Two Women in their 90s Marry in Iowa, Seven Decades after Meeting

Vivian Boyack and Alice "Nonie" Dubes say it is never too late for people to write new chapters in their lives.



Boyack, 91, and Dubes, 90, began a new chapter in their 72-year relationship Saturday when they exchanged wedding vows at First Christian Church, Davenport.

Surrounded by family and a small group of close friends, the two held hands as the Rev. Linda Hunsaker told the couple that, "This is a celebration of something that should have happened a very long time ago."

The two met in Yale, Iowa, where they grew up, and moved to Davenport in 1947.

Boyack was a longtime teacher in Davenport, directing the lives of children at Lincoln and Grant elementary schools.

"I always wanted to be a teacher," Boyack said Saturday after the ceremony. "My plan at an early age was to teach in the school where I was then going, and my teacher would move on to another school."

Dubes worked for the Times and Democrat for 13 years in payroll. "I signed the paychecks for everybody, including Bill Wundram," she said. After leaving the news business, she worked for Alter Corp. for 25 years.

Over the years, the two have traveled to all 50 states, all the provinces of Canada, and to England twice.

"We've had a good time," Dubes said. Boyack added it takes a lot of love and work to keep a relationship going for 72 years.

Jerry Yeast, 73, of Davenport, has known the couple since he was an 18-year-old landscaper working in their yard.

"I've known these two women all my life, and I can tell you, they are special," Yeast said. "This is a very special day for all of us."

"We have stooped so low that LGBTs no longer hide their orientations," Dauren Babamuratov, the leader of the nationalist movement called "Future" told The Independent. "This means they no longer hide their [sexual] orientation."

I think it is easy to identify a gay person by his or her DNA. A blood test can show the presence of degeneratism in a person."

There was recent outrage in Kazakhstan after a gay club poster in Almaty, the largest Kazakh city, depicted a gay kiss between Russian poet Alexander Pushkin and Kazakh composer Kurmangazy Sagyrbayuly.

"There is no gay propaganda in Kazakhstan, but there is homophobia," Kazakh activist and journalist Zhanar Sekerbayeva said, according to Tengri News.

He said the Future movement "is carrying absolutely patriarchal views. We propagate nothing, we don't organize pride parades, we are not shouting slogans in the street. Outlawing us would be a discrimination."

Kazakhstan is a former soviet state that passed the "Code on Marriage and Family" in 1998 and the Kazakh government overturned the anti-sodomy laws.

Politicians in Kazakhstan are now trying to make changes to the code to further hinder LGBT community members from enjoying full freedom.

"The question of gay marriage in Kazakhstan has never been on the agenda," Sekerbayeva told Tengri News. "No one has been promoting it. There is only homophobia and discrimination against women."

The Highest-Paid Female CEO is a Transgender Founder Who Built a Robot Version of Her Wife

Martine Rothblatt founded a \$5 billion company after living as a man for the first half of her life. Today, she's working on building robotic clones of humans.

The 59-year-old founder of pharmaceutical company United Therapeutics, Rothblatt earned \$38 million in 2013, but far more interesting than her financial success is the fact that she is a futurist who spent the first half of her life as a man. The subject of a recent profile in New York magazine, Rothblatt believes technology will help humans achieve immortality. Her latest project--a work in progress of sorts--involves building a robot clone of her wife.

By way of background, before founding her \$5 billion company, Rothblatt was a lawyer named Martin Rothblatt and an expert in the law of outer space. He quit his job at a prominent law firm in 1983 to launch car-navigation system Geostar, and in 1990 he founded satellite radio company Sirius.

Rothblatt began the transformation process to become a woman in the early 1990s, after fathering four children. She published a book in 1995 called *The Apartheid of Sex*, in which she argues that gender categories should be overhauled. She writes



in the book that:

"There are five billion people in the world and five billion unique sexual identities...Genitals are as irrelevant to one's role in society as skin tone. Hence, the legal division of people into males and females is as wrong as the legal division of people into black and white races."

While Rothblatt's belief that humans will one day achieve immortality through technological advances may sound ambitious (to say the least), she is something of a pioneer in the area of extending lifespans. During the 1990s, Rothblatt created a foundation to find a cure for primary pulmonary hypertension (PPH), a rare, fatal disease her son was diagnosed with in 1991. This led to the creation of her pharmaceutical company, United Therapeutics, which had the goal of creating a pill to treat PPH so that patients would not need 24-hour intravenous drug therapy.

There is still no cure for PPH, but last year Rothblatt got FDA approval for the drug in pill form, and patients today can live longer thanks to drugs developed by United Therapeutics and other companies.

