# Gay Marriage Victory: Maine, Maryland, Minnesota, Washington Voters Support Same-Sex Marriage

Minnesota has voted down Amendment 1, a constitutional amendment that would have defined marriage as being a union solely between a man and a woman. The state became the first in the country to vote against such an amendment on the ballot



when results were announced early Wednesday.

In Washington, the state is all but certain to legalize same-sex marriage with the passing of Referendum 74, though due to the state's mail-in voting system, a final tally may not come for another day or two. On Election Day Tuesday, voters in Maine and Maryland chose to legalize gay marriage, according to exit polls and early returns Tuesday night.

For the first time in history, voters have chosen to legalize same-sex marriage on the ballot. Gay rights advocates are already celebrating this development as a critical victory and a turning point in the fight for marriage equality.

Since the late '90s, a total of 32 states have held votes on same-sex marriage, and each time, voters have opposed the measure. For opponents of same-sex marriage, this string of victories has been a crucial talking point. As Brian Brown, president of the National Organization for Marriage, the nation's leading group opposing gay marriage, said in a press release this summer: "The American people know in their heart what marriage is, and they have expressed that in the form of over 70 million votes cast in 32 consecutive state elections to preserve marriage as the union of one man and one woman." Brown could not immediately be reached for comment on election night Tuesday.

Chad Griffin, president of the Human Rights Campaign, an organization that has long advocated for same-sex marriage, spent more than \$5 million in support of gay marriage in Maryland and Maine.

"This is a landmark election for marriage equality and we will forever look back at this year as a critical turning point in the movement for full citizenship for LGBT people," he said in a

press release Tuesday night. "Voters in Maine came to the common-sense conclusion that all people deserve the ability to make loving, lifelong commitments through marriage."

Marc Solomon, national campaign director for Freedom to Marry, another prominent advocacy organization, said in a press release: "Today, a majority in Maine voted in favor of loving and committed same-sex couples seeking the freedom to marry. Now the commitment gay and lesbian couples have made in life will be respected equally under the law, celebrated before their loved ones, and called what it is: marriage."

For gay-rights advocates, the Maine vote is particularly heartening. Just three years ago, a popular vote overturned legislation that would have legalized same-sex marriage in the state.

"Securing marriage equality at the ballot box in Maine is especially appreciated the second time around," R. Clark Cooper, head of the Log Cabin Republicans, the largest Republican group that supports same-sex marriage, told The Huffington Post in an email.

Although six states and Washington, D.C. legalized gay marriage before Tuesday night, they did so through the votes of state legislators or court decisions. The new victory undermines the conservative premise that those early wins were merely the result of liberal bias in state legislatures and the




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#### **THANKFULNESS**

courts, and it reflects what recent polls have shown to be a shift in Americans' views on the issue.

"It's hard to overstate the national significance of this vote," Solomon said. "For years, our opponents have argued that we could not win a majority vote at the ballot. Today, Maine voters proved them wrong, standing up for the Golden Rule and for freedom for all Mainers."

## Maryland Approves Gay Marriage In Historic 'Question 6' Vote

Maryland joined Maine in making history on Election Night, affirming gay marriage by a popular vote.

As The Los Angeles Times reports, Maryland's referendum to uphold the law held a sizable lead with about 80 percent of precincts reporting, putting the state on track to become the first below the Mason-Dixon line to legalize marriage equality.

"Today the marriage equality map expands to Maryland, giving thousands more loving couples the opportunity to make lifelong commitments through marriage," Human Rights Campaign (HRC) President Chad Griffin said in an email statement. "This is a milestone night for the simple truth that when Americans are presented with the real lives of their friends and neighbors, they have no choice but to vote for their equality. It is the momentum reflected in poll after poll that shows a growing majority for marriage equality across the country."

In March, Maryland Gov. Martin O'Malley signed the same-sex marriage bill into law. But just two months later, officials with the Maryland Marriage Alliance -- a coalition of groups working to preserve the traditional definition of marriage as a union between a man and a woman -- had reportedly collected more than 113,000 signatures from opponents, far exceeding the necessary 56,000 signatures to force the law to a referendum.

In recent days, a Washington Post poll found that likely voters favored the law 52 percent to 43 percent, but a subsequent Baltimore Sun poll was less certain, finding support for same-sex marriage in the state at a near-even split.

In other big wins for marriage equality, Maine also legalized gay marriage and Washington was all but sure to do the same but due to the state's mail-in voting system an official tally still is not available. In Minnesota, voters shot down a constitutional amendment that would have defined marriage as a union only between a man and a woman.

