If I put that pink triangle on my car, someone might hurt me, or hurt my car, or do something to hurt someone else who might be with me. These thoughts were with me for three weeks. Day in and day out I would take the pink triangle out of my purse, look at it, feel the fear, put it back in my purse and so it went.

Finally at the end of three weeks I put the sticker on my car and thought to myself why am I so scared about this simple little thing. I've been out for a good five years and in the public eye, but now I am experiencing fear, real or perceived or perhaps my own internalized homophobia? I really couldn't figure it out but it was a relief to finally have that step taken.

A few weeks later some friends and my partner went out to eat. When we came out of the restaurant, we all walked over to my car. Upon seeing the bumper sticker one of the people said, "Oh, I see you have a slow moving vehicle!" I looked at him and he said isn't that what that symbol means?

I explained the meaning of the pink triangle to him and laughed at my own fears. He said "I had no idea that's what the pink triangle meant, I thought you had a slow moving vehicle." I laughed and said "Sometimes I do have a slow moving vehicle as some of my friends could attest to, but that's not what this means." It means I am proud to be a lesbian and proud to be out, even when it takes three weeks to take a step. At least I got it done and I don't have the fears I once harbored

GREG KOWAL REWARD FUND SUCCESSFUL

During the last weeks of August, as the September issue of the New Voice was being put to bed, the idea came up of offering a reward to find the people who murdered Greg Kowal. The New Voice was prepared to lead such a movement but, when we learned that a friend of Greg's had already started to work on a reward fund, we joined friends, co-workers, bars and organizations in the community to raise money for a reward.

The information on the initial meeting was spread by word of mouth. 20 people showed up at the first meeting and the Greg Kowal Reward Fund was born. The group, led by Jeff J., agreed to work to raise money for a reward fund and to distribute flyers asking people with information to contact CrimeStoppers. Over \$4000 was pledged at that first meeting. Bob Ewing, of Printing Plus, donated the first flyers. 2,000 flyers were stuffed by hand into the September issue of the New Voice thanks to the willing hands of members of the steering committee and staff, an old friend of the New Voice-Bill S., and volunteers from Citizens for Equal Protection. Flyers were distributed to bars and businesses in downtown Omaha and to the area where Greg's car and his body were found. The Times of the Heartland featured the flyer in their newspaper and donated printing of additional flyers. Don Randolph held a news conference with TV and radio stations announcing the Reward Fund.

Duane S., a local businessman, agreed to set up the reward fund with a local bank. This was not as easy as it seemed. Duane first went to First National Bank. They were happy to set up an account, until they learned what it was for. Then they had to call a Vice President and came back with the word that they weren't interested. No further explanation was given. So he went to Norwest and was again greeted politely and positively until they realized what the account was for. Then he was told he would have to deal with the "Commercial Accounts" section and

they only saw people by appointment. So Duane tried a third time and finally hit the Jackpot at FirsTier: They were happy to set up the account and give directions for people to contribute - all they had to do was send the money to "The Greg Kowal Reward Fund" at any FirsTier bank. (Makes me pleased that I bank at FirsTier.) And it worked just like they said it would.

Of course, there were details to be ironed out like a Federal I.D. number which meant setting up officers; and working with CrimeStoppers who featured the crime as one of their crimes of the week - but FirsTier was always quite helpful and the donations came from individuals and from businesses. The total grew and grew

Then, finally, about three weeks after the reward fund was established, the much hoped for phone call came. The caller wanted to know about this reward that was being offered and had a tip for the police. The police told members of the group that before the reward was issued they were without leads in the case. The vital information was a direct result of the efforts of the Reward Fund. The informant only called the police after seeing one of the flyers.

I'm sure you all know the rest of the story. Three men were arrested and charges were filed of murder and of being an accessory to murder. The police report that the motive for the brutal murder appears to have been robbery. The three

are now in jail, waiting for trial.

The informant came forward and received the reward of over \$5,000 for information that led to the arrest. The Reward Fund has been closed and the group disbanded, leaving issues of Hate Crimes and self-defense to other groups to pursue. This group's job is done. They raised the money, they distributed the information, and they provided the impetus for someone to come forward with information that led to the arrest. Pretty impressive for a handful of people who came together one August afternoon. You did a great job.

Dear Editor,

I am writing this letter in the hope that you will put it in your magazine. I am in hopes of getting a pen pal. I came into possession of your address from a gay friend of mine here in prison.

Yes, I am in prison and I will be for some time to come. I hope that doesn't matter much, or any at all. I have, or have had, a lot of gay/bisexual friends out in California when I was out in free society. Seems like I am forgotten now that I'm locked up though. A lot of folks tend to forget you when you go into lock up.

What's killing me is that I found out about two years ago, why I've been in trouble so often in my life. I was diagnosed with a mild form of manic/depression, but now that I know I have it, I take medication and I have no more trouble in

The discovery/revelation of the fact that I have manic/depression (and that I will probably not get into trouble again in my life) means little when you're stuck in prison with no friends and no one to support you in any way whatsoever. I'm not doing too good in here this time around, because I'm discovered that I'm not really a criminal, (in the most socially accepted sense of

My crimes were committed before I knew I



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was manic/depressive, and now that I take my medication, I can't get along with any real criminals, because I don't have a criminal mind

I hope everyone can understand what I'm saving to them about all this. I figured if anyone could, or if any one could have any compassion at all, it would be the gay/bisexual community, because they don't get treated real good a lot of the time either.

I think that is a damn shame also, because it has been my experience that the before mentioned are some of the best people around. Now, I told my friend I was going to be honest right from the start of this, and that's how I basically am anyway, unless someone lies to me first, then I feel justified

With that in mind I'm going to say I'm not going to beg anyone for friendship, money or anything else, after all we are all human beings and we already know we all have all kinds of

I'm not going to promise anyone that I will visit in the visiting room here, or kiss, touch, or otherwise have some kind of sex with them. All I can promise is I will write to you, and I really will be your friend.

I would like to be able to tell you anything, and would like for you to be able to tell me anything. To have a <u>real</u> friendship is the main thing. One can play "touchy feely" anywhere, and if that's all your interested in, then go for broke out there in the free world, and don't bother to get started writing to me.

Lets don't waste one anothers time, is my message to all who can understand. Let's be real, and make sense in all things.

Thank you for giving us the opportunity to respond to Scott and Tracy's concerns,

The Board of Governors has not been idle during the time since the burglary. We have initiated several actions with regards to the situation:

1) We removed Joe Reed as treasurer.

We did internal checks of the books to determine the actual loss.
 We established regular contact with the

police regarding the case.

4) We selected an audit committee.

