Rainbow Crosswalks In Toronto For World Pride Are Here To Stay

In advance of World Pride, taking place June 20 to 29 in Toronto, two rainbow-coloured crosswalks have been installed in the LGBTTIQQ2SA* village near Church and Wellesley Streets — and they're there to stay.

Located at the intersections of Church and Alexander, and Church and Isabella, these crosswalks will be "permanent additions to the neighbourhood," announced a press release today. The crosswalks were agreed upon in a 40-2 vote by Toronto city council in February, with Mayor Rob Ford and his brother, Doug Ford, the only two opposing.



The rainbow has long been considered the symbol of gay pride, ever since it was first created in flag form by artist Gilbert Baker in 1978, reports Time magazine.

Residents of the neighbourhood were more than welcoming of the colourful additions, which match many street signs in the area, as well as local art and the 250 banners celebrating World Pride for the duration of the celebrations.

Other cities that have installed rainbow crosswalks previously include San Francisco and Vancouver.

With North Dakota lawsuit, All State Gay Marriage Bans Challenged

Every same-sex marriage ban in the nation is now facing a legal challenge following the filing of a federal lawsuit Friday in North Dakota.

Seven same-sex couples filed the legal challenge to North Dakota's same-sex marriage ban in U.S. District Court, arguing that a state constitutional amendment approved by North Dakota voters in 2004 defining marriage as between a man and a woman violates the U.S. Constitution.



"Without any legitimate governmental interest, North Dakota has targeted a minority of individuals for discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation," the lawsuit states. "By this Complaint, Plaintiffs seek to end that tyranny of the majority."

The plaintiffs are represented by Minneapolis attorney Josh Neville, who filed a similar lawsuit on behalf of six same-sex

couples in South Dakota challenging that state's marriage ban. With today's filing, which comes just weeks before the one year anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court's sweeping decision in the Windsor case, all existing 31 state same-sex marriage bans now face litigation.

"With today's addition of North Dakota, courts in every state are considering a freedom to marry case — 70-plus cases in total," said Evan Wolfson, president and founder of Freedom to Marry, in a statement.

Since the Supreme Court's decision last year striking down Section 3 of the federal Defense of Marriage Act, not a single state or federal court has ruled against marriage equality. Nineteen states, plus D.C., currently permit same-sex marriage.

According to a Washington Post/ABC News poll released Friday, 56 percent of Americans support allowing gays and lesbians to marry, with 38 percent opposed. Moreover, echoing many of the court rulings that have been handed down in the past year, 50 percent of Americans believe that the Equal Protection clause of the U.S. Constitution guarantees same-sex couples the right to marry.

"With 50% of Americans believing the freedom to marry is a constitutional right, and a strong majority supporting marriage for gay couples, it's time the Supreme Court bring resolution nationwide," Wolfson added. "The time is now to get on the right side of history."

Oregon's Siletz Native American Tribe Considering Legalizing Same-Sex Marriage

The governing council of Oregon's Siletz Native American tribe passed a motion in favor of allowing same-sex couples to legally marry on its reservation on Friday but will consult with members of the tribe before putting the measure into effect. The vote by the Siletz tribal council came just days before a federal court struck down Oregon's ban on same-sex couples marrying in the state yesterday.




Federally recognized Native American tribes have the same power to pass laws covering their traditional lands as US states so it is up to the Siletz whether same-sex couples may marry on their lands or not. According to reports the vote by the tribal council was almost unanimous, with only one council member voting against the proposal.

Under the proposal at least one member of a couple must be a member of the tribe in order to qualify to be married.

D.C. High School Defends Out Principal Against Westboro Picket

Roughly 1,000 people rallied outside Washington, D.C.'s Woodrow Wilson High School Monday when the antigay Westboro Baptist Church showed up to picket the school's principal, Pete Cahall (in picture), who came out for the first time to the student body at last week's Pride Day.



According to The Washington Post, hundreds of students, teachers, alumni, and neighborhood residents turned out to share a message of love and acceptance for all members of the Woodrow Wilson community, in stark contrast to the message of the dozen members of the Topeka, Kan.-based church who were on site to claim that homosexuality invokes God's wrath. A Westboro member told the Post the contingent was specifically protesting Cahill's coming-out, which the member called "shameful."

