THANKS FOR SUPPORTING NAP

Dear Friend,

My name is Joseph Conrad and I am a person living with AIDS in Nebraska. I am also a client of the Nebraska AIDS Project (NAP).

I realize that most of you do not know me, but I wanted to thank you for your support of NAP. When I was diagnosed with HIV, I thought the end had come. Then something special happened: I found the Nebraska AIDS Project. I am writing this letter to ask that you consider making a gift to NAP today.

It is difficult for me to describe the overwhelming sense of isolation that I experience with this disease. Few people understand what we are going through and others even try to find ways to blame you for "catching" AIDS. They condemn you for having a virus.

I am really very lucky. I am surrounded by a loving family and good friends. However, I find that I still need help to overcome many obstacles. Other clients I know have no one to whom they can turn, that is except for NAP. For these people, there are volunteers from the Buddy and Practical Support programs that come into our homes and unselfishly offer emotional and day-to-day support: cooking, cleaning, laundry, shopping, or someone to simply sit and listen. I have friends who would have lost their home had it not been for the financial and legal assistance from NAP. This agency is a tremendous source of support for the 300+ men, women and children they serve.

I know you understand: AIDS does more than rob us of our health. All too often, AIDS cuts us off from the outside world, takes our jobs,

bankrupts our finances, and tears at our spirit. NAP can't cure this disease, but they do everything they can to protect the quality of life for people like me thus providing the means to maintain our independence and our dignity.

I am honored that I have this opportunity to write to you, because I know you recognize the value of a place like NAP. It is my sincere hope that your answer will be a generous contribution.

Because there are people like you who care, people living with AIDS in Nebraska and southwest Iowa know that there is an entire group of committed professionals there with us. Your continued support is critical if the Nebraska AIDS Project is to continue providing services.

Perhaps the most amazing thing about NAP is that direct client services is only a part of the work they do. Shortly after coming to NAP, I joined their Speaker's Bureau. When I have the chance to share my story with others and help them understand what they must do to protect themselves I know that I am saving lives.

Most of the speeches I give these days are to young people. I see what a tremendous threat AIDS is to the future of our youth. Without NAP, many (if not most) of these kids would never have a chance to learn that they can live free of HIV and AIDS.

Each year, NAP education programs reaches out to tens of thousands of people across the state. Your support makes this possible. So please, won't you sit down right now and make as generous a contribution as you can to NAP.

Because of your financial support, I know that you are there with me as I face the daily challenges of living with AIDS. When I need help with Medicaid and Medicare — you are there. When I need a ride to the doctor — you are there. When I attend client luncheon — you are there. We are facing this disease together.

I once thought that my life was over. Now I know that — like so many of the people touched by the programs of the Nebraska AIDS Project — AIDS can rob me of my health but it will never take my spirit. NAP is a place that has made it possible for me to understand this. Thank you for your support of NAP.

There is no sign of a cure for AIDS. Your continued support will help guarantee that others like myself who must face this disease will not have to do so alone.

Every day is a special day in our lives. Some are more memorable than others. The most memorable day for me, and one I'll always remember, was Saturday, December 2, 1995.

My family is very active in volunteering for the Nebraska AIDS Project. We've been involved with the delivering of Christmas and Easter baskets and Thanksgiving meals to clients of NAP. We have held many garage sales to raise money for them. We have also had the pleasure of hosting dinners for "Night of 1,000 Stars." It is an evening filled with glamour, glitz and celebrities.

While all of the above may sound like unforgettable events, the one that had the most impact on me was the day I volunteered to work at the Civic Auditorium. It was the weekend the AIDS Quilt was on public display. My main reason for being there was to check in volunteers and give them their assigned areas. During my three hour shift, I watched many volunteers come in and out, some even in tears. Everyone was moved in a different way. The one thing about sadness is that it has no race, religious or gender boundaries. I knew I was going to see the quilt at the end of my shift, but at this time I didn't know what to expect.

The time had come for me to leave my post and proceed to the main floor. This was an area that I had been in many times before. Only this time instead of clowns, animals and a ringmaster, these things were replaced with giant panels of

people's lives. The ringmaster was replaced by readers who read the names of the unfortunate "stars" whose panels were on display. The clowns were replaced by volunteers all in white, who comforted visitors and protected the panels.

