SO WHAT DO I KNOW ABOUT POETRY?

After typing Brian's letter of introduction for this month's poetry page, (see page 2) I felt compelled to offer my opinion. I have to admit there may be a grain of truth in what Daniel Siragusa says. Brian's poems sometimes focus on the darker emotions, on the pain of the child that lives within each of us. However, it is just this focus that I find so powerful in Brian's work. He dares to express the feelings, the fears, the terrors, the passions, and the resignation that we all encounter but so seldom express.

We certainly should work to present a positive message to people living with AIDS. And I firmly believe that HIV infection or AIDS should not put an end to living positively. However, in 20 years of practice as a medical social worker, I have found those who adjust best to a life threatening disease are those who acknowledge and verbalize their fears, despair, and anger. While locked up inside, negative feelings can sap one's energy, confuse one's mind, and even speed the progression of the disease. But once verbalized, fears and negative feelings are outside the psyche and can be examined and put in perspective.

To present only positive thoughts and positive messages is to discount very real feelings and, in fact, convey a message that says the person is wrong for feeling those feelings. Instead of encouraging someone, refusing to allow negative feelings to be expressed can actually drive that person away and cause them to feel devalued.

The serious message of Brian's poetry is accompanied each month by cheerful, irreverent introductory letters from the Guru. By looking at the whole page we see a broader spectrum of Brian's personality. We see both the inner child who cries out in pain and terror and that inner child who plays in the sunlight, running up to tickle the grown-ups and then dancing away, giggling with delight.

So, with all due respect, Mr. Siragusa, I invite you to allow your inner child to be a child, not a

pale reflection of some adult's pain.

"Brian, as a poetry editor of a gay massazine, Ithink you would have some compassion for your readers. People with AIDS will no doubt read these poems. The message they will hear is 'Woe is me. What effect do you think this will have on your audience' Inspiration? You're an accomplished poet, so write like one. And tell

your inner child to grow up."

Harsh words (especially from one sending another submission along with this missive.) Daniel, PWA's do read my poems. A PWA wrote these poems. My friends who are "in my beat" identify with some of the topics I approach, as I am sure anyone with a life-threatening illness would. In order to move on with life, we must have some sort of "section-alizing" of death - a way of acceptance if nothing else

I do not think this disease has touched anyone in Daniel's world. He is very lucky. I used to

have that luxury, too.

These two poems in discussion were written many weeks apart, as I try to create three to four new pieces a week, so I don't know how he could think they are one. I write about other topics subjects, too. One area I try to avoid is the "he broke up with me and I am still not over it" stuff that Daniel seems to enjoy. At least that is what I receive from him.

If I were to follow his theory, perhaps I should

not publish his work so it does not scare young gays into believing all gay lesbian relationships are doomed from the start. What do the rest of you think? Please write me and let me know.

Outside of that, I am featuring another piece from Fritz Bally and Jeanette Morse, along with a piece from Douglas Conrad, from Castro Street in San Francisco. Everyone enjoy, and mind your manners.

POLICY REJECTS HOMOSEXUALS AS FOSTER PARENTS

Mrs. Mary Dean Harvey, Director Nebraska State Department of Social Services

Dear Ms. Harvey

I am writing regarding the article that appeared in the Omahu World-Herald on January 25, 1995. The article described your recent directive to NDSS agency administrators, requiring them "not to place loster children" in the homes of persons who identify themselves as homosexual."

With this in mind, allow me to introduce myself. I am a former State Probation Officer with 7 years service to the State of Nebraska. Prior to that, I was a Crisis Intervention Specialist in a grant-funded program to identify at-risk youth in Council Bluffs. I served as the Aftercare Specialist for the F.I.T.S. (Family Intervention and Treatment Services) Program in Omaha, a program I'm certain you are familiar with. Fam now a United States Probation Officer with the U.S. District Court in the District of Nebraska. My reputation and credentials are impeccable. I am the father of a 12-year-oldson who, thankfully, receives superior grades and enjoys a caring, nuturing home life, and I am gay.

These accomplishments are not the experiences of a fragmented, demented, maladjusted social or sexual pervert. They are the culmination of years of self revelation and a pro-social lifestyle which includes an honest, forthright acceptance about who I am. who I really am—a gay male, age 37, who has overcome the elitist mindset of a homophobic society that refuses to understand and embrace the diversity of humankind.

Not everyone is so fortunate, for it is this same refusal to accept others which causes many teenage youth across the United States to take their own lives when they realize that, through no choice of their own, they're different from their peers. They're gay, lesbian or bisexual and, rather than receiving nurture and love, these youth are ostracized or verbally, physically, and emotionally attacked because of their sexual orientation. Not only are they attacked by their peers who can be excrucialingly cruel, but they're not able to be accepted at home by their parents who lack the capacity to love them as they are.

Would a parent refuse to love a blond son or daughter when all of their other children are brunette? Should society condemn everyone who has blue eyes because the majority are browneyed? Should we segregate anyone who, perhaps by some genetic orientation, is left-handed vight-handed? Have we learned nothing from history or the history of Nazi Germany? In that time, it was perfectly acceptable to consider Jews, Poles, Gypsies, homosexuals and others non-human? Have we not progressed since then?

If and it rome that society fails to come faceto-face with certain facts. For example, every gay, lesbian and bisexual is the result of a birth resulting from heterosexual relations. Gays are predominantly raised in heterosexual households by heterosexual parents, except in rare exceptions. We are socialized by heterosexual media ads and commercials. We are taught that boys and girls have specific and expected social roles Eventually, many homosexuals internalize society's homophobic image and, in an attempt to be pro-social, are driven further and further into the darkness of the closet and into despair, yet society insists homosexuality is a choice.

