

Ron Paul's '90s Newsletters Spew Antigay Sentiment

The New Republic has uncovered newsletters from current presidential candidate Ron Paul that are loaded with antigay and racist rants.

The newsletters dealing with gay content came from the Ron Paul Political Report or the Ron Paul Survival Report and were released in the 1990s (the entirety of the newsletters date back to the '70s). Many of the homophobic diatribes blame gay men for AIDS. An issue of the Ron Paul Survival Re-



port from 1994 states that "those who don't commit sodomy, who don't get blood a transfusion, and who don't swap needles, are virtually assured of not getting AIDS unless they are deliberately infected by a malicious gay."

A newsletter from 1990 waxed nostalgic for the days when gays were shamed into living in the closet.

Paul's newsletters often attacked African-Americans, as well; one issue claimed Martin Luther King, Jr. was a pedophile. It's not yet clear if Paul himself wrote the articles.

The use of recycled materials; formaldehyde-free insulation. nontoxic paint, and intelligent energy-aware construction methods are just a few of the ways to create a more Earth-friendly home.

Optimum Value Engineering (OVE) techniques are those design and framing strategies for wood or "stick-built" construction that were developed by the Forest Products Laboratory in collaboration with the National Association of Home Builders. Buildings employing OVE practices use less lumber and achieve higher insulation values without compromising structural integrity.

That translates into lower construction costs and less energy consumption over the life of the home. The amount of lumber bought, transported, wasted due to overage, and transported away from the site as trash is greatly reduced, while thermal and acoustic insulation is boosted.

A study conducted by the National Association of Home Builders Research Center (NAHBRC) found that OVE framing techniques can potentially save as much as \$1.20 per square foot when compared with conventional wood framing methods.

Pre-fabricated architecture is also making progressive strides forward. An entire generation of green designers is offering aesthetically award-winning houses and condos that can be built quickly in a modular manner, because much of the work is done off-site. That not only reduces environmental impact but also saves the homebuyer substantial expense.

Systems and Appliances

There are a variety of ways to harness green energy as a homeowner, and one of the best is to install appliances rated with the Energy Star designation. Some states even offer "healthy home" certification for energy efficiency that can qualify the homeowner for tax rebates or other perks.

Passive heating and cooling techniques can be also employed by almost any homeowner to capture or deflect solar heat with a reflective roof, intensive insulation, or just strategically placed old-fashioned ceiling fans. An open floor plan with good crossventilation, in fact, can actually reduce energy bills significantly by making a home easier to cool in summer - so green options do not necessarily have to be radically futuristic.

For those who decide to install solar panels or wind turbines. there is an increasing amount of government support being offered. Both state and federal tax incentives are available, depending upon where you live, and many local utility companies also provide assistance.

The utility company may, for example, help install the equipment or share the cost of the system. Homeowners who tie their panels and turbines into a public grid can also "run the meter backwards" by selling the excess energy that they produce back to the utility company. Then the power will be redistributed so it can be used by other customers who share the grid.

Green Products for the Home

Homeowners can also choose more environmentally safe and beneficial products such as "on-demand" water heaters, energy efficient light bulbs, low-VOC paints, and flooring or counter top products made from renewable materials like bamboo, cork, and recycled plastic or glass.

Conventional house paints contain toxic Volatile Organic Compounds (VOC). But low or zero-VOC paints and finishes perform just as well and they are more pleasant to use because they do not have the strong odors associated with high-VOC paints.

Cork bark can be sustainably harvested without damaging the health of the cork tree. Then it grows back within a year or two. Cork is a great insulator and is unusually resilient - making it exceptionally comfortable underfoot. It also cleans up easily and is acoustically superior, so it is a quiet choice for any room in the house.

Bamboo is harder and more durable than many varieties of hardwood, yet it also happens to be the fastest growing plant on the planet. As one of the most rapidly renewable sources of potential building materials on Earth, it is also beautiful to look at and gives off a warmth and glow that will enhance any ambience at a highly competitive price.

If you decide to build an outdoor deck, check out the newer decking materials made from recycled plastics. They look and perform like wood but have none of the harsh chemicals and annoying splinters that are found in conventional pressuretreated lumber. Maintain a healthy canopy of trees outside to shade the home and reduce air conditioning costs, keeping in mind that trees and plants clean the air - making the environment better for everyone.

Same-Sex Couples Pay More Taxes

CNNMoney reports that the federal government's lack of recognition of same-sex marriages, which forces legally married couples to file separately on their federal returns, results in as much as \$6,000 per year in additional taxes.

Not only are these couples losing out because they can't take advantage of the lower tax rates that come from combining incomes and deductions, says to the article, it's "also harder for them to qualify for certain tax breaks because the credits phase out sooner for single filers."

"It's costing these families thousands of dollars a year, as well as the emotional pain and suffering," said Ken Weissenberg, a partner at accounting firm EisnerAmper and one-half of a same-sex married couple.

CNNMoney based their information on a series of same-sex versus opposite-sex tax scenarios it presented to H&R Block. A seemingly equal household with one working parent earning \$100,000 per year and one stay-at-home parent earning nothing produced radically different results when toggled between opposite-sex and same-sex situations.