## Avoiding First Time Home Buyer Mistakes

There are several mistakes that first time home buyers make that are easily avoided. The idea is to not be impulsive or succumb to wishful thinking. Even though a home may seem like a dream house it could, in reality, be a real nightmare if you are not carefully considering everything that entails purchasing the house in detail.

Before you buy be sure to check out the neighborhood thoroughly. Remember that there are real estate agents in the business of selling you a home however they can, and if that means telling you that you are about to live in a gay-friendly neighborhood that actually is not that friendly at all, then they may ~ intentionally or not, do their job and "get you into a home".

Yet another mistake that many first home buyers make is assuming that their credit is good before they make an offer on a home. They discover way too late that they cannot go through with buying the house because their credit is not good enough and the entire deal falls through. We strongly recommend that you get pre-qualified or pre-approved for a mortgage before you even start shopping for a house. This prevents you from wasting your own and everybody else's time later in the game.

Home sellers will not even consider entertaining an offer unless you are at a minimum pre-qualified, and your gay realtor should require it before he or she even puts you in their car to look at homes. Your real estate agent should be able to refer you to reputable mortgage lenders, or speak with your own local financial institution ~ avoid on-line companies that are not familiar with your specific market.

The desire to live in a certain layout or particular neighborhood or in an adored housing style can also cause you to be blind to some of the flaws of the home. Are you really prepared to live with low water pressure for years, that bathroom you have to sit sideways on the toilet in, very old major appliances that might break down at any minute, or replacing that clay tile roof? Make sure that you have the contingency fees in order that will help you pay for things if these break down. This is especially true if you want to buy a historic home, which we happen to love.

Another error is to skimp when in comes to arranging different types of inspections on the property that is to be bought. Make sure that you get all of the inspections that you can afford as that can save you a lot of money in repairs down the line. In addition to the standard home inspection, we recommend a sewer scope, asking for a roof inspection and certificate, a furnace inspection and certificate, and depending on the results of your home inspection, specialists to review items of concern.

Always demand licensed/insured contractors for all repairs and replacements necessary, with receipts and warranties at closing.

When shopping for a mortgage broker many first time buyers just go with the broker that throws them the lowest figure, low figures will change once the company feels they have "hooked you", beware. Go with a referral from a trusted source, your gay realtor who closes dozens of deals every year, or your own bank.



It is also a mistake to take out what is called a sub-prime loan. This is a very expensive mortgage with a super-high interest rate. It might be offered to you if your credit rating is not so hot. Keep in mind that as desirable as it may be to have a bit of equity, that making an expensive deal may not be worth it in the end because you will end up paying thousands more than you would have if you have simply cleaned up your credit rating and bought a home at a later date.

Don't panic about "missing the market" or "missing the low rates", do your homework and be assured of the single best investment you may every make.

# UPS Halts Boy Scouts Donations Over Anti-Gay Policy

More bad news for the Boy Scouts of America (BSA), as a major donor has announced plans to sever funding to the organization on account of a controversial anti-gay policy.

The United Parcel Service (UPS), Inc. will soon adopt a nondiscrimination policy that disqualifies the BSA from future funding, the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD) reports. UPS follows the Intel Foundation in withdrawing corporate sponsorship from the BSA, GLAAD officials note in an email statement.

"UPS and The UPS Foundation do not discriminate against any person or organization with regard to categories protected by applicable law, as well as other categories protected by UPS and The UPS Foundation in our own policies," UPS officials note on the company's website. "These include, but are not limited to race, gender, national origin, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity, veteran or military status, pregnancy, age and religion."

Among those to applaud the UPS move was Zach Wahls, the

Iowa student whose impassioned pro-gay marriage speech to his state's legislators became the most-watched political clip of 2011 on YouTube after going viral twice last year.

"UPS showed true bravery today in standing with the 80,000 Americans, including thousands of Scouts and Scout leaders, who oppose the Boy Scouts' hurtful anti-gay policy. That bravery is what Scouting is all about," Wahls, who is also a regular HuffPost Gay Voices blogger, said in a Change.org petition. "Corporate America gets it better than most: policies that discriminate aren't simply wrong, they're bad for business and they're hurting the Scouting community. You would think that after all the Boy Scouts have lost as a result of this policy, they would understand that."

Added GLAAD President Herdon Graddick: "Equality is not only good for business, but supported by a vast majority of Americans. The time is now for the BSA to end this outdated and unpopular ban before other corporate funders pull dollars and scouting families drop their support."

The petition also noted that UPS gave more than \$150,000 to the Boy Scouts of America, despite the organization's policy banning gay Scouts and leaders from participating, just two years ago.