People often fear what we don't understand. We know this is the basis for many pagan religious. Those religious allow non-educated societies to "explain" the inexplicable. Heterosexuals do not understand homosexuality. Like many latent, Victorian mores, we're taught that intimacy with a member of the same sex is, quite simply, wrong.

This concept of "rightness" and "wrongness" is a manifestation of a polarized, moralized thinking pattern. This rigidity is not the result of enlightened, educated thought processes; rather, it is the symptom of a deeper problem. Fear, which results in hate, which results in prejudice, which results in decrimination.

Study after study have proven that gays lesbians and bisexuals are as well adjusted and "normal" as any other individual, provided they are able to overcome internalized homophobia taught during their childhood socialization process. Study after study proved that les-bigays serve their country with dignity and honor in the military, yet the United States Armed Forces routinely discharge military personnel due to sexual orientation, even when it has been shown that they are not a risk to themselves, their country, or to others. Study after study have proven that les bi-gays are able to parent children with the same success (or lack thereof) as any other segment of society, yet policies such as the one recently enacted by your department exist. Why? believe it is clearly the result of fear and prejudice

Why does society fear gays? Studies show over 95% of all child molesters are heterosexual males, yet the stereoty pe, based entirely on fiction, is that gay men molest boys. In the 1950's Alfred Kinsey proposed a continuum of sexuality, based upon his research at the time. He suggested that very few people are wholly homosexual or heterosexual. Instead, he reported most people fall somewhere on a continuum of sexuality. Perhaps less-bi-gays are ostracized so we won't remindsupposed believisexuals of their own sexual experiences, fantasies, or experiences of a spouse.

Society's fear of gays is preventing heterosexuals from enjoying benefits we offer. If swell documented that Michelangelo was gay. So was Liberace, Leonardo DiVinci, Plato, Socrates. the list goes on Imagine a world barred from enjoying the contributions of these greats!

Unfortunately, fear, hatred, prejudice and homophobia cannot be crased by one letter. I realize your position requires you to assure the safety and well-being of children placed into foster homes through your agency. To that end, I'm sure you are doing what you believe is the right thing. I simply implore you to keep in mind that many of the children you are placing are themselves gay, lesbian or bisexual. Perhaps placing them with an understanding, loving, nurturing les-bi-gay role model would be the greatest contribution your department could make to that child and to society.

I also realize you are an administrator surrounded by politics and media. During difficult times, it's easy to bend to the pressure of the politicians and the reporters... to give them what they want. I simply ask youto make the decisions society needs, not necessarily what society wants. It is your education, experience, wisdom and ability to understand discrimination which, I believe, society depends upon. I believe it is likely you were chosen for your position as a result of those very qualities.

Please don't abandon the children who need you and your department. Don't succumb to the pressures exerted by the ignorant. Consider following the wisdom of other states who, in a time when foster home placements are desperately needed, have realized that the focus should be on finding a well balanced, caring person with a clean home in which to place a child. Making decisions to include or exclude individuals based upon their status, be it minority, sexuality, color of hair, left-handedness, or socioeconomic status is easy, but it lacks vision. It lacks foresight. It

lacks courage. It lacks an educated, intelligent review of the facts. As a group, gays, lesbians and bisexuals are not dangerous to children. Prejudice, batred and discrimination are and, to coin a phrase. "Hate is Not a Family Value"

ONE HOMOPHOBIC WRECKING BALL

As gays and lesbians try to pick up the pieces from the latest affack, a bun on homosexual foster parents, only a few know the political forces that changed the foster care policy of Nebraska Social Services. James Affen Flanery, reporter for the Omaha World-Herald, cited Guyla Mills, policy director of the Nebraska Family Council based in Lincoln, as the person who contacted Nebraska Social Services to see what its policy was in regard to homosexuals and she was told homosexuals were not barred. She was cited as acting as an individual who urged others to contact social services to express their concerns. Why is Guyla Mills so concerned about homosexuals?

Guyla Mills is part of an organization called Grassroots for the Good Life and editor for a tabloid "Citizen Guide: Exposing the Homosexual Special Rights Agenda". The guide carried an ad for Rev. Lou Sheldon's visit to Nebraska in January 1994 and the founding of Nebraska chapter of the Traditional Values Coalition. The Traditional Values Coalition has fought against gay rights across the country and in California, Lyndon LaRouche inspired an initiative which would have quarantined people with AIDS. Guyla Mills' guide cites some interesting "facts" such as: less than 1% of the population is homosexual, and homosexuals want special rights. The tabloid says gays have never faced legal segregation, and never faced economic hardship as a result of discrimination. And always, homosexuals target children and try to recruit them and that the North American Man/Boy Love Association's motto is said to be "sex before eight or it is too late" All of these, claimed to be fact, are demonstrably false. Why are these "facts" cited? To defeat a legislative bill that would protect homosexuals from job discrimination.

