I recently had the opportunity to visit Des Moines for the annual conference of the Mid Central District of UFMCC. While there I visited three of the establishments in the downtown area — Blazing Saddle, the Side Saddle Cafe, and Our Place.

Blazing Saddle was very much as I expected — rustic decor, small, and very crowded with men (about 98% men, though women were welcome). We didn't stay long — there wasn't room to turn around, but the men there certainly seemed to enjoy it.

The Side Saddle Cafe, located just next door as you might expect, was a comfortable cafe serving good quality meals ranging from hamburgers to generous cuts of prime rib. The night I was there, the Side Saddle had been totally overwhelmed by an onslaught of 50 or more people from the nearby conference. David, a dark haired, well muscled man in a tee shirt from International Mr. Leather, was doing an excellent job as the only waiter (in between frequent sprints to the Blazing Saddle to get change). Some of the customers volunteered to do dishes, pass water, and pour coffee, while the rest of us told stories, sang songs, and generally raised the roof. Carla and I shared a booth with a generous Des Moines native who watched the antics with an amused grin and commented that it was certainly more lively than most Saturday nights at the Side Saddle.

After our meal, we went around the corner to "Our Place" — a large bar with a polished wood dance floor, lots of seating, three pool tables, and a crowd that was 98% womyn, though a handful of men wandered in and out during the evening. The music was good, the dance floor excellent, and the customers friendly.

We didn't make it to The Garden — that will have to wait until our next visit. And there will be a next visit. We met some great people and had a great time.

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UNHAPPY WITH CHANNEL 7 COVERAGE OF PARADE

Dear Sharon,

I was disappointed with NewsWatch 7's coverage of the parade and rally of Sunday, June 11, "From Silence to Celebration." The event was covered only briefly, and the Newscaster told viewers that the event was a celebration of the homosexual lifestyle. This information was incorrect.

Use of the term homosexual lifestyle gave no indication of the diversity that exists among gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender people, and no indication of the variety of organizations represented at the event. Use of the term also gave the false impression that we were celebrating only our sexuality and reduced the GLBT rights movement to a bedroom issue.

Sunday's event was intended to increase awareness of the gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender community. However, the brief coverage the event received will only reinforce those stereotypes that the GLBT community has worked to eliminate.

NAMES PROJECT VOLUNTEER HAS "QUILT FEVER"

There's an affectionate term for volunteers who have been with the NAMES Project Foundation since its inception: Dinosaurs, they call them. One such volunteer is Ruth "Jenks" Jenkins, a 69-year old woman who's been with the project since 1988. Jenks had worked at I Magnins for 26 years as a window trimmer and thought she might try sewing for the Quilt. "At first, I kept killing the machines. But eventually I got better and stopped breaking them," she said.

Jenks, from Illinois by way of Texas, has been living in San Francisco's Castro District since 1961. She used to walk by the NAMES Project workshop when it first opened and one day she walked in. At first, Jenks volunteered one day a week. Then she decided two days would be better. "They told me, 'Jenks, you've got Quilt fever,' and it was true. Now I have my own special shelf that says 'Jenks' panels.'

Although Jenks herself has never made an entire panel, she worked on one for a minister friend named Jim. Her artist friend painted it with two angels and the Golden Gate Bridge. "I really didn't have too much to do with it except I did embroider the church symbol. I had to, because I realized there wasn't one single bit of stitching on the panel!"

Jenks was asked if she had been familiar with the Quilt before she began volunteering. "Oh yes," she said, "my supervisor at I. Magnins was the first person I knew who died of AIDS." She's also on the Board of Directors for the Life Center, a project for the community started by the Trinity United Methodist Church. "It's going to be a beautiful building containing AIDS service organizations so that people who are ill can go to one place and get all the information they need."

What has kept Jenks volunteering at the

NAMES Project so many years? "It gives me satisfaction to help complete a panel," she says. "Sometimes when people send panels in, they just glue or pin things so there's lots of sewing to be done." She feels her work at the NAMES Project is especially important now, with the 1996 Washington, D.C. display coming up. She was there in '89 and '92 and she's thinking about going again. "Just before the '92 display, we got tons of new panels that required a lot of work. And now it's so much bigger."