As I walked around the room looking at each of the panels, I realized that each one had its own special story. As I stopped and looked, I tried to imagine what their lives must have been like. As we reached the end, we saw the familiar name of a very dear friend who had his own special place. At that moment instead of reaching for cotton candy or pop, I reached for comfort and a tissue.

Before we left, there was one special panel. It was one where we could leave a special message. I knew what I wanted to say because it came from the bottom of my heart and soul. For you see the day I'll always remember ended on the panel where I wrote, "May God bless and protect my uncle Joey".

I recently wrote a thank you note regarding your series on "Lincoln's Gay Community". Had I actually seen the final edition, I would have written the note to you differently. I was very offended to watch the final edition which implied that the only social life for a gay man is to have sex in a public place. What a poor way to end such a wonderful series. Me and my partner have been together for two and a half years and many other couples a lot longer than that. Our social life would be similar to anyone else's in the general public. We go out for dinner, theater, or spend quality time with friends and family. If you are looking for a specific gay life there are gatherings other than a public forum of sex. We have a club in town, a neighborhood bar, and many other organizations and groups. As a gay community we also have a higher than average rate of alcohol/drug abuse and our youth are at a great risk of suicide. However it would not be fair for one to state that gays and lesbians are all abusing substance and all our youth are suicidal. I cannot deny the fact that gay sex does occur in public places. Many do it for the thrill or enjoy the risk involved. IN this case there probably no cure or resolution. The other side of this issue is even though it may be wrong (public sex acts) I cannot but wonder if the our society does not create this situation by pushing people into a situation of isolation and desperation that they feel there is not other outlet for there sexual feelings. You may remember a article about a Lincoln teacher who was caught a second time for a public sex act. The first time he was brushed under the rug. However the second time was most likely to be made more public in the papers and media. The man, who was probably desperate, isolated and feared for his job killed himself. This left an elementary school full of kids and the whole city wondering why someone would kill themself. As a member of this society I do not want to be responsible for this type of tragedy. 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

ON THE **LEGAL FRONTLINE**

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SAME-SEX MARRIAGES

One of the most contested debates in gay law is whether states should recognize same-sex marriages. Many states, such as California, offer limited recognition and benefits to same sex couples. Colorado recently enacted legislation that allows same-sex couples to publicly document their commitment to each other. However, all states have denied gay couples the right to state sanctioned marriage with all the rights and liabilities that go with that institution. That may change soon.

Hawaii may become the first state to legalize same sex marriages. The great white hope of gay marriage has become the landmark case of *Baehr v. Lewin*, 74 Haw. 530 (1993). In *Baehr*, three same sex couples applied for marriage licenses. When the Department of Health denied their application of the basis of the Hawaii marriage law, they filed their lawsuit. The trial court ruled that gay marriage was not authorized under Hawaii's law. They appealed, and the appellate court ruled that it is illegal, under the Hawaii

Constitution, to deny same sex applicants a marriage license. The court sent the case back to the trial court for further proceedings which were scheduled for trial on September 25, 1995. This has been delayed due to interventions by several fundamentalist groups. The case may now come up for trial soon.

The impending argument of *Baehr* seems to have been a call to arms for every right wing faction to rally against the impending decision. It seems that these groups are admitting that this type of discrimination cannot pass constitutional scrutiny so they are attacking it in different ways. Bills prohibiting same sex marriages have already been introduced in some 20 states and more are in the works. Although most bills are blatantly anti-gay, some are even clever and try to disguise discrimination in legitimate clothing. Ironically, California introduced legislation a month ago to nullify same sex marriages performed elsewhere.

In May, Republicans introduced a bill in

Congress that would prevent states from being forced to recognize same-sex marriages. The bill says that each state may decide for itself whether to acknowledge gay marriages and would define marriage under federal law as a legal union between one man and one woman.

Even more alarming is that President Bill Clinton, who campaigned on the gays in the military platform and then waffled, supports the anti-gay bill. White House spokesperson Mike McCurry said, "The President's against same-sex marriage. We'll have to look carefully at the legislation that's under consideration. He believes this is the time when we need to do things to strengthen the American family, and that's the reason why he's taken this position." Mark this down as one where President Clinton and Senator Dole agree. Senator Dole voiced his support for the bill as well.

It seems that the right wing is all rallied for the fight over gay marriages. Are gay leaders also ready? Openly gay and lesbian state legislators are doing everything they can to prevent enactment of these bills. However, out of 7,600 elected officials currently serving in state legislatures, only 17 are openly gay or lesbian.