James Allen Flanery cited the April issue of the Nebraska Leader, a publication of the Nebraska Leadership Conference whose editor is Ed Weaver. The publication ran a story with the headline "Nebraska Department of Social Services is Placing Children in the Foster Homes of Homosexual Couples" and urged readers to contact Carol Stitt, Chairman of Foster Care Review of Nebraska Social Services. This is the same publication which pushed John DeCamp's infamous "memo" and still sells his book. The Franklin Cover-Up. The publication also offers books on the topic of the "New World Order", the anti-Catholic book, Homeboy by Jimmy Cheshire, and the grandest of homophobes Paul Cameron and his book Exposing the AIDS Scandal. For those who do not remember, Paul Cameron is a psychologist who has been shunned from his own profession for misrepresentation and unethical use of scientific data. Cameron advocated that people with AIDS should be branded with facial tattoos Does Guyla Mills know of any events which would lead the public to believe homosexuals cannot be good foster parents? Has anything occurred to cause public concern about homosexual foster parents? There are no examples to cite. The only reason to ban homosexuals from being foster parents is purely a homophobic one.

A HOMILY FOR E.J.

By Sharon Van Butsel

E.J. Byington was a 17 year old, self-identified gay youth who requested that he be placed in a gay foster home. During the two months that he was with Gary George and Jim Cox, E.J. found love and acceptance. He started back to high school at Benson High. He described his new life in the words of this brief composition.

For English 1 by E.J. Byington January 19

My move from San Francisco to Omaha wasn't made under the best conditions. I wanted to come back but I wasn't sure how things were going to go.

A couple of weeks ago I decided that I wanted to go back to high school and now, here I am. I was afraid that I wouldn't make any friends and everyone would make I un of me, elementary school revisited.

I am living in a foster home currently and have two fathers. My new family is the one I have always wanted.

Things are going great so far. I am settled in from the move. I seem to fit right in at school. Making friends wasn't as hard as I thought. I have a fabulous family and things couldn't be better.

These were the words E.J. wrote, but things at school weren't really going as well as E.J. said. A fellow student from Benson High told me of how she had herself been harassed since she came out at school. She went on to tell of how she had seen E.J. harassed by fellow students, backed up against the wall by a bully who would forment him. And, just a few days later, E.J. took his own life.

During a recent interview, Jim Cox, one of E.J.'s foster parents shared his thoughts about E.J. and his experience as a foster parent.

Sharon: How did you and Gary become foster parents in the first place?

Jim Cox: On November 4 Gary received a call from a caseworker at the Nebraska Department of Social Services. She had gay, 16 year old, HIV+kid who had run away from several foster homes already. He had told her that he would not run away if they found him an accepting, preferably gay, foster home. Gary called and we talked. We met with the caseworker the next Wednesday and agreed to take him. We met him the next day and on Saturday, November 12, he moved in.

Sharon: How would you describe E.J?

Jim: He was a normal kid—a typical teenager—outgoing, friendly, inquisitive, creative, had a great sense of humor. He also had problems. He had difficult days, dark moments. At times he was very quiet. He was nervous in new situations until he got comfortable. All in all he was a kid with spirit but he also had a very deep soul. He had a sense of depth and empathy and understanding. He had a real sense of who he was and a real determination.

He wanted to be a kid again — a 16 or 17 year old kid — to regain that part of his life. Fin proud to say that he was able to do that. He was able to lave a messy room. He had a good time. He'd laugh. He'd joke. He'd play around. He wanted toys and we let him as much as we were able. But he was troubled and we allowed that, too.

Sharon: Would you do it again?

Jim: It's too soon to say. We need some healing time, but we have no regrets. Knowing what we know now — it we had known all that back in November we would have made the same decision. We wouldn't give up one minute of knowing E.J. Opening up our home to E.J. was one of the most powerful and profound things we have ever done. Gary and I have both said that this was an incredible experience. He was a wonderful kid.

Sharon: What about the ban on gay foster parents? Jim: You know, I'm a member of CFEP and I believe that we need to let people know what we think, but in my opinion the issue about foster care is not a gay right issue — no one has a "right" to be a foster parent – but it is an issue about what is best for the kids. Each case should be carefully evaluated based on the needs of that particular child. And the foster home should be one that can meet those needs, whether it's a home with two fathers or two mothers or a home with one mother and one father. The needs of the kids should come first. The moral of our story is that there are loving homes and E.J. got to experience one. And we did love him.

Homily Delivered at E.J. Byington's funeral on January 27, 1995. by Rev. Daphne Hamborg of Augustana Lutheran Church

I found it necessary to write not one but two sermons for E.J.'s funeral. Given the richness of his personality, his staggering range of life experience, and the brief 17 years of his life, I guess I shouldn't have been surprised. We are here this morning to honor the memory of an extraordinary young man — an extraordinary young man who, just a few days ago, committed suicide. How do we put all this together? Obviously, I haven't found the task an easy one. On the other hand, no one should.

I met E.J. last Sunday night, when he and his foster fathers helped move a few pieces of furniture I had sold to a friend. In reminiscing about E.J. this week, I realize I met the same young man the others had: friendly, outgoing, bright, creative particularly interested in crafts. While the others moved furniture, F.J. engaged me in a conversation about doilies. I never quite caught on that I was meeting a man whose life had been framed by pain. He had a vibrancy that defied easy categorization. And so after meeting him, the last thing I expected was that I would learn, a couple days later, that this intriguing person had killed himself. I had seen only a fresh start, filled with the gift of possibilities. Gary and Jim offered him a sanctuary - a place for rest and growth and love. A place of acceptance.

Two months, however, could not counteract a lifetime of abandonment, of rejection, of people who either misused his sexuality or refused to understand it. One person's reflection offered this: Ironically, in his new home, E.J. had finally found a harbor safe enough for suicide because this person suggested — given his history, E.J.

had been programmed for suicide all his life. It was simply impossible for E.J.'s potential to blossom, but he had found a home at last, a place where he could die, even by his own hand, and still be loved, still be attended to.