While a heterosexual couple can file jointly and divide their assets, the homosexual couple must file separately, the breadwinning spouse as "head of household" and the non-earning spouse as "qualifying relative."

In this particular scenario, says the article, the same-sex house-hold would owe \$4,543 more tax than the opposite-sex house-hold. This is because the "head of household" designation pushes more income into a higher tax bracket and the individual filings provide lower standard deductions than "married and filing jointly." The gay head of household is also subjected to a tax on the stay-at-home spouse's health insurance premiums that the heterosexual breadwinner isn't responsible for.

In addition to lowered benefits, same-sex couples who live in a marriage equality state often end up having to fill out twice as many forms when filing their state and federal returns. The additional — and generally more complicated — filings result in higher fees from their tax preparers.

Not that it's not worth it, says Weissenberg, who says, "If I had to pay twice as much in taxes to be married to my husband, I would."

Let Your Money Talk to Help LGBT Organizations

A new report shows that less than 3% of LGBT adults in the U.S. gave money to any national LGBT organization, but that hasn't stopped those who don't donate from criticizing.

I repeatedly hear and see criticism of LGBT organizations and their leaders. The chatter machine gripes about why the Defense of Marriage Act hasn't been repealed yet, why transgender persons are not always included in proposed legislation, and even why there is a glut of gay charity summer pool parties.

LGBT people sure like to talk about the work of gay social justice groups; but far too often, they criticize without doing much to help.

While serving on the board of directors for Equality California for the last few years, and while helping support other groups financially or otherwise, I found myself immersed in dialogue about the LGBT rights movement. I'm all for constructive criticism. No entity or person is beyond reproach, and feedback from the community is always good. But much criticism comes from people who donate no money to any LGBT group (let alone contribute time to serve).

In 2010, less than 3% of LGBT adults in the U.S. gave money to any national LGBT organizations; the number of donors who gave \$35 or more to LGBT non-profits dropped 12%. These disheartening statistics were reported by the Movement Advancement Project in its recently released 2011 National LGBT Movement Report. (Fortunately, the report found LGBT organizations remain fiscally healthy due to support from other sources.) If the LGBT community wants progress toward full equality, the other 97% of us need to financially support the organizations that fight our fights.

With the holiday season and tax year-end upon us, now is the perfect time to contribute and let your money talk for you.

Why don't LGBT people give money? Let's debunk the most

common reasons I hear.

I can't afford it.

That's a legitimate concern in today's tight economy. And most people cannot afford the larger amounts that LGBT organizations historically favor for their marquee fundraising events. But certainly far more than 3% of the LGBT adult population can afford to give \$35, \$50 or even \$100 a year. Give up a few more cocktails; your waistline will appreciate it and so will your local or national LGBT group. With the rise of email and online solicitations, organizations welcome small donations.

I give with my time, not with my money.

Let's fully applaud everyone who gives their time to serve LGBT rights in some fashion. Our movement needs passionate volunteers, and there's a good argument that donating time is more meaningful than just writing a check. But if you can give time and cash, that's even better. No matter how many volunteer hours an LGBT organization receives, it still needs money to do its work.

Someone else will give.

This notion rests on civic laziness, the belief that someone else will create for you the world that you want. It's a sad state of affairs when we ask our straight allies to donate to our cause while less than 3% of LGBT adults do the same. It's even a sadder state when you realize that antigay opponents routinely outspend (by multiples) our LGBT groups.

My contribution to certain organizations is

not tax deductible.

Some of the most important work to advance LGBT equality is done by political advocacy groups that do not qualify as 501(c) (3) charitable organizations. For these entities, raising money can be more difficult but they need our monetary support to fight at the legal and political front line. Moreover, the political advocacy groups typically have a tax-exempt sister entity. (For example, the Human Rights Campaign has the HRC Foundation; Equality California has its Equality California Institute.) Still, gay dollars still do not flow enough to the tax-exempt organizations. And for the many LGBT groups that do in fact hold 501(c)(3) status (such as the Gay, Lesbian & Straight Education Network), there is little excuse for not donating to their charitable work.



Growth is a Decision

I was listening to a CD by Texas Enneagram teacher Suzanne Stabile and she made the above statement. I think it's particularly relevant as the new year approaches and many of us aspire to changing our lives in 2012.

As a psychotherapist to the LGBT for many years' now, I've observed a few developmental growth patterns in our community:



Age 27-35: I am beginning to have a more solid sense of myself. I may even try meditating, yoga or something like that. I am still young and cute, but I am leaving my twink identity behind, which is both sad and a big relief. I'm starting to make more money, and this feels good.

Age 35-45: My young and cute phase is ending; I may start buying anti-wrinkle products from Nordstrom and asking my hair stylist about "color" to hide my gray. I'm considering settling down with one partner and one career, for a while, anyway.

Age 45-55: Panic: omigod, I'm really getting older. I'm halfway through life and the first half wasn't so great. What do I want the second half to be? I want to make some changes, but I don't know how to do it. I don't want to have a Midlife Crisis, but I think I'm having one anyway.

