President Obama's History-Making Gay Rights Inaugural Speech

President Obama didn't just make history by becoming the first president to refer to "our gay brothers and sisters" in an inaugural address. Of course, that alone was a stunner -- he put gay rights on the agenda for his second term in a way that no other president had committed to before -- but by referring specifically to the Stonewall riots of 1969 in the same sentence as Seneca Falls and Selma, he put the LGBT rights struggle within the context of the great civil rights movements in American history.



Standing before Republican leaders, who are fighting against gay rights; the Supreme Court, which will be deciding on gay rights this year; and the American people, who are fast embracing gay rights, the president made it clear that there is no separating LGBT rights from the struggles for equality by women and people of color. The following passage, in which the president casts the individuals who stood up to the police at the Stonewall Inn, a Greenwich Village gay bar that was raided in the summer of '69 -- the drag queens and the lesbians, the gay men and the transgender people -- as our "forebears," is truly amazing and powerful:

We, the people, declare today that the most evident of truths, that all of us are created equal, is the star that guides us still, just as it guided our forebears through Seneca Falls, and Selma, and Stonewall, just as it guided all those men and women, sung and unsung, who left footprints along this great Mall, to hear a preacher say that we cannot walk alone, to hear a King pro-

claim that our individual freedom is inextricably bound to the freedom of every soul on Earth.

President Obama rightly defined the issue of LGBT rights as one that reflects the most basic values of the founding fathers and the Declaration of Independence, which he paraphrased several times ("We, the people, declare today that the most evident of truths, that all of us are created equal ... "). It was a challenge not only to those on the anti-gay right but to those in other civil rights movements to stand up for full equality and to see gays, lesbians, bisexuals and transgender people as truly discriminated against in ways that are similar to the experiences of other groups that are fighting for equal treatment under the law. That may not seem like a big deal to some, but historically, the relationship between the LGBT rights movement and Democratic politicians has been tarnished by their view that LGBT people should have some rights but are somehow different from -- lesser than -- other groups seeking equality. So when the first African-American president says in an inaugural address that, no, discrimination is discrimination, that is profound.

And by proclaiming that "our journey is not complete until our gay brothers and sisters are treated like anyone else under the law," and that "the love we commit to one another must be equal, as well," the president challenged all Americans to support marriage equality. Here is a man who, less than a year ago, was still "evolving" on the question of marriage equality and was being pressured by the very activists, like Joe Sudbay, who got him to admit that he was in the midst of a personal evolution on the issue. Now here he is, not only fully evolved, having *(Continued on next page)*



Two Omaha locations: 3105 North 93rd St / 5310 South 139th Plaza www.ppheartland.org | 1.877.811.7526 run on the issue during his campaign for reelection and having urged voters in four states to vote for equality, but confidently and proudly saying so in his inaugural address, one of the most important, defining speeches a president can give, and telegraphing to the country and the world that they should evolve fully, too.

There's much pressure on the president to deliver on a variety of equality issues and match his words with actions: He still has not signed an executive order that would ban federal contractors from discriminating against LGBT people; his Justice Department has not filed a friend-of-the-court brief in the Prop 8 case before the Supreme Court; and the military is still not equal in the aftermath of "don't ask, don't tell" repeal, with no ban on discrimination against gays in the armed forces, and there's fear that Obama's nominee for Secretary of Defense, former Sen. Chuck Hagel (R-Neb.), will not take up the issue with force. However, by including calls for full equality and marriage rights in such a defining speech -- and making history in the process, as the first president to refer to the struggle for gay equality in his inaugural address -- President Obama has laid out a promise in perhaps the most powerful way he could.



Is the Mortgage Housing Deduction Going Away in 2013?

The national housing market is still healing from the last major recession that the U.S. had and political debates are going on in the nation's capital about limits and deductions for taxpayers. One of these topics is the mortgage interest deduction or the

Prop 8 Supporters Submit Official Brief to Supreme Court

Proponents of California's ban on same-sex marriage officially submitted their brief to the Supreme Court Tuesday, urging the court to uphold the vote that constitutionally banned marriage in 2008.

According to Buzzfeed, Proposition 8's backers say that the state's constitution does not "mandate the traditional gendered definition of marriage, but neither does our Constitution condemn it. This Court, accordingly, should allow the public debate regarding marriage to continue through the democratic process, both in California and throughout the Nation."

The Supreme Court is scheduled to hear arguments for Hollingsworth v. Perry on March 26, and a decision is expected by the end of June.

Inaugural Prayer Service Includes First Out Gay Clergy Member

The LGBT-inclusive nature of President Obama's inauguration festivities carried over into today's Presidential Inaugural Prayer Service at the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C., with the first participation by an openly gay clergy member.

The Reverend Elder Nancy L. Wilson, moderator of the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches, a largely LGBT denomination, gave the first reading of Scripture, a passage from the book of Isaiah, at this morning's event. She was one of a diverse group of interfaith clergy to participate in the service, which was attended by President Obama and Vice President Biden.

In a blog post she wrote for the pro-LGBT interfaith group Believe Out Loud before the event, Wilson said she expected to be "exalting" at the service. "This exaltation is not for myself but for the millions of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) people who have longed for a safe place to call home," she wrote. "Whether spiritual or physical, we need safe homes." In a statement released through GLAAD, she added, "President



Obama prayerfully and respectfully stood up for LGBT equality during his campaign, and I am proud to stand with him."