She was asked what she remembers most about Washington. "It was amazing to see the volunteers all dressed in white during the unfolding ceremony. The first time the Quilt was unfolded in D.C., somehow the panels were at an angle. So everybody took hold of their corners and flipped it up in the air and turned it. That's become part of the opening ceremony — lifting and turning. It's wonderful to watch the big twelve-by-twelves going up in the air. The first time I did it my feet went off the ground!"

If homosexuals are hurting anybody, they are most often hurting themselves, while straight people try to prove they are better by putting homosexuals down, breaking up families through divorce and killing innocent children through abortion.

Regardless of what you may think of my own views, please write John Heaston, managing editor of *The Reader* (512 S. 11th Street, Omaha, NE 68102) and urge the paper not to cave into such homophobic attacks. To understand how pro-abortion homophobia can get, consider Chuck Volz. He is a good pro-life soul. He blocked an abortion clinic and as a lawyer represented pro-life rescuers in at least 50 trials. He opened the one and only home in Philadelphia for women with crisis pregnancies. Then the "pro-life" community discovered he was gay and ALL organized "pro-life" groups pulled their funding of the crisis pregnancy home. 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
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ROBERTS' RULES FYI. What's On The Agenda:

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EXPLORING MILITIAS & ANTI-GAY RHETORIC

The media attention focused on the April 19 bombing in Oklahoma City has triggered debate on citizen militias and the consequences of Right Wing resentment toward government. In the wake of the tragedy, a terrified public is struggling to understand the threat posed by militant groups. However, trying to understand militias and the danger they pose by studying the bombing and the militias' self-professed hatred of government is like trying to understand the entire gay/lesbian/bisexual/transgender community on the basis of one night at a gay bar. The citizen militia movement is a complex phenomenon reflective of fast-growing reactionary sentiment with consequences for all of us.

The citizen militia movement is one faction within a broader Right Wing backlash against democratic values. The militias are situated to the right of more mainstream rightists such as Pat Buchanan, and are tied to white supremacist movements like the Posse Comitatus, the Ku Klux Klan, Christian Patriots, and Christian Identity. When militiamen talk about their "anti-government" agenda, we should hear — "anti-gay, anti-Semitic, anti-woman, anti-democratic, and anti-racial justice" agenda. The militias' proposed alternative to "big bad government" is a return to society ruled by an unamended Constitution — constructed to protect the rights of white property owners, and intended to exclude women and people of color from participation in the franchise. Former Center for Democratic Renewal Research Director Leonard Zeskind writes, "It has the smell of yesteryear — states' rights and armed vigilante gangs — but the militias are now the most popular vehicle to the right of

Pat Robertson's Christian Coalition. Like the Posse Comitatus 15 years ago, the body work is painted with religion, patriotism and the U.S. Constitution, but the motor is anti-Semitism and racism, and the drivers are white supremacists." *The Dignity Report Coalition for Human Dignity*

The militia movement is powered by a growing fear of white male disprivilege. In an economy in which temporary employment agencies have become our largest private employers, and American workers' standard of living has dropped to pre-1953 levels (Jobs with Justice), rightists such as the militiamen are growing nostalgic for a time when white male entitlements went largely unchallenged. In this respect, the militiamen are part of a growing phenomena. Perhaps this is the most important aspect of the militia movement. In spite of the more bizarre racial and religious agendas of some white supremacist members, militiamen share many things in common with more mainstream elements of the Right Wing.

The militiamen contend that government is failing their members — white men — because of the influence of the civil rights lobby ("racial preferences" and "special rights"), Jews ("international bankers"), feminists ("breakdown of the family and gender roles"), and gays (you know what they say about us). This is mirrored in the rhetoric of mainstream rightists, who believe education is in ruins because of political correctness and secular humanism; oppose government programs for the poor, denounce gay/lesbian/bisexual people; and scapegoat minorities as immoral and unproductive. They say we are all destroying God, family, and country and use this to justify super authoritarian measures to control or eliminate us. Samuel Sherwood of the United States Militia Association, based in Blackfoot, Idaho, says of President Clinton, "(he) is determined to seize your guns, steal your food, take your children away. In his term, he will have killed more babies than Hitler, put more homosexuals in government than Sodom and Gomorrah, had the schools teach your children it is right and forced you to accept it." In Michigan, the head of the effort to place an anti-gay initiative