I think this analysis makes a great deal of sense — even though it does not offer any simple resolution. It reminds me of the sort of terminally ill patient who refuses to the until all the family has returned. As Jim said, "He burrowed himself into our home, and we were proud to have him here. He had spirit, soul; he also had had a hard time. He will be missed a lot."

The Scripture I read earlier (Luke 12: 22: 31, Philippians 4:8-13) were not exactly E.J.'s favorites; they were answers to questions he put to Gary and Jim as to which passages they found richest and most helpful. Both passages put the full range of life into perspective — and can remind us today, as we so deeply need to be reminded, that E.J.'s memory, his life, his death, are not things we need to sort through on our own.

There is, these Scriptures say, strength and perspective to be found in the spirit of Christ. There is also acceptance that even his church will often withhold, particularly (I'm ashamed to say) from gay men like E.J. There is also a richness of life that we only rarely bother tapping into. This strength, perspective, richness — and hope — are summed up in the verses I turn to most often, from Paul's letter to the Romans: "Nothing can separate us from the love of God. Nothing in how we live and nothing in how we die." There may be more important words for any who have felt alienated, abused, guilty, or mocked — but I'm not sure what those might be. I began my first sermon with a poem; I now want to end with it. It was written by a woman named Mary Oliver, and found in a book called Faith Prayers. It speaks to me of E.J. and I hope it speaks to you of yourselves.

You do not have to be good.

You do not have to walk on your knees for a hundred miles through the desert, repenting.

You have only to let the soft animal of your body love what it loves.

Tell me about despair, yours, and I will tell you mine.

Meanwhile the world goes on.

Meanwhile the sun and the clear pebbles of the rain are moving across the landscapes, over the prairies, and the deep trees, the mountains and the rivers.

Meanwhile the wild geese, high in the clean blue air, are heading home

Wheever youare, no matter how lonely, the world offers itself to your imagination, calls to you like the wild geese, harsh and exciting over and over announcing your place in the family of things.

I call this a poem. Perhaps it is a prayer perhaps it is the voice of God. Good-bye E.J. We know you're safe and loved.

Please write to Ms. Harvey, with a copy to Governor Nelson and the Nebraska Civil Liberties Union (NCLU) stressing that the new policy is not in the best interests of the children of Nebraska and that there is no evidence supporting the claim that gays and lesbians are poor foster parents.

HOMOPHILE STUDIES IN THEORY AND PRACTICE

Homophile Studies in Theory and Practice may be this year's best book and is certainly a fitting tribute to One Institute and to Dorr Legg who died in July of 1994. It reiterates his continuing insistence on the necessity of homophile studies which has blossomed from One Institutes to many of our finer institutions of higher education and is now traveling to the high school level.

A registered Republican, 90 years of age at his death, Dorr Legg, founder, director, and from 1981 to 1994, dean of One Institute, modestly excerpts from the papers delivered at its convening and articles published by One Magazine to produce not only a guide for gay and lesbian studies but a history of our oldest outgoing homophile institution. He has skillfully woven together documents from over 40 years and demonstrated in passing that scholars there and elsewhere gradually turned the tide in the disciplines theretofore dominated by homophobia Having edited the pioneer Homosexuals Today in 1956, he taught innovative courses at One, achieving the status of "dean of the homophiles"

Homophile Studies in Theory and Practice details the wonderful achievements of a group of unsung and very dedicated individuals and organizations. It is a wonderful and fascinating description of the homosexual movement before Stonewall that is unknown to most. It is a must read for those wishing to understand our movement and a fitting tribute to Dorr Legg who devoted so much of his life and energy to that movement. Homophile Studies in Theory and Practice is written and edited by W. Dorr Legg, One Institute Press, Los Angeles and GLB Publishers, San Francisco, 464 pp, 1994.

from different angles and it deserves further inspection.

My! My! What an interesting concept. Could it be there is no right or wrong? Only what is in reality?

PLEASE! I WANT TO DIE! "Would you please hold the pillow over my face so I can end all this pain?" He was absolutely serious, and his pain was evident in his beleaguered speech as he continued, "I tried to do it when you were at work, but the pillow fell off. I guess I passed out. Please?"

At this point in his battle with AIDS, my Patrick had chosen to spend his days and nights on our couch, rather than our bed, as it was more comfortable for him. I'd just come home from work and sat down beside his frail frame to pick him gendy up in my arms and love him, as was my daily ritual. When he said those words in my ear, my heart literally left like it was tearing itself out of my chest, and I gasped within as I lost my breath. "Oh, God, Patrick, Lean't do that." "They won't know you did it." "Oh, yes they will. I think your lips turn white or something like that and they'd know I did it. Do you really want me togo to jail?" "No. I'm just so tired of the pain, my love. I'm sorry I asked you to do it." Then I held his head on my neck as he fell into unconsciousness or deep sleep.

How I wanted at that moment to have helped him to achieve his plea! In reality, however, as I look back now 5 years later, he was ready, ready to die. I wasn't ready to to let him go yet. It was me who kept telling him to "hang on", and I did everything possible to make him have less pain. I did have legal authority, though, to do what he wanted, because we'd signed Power of Attorney papers early on in his illness. He didn't want to go to the hospital, so I cared for him at home, no matter how bad it got, this was his desire.

