# Westboro Follower Running for Kansas School Board

A man running for the Kansas state school board is a follower of the Westboro Baptist Church and says public schools should stop teaching evolution, which he called a "satanic lie."

Campbell, who supports the state's current science education, which treats evolution as a valid, scientific concept, the Associated Press reports. Campbell was supposed to run unopposed, but Wu said he believed someone had to challenge the incumbent.

"She's going to win my district without a fight?" he said. "I'm not going to let that happen."

Campbell, who is seeking a second term, also served on the Topeka, Kan., school board for 12 years. She would not talk to the AP about Wu's religious affiliation, but said she is a Christian who believes "children should have a well-rounded education on evolution."

# Former Head of Bronx LGBT Center Busted for Embezzlement

The former executive director of Bronx Community Pride was arrested for possibly embezzling \$338,000 from the LGBT resource center during her six year tenure.

Lisa Winters was charged with grand larceny and falsifying business records for the center supported by city government funds on June 15. According to the New York Post, Winters allegedly spent the funds on personal expenses like a month-long, \$25,000 trip to South Africa with her wife in 2007, clothing, and other services.

After she was fired in January 2010 on suspicion that she was embezzling funds, it was discovered that she was responsible for the loss of \$338,674.

The deficit could lead to the closure of the center, which serves at least a thousand people across The Bronx.

# Just what is the Nebraska AIDS Project?

Nebraska AIDS Project was founded in 1984 through the determination of a Creighton medical student to provide the public with accurate information about AIDS. His goal was to establish a state-wide information hot line. At the time, fear, anger and misinformation were spreading faster than the growing epidemic, often obscuring the findings and recommendations of medical research. It took nearly seven months to raise the \$7,000 needed to fund the telephone line and relay service for one year and to provide training and manuals to the volunteers who would work the line.

The Project's budget needs increased when HIV antibody testing became available in 1985. Support groups, personal care and limited financial/medical assistance were soon added to the services provided by NAP.

NAP was able to exist and thrive through those early years only because of donations, mostly provided by the LGBT community, and hundreds of volunteers from all walks of life. It was a privilege for me to be a part of those early years.

Today, NAP has a budget of around 1.7 million dollars with offices in Omaha, Lincoln, Kearney, Norfolk, and Scottsbluff and a paid staff of twenty. NAP serves the entire state of Nebraska, southwest Iowa and eastern Wyoming. (NAP remains unique as the only AIDS service organization in the country to be state wide.) It provides on-going services to 500-600 persons each year and singular or intermittent services to another 400-500 persons annually.

About 80% of NAP's budget comes from federal grants and about 1% from other grants. Fundraisers account for about 10% of the budget and contributions about 7%. Grants are never guaranteed from one year to the next, especially with the current economy and mood of Congress. (NAP recently lost two staff positions when federal budget cuts reduced funding for a rental and housing assistance program through Housing and Urban Development for persons with AIDS.) These budget figures do not include the over 10,000 hours volunteers contribute each year or the thousands of dollars of in-kind donations (food for the pantry, household items, clothes) given each year.

NAP administers about 2,000 HIV antibody tests annually. These tests are free and available at the offices in Omaha, Lincoln and Kearney. Free testing is also made available on a regular basis at such sites as Siena-Francis House, the Respect

Pride Prom would not be possible without all the generous

Clinic and Flixx Lounge. Testing is also offered at ten to fifteen community events each year. Low cost (\$10) STD testing is also provided. Condoms are regularly distributed to LGBT bars and organizations and once a year to the bars in mid-town Omaha as well as at special events and through all the NAP offices.

Housing services continue to be the primary area of need for NAP clients. NAP case managers will assist clients to develop a sustainable housing plan. As part of this plan, staff will help find rental property, negotiate with landlords and assist with rent payments when needed. NAP will also provide emergency food, necessary transportation, help with COBRA payments, medical co-pays and insurance premiums. Nutrition and budgeting classes are held regularly for those affected by AIDS.

Education about HIV, AIDS and prevention continues to be the backbone of NAP. Six to eight multi-session classes are held each year to teach and train young adult men about safer sex practices and help them develop skills to influence the behavioral norms in their communities. Monthly seminars on safer sex practices are held at the Omaha Correctional Center for soon-to-be-released inmates. Presentations are given annually at most colleges across Nebraska as well as at special events held by various organizations and businesses.