on the ballot used the rhetoric of the militia as he advanced the anti-gay measure. In an interview with MetroTimes, a Michigan newspaper, George Matousek described the importance of his anti-gay initiative. "Where sodomy is acceptable, the nation declines. Homosexuals are a tool to weaken America. I love this country and I want to remain strong... The Homosexual movement will destroy the military. Soon half of the troops will be gone. They don't want to serve beside queers. And the half that's left will be useless — made up of women and homos, people who can't fight their way out of a paper bag. When this happens, we'll be doomed. We'll be attacked, or called into a war that our military can't handle. Clinton, or whoever's in office, will turn all our troops over to the United Nations. And this country won't exist anymore." Matousek's plan? "Step one, stop the homos."

Only the U.S. Constitution and armed citizens will prevent such a takeover, according to Matousek. Which is why he advocates all citizens owning guns. Matousek expressed frustration at the stagnating economy and how that inspired his actions. "When I grew up... I could get a job with any factory I wanted. I could earn money. Now, with the international bankers in control, there's so much socialist thinking. Work, work, work — but never really own anything, because of taxes." The solution is "armed revolution. I believe that we're headed for this someday."

This is what the militias represent. As we mourn the tragedy in Oklahoma City, we must not allow our grief to blind us to the continuing threat of the militias and the Right Wing movement to which they belong. We need to get down to business and educate ourselves about the wide array of Right Wing groups that threaten our rights and security, and understand the social and economic factors that lead to their development. We must further understand that our fates as gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender people are inextricably tied to other groups under Right Wing attack. It's time to reach out, broaden our agenda, and increase our capacities for compassion and human connection. We must overcome fear, come out, and organize, organize, organize.

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
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NATIONAL NEWS

NEBRASKA ATTORNEY GENERAL ENDORSES AMENDMENT 2

Nebraska Attorney General Don Stenberg was among seven attorneys general who signed onto a brief asking the U.S. Supreme Court to uphold Colorado's anti-gay Amendment 2. The highest court in the country is reviewing the amendment, which was ruled unconstitutional by the Colorado State Supreme Court. A hearing will be held this fall. Other state attorneys general who signed onto the brief are from Alabama, Idaho, California, South Carolina, South Dakota and Virginia. The brief argued that the Colorado ruling would extend the same rights to "every and any special interest group" and "cast a long shadow of uncertainty over the traditional rights of democratic self-government." The attorneys general say they are not against gay rights, but are for states' rights. In another blow to the gay rights movement, the Clinton administration declined to join the legal attack on Amendment 2. Attorney General Janet Reno decided not to file a friend-of-the-court brief with the Supreme Court opposing the ban on laws and politics designed to protect homosexuals from discrimination in Colorado. Reno said since no federal program or federal statute was involved, her department was not a party. The Justice Department has, however, acted to protect homosexuals from being denied security clearances within the federal government, including the Justice Department and the FBI.

MAYOR ENDORSES GAY MARRIAGE

The mayor of Ithica, New York is urging his state to allow gay couples to marry. His support was sparked by Foshay Greene and Phillip Storrs, who applied for a marriage license at the Ithica city clerk's office. Their request was denied.

Mayor Benjamin Nichols said he disagreed with the law and asked city lawmakers to pass a

WEEKLY GAY SERIES AVAILABLE TO PBS

The first weekly gay television series premiered with little fanfare in Denver on June 8.

The program is called Network Q: Out Across America. There are 13 one-hour episodes being made available to PBS stations nationwide. There are plans to continue producing the program as a weekly, with 26 episodes annually. Each episode has been drawn from feature-length documentaries produced by Network Q since 1992.

With a formal reminiscent of the old "On the Road" series, Out Across America travels to different regions, profiling the wide range of people, issues, events and culture in the gay and lesbian community. Some areas visited include New York City; Seattle; Denver; Ovett, Mississippi; Salt Lake City; Austin, Texas; and Sydney, Australia.

The New Voice learned there were no plans yet by NETV to show the program locally. In fact, NETV had not heard of the program since it was so new.