It wasn't easy over the months to not call 911 and have him brought to Emergency when the pains, fever, and passing out could have taken his live, but I obeyed his orders, even when it tore me apart. He told me not to worry when his pain became great, as he said he always passed out then, and, if he died then it was OK because "We both know I'm going to die, and I want to die at home."

I lived daily with his plea to help him die for the next three months. I still live with it, wondering why the powers-that-be won't listen to a plea like his; not only from AIDS patients, but others with painfully disabling terminal illnesses. Within three weeks after that plea, Pat became unable to speak vocally. We learned to communicate through hand squeezes, since he couldn't write. I slept by him on the old large couch until it became necessary to bring a Hospital bed home when he lost control of his bowels. Then it became a time of ugly had sores and the need for in-home nursing around the clock.

How do we do it? How do we cope? When our loved ones are dying!? How? I don't know for sure, we just do. Maybe it's because "Love suffereth long, is patient, kind, and understanding." Thank God for the love we

WHAT "BARNEY FAG" TEACHES US

Between intention and accident falls relation. On January 27, during an interview, Texas Congressman Dick Armey, referred to Representative Barney Frank as "Barney Fag." Though the F-word hurled at gay men packs the same wallop as the N-word hurled at blacks and the C-word at women, tapes of the interview confirm Armey's claim that use of the F-word was unintentional. He hadn't planned to use the term of Fag. It wasn't hurled. It slipped out.

Armey's further defense that the use was purely accidental, a "stumbled word", rings false. "frank" and "iag" are common one-syllable words and Frank's name is hardly a tongue-twister. As a fall-back, Armey claims that alliteration made him do it. The slur was neither an intentional action nor an accidental event. It lies between the two, but well within a zone of personal responsibility. Armey is blameworthy—in a way that is revelatory for understanding how discrimination frequently works. The relevant moral analogy here is involuntary manslaughter: because you fail to have your brakes checked, you run over a child; even though you didn't intend to run over the child, the death is not a blameless accident; you are responsible.

By abiding certain moral attitudes, Armey was primed and so responsible for the distinctive moral form his slip took. By substituting "fag" for Frank's name, Armey's slurrobilierates Frank's uniqueness and individuality and reduces him to a type, kind, or status, one which the slur presumes is degenerate and loathsome. To be treated in this

way, as less than fully human, is the heart of what we mean by inequality in America.

So Armey's name-slaughter reveals an important moral truth: inequitable treatments can be unintentional. Ill-will and hatred are not the linchpins of discrimination. Discrimination can be more subtle than that. A number of chilling empirical studies show that discrimination against gays frequently occurs independently of ill-will. One study found that heterosexuals unwittingly but literally distance themselves from gays. Without realizing it, heterosexuals in casual interactions stand on average three times farther from a gay person than from each other.


Quite apart from any history of intentional discrimination against gays, the existence of antigay stereotypes and biases operating as unacknowledged lenses and inclinations in people's moral constitutions makes it hopelessly unlikely that gavs are now treated fairly and whether by bosses or legislators. impartially -Remedies are needed. The presence of unintended prejudice in policy-making means the Supreme Court should be leery of believing that laws which draw distinctions with regard to homosexuality are impartial. As with laws that disfavor blacks, women, and religious groups, laws that burden gays should be viewed by judges as presumptively invalid. Further, people working for gay civil rights legislation need to acknowledge the subtlety of discrimination. In drafting legislation, they should not limit what is to count as discrimination to "smoking gun" cases, cases

that is, where there is a documented record of intentional discrimination. If such legislation is to redress most discrimination, then statistical arguments must be permitted in order to indicate the presence of effective, if unintended, prejudice.

More generally, the Armey-Frank affair should teach us that the most important gay issues are those of dignity and individual worth rather than of liberty and opportunity. Note that Armey's statement, though an inequitable treatment of Frank, does not prevent Frank from performing any action nor does it deny him access to any opportunity. Rather it views Frank as scum. When gays are deprived of lie and liberty, as in queerbashing and employment discrimination, the deprivations in the main are vehicles for the denial, by proxy, of every gay person's dignity and personhood — a moral standing which can never legitimately be compromised.

This lesson about gay dignity is one that Frank himself might learn from his experience with Armey. During the national battle over gays in the military, Frank, in a desperate but failed attempt to increase gays' liberty a bit, accepted a political "compromise" in which the only thing that was compromised was gays' dignity—a compromise that treats gays as seum. At the time, Frank dismissed concerns over dignity as mere worries about "symbolism". Perhaps now he has experienced worse and learned better.

SWEET PRINCE OF ORANGE OR LAVENDER?

by William A. Percy

The outing that has provoked the most acrimony since our book, Outing: Shattering the Conspiracy of Silence (by William A. Percy and Warren Johansson - Haworth, 1994), went to press is that a king dead for almost three hundred years The Dutch Prince William of Orange (1650-1702) became William III of England after the Glorious Revolution of 1688. Although King Billie's sexuality has been extensively discussed in print, Protestant Ulster MP Ian Paisley, a leading Orangeman but hardly a reputable historian, has dismissed our allegations about the Prince as "nonsense." Incredulity about the Prince's homosexuality extends to the average graduate of two of America's oldest universities, Princeton and William and Mary, both named for the great Protestant hero.