For his part, the newly out principal told the Post that "students should be proud of themselves" for the impressive turnout at the nonviolent demonstration Monday.

The church, which has been certified as an antigay hate group by the Southern Poverty Law Center, has gained international infamy from its frequent pickets of the funerals AIDS sufferers and of fallen soldiers (where its members carried placards proclaiming "Thank God for IEDs") and its 1998 protest the funeral of slain gay college student Matthew Shepard. Known for its "God Hates Fags" message, the church is made up mostly of immediate family members — by blood or marriage — of its late founder, the Rev. Fred Phelps.

Members of the church had several pickets planned in the greater D.C. area Monday, though it's unclear if the church made any of its additional scheduled stops after being drowned out by the pro-equality counter protest at Woodrow Wilson High.

Hagel 'Open' to Reviewing Military's Ban on Transgender People

WASHINGTON — Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel said in an interview that the military should "continually" review its prohibition on transgender people in the armed forces, calling into question whether the Pentagon's ban may eventually be lifted, as was the ban on gay men and lesbians in the military.



While any such a reversal appears to be far in the future — the Pentagon's stock talking points on the issue have been that it is under continuous review — Mr. Hagel, on ABC's "This Week," pronounced himself "open" to a review of the policy and added, "Every qualified American who wants to serve our country should have an opportunity if they fit the qualifications and can do it."

But he allowed that the transgender issue was "a bit more complicated because it has a medical component to it."

In the American military, transgender service members can be summarily dismissed, as Defense Department guidelines describe transgender people as sexual deviants and their condition as "paraphilia," with its connotations of the atypical and extreme.

A panel affiliated with San Francisco State University estimated in March that more than 15,000 transgender individuals were serving in the military and the National Guard and the Reserve. Officials who worked on that study say transgender people are overrepresented in the military, compared with the rest of America, because many male-to-female transgender individuals enlist to try to submerge their feminine sides, while many female-to-male transgender people enlist because they want to be in a hypermasculine environment.

Last month, a soldier who was convicted as Pfc. Bradley Manning for leaking classified documents to WikiLeaks won an initial victory toward living as a woman when a Kansas judge granted a petition for her to change her name to Chelsea Elizabeth Manning. The decision cleared the way for changes to Private Manning's military records, but did not compel the military to treat her as a woman, including not moving her to a prison with a women's unit or allowing her the desired counseling and hormone treatment.

It remains unclear whether the military will seriously review its ban on transgender people, and President Obama has not addressed the issue specifically. In 2011, speaking to a gay rights group, Mr. Obama said that "every single American — gay, straight, lesbian, bisexual, transgender — every single American deserves to be treated equally in the eyes of the law."

Anti-gay US National Organization for Marriage Breached Campaign Finance Laws

An investigation by the US state of Maine's Commission on Governmental Ethics and Election Practices has suggested that the anti-gay National Organization for Marriage (NOM) has not just breached that state's political campaign finance laws but potentially two other states' laws as well.

A report by the commission found NOM had violated state laws during its campaigns against same-sex marriage in Maine, Iowa and New Hampshire and recommended that civil penalties of up to \$50,000 be laid against the group and also that its donors be publicly named.

NOM had solicited donations from donors telling them they would remain anonymous. An as yet unnamed donor was approached by NOM and asked to provide \$800,000 to influence a Maine referendum on same-sex marriage and electoral races in Iowa and New Hampshire during 2009. That donor then provided donations totaling \$2.25 million to the group.

Two months earlier the Iowa Ethics and Campaign Disclosure Board had sent an email to NOM president Brian Brown instructing him, 'If people are going to donate to your organization for express advocacy activities in Iowa and those donations exceed \$750 in aggregate in a calendar year, your organization will be required to form a PAC and disclose those contributors.' 'The independent expenditure process in Iowa is not a vehicle to shield political contributors.'

NOM's attorney responded to the Iowa Ethics and Campaign Disclosure Board that it had not solicited any specific donations for campaigns in Iowa but the Maine investigation contradicts that claim.