5) We secured the ICON records from Joe. 6) We made public announcements through The New Voice and The Times of the Heartland to inform the community of the loss of funds and to

The New Voice and The Times of the Heartland to inform the community of the loss of funds and to keep the community informed of the progress of the situation.

7) We determined at our July 12 meeting

that we would give the police two months to apprehend the burglar who had signed a confession to the burglary in front of five witnesses.

 We conducted an audit of our books from January 1, 1993, up to the time Joe was officially removed as treasurer on July 12, 1993.

9) We listened to community members as they expressed sorrow at our loss, anger about the burglary, anger at our "inactivity," concern for what we were going to do, support for Joe though he made a foolish mistake, and countless questions about the incident in general.

At the same time that we were doing all of this, we also felt bound by our commitment to you the gay and lesbian community of Nebraska and SW lowa to continue "business as usual." That meant we were busy planning and conducting the July Fourth Picnic-which had over 400 people in attendance. That meant two weeks after that that we conducted the Investiture of the new royal family members. From then until September, we put much of our energies into our biggest PWA fundraiser of the year: the Pre-Labor Day Picnic and the raffles. As you well know, the weather turned against us and we were only able to raise \$1,435.00 for the PWA Assistance Fund, but the effort still took 100's of hours to pull off. And of course during all of this time, there were loose ends from Memorial Day and Coronation and then Investiture that we had to deal with

"Business as usual" in our minds was an important concept to instill in the community's mind. The Imperial Court of Nebraska had served this community well for twelve years, and we wanted each person and each group to know that

we were going to continue to serve them.

The list of what the monarchs and board

members have been doing during the past three months since the burglary goes on and on: shows, meetings, etc.

At the September 13 meeting, the Board of Governors voted to take four direct actions regarding the situation. Those actions are spelled out in another article here in *The New Voice*. We hope that these actions will put to rest the concerns that have been raised in the community.



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ALLIGATORS

In the past months we as a community have much to rejoice in. The national attention since the April march has been outstanding. Even with the minor set backs, it appears we can only move forward. These accomplishments should revive and reinforce our position to achieve equal rights and all other established goals. However, there are a couple of concerns that continue to plague our community. One of the largest of these obstacles are alligators.

It is well know that alligators cat their young and like them there are those of us who feed and devour other members. The example below will

help illustrate

The company 1 presently work for is homophobic. Words like faggot, dyke, fairy, queer, etc. are commonly used in this environment to describe our people. One night last mouth, "lack Shit," a gay man, who is employed with this firm, spotted "Professional Man", a supervisor, at one of the local gay clubs. The next day at work, with great relish, "lack Shit" proceeded to inform "Ms. Monster Mouth," the company gossip, of the observation and added a few embellishments to insure a strong impact. Within four hours both floors of the building had been informed. This story was heavily discussed in hallways, lunchrooms and all other work areas, "Professional Man" completely retreated and withdrew into his office. "Jack Shit" gained in popularity and rumors of "Professional Man's" termination were rampant.

The unfortunate fact of this tale is that not only is it true, but in the three companies I have worked for, this is the fourth time I have witnessed this catastrophe. Even more intolerable is that un each circumstance It was one gay person sacrificing another for the shear delight of the heterosexual community. Why do we eat our own? If this practice is allowed to go unchecked, we will end up playing into the hands of our opponents. We should not have to waste our precious resources, time and money to repair the damage we inflict upon ourselves.

These acts of treason impair the gay community. In the above example some of our losses amounted to the following:

1) a potential supporter

- robbed a person of the right to select the appropriate time to come out
 pushed closet homosexuals further
- pushed closet homosexuals further back
- showed the heterosexual community that there is no gay community
- The creation of an atmosphere of mistrust.

This is what we sacrificed in order for "Jack Shit" to gain temporary popularity. His act was valueless. The internal break-down effect is senseless.

The gay clubs and events must provide safehavens for homosexuals to experience their gay family without fear. After all how many of us had their first real sense of community at a club or event? How would you feel only to be punished for this experience? The sanctity of these places must be protected and respected. If we tarnish our sanctorums we are lost.

SPECIAL RIGHTS

To dismiss the grievances of gay people on the basis of "special rights" is an outrage. We are beaten in the street, dismissed from our jobs and denied basic rights of citizenship, all on the basis of our lifestyle "choice." Cay people don't need legal protection because of our lifestyle supposed choice or private sexual behavior. We need it because of the pervasive haired and persecution visited upon us by straight people. Once you stop treating us as a special class, we will not need legal protections.

A GOOD PLACE TO RAISE KIDS

A ruling of the Vermont Supreme Court has established the legal rights of gay parents. Overturning a probate court decision, the Vermont Court has ruled that a lesbian mother's partner may legally adopt their child without losing parental rights. Deborah Lashman will now proceed in the adoption of Jane Van Buren's two sons. The couple has been together and living as a family for seven years. They had previously been denied the legal status of same-sex parents.

In the decision which side-stepped the question of marriage, Judge Denise Johnson put emphasis on the welfare of the children. She wrote, "When social mores change, governing statutes must be interpreted to allow for those changes in a manner that does not frustrate the purpose behind their enactment, we are mindful that the states primary concern is to promote the welfare of children."

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A WOMAN'S RIGHT TO CHOOSE

Diversity is a word I have heard used frequently in describing the March on Washington. Unity is what the march represented and what has been written about extensively Lack of unity, and its accompanying empathy, is often lamented on these pages. It is discouraging to read about the segregation of gay men and lesbians and the mutual attacks of the militant and the mainstream. However, I believe these rifts are mended, albeit temporarily, with events such as the March. I have never believed that there is a gay 'community' and I don't think there needs needs to be one. What we had in Washington was a forced alliance of many diverse groups demanding what all have been denied: basic civil rights. So, we come back home and fall back into our own separate groups, perhaps not interacting until the next march or pride parade. Nevertheless, the important thing is we can be an assemblage which is unified and powerful. In Washington, we showed how very different we are as individuals, yet how powerful we are as a determined, cohesive unit demanding our rights. Singly, we have the power of our phone calls and letters. As a group, we feel the power.

I've chosen to focus on reproductive choice because on April 25, we marched past two men holding a sign which read: "PRO-LIFE GAYS." I am proud to report that the entire Rhode Island contingent broke into a spontaneous chant of "Pro-choice! Pro-choice!" It was ironic that these men, ostensibly there to demand rights, were seeking to deny the rights of others.

Just as homophobes wish to control the lives of gays with sodomy laws, a military ban, and the denial of legal matrimony, the anti-choice set seeks to control the bodies of women. These people cannot see how evil they are because they are blinded by their self-righteousness, their latted, and their loyalty to the the distorted biblical interpretations of their clergy. Allowing their authority figures to decide what is acceptable and what is not, the anti-choice people feel they are doing merely what is right. They choose to force their own beliefs upon everyone. This is tragic when applied to the very personal decision of whether or not to terminate a pregnancy.

