

Marriage Bill Introduced in Maryland Senate

The marriage equality bill was introduced in the Maryland senate Tuesday morning. Debate is scheduled to begin Wednesday on the measure, which has the required 24 votes to pass the chamber.

The Religious Freedom and Civil Marriage Protection Act passed the senate's judicial proceedings committee last Thursday by a

Gov. Martin O'Mally has promised to sign the marriage equality bill, which is expected to pass the house of delegates.

Meador admitted to Berman that "Sonka had posted a blog entry in January saying that it was the patriotic duty of his readers to send a flamboyantly gay couple to the event."

Mark Looy, chief communications officer for the Creation Museum, told Berman promotional materials for the event made it clear it was for heterosexual couples only.



"The message was one of Christian marriage, which the Bible teaches is between a man and a woman," Looy said.

Meadon said the group was attending the event out of curiosity, not to cause a scene. He said to his knowledge neither Sonka nor his male guest are gay and that the two were not refunded the \$71.90 cost for the two tickets they had purchased online.

Creation Museum Bars "Gay" Couples

A same-sex "couple" was told they couldn't attend a date night event at the Creation Museum in Kentucky and, according to reports, they weren't even issued a refund for their tickets.

Mark Berman writes for Opposing Views: "According to Jonathan Meador, who is a writer for the Louisville-based LEO Weekly alternative newspaper, he, his female guest and another man were waiting to enter the event on February 11th. When the other man, Joe Sonka, told security personnel that the date for whom he was waiting was another man, they were told they would not be allowed in.

"Meador and his female date were allowed to attend. 'On the website, there was no mention of sexual orientation,' he said."



Shirley Phelps-Roper admitted in an interview Monday that her father, the head of the Westboro Baptist Church, physically abused her and her siblings as a way to indoctrinate them to church dogma.

Phelps-Roper appeared on The David Pakman Show, talking about the group Anonymous, which is attempting to take down the online operations of the Westboro Baptist Church. During that interview, Pakman asked Phelps-Roper about claims made by her estranged brother Nathan



Phelps, who said he and his siblings were abused as children.

According to a press release from the show, posted by Pam's House Blend, Phelps-Roper said hitting children was part of "teaching children exactly like their creator told them to do it."

Life Without Pills

Many of my clients – at some point consider anti-depressants. You
know anti-depressants: they're those
pretty little pills that make ugly,
weepy people into happy, beautiful
people who run through fields of
flowers (at least on TV commercials). It sounds too good to be true,
and often, it is.



Anti-depressants are very helpful for lots of people, but they are not the end-all for depression. I'm not a doctor, and yet I've seen that for many of my clients, they don't work so well, or there are side effects (weight gain, nausea, dry mouth, head-aches, sexual dysfunction) that make them not worth the trouble. When you want to feel less depressed, medication is only ONE alternative. To feel better without taking pills, try these "Anti-Depression Lifestyle" suggestions:

- Do some kind of exercise every day; at least 20 minutes every day. It needn't be the gym, but it needs to be something strenuous enough to get an endorphin lift: these "natural" anti-depressants are better than anything money can buy.
- Do not isolate. This is important: even if initially you don't enjoy it, force yourself to be around people. Slowly increase your social contacts and you'll be less self-obsessed and won't feel so alone in your sadness.
- Force yourself to say hello to at least 3 people a day.
 Practice being approachable and pleasant-looking. This may sound obvious, but many people look unapproachable and aren't aware of it. If you feel really brave, you could even practice flirting a little bit!
- Avoid alcohol or recreational drugs. Alcohol is a depressant and you know where that takes you, and the aftermath of recreational drugs is often intense sadness and loneliness.
- No anonymous sex. This is not the time to put yourself out there and risk rejection or have sex that leaves you feeling empty and lonely.
- Get out in nature, be around trees, flowers and plants...or the ocean, or the desert. Let Mother Nature work her soothing magic on you...plus you can check out all those good-looking men and women in jogging/hiking shorts.
- Spend time around animals, if you like them (and if you don't, I feel sorry for you). If you have animals, this is the time to let them comfort you. Even goldfish are good listeners...you can imagine what they'd say! Animals are proven depression lifters. No animals of your own? Volunteer to walk a friend's dog or hang out with friends who have pets...petting a sweet dog or an adorable cat can be more effective than any anti-depressant.
- Watch what you eat and drink. If you're tempted to eat junk food, (1) get yourself out of the house and eat at a

healthy place or (2) buy some healthy food and make a nice, simple meal for yourself. A junk food diet contributes to depression (especially the highs and lows of large amounts of sugar and caffeine), so feed yourself healthy stuff and you'll feel less depressed.