'NOM's independent expenditures are being paid for by funds from its general treasury,' the group claimed in 2009. 'No funds have been solicited by NOM for Iowa independent expenditures, and no designated contributions have been received for Iowa independent expenditures.'

'LGBTI rights group the Human Rights Campaign (HRC) said the revelations seemed to suggest a pattern of dishonesty by the group.'

'NOM's web of deceit seems to grow by the day,' HRC's Vice President of Communications Fred Sainz said. 'Not only did NOM clearly violate Maine law but there are now legitimate questions whether they also broke Iowa law in 2009 and, to top it off, made false statements to a government agency. 'As we've seen time and time again, NOM is willing to play fast and loose with the truth about marriage equality and LGBT Americans while concurrently engaging in a nationwide effort to cover up their activities and then lie to the public and government investigators.'

Many of the youth I interviewed were at Pride Prom for the first time, and were beaming as they talked about how friends who had gone to Pride Prom had gushed about it, and that is why they came. Others had been to prom for many years in a row. They came from many school districts, including Omaha Public Schools, Millard, Ralston, Bellevue, Council Bluffs, and some even came from local colleges and universities. They all talked about how comforting it was to be open about who they are. Rhiannon said, "It's really open. I am able to talk to people and not have to worry about people asking what I am. I can wear a tux if I want!" Kindra said, "It's really unique. Everybody is so nice, not like at high school prom. It's actually fun and everyone is having a great time, including the people running it!" Krystal was appreciative of the fact that she could keep coming until she is 23 because it gives her a feeling of belonging. Maddy liked that people at Pride Prom "don't judge or hide their sexuality."

Christian loved the fact that prom was down to earth. London just moved here from Kentucky and was amazed how accept-

ing everyone is, and that people can dance with whomever they want. Mason said, "It's fun! Be who you are without people seeing anything in a negative light, hang out with friends, and the food is a plus!" Tessa noted that she loves Pride Prom more than high school prom because the music is better, supervision is better, there is free food, and most importantly, "we don't have to go broke to come. It's cheap to get in, we don't have to wear expensive clothes because people aren't judgmental about what you wear, and you don't have to be formal. Lots of kids can't afford real prom."

None of this would have happened without the leadership and guidance of Tom and Barb Johnson, who ran the committee, and as always, gave hours and hours of their own time to making sure everything ran smoothly, and everyone had a great time.

Questions to Ask Before Marriage

This has been one of the most interesting columns I've ever written: I got to ask lots of happily- and formerly-married couples what questions they wish they had asked their future husband/wife before they got married. Boy, I got some really interesting answers!

I also did some research to see what the so-called experts advise couples to talk about once the marriage proposal is accepted and the wedding day approaches.

Not surprisingly, these experts advise asking some pretty unromantic questions and most newly engaged couples don't seem too psyched to talk about stuff that feels more like a business negotiation than a commitment of love.

However, let's be real folks. Frank discussions at the beginning can help you avoid many painful misunderstandings later on.

While it's good to ask these questions, it's better not to assume that you can count on them. A sign of a good, strong marriage is that the couple can talk about almost anything and not yell at each other or run out of the room. This is hard to do. Most of us have subjects that make us extremely uncomfortable, and we would do a lot to avoid feeling that anxiety.

And yet, in a marriage, everything will (eventually) hit the fan. There are very few secrets in long-term marriages. All your ugliness, fears and dark sides will be seen by your mate. So,

why not ask some of these questions before you tie the knot and learn a little more about your fiancé?

For many couples, sex is a predictable stumbling block in a long-term relationship. You could ask each other questions like: "What would we do if we find ourselves sexually unfulfilled in our marriage? Or if one of us finds that we're strongly attracted to someone else?"

This is hard stuff.

I was surprised to find, in my research, that some experts advise engaged couples to share their credit reports. People have been burned by not knowing their spouse's financial situation. But how can you talk about this without feeling like Donald Trump?

I suggest that you skip the credit report request. Instead, you can ask your honey about his/her financial picture and tell them about yours. Be honest. It's good to work this stuff out now before your financial futures are inextricably intertwined.