When Denver PBS station KBDI aired the program in early June, it received a 1 share which means one percent of the people watching TV that moment was tuned into the program. That may not sound like a lot, but it's about the same rating that CNN received in the days before Nicole Brown Simpson and Ron Goldman were murdered. During the program, KBDI says it raised several thousand dollars in pledges and signed up about 60 new members.

resolution, urging the state to legalize gay marriages.

The two men went ahead with a planned Jewish commitment ceremony at the end of June. Storrs said that having a mayor acknowledge the possibility of one day being legally married made a big difference in his mind.

STONEWALL AWARDS GIVEN TO FOUR DESERVING PEOPLE

The annual "Stonewall Awards" go to people who have contributed to life in the gay and lesbian community. This year's awards were announced last month. Each winner gets \$25,000 in recognition of their work. The winners were Peggy Shaw, Jim Thomas, Mandy Carter, and Franklin Whitworth.

Shaw, now 51, lived in public parks and abandoned houses while she toured Europe with a gay theatre group 20 years ago. Today, she is an award-winning artist, playwright and producer who is praised by critics. She and her partner, Lois Weaver, have their own touring theatre company, Split Britches, and a performance stage, the WOW Cafe in the East Village in New York.

Thomas, 38, established the semi-monthly newspaper *The News Telegraph* based in St. Louis. You may have picked up a copy in Kansas City. He started the publication in 1981 without any training as a journalist. It has reached a circulation of 15,000 in Missouri, Kansas, Illinois, Arkansas and Tennessee. He hopes to accelerate its circulation and turn it into a weekly. Thomas helped organize St. Louis's Gay Pride Week.

Carter, 46, was raised in orphanages and a foster home, New York before she became an anti-war activists in San Francisco, Los Angeles, and Durham, North Carolina. She led gay and lesbian opposition to Jesse Helms' 1990 Senate Campaign. Helms won, but Carter plans to return to North Carolina again this summer to mount an effort against Helms' re-election campaign. Also, in the early 1990's, Carter was horrified to discover, what she said, "was the Radical White Right's efforts against gays and lesbians by using the black community." She focused her attention on organizing that constituency.

Whitworth, 55, was a civil rights worker long before he redirected his energies against Fundamentalist attacks on the gay and lesbian community. He helped found the first legally chartered gay political organization in Virginia and the first gay organization in Colorado Springs. When Colorado voters passed the anti-gay Amendment 2 in 1992, Whitworth joined in creating Ground Zero, a grass roots political and educational organization. He plans to use his \$25,000 award to further the work of Ground Zero and fix a long-ignored broken tooth.

The Stonewall Awards have had significant impact on their recipients, all of whom have experienced personal financial sacrifice to support their roles in the gay and lesbian community. The awards often enable winners to accelerate their leadership activity, pay off debts and initiate savings. Winners are selected regardless of sexual orientation, race, ethnic origin, age or gender.

MCC GENERAL

CONFERENCE IN ATLANTA

The fourth week of July will find Rev. Lewis and several members of the MCC-Omaha congregation in Atlanta, Georgia, to attend the General Conference of the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches. This conference, held every two years, brings together MCC churches from around the world to worship, learn, and conduct the business of the church.

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FREEDOM IN RHODE ISLAND

Rhode Island Governor Lincoln Almond has signed a bill prohibiting discrimination based on sexual orientation in employment, housing, public accommodations, and credit which had passed both houses in the General Assembly.

With the Republican governor's signature, Rhode Island became the ninth state to pass civil rights legislation for gay men and lesbians. Wisconsin, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Hawaii, Vermont, California, Connecticut and Minnesota all have some type of prohibition on discrimination based on sexual orientation.

1995 marked the eleventh year of the bill's introduction. Speakers at the signing ceremony included sponsors of the civil rights bill and activists who had seen a decade of disappointment end with celebration. State Senator Rhoda Perry read a letter that she received after the bill had passed the Senate. "As a result of your work, I am relieved of a burden that has been so painful to bear. I may not come out at work, but I no longer agonize about being found out. The recently passed legislation is a gift of enormous proportions, and I thank you and the State of Rhode Island."

MICHIGAN WOMYN'S MUSIC FESTIVAL

The 20th Anniversary of the Michigan Womyn's Music Festival will be held August 8-13. A record number of womyn are expected to attend the '95 festival, with womyn from dozens of countries throughout the world for this 6-day all-womyn camping event.