The challenge that gays and lesbians face is unprecedented. They are on the verge of gaining greater recognition under the law. Certain groups will do anything to prevent these "hippies" of the 90's from succeeding. If there were ever a time to rally, organize, demonstrate, and initiate change, this would be it.

Internally calculating the 12 year difference, and, remembering Roberts' first Rule of future U-hauling, (With any more than a 10 year difference, they'll think of your *nostalgia* as antiques.) "Just playing. She knows my situation."

"Situation?" Oh-oh. What's this "situation" thing? Another chapter of the never-ending lesbian soap opera? "Yes..."

Well, you see, My situation is kind of stalled at the moment. But, I'm sure, only temporarily. I'm in love with this married woman...

Oh, no. Not again.

That makes three women I have heard this

story from this month: "I'm in love with a married woman. And we will be going off into the sunset just as soon as a) hubby grants an amicable divorce with lots of alimony and an even division of property and assets; b) they settle just a few, tiny details about custody of the children, and/or c) she actually *tells* him that she's leaving..."

Yeah, sure. One of the women is *still* waiting after two years. The other laid down an ultimatum she has no intention of living up to. Do the words "an affair to remember?" Ring any bells?

I repeat my question: Are we running out of lesbians? Aren't there enough already-declared, practicing, female, homo-orientations running around to the meet the demand?

A long time ago, I speculated that in the property settlement over what to call ourselves, the guys got the term that means happy. And we got the one that means, "*Joan Crawford is after your wife.*" It got a big laugh. But, hey, things have changed from the '70's when zillions of lesbians found out that they didn't have to stay with whatizname after they'd seen GiGi. Those were glorious years. Woman meets woman. Woman falls in love with woman. Both women leave Hector and Homer and the farm to take off in a rusting VW bus for Oregon to bake bread and read chapters of *Patience and Sarah* aloud to each other, between chopping logs and rough hewing planks for the cabin.

By now, it seemed to me, we had pretty much freed the wives. I didn't think there were any left in the ranks who didn't want to be there, that we'd gotten all the ones who only needed the love of a good woman to break free.

Hey, guess I was wrong. Guess we have pretty much used up our supply of available, desirable single lesbian women. There is, of course, our predisposition to couple, uncouple and recouple, within 36, 37 seconds flat from the time one of us first utters the fateful phrase "Honey, do you *have* to chew your gum like that?" Which means that at any given time there are not a lot of us available to those of us who are available at any given time. It has been scientifically calculated by the Bureau of Lesbian Statistics that the average time span between lesbian relationships is approximately a *minus* 3:746 minutes. Which does make the pickin's kinda slim, it seems.

Apparently we are having to recruit from the outside again. Unfortunately, if my tiny, sample is any kind of accurate, we seem to have used up the good, desirable, available married ladies too. You know, the ones who came willingly. And stayed. Now we are left with the ones who are clear that they aren't lesbians, they just happened to fall in love with a woman. (As though that weren't the actual Oxford English definition.) Only for them it isn't a phase.

Isn't it fun to rediscover the old myths...and realize there might be some truth in them? Wait till you hear what's happening with Butch/Femme!



RUN TO THE BORDERS

STEPHEN McCUALEY'S
THE MAN OF THE HOUSE

Okay, okay, this isn't a book solely for women of our persuasion, but I liked it anyway. Besides, gay men just have that way of saying things, don't you think?

Stephen McCualey's first book, *The Man of the House*, addresses the all too common personal problems our community faces — how our homosexuality affects our families, the way we feel about ourselves and the relationships we form to fill the gaps in our lives.

A sense of ennui is pervasive throughout. The narrator, Clyde, is in a rut, and that rut is magnified, revealing the pain and fear which has paralyzed him. His career is at a standstill, his relationship with his father is a constant source of painful headaches and he can't seem to get over the man who left him years ago.

Clyde is in his mid-thirties and has realized that the "lean and hungry, unkempt and addled look I'd cultivated throughout my twenties was beginning to read like desperation and indigence... At a certain age, the unkempt and hungry look is attractive only if you're neither, and the truth is, I was at least a little of both." Clyde lives in a converted attic apartment near Harvard with an aging playboy (of the hetero bent) who can't quite get started on the dissertation he's been researching for the past decade. Watching the stream of young graduate students his roommate woos and hoping to spy Julia Childs in the gourmet food store prove to be the most exciting topics in Clyde's lonely life.