It's also helpful to find out about your fiancé's previous relationships. Usually, by the time you're engaged, you both know all about the exes. But, if not, try asking in a neutral, open-ended way: "I know you were with Jamie for 3 years, what happened?"

Open-ended questions will give you the most information and are usually the least threatening. The purpose of these questions is to make your relationship BETTER: stay focused on that. Remember: you're not auditioning for CSI: San Diego. For example, a question like: "Name two couples that you admire and tell me what you like about them." will tell you a lot about your future spouse in a positive way.

Another great question I found in my research: "Who should I have on speed dial for the days when I just can't figure you out?" After all, what could be more important than having someone who can give you insight into your partner when you're at a loss what to do?

How will you and your honey handle potential conflicts? If you're an avoider and your fiancé is confrontational, you want to know this. So why not ask your fiancé: "How can we handle conflicts that will come up?" Keep it open-ended, not accusatory.

From my experience, every couple has 2 or 3 challenges that never completely go away. It's helpful to talk about how you will work with them. Conflicts are an inevitable part of marriage: how can the two of you work through your stuff and still maintain a sense of teamwork and respect for each other?

Are you and your fiancé ready now to talk about this stuff? A suggestion: Do not ask all your questions at once. A lot of these subjects are very unromantic. Remember: you are trying to understand your partner better, not interrogate them.

Enjoy your questions. Enjoy learning more about this wonderful person you're going to be marrying.

May your marriage be a great adventure and your relationship be a great teacher to you both.

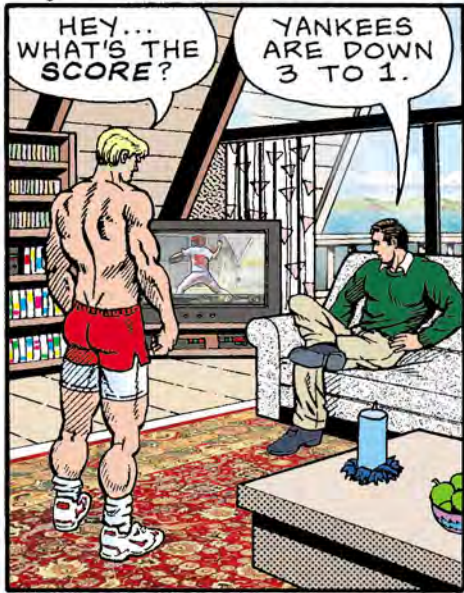
2. Turn dough over directly onto grill rack; peel off foil, return to baking sheet. Cook the dough uncovered over medium-low heat about 4 mins or until bottom is golden brown. With a wide spatula or tongs, turn crust over. Cook 1-2 mins longer or until bottom is set, but not brown. Remove from grill to foil, browned side up.
3. Top crust with shredded Provolone cheese, tomatoes, sausage, bell pepper, sliced Mozzarella, Asiago & Parmesan cheese, and hot pepper flakes or herbs.
4. Return pizza to grill, sliding off foil. Cover grill; cook 3 -5 mins or until crust is golden brown and cheese is melted.

Tips & Substitutions

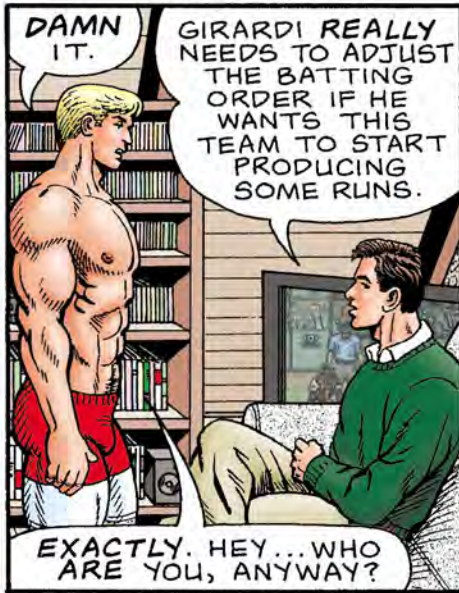
