Tennessee Church's 'Satan' Sign Sparks Outrage, Gets Taken Down

A sign posted outside a Tennessee Baptist church was removed after it sparked outrage in the community and on the Internet.

"Remember Satan was the first to demand equal rights" disappeared from the marquee of the Knoxville's Baptist Tabernacle Church earlier this week following Facebook posts calling the message anti-Christian.



"What is wrong with you people?" posted Ashley Snipes.
"You are sending everyone the wrong messages with your ignorance!"

Knoxville resident Adam Miller posted "I thought surely someone wouldn't post such a thing. Makes me sad I was wrong and doubly sad that these folks are in my back yard."

Pastor Tony Greene said the church meant no harm. The message, he said, was about unity.

"It was not a statement against any one group in particular," he said, according to WATE-TV. "You know, what about the rights of the unborn babies, the rights of children, the rights of everyone?"

A Facebook poster named Andy Henry wrote, "It's clearly a sign that was meant to offend a particular group - the LGBT community. Because of (church officials') lack of foresight, they ended up offending everybody who had ever fought for equality or civil rights in general," reported WBIR-TV.

The church's sign now reads "Glad you reading. Did not mean to offend. We all need Christ."

Indiana Newspaper Sends Big Message

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Extend protected status to gays, lesbians. RFRA and new protections can co-exist.

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A striking front page for Tuesday's edition of the Indianapolis Star delivers an all-caps message to state lawmakers.

"FIX THIS NOW," reads the headline for a rare front-page editorial.

The newspaper argues the so-called "Religious Freedom Restoration Act," signed into law last week by Governor

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






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Mike Pence (at right). "already has done enormous harm to our state and potentially our economic future."

"The consequences will only get worse if our state leaders delay in fixing the deep mess created," it warns, before calling on lawmakers to add sexual orientation and gender identity to the state's antidiscrimination laws. "Half steps will not be enough. Half steps will not undo the damage. Only bold action - ac-



tion that sends an unmistakable message to the world that our state will not tolerate discrimination against any of its citizens — will be enough to reverse the damage.

"Gov. Mike Pence and the General Assembly need to enact a state law to prohibit discrimination in employment, housing. education and public accommodations on the basis of a person's sexual orientation or gender identity."

Pence was asked directly on Sunday whether he'd sign such a law. "I will not push for that," he told ABC's George Stephanopoulos. "That's not on my agenda, and that's not been an objective of the people of the state of Indiana."

For his part, Pence published his own op-ed in the Wall Street Journal on Tuesday, in which he assured the business community that the law isn't discriminatory. Instead of championing anti-discrimination legislation, Pence suggests the "Golden Rule" ensures LGBT people are protected.

"I abhor discrimination," writes Pence. "I believe in the Golden Rule that you should 'do unto others as you would have them do unto you.' If I saw a restaurant owner refuse to serve a gay couple, I wouldn't eat there anymore."

The Indianapolis Star editors couldn't have seen Pence's op-ed before publishing their own, but they mange to address its message anyway.

"We urge Gov. Pence and lawmakers to stop clinging to arguments about whether RFRA really does what critics fear; to stop clinging to ideology or personal preferences; to focus instead on fixing this," the newspaper wrote. "Governor, Indiana is in a state of crisis. It is worse than you seem to understand."

Op-ed: 'Religious Discrimination' Laws Have Nothing to Do With Religion

The value of religious freedom is paramount in our country — that's why it's enshrined in our nation's Constitution. Let there be no doubt: People of faith and their right to exercise their closely held religious beliefs are fully protected.



Most unfortunately, a select group of insidious activists and elected officials is pretending those protections don't exist and is threatening the civil rights of LGBT Americans.

Legislators in states such as Indiana, Arkansas, and Georgia are busy pushing bills that purport to further protect religious believers from the so-called scourge of government intrusion. But these bills aren't about religious belief at all: They're about discrimination, pure and simple.

Legislative proposals like the one coming to Arkansas Gov. Asa Hutchinson and the bill Indiana Gov. Mike Pence signed into law Thursday are driven not by belief but by fear of the unknown. As marriage equality edges closer and closer to becoming the law of the land, those who are dismayed by the broad sweep of progress are using so-called religious freedom bills as ballast. But doing so puts not only LGBT Americans and their families at risk — it puts all of us in an untenable position.

These religious refusal proposals tell folks they can pick and choose which laws they want to follow. That individuals can sue not only businesses but teachers, firefighters, and police officers if they believe their religious rights are violated. If a police officer sues his precinct because he is required to patrol a mosque, can laws like the one in Indiana protect him? If a father sues a teacher because she disciplined his child under a community-wide antibullying policy, can legislation like that before the governor of Arkansas put that teacher in jeopardy? These bills are intentionally vague, leaving it up to an overburdened court system to decide whether an individual's religious beliefs are more important than another person's

basic civil rights.

