (whatever that is) including Charles Wesley, Bernard of Clairvaux, St. Augustine, and Corrie ten Boom?

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Gay Couples Stages IV & V

in this article, I will move into stage four and five. These stages are taken from McWhirter and Mattison's book The Male Couple. These stages span from five to ten years in stage four and eleven to twenty years in stage five.

Each stage builds on the past stages. The growth toward independence in stage three continues to grow in stage four. They have worked through the problems of monogamy in some way and have learned to deal with conflict in their relationship. There is usually increased collaboration on projects, and this can mean increased financial security and a more comfortable life-style.

The trust level continues to grow. The realization that the other partner is going to be there begins to feel more secure. Couples also have more options here. One partner can change jobs or go back to school easier because he or she knows that the other partner will be there if things get rough.

The intensity of the first few years is less. This means more energy for other things. The intense romantic times are still there, but not as often. Sometimes when looking at couples in this stage from an outsider's viewpoint, they can look boring or dull. This is misleading because the intensity one sees in the earlier stages takes a lot of energy and does not leave much time for individual growth and development of new friends.

The next stage again builds on the last one. For men, this stage brings a greater sense of trust. Many couples will now merge their financial resources if they have not already done so. This may be something that women have already accomplished. It is also a time of

change for each individual. Gail Sheehy, in her book Passages, talks about adult stages of development, and she identifies a stage in the middle thirties and forties as being part of the midlife passage. This time period for men and women affects their intimate relationships. Men begin dealing with the reality of where their careers will go before they retire. Many times women are just beginning their careers if they have been raising children up to this point and have much more need for independence and autonomy. Gay couples have some advantages in that each partner knows what the other partner is going through during this stage.

What McWhirter and Mattison found in male couples was increased monotony and taking each other for granted. The men had been together for so long that they lost that sense of the other person being special. This, along with their own developmental stage or passage, caused problems in the relationship.

In the later part of stage five is where I have seen male couples living parallel lives. I have not seen women couples in my practice at this stage and cannot compare. Many couples complain that the romance has gone out of their relationship and sometimes talk about dating each other again. Couples, once they are able to identify what is going on in the relationship, can be very creative at this point to bring back some of the earlier feelings.

It may sound pessimistic or depressing to talk about some of the problems in stage five, but couples also have more resources to deal with the problems too. In the straight community, couples have been using "Marriage Encounters"

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
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to help deal with some of these problems. Couples do not necessarily need intensive therapy here, but for the most part, they need to learn to talk to each other again. Working through the problems in this stage usually means being able to move into the next stage and staying together.

Police Attitude towards Lincoln's Gays

When Burt Neuborne, Legal Director of the American Civil Liberties Union, was in town a few months back, he told an audience that one of the differences between American police departments and European police departments is that American police do not automatically instill terror into all citizens, the criminal as well as the law abiding.

Chief Dean Leitner told me that the Lincoln Police Department considers itself a professional law enforcement agency that bends over backward to provide the same protection to all, regardless of sexual orientation or other minority status. He pointed out that last year every officer in the department was required to attend a sensitivity training session, at a cost to the city of \$6,000, in an effort to correct attitudes within the department about the values, feelings, and experiences of different people.

What then of conflicting signals we receive from the police department? On the one hand, there was an incident known as Antelope Park, a time that will live in infamy. A source from inside the mayor's office told me that Antelope Park happened in large part because of bad advice from the City Legal Department. Two sources within the police department told me that there will be police presence within Antelope Park, but not to the extent of another full scale operation. You, dear reader, are advised to use the greatest of caution if you are planning to go to the park this summer. Chief Leitner is of the opinion that sex in Antelope Park is indecent and said the police take a dim view of it. At the same time, there are other signals that the police department is becoming more progressive.

Last summer, we all had an opportunity to witness this first

hand when a delegation from the First Church of the Vinegar Baptism decided to leaflet outside the Boardwalk. When the police were called, they arrived within minutes and dealt with the situation as one would have expected them to deal with it at any other bar: the harassers were instructed to keep their distance, and the police were polite to all parties concerned. Not that many years ago, the police would have arrived three hours later and raided the bar. Two years ago, the police department helped bring to justice some drunk teenagers harassing people outside the Sanctuary.

The police department's attitude toward gay people is changing, just as its attitude toward blacks and other minorities is changing. Chief Leitner told me that he well remembered days of racism which are not over but certainly lessened. Gay people have not yet begun to make the strides toward social acceptance that are crucial, but at the same time, some progress has been made.

One of the biggest problems that any large department has in changing the attitudes of its members is not so much with the recruits as the old guard. It is much more difficult to unteach bigotry to an old bigot than a young bigot. I spoke with five people who have regular dealing with the police department and the unanimous feeling was that the vestiges of anti-gay bigotry that remain are mainly in the older officers.

I asked Chief Leitner in parting if he had anything special he wanted to tell the gay community. His response was that gay people who have been victimized by criminals should not hesitate to contact the police department and that the police will investigate crimes against gay people just as vigorously

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as against anyone else. He also said that the Internal Affairs Division wants to know about any instances of harassment and police misconduct that may occur. Police officers, of course, have the same human nature the rest of us do. That means that offic-

ers do occasionally treat people in a less than fair manner. Chief Leitner believes such instances to be isolated aberrations, however, and told me such aberrations will not be tolerated.

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



Julie Morgan's article, "Building a Good Relationship," is a touching narrative about two wimmin in a loving, beautiful relationship, and I appreciate the sensitivity with which it was written. I question, how-

ever, the assertions that "many gay young wimmin get bored quickly with a relationship, moving continually from one lover to the next." This is just not true among the wimmin that I know personally; in fact, most lesbians (and straight wimmin) seek long-lasting,

continued

committed relationships--and struggle to develop and maintain their relationships. Some don't work out in the long run, but not very many lesbian wimmin intentionally skip from one lover to another. I suspect that Julie Morgan is still thinking in terms of her past in the male community where a lot of gay and heterosexual men do move in and out of relationships (the very nature of these relationships being fairly different from ours).

Also, I know there are not a lot of gay (or straight) men who understand why lesbians choose to spell "woman" without the m-e-n. For us, it is a conscious usage recognizing our autonomy--we are saying that wimmin need not base their gender, sexuality, and total identity on men or male standard. We no longer accept the idea that woman is the opposite of everything male. While I do not expect any woman to inheritantly share our consciousness, I wonder if Julie Morgan understands this ideology considering the origin of her perspective (as male).