In 1867, Wilhelm Ludwig Holland published some primary source docoments as Briefe der Herzogin Elisabeth Charlotte von Orleans aus den Jahren 1676 bis 1706 as volume 88 of the Bibliothek des ILitterarischen Vereins in Stuttgart. In this correspondence the German wife of Monsieur, the homosexual brother of Louis XIV of France, discussed William of Orange's homosexuality (The letters of October 12, November 4, and December 13, 1701). As early as 1870 Karl Heinrich Ulrichs, the founder of the homosexual emancipation movement in Germany, in one of his brochures announced his plan to treat the subject in a journal which he intended to publish under the title Uranus, but the periodical - for unknown reasons - never saw the light of day (Note from Warren Johansson). Hermann Michaelis, "Aus den Briefen der Herzogin Elisabeth Charlotte von Orleans (1652-1722). Ein Beitrag zur Bisexualtitat im 17, und 18. Vierteljahrsberichte des Wissnschaftlich-humanitaren Komitees 4 [=Jahrbuch fur sexuelle Zwischenstufen 13]: 62+(1912), a journal published by Magnus Hirschfeld who succeeded Ulrich as head of the homosexual emancipation movement, confirmed the Prince's unnatural instincts. The English pioneer for homosexual rights, Edward Carpenter, discussed William's homosexuality in The Intermediate Sex: A Study of Some Transitional Types of Men and Women (London: Sonnenschein, 1908). An erudite Frenchman Augustin Cabanes, chronicler of medical and erotica curiosa, devoted a section of his La Belle-Soeur du Grand Roi (Une Allemande a la Cour de France) (Paris. Ablin Michel, [1916] to allusions to Madame's homosexual contemporaries (pp. 65-76), among them William of Orange. Henriette Elisabeth Heimans dealt at length with the William's personality in Het Karakter van Willem III Koning-Stadhouder: Proeve eener Psychographie (Amsterdam: H. J. Paris, 1925), pp. 21-25, 83. She referenced frequently from contemporary sources about Williams' homosexuality, even from Voltaire: "II n' aimait pas les femmes" and even the Whig historian and politician Lord Macaulay, who idealized the Prince, equivocated. "We can hardly suppose that he was much in the habit of reading Jacobite pamphlets; and, if he did read the, he would have seen that the unalterable affection which he felt for his boyhood to his death of three or four of the bravest and most trusty friends that even a prince had the happiness to possess, was made a ground for imputing to him abominations as foul as those which are buried under the waters of the Dead Sea.

Henry and Barbara van der Zee, William and Mary (New York: Alfred A. Knopf, 1973) discussed the king's sexual as well as political liaisons with his favorites. Terrence Sidney Johnson's Representation of Male Homosexuality on the English Restoration Stage (Ph.D. dissertation, UCLA, 1992) argued that owing in part of William III's reputation, the plays on the London stage of the 1690's evince an upsurge of interest in sodomy. Independently scurrilous satires aimed against the king by his Jacobite opponents were reprinted in its Yale Series of Documents Illustrating English History since 1688, V These texts can no longer be dismissed by historians of British politics as merely prejudiced diatribes. (Warren Johansson, "William III," *Encyclopedia of Homosexuality*, vol. 2, pp. 1391-1392 and Dennis Rubini, "Sexuality and Augustan England: Sodomy, Politics, Elite Circles and Society", Journal of Homosexuality XVI, 1 and 2 (1988), pp. 349-381, reprinted as The Pursuit of Sodomy). Lawrance Stone, trained at Oxford and recently emeritus from Princeton, perhaps the world's leading expert on sex in early modern England, told me, "Everybody knows that" about William's homosexuality

It is possible that William of Orange's sexual orientation has become such a bone of contention in part because the British exposed the homosexuality of the Catholic humanitarian Sir Roger Casement, who supported the Easter Rebellion of 1916 to justify their execution of him. Whatever explains such a hostile reaction in the British Isles, especially those in the Orange Lounge such as Paisley, to the truth about William of Orange, it is perhaps less difficult to grasp why at William and Mary or Princeton University it is not common knowledge that those two institutions

REV. MEL WHITE ARRESTED AT CBN

Rev. Mel White, a former ghost writer for the Rev. Pat Robertson was arrested on February 14 while trying to meet with Robertson outside his Christian Broadcasting Network in Virginia

Beach, Virginia.

White wanted to meet with Robertson to talk about the plight of homosexuals in the United States. In addition, he wanted to demonstrate how CBN's false charges contribute to anti-gay violence. He had no intention of changing Robertson's mind about the nature or theology of homosexuality.

During the confrontation outside CBN, White said CBN Chaplain Mark Johnson told him, "Homosexuals represent the cult of death because you don't procreate. If Pat meets with you, he would give your movement credibility.

The following is an open letter from White to

Robertson following his arrest:

Today, once again, when I returned to CBN with our delegation of Christian leaders (as Jesus commanded us in Matthew 18: 15-16), your security force met us at the gate. After warning us that we were not welcome, your spokesman, Gene Kapp, ordered the Virginia Beach Police to arrest us.

At that time, I spoke with my delegation and told them to go ahead and leave the property, respecting your wishes and said to Mr. Kapp, "As an act of civil disobedience in the name of Christ Leboose to stay". I was then handcuffed and led off the CBN property, while the delegation softly sang a hymn.

It is growing more apparent, even to the eternally optimistic, that for some reason you have decided never to meet with our small delegation of religious leaders who come to you health for Cost a way and leaking children.

on behalf of God's gay and lesbian children. For 20 months, I have asked for such a meeting, first in a private, off the record discussion, then in a more public forum. When you refused to meet us on Tuesday, February 14, I began a fast for understanding, hoping that this small sacrifice would convince you of my sincerity. And though I will continue to hope and pray that you will meet with us to review the hate crime data, let me summarize our simple request.