In July, BSA reaffirmed its policy of excluding gays from participating as scouts or troop leaders, citing support from parents as a key incentive. "The vast majority of the parents of youth we serve value their right to address issues of same-sex orientation within their family, with spiritual advisers and at the appropriate time and in the right setting," the Scouts' chief executive Bob Mazzuca told the Associated Press. "We fully understand that no single policy will accommodate the many diverse views among our membership or society."

The issue had been brought the forefront again after the case of Jennifer Tyrrell, the Ohio-based mother who was forced to resign as den leader of her son's Tiger Scout group because she is a lesbian.

# Tricia Macke, Fox Reporter Who Called Rachel Maddow An 'Angry Young Man,' Issues Apology

After pressure from the Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation (GLAAD), a Fox affiliate anchor has issued an apology for calling MSNBC host and liberal commentator Rachel Maddow an "angry young man."

Tricia Macke, a reporter with Fox 19 Cincinnati, posted "Rachel Maddow is an angry young man," on her Facebook page last month, according to GLAAD. Despite receiving criticism, Macke defended herself, responding, "You are right. I'm sorry, I should've said 'antagonistic,'" and "I knew what I was saying."

GLAAD said "referring to Maddow as a 'man' because she is a gay woman is completely unacceptable for someone in the business of journalism." The organization's president, Herndon Graddick, responded, saying, "Macke owes an apology not only to viewers, but to young people in Ohio who are subjected to unfair bullying and harassment like this on a daily basis."

Macke removed the "angry young man" post about Maddow from her Face-



book, but The Advocate and other news organizations published a screen grab.

On Friday, Macke issued an apology via Fox 19's Facebook page:

I recently posted comments on my personal Facebook page regarding cable news anchor Rachel Maddow which were insensitive and inappropriate. I apologize to Ms. Maddow and any others who may have been offended by my comments, as they do not reflect my firm beliefs in individual and equal rights, and they certainly do not represent the opinions or position of my employer WXIX-TV.

Macke has been with Cincinnati's Fox 19 News since 1993, according to Opposing Views. She anchors the 6:30 p.m. and 10 p.m. newscasts, Media Bistro reports.


However, on Monday Cincinnati.com reported Macke was absent from Sunday's regular newscast.


Fox 19 managers would not address specifics. "We don't comment on personnel matters," WXIX General Manager Bill Lanesey told Cincinnati.com. Adding, "We expect Tricia to be back on the anchor desk Tuesday (tomorrow)."

# WHY ARE GAY RELATION-SHIPS SO HARD?

A client of mine is in his early 20's and experiencing his first gay relationship. He's recently come out and is very happy with his first boyfriend. However, he asked me last week: "Why are gay relationships so hard?" He is shocked how much work a relationship is and asked me for some advice to "make it a little easier". His question inspired this column.





In a committed LGBT relationship, by allowing your partner to get to know you intimately, you are inviting those less-than-lovely parts of yourself to come out loud and clear. You and he/she are opening a Pandora's Box of "previous unresolved life problems"... you know, the box you buried in the backyard, hoping never to open again. And it is even more challenging for us LGBT couples, because most therapists and psychology books use a heterosexual couple's therapy.

When two men (or two women or a bisexual or trans man or woman) commit to each other, the dynamics aren't the same as the hetero model. I don't have the space here to go into detail, but suffice it to say that we have unique needs, e.g., a male-male couple may have problems with too strong a desire for a variety of sexual outlets and too weak a desire for vulnerability and intimacy. In hetero couples, the male and female stereotypes often play out, e.g. "Men are from Mars, Women are from Venus" and that kind of stuff. As LGBTers, we are inventing our own genres of love and making up the rules as we go.

Conflict is vital to the growth of any couple. We try to avoid conflict, but that's impossible. It's more useful to focus on how do you resolve your disagreements and irritations with your partner? How do you talk about them? Or don't you? Can you stand tall (yet flexible) through the tough times, or do you crumble and run away (literally or emotionally)? Couple-hood is not for sissies. It's for adults who are willing to tolerate discomfort and the messiness of growing together with someone who will inevitably drive you crazy one minute and then incite you to wild kisses the next. We can say, "She's wrong, I'm right' and act like narcissistic little children or we can see our lover as "doing us a favor" by showing us the parts of ourselves that are still screwed up and need work. Being part of a couple is like shining a flashlight on the parts of yourself that are childish or immature. Your partner will

know all and see all of you. This is not for the timid or weak.

Sure, gay, lesbian, bisexual and trans relationships are hard...but the possible rewards are pretty amazing. A truly loving relationship helps us to know ourselves, know our partner, and be willing to spend time and energy to help each other grow to become the men and women that we wish to be.