Adoption is often referred to as an alternative to abortion by those who wish to make this decision for a woman. Yet, there are children now who are virtually unadoptable. Minority and special needs children are often difficult to place with earing families. Older children move from foster home to foster home when they become too troublesome. Babies born with AIDS are being abandoned in hospitals, where this is no hope of parental bonding. These facts always seem to elude those who oppose abortion. They don't have solutions.

They prefer that a child be physically, sexually, or psychologically abused as long as it a living human being. The arguments of the anti-choice group are never logical because the issue of abortion rights is a very simple one.

As the National Abortion Rights Action League asks: "Who decides — you or them?" It is tyrannical for any government to take control of person's body. It is fascinating how controversial such a basic right can be made to seem by those wishing to deny that right.

How can people have more extensive rights when they don't even have the rights to their own bodies.

What right does anyone have to force a woman to give birth against her will? The anti-choice people cannot answer that question without referring to a god or their religious beliefs. There are no valid defenses to support the arguments of the anti-choicers. This is why they have resorted to violence.

Having failed to convince people to espouse their ideas, many anti-choice activists have chosen bully tactics such as intimidating young women and blocking the entrances to abortion clinics. Some have burned and bombed buildings. An anti-choice group just bought a financially-troubled abortion clinic in Tennessee in order to close it down. It is the state's only clinic. And we cannot forget Dr. David Gunn, murdered by a fanatic anti-choicer. These people call themselves pro-lifers have no respect for the lives nor rights of others.

To me, pro-life means encouraging the use of condoms, and dental dams, addressing lesbian health issues such as breast cancer, and supporting needle exchange programs. It does not mean making decisions for others, as the Right To (Control Your) Life Committee believes. The right to control one's own body is paramount for

These misguided 'pro-life' gay men should be grateful that they will never have to make a decision about something they find so distasteful. They should realize that abortion is not a gay issue. Nor is it a woman's issue. It is a woman's decision and hers alone.

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"HOPEFUL IN OMAHA" —THE RESPONSES

The wait is over! The results are in! In August, an article entitled "Hopeful in Omaha" asked readers to give "expert" feedback on whether long-term relationships between males was possible. That unscientific study yielded numerous responses:

Letters were received, not only from Omaha and Lincoln, but from Central City, NE, Salina, KS, and from as far away as New Jersey, Respondents ranged in ages from 25 to 72 and have been involved in their respective relationships for one to sixteen years. Some respondents were previously involved in heterosexual marriages. Some have children. Some consider themselves to be involved in service or labor positions while others describe themselves as degreed professionals.

Of the letters and responses received, only one couple indicated that they had an "open" relationship, although it should be noted that this couple of 3 years does not currently reside together. Therefore, their responses did not meet this informal study's criteria for consideration as a "couple".

Without exception, every other response was resoundingly affirming that gay male couples are alive and well in the Midwest!

Some of the respondents were quite articulate in their descriptions. I have elected to reprint excerpts of some of our letters, anonymously, in overte.

I hope you will enjoy the thoughts they shared as much as I, and I thank every respondent for your willingness to share your stories with us, and for your commitment to your respective life partners.

Here is what they said:

"[My partner] and I met uneventfully more than five years ago. No fireworks, no bells. We were friendly, and as we talked about ourselves and our dreams, we saw immediately that our philosophies meshed. We both believed in a lifetime commitment — growing old together was something to look forward to and to be cherished.

And now, many years later, we have built our lives into something meaningful and important. We have different interest, hobbies, work goals and personalities; but we know that above the differences is our 'union'. Although no ceremony was necessary to cement our intentions, we wearings that illustrate our commitment to one another—a commitment that does not allow 'wandering'.

Actually. I find this sincere, secure loving relationship empowers me to concentrate more strongly on my other goals. If I had to even consider the question of infidelity, I would be too distracted to grow spiritually, mentally, socially, or in any other way. Again, it goes to my belief structure, but I would rather be alone than in an 'open relationship."

Another respondent shared the following

story:

1 an 34 years old; my spouse is 35. We are celebrating our 16th anniversary in September. We met in college (my first week) and fell in love one year later. We have two children (via surrogacy), ages 1 and 3.

When we met, both of us were virgins (gay or straight). Since that time, our relationship has been monogamous. YUP! Put both of us down for a grand total of one partner. We skew most surveys we've even seen on numbers of sexual natures.

We chose monogamy because it works for us. Initially our expectations of the relationship included monogamy because our parents had successful marriages that were are presumably monogamous. As we become more familiar with other gay couples and the open-closed relationship debate in our community, we discussed what we wanted out of the relationship and for both of us, it included monogamy."

One reader suggested the following list of 'guidelines' for those seeking a healthy, monogamous relationship:

Tistablish some kind of relationship that is not initially based on sex. Date for a while and don't immediately hop into bed and expect instant compatibility because the sex is good.

2. Be honest with yourself. Know who you are and what you are about before you drag someone else into your sphere of intimacy. Be honest about your perception of the person you find yourself falling in love with. If there is anything that you want the other person to change, chances are the relationship will fail. There is always room for improvement, but if you love the other because of his shortcomings instead of in spite of them you may have success in sight.

3. Be honest with each other. Sometimes our emotional state may not reflect our true feelings. In other words, give each other permission to be human. We've all got bitchy days which doesn't reflect that we don't love the other anymore or that we want the relationship to be over.

 Take risks with each other. By this I mean risk sharing yourself with each other. Allow yourself to be known more and more as the

relationship progresses.

5. Don't expect to have all your needs fulfilled by your partner and don't expect yourself to meet all of his needs. Anyone who is honest with himself knows that emotional, psychological, and spiritual health are much more important to a

person's well-being than sexual gratification 6. Communicate! This is probably the most important aspect of a successful relationship. Not just words, but meanings have to be clear.

7. Don't be afraid to ask for help outside of the relationship. Find a trusted friend or a counselor

One other thing...opposites do attract and often times are initially very exciting to one another, but I have found that there has to be some common interests and goals in order to make it last, along with a common commitment between two people."

So, for those of us looking for role models in the community, take heart because the responses received during this informal study seem to indicate that they do exist, they are in every community, and monogamy between males is working.

My faith in the ability of our community to find creative solutions to problems has, once again, been restored. And to the "real experts" who wrote or called ...thank you.

Does It Exist in the Omaha Gay Community?

It amazes me, and I guess it really shouldn't. Here we are in the 20th century, fighting for equal/human rights for gay chizens, to be accepted as we are with no apologies or explanations. Yet, I don't think that we see the irony in treating our negatively as we seek respect and affirmation.