This was the 57th inaugural prayer service, and officials with the National Cathedral confirmed that Wilson was the first openly gay clergy

U.K.: Law Proposed to Accommodate a Gay King or Queen

As Prince William and Catherine, the Duchess of Cambridge, endure the final throes of pregnancy, Parliament is working on legislation to ensure that their firstborn child will be able to rule, no matter their sexual orientation.

Parliament will soon pass legislation to allow the royal couple's child to rule the United Kingdom whether the child is male or female. Labor MP Paul Flynn has an amendment to support an openly gay king or queen.

The law would determine the heir of the gay king or queen and their spouse or civil partner, as long as they were born through artificial insemination or surrogacy, according to Pink News. An adopted child would not legally be able to inherit the throne, nor would he or she join the line of succession, under current law, and it is not clear that Flynn's amendment would seek to change that. Furthermore, the king or queen's same-sex partner would be recognized as king consort or queen consort.

House of Commons speaker John Bercow is expected to accept the amendment, bringing it into debate.

Daniel Radcliffe: "For me, Kill Your Darlings is a film about young love in whatever form it takes. It wasn't any more challenging than if you're doing a [sexual] awakening scene with a girl. At no point did any of us want to do anything that would distinguish it from how we would fall in love with somebody to my knowledge, there is no difference in how heterosexual and homosexual people fall in love. A lot of people are quick to ask if it's a gay love story—well, yes, they are gay characters,

Is That all There Is?

For many of us, a new year brings great hope for change. We expect things will be better. A lot of my clients tell me, "I'll be so glad when 2012 is over." But, I wonder: will 2013 be any better? Just because it's a new year, nothing really changes. A few months' later, we'll be saying "Is that all there is?"

As a psychotherapist, I notice that a new year usually brings up a lot of discontent in my clients' lives. They want things to be different in the new year, but don't know how to make it happen.

Discontent doesn't feel good, but it's a necessary part of growing wiser. It pushes us to clearly see what we've done so far – the joys and sorrows, successes and failures – and that if we keep going the same way, nothing's going to change. Sometimes we even feel "trapped" in a life where change seems impossible.

We are never trapped, but we often believe that we are.

Discontent is healthy: it pushes us to change...and change takes work. Unfortunately, few of us (myself included) are encouraged to change when life is easy. No, it takes some thumps upside the head to get us to examine what we're doing and consider doing things differently.

How can you use your discontent constructively?

One way is to consider counseling. There are many ways to make 2013 a better year, and most of them involve reflection: going inward. Many of us don't want to do this; we avoid it at all costs. We are afraid that if we look inside our minds we'll discover a horrible person lurking in there.

This is where counseling can be helpful. Psychotherapy encourages us to go inward, where we often find our unconscious beliefs and child-hood fears running the show. If you are wondering why you can't stop doing something that you know is bad for you, I guarantee you that your conscious mind is not in charge.

Your conscious mind knows what would be good for you, but it is often overruled by your unconscious mind. Your unconscious mind is all that stuff just below the surface of daily life, and it goes way, way back.

It's like you're carrying around a 8-year-old version of yourself who is – unconsciously – running your life. If you ever find yourself saying, "I know this isn't good for me, but I just can't stop doing it", know that your unconscious is in control.

But you can change this.

Every year, right after New Year's Day, I get a bunch of phone calls, and all the callers ask me the same question: "I want this new year to be different, can you help me?" Their discontent has pushed them to consider counseling.

Lots of people think that counseling is for crazy people. I know this one. Growing up on a farm in rural Ohio, I believed this too.

Counseling isn't for crazy people. Au contraire: crazy people won't change, they just go on being crazy and making the rest of us miserable. Counseling is for people who want to change their lives and would like some expert help in doing so.


As a psychotherapist, I recommend that my clients consider me to be a personal trainer for their mind.

When you work out at the gym and hit a plateau, if you're smart, you stop doing the same old unproductive routine and get a trainer to help you move to the next level. A good psychotherapist does the same thing for your mental state: when you're "stuck" and can't progress mentally, you need help. Friends, relatives and lovers can be helpful, but they have neither the training nor the objectivity and confidentiality of a good psychotherapist.

If you want this new year to be better than last year, consider getting some expert assistance. You could ring in the new year by making a conscious effort to change your life.

Above all, don't find yourself at the end of 2013 saying, "Is that all there is?"

but it's just a love story.

The relationship between Allen [Ginsberg] and Lucien [Carr], I think is incredibly universal—you meet somebody who is far more confident, far more charismatic, and seemingly more intelligent than you, and you completely fall in love with them, and then you actually outgrow them, and they come to resent you for it. I think that's the whole point of relationships is that they do absolutely move you on as a person, and you learn things about yourself as a person, things you like and don't like, and things you can do better next time you are with somebody.

There were certainly relationships that I could draw on when thinking about my relationship with Lucien, and not all of them romantic relationships, some of them just relationships of professional mentorship, the couple of really great teachers I'd had—elements of all those relationships factored into Allen's and my experience of Lucien.

Out: One of the things that our readers, certainly, find compelling about you is this sense of your instinctive comfort around people of different sexualities. For a lot of gay men that seems quite empowering.



But I can't remember the last time I met somebody of my age who was bigoted. Obviously it exists, but I do think attitudes are changing.