In Rothblatt's new book, *Virtually Human: The Promise--and the Peril--of Digital Immortality*, she argues that the progress made by humans to extend life--from penicillin to organ transplants--will reach the point where life can be prolonged indefinitely. Futurist Ray Kurzweil, the director of engineering at Google, shares her belief.

Perhaps Rothblatt's wildest endeavor, however, is a related project to create a robot clone of her wife, Bina, that will live forever. In 2010, Rothblatt commissioned a firm called Hanson Robotics to build an artificially intelligent robot based on her wife. The

concept of what Rothblatt calls "mindclones" involves the creation of digital replicas of humans. As reported in the New York piece, these replicas would be based on "video interviews, photographs, personality tests and the entirety of their digital lives-- Facebook posts, tweets, Amazon orders. These mindclones would exist in a parallel with their flesh-and-blood originals but act, judge, think, feel, remember, and learn on their own."

Rothblatt's wife's robotic clone, called "Bina48" (based on her wife's age at the time of the clone's creation) includes a head-and-shoulders replica of Bina and was programmed using 20 hours of interviews with Bina.

While Rothblatt concedes that Bina48 is a "far cry" from the real Bina, who knew that a female CEO running a \$5 billion company could also help advance the field of A.I. and robotics as a hobby?

For Rothblatt, her life's work goes far beyond being a successful entrepreneur. As of today, she seems to be making a lot of progress blurring the lines between science fiction and reality.

Idaho Spends Thousands on Lackluster Defense of Marriage Ban

So far, the state of Idaho has spent a little over \$71,000 to defend its marriage ban. And what do they have to show for it? Not much.

The bulk of the expense came from the governor's general fund, and went to Monte Stewart, a private attorney chosen to represent the state.



Stewart's payout so far has covered his hourly rate of \$250, which includes \$50,000 for preparing briefs and \$7,000 for oral argument before the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals.

Stewart's performance at the oral argument was generally considered lackluster. He recycled the same claims about "channeling" procreation that have been rejected by dozens of judges over the last year and a half.

The state of Idaho had the option to present arguments of its own, but chose instead to give all of its time to Stewart.

At times, Stewart had difficulty remembering details, referred to the wrong state, and admitted to making up the term "bonding right" to suggest that children require attachment to their biological parents.

Stewart also claimed that allowing gay and lesbian couples to marry would discourage heterosexual men from bonding with their children. An incredulous Judge Marsha Berzon asked, "has that happened in Massachusetts? ... My understanding is no."

In addition, Stewart argued that marriage equality would be more harmful than divorce. That, too, was met with skepticism by the three-judge panel.

Stewart's \$57,000 argument also included terminology like "genderless marriage," an insulting nonsense-term that would seem to betray his claim that supporters of the ban are not motivated by animus.

The cost to defend Idaho's marriage ban is likely to significantly increase. Earlier this year, the plaintiffs asked to be reimbursed for \$467,000 in expenses after they won the first round of litigation. Lawmakers have set aside \$1 million for the ban's defense.

"The price is too high for switching to a radically different meaning of the definition of marriage," Stewart told the court. He couldn't identify what that "price" would be, perhaps because it doesn't exist, and even if it did, would surely be less than the price of defending inequality.

LGBT Groups, Conservatives Outraged As Straight Mates Marry for Rugby Tickets

A radio competition orchestrated same-sex marriage for two straight male friends and gay rights groups are outraged.

Two heterosexual men in New Zealand got married Friday for a radio competition for 2015 Rugby World Cup tickets.

The wedding between 23-year-old Travis McIntosh and 24-year-old Matt McCormick, has come under fire from both LGBT and conservative groups in the country. The marriage was a stunt put on by The Edge radio station known for its antics and wild stunts, according to the Huffington Post.

"We are not here to insult anyone," McIntosh told the New Zealand Herald. "We are here to do our own thing and travel our own path. It's just seeing how far two good mates would go to win a trip to the Rugby World Cup."

But the stunt has drawn reaction from both sides of the debate.

"Something like this trivializes what we fought for," Neill Ballantyne, a coordinator for the Otago University Students' Association Queer Support, told the New Zealand Herald. Ballantyne added that the competition pokes fun of same-sex marriage "as something outrageous that you'd never do."

Both radio station officials and the two friends who tied the knot claim they never intended to poke fun at same-sex marriage. The marriage was orchestrated as part of the radio station's "Love You, Man" contest.

"It essentially makes a mockery of marriage," Alex Greenwich, an independent member of parliament from Sydney, told the Sydney Morning Herald. "Marriage is a really important institution about love and commitment and it's sad to see that there are people making a joke out of it."

Even conservatives have used the opportunity to make comment on the social acceptance of same-sex marriage. Some conservatives think the outrage expressed by gay groups is ironic.