We oppose these bills because they seek not to preserve or protect religious believers but to demean and exclude LGBT people, religious minorities, and others who may find themselves standing on the outside looking in.

I have seen discrimination. I have stood inside businesses that would not serve me because of my race, and I have been told that the rights of those business owners were more important than mine. I countered that logic then, as I do now. We have no crisis of religious discrimination; we have a crisis of fear. I stand against these bills and with those who are fighting to stop them. I refuse to allow discrimination to cloak itself in a shroud of faith. I refuse to give into fear.

Video Shows Gay Man Stoned to Death in Jamaica

A young Jamaican man was pummeled to death with rocks as his killers chanted antigay slurs, according to a video and local reports.

Video of the public execution was posted on a Jamaican news site and then removed March 3, according to the blog Minority -Insight. Common Jamaican antigay slurs like "batty boy" are heard as the man is killed.

PinkNews reports that the crime occurred in Montego Bay, though that's according to unconfirmed social media postings. The Jamaican government, known by some as complicit in antigay hate crimes in this deeply homophobic country, has not issued a statement on the video.

The Guardian newspaper recently interviewed 2,000 Jamaicans about their feelings toward gay people. Though the paper found widespread animosity toward gays, younger and more educated people expressed much less intolerance. Men, and especially those who listen to dancehall music, were found to be the most homophobic.

Frankie Grande: Smoking 'Ain't Cute,' Guys

When I was a little boy my father, Dr. Victor Marchione — a pulmonologist — took me into the hospital and showed me a black lung. He wrung out the lung out in front of me and I watched the black tar that killed its previous owner



spill into a tray right in front of my face. From that point forward I vowed that I would never touch a cigarette and made it part of my life's mission to deter and stop others from doing so as well.

When I was 5, I walked up to a couple smoking in a restaurant and told them point-blank, "You're going to die." Then I walked away. I can only imagine their confusion as to why this little boy was predicting their imminent demise. Did they think it was the food in the restaurant or perhaps that I was a small prophet? Back then, when we didn't know as much, they may not have thought I was referring to the cigarettes in their hands and the smoke they inhaled between bites.

Now it is an undisputable fact that smoking kills by destroying your lungs and body. It's a huge problem, but it is htting the LGBT community especially hard. According to the National Adult Tobacco Survey conducted in 2009 and 2010, the prevalence of any type of current tobacco use is higher for LGBT adults compared to heterosexual adults, and overall, sexual minorities are 1.5 to 2.5 times more likely to smoke than heterosexuals. But the problem doesn't just affect the adults in our community; it is affecting our youth at alarming rates. Smoking rates among LGB youth are estimated to be considerably higher (38 percent to 59 percent) than those among adolescents in general (28 percent to 35 percent).

To understand why people in our community are still smoking, we need to understand why they start. Several factors, such as higher levels of social stress, frequent patronage of bars and clubs, higher rates of alcohol and drug use, and direct targeting of LBG consumers by the tobacco industry may be related to higher rates of tobacco use among LGB people. Among youth,

research suggests that smoking rates are high because of unique stressors that contribute to their risk of substance use, such as coming out, physical and verbal victimization, feelings of alienation, and depression.

While manufacturers of tobacco products are required to prominently label packaging with warning messages, they continue targeting the LGBT market through their marketing initiatives. According to Legacy Tobacco Documents Library, industry documents show that tobacco companies are aware of high smoking rates among sexual minorities, and marketing plans illustrate the companies' efforts to exploit the LGBT market. Countering those marketing attacks with education campaigns is one of the best ways to keep our community healthy, but education campaigns can't be boring — they have to be fun and compel the viewer to take action.

The "Left Swipe Dat" video that I did with Brittany Louise Taylor organized by The Truth, one of the largest and most successful youth smoking prevention campaigns, does just that — educates with humor and gives us all a simple way to combat the problem. The point of the "Left Swipe Dat" campaign is to shine a light on one aspect of the impact that smoking can have; it's a funny video with a serious message. When you see a photo of someone smoking on a dating app, "Left Swipe Dat," and by doing so, you will take a personal stand against smoking and send Big Tobacco a message that you will not support this bad habit. The video also reminds people that smoking is not only deadly, it's unattractive, so it's time to finish It once and for all.