Omaha staff facilitate support groups for men, women, youth, and Latinos affected by AIDS. Kearney, Lincoln, Norfolk and Scottsbluff staff coordinate general support groups. Limited individual therapy is available at the Omaha office.

Eighty-six percent of NAP's annual budget directly funds client assistance and education programs. That percentage includes the salaries and benefits paid to the staff since 97% of staff time is dedicated to direct client service. The remainder of the budget pays for office rent, supplies and equipment and also development (i.e. fundraisers).

Since 1984, the population affected by AIDS has become more diverse. Medical advances have increased the life span of persons diagnosed with AIDS from eleven months to decades and vastly reduced the occurrence of once common opportunistic diseases such as Karposis Sarcoma, wasting syndrome and pneumocystis pneumonia. Nebraska AIDS Project has grown and adjusted its services to meet the changing needs resulting from increased diversity and medical advances. However, it has not changed its mission to inform and educate the public or serve those affected by AIDS. And, even with the grant monies now available to hire staff and maintain offices, Nebraska AIDS Project could not continue providing its wide range of services without its foundation of volunteers and private support from individuals and organizations.

# **CURIOSITY and PASSION**

Joni Mitchell has a song, "Happiness is the best facelift", but curiosity may be just as good. If you want to stay youthful and energetic, consider the role of curiosity in your life. As kids, many of us were not encouraged to be curious: "Curiosity killed the cat", my grandma told me when I asked too many questions. At the



time (age 5) I shut up and obeyed her, but I wish I had replied with, "But Grandma, I'll bet that cat had a fabulous 9 lives before he died."

#### Curiosity in the world

Curiosity is enthusiasm about your own life and that of others. It's about being out there in the world, not all wrapped up in your neurotic little self. Curiosity is questioning, wondering, and pondering. Reading can be a great way to experience curiosity: you can travel the world and meet the most bizarre and amazing people without leaving your home. Travel is another way to express your curiosity about the world. When you go to different places, you leave your comfort zone behind: new people, places, things and customs keep you alert and pose questions like: "Why do they do that?" or "What would I be like if I grew up here?" Curiosity in the world keeps us mentally expanding and growing...and youthful.

#### Curiosity about yourself

Besides wondering about others and how they live, it's mentally healthy to wonder about yourself. Consider these questions:

- Who am I really?
- Who am I today?
- Who did I used to be?
- Who do I want to be in 5, 10 or 15 years?

By actively questioning and exploring who you are and who you want to be (e.g., "Why am I here?") you are creating new neural patterns in your brain that make you younger, smarter and healthier. While there is a fine line between self-curiosity and self-obsession (hello narcissists!), it's hard to grow without periodic spells of self-examination (even Madonna said, "an unexamined life is not worth living" in her song lyrics), You can use self-help books, prayer, meditation, psychotherapy and even shopping to explore your curiosity about yourself. Yes, shopping! For example, when you go shopping, how do you define what's really "You"? Do you look at something and think, "I like that shirt/lamp/whatever, but that's just not 'me'." This is shopping as a form of self-definition. By saying "yes" or "no" to things you could wear/buy/have, you are asking yourself, "Who am I and what do I think is right for me?" So the next time you go shopping, consciously enjoy your curiosity. Let yourself be amused and perhaps even surprised at how you define yourself.

#### Passion: curiosity's best friend

I define passion as strong feelings or energy directed towards someone or something. There is a common misconception about passion that it must be dramatic and over-the-top. This is bullshit. Passion can be as subtle as watching a spider spin a web at your cubicle at work or noticing the color of the tomato plants on your apartment balcony. We are all passionate beings. You may not think you are, but, dear reader, get over yourself. You may not yet be aware of your passion or expressing it (yet), but it's there.

Often I hear my clients say, "Oh. I wish I felt passionate about something...my life is just so boring." Even a statement like: "I just HATE my life! Everything sucks!" is hardly passionless. There is passion there: thwarted passion. Thwarted passion kills: a little bit at a time, we die. Don't let this happen to you. Instead, look for little things that bring you joy, that make your heart beat just a little faster. Look at the people in your life in whose presence you feel most alive. Look at the animals and plants in your life whose presence you delight in. These are all sources of passion. Your passions are uniquely your own...no one may understand why you love gardening and circuit parties. These are your passions and they need fulfill only you.

#### Discover your own passions

Here's an exercise to get in touch with some of your passions. Sit in a nice relaxing spot, turn off the cell phone, get a piece of paper and pen and then ask yourself these questions:

- What do I care about?
- What do I find interesting?
- What would I like to know more about?
- What have I long wanted to do/try/learn?