Luckily for Clyde (and the reader) there is an undercurrent of change in his life. Clyde's old friend, Louise, returns to Boston to reunite her son, Ben, with his father. Louise has been in constant motion for the past thirteen years and has found moderate success as a writer. She provides a contrast to Clyde's sedentary life, but also reveals that both extremes can be just as damaging. Through his relationship with Ben (no, he's not the dad — that's another subplot), Clyde is able to muster the courage to face life again, with renewed confidence and excitement.

McCauley has written a funny, touching novel. Although a bit narcissistic at times, I couldn't help but see so much of what we are — often lonely, confused, afraid, but ultimately given to joy, courage, and resiliency.

PAST OUT

A reader from Hialeah Gardens, Florida writes: How and why is it that the U.S. military will not knowingly accept gays voluntarily but they have no problem with drafting gays during a war?

It is true that during wartime, the military has often allowed gays and lesbians to serve, only to discharge them when the war ends. During World War II, there were dozens of cases of the army overlooking evidence of homosexuality among otherwise-wanted military personnel. In perhaps the most famous example, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower ordered Johnnie Phelps, a sergeant in the Women's Army Corps, to produce a list of lesbians in her battalion. When Phelps warned the general that the list would be quite long and begin with her name at the top, Ike replied, "Forget the order."

During the Vietnam War, increased acceptance of homosexuality within society led to what the armed forces saw as a new problem: straight recruits pretending to be gay to avoid the draft. The solution was to demand "proof" from potential inductees who insisted they were gay — a psychiatrist's note or sworn statements from sexual partners. Of course, since sodomy was a felony in nearly every state, both straight and gay malingerers looked for other ways to resist the draft.

Journalist Randy Shilts documented many instances of military personnel sent to the Middle East to fight in the Gulf War who returned to face discharge proceedings. Indeed, beginning in September 1990, the Department of Defense's "Stop/Loss" policy phased out nearly all discharges of personnel the army deemed useful, and lesbian and gay soldiers (some relatively out) fought and risked their lives in the Persian Gulf.

The Defense Department's policy in the Reagan and Bush years insisted that homosexuality is incompatible with military

service for a host of reasons — from good order and discipline to security. But under what many gay military insiders jokingly called the "Queen for a Day" clause, commanders who had evidence of a servicemember having engaged in homosexual behavior were allowed to NOT discharge him or her as long as the behavior occurred only once and the individual regretted it. Needless to say, this policy gave the military the discretion to keep some gay and lesbian soldiers and discharge others (and to let "wayward straights" off with just a warning if they misbehaved only once).

The Queen for a Day clause and the fact that gays and lesbians have rarely been discharged when the army needs them to point to a clear contradiction in the military's policy. If gay people are a threat to security, good order and discipline, then wartime should be the time when gays are ferreted out most meticulously. Indeed, by the early 1990's, most supporters of the military's ban on gays and lesbians admitted that homosexuals had the capability of being excellent soldiers. Even pro-ban Sen. Sam Nunn, who until 1995 was the chair of the Senate Armed Services Committee, indicated that it was only open homosexuality that was a threat to the military, and that discreet lesbian soldiers and celibate gay sailors were all right by him.

The current policy of "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" was supposed to have rectified the situation as outlined above, by allowing gays to serve as long as they did not engage in same-sex behavior or share their sexual orientation with anyone. But recent reports show that this policy has resulted in more witch hunts and discharge proceedings against gays and lesbians, rather than fewer. If history is any guide, the discharges are likely to proceed until the United States goes to war again and gay and lesbian servicemembers are needed to defend the country.

What did gays and lesbians write President Reagan about?

While many lesbian and gay Americans vilified President Ronald Reagan for his right-wing politics and inaction during the AIDS epidemic, Reagan received more than just hate mail from America's lesbian and gay citizens during his presidency. A Freedom of Information Act request produced a variety of letters to President and Mrs. Reagan on lesbian and gay concerns, some of which were quite poignant. A Florida man wrote the President in 1988 about being fired for being gay, then finding that he had no legal recourse to get his job back. The White House's response was to pass the letter along to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (even though firing gay employees has never been against federal law). A young man dying of AIDS in 1983 wrote the President anonymously, and a note in the Reagan files indicates the letter was considered "extremely sensitive" and passed on to the Secret Service presumably because the young man was considered a threat to the President's safety in some way.