Age 55-65: Well, here I am. I'm older. How do I feel about it? What can I do about it? I have too many wrinkles to fight, too much gray hair to dye and my stomach will probably never be flat again. Can I make peace with all of this, or am I going to fight tooth-and-nail?

Age 65 and over: Do I want to retire? How am I going to spend my time? I'm facing some physical challenges: how do I live in this aging body when it won't do what I want it to? I may be lonelier than when I was younger: I often feel invisible in the LGBT world.

These are generalizations, of course, but can you relate? As we age, we are given new gifts, talents and opportunities. Growth never ends and a new year often brings a desire to change things. But, do you really expect that a "new" year is going to change your life?

When I have a new client who says, "I want to change so many things in my life, but how do I start?" I encourage him or her to do the following:

Make a list of all the things that bother you and rate these problems (on a scale of 1 to 10) by how much pain each one brings you. For example, "I hate my job" is a 7, "I feel so lonely" is a 9, "I don't like my body" is a 3.

Start to work on the most painful stuff first, focusing on one problem at a time, breaking it down into small, do-able action steps. For example, saying "I hate my job" over-and-over is only going to bring you misery. Instead, ask yourself questions like: "What about my job bothers me the most? What do I like about it?"

Any seemingly unsolvable problem can be broken down into a series of "smaller", more easily solved problems.

Want to really speed the change process up? Be kinder to yourself starting right now. This may sound counter-intuitive if you want to change, but it isn't. Most of us have beaten ourselves up mentally for years; has this gotten us where we want to be? That's not the way to do it. To help yourself, try this:

Make a list of 10 ways that you can be kinder to yourself. It doesn't matter how "big" or "small" your kindnesses are, write 'em down.

Beginning today, start to do some of them. I recommend you start with 3 a day and see how that goes.

You can always add to your list. Post it somewhere you'll see it frequently, like on your refrigerator or bathroom mirror. I guarantee you that by being kinder to yourself, any changes you want to make in your life will happen more quickly and painlessly.

I wish you a 2012 full of conscious, joy-producing changes!

ments for January 12, the day the registry officially opens, have already been booked.

"I think there's going to be incredible interest," Equality Florida field director Joe Saunders said. "We're going to see a big surge in the beginning."

Orlando became the first city in Central Florida to recognize the relationships of same-sex couples when it unanimously approved a domestic-partnership registry earlier this month. And while the registry won't provide the legal benefits of a civil union or a marriage, it will allow registered partners hospital visitation, healthcare decision-making privileges, and the right to make funeral arrangements at institutions within Orlando city limits.

"It's not as many rights as marriage, but it helps couples during very difficult times," said Orlando Commissioner Patty Sheehan, who pushed for the law and who, along with partyer Jocelynn White, is slated to be an early signer of the registry.

The registry is also open to opposite-sex couples.

Gay Marriage Repeal a Top Issue in New Hampshire

Repealing New Hampshire's gay marriage law, legalizing casinos and changing the constitution to bar an income tax are among the hottest topics facing the Legislature heading into 2012, but lawmakers might not vote on these issues until after the Jan. 10 presidential primary.

House Republican Leader D.J. Bettencourt says the House most likely won't cast its votes until Jan. 11 or Jan 18. Bettencourt says the presidential candidates should have the spotlight until after the primary.

"The presidential candidates have a hard enough time getting their message out. This is the time for them to shine. We want them to get all the attention possible," said Bettencourt, of Salem.

When the Legislature convenes Jan. 4, it will instead take up a handful of vetoed bills before taking up legislation held over the summer and fall

Both sides of the gay marriage debate expect the Republicancontrolled House to pass the bill that would replace the law legalizing same-sex marriage with civil unions for any unmarried adults, including relatives. The measure would allow anyone to refuse to recognize civil unions.

The Republican-controlled Senate also is expected to support repealing gay marriage, but Senate Republican Leader Jeb Bradley said he can't predict if there will be the votes needed to override a veto.

Democratic Gov. John Lynch promises to veto the bill if it reaches him

Since the same-sex marriage law took effect last year, more than 1,800 gay couples have gotten married in New Hampshire, the state Division of Vital Records shows.

Though advocates of the repeal bill say those marriages would remain legal under the measure, critics aren't so sure. They argue the bill is so flawed that existing marriages may not be recognized by the courts.

"Civil unions has to be in the bill if we're going to pass something and marriages that occurred while legal have to be grandfathered," Bradley said. "My understanding is the bill doesn't do either of those things. For me, that is a problem, personally."

The House put off voting on the bill last session to keep the focus on the state budget. Republicans campaigned on promises they would pass legislation resulting in more jobs and GOP leaders did not want other issues to be a distraction.

But despite efforts to tamp down the debate, Republican presidential candidates were put on the spot to give their positions on gay marriage, not just the economy.

And a bipartisan group supporting the gay marriage law is soon launching a television ad defending it and urging lawmakers not to vote to repeal it. The 30-second ad shows people saying New Hampshire believes in freedom for everyone.


