## Maryland to Vote To Remove Trans Protections

Conservatives in Maryland are hoping a referendum will pass that intends to reverse a Montgomery County law protecting transgender people from discrimination.

Montgomery County council members unanimously approved a measure last fall that prohibits discrimination against transgender people in housing, employment, public accommodations, and other public services.

In response, Citizens for Responsible Government, a local organization, successfully collected over 25,000 signatures to put a referendum on the county's November ballot to repeal the law.

Bruce Hausknecht, a judicial analyst for the national conservative group Focus on the Family, said his organization is tracking the Montgomery County situation as well as other areas with similar laws facing referenda.

"There's no strategy, there's just similar concerns among people in Montgomery County, Maryland, Colorado, and Gainesville, Fla.," Hausknecht said to The Baltimore Examiner. "This is precisely what the transgender community ultimately wants: to open up bathrooms, locker rooms across the country."

Transgender rights advocates say the bills are about ensuring equal rights and civil liberties, not bathroom access:

According to The Washington Post, the legal situation has attracted attention from gay rights groups like Lambda Legal and Equality Maryland, which have focused on ensuring that transgender citizens are protected under the law. (The Advocate)

## Nebraska: Porn Wrestlers Broke Rules Before

Two wrestlers kicked off Nebraska's team after appearing on a pornographic Web site broke NCAA rules twice in five months, athletic director Tom Osborne said Friday.

Osborne, saying he wanted to respond to criticism of the dismissals, made public a March incident in which Paul Donahoe and Kenny Jordan had been ruled ineligible for receiving an

extra benefit.

"The last few days we've had people indicating that maybe these guys were railroaded," Osborne said in an interview with

The Associated Press. "I just want to make the point that this was not one isolated incident but really was a series of issues. When you have two violations within a matter of months, it would appear that something is seriously amiss."

Osborne and other athletic department officials declined to discuss the specifics of the violations that occurred in March. The school's NCAA compliance staff deemed them to be secondary violations.

After declaring Donahoe and
Jordan ineligible, Nebraska successfully appealed to the NCAA
to have them reinstated. They were scheduled to serve a onematch suspension during the 2008-09 season, Osborne said.

Donahoe and Jordan were dismissed on Aug. 12, three days after a blog posted images of them taken from a Web site featuring naked or partially clothed male athletes.

The athletic department again ruled the pair ineligible, this time for violating an NCAA rule that prohibits athletes from appearing in pictures for commercial use.

"When is enough enough?" Osborne said. "We felt we reached that point certainly."



Jordan and Donahoe also have had a series of run-ins with the law in Lincoln. Jordan has paid fines for possessing or consuming alcohol as a minor, trespassing and assault, and Donahoe for maintaining a disorderly house and having an open alcohol container.

(Nebraska Wrestlers, story Continued from page 1) Donahoe and Jordan have not responded to interview requests.

They would have to apply to the NCAA for reinstatement if they choose to wrestle for another school.

Donahoe, from Davison, Mich., won the Big 12 championship at 125 pounds in 2008 and placed third in the NCAA tournament. He won the 125 national title in 2007. He would have been a senior in eligibility at Nebraska this year.

Jordan, a 133-pounder from Frankfort, III., was fourth in the Big 12 and failed to place at nationals this past season. He would have been a junior.

The two traveled to Los Angeles for a video shoot and were paid for modeling, Osborne said.

"You turn around and take an airplane ticket and perform on a porn site for money, and it was pretty automatic at that point that we couldn't go forward," he said.

Osborne said the pattern of misconduct was as big a factor in the decision to dismiss the wrestlers as was the fact they appeared in pornography -- "something we certainly don't approve of," he said.

"It is definitely a privilege, not a right, that an athlete be allowed to play at Nebraska," Osborne said. "We do insist on a certain standard of conduct." (Eric Olson, AP)

#### Unpredictability

We live in a culture that deeply values control. If we can't control the world around us, then we



will often settle for the illusion of control. The ability to project and predict is key to our sense of control. We tend to avoid situations and people in this world which are unpredictable. We are often threatened by the unpredictable.