Other letters were more friendly. One, from Houston's Gay Political Caucus, invited President Reagan or a representative to speak at the 1983 Gay Pride Week rally in Houston. In a similar vein, a director of the International Gay Bowling Tournament, held in Washington in May 1988, requested a letter of welcome from Reagan to be distributed to the 1,500 gay bowlers who came to the nation's capital from all over the world.

It is difficult to say whether these letter-writers were aware of the irony of requests to an administration that vilified gays and lesbians. The Reagan White House would never have considered allowing the President to address a gay pride event or welcome gays of any persuasion to Washington. But perhaps such requests were a self-conscious political maneuver to remind Reagan that he was the President of a country which included gay and lesbian Americans too.





OLYMPIC TORCH PULLED FROM COBB COUNTY

To the relief and gratification of gay and lesbian people everywhere, the Olympic torch will not pass through Cobb County, Georgia. The Atlanta Committee for the Olympic Games stunned the gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender community last summer when it announced the torch relay would pass through Cobb County which, in 1993, passed a resolution condemning the "gay lifestyle" as incompatible with the community's standards. County officials have refused to rescind the measure despite mounting opposition against it.

The announcement last year that the torch would pass through Cobb County sent gay activists reeling. Only a year had passed since ACOG finally agreed, after an intense and protracted battle with Olympics Out of Cobb Coalition, a group of activists, and NGLTF, to move the preliminary competition volleyball games from Cobb County.

OCC quickly regrouped and began its campaign once again to prevent an official Olympic event from occurring in a county that officially condemns gay people.

ACOG released the following statement:

"ACOG has decided not to run the Torch Relay through Cobb County. The decision is based on the fact that the Cobb County Commission has not changed its non-binding resolution since July 1994 when ACOG relocated the preliminary volleyball venue from Cobb County to Athens, Georgia.

"It is our goal to make the torch relay an exciting and memorable experience. We want to focus on the excitement of the event and not to be distracted by other issues. The torch relay will arrive in Georgia on July 9, and for 10 days it will traverse the state, allowing hundreds of torch bearers to participate in this great occasion, including many from Cobb County."

THE ABC'S OF ICTLEP MEETING THE RCGA

Phyllis Frye Visits Omaha

Kind of sounds like the title of a bad Japanese horror movie, when in fact it was the coming together of the Omaha GLBT community with some of the national leaders in our community. Phyllis Frye and Dee McKellar spoke to a crowd of over 30 people at the MCC Church in March.

ICTLEP stands for International Conference on Transgender Law and Employment Policy. Here's their statement of purpose: *Dedicated to education concerning legal and human rights issues related to persons identifying as transgendered — both masculine and feminine gender identities and expressions — lesbian, gay and bisexual, and welcoming the diversity of people of all racial, ethnic and religious belief categorizations.*

Phyllis is a working lawyer from Houston and the founder and Executive Director of ICTLEP. Phyllis is an activist who has been working for over 20 years for transgender rights.

She was one of the few key people in organizing National Gender Lobbying Days last October, where we all know that over 100 transpeople from all over the country invaded Washington and lobbied almost every senator and congressman they could. All this in the hopes of pushing the ENDA bill and trans acceptance in general with our national leaders. Gloria wrote all about that last year.

Phyllis has worked very hard and continues to do so for our rights as citizens of this country. She has laid so much groundwork and is now to the point that she can no longer do this by herself. ICTLEP was formed and has an office and a full time employee, Dee McKellar to assist in the cause.

For the 5th year in a row, ICTLEP is hosting its law conference in Houston. This year's law conference is July 3-7 and anyone can attend. Not only lawyers but lay people with transgender issues are welcome and encouraged to attend.

During the meetings, stenographers record the meetings in detail and sometime after the Law Conference the official "proceedings" are made available. The purpose of these massive documents is to give us, and the outside world, a written document that deals with transgender legal issues. We were presented a set of the previous proceedings by ICTLEP and the three volumes are now part of the RCGA library.