These are not easy questions, but they will stimulate the right side of your brain...the creative, inspiring side. Take your time and think about them. You may want to answer them now and put them aside, then look at them tomorrow and add to your answers. Let yourself free associate...there are no wrong answers!

Allow the questions to help you identify your passions, those parts of your life that you are curious about and want to explore more. When you follow your curiosity, your life gets more vivid and energized. Curiosity leads to passion: curiosity is the process of investigation and passion is the experience that comes from acting on what you discover. If your life feels a bit dull and boring, try the exercises, have fun playing with your curiosity and identifying your passions. Above all: enjoy the process.

# Navy Official Reassigned After He Fails to Deal With Gay Hazing

Navy official Charles Berry was removed because of what he did after a sailor reported an attempted rape.

Navy official Charles Berry (pictured right) was removed from his post aboard the U.S.S. Florida because he failed to take action against gay hazing, according to a recently-released military report.

Before being reassigned in the spring, Berry served as Master Chief Machinist's Mate and Chief of Boat aboard the Navy nuclear submarine. Berry was removed from the ship because he failed to take action against the hazing of a sailor, who was harassed after he reported an attempted rape. The sailor reported that a man held him at knifepoint at the port of Diego Garcia in the Indian Ocean. Other sailors on the U.S.S. Florida discovered the incident and hounded the sailor viciously, hurling gay slurs and jokes at him.

"Among other things, he was called a derogatory term for a gay person and referred to as 'Brokeback," the Associated Press reports, "a reference to the gay-themed movie Brokeback Mountain. In addition, someone posted a drawing of a stick figure being sexually assaulted." The aggrieved sailor also endured taunting when sailors underwent training for the end of "don't ask, don't tell."

According to the report, the U.S.S. Florida has a culture of antigay harassment and hazing. Berry, who wasn't accused of hazing but simply not doing anything about it, was reassigned, while the accused sailors were reprimanded, and counseling and training was ordered for all on the ship.



Servicemembers Legal Defense Network executive director Aubrey Sarvis released the following statement:

"At SLDN, we are disappointed by what happened aboard the USS Florida, but it appears that this command took swift and appropriate action once the incidents were disclosed. This unfortunate and unprofessional conduct underscores that we must

continue to be vigilant as implementation continues, by and large, without major challenges."

# Mortgage Short Sale or Bankruptcy?

Stagnant real estate values in recent months in many areas across the country have homeowners everywhere continuing to feel anxious about homeownership, some are in a position in which they want or need to sell, while others may be in danger of losing their homes.

Listen, it's quite possible the real estate market has hit its peak for 2012 and waiting for higher values is an exercise in futility  $\sim$  ignoring the situation will only make matters worse.

One viable option if you're not able to wait indefinitely to sell, or if you're facing foreclosure, is to go through the process of a short sale ~ if you're facing financial hardship and just can't seem to keep up, this may be your option to bankruptcy... eliminate your largest debt.

A short sale procedure can be used to sell a home when its value has dropped well below what you owe on it. Put more simply, in order for homeowners to consider the process of a short sale, the home's value must be lower than whatever is owed on the mortgage.

In order for a short sale to happen, a mortgage lender must agree to reduce any outstanding debt so that a home may be priced to sell as close to its assessed value as possible.

What motivates the lender to do this? The lender does not want to own abandoned, vacant properties... they are in the loan business, not the real estate business.

There are several consequences involved when it comes to short selling a home;

Even though going the short sale route allows homeowners to pay off outstanding mortgage debt, one consequence is that they will also walk away with nothing to show for investment made in the property.

Money that was paid as a down payment or toward home improvements will be lost. A short sale allows homeowners to wipe their mortgage debt clean, but it also wipes away any chance of recovering money that was put into the home.

Another downfall to short selling is that the process will affect a person's credit. Some people mistakenly believe that a short sale will prevent negative marks from showing up on their credit report. This is a falsehood ~ if you're late on mortgage payments, you receive negative marks on your credit report. Although a short sale is not as detrimental to a person's credit as a foreclosure, it will show up on a credit report. Buying another home in the future will be possible, but the process may be more difficult.

Finally, there is a chance that the lender may file a 1099-C with the government reporting a debt cancellation. This can subsequently lead to the homeowner owing taxes on any amount forgiven.

Opting to short sell is a great way for homeowners to avoid the