The oldest and largest of the outdoor womyn's music festivals held in the United States, Michigan takes place on 650 acres of remote country land where womyn live communally for the week in this female-created village. The gathering which generally attracts 7-8,000 womyn each August, offers 300 workshops, a womyn's crafts fair with 140 artisan booths, sports, dances, and many special events. The 40 performances featured on the three stages present womyn artists from throughout the United States, Canada and an increasing number of international performers, in a dynamic mixture of music, dance, theatre, comedy, and performance art.

There are special networking centers for differently-abled womyn, womyn of colors, womyn over 50, womyn in recovery, and womyn with children.

CDC OFFERS INFORMATION

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention National AIDS Clearinghouse has announced a new HIV/AIDS Treatment Information Service for people living with HIV, their families and friends, and health care providers.

The Treatment Information Service was developed through the U.S. Public Health Service to provide timely, accurate information about federally approved treatment guidelines for HIV/AIDS.

The service is a free, confidential service. The number is 1-800-HIV-0440.

SECRET SERVICE FEARS AIDS, WEARS GLOVES

What was supposed to be an historic meeting between gay elected officials and White House officials turned into controversy last month.

On June 13, the elected officials were escorted into the White House by secret service agents wearing latex gloves. The gloves were used when the officers searched the gay elected officials' belongings. The gay elected officials were outraged after learning this was not standard procedure. The officers were fearing exposure to

AIDS. The Washington Post quoted Secret Service Director Elijah Bowron as saying, "It is not the policy of the Secret Service to wear gloves merely based on known sexual preference" and he said he would "hold a special training session directed specifically at these matters." White House spokesman Michael McCurry said, "It's safe to say that the chief of staff and others were distressed by that and believe it to be an error of judgment."

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LINCOLN POLICE ASK GAY COMMUNITY TO HELP CONTROL SEX IN PARKS

An Interview with Captain David Beggs of the Lincoln Police Department

The New Voice recently received a telephone call from Captain David Beggs of the Lincoln Police Department, requesting our assistance in getting a message out to Nebraska's gay community.

Captain Beggs stated that he was calling in response to a recent article in the *Lincoln Journal-Star* regarding the growing problem of men engaging in open sex in three of the city parks. Captain Beggs admitted that his knowledge of the gay community was limited, but was calling to request our help. (In fact, Captain Beggs was quite knowledgeable — he had a copy of *The New Voice* at hand, had recently attended a meeting with "leaders of the gay community in Lincoln" and was able to discuss his concerns about the listing of cruising areas in the Damron Guides.)

Captain Beggs stated that his office has had many complaints from Lincoln citizens about men having sex in Wilderness, Mandan, and Pioneers Parks in Lincoln. Citizens have observed open sex as well as finding discarded used condoms in the parks.

Captain Beggs repeated several times that he wants to avoid having a general sweep of the parks similar to what has happened in Omaha, but that his officers cannot ignore blatant violations of Lincoln's city code regarding public indecency. Captain Beggs has assigned more frequent patrols of the parks by Uniformed Officers and some citations have been issued, including two for indecent exposure to men who were completely naked in the park. At this point, the Lincoln Police have not yet assigned plain clothes or undercover details, but this will be likely in the

future if the complaints from citizens continue.

Captain Beggs expressed concern that this sort of illicit sex presents a health hazard in addition to being a violation of city code. Along with members of Lincoln's gay community, he recently attended a meeting called by Tim Timmons of the Lincoln-Lancaster County Health Department to discuss strategic planning to decrease the spread of HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases. Timmons expressed serious concern over the behavior of some gay men, who have expressed the feeling that because the incidence of HIV is quite low in Lincoln they do not have to use condoms during casual sexual encounters. Those attending the meeting agreed that more education is needed, both through publications and in the schools, and also shared their thoughts about the recent increase of sex in the parks. The group did agree that park sweeps, plainclothes, and undercover operations are not positive, but lead to negative feelings and strained relationships. Captain Beggs was also concerned that one time intervention, such as a sweep of the parks, does not change behavior any more than one radar check point makes a significant reduction in speeding.