Personally, I want a significant other who is going to take care of himself. I take a great deal of pride in maintaining a healthy body, so when others advertise smoking in their photos, this tells me that they don't understand the impact that they are having on themselves and others. Love yourself, take care of your body, and don't destroy it. Make yourself more attractive by just putting down that cigarette.

As I said earlier, it is important to me to help deter others from smoking. This video helps further that goal, and if I can get just one person to quit smoking, in turn saving their life, then I will be happy. And if I can influence people to take a stand through this video, then I will have satisfied my mission because smoking and cancer ain't cute.

6 Ways You Can Get HIV

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You thought he was monogamous

Surprisingly, this is one of the most common ways that people report becoming HIV-positive. When you enter into a monogamous relationship, you shouldn't have to question your partner's fidelity or be forced to wear condoms on your wedding night. But that doesn't mean you should turn a blind eye to the possibility of your partner sleeping with another person. So keep the communication open and the topic of HIV on both of your minds to minimize your risk while maximizing your pleasure.

He didn't know he was HIV-positive

You like him, he likes you and both of you seem to be as healthy as can be. Of course you would use a condom for a hook-up, but this isn't a hook-up and condoms are so "unromantic." Many people feel like sex without a condom is more intimate and a sign of trust. The decision to remove a condom as a relationship progresses can be a very good thing, but not before you've been tested together. Remember, more than half of young people living with HIV do not know that they are HIV-positive. And according to the CDC, the majority of HIV infections occur from someone who is unaware of their status. If you skip getting tested together, one of you may unknowingly transmit the disease.


Drugs and Alcohol impaired your judgment

So you claim to wear condoms most of the time, but when examining your most recent sexual romps, the details are a little hazy. Maybe you wore a condom, maybe you didn't. Drugs and alcohol are one of the biggest risk factors when it comes to the spread of HIV. If you know that your likelihood of wearing a rubber decreases as the drinks start to flow, you may want to take a sobering look at just how risky your behavior may be.

You didn't ask, he didn't tell

Naturally, you would assume that anyone who is HIV-positive would disclose his or her status before having sex with you. So you just presume that since they didn't bring it up, you're safe. Unfortunately, people fail to disclose all kinds of things, especially when it comes to sex. If you don't ask, he may not tell you. And in case you need reminding, just because he says he

is HIV-negative doesn't make it true. When it comes to your HIV status, you cannot afford to be too idealistic.

You are a top so you thought you were safe

It's common knowledge that HIV is a "bottom" thing, right? So when a hot guy is cool with going at it without a condom, you consider it safe. But if the same guy is unknowingly living with HIV and carrying a high viral load, your risk might not be as low as you think. Many men have reported contracting HIV from topping during anal sex. According to a recent study, around one-in-five men who were recently infected were tops.

You thought it couldn't happen to you

It's easy to consider HIV as separate from your reality and, therefore, not a threat to your health. Many people living with HIV do so in secret; never revealing their status to their friends and family. This, along with improved medications, has created an environment where people falsely believe that HIV isn't a part of their world. Don't be naïve. HIV continues to spread and you are just like everyone else — at risk for HIV.

So get tested, talk about prevention with your friends and your partner, and be aware of the risks you face. Your sexual health depends on it.





Major Companies Decry 'License to Discriminate' Bills

Several major corporations have signed on to a Human Rights Campaign statement decrying proposed "license to discriminate" bills like the one that just became law in



Indiana and the one awaiting action by the governor of Arkansas.

The first nine signatories are American Airlines, Apple, Levi Strauss, Microsoft, Orbitz Worldwide, Replacements, Starwood Hotels & Resorts Worldwide, Symantec, and Wells Fargo.

The statement denounces as "bad for business" laws that would allow individuals and companies to discriminate against those who offend their religious beliefs — for instance, LGBT people or members of a different faith. The current rash of legislation is largely in reaction to the spread of marriage equality, as some vendors of wedding-related goods and services want to be able to turn away same-sex couples without running afoul of state antidiscrimination law.

"Equality in the workplace is a business priority to foster talent and innovation, and these state laws undermine this core value," the statement reads in part. "These state laws set a dangerous precedent that stifles investment and economic growth by jeopardizing a state's status as a welcoming place for employees to live and thrive, undermining the success of a business at large.

"It is unreasonable for job creators to recruit a diverse workforce from states that encourage businesses to discriminate against our community of employees or consumers. While these bills won't alter our commitment to equality in the workplace, this legislation sends the wrong message about the states in which we operate and threatens our core corporate commit-



ment to respect all individuals. We the undersigned call for public officials to defeat or abandon efforts to enact this type of harmful legislation."

HRC officials said they expect additional companies to sign on to the document, which is available on the organization's website. HRC president Chad Griffin issued a statement praising the businesses that have taken a stand against such laws, which are under consideration in numerous states.