What do I mean? Well, what's the difference in straight people calling me "laggot", "queer" on "homo" and you, my gay brothers and sisters, calling me "nigger", "spic", "chink", or "dago"? What's the difference in my getting "bashed" by heterosexuals who hate me because of my homosexuality and getting "bashed" by white people who hate me because of my race or ethnicity? Get to know me before you judge me.

What amazes me is that, after years of persecution because of our homosexuality, we do not look upon other minority groups with compassion. You "fags", "queers", and "dykes" basically know what it's like to be called "nigger", etc., because it is the same thing... bigotry!!! Yet, you march with PRIDE to show your diversity.

I'm not saying that your experiences are any less annoying than mine, or any less severe. But before you judge me, stop and THINK! It's not only painful to be treated this way, it's also maddening. Many people wonder why so many minority males have quit trying, why there are so many negative attitudes. It is almost an exercise in futility to continue trying to be expected as as a human being, an individual, and not be judged by one characteristic or trait. Continually tunning into the walls and road blocks of bigotry obstructing daily living can be enough to stop a weak person.

Think about that friend, or that time you were beaten because you were presumed "inferior", or that you were "different". Think about all the violence and ignorance before you shun or degrade me or any other minority for or because of our differences. Think about true diversity and think about our community. Does true diversity exist? What can you do about that? Think about it as you ask to be treated humanely with dignity, respect and acceptance. How can unity exist in the gay community when we allow and encourage societal and cultural divisions to remain in place?

True diversity can't and won't exist until you and I accept each other as equals and work toward a common goal, for my input is as important as yours.

NATIONAL COMING OUT DAY EVENT IDEAS

BE VISIBLE

Plan a 'Queer Visibility Field Trip'. Wear NCOD t-shirts, buttons and caps and spend the day in a group at a shopping mall, amusement park, on a bike ride, etc.

Display NCOD literature in conspicuous places throughout your community where the

other groups put their handouts.

Contact local radio stations about having representatives of gay, lesbian and bisexual groups on their programs.

Have a religious group announce that it recognizes and blesses gay and lesbian couples and families; ask them to perform a union ceremony for those who want to more visibly establish their relationship.

Hand out National Coming Out Day literature at a local shopping center to help get the word out.

GET POLITICAL

Host an evening of letter writing to local and national elected officials or newspapers on gay and lesbian issues. Your local political organization, or the Human Rights Campaign Fund (202-628-4160), can help you with ideas.

Hold a demonstration calling for gay/lesbian/ bisexual rights in a prominent location. Get permission to have the rainbow flag flown at a government building on National Coming Out

EDUCATE YOUR COMMUNITY

Host a film event featuring coming out themes or other gay/lesbian related educational subjects.

Have a book fair or art show highlighting gay and lesbian authors or artists. Many gay and lesbian authors will make themselves available for book readings and signings.

Place an advertisement in a major metropolitan newspaper in your area encouraging gay and lesbian people to come out.

Produce a 'Coming Out Workshop' with a local/campus counselor or host an event where people come out publicly and/or tell their personal coming out stories.

PARTY

Create a gay and lesbian "Come Out and Play" sports event. Plan a volleyball, softball, bowling or golf game for people in your community.

Host a fund raiser for the National Coming Out Day campaign to support the nationwide effort. Some suggestions: House Party, Picnic,

Arrange a gay/lesbian entertainment event: a band, stand up comedy, performance art, singing, variety show, etc.

Whatever you do, please notify the National Coming Out Day headquarters so we may get the information to other people who call us from your area. We encourage everyone at your event to wear a National Coming Out Day shirt and button to make a powerful statement about the importance of telling the truth about their life. We will assume the media is welcome at your event unless you tell us otherwise. Publicity may be your next

step to living powerfully and openly Remember, your efforts will have an enormous impact on the people you reach. The success of National Coming Out Day depends on our working together. Good luck with your

HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL

Though devoted primarily to the more than six million Jews exterminated by the Nazis, organizers of the just-opened United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, in Washington, DC, have also documented the 10,000 gays and lesbians who were victims.

Early visitors have been impressed by the range of exhibits that touch on gay prosecution. On entering, each visitor receives an identity card of a Holocaust victim; nine of the 500 possible are gay men; one is lesbian. There are even a pair of the notorious pink triangles. Additional archival material apparently exists. Curators may feel encouraged to put more of it on display if asked.

The Memorial is a powerful and important reminder of the power of hatred. 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TRANSSEXUAL WOMYN EXPELLED FROM FESTIVAL

Walhalla, MI-Four postoperative male-tofemale transsexual lesbians were expelled from the 18th annual Michigan's Womyn's Music Festival (MWMF) by festival security staff on the third day of the event. The four womyn, who had undergone sex change surgery from 2 to 14 years earlier, and a nontranssexual supporter attended the festival to raise consciousness among participants about the festival's policy of excluding transsexual womyn, the unclear and contradictory statement of policy in the festival literature, and issues of gender in general. Womyn opposed to transsexuals at MWMF attempted to silence them by destroying their educational materials

The five womyn arrived at the festival on Monday, August 9, and none encountered any difficulty gaining admittance to the festival. The next day, the five womyn set up a table which they distributed literature and buttons and asked womyn who opposed the exclusionary policy to sign a petition seeking its repeal. The four transsexual womyn freely discussed their experiences as transsexuals with festival participants who approached their table. On Tuesday and Wednesday, the five womyn did workshifts in the kitchen, at the medical and emotional support areas, and at the Sober Support tent. Transsexual womyn provided medical care, including taking a hemorrhaging women to an area hospital in the middle of the night, extended a helping hand to those in need of friendly support, and prepared food. They also attended concerts, ate meals, took showers, and shopped in the crafts bazaar with other festival participants without

At approximately 4:30 pm on Thursday, Janis Walworth of Massachusetts, the nontranssexual member of the party, and Kaiser, who were staffing the literature table were approached by two womyn, one of whom identified beiself as MWMF security coordinator. She told Walworth that the transsexual womvn were in violation of the festival's "womyn-born womyn" only policy, and they must therefore leave the festival Walworth replied that it was not clear that the transsexual womyn were in violation of the policy as stated, since they all identify as womyn-born

The security coordinator went on to say that some festival participants had complained about the presence of transsexual womyn at the festival, asking security to remove the transsexual women from the land and vowing to take matters into their own hands if security did not do so. Security felt, therefore, that it could no longer guarantee the safety of the transsexual womyn. In addition, the security womyn were reluctant to assure Walworth that she would continue to be safe at the festival, since she had been seen staffing the literature table and associating with transsexual womyn.