First, acknowledge the growing number of hate crimes against gay and lesbian Americans.

Second, condemn those hate crimes and the people who incite or commit them.

That's what we came to ask. Will you use your powerful voice to take a stand against the suffering of innocent Americans? When I hear that you have taken this simple stand, I will end my fast. Is it too much to ask you to report the hate crimes and to do your best to end them? In the name of God, please, Pat, help us end the suffering. Sincerely, Rev. Mel White

White triges members of the homosexual community across the nation to contact local religious leaders, asking them to issue a statement of support for his actions. He also urges everyone to contact the news media, both local and national, letting them know you want to be kept informed about this important event.

MISSISSIPPI TEEN CONVICTED OF KILLING TWO GAY MEN

A Laurel, Mississippi teenager was convicted February 9 of murdering two gay men. The bodies of Robert Walters, 34, and Joseph Shoemake, 24, were found near an abandoned railroad track in October of 1994. It was a case that sent shockwaves through the conservative comminity.

Many gay rights activists believed a conviction would be unlikely in the city which sits in the Bible belt. They also feared the case was tarnished because Marvin McClendon, the 17 year old killer, was allowed to claim self defense. He said he was trying to avoid being raped and infected with the AIDS virus.

Defense attorneys claimed the victims were "trolling for sex" when they ran into McClendon. He never mentioned AIDS as police questioned him after the killings. Prosecutors argued that robbery was the real motive because the youth stole \$100 from the men before killing them.

After muchthought, the judge allowed defense attorneys to reveal that one of the victims was HIV positive. The Mississippi Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union said the judge's ruling to allow that HIV evidence sent the wrong message. That it's okay to kill gay men who approach you because you might be scared. They also feared that it could have nationwide implications. Following his conviction, McClendon was sentenced to two consecutive life prison terms. The father of one of the victims announced, "Justice was served."

SECOND GENERATION GAYS AND LESBIANS?

Second Generation, a new newsletter by and for lesbian, gay and bisexual daughters and sons of lesbians, gay and bisexual parents, is now available from COLLAGE. This forum for the second generation of lesbians, gay men and bisexuals takes a tough look at negative reactions that gay kids of gay parents face in the lesbian and gay community. After a mixed response from the crowd to the Second Generation contingent in the Stonewall 25 parade, founder Dan Cherubin comments, "I can understand the (lesbian and gay parent) party line of 'I can raise normal kids too' to appease any over-eager social workers and evil judges. But we Second Generation people are theirs too." Second Generation member Hope Berry, lesbian daughter of a gay dad and lesbian mom, sees little acknowledgement of gay people with gay parents. "Notice the absence of a term such as second generation of gay men. Our community has work to do on it's own internalized homophobia." The dilemma of coming out to straight parents and friends is presented as a universal experience for lesbians and gay men.

Stefan Lynch, the director of Children of Lesbians and Gays Everywhere says, "I always told people that one benefit of having lesbian and gay parents is that if the child is gay, he or she would have a much easier time coming out. However, I learned that many lesbians and gay men with lesbian and gay parents had just as difficult time coming out. And there is the added burden of feeling you are feeding into the myth that gay parents somehow make gay kids."

GAY COMEDY IN OMAHA

Interviews with Nancy Norton & Kevin Snow By Sharon Van Butsel

February 8-12, the Funnybone Comedy Club "came out" with Snights of all Gay Comedy. The evening featured emcee and opening act, Kevin Snow of Overland Park, Konsas: featured performer, Naurey Norton of Boulder, Colorado; mai headliner, Jason Stuart. Our interview with Jason Stuart was featured in the February issue of The New Voice. This month we are featuring interviews with both of the supporting acts.

Sharon Van Butsel: Nancy, how would you characterize your particular brand of comedy? Nancy Norton: You mean, "What's the bumper sticker of your act?" I guess it's to love everybody—ooohh, I can hear the readers saying "That's risky. She's adventurous, on the edge. She's so daring." And actually that's not that far from who I am. I believe you should love everybody and have fun doing it.

Sharon: How long have been doing comedy? Nancy: I first did comedy professionally in 1988 in Honolulu. I began touring in 1990, so about 4-6 years.

Sharon: How would you describe your typical audience?

Nancy: My typical andience is mainstream clubs. I've only done 3-4 gay shows including this one. Sharon: Do you do many women's lestivals? Nancy: I've just started tapping the women's festivals. I auditioned to do Michigan and didn't get it. It's their 20th anniversary and they're bringing a lot of people back, so I'll have to wait until next year.

Sharon: Is your material always as out as it was in this show?

Nancy: Yes, and it always has been. It's funny, I only came out to myself 3 years ago so I started comedy before I even understood my own lesbianism and I'm still learning what it's all about

It's been a process that paralleled my therapy. Way before I came out to myself I did lesbian material. As a matter of fact, I kept telling my therapist "I said lesbian on stage. What do you

say that's about?

The material I do now is the same as it was before leame out, but the reaction is different. In places like the Holiday Inn in Butte, Montana, there's a kind of a hush that comes over the audience. I'm pretty pleased about that—coming out in Butte, Montana. Overall, reactions generally have been good and I feel good about that. You can feel free to edit that response. I leave

You can feel free to edit that response. I leave long messages on answering machines, too. You asked me if my material was always as out as it was in this show. Now, I could have just said yes. Sharon: You wouldn't be on stage if you just

said yes to questions.