Captain Beggs stressed that neither he nor anyone else on the Lincoln Police Department has any intent or desire to stop men from meeting other men. He stated that they are well aware that gay men meet at "The Loop" but they have not had any problem with open sexual encounters there — rather, there has been concern about possible gay bashing.

The problem with the parks has been the

allegations of open sexual encounters, not that men were meeting other men there. Beggs also stressed that all of his officers have been instructed to enforce the city code equitably and to issue citations to any persons engaging in open sex, whether homosexual or heterosexual.

Captain Beggs asked for the community's cooperation to abide by the city codes and abstain from sexual contact in any public place. He did acknowledge that if the complaints continue, he will have no choice but to take other action.

I would like to personally express my gratitude to Captain Beggs for his openness and willingness to "play fair" with the gay community. We have been reminded of the consequences of our actions, it is up to us to heed the warning and monitor our own behavior.

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ICON AWARDS GRANTS FROM MEMORIAL DAY PICNIC PROCEEDS

The Imperial Court of Nebraska announced that they have awarded \$1499 from the proceeds of their Memorial Day Picnic.

Thanks to the generosity and support of the 459 people who attended the picnic, 6 local groups received grants.

The initial grant for \$100 was awarded to P-FLAG of Lincoln for its *Straight from the Heart* campaign, which helped put gay/lesbian positive videos into the hands of our Congressional representatives in Washington.

The next grant for \$100 was awarded to the Hospice Project of Bergan Mercy Hospital and the University of Nebraska Medical Center. This project will build a \$3 million hospice which will be open to all terminally ill persons.

A grant of \$450 was awarded to the Omaha-Council Bluffs Chapter of the National Organization for Women (NOW) to assist with many projects, including educational programs on domestic violence, eating disorders, women's rights in the workplace, and cancer awareness.

Another grant of \$450 was awarded to the G/LBT Community Resource Center Development Committee to assist them as they develop a plan to implement a Resource Center here in Omaha.

A grant of \$315 was made to ANGLE (Achieving New Gay and Lesbian Endeavors) to assist with its projects including the annual community recognition dinner, its ongoing efforts

to network and avoid conflicts in scheduling major events, and the annual Pride celebration.

A grant of \$84 (from the tips at the beer wagon) was awarded to the Outreach Center to help with its continued work to educate and counsel people in the downtown area about HIV prevention and to continue HIV testing. The

Outreach Center has the highest rate of positive tests in the State, due largely to the high risk clientele it serves.

These grants were presented by Emperor XIV David Hansen and Empress XIV Mae O'Naise during Coronation XV, held at the Ramada Inn Airport.

DC's TRIUMPHS IN OMAHA INDOOR RODEO

It was May, the weather was rainy, and the laughter and the spirits inside DC's were boisterous (and a little nervous) as 5 teams and several individuals signed up to compete in the Heartland Gay Rodeo Association's Annual Indoor Rodeo. This year's indoor rodeo featured five events: Bull Riding (bouncing around the dance floor on an inflated rubber ball), Barrel Racing (riding a tricycle in a figure 8 around two barrels), Dart Throwing (throwing a dart at a target while prancing along with a stick horse clutched between your legs), Roping (trying to rope a wooden horse without first catching your rope in the ceiling fans), and the Drag Race (dressing in bm, dress, wig, and boots and racing to the finish line). Hosts for the afternoon were owners of DC's, David Brady and Dan Johnson, along with Mr. HGRA, Jim Bohrer. Timekeeper for the events was Jo. Competing for top honors in the team events were one team from DC's, one team from HGRA, and three teams from the Imperial Court of Nebraska — the "Good," the "Bad," and the "Ugly." The contests were fast and furious, pausing only for basic instruction in the skills necessary to survive an Indoor Rodeo. And by the end of the afternoon, three individuals had emerged successful. Taking first place in the individual competition was Mr. HGRA, Jim Bohrer (the only one there who actually owns a horse). Second place went to Mark Warneke, and third place went to Joe Batter. In the team competition, DC's took first place, HGRA took second, and two of the ICON teams "The Bad" and "The Ugly" tied for third place. Only "The Good" failed to place. It was a wonderful afternoon of fun. Thanks to HGRA and to DC's for a great time.