The festival catalogue calls upon womyn who attend the festival to dialogue and listen to one another and explicitly states that "violence against womyn in any form is not acceptable in this community, on this land." However, no apparent action was taken against the womyn who threatened Walworth and the transsexual

The security coordinator pointed out that members of the party had been openly discussing their transsexuality at the literature table, thus alerting many womyn to the fact that there were transsexuals on the land. She implied that if they had not revealed their transsexuality to anyone,

they would not have been asked to leave - in effect, "don't ask, don't tell."

The four transsexual womyn returned to their campsite and packed up their belongings. However, they were delayed in leaving the festival grounds until approximately 11:00 pm because so many womyn stopped them on their way out to express support. A contingent of leatherwomyn offered to guarantee the safety of the transsexual womyn at their campsite for the duration of the festival and strongly attempted to dissuade them from leaving. However, the transsexual womyn collectively decided to honor their agreement to cooperate with security and declined the offer.

Upon leaving the festival site, the transsexual womyn set up camp across the road on National Forest land. The following morning, they set up another literature table, along with neon pink banners proclaiming "Transsexual Womyn Expelled From Festival" and "Too Out To Be A steady stream of womyn came out from the festival to spend time with the transsexual womyn and to express their support; they brought vegetables, soda, hamburgers, fried chicken, flowers, and encouragement. Throughout the remainder of the festival, the transsexual womyn continued to distribute literature and buttons and to talk with womyn about gender issues and the exclusionary policy. Festival participants who visited the transsexual women reported that sentiment inside the festival was overwhelmingly supportive of their participation in MWMF, and there was outrage at their expulsion.

Inside the festival, nontranssexual womyn helped staff the inside literature table, and Walworth conducted two sessions of a workshop entitled "Confronting Transphobia," as well as a workshop on gender and shamanism which had been scheduled to be presented by Gabriel.

On Friday evening, the transsexual women were joined by a fifth transsexual womon, who flew in to present her workshop, "21 Things You Don't Say to a Transsexual". Although she had originally planned to enter the festival, she chose to remain outside with the four expelled transsexual womyn. Womyn inside the festival who wanted to attend the workshop unanimously agreed to move the location to the area outside the front gate. Approximately 75 womyn walked the mile to attend the two workshop sessions.

Saturday morning, when the literature table inside the festival was left unattended for a short time, all literature, buttons, display racks, signed petitions, and completed survey forms, as well as a donation can and personal property, were stolen by undetermined individuals. A womon reported seeing some of the buttons deposited in a portable toilet, which Walworth reported to MWMF security in hopes of avoiding damage to sewage

Also on Saturday, Walworth and Laura Ervin of Massachusetts, who had traveled to the festival in 1991, met with feminist author Kay Leigh Hagan, who was acting as an official representative of the festival producers, and the security coordinator. At that meeting, Hagan disclosed that the festival producers, Barbara Price and Lisa Vogel, are the sole determiners of festival policy and that she did not anticipate that they would change the antitranssexual policy in the near future.

MICHIGAN WOMYN'S MUSIC FESTIVAL A SUCCESS

The 18th Michigan Womyn's Music Festival was held August 10-15 near Hart, Michigan. 7500 women attended the festival, an annual gathering that draws 6-8000 women each August. The largest and longest running of the outdoor womyn's festivals, "Michigan" attracts womyn from every state and province throughout the US and Canada and has become an international event, with performing artists and participants attending from more than 25 countries. The International Welcome at the opening of the Night Stage best represents the significance of this event for the world-wide women's community, with over 30 women speaking in their native languages welcoming the women of the world "home" to the community of Michigan.

"Home" is 650 secluded acres of private land in northwestern Michigan surrounded by 1/4 million acres of the Manistee National Forest. The Festival is created each year by the staff of 650 womyn, who build the stages, wire the electric panels, run the plumbing, care for the children. drive the vans and tractors, and coordinate cooking the 130,000 meals eaten over the week of Festival. There are healthcare, emotional healthcare, and sober support areas, and childcare camps for

girls, boys and toddlers.

Among the festival activities are over 3(X) workshops, the incredible Crafts Bazaar filled with the art of 160 craftswomyn, and a daily film festival highlighting current releases by womyn working in film and video. The Womyn of Color tents celebrated its 10th anniversary this year with special intensive workshops and a week long Womyn of Color drumming workshop that culminated in a Sunday performance. The DART (Differently-Abled Resource Team) area works to make the festival camping experience possible for womyn with disabilities, with wheelways and carpet paths to ease access for womyn in chairs. Accessible wheelchair shuttle buses are provided to get around the land, and "helping hands" support is available to manage camp-life more easily. Performances and workshops are ASL interpreted

The festival services are "housed" in 80 large vinyl and canvas tents that become the Community Center, One World Workshops, Orientation, DART, or one of the dozens of festival service areas. Michigan is a music festival, yes, but most of all it is a community experience where womyn can come together once a year and live with womyn from around the world in a womon-centered, female defined community.

The Festival presented 40 performances that were held on the three stages (Day Stage, Acoustic Stage and Night Stage)), with shows beginning at noon and running till 12 midnight. There was an incredible array of music, theater and dance

represented at this year's Festival.

The womyn enjoyed sunshine-filled summer weather for the week, with the exception of a shower, which stopped few from attending the outrageous Sunday afternoon comedy jam featuring Suzanne Westenhoefer, Marga Gomez, Over Our Heads, and Diane Amos, with Karen Williams as MC. The Festival culminated with a Candlelight Concert on the Acoustic Stage featuring an array of artists. This last gathering was illuminated quietly by hand-held torches on either side of the stage, with hundreds of candles scattered through the audience.

GAY ORDINATION SUPPORTERS GO PUBLIC

More than 570 HLCA pastors and lay leaders relased their names in public support of the unconditional ordination of qualified gay and lesbian people. Calling themselves "The Network: A Public Roster To End Sexual Discrimination in the ELCA," the group presented a framed list of names to the Rev Charles S. Miller, executive director of the Division for Church in Society. The ELCA currently ordains only homosexuals who pledge lifelong celibacy. The Network seeks the removal of that rule and asks the ELCA "to affirm committed and faithful same-sex relationships with appropriate ecclesial liturgies."

Standing before four colorful banners with the more than 570 member names, Paul. A. Johnson said, "The new thing about The Network is that these people in the church are willing to be open about their support. It helps to know that if the worst should happen, we're not alone." Johnson, a former assistant to the bishop of the ELCA La Crosse (Wis.) Synod, was asked to resign when his homosexual orientation became public. He said he was suicidal for 11 years while he struggled with his sexuality.