"Business leaders have made it abundantly clear that these anti-LGBT bills undermine their core values and set dangerous precedents that stifle investment and economic growth," he said. "Anti-equality lawmakers who value corporate investments in their state should sit up, pay attention, and abandon these bills attacking LGBT people."

A free-will donation will be taken at the concert with all proceeds going to Outlinc, a nonprofit organization dedicated to serving and advancing the Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual and Transgender (LGBT) community.

Musical selections include "Bridge over Troubled Water," by Simon and Garfunkel, "I Sing Out," by Mark Hayes and "Make Them Hear You," from the musical Ragtime. Additional pieces, mainly from Broadway and popular collections, were specifically selected for their messages of inclusion, hope and empowerment.

The River City Mixed Chorus is in its 31st season and includes 100 singers. RCMC is one of the longest-running gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender and ally (GLBTA) mixed choruses in the United States and is under the direction of Dr. A. Barron Breland.

"Our mission is to create exceptional musical experiences to support diversity, inspire change and empower communities," said Breland. "We realize that our community reaches beyond Omaha, where the majority of our singers live. It includes Lincoln, the state of Nebraska and the entire United States. We look forward to expanding the reach of our message of inclusion and acceptance to the Lincoln community."

Star City Pride Looks to Strengthen Event with \$10,000 Grant

Early this March, Star City Pride – Lincoln's annual four-day celebration of the LGBT community – was awarded a \$10,000 grant through the Nebraska Tourism Commission.

After becoming a non-profit organization last year, organizers with Star City Pride applied for the grant. It became 1 of 26 awardees from a pool of 52 applicants.

Now in its eighth year, Star City Pride hopes to strengthen the expanse of the event and assemble a more robust advertising campaign for each of the four days, which will take place July 9-12 this year.

"None of us had ever written any kind of grant like that before, so it was kind of daunting at first," said Vadra Stutzman, Star City Pride president. "But with this now, we're looking to do things we haven't been able to do in the past."

Funds from the grant will allow Star City Pride to advertise outside of a 100-mile radius of Lincoln and will go to fund printing costs of the "Pride Guide," the event's signature brochure that includes sponsors for the event, its largest source of income.

In the past, Stutzman said the organization has never been able to afford advertisements in radio or newspapers outside of Lincoln. Now they hope to make the event more widespread and reach places like western Nebraska, for those who may not have the support of an LGBT community like Lincoln and Omaha has.

Ryan Huskey, vice president of Star City Pride, said Star City Pride will officially be able to attend surrounding pride events as an organization for the first time.

Moines, Iowa, and Omaha, Stutzman hopes the grant will further help these relationships with LGBT communities in other states and draw a greater breadth of attendees.

Life Beyond Therapy

How To Choose A Therapist

How To Choose A Therapist Recently, I got an email from a guy who said:

"A friend of mine told me that he was tired of hearing me complain all the time about the same problems over and over and that I should see a therapist. I've never gone to a therapist; what exactly do you do?"



I recommended that he consider therapists as personal trainers for the mind. For example, when you work out at the gym, hit a plateau and can't progress any further, if you're smart, you stop doing the same old unproductive routine and get a trainer to help you move to the next level.

A therapist does similar work for your mental state; when you're "stuck" and can't progress mentally, you need some expert help. Friends, relatives and lovers can be helpful, but they have neither the training nor the objectivity and confidentiality that a good therapist does.

Therapists (psychotherapists, psychologists and psychiatrists) are regulated and licensed by the rules and regulations of your state. They usually have rigid continuing education requirements and can lose their licenses if they misbehave (e.g., have sex with a client, violate your rights to confidentiality, etc.). If you have a problem that is not going away, for example, your self-esteem continues to be low after years of trying to feel better about yourself, or you can't get over your ex, or you feel depressed or panicky and often anxious, a therapist may be helpful.

There are different types of therapists. Your State may have a different title for them than the State next door. Keeping that in mind, here is some general information:

A psychotherapist is specifically trained to do psychotherapy, that is, talk therapy for your psychological issues. They do not issue prescriptions for any medications and rarely do psychological testing. Psychologists are usually to do talk therapy (like psychotherapists), but may do psychological testing as well. These folks often have the initials Ph.D. after their names.

Psychiatrists are medical doctors (MDs) who specialize in mental health. Their primary focus is usually in doing psychological evaluations and dispensing medications (antidepressants, antianxiety medications, etc.).

You can go to any of these for "therapy", but note that each has their own specialty. Psychiatrists are usually the most expensive, psychologists and psychotherapists usually charge less.