Phyllis has given a great deal of time and effort to our causes but she needs our help. With the acquisition of the office and assistance from Dee there are monthly expenses that ICTLEP needs to cover. For this reason ICTLEP is asking for monthly pledges from anyone and everyone throughout the country. They currently do not have enough pledges to ensure that ICTLEP will continue. Therefore any monthly pledge you can make will be greatly appreciated. The RCGA will take a monthly collection at our meetings and make a group donation every month (give your donations to Doris at the meetings. I know she'll track you down anyway).



CFEP EYES AMENDMENT 2 DECISION

As reported in last month's *New Voice*, the U.S. Supreme Court will soon hand down its decision on Colorado's Amendment 2. Four possible dates remain in June for the decision: June 3, 10, 17 or 24 at 10AM. The Court may already have issued its decision in May, prior to the deadline for the June edition of the *New Voice*.

Amendment 2 is a ballot initiative that sought to amend Colorado's constitution to prohibit state and local lawmakers from ever passing laws that protect lesbians, gay men and bisexuals from discrimination. In addition, the measure was designed to repeal any existing civil rights laws that cover lesbians, gay men and bisexuals.

Citizens for Equal Protection invites you to either celebrate or demonstrate on the Tuesday following the decision at 10AM on the west side of the State Capitol Building in Lincoln. Watch news reports and papers or call the CFEP phone line at 398-3027 for the results each Monday after 11AM or you can access this information on the Internet at WWW.ANGLE.ORG

Whatever the court's decision, it will have significant impact on the lesbian, gay and bisexual community and on all Americans. If allowed to stand, Coloradans will be barred from the democratic process and be required to play by different political rules before they can secure anti-discrimination laws.

If Amendment 2 is struck down, it would be a profound victory not only for lesbian, gay and bisexual Americans, but also for the constitutional right of all Americans to have the equal

opportunity to participate in all facets of government.

However, a victory only secures the rights of gays and lesbians to play by the same political rules as others — it does not move us forward toward equal civil rights, but simply keeps religious political extremists from dragging us backwards. Neither will a victory stop future anti-gay/lesbian/bisexual initiatives nor make them "court proof".

Whatever the outcome of this case, the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender community must continue its fight for equality and the basic right to be protected from discrimination.

Since *Bowers v. Hardwick*, this is probably the most significant case affecting gay, lesbian and bisexual Americans on which the Supreme Court will rule. Make every effort to be in Lincoln on the Tuesday following the decision to let your voice be heard.

GAY/LESBIAN PROGRAMMING ON NEBRASKA ETV DURING JUNE

Recognizing Gay/Lesbian Month, the statewide Nebraska ETV Network will broadcast four informative programs for and about gays, lesbians, bisexuals, and heterosexuals.

Produced from the vantage point of people living daily with the HIV virus, the final two programs in the *POSITIVE: LIVE WITH HIV* series are broadcast Fridays, June 7 & 14 at 9 p.m. "Care," June 7, looks at how HIV/AIDS is changing priorities of the American health care system. The program visits Washington, D.C., Atlanta, San Francisco, and Queens, New York, to observe how HIV+ individuals are impacted by health care. The final program, "Fighting for Our Lives," airs June 14. Activism exists because people continue to die. Concerns about death, grief and commemoration are explored, as well as the ways many are making a difference in the battle against HIV/AIDS and in our society.

All four episodes of *POSITIVE: LIVE WITH HIV* will be rebroadcast on NETV's cable service, EduCable, Sundays at 7 p.m., beginning June 9. *POSITIVE: LIVE WITH HIV* is telecast with closed captions for hearing-impaired. The EduCable broadcast will be with Spanish subtitles.

(Videocassettes in English or English with Spanish subtitles are available by calling KQED Video at 1-800-358-3000. The cost for the entire series is \$23.70 with shipping and handling included.)

Brian McNaught, an award winning freelance writer, educational consultant, and lecturer hosts two specials. In "Homophobia in the Workplace" (June 21) McNaught presented a skilled explanation of the losses to everyone when homophobia exists in the workplace, at school or anywhere. He defines homophobia and draws from his personal experiences to point out some of the difficulties of living and working as a homosexual in today's world.

How does it feel to hear parents make fun of gays, or to hear negative comments from teachers, or have to endure words like "sissy," and "faggot?" "Growing Up Gay" (June 28) is a gentle initiation into seeing gay and lesbian lives in non-threatening ways and breaks through misconceptions about homosexuality. Drawing from expertise as a sex education specialist and his own personal story, McNaught weaves a story of growing up gay in a heterosexual world.



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
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