Saviour Lutheran Church, New York, told to

VICTORY FUND SEEKS CANDIDATES

The Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund is seeking openly gay and lesbian candidates who plan to run for public office in 1994. The Victory Fund, which puts the power of its national donor network behind qualified candidates, has contributed more than \$400,000 directly to campaigns since its inception in 1991. Members of the Victory Fund pay \$100 or more to join the network, then agree to support at least two recommended candidates over the next 12 months with direct contributions of \$100 or more. "The impact of Victory Fund combined contributions can make a difference in a race," said William Waybourn, Victory Fund executive director. Citing Jackie Goldberg's 51 to 49 percent win in this year's heated race for the Los Angeles City Council, Waybourn noted that the \$18,000 contributed by Victory Fund members was crucial to Jackie's victory

The Victory Fund is currently sponsoring ten candidates. Members have made more than \$120,000 in 1993 campaign contributions. Among the victorious 1993 candidates to receive financial support from Victory Fund members are Shelley Gaylord, Wisconsin's first openly lesbian judge, and Craig McDaniel, the first openly gay City

Councilmember in Dallas.

"Money is the key element in a winning campaign," Waybourn noted. "We are actively seeking qualified candidates who can benefit from Victory Fund support to get an early start in their nees." The Victory Fund board of directors will consider new candidates for recommendation at its November board meeting. Silent March will tour the country to be filmed and photographed. It will take on different shapes according to its environment. The images will be used for AIDS education.

EXPERIMENTAL AIDS VACCINES: WHAT DO THOSE TERMS MEAN?

AIDS is caused by the human immunodeficiency virus, HIV. By infiltrating the immune system's intricate network of cells, the virus multiplies and spreads throughout the body. In the process, IIIV gradually destroys a key type of immune cell vital to protection against various kinds of infections. HIV's devious strategy for success poses an extraordinarily difficult challenge to AIDS vaccine researchers, who must outwit the virus to triumph.

The ideal way to design an effective HIV vaccine would be to know what immune responses protect against HIV infection and construct a vaccine that stimulates those responses. Clues about these so-called correlates of immunity or correlates of protections have been collected, but their precise identities so far are unknown. Indeed, whether a natural protective state can exist still is unknown. The urgency of the AIDS pandemic requires moving ahead with the knowledge at hand.

Several experimental vaccines are being tested in early human clinical trials. These trials provide information about any adverse reactions caused by the vaccines and about their immunogenicity, their ability to stimulate immune responses.

Two main types of immunity exist: Humoral immunity and cellular immunity. Humoral (antibody-mediated) immunity refers to protection provided by products of one type of white blood cell, lymphocytes. These products, custom-made proteins known as antibodies circulate in body fluids, primarily blood and lymph. B lymphocytes (B cells) produce antibodies in response to a specific foreign invader like HIV or a vaccine:

Different antibodies can be generated. Socalled binding antibodies attach to some part of HIV and may or may not have antiviral effects. Functional antibodies are binding antibodies that actually do something. For example, one type, neutralizing antibodies, mactivate HIV or prevent it from infecting other cells

Scientists have identified the V3 loop as one important part of HIV that stimulates neutralizing antibodies. The V3 loop is a piece of gp120 (glycoprotein 120), a major protein found on the surface, or envelope, of HIV. Thus, gp120 and its parent protein, gp160, form the basis of many recombinant subunit vaccines, so-called because they are genetically engineered and contain only pieces of the virus

The second type of immunity, cellular (cellmediated) immunity, refers to activities carried out by immune system cells called T lymphocytes. Cytotoxic T lymphocytes (CTLs) nicknamed killer T cells, destroy HIV-infected cells directly. Some cytotoxic T cells, referred to as CD8+CTLs or CD8+T cells, hear CD8 receptors on their surfaces. CD8+ CLTs, which destroy cells that are actively producing HIV, are most likely the immune cell that protects against HIV infection.

Regulatory T cells, a component of cellular immunity, direct both antibody- and cell-mediated immune responses, much like a conductor leading a symphony orchestra. The chief regulatory T cell, the helper T cell, also is HIV's main target. The virus attaches to the cell through a receptor on the cell's surface called CD4. Hence the other name for helper T cells, CD4+T cells.

A subset of helper T cells, memory T cells, are evoked upon first exposure to an invading organism such as HIV. The name "memory reflects their specialized function, which is to create a "criminal record file" on that virus or microorganism. If it enters the body again, memory T cells will recognize it immediately and quickly stir the immune system into action. The

most common way to measure memory T cells is by a test called the T lymphocyte proliferation assay, which indicates the strength of the T memory cell response to HIV

To be effective, an IffV vaccine may have to stimulate a third type of immunity, mucosal immunity. Immune cells lining the mucous membranes of the genital tract and other portals into the body produce mucosal immune responses.

HIV continually evolves as a consequence of genetic mutation and recombination. Thus, researchers designing vaccines must estimate the significance of strain variation within individuals and among populations.

A person usually is not infected with more than one HIV strain, but once HIV infection becomes established, the virus starts changing and variant viruses arise. When a drug or immune reaction destroys one variant, a distinct but related one can emerge. Variants may thrive in specific tissues or become dominant because they replicate faster than others.

The envelope regions of many HIV isolatesviruses taken from patients - have been genetically analyzed. Based on this information, scientists have grouped these isolates into at least five subclasses, or clades, each about 30 percent different from all the others

Scientists do not know what is most important for making a vaccine to protect against divergent HIV strains. They do examine whether candidate vaccines made against single HIV strains stimulate neutralizing antibodies directed against closely related strains of the same genetic subclass or against strains from other subclasses.

The first AIDS vaccines made were based on the LAI strain (also known as IIIB and LAV) Subsequently, LAI has been shown to be atypical of strains isolated from infected people. Newer vaccines have been based primarily on the SF-2 and MN isolates. These strains fall into the same genetic subclass as LAI but are more representative of HIV strains isolated from North Americans and Europeans

Because of safety concerns, most experimental AIDS vaccines have been constructed using only one or more pieces of HIV rather than the whole virus. However, these recombinant subunit vaccines stimulate weaker immune responses than desirable. This problem has prompted a renewed interest in vaccine adjuvants, substances that can increase the type. strength, and durability of immune responses when incorporated into a vaccine. Currently, only one adjuvant-alum-is approved for use in vaccines for humans licensed by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). The development and increased use of novel adjuvants to enhance special immune responses is likely to improve the immunogenicity of many candidate HIV vaccines.

A different way to enhance immune responses to HIV is the prime-boost vaccine strategy. Researchers first ready, or prime, the immune systems of volunteers with a live vector vaccine. a bacterium or virus that has been genetically engineered to contain a gene for an HIV protein. The best studied vector is vaccinia virus, formerly used to immunize against smallpox. Vaccinia transports the foreign HIV gene into the body There, the HIV gene makes a protein that the body perceives as foreign, stimulating production of protective antibodies. Later, the volunteers will periodically receive booster shots of a genetically engineered vaccine made from the same HIV protein. Such a strategy has been used with a gp160-containing vaccinia virus. By itself, this vaccine stimulated memory T cells but few antibodies. Some volunteers also had CD8+CTLs

This combined strategy is the only one so far that has produced these killer T cells.