- Make yourself get dressed and leave the house, even on non-work days. Stay in bed if you're tired, but not if you're sad. My rule of thumb is: it's okay to stay in bed for the morning, but not for the whole day.
- If you're depressed, let yourself have a good cry whenever you can. It's cathartic, and you're likely to feel better after. Keeping strong emotions inside is not good for your mind or body.


Sometimes, depression or anxiety is too much for us. If you have suicidal feelings, pay attention to them. Do not ignore them. This is a sign that you need professional help. Call your doctor, therapist or go to the nearest hospital emergency room if you experience suicidal feelings. Get professional help! Don't try to do it alone. Get professional help.

And, as a last resort, get off your butt and volunteer. When you give to others, you feel good about yourself and you put yourself in social situations where you're likely to meet like-minded people...and what could be better than that?

ly formed gay rights group has hit the ground running, launching a public push to legalize civil unions for the state's gay and lesbian couples.

Equality Delaware's first meeting, attended by about 120 people, resulted in the unveiling Thursday of the campaign to get civil unions. State Rep. Melanie George and Sen. David Sokola have signed on to be the lead sponsors of the bill, which they said will



likely be filed in mid-March, according to the News Journal (Wilmington, Del.).

According to the group, about 700 Delaware couples would enter a civil union within the first few years the law takes effect.

In addition to granting gay and lesbian couples the same rights as married couples have in the state, the civil union law would also rescind current policies that fine and imprison same-sex couples who fraudulently present themselves as married couples. It would also establish religious freedom protections for clergy, and ensure that same-sex marriages from other states be recognized in Delaware.

Equality Delaware president Lisa Goodman told the News Journal that there is enough support to legalize civil unions, but fullon marriage equality would probably be an unsuccessful battle.

Gay Art Controversy in Washington State

A tiny gallery in Vashon, Wash., has been forced to remove art that the building's owners found objectionable because of its gay content.

The Two Wall Gallery is located within a building owned by Louise Rice, her husband Ray Rice, and daughter, Wendy Rice. The gallery, really two walls in a hallway of a retail building, operates rent-free, and the owners say it's their discretion as to what art is appropriate to be shown. The Rices objected to the work of two artists, one being Greg Davila, who had photographs of semi-nude gay couples.

"The entire homosexual content was part of it," Ray Rice told the Seattle Post-Intelligencer. "We have a right to critique what goes on in the building. They can do whatever they want to do, but Louise didn't think it was appropriate to show the homosexuals doing their thing in the building, and that's her prerogative."

The Rices made it clear they don't want curator Jack Strubbe, who is gay, organizing any more shows in their gallery. In the meantime, all the works that were taken down are being shown at a store across the street from the Two Wall gallery.

"For those who want to help," the speed skater wrote on Facebook, "save your pennies and make that trip to New Zealand you have always wanted to do in a year from now. Christchurch is truly an amazing city. Today is its darkest day and my

Christchurch mayor Bob Parker said Wednesday (local time) that the death toll from the 6.3 magnitude quake has risen to 55, and as many as 300 people could be missing. In response to the country's deadliest earthquake in 80 years, about 70 U.S. emergency rescue workers are being sent to assist on the ground, the Agence France -Presse reports.

Rahm Emanuel Wins Chicago Mayor Race

Rahm Emanuel has been elected the new mayor of Chicago in a landslide victory.

The former White House Chief of Staff has nearly 55 percent of the vote with 88 percent of precincts reporting. Former Board of Education President Gery Chico is in second place with 24 percent, City Clerk Miguel del Valle has nine percent and long time civil rights advocate Carol Moseley Braun is in fourth with eight percent of the vote.

Longtime LGBT ally Richard Daley decided not to seek reelection in September.

Emanuel, a former congressman from Illinois, stepped down as White House chief of staff last year to prepare his run. He has been endorsed by Equality Illinois PAC and the Human Rights Campaign.

ChicagoPride.com reported Tuesday morning: "Emanuel, who received the endorsement of over 200 LGBT community leaders and advocates including openly gay state Rep. Greg Harris (D-Chicago) and state Rep. Deborah Mell (D-Chicago), has approached 50 percent in opinion polls but his numbers have since dropped in recent polling."








Volunteers Needed for LGBT Cigarette Smoking Survey

If you are lesbian, gay, bisexual, or transgender and smoke cigarettes, please participate in a national and anonymous survey study on reasons for adult LGBT tobacco use. The purpose of the study is to better understand ways of being, thinking, and feeling that influence adult LGBT cigarette smoking.

The study is being conducted by Dr. Darrell Greene and Dr. Paula Britton, through John Carroll University and the JCU Education and Allied Studies Department.