Nancy: You're right. Thanks for understanding. Sharon: So, where do you go from here?

Nancy: Next week I'm at Stanford's in Overland Park, Kansas, where Kevin's from. Yeah, I'm going to Kevin's home town so we're going to hang out next week.

Sharon: That sounds like fun. I'm have a little trouble keeping up with all the conversation, but lusually can do a pretty good job of reconstructing and interview.

Naney: I know Jason really liked his interview. If something's in the article that's not in my vocabulary, I'll just go "How did I get so smart. I didn't even know I knew that word."

Sharon: How has the audience been in Omaha? Nancy: Really warm and receptive. I only had one show when it felt a little judgmental and I felt a little stiff. I've never done a show like this where it's all week all gay, with every customer coming in and knowing what it's all about.

Sharon: I think it's wonderful that the Funnybone is doing this.

Nancy: Me too.

Sharon: Any last comments for our audience? Nancy: There is one thing I would like to ask people to do. It's a risk for the Funny bone to do something like this. I'd like to come back to perform in Omaha again, so I'd appreciate it if people could call the Funny bone and let them know. If enough of you call, you could get me back! Or if any other club or group would like to bring me in I'd like to do an evening of music and comedy, sharing the bill with a local lesbian folk singer.

Sharon: Now that sounds great! We'll see if we can generate some interest. When can we see you

again

Nancy: I'll be touring in the Northwest for a while but I'll be back this way in June. June 2 and 3 I'm performing at the comedy club in Cedar Rapids and then from June 6 to 11, I'll be at the Funnybone in Des Moines.

Sharon: We'll plan to catch your act in Des

Moines. Now, is Kevin available?

Kevin Snow

Sharon: Tell me about Kevin. How long have

you been doing comedy?

Kevin: Professionally, a couple years. As an amateur, all my life. I wasn't the class clown — I wrote for the class clown. I'd write notes and he'd get in trouble. I was a sort of a twisted Eddie Hascall.

Sharon: How would you characterize your comedy?

Kevin: I'm a friendly gay comic. I guess you could say I'm user friendly, and I'm a real honest comedian. I really believe that the truth is what's funny and that's what I try to write about, at least the truth as I see it.

Sharon: What sort of reception have you received as a gay comic.

Kevin: People have been very receptive. I came out on stage the very first time I hit the stage, in July of 93. It was a very interesting feeling. This hush came over the room and I adored it. Before the show, I thought I would be sick. Then I got on stage and said, "I'm Kevin Snow, and I'm a queer comic." Then there was a hush. I didn't think that would be the reaction and I didn't think that I would be it.

I only did one club where I didn't come out. It was an emcee spot and the club management was all over me not to do it. I felt raped and I never did it again. Lesson learned — once you come out of the closet, you just can't be comfortable going back in. I play extensively in the Midwest and South and I have been surprised at the reaction I receive.

There's one audience I never have trouble with. I love rednecks. They're no trouble. They love new comedy. The group I do have trouble with are the neo-Republican, Yuppie, suburban types. But that doesn't surprise me. They just wouldn't ever be open to new ideas.

One event really surprised me. I won the Comic Relief 6 Comedy Competition on HBO. I was going up against 8 comics, all seasoned. I walked into the club and into a sea of cowboy hats. I hadn't realized it was being held in a country western club. Hooked at all those cowboy hats

and I was just sick. But I went on and did my bit. I walked onto the stage and said, "I'm gay and from Alabama." I was honest and up front and they loved me. I won the contest. It was a tremendous experience. It just goes to show that we can't characterize people. We think we have problems with rednecks. They're the least of our worries. They just want to chaw and spit.

Sharon: So when will we get to see you again? Kevin: I'll be back in Omaha at Noodles Comedy Club on April 14 and 15 as the feature act 1 did about 15 minutes tonight. Then I will do about 45 minutes. I'll do some characters, and expand my ideas. And I will be appearing at Noodles Comedy Club in Des Moines on March 3 and 4. I hope your readers are able to catch my act when I'm back in town. I really depend on the gay people in the audience. Their presence is very affirming. Sharon: Thanks so much, Kevin. We'll plan to see you at Noodles in April.

FROM THE OUTREACH CENTER

The Nebraska AIDS Project and the Douglas County Health Department have provided testing, prevention and outreach education from the Outreach Center. Statistics, gathered from 1992 through 1994 indicate more than a 16% positive rate at the Outreach Center but a positive rate of 2% in other Douglas County Test Sites. In 1985, when Counseling and Testing Sites were set up, it was in the hope that people who received test results would adapt their behavior to protect themselves and partners from exposure or re-exposure to HIV. Overall findings indicate that testing and counseling does not result in change in high risk for HIV infection. Changing sexual and needle-sharing behavior is a way to control infection, since there is no cure. Recent studies suggest a trend toward safer sexual patterns and a decrease in the number of partners, but widespread condom usage, monogamy/celibacy and restraining from anal intercourse are not consistently practiced. We know contact with contaminated blood, semen and vaginal fluids, that unprotected anal, oral or vaginal sex, and sharing needles are behaviors that cause infection. We hope testing and education from the Outreach Center will remind us to change our habits and reduce the number of cases of HIV





Yes, the meetings were long and boring. But did anyone come forward with a solution? I heard a lot of griping, but did anyone come forward with a solution?