One concorn is that the vaccinia construct could cause serious vaccinia infection in some people who have compromised immune systems and HIV and who have not been exposed to either smallpox or the vaccine. Thus, other vector vaccines also are being developed and evaluated. One new one, made from a canary poxvirus that closely resembles vaccinia, is in clinical trials Canary poxvirus does not grow in human cells, so it should be much safer. Another HIV vector vaccine under development contains Salmonella, bacteria that infect the gut.

After an experimental vaccine has been deemed safe in preclinical studies, it must successfully complete three stages of testing in people before it can be developed into a licensed product. Experimental vaccines first are tested in uninfected people to determine if they are safe and can elicit immune responses in healthy people. Traditionally, most have been tested as prophylactic vaccines, that is, for their ability to

prevent HIV infection.

A Phase I trial is the first setting in which an experimental vaccine is given to people. Such a trial enrolls a small number of volunteers, usually about 20 to 80, at low risk of HIV infection. A Phase I trial assesses any vaccine-related side effects and may collect preliminary data on the product's immunogenicity. To assess side effects, the vaccine is compared in clinical trials with an inactive placebo vaccine, or control, that looks like the real product. Researchers also try to determine the maximum useful dose of vaccine that can be tolerated without compromising safety. To help measure the breadth of the vaccine's protection, investigators can determine if the neutralizing antibodies react against strains from the same genetic subclass or those from others. A Phase I trial may last one to two years.

Once Phase I trials show an experimental HIV vaccine to be well-tolerated, it then can advance into Phase II trials. These trials enroll many more people, up to a few hundred, and often include some volunteers at higher risk for acquiring HIV. Researchers gather more information about safely and immune responses. asking more sophisticated questions that such larger trials allow. Optimally, the trials are randomized and double-blind, meaning that volunteers are assigned at random to a study group and that neither the health care workers nor the patients know what preparation the patients are receiving. Phase II trials last one to two years.

The most promising candidate vaccines move into Phase III, or efficacy, trials, enrolling large numbers of uninfected people at high risk for acquiring HIV. A Phase III trial usually is designed to ensure the collection of enough detailed information on safety and effectiveness to support an application for a license to the FDA, if warranted. The vaccine may be tested against a placebo or a vaccine known potentially to be beneficial to the study population, such as the hepatitis B vaccine. An efficacy trial can involve thousands of volunteers and thus takes much longer, at least four years, to complete

Recently, researchers have begun testing the idea of using vaccines as treatments. The goal of therapeutic vaccination is to determine if experimental vaccines can sufficiently boost the immune responses of people infected with HIV to prevent or slow down development of disease.

BOOKS, BOOKS, BOOKS

QUEER IN AMERICA HITS BOOKSTORES

Queer in America, a long-awaited book from controversial writer Michelangelo Signorile, provocatively subtitled Sex, the Media and the Closets of Power, examines and exposes the hypocrisy which pervades mainstream American institutions. Signorile's theory is plainly stated. Those in power who remain in the closet do so at a cost not only to themselves, but to others within their personal circles and beyond, ultimately affecting millions. The closet, Signorile effectively argues, in not a matter of privacy, but one of persecution concerning all Americans.

Oueer in America is a scalpel-sharp examination of the way people participate in the lies of the institutionalized closet, covering for those who still hide and silencing those who attempt to come out. Signorile dissects the issues of gays in the military, in Hollywood, on Capital Hill and the scores of lives ruined by the closet. Signorile brilliantly recounts the instances where the media spun out of control to keep a personality closeted, and how an outing did not destroy a career, thereby disproving the most familiar claim

of anti-outers.

Queer in America is also a personal look at Signorile, in some circles a much-maligned figure, but also named by Newsweek as one of the 100 members of the Cultural Flite. Farly chapters recall a quiet youth, growing up queer in Italian working-class Brooklyn and Staten Island, and Signorile's meteoric climb up the glitz ladder of Manhattan nightlife before the AIDS epidemic turned the gossip publicist into an activist, a journalist and co-founder of Queer Nation

In another chapter, Signorile praises the gay-positive corporations of Silicon Valley, and peers into the future when queer activism will be implemented by a touch of a computer key. Signorile also offers a manifesto for the Queer 90s, a powerful, no-nonsense agenda for the lesbian/gay community entering the 21st Century. In his most controversial chapter, illustrating the destructive power of the closet, Signorile reveals a shameless story of same sex harassment and hypocrisy on the part of a supposedly heterosexual figure of national prominence.

Signorile detractors will be astounded at the depth and passion of Queer in America. Those won over by Signorile's fiery eloquence will welcome this book. Impassioned, polemical and sometimes intemperate, Queer in America is a touchstone work for the new generation of gays & lesbians - a clarion call for mainstream America.

BEAST OF BURDEN

Aaron Travis is one of gay erotic's most prolific and provocative writers. Slaves of the Empire cemented his reputation for scrupulously detailed, unrelenting raw sexual fiction. Now, Beast of Burden, (Badboy, 1-56333-\$4.95 US) \$5.95 Canada) collects some of Travis' most riveting stories

Selected by the author especially for this collection, these stories cover classic Travis terrain-sexual power in ruthlessly stolen or helplessly surrendered in settings ranging from a harsh expanse of desert to a military academy to the ancient Roman Empire. Travis has never been more arresting, making Beast of Burden a volume of ruthless imagination.

ZAPPED: TWO **NOVELLAS**

Zapped: Two Novellas by Robert Peters has just been released by GLB Publishers. The worldfamous author of poetry, plays, and fiction lets his hair down and his foxy mind roam with two new age novels: asbestos: a book for lepers, and how

to make love to a foot.

Not since R. Crumb regaled us with the antics of his comics has such unbridled, outrageous fiction become available. Written in the style of a comic book (without pictures), Peters takes us through the travails of a gay writer who suddenly finds his hand turned to flakes. Not funny, you say? When the writer is visited by all kinds of spirits that bear strong resemblances to people with household names (in addition to Mr. Deity and his dutiful son), the scene gets pretty outrageous

And making love to a foot can be more fun than it sounds, the way Peter's characters do it. How could you avoid becoming a foot fetishist when you were shipped across country as a baby in a shoebox and raised by a shoe store operator who had designs on your body? And when Mother shows up in a nudist camp—well, you get

This paperback book is in an unusual format, too-5" X 9" (this cover was pared down a bit to fit the printer), and the two novellas are back to back. Read it from either end.