God, you know, is unpredictable. That sounds strange. It has been beaten into our head that God is always the same, unchanging. Maybe, but I don't buy that. Don't we, after all, describe God as "Love"? We have all been in love. Haven't you noticed how much love changes the one loving and the one being love? Love is unpredictable. People find themselves doing some very surprising things when in love. Ah, the things you do for love. I believe it may be the same for God. God is transformed in sharing and receiving love with you and I. This has caused God to be unpredictably generous through history. Sending Jesus, for example, to show us the Way to greater and deeper love . . . unpredictable love.

## Gay Foster Ban Cleared For Arkansas Ballot

A proposal aimed at effectively banning gay men and lesbians from becoming foster or adoptive parents was cleared Monday to appear on this fall's ballot in Arkansas.

The measure would prohibit unmarried couples living together from fostering or adopting children, and Arkansas doesn't allow gays to marry or recognize same-sex marriages conducted elsewhere.

Secretary of State Charlie Daniels certified the proposed initiated act for the Nov. 4 ballot after verifying that the Arkansas Family Council Action Committee had submitted 85,389 valid signatures of registered voters. Supporters needed to turn in at least 61,974 valid signatures.

"Arkansas needs to affirm the importance of married mothers and fathers," Family Council President Jerry Cox said. "We need to publicly affirm the gold standard of rearing children whenever we can. The state standard should be as close to that gold standard of married mom and dad homes as possible."

The Family Council campaign is a response to a 2006 Arkansas Supreme Court decision striking down a state policy that specifically banned gay men and lesbians from becoming foster parents.

The ballot measure would take the place of a state policy that currently bars unmarried couples living together from serving as foster parents.

The measure faces the threat of a lawsuit from groups who say that it unfairly discriminates against unmarried couples and limits the number of foster and adoptive homes available for children.

Arkansas Families First is campaigning against the measure and has said it plans to file a lawsuit to keep it from appearing on the November ballot. Debbie Willhite, a lead consultant for the group, said last week the group has found numerous signatures that should have been rejected by the state as invalid and that the group also plans to challenge the constitutionality of the measure.

Attorney General Dustin McDaniel opposes the proposed initiated act but said last week that he was confident it could survive a legal challenge.

Cox said the Family Council will rely on support from the same network of churches that helped it pass a constitutional amendment banning gay marriage in 2004.

The Family Council's campaign had a debt of nearly \$2,800 as of July 31. By comparison, Arkansas Families First reported more than \$45,000 in the bank for its efforts to fight the measure. (Andrew DeMillo, AP)

## Diane's Story

"My partner and I had been together for 14 years when I received the worst phone call of my life. There had been a terrible accident, and she was being flown to the hospital by helicopter. ## Canada Pledges Additional \$45 Million to Fight AIDS

Canadian health minister Tony Clement announced at the 17th International AIDS Conference in Mexico City that his country will spend \$45 million to fight the spread of HIV in Africa. These funds will be on top of the \$515 million Canada has pledged to fight HIV globally over the past three years.

"For people living with HIV/AIDS," Clement said in a statement, "these funds will go toward programs that help them to live longer and better lives. For those at risk of infection, this investment will help to provide the education and prevention tools needed to protect themselves against HIV/AIDS."

The bulk of the spending will focus on sub-Saharan Africa. The \$515 million Canada has pledged in recent years supports clinical training, nongovernmental organizations, and research, with commitments extending into the next decade. The bulk of the additional \$45 million is being earmarked for projects in Mozambique and South Africa. (The Advocate)

## D.C. Clinic Registers 232% Rise in HIV Cases

An unusually high increase in the number of clients testing positive for HIV at the Whitman-Walker Clinic in Washington, D.C., has officials alarmed, according to the Washington Blade. The clinic reported that the total number of clients being tested has not changed drastically, yet the number of clients who are testing positive for HIV has jumped by 232% in the past year.

Out of the roughly 6,500 clients tested at the Whitman-Walker Clinic, 266 have tested positive for HIV so far in 2008. By this time in 2007, only 80 clients had tested positive. Clinic officials, including Dr. Raymond Martins, Whitman-Walker's chief medical officer, are concerned about the results and are working on a plan of action.

"These are troubling statistics that warrant more aggressive education, prevention, and testing initiatives," said Martins.