"This competition makes a mockery of marriage, but so did redefining marriage," Bob McCoskrie, the director of Family First, told the Sydney Morning Herald.

The Truth About Gay PDA: LGBT Whisper Users Sound Off Anonymously

In May, ESPN captured Michael Sam's emotional reaction after learning he'd become the first openly gay player to be drafted into the NFL. Photos and videos showed Sam, who has since been signed to the Dallas Cowboys' practice squad, playfully smashing a slice of cake in boyfriend Vito Cammisano's face before leaning in for a passionate smooch.

One could interpret the ESPN report as indicative of increased social acceptance when it comes to public displays of affection among same-sex couples, and certainly, media coverage has gotten more positive overall. But when it comes to PDA, has it REALLY gotten better for the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) community?

LGBT users took to Whisper to anonymously submit their feelings about PDA, and the responses were mixed, to say the least.

"I'm openly gay but I sometimes feel uncomfortable holding my girlfriends hand in public," one user wrote. Added another: "I'm so ashamed to be bisexual that I get repulsed when I see gay couples in public."

Life Beyond Therapy

Friendship

Last week I was talking with my best friend. As usual, we covered a wide range of subjects. He brought up the subject of Friendship and suggested I write a column about it, telling me: "Friendship is severely underrated in the LGBT community, especially among men". A client of mine told me, "Boyfriends come and go, but friendships last a lot longer. I'd be sunk without my friends."

What is a friend? Here are some definitions I like: someone who loves you and who you love. Someone you respect, trust and enjoy spending time with. Someone who forgives you, tries to help you when you need it, and tells you when you're being stupid without making you feel stupid.

And, my favorite definition: someone it's okay to fart in front of.

I asked my best friend why we are still friends after meeting 22 years ago. He said, "We have a core appreciation of each other, despite our differences." You may not agree with a friend, or like what they say. You may even think they sound like an idiot on a given subject, but you still respect them.

In a friendship, mutual intimacy invites openness, vulnerability and feeling accepted. A friend told me that he used to be afraid of being intimate and vulnerable, but decided to risk it: "I was afraid to let people really see me. But, I realized, what do I have to lose? I'm already sad and lonely. I want friends."

Good friendships have depth: there is more to your relationship than common interests or similar personalities. There is history, understanding and acceptance. You've seen them at their worst (and vice-versa) and you still love each other anyway.

What do you want from a friend? It's good to be clear about this. As we move through life, we usually want different things at different times from friends. What you want from your friends at age 27 is probably quite different from what you want at age 72.

Or not.

Making friends is a risk-taking activity. People may reject you. People may flake out on you. People may not be who they present on first meeting. So what else is new? Making and cultivating friends is a process that unfolds over time. We're all bound to go through some bad matches before we get to solid gold.

Real friendships grow slowly. Too many of us scare potential friends away by telling them too much, too fast. Slowly open up to someone: if you feel safe and appreciated, a budding friendship may begin. If you feel uncomfortable or anxious, this person may not be right for you.

Lasting friendships have realistic expectations. Like you, your friends screw up from time to time. Like you, they don't always say the right things or show up when you need them. All friendships go through rough times. No matter how much you love each other, friends inevitably get on each other's nerves. What do you do about it? Give up and dump them, or hang in and work it out?

To cultivate great friendships:

- keep your word and do what you say.
- pay attention. If you're texting or checking out everyone who walks by while a friend spills her or his guts to you, you are not paying attention.
- friends have to be able to say, "Yes, I can do this for you." or "No, I can't". It's normal for a friendship's boundaries to shift over time as adjustments are made (by both of you).

How to screw up a Friendship:

- lying, backstabbing, manipulating.
- expecting a friend to "read" your mind.
- unattended friendships die like neglected flowers.

On the other hand, an obsessive friendship sucks the life out of you.

We may only need one partner, but we sure need more than one friend. I think everyone needs two or three intimate friends, some friends to just hang out with, and lots of friendly acquaintances.

Crockpot Chicken Curry

Let it sit and stew. That's our advice when it comes to this gourmet chicken curry dish that's chock full of flavor. Serve with jasmine rice for best results.

Ingredients

- 5 medium potatoes, diced
- 1 green bell pepper, coarsely chopped
- 1 medium onion, coarsely chopped
- 1 lb. boneless chicken breasts, cubed
- 1 can (14.5 oz.) of no salt added tomatoes
- 1 tbsp. coriander
- 1 1/2 tbsp. paprika
- 1 tbsp. ginger
- 1/4 tsp. red pepper
- 1/2 tsp. turmeric
- 1/4 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/8 tsp. cloves
- 1 cup of low sodium chicken broth
- 2 tbsp. cold water
- 4 tbsp. cornstarch

Methods/steps

Place vegetables in crock-pot; place chicken on top. Mix together tomatoes, spices and chicken broth. Pour over chicken.