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The theme of this year's Pride activities, "From Silence to Celebration," was exemplified by the gentle, outgoing editor of the anthology of gay and lesbian role models, *Uncommon Heroes*. Phillip Sherman has traveled across the country and back again promoting his photo anthology which features a cross-section of outstanding gay and lesbian people: political activists, authors, artists, actors, politicians, models, business owners, physicians, attorneys, teachers, ministers, and even a rodeo bull rider. The book features photos and one page commentaries on the life and contributions of each of the persons featured. Phil Sherman shared some of his dreams and some of the stories about his interviews with the people in his book, as he autographed copies of the book during the Pride celebration.

Just 3 days after Phil Sherman shared a few moments with the Omaha community, he received notice that *Uncommon Heroes* was awarded the American Library Association's 1995 Gay, Lesbian, and Bisexual Book Award for non-fiction, sharing the award with Dorothy Allison's book, *Skin: Talking About Sex, Class, & Literature*, the association's first tie in its 25 year history. Upon learning of the award, Sherman stated "I'm thrilled. It was really a labor of love, and to be acknowledged like this is wonderful. I hope it means that more people, particularly gay and lesbian youth, will have the opportunity to ready it. It's just the kind of thing I wish existed when I was a kid."

The book is well written and informative with excellent black and white photographs of many of our heroes. The Omaha display will feature more than 1,000 panels, each commemorating the life of someone who has died of AIDS. This is just a portion of the entire quilt which includes more than 30,000 panels.

On opening day, schoolchildren and educators from all across Nebraska and Iowa will view the Quilt from 9AM to 5PM. A private showing for persons with AIDS and their family members will be held that evening from 5 until 9.

Opening ceremonies for the Quilt will be Saturday, October 7 at 9AM. The Quilt will be on display until 9PM and then again the next day from 9AM until 6PM.

CREATING CHANGE CONFERENCE TRAVELS TO DETROIT

Creating Change, the preeminent national gathering of gay/lesbian/bisexual/transgender activists, will be hosted this year in Detroit, November 8-12. All conference events during this 8th annual conference will be held at the Westin Hotel, Renaissance Center in downtown Detroit.

Major program elements of this year's Creating Change Conference have been locked in. The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force is pleased to announce that Urvashi Vaid, writer, veteran activist, dynamic speaker and executive director of the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force from 1989-1992, will address the conference at the traditional Sunday closing brunch/plenary session. Vaid is currently completing a book that critiques our political movement. Vaid's book, *Virtual Equality: The Mainstreaming of Gay & Lesbian Liberation* (Anchor Books), is due out on October 11, just weeks before Creating Change.

As in past years, several all-day pre-conference institutes are scheduled prior to the core workshops and roundtables of the conference. On November 8, the two simultaneous institutes will be the annual "People of Color Organizing Institute" and "Eliminating Racism: Doing The Right Thing". On November 9, the two simultaneous institutes will be "Building Alliances Across Race, Class & Gender Lines" and the new "Youth Organizing Institute".

To make Creating Change more useful as an organizing and strategy-building event, this year's conference will feature a new format—Organizing Roundtables on a number of topics. These all-day sessions will allow attendees to immerse themselves in one issue. The Organizing Roundtables will cover the "how do we do it?" stage of an issue and will then progress to the "what to do next?" stage of organizing.

Some topics that will be covered in the Organizing Roundtable format include: rural organizing, people of faith organizing, speakers bureaus; equal marriage rights; anti-violence work, family issues; and workplace/employee organizing.

Back to this year's Creating Change by popular demand—skills-building intensives. These all-day instructional sessions will be offered on topics such as fundraising and campaign management.

The always provocative Hot Topic Series this year will include presentations on transgender/gender identification issues and the New York City sex club/safe sex debate.

Creating Change attendees will also be provoked and enlightened by a screening of Black Is... Black Ain't, Marlon Riggs final and award-winning film. The 82-minute film, made available by California Newsreel, prominently features the perspectives of those who have been silenced because their complexion, class, sexuality, gender or speech have rendered them "not black enough," or conversely, "too black." Riggs became an on-screen character in his own film after he was bedridden by AIDS. Many scenes are shot in his hospital room as he contemplates his own life and his own answers to the question: What has his "blackness" meant to African Americans?