# The Parent Crap: 10 Tips for Coming Out

For most people who are struggling to come out, way up at the top of "Life's Most Dreaded Moments" is uttering, "Mom, Dad, I have something to tell you: I'm gay." For many parents, it's not exactly the moment they've always dreamed about, either. Reactions from parents can range from, "Not if you want to continue being my son, you're not," to, "Duh, we've known since you were 6 and could sing 'Over the Rainbow' from start to finish."

If you're heading home for Thanksgiving dinner with the family and thinking this might be the right time to come out to your parents, here are 10 tips to consider as you plan what to say.

- Consider the timing. If you're going to spill the beans at Thanksgiving, do it after dinner, not before or while you're passing the cranberry sauce. Someone's gone to a lot of trouble to cook this meal, so first enjoy the turkey, and then raise the topic at the appropriate time.
- 2. Determine whether this is the right time. Do you still live under your parents' roof or rely on them to cover expenses such as your education, clothes, car payments, gas money or insurance? If you think they'll be reasonable in their reaction to the news, then go for it, but if you think they might try to use this in some way as leverage against you (for example, restricting who you can see or even perhaps cutting you off financially), then waiting until you're no longer dependent on your parents might be a better time to come out to them.
- 3. Be in a good place in your life. Be comfortable and confident with who you are. I came out to my parents after I had learned that my boy-friend of 18 months was cheating on me with another friend of mine. I was heartbroken and tired of living a lie, so I made the mistake of choosing that moment to come clean. Do not spill your guts when they are already tied up in knots. Showing your parents how miserable you feel at the moment is only going to reinforce their imagined fears that you'll end up living a sad and lonely life.
- 4. Be realistic and anticipate what their reactions will be. Parents can sometimes surprise you and may not have any issues at all. They may even embrace you for being honest with them. But if they are socially conservative and proud members of Pat Robertson's 700 Club, don't expect them to trade in their membership card for a PFLAG T-shirt anytime soon. Be prepared with what you're going to say and how you're going to respond to their reactions.
- 5. Arm yourself with answers ahead of time. There isn't a concern that your parents could voice that hasn't already been discussed in dozens of articles and blogs online. You'll find some great suggestions on how to phrase your answers that will make you sound like Einstein. You know your parents better than almost anyone else, and if you anticipate

their concerns, you can be ready with some answers that will be hard for them to dispute.

- 6. Be ready for the "hellfire and damnation" argument. If your parents are nonreligious, skip to #7. But if they're anything like my parents were, read on. You probably aren't going to win this argument in the first conversation, but you can avoid losing it. Educate yourself with some basic answers to what you know will be their main arguments. They may not comprehend what you're saying or even agree with you if they do, but at least they'll know you have given this a lot of thought, and you'll know how to respond to them in later conversations.
- 7. Stay calm, even if your parents aren't. You might have someone like Sally Field for a mother -- her reaction to her son being gay was, "So the f\*#% what?!" -- but if your parents are more like mine, be ready for them to get angry, melodramatic and downright cruel. Don't join in. Keep your cool and be the rational adult in this encounter.
- 8. Their approval or permission is not required. Don't expect too much from your parents right away. It's taken them a lifetime to believe what they believe, and that's not going to change in one conversation, and maybe not even in 100 conversations, so try not to measure the success or failure of your first coming out conversation by their initial response. If it's not what you had hoped for, don't despair and don't give up. Give them time, but do not give them the impression that you're asking for their approval or permission. This isn't about them. It's about you and who you truly are. Show them that you are the same person they've always loved, just more honest now.

- 9. Know when and how to make your exit. When I came out to my parents, there was a lot of anger and drama, and I was hurt that they weren't welcoming this news with open arms. So I took the old "frankly, my dear, I don't give a damn" approach and stormed out. Thought it felt pretty good, it wasn't very effective. You might consider a less dramatic exit line. It's important to be sensitive to what they may be feeling and put yourself in their shoes. Their concerns may be all over the map, from, "Will we ever have grandchildren?" to, "Please, God, don't let my son get AIDS." Whatever happens, try to leave the door open, even if you or your parents feel like shutting it.
- 10. In the end, know that they love you. My parents are both gone now. One of the last moments I remember before my mother died was when I came home to find my husband, Joe, sitting by the phone with his eyes filled with tears. Mom's health was failing fast, but she had an important phone call to make. She wanted Joe to know that she loved him as if he were her own son, and she told him how grateful she was that we had each other to love. She passed away a few months later. In the end she realized that the most a parent can hope for is that their children are happy and loved, and that's really all that matters. It didn't take my father long to come to the same conclusion. Yours will, too. Just give them time. If they don't come around, at least you were honest with them and with yourself, and the charade is finally over.