One such effort to investigate the reason for the rising number of infected clients was a focus group series directed by the clinic. The clinic interviewed various D.C. residents who fit into the demographic groups most often affected by HIV, including African-American heterosexuals, young gay men, and gay men of color.

According to the results of the study, there was one "surprising theme" among the groups -- "even though everyone recognized HIV was a serious issue, every group identified HIV as really being a problem for another demographic group," the statement says. "This is of great concern because the highest-risk groups do not identify themselves as being high-risk and thus increase their susceptibility to HIV through unsafe behavior and a lack of knowledge."

Recent research by the CDC shows that, despite long-touted estimates that a total of 40,000 people in the United States each year are newly infected with HIV, the actual number of yearly infections since the early 2000s has been closer to 56,500. (The Advocate)

## **Obama Supports Right of Same-Sex Couples to Adopt**

Barack Obama has expressed his support for same-sex couples' right to adopt children, according to the Family Equality Council. The group had sought to learn the presidential candidates' positions on the topic, and only Obama responded. However, John McCain has previously expressed his opposition to adoption by gays in a July 13 New York Times article.

"We also have to do more to support and strengthen LGBT families," Obama wrote in his letter to the group, dated August 1. "Because equality in relationship, family, and adoption rights is not some abstract principle; it's about whether millions of LGBT Americans can finally live lives marked by dignity and freedom. That's why we have to repeal laws like the Defense of Marriage Act. That's why we have to eliminate discrimination against LGBT families. And that's why we have to extend equal treatment in our family and adoption laws."

Obama also touted his plans to expand the Family Medical Leave Act, pass laws to prohibit caregiver discrimination, and encourage businesses to allow more flexible schedules for workers.

While McCain and his wife, Cindy, have an adopted child, he said to the Times, "I think that we've proven that both parents are important in the success of a family, so no, I don't believe in gay adoption. I encourage adoption and I encourage the opportunities for people to adopt children. I encourage the process being less complicated so they can adopt as quickly as possible. And Cindy and I are proud of being adoptive parents."

In McCain's home state of Arizona, any unmarried adult can petition to adopt a child; however, the law does not specifically provide joint adoption by same-sex couples, according to the Human Rights Campaign. There is also no explicit ban on allowing a same-sex partner to petition to adopt a child of the other partner. Florida is the only U.S. state that bans all forms of adoption by gays.

According to the Family Equality Council, same-sex parents are raising 4% of all adopted children in the United States as well as 3% of all children in foster care. (The Advocate)

## Judge's Ruling Protects Man's Anti-War T-Shirts

PHOENIX, Arizona (AP) -- A federal judge on Wednesday permanently barred Arizona from using a state law to prosecute an online merchant who sells shirts that list names of thousands of troops killed in Iraq.

U.S. District Judge Neil Wake did not strike down the 2007 law against selling products that use of military casualties' names without families' permission. But he ruled that using the law to prosecute Dan Frazier would violate the Flagstaff man's First Amendment rights because his "Bush Lied -- They Died" shirts are "core political speech."

"It is impossible to separate the political from the commercial aspects of that display," Wake wrote. "For example, the state argues that Frazier can sell his shirts without displaying the soldiers' names. But Frazier's product is his message, and his customers' message."


Arizona's law was enacted with little debate by the Legislature, and Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas have enacted similar laws.

A spokeswoman for Arizona Attorney General Terry Goddard said Goddard's office was reviewing the ruling and did not immediately know whether it would appeal.







"I always knew the Constitution was on my side," Frazier said in a statement released by the American Civil Liberties Union.

Lee Phillips, a Flagstaff lawyer who represented Phillips on behalf of the ACLU, said it could be possible to use the law to prosecute a person in a case without political circumstance or motivations.

Citing First Amendment concerns, Wake had issued a preliminary injunction in September against enforcement of the law against Frazier while the lawsuit was pending.

The ACLU is also defending Frazier in a lawsuit filed in federal court in Tennessee by a couple whose soldier son was killed in Iraq. Robin and Michael Read of Greeneville have asked that their case be expanded to cover more than 4,000 casualties and seek more than \$40 billion in damages.