Cook on low 8-10 hours or on high 5-6 hours. Remove meat and vegetables. Turn heat to high.

Stir cornstarch into water. Add to crock-pot. Cook until sauce is slightly thickened, about 15-20 minutes.

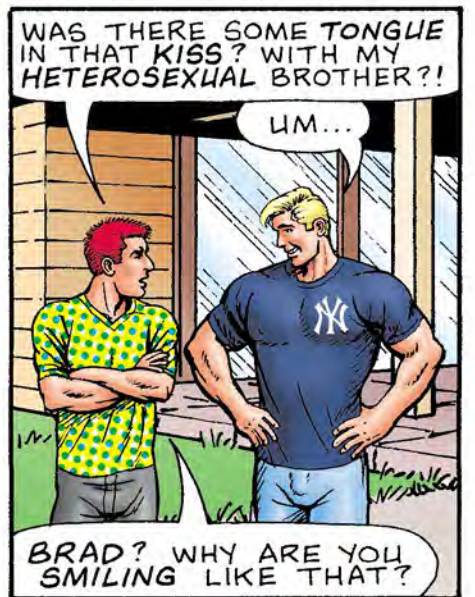
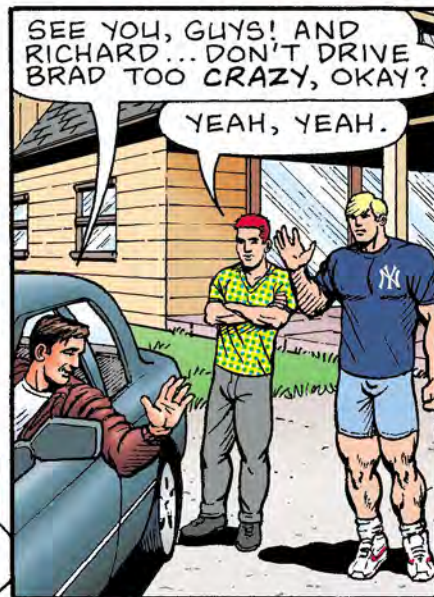
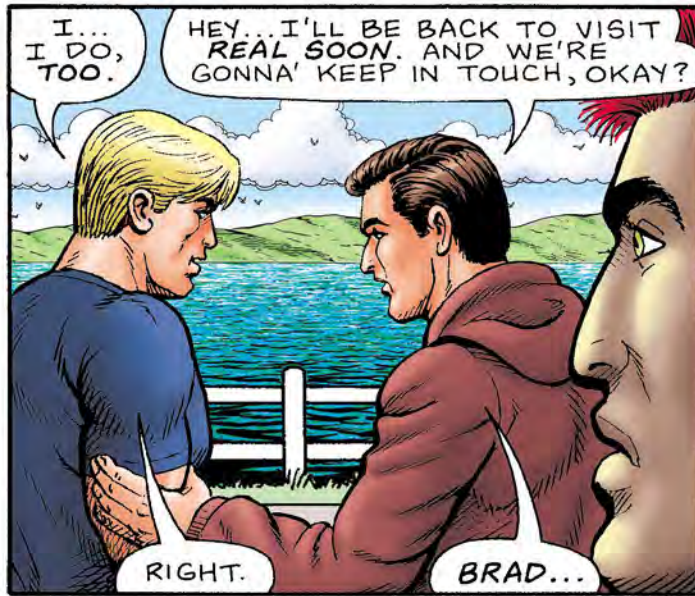
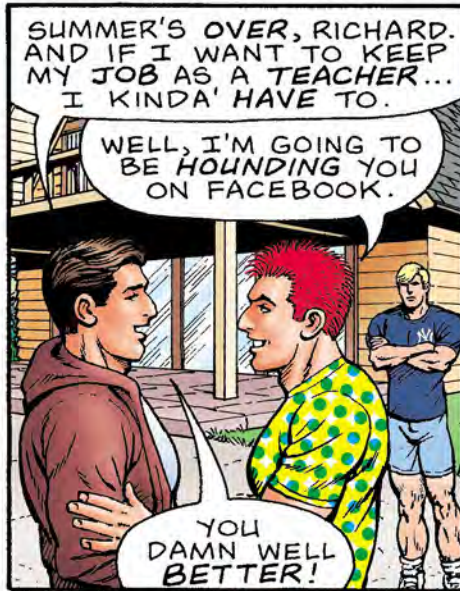