How do you find a therapist that you like and is able to help you with your problem(s)? Well...how did you find your doctor, dentist or chiropractor? Most of us ask our friends, family and co-workers for recommendations. Once you have some potential therapist candidates, I recommend that you come up with a list of questions to ask them before you call them up.

Some therapists will speak with you on the telephone before your first appointment, others will not. If this is your first time in therapy, I recommend talking with a therapist on the phone before you make an appointment; here are some questions to consider asking them:

"I am looking for help with ————". Do you have experience with this?" "If not, can you recommend someone who specializes in this area?"

"How would you help me?"

"How often would you want me to come in?"

"How long would our sessions last?"

"How many times do you think I'd need to see you?"

"How much do you charge for your sessions?"

"Do you have evening/weekend/early morning appointments?"

This is not an exhaustive list, but it's a good start. Interview several therapists over the phone before you choose one to see in person. Remember, this is how they make their living, so keep your telephone interviews as focused as possible...ask your questions but don't waste their time.

Once you have done your telephone interviews, pick one or two therapists and schedule an appointment. Tell them during your appointment that you are looking for a therapist and may see another therapist (or two) in order to find a therapist that you really click with.

Don't feel guilty if you don't click with the first (or second) therapist you meet. You may need to meet with two or three to find the right one. It's your time and money, so make sure you feel comfortable with who you choose. Then, get ready to face your problems and change your life!

Slow-Cooked Pork & Sauerkraut

Ingredients
1 (20 oz.) can or bag sauerkraut

1/4 cup brown sugar 1 1/2 lb. ground pork sausage

1 onion, sliced

Methods/Steps

Methods/Steps

Brown sausage in skillet, stirring until crumbly. Drain and cool. Place crescent rolls on floured pastry board; flatten and pinch seams together. Roll into 2 rectangles. Sprinkle sausage and remaining ingredients on rectangle. Roll to enclose filling; seal edge. Cut into 1/2 inch slices. Place slices in 2 greased baking pans. Grill with lid down over medium-low indirect heat for 30-35 minutes or bake in a preheated 400-degree oven.





Organizers even hope to host RuPaul – a renowned drag performer and producer of RuPaul's Drag Race – as an emcee for one night.

In the early years, Stutzman and volunteers raised funds by themselves for the entire event, which typically costs around \$15,000 to \$20,000, hosting fundraisers that ranged from dunk tanks, golf tournaments, drag shows and barbecues.

"The first event we ever had was just an afternoon in the park with maybe around 50-60 people," Stutzman said. "Now, in just this past year, I think we had grown to a crowd of maybe five to six thousand people."

This year, Stutzman and Huskey said they will continue these fundraisers and grow fundraising efforts to one day establish a parade with the event.

"It's been exciting just seeing this grow bigger and bigger each year," Stutzman said.

But both Stutzman and Huskey expect the event will still have the same close community feel for all ages and continue to further their goal to defend human and civil rights and promote equality throughout the entire Lincoln community.

"The main thing we hope to do is to give a safe space for people to have fun for a weekend and promote acceptance," Huskey said. "There's a huge difference between tolerance and acceptance, and we hope the more Lincoln has events like this, the more acceptance the state is going to have."



Gay-Bashing Murderers Become First Same-Sex Couple To Marry in Prison

Two convicted murderers detained in one of Britain's toughest prisons have become the first gay couple to marry in jail, The Guardian reports.

Mikhail Gallatinov and Marc Goodwin exchanged vows in Full Sutton prison, a top security facility in East Yorkshire, England, in what is believed to be the first same-sex



marriage (or civil partnership) to take place in a prison since the equal marriage act was introduced.

Both men are serving life sentences for gay-bashing crimes. Gallatinov, 40, is a convicted pedophile who was sentenced in 1997 for murdering a man he had met through a gay chat line. Goodwin, 31, was jailed 10 years later for a homophobic killing on Blackpool seafront.

At their wedding ceremony, the pair exchanged vows they had written in front relatives, fellow prisoners, and four prison officers.

"These two guys were on separate wings at Full Sutton and used to meet — and have sex — in the prison library," a source told the Guardian. "Then they managed to get on the same wing and had sex regularly."

A prison service spokesman said the wedding had come at no cost to British taxpayers. "We are very clear that if prisoners do get married, the taxpayer does not foot the bill for the ceremony and they are certainly not allowed to share a cell," he confirmed.

In England, under the terms of the Marriage Act 1983, all prisoners can exercize their right to marry under civil law in the place of their detention. Since last year's Marriage Act, same-sex couples are also entitled to the right to marry in jail.



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