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

ICON MOVES IN BURGLARY CASE

The Board of Governors of the Imperial Court of Nebraska announced mid-September that it has taken the following action regarding the burglary of ICON monies following Coronation XIII:

- Remove all titles and honors received by Joe Reed.
- Remove Joe Reed from the Board of Governors.
- Deny Joe Reed eligibility as a board member, royal family member, monarch, or recipient of any title or honor until restitution has been made.
- After consultation with an attorney, file a claim for \$1,800.00 against Joe Reed in Small Claims Court.

The Board of Governors delayed taking action against Joc Reed, the former treasurer of ICON, to allow the police time to apprehend the burglar. When in the police's estimation that was

not going to happen, representatives of the Board met with Reed to determine whether or not he would make voluntary restitution. He chose not to do so. During this same time, an audit committee was formed to do an audit of the records from January 1, 1993, until July 12, 1993, at which time Joe Reed was removed as treasurer. The results of the audit will be made public as soon as they are examined by the Board

TOLERANCE ON TRIAL

In the documentary Tolerance on Trial viewers will meet Chuck Merino a former Boy Scout Explorer leader and a 15-year police veteran and former president of the El Cajon Police Officers Association. Chuck has spent five years advising the department's drug abuse education program. For 20 years he has coached local high school football.

Last year while speaking at a community meeting on hate crimes against gays, police officer Chuck announced he was gay. Although honesty is an idea upheld by the Boy Scouts of America, homosexuality is not. In September 1992 Merino was told by the Scouts' San Diego County chapter that a "homosexual role model" is not welcome. When mediation didn't work, Merino filed a lawsuit seeking re-instatement, or denying the Boy Scouts use of city-owned property in accordance with San Diego's anti-discrimination ordinance.

Tolerance on Trial effectively examines how this issue has polarized the San Diego community, pitting those who uphold the Scouts' view of "traditional values" against those who believe there's no room for discrimination when teaching children.

Directed by the Emmy award winning filmmaker Jack Ofield, Tolerance on Trial is a co-production of KPBS public television and the Production Center for Documentary & Drama at San Diego State University It is a must viewing for every group and individual in America concerned with civil rights and the need to make all organizations, public and private, abide with anti-discrimination laws.



On the 6th of September, we attended the annual Omaha Meatpackers PWA benefit held at the MAX. This show featured many well known community performers as well as several bearded and mustached members of the community strutting their stuff — complete with dazzling and sequined gowns, high heels, and excessively large bosoms. It was Skag Drag at it's best.

This year's benefit was hosted by Mr. Don Flowers, a long time member of the Meatpackers, who has been continually active in numerous community fundraisers and activities, and cohosted by a former Miss Gay Nebraska who came out of retirement for the benefit, Miss Velvet.

The show opened with the entire cast performing a military cadence to the tune of Don't Ask-Don't Tell - a great opening number! This was followed by lip-synching performances by Empress XIII - the Black Rose - Miss Roxy performing Tongue Check; Francine Fishpaws with Bette Midler's Miss Otis Regrets, She's Unable to Lunch; a dynamic performance by Velvet of Peggy Lee's Fever, Gary West doing Paula Abdul's Straight-Up; Babes Behind Bars with a Pointer Sisters medley of He's so Shy, Fire, and Make Your Move; Miss Targay with Bonnie Raitt's Something to Talk About; Miss Easy Does It and Marilyn McCoor Last Night; David - Bertha (really Big Boobs) - Harper Valley PTA; Ruby (Scotty) doing Diana Ross's Up the Ladder To The Roof; and Don Flowers' God Bless America. During the first half of the show the audience really showed their appreciation by rewarding the performers with loads of tips, which were placed in the fishbowl by all performers

The show continued with Targay as Patti Labelle, with Velvet performing Paula Abdul's The Way That You Love Me; Gary West and Cher's If I Could Turn Back Time, The Babes Behind Bars performed from Chorus Line; Sharon Van Butsel (one of the two real women in the show) performing Lynn Lavner's Don't Wear Leather Pants to the Seder, Froline's Dream a Little Dream: Francine Fishpaws and Dolly Parton's I Will Always Love You; Miss Fasy Does It with You've Come A Long Way From St. Louie; David with Linda Ronstadt's Good-by My Friend; and Don Flowers Don't Tell Me What To Do. The show closed with the grand finale of the entire cast performing Don't Ask, Don't Tell breaking into I Am What I Am.

All in all, it was a very entertaining show and lots of money was raised for the PWA assistance fund.

WHEN DID THE WORLD LOSE TEN DAYS?

In 46 B.C., Roman ruler Julius Caesar put a new calendar into effect, which came to be known as the Julian Calendar. The Romans thought that the year was 365 1/4 days long, so they made an ordinary year 365 days and added an extra day

every fourth year, or leap year.
But by the year 730 A.D., it was known that
the year was actually 11 minutes shorter than the
Romans of Julius Caesar's time thought it was.
This mistake made the calendar wrong by 11
minutes every year, or one day wrong in every
128 years. By 1582, the calendar was ten days out

of line with the seasons.

So in that year, Pope Gregory XIII ordered a new calendar placed into effect, which we now call the Gregorian Calendar. To keep the calendar in line with the seasons, it was decided that the first year of each century would be a leap year only when that year could be divided by 400. Therefore, 1200 and 1600 were leap years, but 1800 and 1900 were not. This change eliminated the 11-minute-per-year-error in the calendar.

To bring the calendar immediately back into line with the seasons, Gregory ordered that ten day be dropped from the year 1582. People went to bed on the night of October 5 of that year woke

up on October 15th!

Shop for healthcare just as you would for any other major purchase. After all, this is your life we are talking about. Many insurance policies will only pay for one hospitalization for alcohol and drug treatment. Don't make a mistake!

The following are suggested questions to ask when shopping for a treatment center. Do not be intimidated. You have the right to this information.

1. Is your facility accredited by the Joint Center on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations?

2. Is this a lesbain gay treatment center or just a "gay track" or sideline program at a "straight" hospital? Do you operate a "Christian Program" in your facility?

3. What do you mean by "gay program"? Will I be housed with gay people and be in all gay groups, or will all the groups be mixed together depending on the number of patients in the "gay program"? If in mixed groups, how can the group members' prejudices be handled? Will I be able to speak about the most intimate parts of my life?

4. How many gay patients in your facility today?

5. Is this a psychiatric hospital or a drug and

alcohol treatment center? Will I be locked up?
6. How long has this "gay program" been in business? What is your success rate? Ask to see an independent outcome study.

7. How much will this hospital charge my insurance company? Will I have any benefits for continuing therapy after I am discharged?

8. Will my counselor be lesbian, gay? What is

education background, years of experience?

9. Has this hospital or its parent company, been charged with or investigated for, any fraudulent

or deceptive practices?
